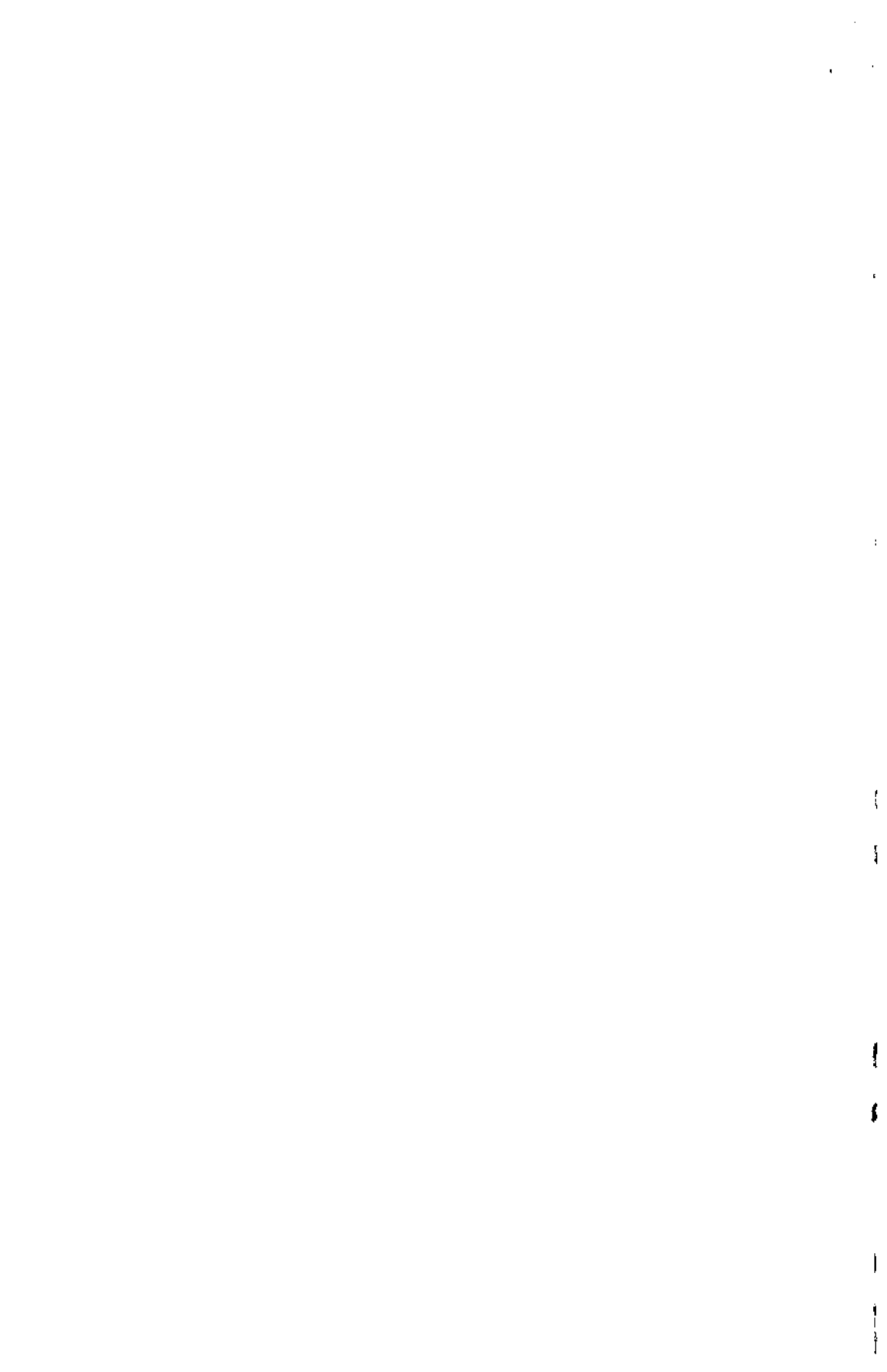

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THE GREAT SEAL OF IOWA

The Great Seal of the State of Iowa was adopted in 1847, by act of the First General Assembly. It is retained in the custody of and under the control of the governor.



THE STATE BANNER

On March 29, 1921, the Thirty-ninth General Assembly adopted a resolution designating a design for a flag to be known as the "State Banner."

The banner was designed by the "Iowa Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution," and consists of three vertical stripes of blue, white and red, with the blue stripe nearest the staff and the white stripe in the center depicting a spreading eagle bearing in its beak blue streamers on which is inscribed in white letters the state motto, "Our liberties we prize and our rights we will maintain." The word "Iowa" in red letters is just below the streamers.

The Wild Rose was officially designated as the flower of the state by the Twenty-sixth General Assembly in extraordinary session. The resolution was adopted May 7, 1897.



THE EASTERN GOLDFINCH, THE STATE BIRD OF IOWA

The Forty-fifth General Assembly, by a concurrent resolution adopted March 22, 1933, designated the Eastern Goldfinch (*Spinus tristis trist-is*), as the official Iowa bird. It is generally designated as a wild canary.

The Capitol Building



The cornerstone of this impressive-looking building was laid on September 29, 1873, in the twenty-seventh year of Iowa's statehood.

The towering central dome is covered with 22-carat gold leaf and the four smaller domes have dotted lines of gold, like seam marks, adding further attractiveness to the structure.

On the first floor of the Capitol are the offices of the Governor, Secretary of State, Auditor, Treasurer, Attorney General, Secretary of Agriculture and the Supreme Court Chambers.

On the second floor will be found the law library and the House Chamber to the north and the Senate Chamber to the south.

Iowa State Capitol

HE administrative, legislative and judicial functions of the state of Iowa are centralized in an imposing and substantial state capitol occupying a prominent place in a spacious park on a hill commanding the capital city of Des Moines.

In its architectural features, its lines of simple beauty, its convenient interior arrangement, and in its decoration and adornment, the Iowa state capitol compares favorably with those of other states. It has served well the needs of the state as a seat of government for more than half of the state's first century of statehood. The surrounding grounds, or park, provide a setting which in extent and attractiveness is unequalled. The state has an investment in this plant for the transaction of public business of over seven million dollars.

The governor and other elective state officials have offices in the capitol, on the first or main floor, conveniently grouped around two central halls in the form of a cross, the offices amply, but not luxuriantly, furnished with modern equipment. On this floor sits the highest judicial tribunal of the state, in the supreme court chambers, which harmonize with the dignity and importance of that body. The legislative chambers are on the second floor, while in the basement and on the third floor there are many business offices and work rooms. The law library, and many needed committee rooms, are on the second floor. The speaker of the house and the lieutenant governor have offices near the large halls for the senate and the house.

Design of the Building

The architectural design of the capitol, rectangular in form, with great windows and high ceilings, follows the traditional pattern of the nineteenth century planning for public buildings, a modified and refined Romanesque style which gives the impression of strength and dignity combined with utility, both severely plain and handsomely decorated.

The commanding feature of the capitol is the central towering dome. It is constructed of steel and stone and is entirely covered with pure gold, which glistening in the sunlight can be seen from far distant places. The dome is surmounted by a lookout lantern that may be reached by long and winding stairs, and it terminates in a finial that is 275 feet above the ground floor. The rotunda beneath the dome is 67 feet in diameter. Four smaller domes of simple design rise from the four corners of the capitol. The pediment over the front entrance discloses a fine piece of allegorical sculpture.

The exterior is entirely of stone, of several kinds and differing qualities, with elaborate columns and handsomely designed cornices and capitals. The substructure is of a dark and coarse-grained attractive stone quarried in Iowa. This is topped by a heavy course of vari-colored and beautifully marked granite cut from boulders scattered by glacial action over the prairies of the state. The superstructure, or main part of the building, is of a sandstone of a delicate buff color, fine-grained in texture, secured from Missouri in quarries along the Mississippi River. The approaches to the capitol are by four sets of steps mainly of granite.

Native Woods Used

The interior finish of the capitol is of native wood—cherry, walnut, catalpa, oak and butternut. There is much fine wood carving, and the supreme court bench is especially handsome as to material and workmanship. The main floors are of tile. Wainscoting and shelving are of marble, American and foreign, and some of this is very rare and unusual. There are imposing columns in the rotunda of fine sandstone, and on the second floor of granite, and in the legislative chambers of fabricated stone.

In size the capitol is 364 feet north and south by 247 wide. The cross-halls meet in the rotunda, with a wide opening from the basement floor to the base of the dome. The house chamber is 79x91.4 feet in size, with ceiling 47.9 feet high; the senate chamber is 58x91.4 feet and 41.9 to the ceiling. Each member of the General Assembly is provided with a separate desk, 108 in the house and 50 in the senate, and the house is equipped with an electric vote recording system.

Central Location Chosen

The history of the state capitol, the choosing of the location, the construction thereof, and provision for a proper setting and surroundings, covers the whole period of statehood. Almost every step taken during the state's first century encountered opposition from selfish or sectional interests, or from pretended reasons of economy, and this was true as to the proper site near the center of the state, the size and character of the building and securing the necessary ground for the plant and equipment in which to transact the business of the state.

The wisdom of a central location in the state for the seat of government was recognized by the First General Assembly, and before the state was two months old, a resolution was adopted looking to that end. A commission was authorized to choose a site and lay out a capital city, which was done, but the location did not meet with approval and the project was abandoned. Eight years later in 1855 the Fifth General Assembly, despite fierce opposition, by legislative act directed the location of the state capitol near the Raccoon forks of the Des Moines river. The precise place for the building was entrusted to a commission and a site was selected half way between the abandoned old Fort Des Moines and the scene of the last Indian agency on "Keokuk's Prairie." This place was decided upon because of the generous donation by citizens of Des Moines of a nine-acre tract and several buildings for a temporary capitol which was in use for nearly thirty years.

By proclamation of Governor Grimes in 1857 the city of Des Moines became the state capital, and near the close of that year the books and papers of the state were brought from Iowa City, the old territorial and first state capital.

Fifteen Years in Building

The state capitol was in process of building fifteen years. The Thirteenth General Assembly, in 1870, created a commission which selected the design, commenced work and in November, 1871, laid the cornerstone. The plan adopted was a modified composite of several designs submitted in competition. Messrs. Bell & Hackney were employed as supervising architects. Material for the foundation was purchased from Iowa quarries, as directed by law; but the stone proved unsubstantial and nearly all had to be removed.

The first building commission was discharged and a second was authorized to take charge of construction. Work proceeded under direction

of a supervisor and foreman, a working force was employed by the day, and material and equipment were purchased on bids or by contract. The legislature made small appropriations every two years and the work proceeded as rapidly as funds and material would permit.

Cornerstone in 1873

The cornerstone was relaid by the second commission on September 29, 1873, and it contains manuscripts, books, coins, money and historical material. It is simply inscribed "Iowa, A. D. 1873."

Construction had been so nearly completed that the legislative halls were occupied and many of the state offices when dedication was made in 1884. The temporary capitol was in use, however, for the supreme court and some other offices; but in 1886 the supreme court chambers were occupied. The work of the commission was brought to a close June 30, 1886. There was never a hint of misuse of public funds in connection with the construction, and a final audit of the \$3,296,256 expended showed a net error of only \$3.77 in computing of bills and accounts.

In 1902, in order to modernize the capitol and make needed changes and repairs, a third capitol commission was created and appropriations made for the work. While this work proceeded, there occurred a disastrous fire in the north wing on January 4, 1904, which ruined the house chamber and damaged other offices. The commission restored the building, purchased paintings and mosaics, and redecorated the entire interior. The original decorations are still in the Senate.

Historical Building and Library

The Historical Memorial and Art Building is 260x110 feet in size and was begun in 1896, at first as a home for the Aldrich collection of historical matter. It is occupied by the Historical Department, the State Traveling Library, the State Medical Library and offices of the Library trustees. The State Law Library is located on the second floor, west wing of the capitol.

Battle Flags—Lunettes—Statutes

The battle flags carried by the Iowa regiments in various wars are preserved in niches on the main floor—Civil War 36; Spanish-American War 13; First World War 26. In the west hall is a fine plaque done by Nellie V. Walker in commemoration of the work of Iowa women in the fight for civic and political equality. In the south hall is a monster photograph in colors, showing the grand review of Iowa troops on return from France.

Twelve statutes, high within the rotunda, beginning north of the library door, represent History, Science, Law, Fame, Art, Industry, Peace, Commerce, Agriculture, Victory, Truth and Justice.

Eight lunettes, or half-moon-shaped paintings surrounding the rotunda are the work of Kenyon Cox, a famous American artist, who was paid \$8,000 for them. They are entitled: Hunting, Herding, Agriculture, The Forge, Commerce, Education, Science, Art. They are allegorical and indicate the progress of civilization.

Over the main stairway is the large painting "Westward," and on the floor above the picture are six mosaics, designed by Frederick Dielman of New York and made in Venice of very small pieces of colored stone, permanent in color. The subjects represented are Defense, Charities, the Executive, the Legislative, the Judiciary and Education. These cost the state \$10,000 and are among the finest and largest in America.

The State of Iowa

THE Indians who first roamed these prairies called it Iowa, which is Indian for "This is the Place" or "The Beautiful Land." Iowa completed 100 years of statehood on December 28, 1946. It was the twenty-ninth state admitted to the Union and was the first free state west of the Mississippi River. There were 100,000 residents when Iowa became a state. Now we have 2,621,073.

During the first 160 years following the voyage of Joliet and Marquette down the Mississippi River in 1673, the land that is now Iowa was a favorite hunting and trapping ground for a number of tribes of Indians. Adventurers, miners, fur buyers, and traders, followed the worn trails along the valleys and over the prairies.

Part of Louisiana Purchase

Iowa was a part of the vast Province of Louisiana purchased by the United States from France. Other states had been formed in this region, but Iowa was the first state carved out and established with soil forever dedicated to human freedom. The probationary time as a territory was for eight and a half years and it had been only 13 years since the first legal settlements. Mining of lead had been engaged in at Dubuque since 1788, by favor of the Indians, and there had been feeble efforts at colonization along the river under Spanish grants, but not until 1833, following the Black Hawk war, did the home seekers secure title to their holdings.

Spanish and French monarchs had vague claims of jurisdiction over the region, but the standard of neither country had ever been set up permanently in any part of what is now Iowa. The United States closed out the French claim by purchase in 1803, after which local authority shifted frequently; namely, Indiana territory given jurisdiction, 1804; Louisiana territory organized with St. Louis capital, 1805; Iowa included in Missouri territory, 1812; when Missouri became a state, Iowa left without government, 1821; Territory of Michigan with a capital at Detroit given jurisdiction, 1834; became the major part of Wisconsin territory, 1836; organized and named Territory of Iowa, 1838; statehood first authorized, 1845; organized as a state, 1846.

Indians Were Here First

Iowa had been the home for many centuries of American red men, who succeeded an unknown race of pottery makers and mound builders, but few Indians were seen by the first explorers. A small band of friendly Indians entertained Joliet and Marquette at a camp on the Des Moines River near its mouth. A century later, the Sac and Fox federation of two Algonquin tribes had villages along the Mississippi River, where they cultivated land and had permanent homes. They had migrated originally from the Atlantic coast and before settling in Iowa had united for defense. When Illinois became a state, they were driven from their homes east of the river, and their lands bought or confiscated. Chief Black Hawk, the military leader of the Sac tribe, made heroic resistance, but was taken to Washington and kept a prisoner for a time.

The Sac and Fox federation had been chief occupant of the land along the Mississippi valley, and in 1833, following the Black Hawk war, a large part of their land in Iowa was taken by the United States and opened for settlement. The Black Hawk purchase, through which the Iowa River flows, was the beginning of Iowa, and by later acquisitions the entire state was opened for the use of the pioneers.

While the Sac and Fox federation claimed the eastern and central part of Iowa, there were other tribes having rights and making use of

the hunting grounds. The Iowa tribe wandered all over the state. The Winnebagoes were given land in northeast Iowa, but later were moved north. The Pottawattamies lived along the Missouri river, and were associated with the Otoes, Omahas and others. The Sioux tribe, of the Dakotah nation, claimed all northern Iowa and not until long after statehood was their title extinguished. The Mesquakie Indians, now living at Tama, are a branch of the Fox tribe, who returned after removal to the south.

Forts Were Established

The United States maintained several forts in Iowa or along the borders. Fort Madison, in Lee county, was maintained for a time after 1808. Fort Armstrong was placed on Rock Island in 1816. Fort Crawford had been maintained at Prairie due Chien many years. Fort Atkinson was located on the "neutral strip" and Fort Croghan was on the Missouri. In 1834, Fort Des Moines was built at Montrose, and the second Fort Des Moines was located at the Raccoon fork of the Des Moines in 1843. Fort Clark was maintained for a brief time at Fort Dodge. The present Fort Des Moines was established as a cavalry post at the state capital in 1900.

The site for the capital city of Iowa was first studied by Gen. Stephen W. Kearny, then a colonel in command of the first Fort Des Moines, who in 1835 brought a company of dragoons to the Raccoon forks looking for a good place to establish a military post. He was accompanied by Capt. Nathan Boone, son of Daniel Boone, and by Lieut. Albert M. Lea, who published a description of central Iowa and made a map on which he named this the "Iowa district." From this the territory formed soon afterwards took its name.

People Demanded Statehood

Although there were only 22,859 people in the twenty-two counties west of the Mississippi River when Iowa was set off as a territory, agitation for statehood commenced almost at once. One obstacle was the unwillingness of Congress, as then constituted, to admit any free soil state without also adding a slave state, so that the slave states would at all times have control of the senate. Several states had been so paired off for admission. The bill authorizing admission of Iowa in 1845 also provided for admission of Florida, one free and one slave state.

The people of Iowa and Congress disagreed as to the proper boundaries for Iowa, and Iowa twice rejected what was offered. Congress proposed that the western one-third of the state should not be included, but that all of southeastern Minnesota should be a part of Iowa. The Iowa people finally got the boundaries as they are now and a year and a half after admission was authorized, the final act of admission was passed and the state proclaimed, December 28, 1846.

When the territory was organized, Brevet Brig. Gen. Henry Atkinson was named territorial governor of Iowa, but declined the appointment and Robert Lucas was named and assumed the office. General Lucas had been governor of Ohio and had fought in the American wars. When the state was organized, Ansel Briggs of Jackson county, was elected to be the first governor of the state. The general assembly met and enacted laws before the final act of admission was completed at the national capital.

Part of Wisconsin Territory

When the territory of Wisconsin was established by act of Congress April 20, 1836, Belmont, located in Lafayette county, became its first capital. The first session of the territorial Legislative Assembly was held in a frame building built for the purpose. Prior to the convening of the second session of the Wisconsin Territorial Legislative Assembly on November 6, 1837, the capital was moved to Burlington, in the Iowa District. By act of Congress approved by President Van Buren June 12, 1838, the Territory of Iowa was created for that portion of Wisconsin Territory west of the Mississippi, and Burlington became its capital,

remaining so until removal to Iowa City in 1841, which became the first state capital in 1846, and so remained until 1857 when removed to Des Moines. The capitol building at Iowa City was turned over to the State University, and a temporary brick statehouse occupied at Des Moines while the present state capitol was being built.

The state constitution under which Iowa had entered the Union and which had been hastily prepared in 1844 and remodeled in 1846, was discarded and a new constitution adopted in 1857, which has since been several times amended. Slavery was forbidden from the state, but voting rights were reserved for white persons until 1868. Liberal school legislation was enacted at the outset. Elections were held every year until the biennial election system was adopted in 1904.

Some Iowa Slogans

Iowa's contribution to the building of the Washington monument at the seat of government was a stone, on which was lettered this inscription penned by Lt. Gov. Enoch W. Eastman: "Iowa, her affections like the rivers of her borders, flow to an inseparable union."

The State Seal displays a banner, and on the ribbons is the state motto: "Our liberties we prize and our rights we will maintain."

Nicknamed the "Hawkeye State," by the press and adopted by the people, the slogan by Sidney A. Foster, "In all that is good, Iowa affords the best," is more true today than when it was first spoken.

Politics, Too

Iowa was strongly Democratic in politics as a territory and for the first eight years of the state. In 1854 the Whigs elected the governor, who helped the free soil element organize the Republican party, which dominated for 35 years. In 1890 a Democrat became governor, because of dissensions over policy as to alcoholic drinks. Then followed eleven Republican administrations, when in 1933 the Democrats again seated two governors, who were followed by six Republicans to January 1957, when a Democrat became chief executive of Iowa. In 1907 the law required that all party nominations be made at primary elections.

By 1860 the state had 674,000 people, and for war that came soon after furnished 76,000 volunteers. In the period 1860 to 1870, the population increased to 1,194,000 after which the growth was slower.

The land area of the state is 55,586 square miles, or 35,575,040 acres, and the water surface 561 square miles. The maximum elevation of the state above sea level is about 1,600 feet.

Good Schools, Roads, Lakes

Iowa's literacy is high—99.2%. There are almost 7,200 public schools, including kindergartens, elementary schools, junior high schools, senior high schools, and a small number of adult education classes. There are 23 junior colleges—16 municipally operated and seven privately operated.

There are three state owned colleges, two special schools, one for the blind and one for the deaf. There are 22 colleges of higher learning, maintained by various denominations.

There are 381 public libraries, almost 500 newspapers, 64 radio stations and 14 TV stations which keep the public well informed. And 24 artificial lakes, 72 natural lakes and 137 public hunting grounds furnish recreation centers to thousands each year.

Included in the highways of Iowa are approximately 9,656 miles maintained by the state, known as primary highways; 13,700 miles of county trunk line highways and in excess of 80,000 miles of county roads. The two latter named road systems are maintained by the counties in which the highways are located. Each county, however, receives a share of the funds collected from state gasoline taxes.

Iowa has an average of more surfaced roads per square miles of its area than any other state. Surfaced roads of the state are over 40,000 miles. Surfacing connects every city, town and village with the general road system.

The Iowa State Capitol Park

THE limited area of the capitol grounds became a major political issue in 1914 in Governor George W. Clarke's administration. Looking to the future it was apparent that expansion would have to come to provide space for office buildings. The thirty-fifth General Assembly set up a tax to raise \$3,000,000 to purchase lots, buildings and residences to clear the way for expansion to 93 acres. The land was landscaped, drives were put in and a system of lighting was installed to enhance the beauty of the capitol.

A new state office building was completed and fully occupied in 1952. A tunnel connecting the state house and the building was also constructed. In the expansion program to centralize the offices of the state, the International Harvester building was purchased and its five floors were completely remodeled. The old school building on the northwest corner of the grounds was razed. The former home for governors north of the capitol was fitted for training of disabled persons. And the Amos Hiatt school building was better fitted for offices for the Commerce Commission. The impressive and well equipped historical building on Grand avenue, is fully described in their departmental section in this book.

Monuments Erected on Grounds

The most striking monument is the granite shaft rising 145 feet, erected to the memory of the soldiers and sailors of the Civil War. The heroic bronze figure "Victory" is predominant, while at the base there are four groups representing different branches of the military or naval service, and numerous historical plaques and medallion portraits of typical soldiers. The original design was by Harriet A. Ketcham and work was commenced in 1894. A small and appropriate memorial to Christopher Columbus, erected by Iowa citizens of Italian ancestry, stands near by.

General Greenville Dodge erected a monument honoring Iowa's long-time Senator William B. Allison. This is an allegorical design of heroic dimensions, depicting civic duties in the public service, and it is encompassed by a flower bed.

Monument to Pioneers

West of the capitol, is an impressive bronze statuary group depicting "The Pioneer." The cannon and mortar on the grounds are of Civil war days. The grave of Willson A. Scott, one of those who gave the state the capitol grounds, is near where he lived and is appropriately marked. A bronze cannon taken in the Spanish-American war, and the headpiece of the Battleship Iowa, are near the historical building. A granite block dedicated to the soldiers of the Spanish-American war also stands on the plaza east of the capitol.

In 1950, the fine record of Iowa citizens in war bond drives was rewarded with the presentation of a replica of the Liberty Bell, and it is properly stationed just across the road west from the new office building. Boy Scouts presented a replica in miniature of the Statue of Liberty and it is erected between Grand Avenue and the parking area east of the capitol building. A stone erected by the W.R.C. in honor of Crocker Post No. 12 Department of Iowa, was set in 1944.

The magnificent golden dome of the capitol, one of the largest in the world, is a landmark that can be seen for many miles. The capitol, the state historical building, and the capitol park are visited annually by thousands of people of Iowa and tourists from other states. On the grounds there are several very large native trees, and the grounds are further adorned by many shrubs, trees and flowers.

Governor's Office—Paintings—Quotations

The outer office of the Governor is impressive with desks and furnishings which have come down through the years. The chandelier centering the ceiling was imported in 1927 from Czechoslovakia, at a cost of \$800. It weighs 500 pounds, has 500 octagonal crystal teardrops, 18 crystal bells with clappers and is lighted by 65 fifty-watt bulbs.

The hand-frescoed ceiling has the original colors, as the artists used water colors in painting freshly plastered surfaces before the plaster dried. Thus the pigments of the water color penetrated the plaster, making a permanent and lasting surface which is preserved by careful cleaning.

The woodwork, mantel-mirror and marble paneling carry out the atmosphere of quiet elegance. A huge desk, used by Governors in the past, add to the dignity of this outer office. In an adjoining room is an unusually large grandfather's clock, noticeably of special interest to visitors.

The Governor's private office, with a handsome desk, elegant furnishings and a fireplace surmounted by a large mantel-mirror bespeaks impressively the dignity of that high office.

Description of Painting "Westward"

The great painting entitled "Westward" is an idealized representation of the coming of the people who made Iowa. Edwin H. Blashfield, the artist, wrote of it:

"The main idea of the picture is a symbolical presentation of the Pioneers led by the spirits of Civilization and Enlightenment to the conquest by cultivation of the Great West. Considered pictorially the canvas shows a prairie schooner drawn by oxen across the prairie. The family ride upon the wagon or walk at its side. Behind them and seen through the growth of stalks at the right come crowding the other pioneers and later men. In the air and before the wagon are floating four female figures; one holds the shield with the arms of the State of Iowa upon it; one holds a book symbolizing enlightenment; two others carry a basket and scatter the seeds which are symbolical of the change from wilderness to plowed fields and gardens that shall come over the prairie. Behind the wagon and also floating in the air, two female figures hold respectively a model of a stationary steam engine and of an electric dynamo to suggest the forces which come with the later men.

"In the right hand corner of the picture melons, pumpkins, etc., among which stand a farmer and a girl, suggest that here is the fringe of cultivation and the beginning of the prairie. At the left a buffalo skull rather emphasizes this suggestion."

Many competent critics have pronounced the picture one of the great American murals. The artist was paid \$10,000 for his work. The state received it in 1904.

At the top of the staircase on the south wall is a painting of a basket of corn by Floyd V. Brackney. He was paid \$1,000. This picture was the center of the Iowa exhibit at the Panama-Pacific exposition at San Francisco, 1915. He was a native of Marshall county.

Famous Quotations

Above the grand stairway, facing the large "Westward," are quotations. On the south side is one by Patrick Henry—"No free government

or the blessings of Liberty can be preserved to any people but by a firm adherence to Justice, Moderation, Temperance, Frugality and Virtue and by a frequent recurrence to fundamental principles."

On the north side is one by G. W. Curtis—"Courageous confidence in the intelligence of the community is the sure sign of leadership and success."

Underneath it is one by Solon—"The ideal state—that in which an injury done to the least of its citizens is an injury done to all."

Around the rotunda on the frieze above the columns is the famous Abraham Lincoln quotation—"That government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth."

Above the door of the law library appears William Pitts' saying, "Where Law ends Tyranny begins."

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS IN OFFICE BUILDINGS

In order to get various state departments centralized, a number of major projects have been completed within the past few years, chief of which was the new office building, erected east of the capitol.

There are five departments off the capitol grounds—the Banking Department, located in Central Bank Building and the Iowa Development Commission, at 200 Jewett Building at Ninth and Grand Avenue. The Employment Security Commission is at 114 West 11th St. The Aeronautics Commission headquarters are at the airport south of the city and the Highway Commission is at Ames.

New State Office Building

The six-story and basement office building, 120 by 246 feet, was fully occupied on April 24, 1952, when the Public Instruction department moved from the capitol. The Social Welfare department was the first to move in on September 1, 1951.

The 49th General Assembly appropriated \$1,650,000.00 available July 1, 1941, to start the building fund. Contracting firms doing the work were the Kucharo Construction Company, with the general building contract at \$2,805,757.40; Johnson Electric Company, \$493,955.57; A. J. Allen, plumbing and heating and pump, \$282,362.30; Iowa Sheet Metal Company, \$475,747.01; Seibert Floor Company, \$90,756.77; Montgomery Elevator Company, \$180,928.00; Artistic Venetian Blind Company, \$7,450.00; Herring Hall Marvin Safe Company, \$31,330.00; Diebold, Inc., \$44,347.91; Hockenbergh Fixture Company, \$62,045.34; Graham Sign Company, \$337.50; Brown Engineering Co., heating plant, \$54,639.40; Johns-Manville Sales Corp., \$174,553.80; Tinsley, Higgins, Lighter, architects, \$231,656.49. Total cost was \$4,935,892.45.

The Tunnel

The tunnel, connecting the statehouse with the new office building was completed early in 1953. The cost items follow:

Lovejoy Construction Co., \$78,507.68; Johnson Electric Co., \$9,828.00; bronze tablet, \$85.00; Tinsley, Higgins, Lighter, architects, \$4,421.03. Total cost was \$92,841.71.

Office and Lab Building

The International Harvester building, on the southwest corner of the statehouse grounds, was bought in 1945. Remodeling was started in 1949. Costs are as follows: International Harvester \$155,000.00; Westinghouse Electric Corp., elevators, \$47,159.00; general remodeling contract to Lovejoy Construction Co., \$125,347.00; Van Dyck Plumbing and Heating, \$97,750.00; Towner Electric Co., \$67,741.00; Johns-Manville for partitions, \$48,975.00. Total cost was \$541,972.00.

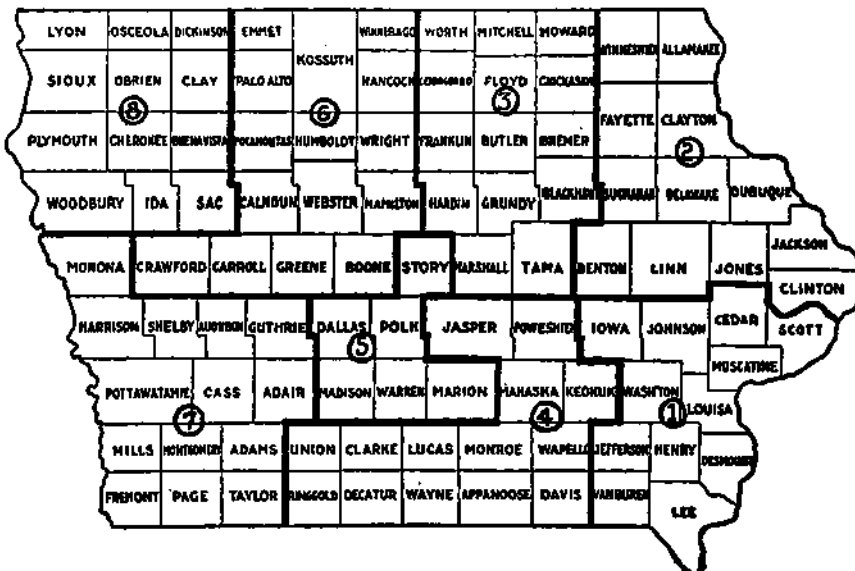
Iowa Congressional Districts

The office of Statistician of the Judicial Department was created by the Legislature in the enactment of House File 349 during the 56th General Assembly. The express purpose of the Act was to provide for the gathering of information for the benefit of the future general assemblies and to assist in the current administration of business conducted by the various courts in the Judicial System of the State. These purposes are more specifically set forth by the Legislature in Section 4 of the Act, which is as follows:

- "Sec. 4. Under the direction of the supreme court the statistician shall:
1. Collect and compile statistical and other data and make reports relating to the business transacted by the courts;
 2. Collect statistical and other data and make reports relating to the expenditure of moneys for the maintenance and operation of the judicial system and the offices connected therewith;
 3. Obtain reports from clerks of court, judges, justices of the peace, mayors, and magistrates, in accordance with law, or rules prescribed by the supreme court as to cases and other judicial business in which action has been delayed beyond periods of time specified by law or such rules, and make report thereof;
 4. Examine the state of the dockets of the courts and determine the need for assistance by any courts.
 5. Make reports concerning the overloading and underloading of particular courts;
 6. Make recommendations relating to the assignment of judges where courts are in need of assistance;
 7. Examine the administrative methods employed in the offices of clerks of courts, probation officers, and sheriffs, and make recommendations regarding the improvement of same;
 8. Formulate recommendations for the improvement of the judicial system with reference to the structure of the system of courts, their organization, their methods of operation, the functions which should be performed by various courts, the selection, compensation, number, and tenure of judges and court officials, and as to such other matters as the chief justice and the supreme court may direct; and
 9. Attend to such other matters as may be assigned by the chief justice and the supreme court."

Iowa is Indian for "This is the Place," or "The Beautiful Land." Centuries of wilderness and four glacial epochs prepared the soil of Iowa.

Upper Mississippi River and Iowa discovered June 17, 1673, by Marquette and Joliet, 181 years after Columbus found America.

Iowa, favorite Indian hunting land, purchased with Louisiana, 1803.

Black Hawk purchase, 1833, opened eastern Iowa to white settlers.

Second purchase, 1837; central Iowa, 1842; northwest Iowa, 1851.

In four years, 1833-1836, Iowa grew rapidly and became a territory.

Capitals—Burlington, 1838; Iowa City, 1841; Des Moines, 1857.

First Settlement—Lee County, 1820; Burlington, 1832; Dubuque, 1833.

School opened in Lee County, 1830; first newspaper, Dubuque, 1836.

Gen. Robert Lucas of Ohio, appointed governor of territory, 1838.

Ansel Briggs of Jackson County, elected first governor of the state, 1846.

First locomotive into Iowa at Davenport, 1854; railroad across Iowa, 1867.

State capitol built, 1873-1886; state historical building, 1899-1904; state office building, 1951.

Iowans in the wars: Civil War, 72,252, Iowa population 674,913; Spanish-American, 5,859, Iowa population 2,058,069; World War I, 114,213, Iowa population 2,358,066; World War II, 262,838, Iowa population 2,538,268; Korean conflict, 70,500, Iowa population 2,621,073.

The supreme executive power of the state is vested in the Governor, whose term of office is two years.

No person is eligible who has not been a citizen of the United States and resident of this state two years next preceding the election, and attained the age of thirty years at the time of said election.

He is commander-in-chief of the military forces of the state.

He transacts all executive business with the offices of government, civil and military.

When any office, from any cause, becomes vacant, and no mode is provided by the constitution and laws for filling such vacancy, the Governor has power to fill such vacancy.

He may convene the General Assembly in extraordinary session.

He is required to communicate, by message, to the General Assembly, at every regular session, the condition of the state, and may make such recommendations to the body as he shall judge expedient.

In case of disagreement between the two houses with respect to the time of adjournment, the Governor has power to adjourn the General Assembly to such time as he may think proper, but no such adjournment shall be beyond the time fixed for the regular meeting of the next General Assembly.

All bills, including appropriations, must be submitted to him for approval, and a two-thirds vote of both branches of the Legislature is required to pass a bill over his veto.

The Governor has power to grant reprieves, commutations and pardons, after conviction, for all offenses except treason and cases of impeachment. Upon conviction for treason, he has power to suspend the execution of sentence until the case shall be reported to the General Assembly. He has power to remit fines and forfeitures, and shall report to the General Assembly, at its next meeting, each case of reprieve, commutation or pardon granted, and the reasons therefor.

He appoints all principal officers of the state not elected by the people, and certain officers connected with the state government, by and with the consent of the Senate.

He signs patents for state lands, and appoints and commissions notaries public and commissioners in other states to take acknowledgements of deeds for this state.

He may demand fugitives from justice from the executives of other states, and may issue warrants, upon the request of other governors, for fugitives found in this state.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR

The Lieutenant Governor is elected for a term of two years and is required to have the same qualifications, as to age and residence, as the Governor.

In case of the death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability of the Governor, the powers and duties of that office devolve upon the Lieutenant Governor, as Acting Governor.

The Lieutenant Governor is president of the Senate, but can vote only when the Senate is equally divided. In case of his death or other disability incapacitating him from discharging the duties of his office, the same devolve upon the president pro tempore of the Senate.

He receives the same mileage and expense allowance as a member and double the compensation of a senator. He maintains an office at the capitol building only during the meetings of the General Assembly.

The office of Secretary of State is established by the Constitution of Iowa. Its three principal departments are the land office, the division of corporations and trademarks, and the general or custodial office.

Through his general office the Secretary of State serves as custodian of original and official documents of the state, including the constitution, the original statutes of Iowa, authenticated journals of the General Assembly, Administrative Rules and Regulations, and election records. The bonds of various elective and appointive officials are filed in this department.

The state land office maintains the records of the annexation or severance of land by the state and by incorporated cities and towns. Records of original patents issued by the state are also kept in the state land office.

Under the law of Iowa, charters of corporations for pecuniary profit, corporations not for pecuniary profit and cooperative associations are granted by the Secretary of State. Foreign corporations doing business in Iowa are required to obtain permits from that officer. Protective registration of trademarks, labels and forms of advertising is provided by the state department. These statutes are administered by the division of corporation and trademarks.

The Secretary of State is ex officio chairman of the Iowa Real Estate Commission, is an ex officio member of the State Executive Council, the State Board of Health, the State Printing Board, the State Permit Board and the Employment Agency Commission.

The Auditor of State is a constitutional official and at least once each year makes full settlement between the state and all state officers and departments and all persons receiving or expending state funds, and makes a complete audit of the books, records and accounts of every department of state. These departments include the office of the governor, the executive council, state comptroller, secretary of state, state treasurer, attorney general, supreme court, superintendent of printing, adjutant general, state board of control and all institutions under its control, department of health, board of education and all institutions under its control, department of public instruction, department of agriculture, highway commission, liquor commission, state fair board, state tax commission (including sales, income and chain-store tax divisions), board of railroad commissioners, banking department, conservation commission, state relief associations, and all other departments, boards and commissions.

The Auditor of State also has charge of the municipal finance department, the county accounting department, the fiscal affairs of all political subdivisions, including schools and school districts and building and loan associations. He appoints the county examiners, the municipal and school examiners, and the examiners of building and loan associations, examining their reports, conferring and discussing with said examiners the affairs of the counties, cities, etc., as disclosed by the reports, advising, suggesting and recommending such changes in policy as he deems expedient. All reports by building and loan associations and all fees, except fees for incorporation, are paid to him. No building and loan association can transact business in the state without a certificate of authority from the Auditor of State.

All offices of the 99 counties are examined annually, as well as all cities and townships of municipal corporations with a population of 2,000 or more and school districts with a population of 5,000 or more, but in cities, towns and school districts the audits are optional with the governing bodies and are made upon request.

For the purpose of examining, auditing and checking, the various departments of the state may be classified roughly into three groups, viz.: all those departments, boards and commissions located in or adjacent to the state house; the state highway commission and the institutions under control of the board of control and the board of regents; counties, cities, towns and schools.

The Auditor of State submits annual and biennial reports to the governor, as well as individual audit reports. The annual reports are on municipal finances, and the biennial reports on the operations of the auditor's office, and on the state and county, and building and loan affairs, are as narrative and statistical as the auditor deems necessary and the individual audit reports contain schedules, exhibits, comparative figures, etc.

Ex officio, the Auditor of State is a member of the executive council, printing board, geological board, bonus board and department of health.

The Treasurer of State is a constitutional official. The public revenues of the state are received and disbursed by the treasury department. A record is maintained to show the sources of all income, the funds to which such incomes apply, the dates received, and the amounts received. Disbursements are made only upon warrants issued as certified by the state comptroller. A record is kept of each warrant paid, as well as the date of issuance, date of payment, to whom paid and against which fund such warrant is drawn.

When remittance of state revenue is made by bank draft, check or money order, such items are deposited for collection in a bank or banks in the state which have previously been duly designated and approved as depositories for state funds.

The Treasurer of State also handles funds diverted under the public fund deposit guarantee acts of the Forty-first General Assembly, reimbursing losses of public funds which may be sustained on deposits in banks placed in receivership for liquidation.

The Treasurer of State is ex-officio Treasurer and custodian of the Unemployment Compensation Fund and ex-officio Member of the State Board of Health, also, member of the Board of Trustees and custodian of funds of the Public Safety Peace Officers Retirement System. Member of the State Board of Appeal, World War I Soldiers Bonus Board. The State Treasurer serves as Treasurer of the Iowa Centennial Memorial Foundation.

The Treasurer of State shall maintain in the state treasury a cash balance sufficient to pay the anticipated expenditures by the Highway commission for the ensuing month. When necessary to restore the cash balance in the state treasury, he shall draw against the motor vehicle funds collected by the treasurers of each county of the state in proportion to the amounts in their possession, a sum sufficient in the aggregate to restore said cash balance. Such drafts shall be honored by the treasurer of each county upon presentation.

Acts of the 45th General Assembly Extraordinary Session, provides for the refund of the license fee paid when gasoline is not used on the public highways.

Acts of the 55th General Assembly require the Treasurer of State to collect from distributors a license fee of 6c per gallon on all gasoline used in the State of Iowa except when used in federal and state owned cars.

The 53rd General Assembly created a Road Use Tax Fund by embracing the following: All net proceeds of registration fees of motor vehicles; all net proceeds of motor vehicle fuel tax or license fees; the compensation tax on motor vehicle certified carriers; all revenue derived from use tax on motor vehicles, trailers, equipment and accessories for same; 10 per cent of net sales tax revenue and any other funds by law credited to the Road Use Tax Fund. The fund is distributed monthly as follows: To Primary Road 42 per cent; to Secondary Road Construction Fund 35 per cent; to Farm-to-Market Road Fund 15 per cent and to the Street Construction Fund of Cities and Towns on a population basis 8 per cent.

It is the duty of the Attorney General to appear for the state, prosecute or defend all actions and proceedings, civil and criminal, in which the state shall be a party or interested, when requested to do so by the Governor, executive council or General Assembly, or he may so appear on his own motion; and shall prosecute or defend for the state all cases in the Supreme Court in which the state is a party or interested.

The Attorney General is given supervisory power over county attorneys.

He shall also, when requested, give his opinion in writing upon all questions of law submitted to him by the General Assembly or any state department.

It is also the duty of the Attorney General to prepare drafts for contracts, forms and other writings which may be required for the use of the state, and shall at the close of each biennial period report to the Governor the condition of his office, the opinions rendered and the business transacted in the office.

The Attorney General is an ex officio member of the state printing board.

The Iowa Department of Agriculture was created by the Fortieth General Assembly in 1923 for the express purpose of promoting and advancing the interests of agriculture.

At the present time the Department of Agriculture is responsible for the administration of fifty-two laws and employs a field force of fifty-six inspectors and nine district veterinarians.

The Iowa Department of Agriculture is a most important branch of our state government. Its functions and services vitally affect the health and welfare of every person in the state. Producers and consumers are protected by the enforcement of sanitary laws relating to the production, manufacture, processing and sale of food products. Business interests and consumers alike are protected through the elimination of unfair competition by the impartial enforcement of laws relating to the adulteration and mislabeling of foods, paints, petroleum products, insecticides, feeds, fertilizer and seeds. Agriculture is benefited by livestock disease control, the promotion of farm shows and exhibits, control of noxious weeds and insect pests, and the enforcement of labeling and standardization laws relating to agricultural feeds, seeds and fertilizers. In addition, the department, in cooperation with the federal government is responsible for service reports concerning weather, market news, crop statistics and crop estimates and yields.

Historical Data

The "Iowa Board of Railroad Commissioners" was created in the year 1878 for the purpose of regulating the operation of the railroads, which was the only major transportation system in existence in the State of Iowa at that time.

The jurisdiction of the Commission was extended from time to time by the General Assembly to include regulation of other public transportation agencies and public utilities such as passenger and freight motor carriers, truck operators and contract carriers, pipe lines, transmission lines, airports, and bonded warehouses. The Commission's jurisdiction covers practically everything having to do with the relationship between transportation agencies and the traveling and shipping public.

In order that the name of the department might better indicate the scope of the duties assigned it, the 47th General Assembly in the year 1937 changed the name to "Iowa State Commerce Commission."

Transportation and communication are vitally important to the people of Iowa, as well as the Nation, and the purpose of regulation is to preserve that service and at the same time safe-guard the interest of the public by insuring a nondiscriminatory service best suited to the public need at a cost reasonable to sustained operation. The service furnished by the various transportation agencies is so closely related that the General Assembly of this State, as well as elsewhere throughout the United States, has seen fit to centralize the responsibility for regulation in one body, here known as the Iowa State Commerce Commission.

The Commission is composed of three members, each of whom is elected by popular vote for a term of four years, and is the only Commission so chosen. The terms of the Commissioners overlap, two being elected at one General Election and one at the next General Election, so that there is at least one experienced member on the Commission at all times.

In representing the public, the Commissioners are constantly confronted with matters pertaining to rates and service, operating rights, safety requirements and many other things affecting relationship between the public and carriers. Numerous hearings must be held and decisions rendered, innumerable investigations conducted, court proceedings instituted, records of various kinds maintained, rates fixed, service prescribed, information imparted, taxes collected, and rules of operation adopted.

Commerce Counsel

C. A. Amend, Polk County

The 34th General Assembly created the office of Commerce Counsel in 1911. The Commerce Counsel is appointed by the Iowa State Commerce Commission for a term of four years subject to the approval of the Senate.

The functions of the office may be summarized briefly as follows: legal adviser to and attorney for the Iowa State Commerce Commission; investigate the legality of all rates, charges, tariffs, rules, regulations and practices of all common carriers under the jurisdiction of the Commission and institute proceedings thereunder; investigate the reasonableness of rates, tariffs, regulations and practices of all common carriers in interstate commerce when directed by the State Commission or when in his judgment such rates are unlawful, prejudicial or discriminatory against any city, town, business or citizen of the state and institute before the Interstate Commerce Commission and prosecute to final determination any controversy growing out of such matters; appear on behalf of any person who files complaint against any common carrier before the State Commission and in like manner appear and represent the Commission or any citizen, city, business or industry of the state in all proceedings brought by or against any common carrier before the Interstate Commerce Commission in which such parties are interested; appear as attorney in all actions instituted in state or federal courts wherein the validity of any rule, order or regulation of the State Commission or of the Interstate Commerce Commission affecting the interest of the State of Iowa is involved, and to prosecute in any state or federal court all actions necessary to enforce or to restrain the violation of any rule, order or regulation of the State Commission or of the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Safety—Service—Engineering Division

H. A. Franklin, Superintendent, Polk County

The duties of the Safety Engineer relate to all matters pertaining to safety in connection with the operation of railroads and pipe lines.

Those duties require the inspection and approval of all types of interlockings and other safety devices for the protection of railroad crossings, junctions or draw bridges; the general supervision of all railroad grade crossings; the inspection as required of safety devices used on cars, locomotives and other equipment of railroads; the inspection of bridges, track and structures when and as requested; investigation of train collisions where serious injury or loss of life occurs, and a report thereon with recommendations; investigation of train service and train operation when and as required; the approval and inspection of devices installed at highway grade crossings; the handling of matters relating to the closing of railroad stations, removal of depots or withdrawal of agency service; the handling of matters relating to right of way fences; inspection of communication wire line crossings over and under railways, and enforcing compliance with issued regulations; investigation of improper clearances; investigation of hours of service of railway employees where complaints are filed; the inspection of pipe lines and underground storage of gas, approval of construction specifications and requiring specific construction thereof; and the collection of construction inspection fees and annual inspection fees on pipe lines.

Electrical Engineer

The duties of the Electrical Engineer relate to all matters affecting the construction, maintenance, and operation of transmission lines outside of cities and towns.

The provisions of the transmission line law requires that a franchise be obtained before an electric line is constructed.

Motor Transportation Division

Eugene W. Powers, Superintendent, Polk County

The duties of the Division are to prepare notices of motor carrier hearings, issue decisions and orders. Issue, transfer and amend Motor Carrier Certificates, Truck Operator and Contract Carrier permits. See that the required insurance and tariffs are kept on file with the Com-

mission and make collections of all compensation taxes and fees due the Commission and to issue the required receipts covering such collections. Investigate matters pertaining to services, C.O.D. collections and claims. The Commission's Inspectors are continuously checking to see that all equipment is properly marked, receipts carried in cabs and the proper rates are charged. Also to see that services are not being provided by persons who do not hold the required authority from this Commission.

Rate Division

Kenneth D. Hoke, Chief, Polk County

The duties of the Rate Division consist of preparing exhibits on rates and charges to use before the Iowa Commission and the Interstate Commerce Commission. It acts as technical advisor to the Commission on questions involving rates and charges. It assists shippers with claims.

The Division maintains constant surveillance of proposed changes in railroad or motor carrier rates and services in order that the Commission and the shipping public may be informed. The Division also maintains current tariffs filed by the transportation agencies. It audits freight bills for the Board of Control and State Institutions and files necessary claims. It makes rate quotations and tariff interpretations to the shipping public and the transportation agencies.

Research and Statistical Division

Eugene L. Gill, Polk County

The Division performs research for all divisions of the Commission. It audits and compiles annual reports of large and small railroads, bridge and terminal companies, The Pullman Company, Railway Express Agency, Inc., and passenger and freight motor carriers. It issues accounting requirements and prepares studies and exhibits for the Commission, its divisions, Commerce Counsel, and the public generally when properly requested to do so.

The Director appears as a witness for the Commission and/or the State and public generally in hearings before the Iowa Commerce Commission, Interstate Commerce Commission and Courts.

Warehouse Division

Ray C. Johnson, Superintendent, Polk County

The Warehouse Division's employees inspect and measure all storage facilities before licensing bonded warehouses for storage of agricultural products and marks all warehouse units. It issues licenses to weigh and grade grain for storage purposes and collects license and inspection fees and makes inspections and special investigations of licensed warehouses and their operations. The Division keeps an inventory of commodities in storage, maintains on file required insurance policies and bonds and keeps a record of all warehouse receipts sent to and issued or cancelled by warehousemen.

State Boards, Commissions, Courts and Departments

COMMISSION OF AERONAUTICS

Appointed by the Governor with approval of the Senate.
Term six years.

The Fifty-first General Assembly created a new aeronautics commission and prescribed its duties and powers; also prescribed registration of persons engaged in aeronautics and operation of aircraft and aeronautics facilities; prescribed penalties and repealed old sections of the laws which authorized a commission of limited power. Commission membership carries no salary. Expenses and \$9 per diem, when engaged in duty for the commission, are authorized with a maximum of \$450 a year per member. The commission numbers five and the following have been appointed by the governor:

The Aeronautics Commission's primary purpose is to promote and foster development of aviation within the state of Iowa and to register all Iowa owned airplanes annually, as well as all Iowa airmen. During 1956 Iowa ranked tenth in the nation in the number of privately owned airplanes—1,629. There are approximately 16,669 pilots in the state of Iowa, but only 6,903 of them are active.

The commission provides the following services to Iowa aviation: Air Age Education, liaison with all flying groups and organizations, engineering services to cities and towns, and accident investigation. They enforce the Iowa Aviation Laws and provide an airmen's information service.



BERLIN, Frank W., Woodward

In 1942 married Janice Gall Smith of Perry, Iowa. Have a daughter, Linda, and two sons, Frank and Bruce. Member Methodist Church, Chief of Staff Iowa Air National Guard serving as Commander 1953-1957, Masonic order, B.P.O.E., American Legion and the National Fraternal Organization of Pilots, Quiet Birdmen. Appointed by the Governor. Term three years.

Board members receive no compensation. No person shall be eligible for more than two consecutive terms of office. Under the provisions of the law, the board meets at least four times during the year; at least

two of such meetings shall be held in the state house. The examination fee for those taking an examination to qualify as certified public accountants is \$25. Persons granted a certificate to practice must furnish bond to the auditor of state in the sum of \$5,000. However, in lieu of that \$5,000 bond, such person may file a certification from an insurance carrier that such person is insured, as an individual or a member of a partnership, under an accountancy liability policy in an equal or greater amount. The board publishes an annual register of all persons authorized to practice accountancy in this state.

Appointed second lieutenant, reserve corps, 1922, and in 1924 was appointed first lieutenant, cavalry, and assigned to F Troop, 113th cavalry. Promoted to captain, cavalry, July 1930. Commanded Machine Gun Troop, 113th Cavalry, 1929-1931, and transferred to the staff as S-4 Supply, 1931; served as S-4 and Adjutant, and on January 13, 1941, entered active military service with the 113th Cavalry. Was promoted to major and then lieutenant colonel and assigned to Inspector General's department in 1942. Served as Assistant Inspector General at New York Port of Embarkation for a year and went overseas as Inspector General of the Bristol Channel Ports and Inspector General in the continent. After returning to the States was assigned as Inspector General, Fifth Army, Chicago, Illinois, until relieved from active duty December 1946. Commissioned lieutenant colonel, Adjutant General's department, Iowa National Guard and assigned adjutant general 34th Infantry Division December 1946. Appointed assistant adjutant general of Iowa, September, 1948. Appointed to colonel, Iowa National Guard, March 1949. Promoted to brigadier general, adjutant general's corps, and appointed adjutant general of Iowa, September 29, 1950, by Governor William S. Beardsley. Promoted to major general, July 1953. Transferred and federally recognized major general air force on January 24, 1955. Member of the Adju-



tants General Executive Council Association, National Guard Association of the United States. Sojourners, Argonne Post American Legion, Servicemen's club, Des Moines Rotary club, Hyperion Field club, and 32nd Degree Mason. Married to Irene L. Ekdahl. Has two sons, Billy J. and Gary F.

The adjutant general issues and transmits all orders of the commander-in-chief and keeps a record of all appointments of officers commissioned by the governor, of all general and special orders and regulations, and of such matters as pertain to the organization of the military forces and the duties thereof. He has charge of the state arsenal and grounds and all other property of the state kept or used for military purposes. He furnishes at the expense of the state such blanks and forms as are approved by the commander-in-chief. In each year, pre-

ceding a regular session of the General Assembly, or at any other time the governor may direct, he makes out a detailed report of the transactions of his office, the expenses thereof and such other matters as shall be required by the commander-in-chief for the period since the last preceding report.

All muster rolls, reports, returns, enlistments, discharges and complete records of the national guard and state guard are filed and made a matter of record in his office. The records of Iowa soldiers for the Civil, Spanish-American and World War I are on file in his office and all information desired from such records is furnished by him. Certificates of military service of Iowa soldiers of the late wars or past service in the organized militia and national and state guard are given by him under the seal of his office. He is disbursing officer of all state appropriations for the use and support of the national guard and as adjutant general all military property is committed to his custody which he is required to issue for the use of the national guard and state guard, keeping an account of the same. He is required to furnish such reports of the national guard and state guard of the state as the war department may from time to time require.

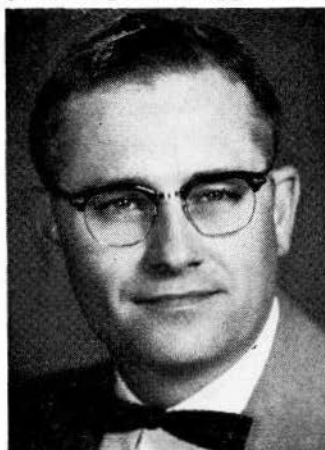

Deputies and bank examiners are appointed by the superintendent subject to the approval of the banking board which fixes remuneration of such appointees within limits prescribed by law and passes upon all applications for new banking charters.

The basic science law enacted by the 46th General Assembly establishes a state board of examiners in the fundamental sciences underlying the practice of the healing arts, providing for its organization and powers, and that certification by such board following examination in the six basic sciences of anatomy, physiology, chemistry, pathology, bacteriology and hygiene is prerequisite to eligibility for examination for a license to practice medicine and surgery, osteopathy, osteopathy and surgery, and chiropractic. It establishes uniform educational standards in the fundamental sciences for all applicants for license to diagnose and treat human ailments. The act does not apply to dentists, dental hygienists, nurses, pharmacists, optometrists, embalmers, podiatrists, barbers or cosmetologists practicing within the limits of their respective professions, or Christian Scientists.

The personnel of the board consists of six members learned in the basic sciences, having no degrees in the healing arts. The members of the board receive as compensation \$10 per diem for the time actually employed and necessary expense incurred in the discharge of their duties which is paid out of funds in the state treasury received as fees from applicants for examination.

The board meets in Des Moines and there conducts the examinations in the basic sciences four times each year, respectively on the second Tuesday in January, April, July and October. The examination fee is \$10.

The Commission for the Blind, created in 1926, offers the following rehabilitative services to the blind in Iowa: Help is offered with problems of acceptance and adjustment to blindness, through home teachers, themselves blind, who call on blind persons in the state and offer, in addition to counseling, training in braille, typing, handcrafts, home-making, cooking and other activities which have been made difficult by reason of blindness. The objective is to help the person to see how he can pursue normal activities despite the visual handicap.

Help is offered to blind persons in regard to employment problems; and guidance, including testing, counselling and information, is offered to help individuals to formulate a realistic vocational goal. Where indicated help is offered with the cost of vocational training, after which the blind person is helped, where needed, to find suitable employment.

Small refreshment canteens are established by the Commission in hospitals, post offices and other public and private buildings throughout the state. These are operated by blind persons and this has proved to be a stable source of employment.

Home work units are established in the homes of blind persons and products produced, including rugs, mats, ironing board covers, etc., are marketed throughout the state.

Phonographs, called Talking Book Machines, which "read" a wide variety of recorded literature, are distributed by the Commission to both blind children and adults in the state.

A register of the blind in Iowa, showing cause of blindness, age and other statistical information valuable in program evaluation and planning is maintained by the Commission.

Other miscellaneous rehabilitative services are provided according to law.

The superintendent of buildings and grounds shall, on or before September 30, preceding each regular session of the General Assembly, make a verified report to the executive council which shall cover all transactions for the preceding biennial period.

It is the duty of the superintendent, except as otherwise provided by law to have charge of, preserve and adequately protect the state capitol and grounds, and all other state grounds and buildings at the seat of government and all property connected therewith or used therein or thereon; to see that all parts and apartments of said buildings are properly ventilated and kept clean and in order; to see that all visitors at proper hours, are properly escorted over said grounds and through said buildings, free of expense; to have at all times, charge of and supervision over the police, janitors, and other employees of his department in and about the capital and other state buildings at the seat of government; to institute in the name of the state, and with advice and consent of the attorney general, civil and criminal proceedings against any person for injury or threatened injury to any public property under his control; and to keep plans and surveys of the public grounds, buildings and underground constructions at the seat of government; to perform all duties required by law or order of the executive council.

Governor's Home Maintenance

The superintendent of buildings and grounds of the state of Iowa, under the direction of the governor, is hereby authorized to provide, furnish and pay for public utilities, service, heat, maintenance, minor repairs, and equipment in operating and maintaining the official residence of the governor of Iowa, located at 2900 Grand Avenue, Des Moines, Polk County, Iowa.

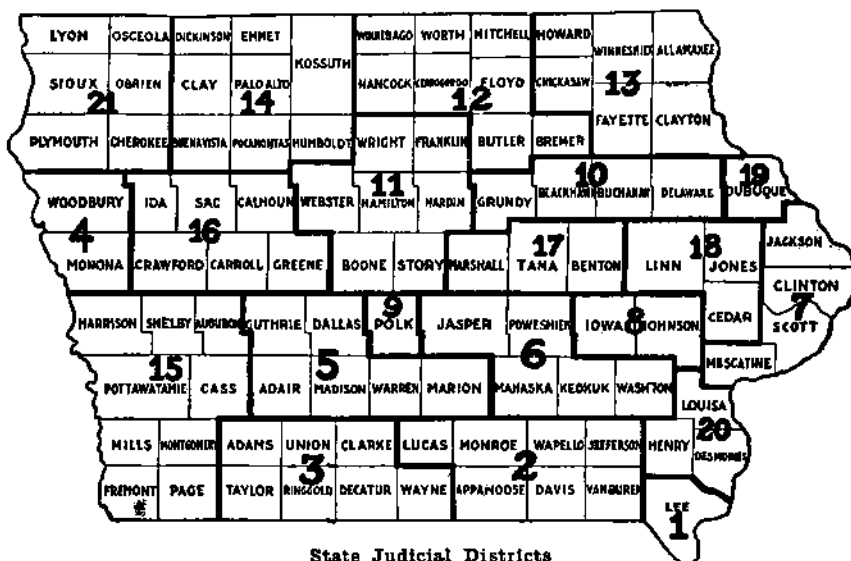


SARSFIELD, Glenn D. Republican

The state comptroller audits all demands by the state and preaudits all accounts submitted for the issuance of state warrants; controls the payment of all moneys into the state treasury and all payments from the state treasury; prescribes all accounting and business forms and the system of accounts and reports of financial transactions by all departments and agencies of the state government other than those of the legislative branch; keeps a central budget and proprietary control accounts of the state government; established a reasonable cash revolving fund for each department or institution for disbursement purposes where needed; has the custody of all books, papers, records, documents, conveyances, leases and other documents appertaining to the fiscal affairs and property of the state which are not required to be kept in some other office; apportions the interest of the permanent school fund; prepares biennially a list of all standing appropriations and furnishes a report of same to each member of the Legislature; prepares the budget document and drafts the legislation to make it effective; reviews such requests for allotments as are submitted to the governor for approval; determines the need for all transfers of appropriations submitted to the governor; makes such investigations of the organizations, activities and methods of procedure of the several departments and establishments as he may be called upon to make by the governor and executive council or the Legislature; furnishes any committee of either house of the Legislature having jurisdiction over revenues or appropriations such aid and information regarding financial affairs of the government as it may request; prepares and submits to the governor and the Legislature on or before December 1st of each year, an annual report, setting forth in detail and in summary form the financial condition and operations of the government; and prepares such other reports as the governor or the General Assembly may from time to time require of him.

SUPERIOR COURTS

The Iowa statutes provide that any city of 4,000 population, or over, may establish a superior court. There is at present one such court located in Keokuk. The judges are elected for terms of four years and receive an annual salary, which is paid quarterly, the first two quarters being paid from the city treasury and the last two quarters from the county treasury of the county in which court is located. Salary of judge, \$5,875.00 per annum.

The judges appoint a shorthand reporter, whose compensation is fixed by order of the court not exceeding \$8.00 per day for the time actually employed.

MUNICIPAL COURTS

Any city, now or hereafter having a population of 5,000 or more, as shown by the last preceding United States census, may establish a municipal court. All civil townships in which said city or any part thereof is located shall constitute the municipal court district and its jurisdiction is co-extensive with the territorial limits of the county in which the court is located.

The salary of municipal court judges is \$5,875 in cities with population less than 30,000; \$6,500 with population from 30,000 to 75,000; \$6,750 with population 75,000 or over. Compensation of court reporter is fixed by the judge at not to exceed \$12.50 per day in cities under 70,000 and \$15 per day in cities over 70,000 population. Salary of clerk is \$3,800, \$4,300, and \$5,500 and for bailiffs is \$3,600, \$3,850 and \$4,100 according to population of the cities as above indicated.

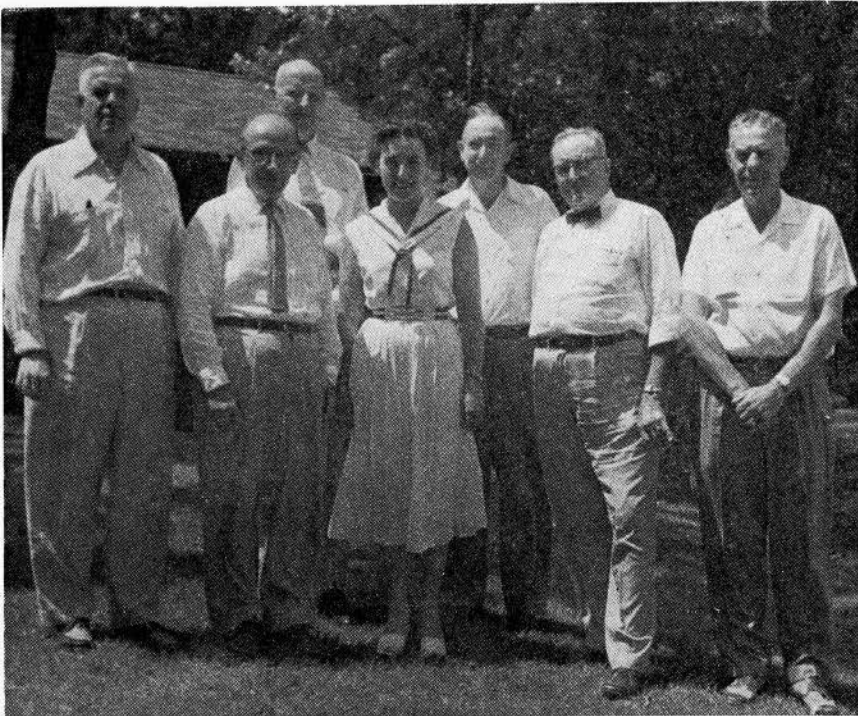

The conservation commission makes recommendations for the acquirement of state parks and preserves, forests and other state conservation areas, and is charged with the duty of administering same. The commission is charged with the duty of protecting, propagating, increasing and preserving the fish, game and fur-bearing animals, and protecting the birds of the state and the enforcement of laws relating thereto. The administration and enforcement of laws relating to boats and navigation in the state-owned inland waters of the state is a duty of the commission. The Commission has jurisdiction over the state-owned meandered lakes and streams of the state and the construction of dams and other improvements relating to such waters.

Commission Jurisdiction

The State Conservation Commission has jurisdiction over the following lands and water areas of the state: Eleven meandered streams, 800 miles; 123 wildlife refuges, 34,786.19 acres; 24 artificial lakes, 3,210 acres; 72 natural lakes, 43,235 acres; 161 public hunting grounds, 90,498 acres.

The board of control of state institutions was created under the provisions of chapter 118, laws of the Twenty-seventh General Assembly, which, with the amendments thereto, clothes the board with full power to manage, control and govern, subject only to the limitations contained in the act, the institutions under its management.

The board of control was organized on April 6, 1898, and took full control, as provided by statute, on July 1, 1898, of the institutions subject to its control.

The board is required to inspect county and private institutions in which insane persons are kept.

The board is required to investigate the management and financial conditions of the state institutions under its control, to determine questions as to the sanity of patients in state hospitals, and to determine when persons shall be admitted to them as state charges, and is required to divide the state into hospital districts. It is required to make biennial reports to the governor and legislature showing the cost of operating the institutions for the preceding two years and to visit all institutions twice each year. Some member of the board or its agent is required to visit each hospital for insane once each month. The board is required to meet the superintendents and other heads of institutions in quarterly conferences, to gather statistics, to require official bonds of certain institution officers, to make a semi-annual invoice of all the stores of the institutions, to fix annually the salaries of officers and employees not fixed by law, and to perform other duties provided by law. Following is a list of the 14 state institutions under the supervision of the board of control and the executive officer of each.

Iowa Cares for Children and Veterans

The state board of control has jurisdiction over 14 state institutions, of which six are for the mentally unfit and three are for criminal offenders. The remaining five are divided as follows: two training schools, designated as correctional institutions: one for boys, at Eldora; one for girls, at Mitchellville; two orphanages, at Toledo and Davenport; and the soldiers' home at Marshalltown.

Training School for Girls, Mitchellville

The training school for girls was established in 1868, to be located on property in Lucas county, leased from a Society of Friends, or Quakers. The first admission was April, 1873. In 1880 the present training school, at Mitchellville, was located, taking over the Lucas county plant.

Girls between the ages of 10 and 18 are admitted, on commitment from district, juvenile and municipal courts or on transfer from other institutions by the board of control.

Under competent instruction and supervision, girls are taken through the twelfth grade of regular public school work, and are taught all necessary branches of home economics.

Farming and gardening are carried on, with good results.

The present superintendent is Mrs. Marie L. Carter.

Juvenile Home, Toledo

The state maintains a juvenile home, or orphanage, at Toledo. Dependent, destitute, homeless and neglected children are admitted and given care until they are 21 years of age, most of them being placed in good private homes, under the supervision of women state agents.

The buildings are substantial and kept in a home manner as far as possible. Generally the children are happy and contented and make good progress in their school work.

The present superintendent is Lyle E. Kelley.

Iowa Annie Wittenmyer Home, Davenport

The second state orphanage is known as the Iowa Annie Wittenmyer Home and is located at Davenport.

The first child was admitted July 4, 1864. Dependent, neglected and abandoned children are admitted upon court order or personal application of parent or guardian, approved by court or board of supervisors.

The children are given scholastic and industrial advantages, with moving pictures, all manner of games and sports, picnics and the like, to make life more pleasant.

The present superintendent is Leon R. Lyle.

Iowa Soldiers' Home, Marshalltown

The board of control also manages the Iowa Soldiers home at Marshalltown, founded in 1887.

Life is lived pleasantly by the soldiers, with plenty of amusements, moving pictures, billiards and pool, cards, horseshoe pitching and all manner of games and light sports. The nearby river permits fishing and boating and families are kept together by the presence of the veterans' wives. The men and women take frequent furloughs, to visit relatives and friends. Upon their return they seem more than ever satisfied.

The present commandment is George R. White.

Training School for Boys, Eldora

The training school for boys at Eldora was opened March 31, 1868. This school is for incorrigible and delinquent boys, sent there upon court order. The school has farms upon which are learned, by practical work, and have various entertainments and amusements, including movies,

the various phases of farming and gardening. In addition there are industrial shops, tailor, blacksmith, automobile, shoe, printing, sewing room, bakery, machine shop, plumbing, carpenter, mason and painting.

Competent schools are presided over by efficient teachers. Athletics, debates, home talent plays, a fine band, moving pictures, a good library and other opportunities are provided to improve mind and body.

The present superintendent is Hollis L. Miles.

Iowa Penal Institutions

Under Supervision of Board of Control.

State Penitentiary at Fort Madison

The prison at Fort Madison is more than 100 years old. It was established in 1839, the year after Iowa became a territory, and seven years before it became a state.

Under the able guidance of the board of control and recent wardens, the Fort Madison penitentiary has achieved high rank among the nation's penal institutions. Outbreaks have been few and escapes infrequent. A parole system enables the men of highest intelligence and best records to work on the prison farms, away from the enclosure, and even to go to the state's various other institutions under the board of control (state hospitals and schools) to work and live on an honor system.

The inmates as far as is possible are kept at work, according to their terms of sentence, many being fitted for industries at which they can support themselves after release. Each prisoner is interviewed, upon admittance, by the chaplain and the warden, in an effort to see what work he should be put to and what can best be done to reclaim him.

The inmates have recreation and amusement opportunities. Headphone radios are installed in the cells and good programs are furnished from a central control. A good library is well patronized; athletics and moving pictures make life more bearable. Baseball, kittenball, tennis, boxing, wrestling, horseshoe pitching, football and basketball give ample opportunity to most of the men to keep in good physical trim.

Under the law all condemned prisoners are executed at Fort Madison.

The present warden is P. A. Lainson.

Men's Reformatory at Anamosa

The men's reformatory is located at Anamosa, where the first prisoner was admitted on May 13, 1873. Originally intended for first and youthful offenders, and the criminally insane, within recent years prisoners have been transferred from Fort Madison as conditions demand.

Grain and livestock farming are carried in here on a large scale. A large modern canning plant is operated here as an industry. Most of the vegetables for the other state institutions are canned here. Other industries include the manufacture of soap, clothing, automobile number plates, road signs and cheese.

The prisoners are kept at work, according to the sentences imposed on them, but they have ample recreation and amusement facilities, including various sports and games, radio programs and moving pictures. Part of the reformatory yard, or enclosure, is flooded during the winter, permitting ice skating.

The warden of the men's reformatory is Ray Purcell.

Women's Reformatory at Rockwell City

Women over 18 years old, convicted of offenses which carry a term of more than 30 days, are sent to the women's reformatory at Rockwell City. The first prisoner was received on May 2, 1918.

The fact that many short-term offenders are sent to Rockwell City, instead of being kept in county jails, makes the per capita cost of main-

tenance large. The women are given an opportunity to attend school dances, lectures and recitals, home talent plays and picnics.

The superintendent is Mrs. Eida M. Kyles.

Iowa Cares for Mental and Needy Cases

Iowa Mental Institutions are administered by the State Board of Control.

On February 27, 1861, the first patient was received at the state hospital at Mount Pleasant, generally said to be the first institution of its kind west of the Mississippi river.

For the past 49 years Iowa has had four institutions to care for its mentally afflicted, those at Independence, Clarinda and Cherokee having been added. These are now known as Mental Health Institutes.

Four Hospitals for Mental Cases

In order of their establishment Independence comes second, the first patient having been admitted there on May 1, 1873; Clarinda is third, December 13, 1888; Cherokee, fourth, August 18, 1902.

Two Homes for Feeble-Minded

The reports of these four state hospitals do not begin to tell the entire story of what Iowa is doing for its mentally deficient and unfit. The state board of control has jurisdiction over two other institutions belonging to this same general classification: The Glenwood State school at Glenwood, which received its first patient on September 1, 1867; and the Woodward State Hospital and School at Woodward, which received its first patient on September 3, 1917.

Each of these six institutions is open to general visitors within certain prescribed hours each day, and parents at any time. To the limit of funds available they are well kept, sanitary and attractive, the buildings at each place being surrounded by large grounds, nicely landscaped and properly tended. While the atmosphere is not at all depressing, entertainment is arranged for as many as can mentally enjoy it.

The present superintendents are as follows: Mount Pleasant, Dr. W. B. Brown; Independence, Dr. J. O. Cromwell; Clarinda, Dr. Karl Catlin; Cherokee, Willard C. Brinegar; Glenwood, Alfred Sasser, Jr., and Woodward, Dr. Grace M. Sawyer.

PUBLIC ASSISTANCE

State-wide monthly aid to dependent persons in Iowa is provided under the programs of Old Age Assistance, Aid to Dependent Children and Aid to the Blind. Through these programs cash grants are provided needy persons residing outside of state or county institutions. As of July, 1951, there were 48,920 aged, 5,171 dependent children beneficiaries and 1,258 blind receiving financial help under the programs. The cost of monthly aid to such persons amounted to \$35,824,206 for the 12 months ending June 30, 1951. Of this amount, 52.1 per cent was provided from Federal funds, 43.3 per cent from state funds and 4.6 per cent from county funds.

In Iowa 19 out of each 100 persons age 65 years or over are being provided assistance. Over 3,000 of these recipients are being cared for in private nursing homes. The Legislature, through the State Department of Social Welfare, has effectively provided for many of the special needs of the aged citizen.

Under Chapter 96, Code of Iowa, the Iowa Employment Security Commission administers a program designed to assist workers to gain a more profitable and satisfactory employment status and to provide employers with satisfactory workers. The program is planned to assist unemployed workers in finding suitable work and to enable employers to stabilize their employment and to secure workers skilled in the type of work offered.

The Employment Security Law levies a tax upon employer payrolls of four or more workers in commercial and industrial employment for the purpose of providing a fund from which weekly benefits are paid to workers who are unemployed and who meet eligibility requirements.

Each employer's contribution rate is based upon his individual employment record. If his employment record is favorable his contribution rate will be lower than the standard rate. The plan is intended to encourage employers to provide steady employment and to avoid lay-offs.

The Iowa payroll tax is known as one of the lowest in the United States. For several years past about one-half of all covered employers of the state have so stabilized their employment that they are not required to pay any contribution tax to the state, at the same time a reserve amounting to more than \$107,000,000 has accumulated.

Workers who are employed by employers liable under the law build up wage credits, and upon becoming unemployed, if found eligible and no suitable work is available, are paid weekly benefits based upon the amount of their earnings but not to exceed \$30 per week and for not more than 24 weeks in a 12-month period.

The Iowa State Employment Service was established in 1915 by legislative action. In 1933 the Congress enacted the Wagner-Peyser Act establishing the United States Employment Service, thus providing a nation-wide employment service with local offices in every state. With the enactment of the Iowa Employment Security Law in 1936, administrative control of the Iowa State Employment Service was given to the Iowa Employment Security Commission. Thirty-five full-time local employment service offices serve every section of Iowa.

Under the terms of Title IV of the Federal Readjustment Act the State Employment Service renders an effective job placement and employment counseling service to veterans, providing them maximum job opportunities in the field of gainful employment.

The Employment Security Commission, under terms of an agreement with the U. S. Secretary of Labor, is authorized to administer Title IV of the Veterans Readjustment Act of 1952, which provides unemployment compensation to veterans of service on or after June 27, 1950, at the rate of \$30 per week not in excess of a total of 26 weeks. Determinations are made in accordance with provisions of the Iowa Employment Security Law insofar as the state law is applicable.

The Commission, through its system of local employment offices, receives and processes all claims for unemployment insurance under the Employment Security Law, finds jobs for unemployed workers, gives effective job counseling and offers a testing service to determine proficiency and natural fitness.

Under terms of an amendment to Title XV of the Federal Social Security law the Iowa Employment Security Commission administers the program providing unemployment insurance to federal civilian employees, in accordance with provisions of Chapter 96, Code of Iowa.

Under Chapter 97, Code of Iowa, the Commission has the responsibility of carrying out the provisions of the Iowa Old Age and Survivors Insurance law, enacted by the Fifty-first Iowa General Assembly, to insure the rights of all public employees retired under or otherwise affected by this recently repealed statute.

The Commission administers Chapter 97B, Code of Iowa, known as the Iowa Public Employees Retirement law, receiving and processing all claims and collecting contributions from both employees and employers.

Under terms of the State Supplemental Retirement law, Chapter 97B, Code of Iowa, Fifty-fifth General Assembly, the Commission receives retirement applications through the facilities of its system of local employment service offices throughout the state.

The Employment Security Commission administers Chapter 97C, Code of Iowa, which together with amendment to Title II of the Federal Social Security Act, extends to employees of the State and its political subdivisions the protection and benefits afforded under the Federal Social Security Act. This entails the withholding of a 2¼ percent tax upon the wages of all employees, collecting of a like amount from public employers, accounting for all funds and transacting other business.

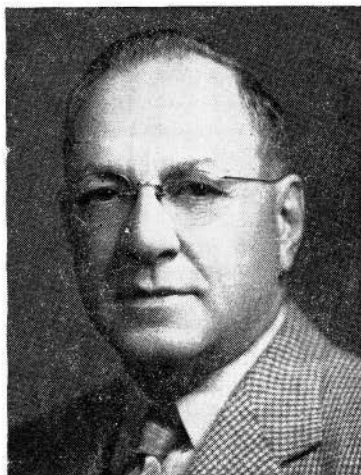

Among the duties placed upon the executive council by the laws of Iowa are the following: To act upon all state activities and to notify all interested persons of action taken thereon; to determine the value at which property may be taken by Iowa corporations and amount of stock which may be issued on account thereof; to approve articles of incorporation and by-laws of building and loan associations, and plan for liquidation of said associations; to approve property purchases and acceptance of gifts; to authorize department leases; to approve the issuance of patents, corrected patents and easements; to approve and purchase all state vehicles; to authorize and pay special assessments; to authorize and pay court costs, and special attorney general's fees; to authorize condemnation proceedings; to authorize payment of institutional vouchers; approve bank depositories of public funds; authorize issuance of "dummy" plates; approve compromise tax settlements; reimburse school district taxes under Sec. 284, Code, 1954, to purchase all stores, supplies and furniture for the state departments and officers; to execute contracts for fuel, lights and repairs; to approve all requisitions, issue purchase orders and authorizations; has custody of supplies for state offices and commissions; the canvass of votes cast for state and district officers; the declaration of changes in classifications of cities; the assignment of office rooms to state officers; the approval of out-of-state travel; the appointment of the board of examiners of mine

inspectors; the approval of plans for state buildings; the authorization of printing pamphlets, posters and booklets for various departments.

The secretary of the executive council is also car dispatcher, secretary of conservation commission and of the board of engineering examiners. He also has the direct supervision of the state postoffice employees and the telephone office employees.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COUNCIL SECRETARY

Section 19.6, Code of Iowa, 1954, requires that a report of the secretary of the executive council be published in the Iowa Official Register. That portion of the report of the secretary dealing with matters of general interest is presented here. Other matters required in the report as to Iowa cities and the official canvass of Iowa election results are presented in tables elsewhere.

There were 51 council meetings held during the year 1955, the final joint meeting with the Legislative Advisory Committee on the Liquor Warehouse, and 18 special meetings. In 1956 there were 49 council meetings and 14 special meetings.

STATE HOUSE TELEPHONE EXCHANGE

(Located on ground floor, State Office Building)

Working under the executive council, this department handles local and long distance calls for the Capitol building, State office building, Historical building, Old Amos Hiatt building and Office and Laboratory building.

Among the hundreds of calls answered daily are inquiries concerning various functions of departments, personnel, hours of operation and so forth. During legislative sessions and time for filing income tax returns, a very heavy increase is noted in both local and long distance calls.

The state board of engineering examiners was created by the Thirty-eighth General Assembly in 1919. No person can practice professional engineering or land surveying without first being registered with this board. The board meets from time to time and conducts examinations of applicants for registration.

The law provides that the membership of the board shall consist of five members who shall be appointed by the governor. Each member of the board shall be a professional engineer at least thirty-five years of age and shall have been a resident of this state for at least three years immediately preceding his appointment and shall have had at least ten years active practice preceding his appointment and during such time shall have charge of engineering work as principal or assistant for at least two years, and shall be a member in good standing of a recognized state or national engineering society. No two members of said board shall be from the same branch of the profession of engineering.

CAR DISPATCHER DEPARTMENT

A bill known as Dispatcher of State Automobiles was passed by the Forty-eighth General Assembly in 1939. Under this bill, the authority to assign all state-owned motor vehicles to state officers and employees, and state offices, departments, bureaus and commissions, was vested in the Governor and the Executive Council. This law went into effect July 1, 1939. Upon the appointment of a State Car Dispatcher, steps were taken to place all state cars under the control of this department, except the State Highway Commission and the Board of Education (University of Iowa, Iowa State College, Iowa State Teachers' College, etc.), which was not directly under the jurisdiction of this department. In 1941 the Forty-ninth General Assembly amended the original law so that the maintenance for all cars and trucks was paid by the State Car Dispatcher. The cost of maintenance, plus the administrative costs and depreciation, were charged back to each department according to the actual amount paid out for the operation of each motor vehicle. Rules and regulations were adopted, presented to the Executive Council, and approved.

In 1956, this department had 702 cars and 301 trucks, making a total of 1,003 units. The total for 1955 was 957 units.

The Car Dispatcher Department maintains a record of miles driven, cost per mile of each unit, and the overall operation cost. All purchases of cars and trucks are made by bid, and with the approval of the Executive Council. The assignment of all motor vehicles must have also the same approval. For 1955, the operating cost for passenger cars was \$.0328 per mile, and for trucks \$.0611. For 1956, the cost per mile for cars was \$.0304, and \$.0598 for trucks.

IOWA CENTENNIAL MEMORIAL FOUNDATION

The responsibility of the Iowa Centennial Memorial Commission is to administer the \$200,000 fund realized from the sale of memorial half dollars during the Iowa centennial year, 1947. The commission is authorized to spend the income from this fund for awards and scholarships. In 1951 the "Iowa award" was created and presented to Herbert Hoover and to Jay N. Darling in 1956. More than fifty scholarships to Iowa colleges have been granted.

The commission was set up in 1949 by Governor Robert D. Blue.

The membership of the commission includes all former governors, four "citizen" members, and several state officials, who serve ex officio. The last include the governor, who is chairman of the commission; president of the state board of regents, who is secretary; treasurer, who is treasurer; and attorney general, who is attorney. The "citizen" members are Mrs. Mary Humeston, Albia; Mrs. Helen Mitchell, Mason City; Ralph Evans, Davenport; and John M. Henry, Des Moines.

It is the duty of the Geological Survey to collect, interpret, and report information on basic geologic features of the state. These include surface and underground water supplies, coal, gypsum, sand and gravel, ceramic clay and shale, limestone and dolomite, raw materials for the manufacture of cement, ore deposits, and other mineral resources. Studies are continuing on the oil and gas possibilities in Iowa, particularly in the southwestern portion of the state, and the geological sections of the oil and gas law are being administered. Geological studies of dam sites are made on some of the flood control and recreational projects of Federal and state agencies, and reports on the mineral resources of such reservoir areas are frequently prepared.

The Survey is the repository for all basic geologic data obtained in the State.

Collection and dissemination of data on water wells, water levels, stream flow and sediment loads, lake levels, and other hydraulic data are accomplished in cooperation with the Water Resources Division of the U. S. Geological Survey. Topographic mapping of the state, by quadrangles approximately 220 square miles in area, is being conducted in cooperation with the Topographic Division of the U. S. Geological Survey.

As a part of the result of its work, the Survey has published 38 volumes of annual reports and accompanying scientific papers. These publications include special reports and maps covering the geology and mineral production of all but six of the 99 counties, as well as special reports on mineral production of all sorts. There are also three technical papers on Iowa coal and six water-supply bulletins. Geological and mineral resources maps of the state have been prepared. Other summaries of specialized geological studies have been published in geological periodicals. These published reports, together with the large file of unpublished data obtained during more than half a century of continued study, serve as a reliable basis for up-to-the-minute reports to Federal, state and municipal agencies and to private concerns and individuals who request and need the available information on water supply and other mineral resources of Iowa. Information, advice and direct assistance in the increasing development of large water supplies are freely given to the limit of funds and personnel.

Cancer Control

The Division conducts frequent Cancer Institutes for physicians in various areas of the state wherein doctors are kept informed as to the latest developments in this field.

Through lectures, literature, movies, etc., the public is made conscious of the importance of prompt attention to the earliest even insignificant signs of the disease.

In the six tumor clinics strategically located, any citizen is given an opportunity for expert diagnosis and the collective judgment of a group of physicians as to adequate treatment measures.

Communicable and Preventable Diseases

Preventable diseases are by their very nature of vital concern to the community and the state. Reports of various infectious diseases are received daily from physicians and health officers throughout the state. These reports are surveyed and tabulated so as to make possible a study by weeks and months of the current prevalence of disease as compared with the preceding year and period of years. Field investigations are made upon request of local health officers or other officials, to determine the nature and extent of outbreaks and to assist with control measures. The Department through articles, reports, literature, talks, correspondence and graphic presentations, aims to inform the public about disease prevention.

The staff of the Divisions includes a veterinarian and several nurses, all with special training in their respective fields of public health.

The public health veterinarian is responsible for much of the work relating to diseases of animals transmissible to man. The public health nurses work with the Tuberculosis Control, the Venereal Disease and the Preventable Disease programs. These staff members co-operate at all times with local physicians and health officers in the problems of communicable disease control, in the conduct of special surveys and in any measures that may be necessary to prevent the spread of infection either on a local or a state basis.

Dental Hygiene

The Division promotes programs for the prevention and care of dental diseases by working with organizations interested in health such as schools, parent-teacher units and other local groups. Fluoridation of public water supplies is a primary interest.

This is the thirtieth year of the Iowa Plan of Dental Health Education. The plan is for use in rural, town and parochial schools.

Gerontology, Heart and Chronic Diseases

The Division of Gerontology, Heart and Chronic Diseases was established July 1, 1953.

There is an increasing awareness of the greater incidence of heart and chronic diseases as a public health problem as the population grows older and a need of community responsibility on the part of all health, civic and governmental agencies concerned.

It is the purpose of this Division to promote such community responsibility toward establishment of special diagnostic centers, particularly in the larger hospitals, as well as better facilities for treatment, rehabilitation and restoration of health as far as possible.

Hospital Services

This Division is charged with the duties of administering the Federal Grants-in-Aid Program authorized by the Hospital and Medical Facilities Survey and Construction Act (Hill-Burton Program). The Division annually inventories all existing hospitals, diagnostic and treatment centers, rehabilitation centers, nursing homes and related facilities; determines the need for them; and allocates approximately two million dollars annually to local communities to assist in the construction of medical facilities.

The Division is further charged with the responsibility of promoting safe and adequate care of individuals in approximately 175 hospitals and 600 nursing homes through a program of inspection and licensing.

Hygienic Laboratory

This unit provides diagnostic services to those licensed to practice the healing arts, hospitals, laboratories and health organizations of the state relative to the diagnosis and control of diseases communicable to man and consultation pertaining thereto.

These services are many, the majority dealing with the public water supplies of the state, control of stream pollution, milk supplies, venereal diseases, rabies, typhoid group of diseases, tuberculosis, brucellosis, parasitic and fungus diseases, virus and rickettsial diseases, and many others. Marriage certificates are initiated and returned to physicians submitting blood specimens for persons contemplating marriage.

Private, hospital and city laboratories are appraised annually to perform venereal disease tests, water, milk and sewage analyses. Laboratory technicians of the state are constantly being trained in the State Hygienic Laboratory in these areas.

Licensure

Under the provision of the Code of Iowa, Chapter 147, the following are required to obtain a license before entering upon the practice of the respective profession: Chiropody; chiropractic; funeral director and embalmer; dental; dental hygiene; optometry; osteopathy; osteopathy and surgery; barbers and cosmetology; medical.

The Boards of Barber, Chiropractic, Cosmetology, Medical and Osteopathy maintain separate offices with an executive secretary.

Under the provisions of the Code of Iowa, Chapter 135D, the State Department of Health is authorized to administer the law relating to Mobile Home Parks, and the Division of Public Health Engineering has

been designated to direct the same. The Division of Licensure only accepts the applications and fees, and by direction of the Division of Public Health Engineering, the licenses are issued.

All of the above licenses are signed by the Commissioner of Public Health.

Maternal and Child Health

The activities of this Division are designed to make known to those concerned, the health needs of mothers and children and how they should and can be met. Personnel specifically trained in public health aspects of pediatrics, obstetrics, dentistry, nutrition and nursing direct these activities. Educational programs and techniques are developed to reach the lay people through the family physician and dentist and through public health visiting and school nursing services.

Nutrition

Public health trained nutritionists work with staff members of other divisions of the Department on programs involving nutrition education. They serve as consultants on state-wide programs and, insofar as possible, to local public health people who can carry out their recommendations.

Public health nutritionists review nutrition materials and films and assist in writing of manuals and other guides to be used in program planning; give consultation service to hospitals without dietitians, and dietary consultation to nursing homes, children's homes and day-care centers.

Public Health Education

The Division of Health Education co-operates with and assists other divisions, regional health services, and county and city health departments in health education programs. Through newspapers, radio, television, films, conferences, exhibits, lectures and other media it reaches the citizens of Iowa with up-to-date health information.

The Division works with schools, and community, county and state organizations in the development of their health programs.

Public Health Engineering and Industrial Hygiene

Primary functions and duties of the Engineering Division pertain to general supervision over construction, maintenance, and operation of public water supplies, swimming pools, sewerage and refuse disposal. Activities include inspections of existing systems and review of plans and specifications for new installations.

Administration of the stream and lake pollution law requires the investigation of the existing conditions of pollution with authority to order abatement thereof, and the issuing of permits for new sewer installations.

The Division prepares amendments to the State Plumbing Code and advises local officials on proper installations of private water supply and sewage disposal systems. It regulates the sanitation requirements of mobile home (trailer) parks, makes inspections, and approves them for annual licenses. It also inspects all Grade A milk supplies and certifies their qualities to the Department of Agriculture.

General supervision is exercised over administration of the housing law and local officials are aided in its enforcement. Advisory service is rendered to local boards of health on enforcement of sanitation laws and regulations, and on administration of local sanitation programs.

Industrial hygiene activities consist of an advisory service to management and other agencies on control of occupational diseases caused by manufacturing and other industrial operations.

Public Health Nursing

This Division recruits, trains, places and gives guidance to public health nurses. It also evaluates nursing services and formulates plans

and policies for nursing in the various programs of the State Department of Health such as in preventable diseases, maternal and child health, handicapped children, adult and chronic diseases and dental health.

Vital Statistics

The Division is responsible for the handling of all birth, death, fetal death, marriage, divorce and related records for the State of Iowa. The vital statistics system includes the registration, collection, preservation, amendment and certification of vital statistics records, and activities related to those records, including the tabulation, analysis, and publication of statistical data. Certified copies of birth and other vital records are issued for a fee of one dollar.

The Iowa Board of Nurse Examiners was made a department separate from the Department of Health by S.F. 50, passed by the Forty-sixth General Assembly and became effective upon publication. The board gives examinations and issues licenses to two classifications of nurses: 1, registered nurse; 2, licensed practical nurse. Examinations are held semi-annually in Des Moines.

The examination fee is \$10.00; the reciprocity fee, \$10.00; certification fee, \$5.00, and annual renewal of license, \$2.00.

Through its Executive Secretary the board keeps all records pertaining to the licensing of nurses in the state, receives all applications for licensure, collects all fees and issues all licenses.

It is the duty of the Board to enforce the laws governing the practice of nursing in the state.

Since 1907, when the first regulatory measure affecting the practice of nursing in Iowa was enacted, 29,398 nurses have become registered, giving them the right to use the title Registered Nurse. At the close of the 1956 fiscal year 21,374 registered nurses had renewed their licenses.

Since 1949, when regulatory measures were enacted pertaining to the practice of practical nursing, 1,939 individuals have qualified to use the title Licensed Practical Nurse in Iowa. At the close of the 1956 fiscal year, 1,672 Licensed Practical Nurses had renewed their licenses.

The board formulates administrative and educational policies for the 26 schools of Professional Nursing and the four schools of Practical Nursing.

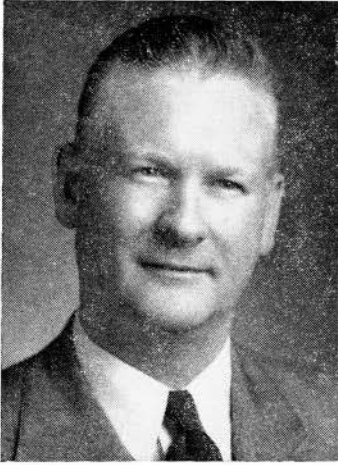

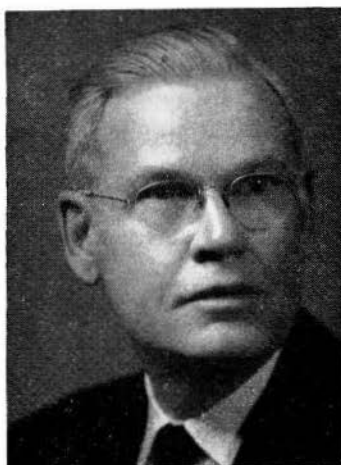

Start and Progress of State Highway Commission

The first law creating a state highway commission in Iowa was adopted by the General Assembly in 1904. That law simply stated that the Iowa State College should act as a state highway commission. Acting under said law, the state board of education appointed Dean Anson Marston of the engineering division, and Dean Charles F. Curtiss of the agricultural department of Iowa State College as the directors of the commission. Thomas H. MacDonald, U. S. Commissioner of Public Roads, was appointed by the directors as secretary and engineer for the commission. The duties of the commission at that time were to make investigations and studies of highway conditions and to advise with local authorities with respect to highway improvements.

This organization continued until 1913, when the Thirty-fifth General Assembly passed an act creating a state highway commission of three members and separated said commission from Iowa State College.

In 1927 the General Assembly passed an act which now appears as chapter 307 of the Code of 1954, creating a state highway commission of five members, all to be appointed by the governor, not more than three of whom could be from the same political party.

The law of 1927 placed the primary road system under the direct control and supervision of the state highway commission. Thomas H. MacDonald, who became secretary and engineer of the highway commission in 1904, was designated as chief engineer of the highway commission in 1913 and continued in that capacity until 1919, when he resigned and F. R. White was appointed to that position. Mr. White retired from the position of chief engineer in 1952 and Mr. E. F. Koch was appointed as chief engineer in October of that year. Mr. Koch resigned on March 31, 1954, and Mr. Butter was appointed chief engineer on April 1, 1954.

The highway commission's duties are fivefold:

First: Marking and signing of primary roads for safe operation.

Second: Construction and maintenance of primary roads.

Third: Approval of plans and contracts for secondary road construction in co-operation with county authorities.

Fourth: Approval of budgets for secondary roads.

Fifth: Providing engineering assistance for other state departments.

The Commission has entire charge of and responsibility for all construction and maintenance work on the primary road system. It prepares the necessary surveys, plans and specifications for primary road improvements, lets the necessary contracts and supervises the construc-

tion work. It has charge, for the state of Iowa, of the expenditure of all federal aid road funds allotted to this state.

Outline of State Highway Commission Work

All construction and maintenance work on the primary road system is directly under the supervision of the highway commission.

The highway commission employs a force of officers to enforce laws with reference to size, weight, registration and load of vehicles operated on the highways of the state.

The secondary roads (all rural roads not included in the primary road system and not classified as state institutional roads under chapter 308, Code 1954) are under the supervision of the county board of supervisors in their respective counties. However, the law places on the highway commission certain duties and responsibilities in connection with such secondary road work.

The secondary roads in each county are classified into two groups or systems—the farm-to-market road system which includes about 35,000 miles of main traveled secondary roads, and the local secondary road system which includes about 58,000 miles. Changes or modifications in the farm-to-market road system are initiated by the county board and are subject to approval by the state highway commission. It is the duty of the county to initiate projects for the construction of farm-to-market roads, to make surveys and prepare plans for the improvement of farm-to-market roads, and submit these plans to the state highway commission for approval. It is the duty of the state highway commission to advertise for bids on projects involving Federal-Aid funds, let construction contracts and give general supervision to the construction of farm-to-market road projects.

County boards of supervisors must prepare a budget showing estimated secondary fund receipts and proposed expenditures from this fund for each calendar year, and submit such budget to the state highway commission which shall have the power to approve or to disapprove the budget. Procedures to be followed are provided in the law in case of disapproval. Secondary road construction programs for each calendar year must also be submitted to and be approved by the highway commission. Plans prepared by the county engineers for secondary road improvements must be submitted to the highway commission for approval. Contracts awarded by the boards of supervisors for secondary road construction work involving a cost of \$2,000 per mile or more than \$5,000 in the aggregate, or more than \$2,000 for any one bridge or culvert, must be approved by the state highway commission before becoming effective.

In case two adjacent counties are unable to agree on any county line road or bridge construction or maintenance matter, either board may appeal to the state highway commission to determine said controversy.

The commission, on request, renders engineering assistance to various other state departments. This includes the making of surveys and preparation of plans and general supervision of construction and maintenance of public highways upon or adjacent to lands belonging to the state at the various educational, charitable and penal institutions, and at state parks, engineering assistance to the executive council on street improvements on and adjacent to the capitol grounds, assistance to the national guard on projects in connection with the national guard camp, and various other technical matters which may come before such other state departments.

**State Historical Activities**

The State Historical department organized in 1892 by Charles Aldrich. State Historical building erected in 1889 and 1908, reorganized as Iowa state department of history and archives in 1939, activities described as follows:

The dominant motif of the Iowa state department of history and archives is preserving the history of Iowa—its development from the era of many thousand of years ago, the roaming upon its prairies by the aborigines, the enjoyment here by the red man in his hunting exploits, the discovery and mining of its lead and coal deposits, the coming of the Indian trader and the pioneer, the early community settlements,

the establishment of schools and churches, the organization as a territory and later admission to statehood, the building of roads and the coming of the railroads, the progress of its people and its institutions—all a glorious panorama of its history from the beginning up to the present.

In achieving this high purpose a major objective has been the gathering of historical source material—the substance from which history is written. The Iowa Historical department was founded in 1892, and quickly became an important link in the chain of educational and cultural activities of the state, occupying a field then only partially developed for systematically collecting and preserving at the seat of government the priceless materials and records of Iowa development. From small beginnings the department has grown in sixty years to fill and overflow the beautiful building erected on the state capitol grounds at an original cost of about \$375,000, and in later years to acquire by purchase the Kasson Memorial building, situated at a short distance, as a temporary cataloging workshop for the immense accumulation of archival material for ultimate placement in a permanent and suitable building to be erected upon space reserved for that purpose upon the capitol grounds.

Here is a unique and unrivaled institution in which all Iowa has pride and its people visit continually, open every day, in which may be found the available Iowa materials that show how things came to be as they are, how the people lived at various stages of their progress, the quality of their thinking and their achievements here in Iowa—the classroom equipment for the practical study of life from prehistoric, primitive and pioneering times to the later days of community building.

In the museums are found a wide range of exhibits. Here are shown the tools, utensils and implements used by Iowa pioneers to conquer the wilderness and convert a hunter's paradise into a land of unparalleled productivity and industry; also the tepees and wickiups of the Indians, their canoes, weapons, pipes, domestic utensils, clothing, beadwork, industries used in their home life; a fine museum of natural history, specimens constituting a visual education in the story of Iowa's birds, animals, insects, flowers, trees, soil, geology and the prehistoric preparatory time. Specimens of mounted animals and birds, color slides for projectors, are provided upon application for display by local schools over the state, as well as other material of educational character. Of our extinct birds, a pair of passenger pigeons is exhibited. These were once so plentiful in Iowa that 5,000 birds were killed in Scott and Clinton Counties in two days. Of Iowa's rare birds, a sandhill crane, a pair of pileated woodpeckers, an eared grebe, upland plovers, prairie chickens and ruffed grouse are shown. In the mammal collection a pair of buffalo and a young calf are excellent specimens. Moose, elk and fawn are included. Approximately one hundred thousand visitors annually avail themselves of the opportunities the department provides.

Iowa's geologic column is represented by rock samples from every formation of the state, including also an exhibit of fossil crinoids from the Mississippi era. In the fossil coal plant series are shown some of the finest specimens in the United States. These plants were growing here two hundred and fifty million years ago.

An unrivaled collection of autograph letters and papers of authors, explorers and statesmen of the nation, representing the lifetime efforts as a collector of Charles Aldrich, the founder of the institution, became the foundation upon which has been built a manuscript division, more largely devoted to filings of the writings, addresses, documents and correspondence of eminent Iowans, supplying valuable unrecorded chapters in state history, which serves in a useful way the entire state, and is visited by research writers and consulted by many others from distant places.

The State Historical library contributes to the inestimable value of the institution. On its shelves are now upwards of 45,000 books about Iowa,

or by Iowa authors, Iowa state and county histories, family records and references for research in genealogy, declared by students to be one of the finest genealogical libraries in the middle west, in constant use by people from all parts of this and other states.

From varied sources were obtained files of Iowa daily and weekly newspapers, and since the establishment of the department a systematic building of a newspaper division has been accomplished. Its catalog contains listing of the permanent files of the papers from every county, beginning with the Dubuque visitor in 1836 and other publications of territorial days down to the present, containing graphic history of Iowa people and events as recorded by the faithful and talented editors and reporters of the century just closed. These papers are consulted almost daily by those seeking information and establishing historic and factual data regarding local and state happenings. There is no comparable source of authentic information available.

The oil portraits of distinguished Iowans, including the outstanding men and women who have contributed to Hawkeye culture, progress and prosperity, are hung in the magnificent gallery. There appears the three governors of the Territory of Iowa, most of the governors of the state, justices of the supreme court, cabinet officers from Iowa, and other eminent citizens, including writers, editors and outstanding members of the clergy.

The War History division contains some of the most precious documents held in preservation for future generations. The record of Iowa in the Civil War, the Spanish-American war, and in all other military activities since, is extensive, and includes not only many manuscripts, reports and official publications, but the enlistment and service papers of the Iowa volunteers and of members of the national guard—all rich in reminders and record of Iowa's part in five great wars. The more recent work of collecting for the state the details of the history of everything done in and by Iowa in World War II has produced a vast accumulation of valuable material. Thousands of portraits and intimate home and service records of those who have made the supreme sacrifice have been assembled; and the state, local and federal agencies have cooperated with this department to make the details as complete as they are reliable.

In the cataloging and classification of historical material, leaflets and folders embracing varied subjects have been prepared and are available upon request. In the Annals of Iowa, the historical magazine issued quarterly, appear interpretative studies and articles upon the state and its people. In the more than half century it has been published the Annals has been drawing upon the experiences of men who participated in or witnessed at close range the developments of which they write, being primarily a source book of Iowa history. As such a repository it has made available to the people of the state a vast amount of accurate data that otherwise would not have been accessible.

The Iowa public archives, or state records, comprise literally millions of items, such as census records from territorial days, the record books and correspondence files of state officers with papers and documents on which official action was had, legislative filings from territorial period so far as preserved. These records are in daily demand and use for reference and more especially in legal procedure for verification of names and for other facts. Only such material as may have administrative, legal or historical value is received for archival files, but the accumulation through the years has become so voluminous that it is taxing the facilities now available. However, through the cataloging system now employed the state archivists are more closely integrating the activities of this division with the current filing systems of the state departments contributing the records, which now constitute a back file of departmental papers and records arranged for immediate inspection at any time.

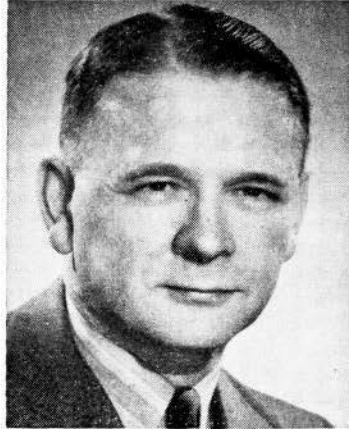

William J. Petersen was born in Dubuque, Iowa, on January 30, 1901. He was educated in the Dubuque public schools, received his B.A. from the University of Dubuque in 1926, his M.A. from the University of Iowa in 1927 and his Ph.D. from the same school in 1930. He was appointed research associate in the State Historical Society of Iowa in 1930 and became Superintendent in 1947. In 1937 he married Bessie Rasmus. Dr. Petersen is the author of several books and almost two hundred articles on Iowa history. He has taught the course in Iowa History in the University of Iowa since 1930.

Organized in February, 1857, its purposes are to preserve the history of Iowa and further its dissemination among the people of the state. In fulfillment of these purposes a permanent program of activities has been gradually developed and put into execution. This includes (1) the discovery, collection and preservation of materials of Iowa history; (2) research in the field of Iowa history; (3) publication of the materials of Iowa history, (4) dissemination of the materials of Iowa history through public depositories and members. The society publishes a monthly magazine, *The Palimpsest*, and a quarterly magazine, the *Iowa Journal of History*. In addition, it issues numerous books on the political, social, economic and religious history of Iowa. It has published seven volumes on the Messages and Proclamations of the Governors of Iowa, six volumes in the Applied History series dealing with state, county and local government. Among the better books are Mrs. Shambaugh's "Amana That Was and Amana That Is," Gingerich's "The Mennonites in Iowa," Swisher's "Iowa—Land of Many Mills," Petersen's "Steamboating on the Upper Mississippi" and "Iowa—The Rivers of Her Valleys," Richman's "Ioway to Iowa," and Cole's "Iowa Through the Years" and "I Remember, I Remember," Galland's "Iowa Emigrant," Ross' "Iowa Agriculture," Petersen's "Iowa History Reference Guide," Scholl's "Arnewood—The Story of an Iowa Dairyman," Nollen's "Grinnell College," Younger's "John A. Kasson," and Sage's "William Boyd Allison" are recent publications.

The library of the society now includes about 105,000 titles. There are 5,300 active and life members. The official depositories within the state number 236 and the out-of-state depositories and exchanges total 130.

A native of Iowa, born at Oskaloosa, Iowa, received early education Oskaloosa Public Schools, completed formal and professional education Penn College and Drake University Law School, class of 1933. Married Mary David of Oskaloosa, Iowa, July 1, 1931. Admitted to the Iowa Bar June 8, 1933, has practiced his profession in Oskaloosa since that date. Veteran World War II, served with the Army Air Forces in the Pacific theatre of operation. Returned to Oskaloosa in 1946 to continue practice of law as a partner of law firm Fleck-Jones. Member of Mahaska County Bar Association, Fifth District Bar Association, Iowa State Bar Association and the American Bar Association. Fraternally affiliated with Masons, Elks and American Legion. The Workmen's Compensation Law was enacted by the Thirty-fifth General Assembly in 1913. Iowa was one of the first states to provide compensation benefits for injuries sustained by Industrial Workers. Succeeding legislatures have made many changes and increased benefits. The Fifty-first General Assembly established a second injury fund for the benefit of Veterans, who were maimed by loss of members, making it possible for an employer to hire a maimed Veteran without taking undue risk. The Fifty-second General Assembly enacted an occupational disease law. Reports of all industrial injuries resulting in disability for more than seven days or death are required to be made to the Industrial Commissioner. Settlement agreements are submitted for his approval. In the event an amicable settlement is not reached an Arbitration Hearing before a Deputy Commissioner or Arbitration Commission is held in the county where the injury occurred and the claimant, employer or insurance carrier may appeal to the commissioner. Review hearings are held in the commissioner's office and an appeal may be taken to the District Court of the county where the injury occurred.

The office of commissioner of insurance, as the executive head of the insurance department of Iowa, was created by chapter 146 of the laws of the Thirty-fifth General Assembly (1913) and the first commissioner took office July 1, 1914. Previous to that time, the supervision of insurance had been under the direction of the auditor of state.

The commissioner of insurance has general control, supervision, and direction over all insurance business transacted in the state, and is charged with the responsibility of enforcing all the laws of the state relating to insurance.

Under the law, all securities in which the reserves of Iowa life insurance companies are invested are required to be deposited with the commissioner and complete records are kept showing each item on deposit at all times. The amount of approval securities representing these and other incidental deposits in the hands of the commissioner on September 30, 1957 was in excess of \$1,793,076,000.

The commissioner supervises all transactions relating to the organization, reorganization, liquidation and dissolution of domestic insurance corporations. He supervises the sale in the state of all stock or other evidences of interest either by domestic or foreign insurance companies. He is the statutory receiver in the event of liquidation of any Iowa insurance company.

All foreign companies, as well as all local companies, must, before engaging in the insurance business in this state, obtain a certificate of authority from the commissioner of insurance. These certificates expire annually on April 1, and action is taken on their renewals after analysis of complete financial statements filed covering the condition of the

company as of the previous year end. All insurance agents must likewise obtain individual licenses to solicit business. In 1957 there were 830 insurance companies authorized to do business in the state, and approximately 80,000 individual agents' licenses were issued.

A state statute requires insurance companies to file all rates with the insurance commissioner for approval, and a rating division has been set up within the insurance department to handle rate filings together with supporting statistical information.

The commissioner conducts examinations of all domestic insurance organizations every three years. He may also make an examination of any foreign insurance company authorized or seeking to be authorized to do business within the state. All policy forms used by any company within the state are required to be approved by the department.

The commissioner is a member of the national association of insurance commissioners composed of the insurance supervising officials of each of the various states and meets with and cooperates with this organization in the many matters that arise involving the common interest of the separate states in insurance matters.

Securities Department

The state securities laws, designed to protect the Iowa investing public through regulation of securities dealers and qualification of securities offered for sale, are administered by the commissioner of insurance.

The volume of business handled by the securities division has nearly doubled in the past two years.

The Commissioner also has jurisdiction over the sale of stock on the installment plan and sale of memberships or certificates of membership entitling the holder thereof to purchase merchandise, materials or services on a discount or cost-plus basis.

Iowa holds membership in the "North American Securities Administrators" through the facilities of which close contact is had with security problems on an international scale.

Prior to his appointment with the commission, was area control supervisor at Solar Aircraft in Des Moines; in business for himself in sales of office systems and equipment; served as chief, Price Action Branch of the Economic Stabilization Agency; and was president of Zaisers, Inc., in Des Moines. Had four years of active duty during World War II as a captain in the U. S. Army. Married to the former Mildred Peacock of Lenox, Iowa, and they have two children. Appointed director November 16, 1957.

Purpose of the Iowa Development Commission

As the state's executive promotional agency, the Iowa Development commission has two major undertakings:

To gain for Iowa the economic benefits of industrial expansion;

To publicize Iowa's accomplishments, resources and possibilities, in many fields including agriculture, industry and recreation.

Iowa seeks new and expanding industry as a source of additional job opportunities to hold our surplus labor supply; additional payrolls, to diversify sources of income and create new markets for Iowa business and services; new tax revenues which support city, county and state government.

Iowa's advantages as a location for new plants are carried to manufacturing executives through nation-wide advertising in management publications, through brochures and in personal calls by the Commission's industrial men, who travel widely. This work is coordinated with activities of local Chambers of Commerce.

Publicity and statistics which spotlight Iowa are supplied to all channels where they can be effectively used. Appropriate information and photographs are provided to publishers of books, periodicals and travel guides. Current data, in readable form, is given regularly to newspapers, radio and television stations and trade publications throughout the state and nation. Monthly summaries are compiled for libraries, schools, public speakers and others who carry information to the general public.

Iowa's agricultural prowess figures prominently in state publicity, as a noteworthy achievement in itself, and as a steady source of raw materials and of markets which are attractive to new businesses.

Encouraging tourists to spend time in Iowa, the Development Commission publishes a pocket-size brochure on Iowa, and a pamphlet on unusual events in Iowa. These are distributed by mail to 40,000 tourists and school children who write, requesting such information, each year.

A statistical file centered on Iowa is maintained. Market research studies and specific data are available on request.

Commission members give their time as a public service.

THE STATE LIBRARIES

A board of trustees, composed of the governor, the state superintendent of public instruction and a member of the supreme court, control the state law library and the state medical library. The law library is located in the state house, the other in the Historical building.

The salary of each librarian is \$4,500.00.

State Medical Library

(Second Floor, Historical Building)

The Iowa state medical library was established as a department of the state library in July, 1919, and became a separate library in the reorganization of the state libraries by the Forty-eighth General Assembly in 1939.

The library serves primarily medical doctors, but is open to any resident of the state.

The library contains 50,953 accessioned volumes and receives 335 medical and scientific periodicals annually, having over 100,000 unbound periodicals. The main work of the medical library is its mailing service, whereby proper material is selected and placed in the mail the same day doctors request literature by mail, phone or telegram. During the year 1956, 29,968 books and journals were used by 6,722 patrons.

The library also has a small museum of old medical instruments and collects items of medical historical interest.

In addition to legal reference facilities provided for the Iowa supreme court judges, attorney general and other state officials, it is used as well as for attorneys and the general public.

IOWA STATE TRAVELING LIBRARY

(East Wing Historical Building)

The Fifty-sixth General Assembly established the Iowa State Traveling Library Board of Trustees consisting of five members, none of whom shall be practicing librarians, to be appointed by the Governor, three of whom may be from a list of six nominations submitted by the Iowa Library Association and one chosen from a list of three nominations submitted by the Superintendent of Public Instruction.

The first members appointed by the Governor shall be appointed for terms of one, two, three, four and five years, and all subsequent appointments shall be for terms of five years. Vacancies shall be filled in like manner for the remaining term. The Board shall meet at least once in each quarter of each fiscal year to transact business and shall at the first meeting of the new year elect a chairman from said Board.

Don W. Lowe of Des Moines, Iowa was named as Labor Commissioner July 1, 1957, by appointment of Governor Herschel Loveless for a two year term succeeding Frank Means. At the time of his appointment he was business agent for street railway employees local 441 in Des Moines, a union to which he has belonged since 1937. In 1948 he was elected president of the Iowa State Association of Bus Drivers. He served as president of the Des Moines Trades and Labor assembly for the 1951-52 term. He was chairman of the Des Moines Central Labor Union's Education committee, 1953 to 1957. Mr. Lowe, one of five children, was born in Des Moines on March 24, 1908. He attended the Bloomfield township school system and graduated from Lincoln high school in Des Moines. The office of labor commissioner was created by the Twentieth General Assembly in 1884.

Under the provisions of law, the commissioner is also a member of the board of vocational education and rehabilitation, and the employment agency commission. The commissioner is executive secretary of the employment agency commission.

The bureau is responsible for the enforcement of laws relating to health and safety, child labor, passenger and freight elevators, installation and inspection of steam boilers, generators and superheaters, private employment agencies, arbitration and conciliation, and industrial accidents for reinspection and statistical purposes.

Six factory inspectors devote full time to inspection and reinspection of factories, mills, work shops, theatres, buildings, public buildings, passenger and freight elevators, private employment agencies and general employment conditions. The law requires that one of the inspectors shall be a woman who shall give special attention to places employing women and children.

Since July of 1949 the Bureau has dropped its publication "Iowa Employment Survey" because of the duplication with the report of the Iowa Employment Security Commission. However, the Bureau undertook the job to publish reports on Child Labor, Apprenticeship Registration, Construction Activity, and Iowa Work Injuries. At this time monthly statistical reports are being published and distributed throughout the state to aid both labor and management.

The Bureau recognizes the need for a broader survey and hopes that in the near future it will be able to furnish more extensive and pertinent information.

The Iowa merit system council serves as the central personnel office for those state agencies who receive certain federal funds. It provides progressive and uniform personnel practices to about 1,800 individuals who work in about 200 different classifications in the five agencies served.

The "regulations for the merit system," as adopted by the above agencies, provide, in part:

"A merit system council shall be appointed by the governor . . . The council shall be composed of three members, who shall be public-spirited persons of recognized standing and of known interest in the improvement of public administration and in the impartial selection of efficient government personnel. No member of the council shall have held political office or have been an officer in a political organization during the year preceding his appointment nor shall he hold such office during his term. No member of the council shall have been an employee of the agencies within one year prior to his appointment.

"Members of the council shall serve for a term of three years or until successors have been appointed by the governor. . . In appointing a suc-

cessor to a member of the council, the governor shall make his selection from a panel of three names presented to him through joint action of the participating agencies. A member appointed to fill a vacancy occurring prior to the expiration of a term shall be appointed for the remainder of such term. Members of the council may be reappointed at the expiration of their term of office.

"It shall be the duty of the council within the scope of these regulations:

- (a) to establish general policies for the administration of merit examinations and the hearing of personnel appeals.
- (b) to hear such appeals or to establish impartial bodies to hear such appeals on its behalf;
- (c) to appoint a merit system director with the approval of the participating agencies, to advise with him in formulating procedures for the conduct of merit examinations, and to inspect and review his activities for the purpose of assuring conformity with these regulations and the policies of the council;
- (d) to review the classification and compensation plans and to advise with the state agencies on their adoption and subsequent revisions;
- (e) to make recommendations to the agencies relative to their internal personnel practices to assure conformity with these regulations;
- (f) to approve a budget for submittal to the state agencies covering all costs of merit-system activities as covered by these regulations;
- (g) to promote public understanding of the purposes, policies and practices of the merit system. As a means thereto, the council shall examine into and make a written report to the governor and to the state agencies at least annually on the operation of the merit system, including the conduct of examinations, the establishment of registers, certifications from registers, promotions, salary advancements, dismissals, demotions, transfers, and separations, and the maintenance of the classification and compensation plans. Such reports shall be filed with the governor and the state agencies and shall be open to public inspection.

The Fifty-third General Assembly declared it to be the policy of the state to correlate and vest the powers of the state in a single agency with the duty and authority to establish and enforce an appropriate, comprehensive, state-wide plan for the control of water and for the protection of surface and underground waters of the state, recognizing and including in such plan the resultant effect thereof of other resources of the state; and created the Iowa Natural Resources Council as the agency of state government to promote the policies set forth in the Act, and to represent the State of Iowa in all matters within the scope of the Act.

The functions and duties of the Resources Council include the establishment of a comprehensive state-wide program of flood control, and a

comprehensive state-wide program for the conservation, development and use of the waters of the state.

The Resources Council has been designated as the agency with which the Federal governmental agencies carry on relations for cooperation in cases involving investigations and studies for works or improvements for navigation or flood control affecting the state.

The Resources Council receives, reviews and determines the issuance of permits for the erection of any structure, dam, obstruction, deposit or excavation in or on any floodway and has the power to abate as a nuisance any of the foregoing which adversely affect flood control.

The Resources Council is composed of seven members who are electors of the State of Iowa and appointed by the governor with the approval of two-thirds of the members of the senate. They serve on a part-time per diem basis and are appointed for six-year terms.

The statutes of Iowa provide: "When any person over sixteen years of age is convicted of a felony, except treason or murder, the court imposing a sentence of confinement in the penitentiary, men's or women's reformatory shall not fix the limit or duration of the same, but the term of such imprisonment shall not exceed the maximum term provided by law for the crime of which the prisoner was convicted," thus leaving to the court imposing the sentence no discretion as to the length of confinement. The board of parole is charged with the duty of investigating and studying each case, and is authorized to release on parole any prisoner, except those sentenced for life terms, after serving portion of the maximum time it deems proper. Parole rules are provided which must be observed by the person on parole and for the violation of which he may be remanded to prison. By statute, each member serves as chairman in the last two years of his appointment.

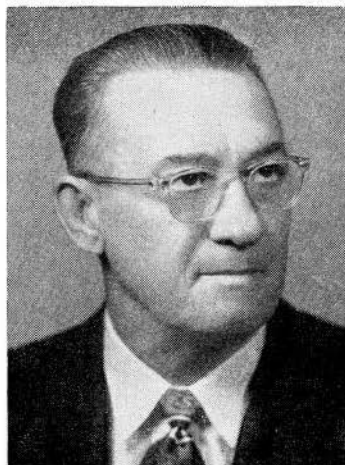

The advisory board of the Iowa Pharmaceutical Association annually recommends to the governor a list of six persons for appointment (Code of Iowa, 1954, section 147.15), who have the qualifications prescribed for examiners of the profession, and the governor in making the appointment to the board shall select one of the persons so named. Confirmation by the Senate is not required.

It is the duty of the pharmacy examiners to enforce the laws governing the uniform narcotic act which controls the use of morphine, cocaine, marijuana, and other narcotic drugs of both illegal and legal distribution.

It is the duty of the board to enforce the drug store licensing act.

It is the duty of the board to enforce the laws governing the sale and distribution of drugs for the licensing of pharmacists. The examination fee is \$10.00. A record is kept of all pharmacists licensed and a fee of \$5.00 is required each year for the renewal of certificates; \$2.50 of this amount is retained by the pharmacy department, and \$2.50 is remitted to the treasurer of the Iowa Pharmaceutical Association. Itinerant vendors of medicines are licensed by the department and the license fee is \$50.00 per year.

STATE BOARD OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION

The statute establishing a Department of Public Instruction, under the direction of a state board, was enacted by the Fifty-fifth General Assembly. The law provides for the election of members of the State Board and prescribes their powers and duties. Members are elected, one from each of the eight congressional districts as they existed on January 1, 1953, plus one board member who is appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the senate. The term is for six years.

The State Board of Public Instruction is a policy making board made up of lay people. The function of this board has the same relationship to the schools in the State of Iowa as the county board of education has to the county school system and the local board of education has to a local school district.

The law also provides for the appointment of a superintendent of public instruction, assistant superintendents, and such other staff members and employees as necessary. The powers and duties of the superintendents and staff members are also prescribed.

The superintendent of printing is appointed by the board and is ex-officio secretary of the board and its executive officer. The law directs that the manuscript of every report or document, book, booklet, bulletin or anything to be printed shall be transmitted to the superintendent of printing as soon as it is ready for printing, and he shall edit, revise, condense and arrange the same for printing. He has the custody of and attends to the distribution and sale of the code, session laws, supreme court reports and public documents; supervises the compilation and publication of the legislative bill index, and the official register. The completed journals of the House and Senate are indexed under his supervision.

Centralized Printing Division

By act of the 55th G.A., under S. F. 377, there was established a centralized printing department, to operate under the control of the State Printing Board. Multilith machines that had been located in the several state offices were assembled in a room on the ground floor of the state office building, for the printing of work to be produced for short runs and quick service. Paper and envelope supplies were transferred from the Executive Council to be distributed as requisitioned, on signed orders from each Department.

Born at Dumont, Iowa, April 4, 1925. Educated in Cedar Falls Campus high school, graduate of Iowa State Teachers College, with a major in industrial arts and a minor in safety. Received his Master's degree at the New York University Center for safety education. Served in the United States army from August 10, 1943, to March 24, 1946. Married Donna D. Sharp August 20, 1950; two sons, Scott Russell, age 4, Daniel Eugene, age 2. Member of Methodist church, Iowa Safety Council, Iowa Driver Education Association, State Safety Chairman P.T.A., Iowa State Sheriff's Association, Iowa State Policemen's Association, Iowa Association of Chiefs of Police, American Legion; honorary member, Epsilon Pi Tau, National Safety Council; a member of several national safety organizations and president-elect of the National Driver Education Association. Taught driver education and safety patrol for AAA and in several schools in Iowa. Director of the Iowa safety education division program for two years. Appointed Acting Commissioner August 1, by Governor Loveless, to fill vacancy due to resignation of Clinton H. Moyer.

**Duties of State Department of Public Safety**

The Iowa State Department of Public Safety was created by the Forty-eighth General Assembly in 1939 by consolidating several bureaus and divisions under one executive designated as Commissioner of Public Safety. One of the obvious purposes was to facilitate the cooperation and coordination of the law enforcement agencies of counties, cities and towns. In addition, the department directs the law enforcement activities of the State Highway Safety Patrol and functions in the fields of safety education, fire protection, criminal investigations, police radio communications, vehicle registration, driver and dealer licensing, safety responsi-

bility and accident statistics, and other related activities affecting public safety. The activities of the department's various sections are as follows:

Division of Highway Safety Patrol

DAVID G. HERRICK, Cass County, Colonel.

The Iowa Highway Safety Patrol was created by the Forty-sixth General Assembly with a personnel of 53 men. This authorized strength was increased to 128 by the Forty-seventh General Assembly; to 160 by the Fifty-first General Assembly; to 225 by the Fifty-fourth General Assembly; and to 275 by the Fifty-seventh General Assembly (1957).

The original duties of the Highway Patrol were to enforce all provisions of the motor vehicle laws relating to the regulation of motor vehicles and laws of the road, with power to arrest without warrant any person or persons committing or attempting to commit within their presence or view a breach of peace or other violation of the law. The Forty-eighth General Assembly broadened the scope of the patrol's powers by providing that they shall have and exercise all the powers of any peace officer of the state. There are, however, certain restrictions on the exercise of their general powers. Patrol duties and restrictions are stated in full in Chapter 80, Code of Iowa, 1954.

Besides enforcing motor vehicle laws and exercising police powers, the members of the Highway Patrol conduct hearings in connection with revocation of operators' and chauffeurs' licenses, and investigate serious accidents occurring upon the highways of the state. Drivers' licenses are issued by uniformed examiners.

Activity of the Highway Patrol has increased steadily in recent years. In 1956, patrolmen traveled 9,771,585 miles and contacted 259,201 drivers on the highways. Of these drivers contacted, 27,842 were motorists who had car trouble or other distress and were assisted by the patrol.

Patrolmen during 1956 issued 32,652 memorandums of warning to drivers. These warnings do not immediately penalize the motorist, but they are marked on his driving record. A series of warnings to a particular driver within a reasonable period may be basis for suspension of his license.

Notifications of illegal or faulty equipment were issued by the patrol in 152,164 cases. Summons tickets issued during the year totaled 46,543 in number. Fines collected in cases where summonses were issued amounted to \$677,423.00. Stolen property valued at a total of \$236,048.00 was recovered, and another \$392,329.00 of privately owned property was saved from destruction by fire, as a result of patrol activity.

Arrests in O.M.V.I. (operating motor vehicle while intoxicated) cases numbered 1235 during 1956, and 6,033 police demand orders were served. Average patrol strength during the year was 210.

Criminal Investigation Division

TILLMAN A. THOMPSON, Wright County, Chief. Salary \$6,600.

The Criminal Investigation Division is a service organization which cooperates with and supplements the work of local officers of the state of Iowa. It is not a local policing unit but serves the law enforcement officers of counties and municipalities as a central agency to which all may come for help on difficult criminal investigations. It is also charged with responsibility for certain matters involving the internal security of the state of Iowa. In addition, it is called upon to investigate matters involved in the functioning of state government and cooperates with the various elective and appointive officers of the state in all such matters.

There are three main subdivisions of the Criminal Investigation Division, namely, the investigative section, the identification section and the technical laboratory.

The investigative section is concerned with the work of special agents of the division. Upon receiving a request for aid from a duly authorized law enforcement officer, a special agent is given a definite assignment to assist that officer in the investigation of the specific case. Daily reports are required from all special agents and these are carefully studied and reviewed with the special agent, usually before an arrest is made. Investigations conducted by special agents of this division range from cases involving murder, rape, robbery, extortion, bank robbery, etc., and through the entire category of major crime.

The identification section is a huge storehouse of information. Here are kept the fingerprints of over 2,000,000 criminals, a civilian fingerprint for personal identification, files of modus operandi of various classes of criminals including their photographs, a criminal record file which reflects in chronological order each arrest and sentence of the subject and a card index file including the name and all aliases known to have been used by the subject.

The fingerprint files in this division constitute the clearing house of criminal records for the state of Iowa. Under Iowa law, sheriffs and police departments are required to fingerprint those arrested for commission of specific types of law violations and to forward copies of such fingerprints to this division. Fingerprints have long been recognized as the only infallible method of personal identification known to man. As the fingerprint cards are received, they are classified and searched against the master fingerprint file. If they are identified with a previous record, a complete transcript of the subject's criminal record, as contained in the files of this division, is immediately forwarded to the agency which submitted the fingerprints.

The technical laboratory of the Criminal Investigation Division is a modern crime laboratory which utilizes the aid of science in the solution of crime mysteries which frequently could not be solved in any other way. One of the important services rendered by the laboratory to local officers is the comparison of handwritings, particularly in fraudulent check cases; however, the problems are many and varied. They may involve a question of fraudulent alteration of a document, the restoration of faded or obliterated writings, comparison of typewritten material or possibly a comparison of inks or papers.

Photography is an important tool of the modern trained investigator and the technical laboratory is equipped to handle many photographic problems from "shooting" the crime scene to the use of ultra-violet light in photographing of permanent record invisible stains, invisible writings and alterations on documents, latent fingerprints on multi-colored surfaces, etc.

Other work done in the technical laboratory includes firearms identification, microscopic examination, polygraph tests (lie detector), examination of tool mark, restoration of obliterated serial numbers on metal and examination of glass fractures.

The services of this division include testimony of the special agent and technicians in court. The services of this department of state government are available without charge to all duly constituted law enforcement agencies and the courts of this state upon request as provided by statute.

Division of Radio Communications

BOYD F. PORTER, Polk County, Director. Salary \$6,600.

The Division of Radio Communications of the State Department of Public Safety is charged with the operation of seven police radio stations located at Des Moines, Cedar Falls, Storm Lake, Atlantic, Fairfield, Maquoketa and Belmont and automatic repeater stations at Essex, Ladora, Van Wert, Calmar, Burlington, Lake Park, Moorhead, Merrill, Scranton, Glenwood and Solon. This division operates 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

This division is also responsible for the installation, maintenance and servicing of the two-way radio equipment in the 273 mobile units (cars) operated by the Iowa Highway Patrol, Division of Criminal Investigation and other state agencies.

Services of the Police Radio Network are available to all municipal and county peace officers within the state. Interstate traffic is also handled by this division for the other 47 states and for peace officer personnel within this state. In addition, special and routine orders for members of the Division of Highway Patrol and Criminal Investigation Division for immediate delivery by the two-way radio.

This division also handles traffic relating to the Federal and State Office of Civil Defense.

Complete files of all broadcasts since the origination of this division are maintained at the Des Moines station.

During 1954, the Radio Communications Division relocated the Atlantic and Fairfield radio stations and completed a new police radio station near Belmond in Wright County. During 1956 this division also built four new repeater stations near Merrill, Glenwood, Scranton and Solon to improve its coverage of the state.

Major activities of the Radio Division during the year of 1956 included broadcasting 3,573 items regarding stolen property and criminal actions; origination of 31,342 messages directed to specific officers or departments; relaying of 12,249 messages to city and county departments; handling of 7,021 interstate messages; and 538,015 two-way car contacts.

Since 1945, the number of county sheriffs and city police departments served by the Radio Division has increased from 10 to 235.

Division of Fire Protection and Investigation

ED. J. HERRON, Linn County, Fire Marshal. Salary \$6,600.

The duties of the State Fire Marshal are to enforce all laws of the state relating to the suppression of arson, and to apprehend those persons suspected of arson; to investigate into the cause, origin and circumstances of fires; to promote fire safety and reduction of loss by fire through educational methods; to enforce all laws, and the rules and regulations of the Iowa Department of Public Safety, concerned with the storage, transportation, handling and use of flammable liquids, and explosives; the storage, transportation, handling and use of liquefied petroleum gas; the electric wiring and heating, and adequate means of exit in case of fire, from churches, schools, hotels, theatres, amphitheatres, asylums, hospitals, nursing homes, college buildings, lodge halls, public meeting places, and all other structures in which persons congregate from time to time, whether publicly or privately owned; to review the design and regulations for fire escapes and exits; to require teachers in public and private schools to have at least one fire drill a month.

For the purpose of enforcing the orders of the Fire Marshal, suitable penalties and fines are provided and he and his deputy are empowered to administer oaths and compel the attendance of witnesses. If the State Fire Marshal shall be of the opinion that there is evidence sufficient to charge any person with the crime of arson or criminal conduct in connection with any fire, he shall cause such person to be arrested.

Reports are required to be made to the State Fire Marshal by the Chiefs of Fire Departments of each and every fire where the fire loss is \$50.00 or more; where there is no established fire department protection, the report is to be made by the Mayor or Township Clerk.

The State Fire Marshal is required to make an annual report of the affairs concerning his office which shall be published and distributed as the reports of other state officers.

Division of Motor Vehicle Registration

JOHN F. CARLSON, Polk County, Director. Salary \$6,600.

Besides maintaining complete records of all motor vehicle licenses and titles issued and revenue collected from such issuance, the Motor Vehicle Registration Division has direct jurisdiction over the licensing and titling of motor vehicles, official vehicles, and non-resident vehicles, and also the issuing of licenses to itinerant merchants.

Residents of the State of Iowa license and title their motor vehicles at the County Treasurer's office in the county in which they live. Official vehicles and vehicles owned by non-residents but domiciled and operated in Iowa are licensed and titled by the Motor Vehicle Registration Division.

The law provides that all revenue from motor vehicle registrations and titles shall go to the state's road use tax fund, with the following exceptions: (1) Three per cent of gross collections to the general fund of the state for expense of the registration division subject to appropriation and balance remaining at end of fiscal year credited to road use tax fund. (2) One per cent of collections to a reimbursement fund from which to pay refunds. (3) Collection fees of 50 cents on each registration, 40 cents on each title and 65 cents on each notation of lien retained by County Treasurer.

Division of Motor Vehicle Dealers' License

D. H. DAY, Franklin County, Director. Salary \$6,600.

The Dealers' License Division of the Department of Public Safety was created by act of the Forty-seventh General Assembly at the request of the automobile dealers for the protection of the buying public, its purpose being to prevent the practice or commission of fraud in the sale, barter, or disposition of motor vehicles at retail in this state, to prevent irresponsible, unreliable or dishonest persons from engaging in the business of selling, bartering or otherwise dealing in motor vehicles at retail in this state and to encourage reliable persons to engage in the business. "Motor Vehicle" means any vehicle subject to registration under the laws of this state.

The Dealers' License Division is further charged with the administration of the dealers Disclosure Law which makes certain specific demands as to the items that must be contained in the dealers "Retail Installment Contract" and the "maximum" finance charges that may be assessed to the purchaser.

All fees and funds for the Dealers' License Division accrue from licenses and transfers of "Motor Vehicle Dealers", are paid into the state treasury monthly, and constitute a separate and distinct fund known as the "Motor Vehicle Dealers License Fee Fund." All expenses incurred in

the administration of this division are paid out of said fund in the same manner as other state expenses are paid. Any amount in such fund in excess of ten thousand dollars at the end of any fiscal year is credited to the state general fund.

Safety Responsibility and Drivers License Division

Director. Salary \$6,600.

The Safety Responsibility and Drivers License Division of the State Department of Public Safety was created October 1, 1947, to administer the Motor Vehicle Financial and Safety Responsibility Act enacted by the Fifty-second General Assembly.

During the year 1956, the Department processed 57,418 accidents reporting an estimated loss of over 30 million dollars in property damage and bodily injury. A total of 144,262 drivers and owners were involved with 5.21 per cent failing to comply with the Financial Responsibility Act, requiring the Department to institute suspension of their motor vehicle privileges. The percentage of uninsured motorists involved in accidents in Iowa has shown a decrease of approximately 12 per cent since enactment of the Financial Responsibility Act.

The operating privileges of 2,813 drivers were revoked and the privileges of 4,061 were suspended upon traffic convictions. This is an increase of 364 over the total for the preceding year.

This division maintains a cumulative permanent record of over 2,000,000 drivers showing all restrictions, violations, accidents, suspensions or revocations against their driving records. Under the Drivers Improvement Program the records of potential problem drivers are reviewed. The driver may be issued an advisory letter, re-examined, interviewed, placed on probation, or his driving privileges may be withdrawn. The records of 50,036 were reviewed during the year; 10,947 drivers were issued advisory letters, 1,517 were re-examined, 1,134 were interviewed, and 1,085 were placed on probation. Drivers licenses are suspended or denied to those persons who are physically or mentally incompetent to operate a motor vehicle safely.

Division of Safety Education

FRANK B. ULISH, Webster County, Acting Director.

The Division of Safety Education was created by action of the Forty-eighth General Assembly for the purpose of promoting highway safety through public information and education. Besides carrying out its own program of activities, this division works in cooperation with the National Safety Council, Iowa Safety Council and affiliated local organizations and renders other valuable services in the interests of public safety on our highways.

Fieldmen for the Division of Safety Education travel throughout the state, delivering lectures, showing safety films, giving radio and TV talks and demonstrations; aiding in local safety projects; assisting schools in setting up and conducting driver education courses, school boy patrols and bicycle safety programs; consulting with city officials on traffic problems; and cooperating with the safety activities of other organizations such as the Parent-Teacher Association, American Legion, Federated Women's Clubs and many others, such as Teen-Age Driving Clubs.

The division puts on safety exhibits and demonstrations at the Iowa State Fair and other major events; produces weekly programs and announcements on radio and television stations; maintains a safety film library and exchange.

Through all media for public information, the division undertakes to keep the people of Iowa informed on accident trends, new traffic legislation and safety precautions. Extensive mailing lists are maintained in this office for the distribution of posters, pamphlets, other safety promotion material and information to schools, organizations and informational media.

Secretary to the late Wayne M. Ropes, secretary of state and real estate commissioner from 1943 to 1946. First director of the Iowa real estate commission created in 1945 to become

effective in 1946. 1951 president of the National Association of License Law Officials and now serving as life member of the Executive Committee.

The first real estate license law was enacted by the 43rd General Assembly and became effective January 1, 1930. The law was administered by the secretary of state who was designated as real estate commissioner. This law was amended and revised by the 51st General Assembly and among other things provided that as of January 1, 1946, the law would be administered by a five-member commission composed of the secretary of state as chairman and four additional members appointed by the governor with the approval of the Senate.

During the past ten years it has been the administrative policy of the Real Estate department to correct most of the evils in the real estate brokerage business which have developed over many years of uncontrolled practice. This has resulted in elevating the real estate business to a professional status and has tended to encourage men and women in all walks of life to enter this business where income is based on intelligence, initiative and hard work.

While the present law requires a rather complete and comprehensive written examination for all applicants it has not tended to deter or discourage the many people who are endeavoring to get into this business. During the calendar year of 1956 more than 900 men and women were examined and as of the end of the first quarter in 1957 nearly 7,000 licenses have been issued. The examinations are held once a month at a specific time and place set by the Commission.

The fees for a Broker's and Salesman's examination are \$10.00 and \$5.00 respectively. The same amount is charged each year for renewal

of the license which expires on December 31 of the year of issuance. For the last audit period the total received from all fees amounted to \$62,104, from which amount \$21,900 was allotted for operational expense and the balance of \$40,204 was left in the general fund as revenue to the state. Since the first years of its operation the department has not only lived within its income, but has not required an appropriation.

The department prepares and distributes to the citizens of Iowa a Real Estate Primer which is a basis for the qualifying examination and which has been accepted and used as a textbook by many high schools, colleges and universities in Iowa and many other states. This Primer and the educational institutes held over the state each year have contributed materially in reducing law violations to a minimum and have facilitated the economical and efficient operation of the department.

The department is also charged with the responsibility of regulating and investigating the business conduct of all real estate licenses in their relationship with the public and to hold hearings on formal complaints which contain evidence which would indicate a violation of the law.

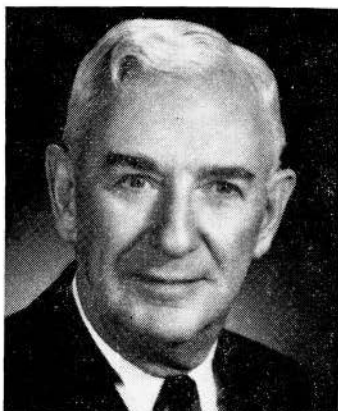

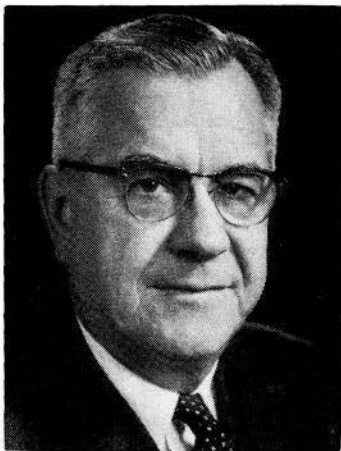

THE IOWA BRAILLE AND SIGHT SAVING SCHOOL—Vinton

D. W. Overbeay, Superintendent

The Iowa Braille and Sight Saving School was opened at Iowa City on April 5, 1853. Nine years later (August, 1862) the school was moved to its present location at Vinton.

The Iowa Braille and Sight Saving School is an educational institution which offers complete educational opportunity to visually handicapped boys and girls from the kindergarten through the high school. Although the techniques, philosophy and psychology applied are different from that found in public schools for the fully sighted, courses of study are quite similar.

In addition to academic subjects, special emphasis is placed on music, industrial arts and physical education. After satisfactorily completing the four-year high school course, students may enter colleges and universities. The records of those who do so have been excellent.

Supported by appropriations made by the State Legislature, the school is governed by the State Board of Regents. No charges are made for room, board, laundry, tuition and educational supplies. School is in session for a nine months' period.

In September, 1943, a sight-saving department was established to meet the needs of pupils with partial vision. Students in this department study large-type print instead of Braille and do their school work in classrooms especially equipped with excellent lighting, special desks, green chalk boards and other materials designed for this purpose.

The purpose of the Iowa Braille and Sight Saving School is to prepare its boys and girls to take a contributory place in life. In addition to the regular academic course of study, pupils may enroll in industrial arts, music, home economics and physical education. Parties, dances, swimming, wrestling, band, chorus, track, Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts, 4-H Clubs, and skating are a few of the extra activities.

IOWA SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF—Council Bluffs

The Iowa School for the Deaf was founded in 1855, and was first located at Iowa City and then moved to Council Bluffs in 1870. In 1902, fire completely destroyed the main building, which housed the executive quarters and dormitories for pupils. A substantial fire-proof structure now stands in its place, where sufficient room is provided for 375 pupils.

The school represents a capital investment for the state of \$2,000,000 and occupies 200 acres, with twelve fine buildings and beautiful grounds. There is a separate building to accommodate seventy-five of the youngest pupils. The school affords an education for children of the state too deaf to make progress in the hearing schools. The entrance age is five years and students are required to remain in school until nineteen years of age unless excused for good cause. The work embraces thirteen years with training largely through writing, speech, lip-reading and through the use of hearing aids where possible. The course of study provides a strong elementary education, together with substantial vocational training. The philosophy of the school is to bring the child with impaired hearing as near the normal as possible. Pupils of the school become skilled workmen and graduates, with remarkably few exceptions, are self-supporting, useful citizens of the state. Among the vocations taught are baking, shoe repairing, book-binding, printing, cabinet making and upholstering. Instruction in rhythm is also given, and a well-rounded course in almost everything which will make life more pleasant for those bereft of their hearing.

STATE SANATORIUM—Oakdale

The state sanatorium for tuberculosis was established in 1908, at Oakdale, six miles from Iowa City and 21 miles from Cedar Rapids. The care and treatment are splendid and the beneficial results are manifest.

Patients are admitted on certification by attending physicians. The

cost of patients is charged to the counties where they live. Those who can do so are asked to reimburse the counties.

The sanatorium has the facilities and services of the hospital of the State University at its easy disposal, which is of inestimable value. It is under the jurisdiction of the State Board of Regents.

Information on State Schools

The Iowa state board of education was created by chapter 170, Acts of the Thirty-third General Assembly, as the governing body for the State University, the Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts and the Iowa State Teachers College. The law went into effect July 1, 1909. Two years later chapter 141, enacted by the Thirty-fourth General Assembly, placed the school for the blind under the control of the board; chapter 160, Acts of the Thirty-seventh General Assembly, 1917, transferred the control and management of the school for the deaf to the board; and chapter 110, Acts of the 52nd General Assembly, 1947, transferred the state sanatorium. The 56th General Assembly changed the name of the board to State Board of Regents.

State University of Iowa

The pioneering vision of the First General Assembly of the State of Iowa created the State University of Iowa by an act adopted on February 25, 1847. During the century and ten years since, the University's work has touched and benefited every city, village, and home within the boundaries of Iowa.

The University's objectives have been three-fold: to educate in her classrooms, to advance the frontiers of knowledge through research, and to carry the wealth of knowledge from her libraries, her laboratories, and her learned faculty to the people of Iowa.

Consistently, throughout her history, the University has maintained an educational program of the highest integrity as the base for all her activities and the foundation upon which a superstructure of professional, semi-professional, and graduate education has been erected. The University is a member of the Association of American Universities, an association of thirty-seven of the outstanding institutions of higher learning in the United States and Canada.

The University has pioneered in liberal education, for both men and women students, and today ranks with the leaders in the general education movement.

The University's objectives of teaching and research have been carefully integrated to achieve the greatest efficiency in the teaching and learning processes. Balanced living with proper attention to pleasant housing, maintenance of good health, and recreational, religious, and cultural activities has been provided as no less important to a rounded college experience.

From the days when she stood on Iowa's physical wilderness, the State University of Iowa has been on the world's educational frontier. She has pioneered and advanced with her state, and, with justifiable pride, points to her distinguished contributions to the advancement of knowledge and the wellbeing of the State of Iowa.

The Campus

The University's buildings (approximately 85) dot a 1,260-acre campus stretching for nearly a mile along the banks of the gently winding Iowa River.

Dominating the scene on the east bank of the river is the Old Capitol, first capitol of the State of Iowa. Its history and architecture symbolize the pioneer spirit of Iowa and her University. Arranged about the Old Capitol is a pentacrest and in nearby blocks are the buildings housing the department of the Colleges of Liberal Arts and Commerce; to the east are the College of Education, the Iowa Child Welfare Research Station, and the Extension Division, all housed in East Hall; to the north are the Colleges of Law, Dentistry and Pharmacy, the women's dormitories and Iowa Memorial Union; to the south are the College of Engineering, the University Library, the Communications Center, the power and water plant and the maintenance and service buildings.

The distinctive Gothic tower of the University Hospital rises above the west campus. In its immediate vicinity stand the buildings of the

Medical Center, including the College of Medicine, the College of Nursing and the State Bacteriological Laboratory, Children's Hospital, Psychopathic Hospital, the new Hospital School for Severely Handicapped Children, and Westlawn Nurses Dormitory. To the northwest stands the new Veterans Administration General Hospital, and to the west and south are the athletic fields and golf courses, the Field House, Armory, sites acquired for construction of married student housing and future campus expansion; and on the west bluffs of the Iowa stand the large dormitories for men. On the banks below at the water's edge are the Hydraulic laboratories. To the north along the river's west bank are located the Iowa Center for Continuation Study, the Fine Arts building and the Theatre.

Permanent Construction

During the present biennium, permanent construction projects approved by the 55th General Assembly were essentially completed. A description of these and other capital improvements is continued below.

General University. Renovation of Eastlawn for use by the Department of Music as a library, practice rooms and offices has been completed. Macbride Auditorium has been refurbished. The project included installation of air conditioning, rearranging and replacing the seats, raising the platform and providing a new curtain. A new feed water system was completed and put into operation in the Power Plant. Contracts have been awarded and work started on a new Laundry Building. Plans call for occupying this building during the fall of 1957. Contracts for engineering and construction of a turbo-generator have been awarded. Preliminary work for providing more adequate facilities for the College of Law has been completed. Other construction projects completed include a boiler in the Power Plant and a steam distribution system to the Medical Research Center, with an extension of low-pressure lines to the Children's Hospital. Contracts have been let to complete the sewer project in the vicinity of the University Elementary and High Schools. These projects are financed by allocations made by the 56th General Assembly.

Student Housing. The past two years have seen considerable change in our provision for on-campus housing. As a result of ever increasing student population, it was necessary to expand the occupancy of the existing dormitory facilities by modifying specific rooms to accommodate additional students. As a part of the expansion program, a portion of Parklawn, the first permanent structure to house married students, was reserved as temporary quarters for the Iowa Center for Continuation Study. Relocation of the Continuation Study Center made possible use of the Commons as a boarding dormitory for girls. An addition to the Quadrangle provided the facilities for converting Quadrangle to a boarding dormitory. Construction of Burge Hall, a new women's dormitory, intended to accommodate approximately 1,300 students, is well under way. This building is scheduled for occupancy during the fall of 1958. Final plans to provide a permanent structure for boarding facilities in Hillcrest are nearing completion. It is tentatively planned to award contracts for this building late in June of 1957. Considerable preliminary study of the problem of providing additional permanent married student housing has been accomplished. Such studies are continuing, and it is hoped that in the near future it will be possible to develop final plans and proceed with construction. All construction for housing facilities is financed from funds other than those allocated by the legislature.

Athletic and Recreational. Funds from the Athletic Department have been available to accomplish considerable expansion in their plant. An office and classroom building was completed, equipped and occupied during this period. The new Finkbine Golf Course has just begun its third season of play. A new running track has been provided. Adequate football practice fields are now available. Irrigation systems for the stadium and practice fields, together with a well to supply the water,

are now in use. Permanent bleacher seats have been installed at the south end of the stadium. This resulted in an increased seating capacity of approximately 9,500 for the stadium. At the same time it was possible to provide more adequate rest room facilities and concession areas.

Greatly increased facilities for student service have been available with the completion of Unit 3 of the Iowa Memorial Union. These new facilities include a billiard area, bowling alleys, music room and greatly expanded lounge facilities. Progress is being made in the planning for the completion of the building (Units 4, 5 and 6) at an early date.

Medical. The Medical Research Center is virtually complete. It is anticipated that this building will be in operation by the beginning of the fall semester 1957. The addition to General Hospital to house Pediatrics out-patient clinic has now been completed and put into operation. Approximately one-third of the total cost of these two projects came from funds other than those allocated by the legislature.

Several projects of major proportion have been completed from funds allocated for Repairs, Replacements and Alterations, and others are in various phases of progress. Office suites of the departments of Neurology and Urology have been relocated in the fourth floor tower area, a shift which made possible expanding and improving ward facilities on the Urology Service and providing urgently needed office space in the department of Internal Medicine. Renovation and expansion of the office suite for Internal Medicine and Oral Surgery clinical treatment area has been completed. Provision has been made for recovery room facilities and office space for the Department of Anesthesiology adjacent to the sixth floor operating room area. Progress is being made in providing for a central sterilization unit and intravenous fluid production laboratory, both of which are to be located in Children's Hospital and will serve all services in the Medical Center. Initial equipment purchases and space allocation have been made for this project. The fluid production laboratory is a joint project of the Hospital and the Hospital Pharmacy, a division of the College of Pharmacy. Present scheduling calls for both of these projects to be complete by September of 1957.

The areas occupied by admissions, registrations and the east lobby have been altered to make possible more effective use of the area. Included in this particular project was the addition of a new elevator in the east lobby. In Children's Hospital the Orthopedic offices have been remodeled and relocated, resulting in more adequate and efficient use of the office area, as well as allowing expansion and improvement of ward facilities.

Preliminary plans for an animal house to be located near Oakdale and remodeling the fourth floor of the Medical Laboratory have been completed. These two projects also are being financed primarily from funds other than those allocated by the legislature.

Land Purchase. Approximately 540 acres of land have been purchased west of the new Finkbine Golf Course for future campus expansion. A portion of this area has been designated as the site for permanent married student housing mentioned in an earlier paragraph.

New Construction Requirements

Still very much in evidence on the campus is a large number of temporary housing and classroom buildings. These buildings, erected during the years immediately following the World War II, provided classroom and housing facilities for the rapidly increasing student population resulting primarily from the return of veterans. Of the married student housing units erected during this period, there still remain in use 648 barracks apartments and 50 quonsets. Since the demand for accommodations for married student housing has not decreased (As school opened this fall all available units were assigned, and there were some 500 names on the waiting list.), nor is it likely to in the foreseeable

future; and since these structures have at this time outlasted their anticipated life of ten years, it is essential that permanent buildings be constructed to replace the temporary structures. Preliminary plans for this type of construction have been fairly well formulated.

Most recent estimates of enrollment increases indicate that the number of students on campus will continue to increase, reaching a maximum of some 16,000 the fall of 1970. To meet the needs of an enrollment of 9,900 for the fall of 1956, it was necessary to utilize for classrooms, laboratories, offices and other miscellaneous purposes some 83,212 square feet of space in temporary structures of the barracks type and averaging ten years in age and 65,137 square feet in buildings considered to be obsolete. To house the activities presently located in temporary and obsolete structures will require two buildings larger than Schaeffer Hall, which is the largest of the four story buildings adjacent to Old Capitol. To this must be added the needs resulting from an enrollment increase from 9,900 to 16,000 if the University is to continue to accept students without restrictions.

Courses of Study

The academic affairs of the University are conducted under the direction of the Provost of the University who in the spring of 1950 assumed the powers, duties and functions of the executive deans of the University's Division of Research and Teaching and the Division of Health Sciences and Services. Under the Provost the advantages of the division system, which draws together related areas of the University, have been retained. Grouped in the research and teaching areas are the Colleges of Commerce, Education, Engineering, Law, Liberal Arts, the Graduate College, the Iowa Child Welfare Research Station, and the Summer Session. Included in the health sciences and services groups are the Colleges of Medicine, Dentistry, Pharmacy, and Nursing, the University General Hospital, the Children's Hospital, Psychopathic Hospital, the State Bacteriological Laboratory, and the Hospital School for Severely Handicapped Children.

The University organization also includes four schools. Of these, three—the Schools of Journalism, Fine Arts, and Social Work—are affiliated with and administered under the College of Liberal Arts. The fourth, the School of Religion, offers work through the College of Liberal Arts, but is related to the University through the President of the University.

A minimum of four academic years of study is required for a baccalaureate degree from the College of Liberal Arts with its affiliated schools, and the same time is required for a bachelor's degree from the Colleges of Commerce and Pharmacy. Engineering requires a minimum of four and one-half years.

Six years of study, two in pre-professional and four in professional study, are required for a degree from the College of Dentistry. Law requires three and one-half years beyond the three years of liberal arts, while seven years are necessary, three in pre-medical and four in medical study, for the degree of Doctor of Medicine. A four year course in nursing leads to the Bachelor of Science in Nursing and the certificate of Graduate Nurse. A year course for Practical Nurses is offered by the College of Nursing. Graduate work in Nursing is available through the Graduate College and College of Nursing.

Advanced degrees from the Graduate College are earned under approved programs of study and research with a minimum of one year required for a master's degree and three for the doctorate.

The various courses of study and fields of specialization and the degree conferred upon graduation are as follows:

COMMERCE—Accounting, Economics, Labor and Industrial Management, Marketing, Office Management and Business Education, and General Business majors lead to the degree Bachelor of Science in Commerce. Graduate work through the Ph.D. is offered.

DENTISTRY—Four-year course, in addition to two years of pre-dental study in the College of Liberal Arts, leading to the degree Doctor of Dental Surgery.

Graduate work leading to the degree of Master of Science, from the Graduate College, is available in the field of Orthodontics, Preventive Dentistry, Roentgenology and Oral Diagnosis, Oral Surgery and Peridontia. A course for the training of women in Dental Hygiene is offered.

EDUCATION—Courses for the professional preparation of teachers of the undergraduate level are integrated with the curricula of the Colleges of Liberal Arts and Commerce and lead to degrees in those colleges. Graduate programs for teachers, principals, supervisors, superintendents, directors of student teaching, and research and teaching positions in higher education lead to the M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in the Graduate College.

ENGINEERING—Chemical, Civil, Electrical, Mechanical, and Industrial and Management Engineering leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in the designated curriculum; General and Commercial leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science without designation. In each curriculum certain specialized options may be elected; for example, automotive, industrial, aeronautical, hydraulic, sanitary, structural, communication, power, or metallurgical. Considerable emphasis is placed on graduate work leading to the Master of Science and Ph.D. degrees in the branches of Engineering.

LIBERAL ARTS—Actuarial Science, American Civilization, Anthropology, Art, Astronomy, Bacteriology, Biochemistry, Botany, Chemistry, Child Welfare, Chinese, Classics, Economics, Education, English, European Literature and Thought, Geography, Geology, German, Greek, History, Home Economics, Humanities, Hygiene, Journalism, Latin, Library Education, Mathematics, Medical Technology, Museum Training, Music, Occupational Therapy, Oriental Studies, Philosophy, Physical Education, Physics, Political Science, Psychology, Religion, Romance Languages (French, Spanish, Italian, Portuguese), Russian, Social Science, Social Work, Sociology and Anthropology, Speech and Dramatic Art, Speech Pathology, and Zoology leading to the degree Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Music, Bachelor of Fine Arts or to advanced degrees through the Doctor of Philosophy.

Specilized courses in the Departments of Chemistry and the Division of Physical Education lead to the degree Bachelor of Science in the respective fields.

Students who select courses to prepare for dentistry, law, and medicine may study pre-professional subjects in the College of Liberal Arts for the required number of years and then enter the professional college. If all specific requirements for the bachelor's degree are included in the pre-professional program and the first year of professional study is completed successfully, the student may receive a bachelor's degree from the College of Liberal Arts, since the college will give credit for one year of professional work in lieu of the fourth year necessary for a bachelor's degree.

SCHOOL OF FINE ARTS—Combines departments of art, music, and dramatic arts. Students enroll in the College of Liberal Arts or the Graduate College and may be candidates for one of the degrees of Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Music, Bachelor of Fine Arts, Master of Arts, Master of Fine Arts, or Doctor of Philosophy.

SCHOOL OF JOURNALISM—Offers study sequences through the College of Liberal Arts in Editorial Journalism, Radio and Television, Journalism, Advertising, Magazine Journalism, Pictorial Journalism, and Public Relations. Awards a Certificate of Journalism on basis of scholarship and concentration in the field.

SCHOOL OF RELIGION—In cooperation with the College of Liberal Arts offers a field of concentration leading to Bachelor of Arts and

Master of Arts degree. It is inter-faith in nature and professorships of Catholic, Jewish, and Protestant faiths are maintained by the respective groups.

SCHOOL OF SOCIAL WORK—Offers a two-year graduate curriculum as preparation for social work. Some undergraduate subjects recommended as preparation for professional training are now being given.

LAW—Three and one-half academic year course, in addition to three years of pre-law study in the College of Liberal Arts, leading to the degree LL.B. or J.D.

MEDICINE—Four-year course, in addition to three years of pre-medical study in the College of Liberal Arts, leading to the degree Doctor of Medicine.

The College of Medicine offers postgraduate work leading to advanced degrees in the Graduate College. Special training is also offered in Physical Therapy, Occupational Therapy, and Radiology.

At frequent intervals each year, the College of Medicine also offers postgraduate conferences designed to provide new and refresher information for practitioners in the State of Iowa.

COLLEGE OF NURSING—The degree Bachelor of Science in Nursing and the Certificate Graduate Nurse are offered at the conclusion of the four year program. Students who have received the certificate of graduate nurse may enroll for additional work leading to the degree Bachelor of Science in Nursing. A special program in Psychiatric Nursing is also being offered.

Work is offered through the Graduate College toward the Master's degree in the area of Nursing Service Administration. A one-year course for Practical Nurses is also offered.

PHARMACY—Four-year course, leading to the degree Bachelor of Science in Pharmacy, including unique training in Hospital Pharmacy. Advanced work through the Ph.D. is also offered.

GRADUATE—Opportunity for study at the graduate level is available in all fields listed above at this time. It is also available in the fields of Child Welfare and Hydraulic Engineering. Such study leads to the degrees Master of Arts, Master of Fine Arts, Master of Science, and Doctor of Philosophy.

CORRESPONDENCE STUDY—Courses at the college level are offered in many of the departments through the Extension Division of students who cannot be in residence but wish to prepare themselves for more effective work in their respective occupations, or who wish to continue work toward degrees while out of residence.

Enrollment

Prior to World War II, the University stood among the fifteen largest colleges and universities in the country in the total number of different students of college grade enrolled annually. Its growth has proceeded apace with the general upward trend of college enrollment. The University's enrollment of 1,542 different campus students of college grade in 1900-01 rose to 9,283 in 1940-41, forty years later.

Then came the overwhelming influx of the veteran students. During the war, in 1943-44, the campus enrollment of college grade went down to a low of 4,891. Just four years later, 1948-49, the enrollment had risen to 13,354. This pattern is comparable to the experience of other large universities.

The enrollments in higher educational institutions fell away sharply beginning in 1950, due to the decline in the World War II veterans' enrollment of about 40 per cent from the post-war peak and because of the Korean conflict. However, the lull was anticipated and enrollments continued to decline gradually until the fall of 1954. Since 1954 the enrollment has increased rapidly and in the fall of 1956 a total of

9,901 students were in attendance. This increase is expected to continue past the highest immediate Post World War II peaks and will continue to spiral, reaching the pinnacle in the 1960's and possibly the early 1970's. Our best estimates indicate that we shall have in the neighborhood of 13,000 students on campus of college grade during the fall of 1965-66 and 15,000-16,000 in 1969-70. Forecasts are based on past experience with enrollments with recognition of the influence of the increased birth rate of the war and post-war years and the trend toward the enrollment of higher percentages of the population in higher educational pursuits.

Every university has faced the complex problem of providing the education demanded during the post-war years without a sacrifice of the integrity of academic program. Now faced with anticipated record enrollments within a few years, the universities must be concerned with the integrity of the academic program lest it be slighted by attempts at false economy and rendered helpless before the next record wave when it arrives.

The record of enrollment since 1940 and annually thereafter is as follows:

It is significant to note that the University usually enrolls from 21 to 23 per cent of the college enrollment in the State of Iowa, and grants about 30 per cent of all the degrees granted by Iowa colleges. This is perhaps the best evidence of the relationship of the University to the total pattern of higher education in the State of Iowa. The University is a partner with the four-year colleges and junior colleges of Iowa in the field of general education—the process of training citizens for good citizenship.

Beyond that level the University provides the professional and specialized programs which provide opportunities for further study at an advanced level for the graduates of junior colleges, and four year colleges as well as for her own students. In so doing, the University is an integral and indispensable part of the total program of higher education in the State of Iowa.

Service to the state is a keynote in every University effort. This it accomplishes on a daily basis in the activities of each of its colleges and departments along with the teaching and research functions. In addition, the University has numerous units in its organization specifically designed to provide direct service to the people of Iowa and at the same time contribute to the teaching and research functions of the total University.

Some of the principal service units are: The University Hospitals, Psychopathic Hospital, the Iowa Hospital-School for Severely Handicapped Children, the State Bacteriological Laboratory, and other affiliated organizations in the medical service field; the Iowa Child Welfare Research Station, the Extension Division with its bureaus of Audio-Visual Instruction and Correspondence Study, the Bureau of Business and Economic Research, the Bureau of Labor and Management; the Information Service, the Institute of Hydraulic Research, the Institute of Public Affairs, and the Iowa Center for Continuation Study. The University had more recently added research Institutes in the fields of Agricultural Law, Agricultural Medicine and Gerontology.

Through the activities of these units, and others, the University serves hundreds of thousands each year, both on and off the campus.

The University belongs to Iowa and to Iowans. It serves them whenever possible, holds the door wide open for every visitor to its campus, and stands ready to be of further service.

Every Iowan should know his University.

Iowa State College

The Iowa State College was established on March 22, 1858, by act of the Seventh General Assembly of Iowa.

In the succeeding years financial depression, the confusion of the Civil War, and other factors delayed the construction of buildings and the beginning of instruction for a decade.

The college first received students for preparatory training on October 21, 1868.

The Land-Grant College Act of 1862 gave federal aid to industrial education and the Iowa legislature was the first in the nation to accept the provisions of the act, September 11, 1862.

Thus the Iowa State College became a part of a nation-wide system of land-grant colleges and contribution of America to higher

universities—often called the unique education.

The system had its beginning when the people protested that colleges of that day were neither democratic in range of subject-matter nor in the sense that they were generally available to capable students in all walks of life. There was a demand for a new emphasis on agricultural teaching and research, as well as the needs of industry and the problems of engineering and technology.

Through the years Iowa State College as a part of the Land-Grant system has provided for rich and poor alike, a new kind of education to meet the needs of a new nation in a time when science and technology have assumed great importance.

Objectives and Scope of Activity

Under the authority granted by the Iowa General Assembly, the Iowa State College is charged with the responsibility of conducting activities in three general areas:

- (1) Formal classroom instruction on the campus.

The most important assignment of Iowa State College is to educate young people for useful lives. They must be educated, first of all to become good citizens with a solid grasp of social, economic and political problems of the day as well as scientists, engineers, agriculturists and home economists.

Wherever you go, not only in this country, but throughout the world, you will find Iowa State College graduates in important positions of responsibility and leadership—as engineers, as scientists, as home economists, as doctors of veterinary medicine and as agriculturists.

- (2) A broad research program for the benefit of agriculture, industry and the home.

Next to the dollar Iowa spends in the education of the people of the state, the dollar we invest for research probably returns the greatest dividends of any investment we make. It has been reliably estimated that each dollar invested in research at Iowa State College has returned about \$300 to the welfare of the state.

What has been accomplished through research is truly an amazing story. Science and technology have literally revolutionized our business structure and methods of living during the past 50 years. Even more important than the financial dividends resulting from research has been the improvement in the physical and spiritual well-being of all people.

- (3) An extension or off-campus program designed to take the benefits of the college to all people in the state.

The chief objective of the extension program has been to reach every family, urban as well as rural, with information that will enable them to maintain a more satisfactory life.

ACADEMIC PROGRAM

The following undergraduate courses of study, leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science, are now offered in the college:

AGRICULTURE—Agricultural Business, Agricultural Education, Agricultural Journalism, Agronomy, Animal Husbandry, Dairy Husbandry, Dairy Industry (also Dairy Industry with majors in Chemistry or Economics), Farm Operation, Forestry (also Forestry with majors in Conservation, Farm Forestry, Forest Utilization, Range Management, or Wildlife Management), Horticulture (with majors in Floriculture, Nursery Management, Pomology or Vegetable Crops), Industrial Education, Landscape Architecture, Poultry Husbandry, Rural Sociology.

ENGINEERING—Aeronautical Engineering, Agricultural Engineering, Architectural Engineering, Ceramic Engineering, Chemical Engineering, Civil Engineering, Electrical Engineering, General Engineering (with an option in Industrial Engineering), Mechanical Engineering, Mining Engineering.

HOME ECONOMICS—Applied Art, Child Development, Food and Nutrition (with majors in Dietetics, Experimental Cookery or Community Nutrition), General Home Economics, Home Economics Journalism, Home Economics and Related Science, Home Economics Education, Home Management, Household Equipment, Institutional Management, Textiles and Clothing.

SCIENCE—Agricultural Economics, Bacteriology, Botany, Chemistry, Chemical Technology, Climatology and Meteorology, Economics, Entomology, Food Technology, Foreign Trade and Service, General Science,

Genetics, Geology, Government, History, Industrial Economics, Industrial Psychology, Mathematics, Naval Science, Physical Education for Men, Physics, Rural Sociology, Statistics, Technical Journalism, Zoology. (Also special program in preparation for human medicine and preparation for veterinary medicine.)

In addition, the college offers studies leading to the degrees of Bachelor of Architecture (five-year program) and Doctor of Veterinary Medicine (six-year program), and offers graduate courses leading to the degrees of Master of Science and Doctor of Philosophy.

For the benefit of students unable to spend four years or more in college study special programs are offered which may be terminated in less time and for which a certificate of completion is offered. These programs include Dairy Plant Operation, Farm Operation, and an option in Marketing Industries under Agricultural Business.

RESEARCH

The research program of the college is organized into six units.

THE IOWA AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENT STATION has been closely associated with most of the tremendous strides which scientific agriculture has made for years. Experiments are conducted on college farms at Ames and at nearby Ankeny, as well as at 31 farms and experimental plots located throughout the state. Important results have been achieved in almost every area of farming, including breeding, feeding and selection of livestock, farm crops, cultivation and conservation methods, farm power and machinery, farm structures, farm marketing methods, farm management and many others.

THE IOWA ENGINEERING EXPERIMENT STATION which is 50 years old this year, shares with the University of Illinois the distinction of being the first such station to be established in the nation. Its objectives always have been to foster and develop the industries of Iowa through engineering research, to aid in the development of raw materials and natural resources of the state, to increase utilization of agricultural by-products, and to aid in the solution of engineering problems arising in the various branches of industry. The Station does considerable work for the Iowa State Highway Commission under grants from the commission.

THE INDUSTRIAL SCIENCE RESEARCH INSTITUTE aims to provide fundamental scientific facts and principles which underlie the development and successful solution of agricultural and industrial problems of Iowa. In addition, it trains students for responsible positions in research organizations, in industry, in government laboratories and in colleges.

THE INSTITUTE FOR ATOMIC RESEARCH includes the Ames Laboratory of the Atomic Energy Commission which is one of the major laboratories of the Commission. The principal objective of the Institute is to contribute fundamental knowledge basic to the release, effects and utilization of atomic energy.

THE STATISTICAL LABORATORY is a co-operative project with the Bureau of Agricultural Economics of the United States Department of Agriculture. The laboratory has developed techniques which are of great value to more accurate and meaningful research.

THE VETERINARY MEDICAL RESEARCH INSTITUTE is closely tied to problems associated with livestock production in Iowa. It aims to develop methods of controlling or eradicating diseases in food producing animals.

Extension Services

THE IOWA AGRICULTURAL AND HOME ECONOMICS EXTENSION SERVICE is part of a nation-wide Extension Service operated through the United States Department of Agriculture. It is part of the

largest and perhaps the most effective program of adult education in the world. In addition to several hundred paid employees, nearly 50,000 active volunteers each year assist in carrying out extension programs in every county in Iowa. In a single year, information received through the Extension Service results in changed practices on upward of 125,000 Iowa farms. Some 70,000 Iowa homes also will change practices because of Extension Service activities.

THE ENGINEERING EXTENSION SERVICE operates in the fields of public service, industry, technology and engineering. It conducts vocational-education training for persons in semi-technical or technical positions for which an engineering degree is not required. It carries on professional education for engineers, executives and supervisory personnel of Iowa industry. It gives specific advisory and information assistance to Iowa industries, municipalities, associations and citizens.

Service Units

To help Iowans make the most of the information available from the College, special service units are maintained.

RADIO STATION WOI AND TELEVISION STATION WOI-TV are used to bring educational features from Iowa State College and from the State University of Iowa and Iowa State Teachers College into homes, classrooms and business establishments throughout the state. Emphasis is on educational programs, good music, drama and public service. In the latter category is the market information, possibly the most complete in the Midwest, which is relied upon by farmers, elevator operators, livestock buyers, produce houses and others in daily operations.

SEED TESTING LABORATORY is largely self-supporting and is considered one of the finest and best equipped laboratories of its kind in the world. It helps to guard the quality of seed which Iowa farmers and gardeners plant.

SOIL TESTING LABORATORY also is largely self-supporting and helps Iowa farmers determine the needs of their soils for fertilizers, helps agronomists know more about Iowa's all-important agricultural land.

Short Courses

About 100 special short courses and meetings of the duration of one day or more are held on the Iowa State campus each year. Most of them are sponsored by groups within the college, and they are attended by approximately 20,000 persons. They help professional men, business men, boys and girls, farmers and others to keep abreast of new and important developments within broad fields of agriculture, home economics, engineering, science and veterinary medicine, or within more specialized fields where their particular interests may lie.

Enrollments

Enrollment at Iowa State College is increasing more rapidly than had been predicted earlier.

The 1955 enrollment of 9,176 was approximately 900 greater than the year previous. In the fall of 1956, more than 9,673 students were on the campus.

This increase in enrollment will impose heavy burdens on the facilities of the college. At the same time, the programs of research and extension services are undergoing considerable expansion, largely in response to the greatly increased needs and demands of the people of Iowa.

Iowa State Teachers College

The State of Iowa maintains one institution whose sole function is the preparation of personnel for work in the public schools of the state. Iowa State Teachers College recognizes its unique role and the attendant responsibilities in the maintenance and further development of an effective system of public education throughout the state.

The need for establishing a separate professional college for the education of teachers was recognized in Iowa by the Second General Assembly. The Sixteenth General Assembly made appropriations for the establishment of the Iowa State Normal School at Cedar Falls. Instruction began on September 6, 1876. In 1909 the Normal School became Iowa State Teachers College.

Recently there has been a nation-wide trend for teachers colleges to assume broader functions as regional colleges—to such an extent in numerous cases as to submerge their original functions of teacher education. The Iowa State Teachers College continues to adhere to its primary function—teacher education.

(1) Pre-service teacher education

The pre-service program conducted on the campus provides education through the master's degree level for all instructional positions common to the public schools. All curricula are designed to meet the requirements for one or more teaching certificates. In line with a nation-wide trend in curriculum reorganization the college conducted an intensive study of its curricula and introduced a revised program, begun with the freshman class of 1951-52. This program places increased emphasis on (1) the general education of all students and (2) professional laboratory experiences. It is intended that graduates shall secure both the broad education essential for effective citizenship and the subject-matter background and professional competence required of members of the teaching profession.

Since June, 1952, the college has offered graduate work leading to the M.A. in Education degree for public school personnel.

(2) In-service teacher education

Since continued professional growth is necessary for teachers, as for members of other learned professions, the college maintains an extensive in-service program of teacher education. Members of the staff are available throughout the year to assist teachers with instructional problems in their own schoolrooms, to discuss plans with groups of teachers and administrators, and to serve as professional leaders at conferences, demonstrations or work-shops organized for their teachers by county and city superintendents of schools.

(3) Professional publications

As a professional college, the Iowa State Teachers College issues from time to time professional publications, usually prepared by members of its own staff, designed to be of service directly to the classroom teacher.

Areas of Preparation

In the preparation of teachers for the elementary grades, the pre-service curricula have been adapted to the legislation enacted by the Fifty-first General Assembly. Since September 1952 the two-year curriculum has been the one remaining transitional program pending the time when it is hoped that Iowa will join the other states in requiring a minimum of four years preparation for all teachers.

During the past decade an increasing number of elementary teachers has been completing four years of study and it is likely that at some time in the near future the four-year program will be the accepted pattern for prospective elementary teachers. Many city schools are making the degree requirement their minimum in the employment of grade teachers.

Elementary school majors are offered at the college for teaching at the kindergarten-primary level and in grades above the primary. There is also a special curriculum preparing teachers for the junior high school.

At the undergraduate level, the college prepares for teaching in the following junior and senior high school subjects: agriculture, art, biological science, business education, chemistry, distributive education, dramatics, earth science, economics and sociology, French, German, government, history, industrial arts, Latin, home economics, library science, mathematics, music, physical education for men, physical education for women, physics, safety education, science, Spanish, and speech. Preparation for special teachers to work throughout the entire elementary and secondary school system is provided in art, music, industrial arts, physical education, and speech correction.

Specialized instruction is provided by twelve instructional departments comparable to those in other colleges and universities—art, business education; home economics; industrial arts; languages, speech and literature; library science; mathematics; music; physical education for men; physical education for women; science; and social science.

Professional Education

Professional education is provided by three closely related professional departments and by a considerable degree of professionalization of the work in various academic fields. The basic professional courses in education are provided by the Department of Education; opportunities for observation and student teaching courses are the responsibility of the Department of Teaching; curriculum and instructional materials are available through the service of the Library and the Curriculum Laboratory. Through the coordinated effort of the three professional departments an effective training in audio-visual education is received by the prospective teachers.

The board of social welfare was created by act of the Forty-seventh General Assembly in 1937. The Forty-eighth General Assembly amended the original law by enacting legislation relating to membership, salary, terms of office and removal from office of its members.

The board of social welfare has authority to administer state and federal funds appropriated by the federal social security law and the Iowa Legislature for old age assistance, aid to the blind, child welfare services, aid to dependent children and emergency relief.

Under the terms of the law, county social welfare boards, also bipartisan are appointed by the county boards of supervisors. The county welfare boards receive applications for assistance from needy aged and blind in the various counties and make recommendations for assistance to the state board. Further enactment of the Forty-eighth General Assembly provided for the administration of funds made available to the counties for emergency relief, and relating to relief labor and the powers and duties of the boards of supervisors in connection therewith. The county boards also cooperate with the state board in giving service to neglected and dependent children.

The board of social welfare is required to cooperate with the federal government according to the provisions of the federal social security law, to make reports to the federal social security board on administration of assistance, and the federal children's bureau of the U. S. department of labor on its services to children.

The division of child welfare will carry on services to children in the State of Iowa except those performed by the institutions under the jurisdiction of the board of control.

Information on State Fair

For over 100 years, the Iowa State Fair has been gaining steadily in size, prestige and public service. Today, it is nationally recognized as America's greatest agricultural and livestock fair. Situated in the heart of the world's wealthiest agricultural empire, it is the focal point each year for exhibitors of the finest livestock and farm products. In attendance, too, it stands in the front rank of the great educational and entertainment expositions on the North American continent.

The Iowa State Fair, the original "State Fair" of a best-selling novel and of two hit motion pictures, is held in Des Moines each year. It runs for 10 days, starting in late August and sometimes carrying into the first few days of September. Attendance each year now runs over 500,000.

The livestock show, largest of its kind in America, attracts over 8,000 of the finest farm animals from 20 leading agricultural states. The 4-H and F.F.A. shows, state-wide congresses of farm young people's organizations and their livestock and projects, add to the fame of the fair. Other major educational features include the corn and small grain show, farm machinery exposition, flower and garden show, art salon,

photographic salon, school exposition, women's exposition, harness and saddle horse show, culinary and needlework departments, and the fish and game exhibit.

From the huge State Fair grandstand, one of the finest amphitheatres in the nation, fairgoers witness a varied series of spectacles and events, including national championship auto races, midwest circuit horse races, thrill day stunts, musical extravaganzas, fireworks and circus acts.

The first and second Iowa State Fairs were held in Fairfield, Iowa, in 1854 and 1855. From 1856 to 1879, the State Fair moved from city to city. It was held in Muscatine in 1856 and 1857; Oskaloosa, 1858 and 1859; Iowa City, 1860 and 1861; Dubuque, 1862 and 1863; Burlington, 1864-1866; Clinton, 1867 and 1868; Keokuk, 1869, 1870, 1874 and 1875; and Cedar Rapids, 1871, 1873 and 1876-1878.

In 1879 the State Fair moved to Des Moines to stay. In 1884 the Legislature appropriated \$50,000 to purchase a state fairgrounds, on condition that the city of Des Moines raise an equal amount for buildings and facilities. The city concurred, and Iowa thus became the second state in the Northwest to acquire a permanent site for its fair.

In 1923 the General Assembly changed the former method of fair administration by providing for an Iowa department of agriculture and a state fair board, and giving this board the duty of managing the fair and the custody of the fairgrounds. Under this law, the fair board comprises one director from each congressional district. These directors together with the president and vice president of the fair, are elected at the annual midwinter session of the state agricultural convention. Immediately after that convention, the state fair board elects its secretary and its treasurer.

All operating expense, maintenance and other costs of the fair are paid out of fair receipts, except where the Legislature may deem it advisable to make a special appropriation for such purposes. The law provides that the state will not be liable for any expenses or liabilities incurred by the fair.

Since 1902 the Legislature has appropriated \$1,130,500 for the construction of permanent buildings on the fairgrounds, purchase of additional land and for necessary improvements. In recent years, however, the State Fair has used only its own revenues for these purposes. Altogether, since 1902, the fair itself has expended \$3,362,862 for maintenance and improvements from actual profits of the fair. One of the latest major building projects financed by fair funds is the new fireproof 4-H Girls' dormitory, on which construction was begun in the spring of 1949. It was formally opened and presented to the Girls 4-H Club for their use at the 1950 Iowa State Fair. Another is the beautiful new Radio and Television Center providing studios for programs originating on the grounds as well as established programs featuring well known announcers and entertainers. This building was built and in use in 1956. Premiums, amounting to over \$190,000 a year, are also provided by the fair for winners in exhibits and contests.

How the State Fair has grown during 100 years of progress can best be shown by comparing statistics on the first fair of 1854 and the average figures for the 1955 and 1956 fairs:

Duties of State Tax Commission

The state tax commission was established in 1929 and was originally known as the state board of assessment and review. The duties of the commission as fixed by law include the supervision of the assessment system of the state, and the assessment of public utilities, including railroads, telephone and telegraph lines, pipe lines, water works, transmission lines and plants producing electricity.

In addition to these duties the commission administers the individual and corporation income tax, sales and use tax, chain store tax, cigarette tax, beer and inheritance taxes and many other minor activities.

The total collection of taxes received by the tax commission for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1956, aggregated \$123,607,665.

In addition to duties in relation to the assessment and collection of taxes, the commission also administers the provisions of the homestead credit act, under which more than 24 and three-quarter million dollars annually is now being credited upon the real estate and personal property taxes of persons entitled to homestead grants.

The tax commission also administers the military service tax credit act under which local taxing bodies are reimbursed more than one million seven hundred thousand dollars annually for losses incurred through the exemption of property owned by persons who have been in military service.

The tax commission has supervision of local property assessments. It is in charge of the general direction of county and city assessors under the law enacted by the 52nd General Assembly.

State Permit Board

Chapter 124 of the 1954 Code of Iowa, provides for the issuance of permits for the manufacture, sale and taxation of certain nonintoxicating liquor, with the provision that such fees and taxes shall be collected under this act, accrue to the general fund of the state of Iowa. The state permit board is constituted of the chairman of the state tax commission, who is also chairman of the board, the secretary of state and the auditor of state. The board reviews the action of any governing body in any case where a hearing has been had relative to the cancellation or revocation of a permit issued under the provisions of this act.

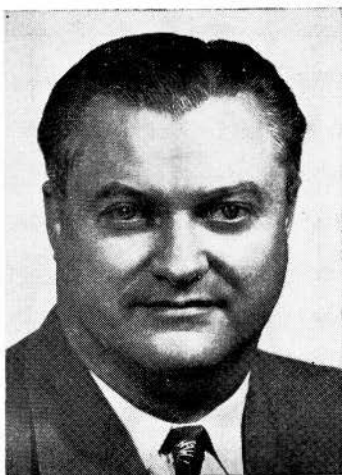

The Fifty-first General Assembly created a watchmakers' board to register all persons or firms engaged in watchmaking or repair. Members of the board are paid \$10 per day during sessions of the board, with maximum compensation of \$300 a year. They are required by law to meet at least once every six months.

The Indians in Iowa

The Mesquakie Indians who are residents and voters in Iowa number around 500. Iowa was for many years the cherished home of their ancestors and friends.

They own, as a tribe or family, 3,600 acres of land in the Iowa river valley in Tama county. This is their collective farm, bought by them with their own money, managed and cultivated by them, on which they live, where they study and have their religious services. The State of Iowa many years ago by law gave them authority to own tribal land and property and the title is held in trust for them. They pay taxes and those who are qualified are voters.

They have a genuine democratic government for themselves, elect a council of managers and the council has a chief or president. They have a school and all of the younger people can write the English language. Some of the older ones have never learned other than their own language, which is used by all of them.

The Mesquakie tribe is of the Algonquin family. They formerly lived on the Atlantic coast, then moved westward through New York and Canada, and in Wisconsin in the early fur trading days, they formed a federation with their kinsmen, the Sacs, or Saukies. The Mesquakies were called by the traders Reynards or Foxes and their name means the "people of the red earth." A century ago they lived in several camps along the Mississippi river, then moved into the Des Moines valley, followed the agency and army to Racoon forks, and departed from Des Moines when Iowa was admitted as a state.

Some of the Mesquakies so loved their homes in Iowa that they gave up their government payments and returned from their southwestern reservations. The state gave them permission to live in Iowa as a tribe and with money received in settlement with the government they bought their present lands.

On their Tama county farm they live in comfortable houses and dress, in the main, as their white neighbors. Formerly the head men resisted efforts at educating the young, but now they go to school and are apt scholars. They keep up their wickiups, not to live in, but for their visits and ceremonies. They also have one large tribal hall in which they

hold their religious ceremonies regularly, several services each week, conducted in their own language by their own leaders and preserving their own forms of worship.

They are quite skillful in various industries—weaving, basket making, bead work and in leather. One-third of the land is cultivated but the remainder is largely rough pasture land. The tribe has a tractor, but uses horses for farm work, and there are cows, hogs and chickens.

Grand Army of the Republic

The Grand Army of the Republic was a patriotic and fraternal organization of the Union survivors of the military and naval forces of the Civil War who served between April 12, 1861, and April 9, 1865.

Iowa was one of the first states of the Union to attempt organization of the Grand Army of the Republic, receiving as a department its first charter on July 12, 1866. Its permanent organization dates from January 23, 1879.

There were over 519 posts chartered in Iowa. Membership stood at its peak in 1890 when 52,013 veterans held membership.

Six veterans of the Civil War served as governors of Iowa: Colonel William M. Stone of Knoxville, 1864-1868; Colonel Samuel Merrill of McGregor, 1868-1872; Colonel Cyrus C. Carpenter of Fort Dodge, 1872-1875; Captain Joshua G. Newbold of Mount Pleasant, 1877-1878; Captain Buren R. Sherman of Vinton, 1882-1886; Lieutenant Colonel Francis M. Drake of Centerville, 1896-1898.

To the Grand Army of the Republic goes the credit for having instituted Memorial Day, with all the tender and reverent patriotism which that occasion always reveals, and for having kept alive, in history and story, the brave deeds performed upon the battlefields by many a gallant soldier. To them goes the credit of having preserved the Union at a critical period in its history. Their average age when they fought the war was nineteen.

Nate E. Kendall, former governor of Iowa, was principal speaker at the dedication of the Iowa monument on the battlefield of Shiloh. He eulogized the veterans of that sanguine conflict, when he said:—"No soldiery ever entered a field with such noble purpose, and none ever emerged with a record of such glorious accomplishment. When our beloved flag was insulted, when our territorial integrity was threatened, when our national life was imperiled, they promptly responded to the appeal of President Lincoln, and cheerfully embraced self-immolation to secure the perpetuity of the government of the people, by the people and for the people, and to render forever positive the certainty that the government, after being baptized in the sacred blood of the Revolutionary fathers, should not disappear from the earth, but that it, under God, should have everlasting life.

"And over the graves of the fallen dead the spring has cast its tender violets, the summer its gorgeous field of flowers, the autumn its golden withered leaves, the winter its blanket of snow. All is forgiven, all is forgotten except the glorious results of the combat in which our soldiers were engaged.

"The United States of America! The immortal principles of justice and equity which underlie it! The incomparable benefits which it secures to its citizenship. The inestimable sacrifices which have been suffered to maintain it! It is our home, our country, our beloved government, bequeathed to us forever by the venerated fathers, the most invaluable inheritance ever bestowed upon the sons of men."

The Iowa Department lost its last member in the death on September 20, 1949, of James P. Martin of Sutherland. Thus the last Iowa member of that long line of the Grand Army of the Republic answered "taps" and bivouaced on the eternal camping grounds.

The 55th General Assembly dismantled the G.A.R. room in the capitol and stored the records with the History and Archives department.

Spanish-American War

The United Spanish War Veterans came into existence because of the desire to carry on the comradeship that came from their associations in the service with the only 100 per cent volunteer war the world has ever known.

In this organization, the Iowa Department is one of 52 departments, and maintains its headquarters in room 102 in the north corridor, basement floor of the state capitol. Here are kept the records of the organization and personnel. Plans are made for the annual encampment, service work given in claims for pensions for widows and the orphans of deceased veterans.

The men who served in Iowa's four regiments of infantry and the two batteries of light artillery numbered 5,696; there were two killed in action, 38 wounded and 163 died of disease.

Out of this war came men who later served their state and national government in high positions—Dan Turner, Corning, Governor 1931-1933; Joe Hanley, Muscatine, later New York Lt. Governor of that state; Lloyd Thurston, Osceola, member of the State Legislature, and the U. S. Congress, National Commander in Chief, 1954-1955, United Spanish War Veterans; Horace M. Havner, National Commander in Chief of the United Spanish War Veterans 1947-1948.

The leaders of the American Army in World War I were all veterans of this war. Among them were such men as Matthew A. Tinley, Council Bluffs, Colonel of the famous Iowa Regiment, the 168th Infantry, and all of the field officers of that regiment.

The war was the only one fought by an army of this country where the returns were greater than the total cost of the war.

Iowa in World War I

The total number of men registered in Iowa for service, and possible service, during World War I, was 523,478. This grand total was divided as follows:

In the army, 96,726 enlisted men, 4,975 officers, 611 nurses.

In the marines, 1,044 enlisted men, 30 officers.

In the navy, 10,211 enlisted men, 525 officers, 40 nurses, 42 yeomen.

Cadets at West Point, 20.

These Iowa soldiers came from every walk of life. The adjutant general reported to the government that, of the men drafted in Iowa, 51.7 per cent were farmers and farm laborers.

Iowa in World War II

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This registration was for the purpose of uncovering persons, 45 through 64 years of age, who possessed critical skills required in war production or civilian activities vital to the successful prosecution of the war effort. This age group was not vulnerable to military service.

The number of officers and enlisted men and women from Iowa in World War II is placed at 262,638. No distinction is made as between persons who entered service through induction or enlistment. Although no specific figures are available, it is estimated that persons served in the various components as follows:

The Post World War II Act was initially effective June 24, 1948, and was amended June 19, 1951. The Act requires registration of all male persons born on or after August 31, 1922, upon attaining the eighteenth anniversary of the dates of their birth.

Total in service since invasion of South Korea, June 25, 1950, enlisted and inducted 70,500

The American Legion in Iowa

The American Legion was born in Paris, March 15, 1919. The Legion was launched formally at St. Louis, May 8, 1919, by World War veterans from nearly every state in the Union, who had been selected by temporary secretaries named at the request of Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., who acted under instructions from the Paris caucus.

The first Iowa state convention was held in Des Moines, September 4, 1919. The first national convention of delegates from the newly organized state departments was held in Minneapolis on Armistice Day, 1919.

The American Legion Auxiliary of mothers, wives, sisters and daughters of Legionnaires was organized in 1921. The Iowa department was launched at Sioux City.

La Societe des 40 Hommes et 8 Chevaux, a national fraternal order of Legionnaires, was organized in 1921.

Hanford MacNider established the Iowa Legionnaire, with Frank Miles as editor on March 4, 1921. He was succeeded as editor on April 1, 1946, by A. F. Faber.

The Disabled American Veterans in Iowa

The disabled American Veterans, commonly known as the D. A. V., was organized nationally in 1920 by groups of disabled veterans then undergoing vocational training courses, and chartered by Congress in 1932, to render service to, for and by disabled veterans. The D. A. V. has, ever since its inception, been the spokesman for the disabled war veterans of America, in Congress and before its various committees as well as before the Veterans' Administration and its local regional offices and facilities.

During 1920 and 1921 the first three chapters of the Iowa department were organized in the vocational training centers at Des Moines, Iowa City and Ames. The department of Iowa D. A. V. held its first state convention in 1922 at Iowa City.

American Veterans of World War II

The American Veterans of World War II, commonly known as the AMVETS, were organized nationally in September, 1944, at Kansas City, Missouri. The AMVETS were granted a national charter by an act of Congress and President Truman signed the measure on July 23, 1947. AMVETS is the only nationally chartered World War II veterans organization.

AMVETS got their start in Iowa at Atlantic in 1944, and were incorporated as the Iowa Department of AMVETS on May 2, 1945. The first state convention was held in Des Moines in 1947. AMVETS were recognized as a nationally chartered World War II veterans' organization by the Iowa Legislature in March, 1949, and entered as such in the Iowa Code.

The AMVETS principles are (1) to promote world peace, (2) to perpetuate the American way of life, (3) to help the veteran help himself.

The AMVETS have a national and state auxiliary comprised of the wives, mothers and sisters of World War II veterans.

Iowa Veterans of Foreign Wars

The Veterans of Foreign Wars, department of Iowa, was granted its charter by the national organization on May 28, 1921. Its objects are fraternal, patriotic, historical and educational; to preserve and strengthen comradeship among its members and to assist worthy comrades; to perpetuate the memory and history of its dead; and to assist their widows and orphans; to maintain true allegiance to the government of the United States and fidelity to its constitution and laws. V.F.W. is composed only of American men who have served honorably in the army, navy, marine corps or coast guard of the United States, in hostile waters or on foreign soil during any foreign war, insurrection, or expedition.

Veterans of Foreign Wars has an auxiliary of mothers, wives, sisters and daughters, and fraternal orders consisting of Cooties of V.F.W. members, and Cootiettes and Lady Bugs of auxiliary members.

Iowans in Presidents' Cabinets

Fifteen Iowa men have served in the cabinets of thirteen presidents of the United States. The list of these is as follows:

JAMES H. HARLAN—Mount Pleasant. Served as secretary of the interior in the cabinet of President Andrew Johnson in 1865 and 1866.

WILLIAM W. BELKNAP—Secretary of war in the two administrations of President Ulysses S. Grant. Made his home in Keokuk for a number of years.

GEORGE W. McCRARY—Served as secretary of war in the cabinet of President Rutherford B. Hayes.

SAMUEL J. KIRKWOOD—Iowa's Civil War governor was secretary of the interior under President James A. Garfield.

FRANK HATTON—Burlington. Co-publisher with Robert J. Burdette of the Hawkeye, was assistant postmaster general from 1881 to 1884 and postmaster general in the cabinet of President Chester A. Arthur from October 14, 1884, to March 4, 1885.

JAMES WILSON—Served as secretary of agriculture for sixteen years in the cabinets of Presidents McKinley, Roosevelt and Taft.

LESLIE M. SHAW—Denison. Served as secretary of the treasury in the two administrations of President Theodore Roosevelt.

EDWIN T. MEREDITH—Secretary of agriculture in the cabinet of President Woodrow Wilson. Born in Avoca, Iowa, in 1876.

HENRY C. WALLACE—Secretary of agriculture in the cabinets of Presidents Harding and Coolidge.

HERBERT HOOVER—Served as secretary of commerce in the cabinets of Harding and Coolidge, 1921 to 1929. Elected president of the United States in 1928, the first man born west of the Mississippi river to attain this high position.

CURTIS DWIGHT WILBUR—Born at Boonesboro, Iowa, on May 10, 1867. Served as secretary of navy in cabinet of President Coolidge.

RAY LYMAN WILBUR—Born at Boonesboro, Iowa, on April 13, 1875. Served as secretary of the navy in the cabinet of President Coolidge and secretary of the interior in the cabinet of President Hoover.

JAMES WILLIAM GOOD—Born near Cedar Rapids in 1866. Became secretary of war in the cabinet of President Herbert Hoover.

HENRY AGARD WALLACE—Son of Henry C. Wallace. Served as secretary of agriculture in the first two terms of Franklin D. Roosevelt. Elected vice president in 1940. Appointed as secretary of commerce in 1945.

HARRY L. HOPKINS—Born in Sioux City in 1890. Secretary of commerce under President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Iowans in United States Supreme Court

SAMUEL F. MILLER—Born April 5, 1816, at Richmond, Kentucky. Located at Keokuk, Iowa, in 1850. Was personally acquainted with President Lincoln who nominated him for the United States Supreme Court in 1862 where he served for 28 years.

WILEY BLOUNT RUTLEDGE, JR.—Born July 20, 1894, at Cloverport, Kentucky. Professor of law and dean of the College of Law at the University of Iowa from 1935 to 1939. Appointed Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia in 1939. Appointed Associate Judge of the United States Supreme Court and sworn into office February 16, 1943.

Iowans in Diplomatic Service

HORACE M. TOWNER—Born October 23, 1855, at Belvidere, Illinois. Located at Corning, Iowa, in 1880. Served as a representative in Congress from March 4, 1911, to April 1, 1923, when he resigned to become governor of Puerto Rico.

WILLIAM I. BUCHANAN—Born in Covington, Ohio, September 10, 1853, and moved to Sioux City, Iowa, in 1882. Envoy extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary to the Argentine Republic from 1894 to 1900. First United States minister to the Republic of Panama. Served as high commissioner to settle disputes between the United States and Venezuela and at the time of his death was agent of the United States for the future arbitration at The Hague of one of the Venezuelan questions.

JOHN H. IRWIN—Born in Ohio in 1847. Came with his father's family to Keokuk, Iowa. Appointed by President Arthur as governor of Idaho territory in 1883. In 1890 he was appointed by President Harrison as governor of the territory of Arizona. Appointed by President McKinley in 1899 as American minister to Portugal.

EDWIN H. CONGER—Born in Knox county, Illinois, March 7, 1843. In 1868 he located on a farm near Dexter, Iowa. He was appointed by President Harrison as minister to Brazil where he served four years. In 1897 he was again appointed to that position by President McKinley. Later he served in China during and after the Boxer uprising.

AUGUSTUS C. DODGE—Born January 2, 1812, in the territory of Louisiana. In 1838 he was appointed registrar of the United States land office at Burlington. Appointed by President Pierce as minister to Spain where he served until 1859.

JOHN A. KASSON—Born at Charlotte, Vermont, January 11, 1822. Moved to Des Moines in 1857. In 1863 he was elected to Congress where he served six terms. Appointed and served as minister to Austria-Hungary and Germany.

ALBERT W. SWALM—Oskaloosa. Consulship at Montevideo, Uruguay, 1897-1903; Southampton, England, 1903-1919; Hamilton, Bermuda Island, 1919-1922. Died August 24, 1922, at consular residence at Hamilton.

JOHN E. ROWEN—Clarion. U. S. consul, Port Stanley, Falkland Islands, 1897-1907; Pienta Arenas, Chile, 1907-1911. Died May 1, 1914.

JOHNSON BRIGHAM—Cedar Rapids and Des Moines. Born at Cherry Valley, New York, March 11, 1846. U. S. Consul, Aix-la-Chapelle, Germany, 1893-1894. Died in Des Moines October 8, 1936.

EUGENIE ANDERSON—Adair, May 26, 1909. Ambassador to Denmark, 1948-1953.

Iowans now in diplomatic service as ambassadors are Raymond A. Hare at Jidda; Christian Ravndal at Montevideo.

Private Colleges and Universities

In addition to its three state institutions of higher learning, Iowa has a large number of liberal arts colleges and universities which are material factors in making this state stand first in literacy and intelligence. There are few places in Iowa more than 40 to 50 miles distant from some institution of higher learning well fitted by curriculum and faculty to teach those things which lead to the higher and better life and provide the education that makes for culture and higher citizenship.

Besides the colleges giving four-year courses, Iowa provides that Junior Colleges may be created and conducted by any community that accepts the provisions as set up in the law. Thus many students take two years of advanced learning, before going on for further work in a four-year institution.

Private colleges of Iowa which are fully accredited and offer four-year liberal arts courses are the following, arranged alphabetically:

Buena Vista College, Storm Lake

Buena Vista college is located in Storm Lake. The Fort Dodge Presbytery founded the school in 1884 at Fort Dodge. The college was later moved to Storm Lake on July 8, 1891, and became the joint responsibility of both the Fort Dodge Presbytery and the Sioux City Presbytery.

Briar Cliff College, Sioux City

Briar Cliff college, a four-year college for women, is conducted by the Sisters of St. Francis of the Holy Family of Dubuque, Iowa. The college began its first scholastic year September 18, 1930.

Central College, Pella

Central college, at Pella, was opened in 1853 as a Baptist church institution. Dominie Scholte, leader of a colony of 800 from the Netherlands to Pella, donated the land for the campus. In 1916 the sponsorship of the school was transferred to the Reformed church in America, who have continued its support as a Christian, liberal arts college, open to students of all denominations.

Clarke College Dubuque

Clarke college, the first four-year liberal arts college for women west of the Mississippi, dates back to 1843. Formerly called Mount St. Joseph College, Clarke was renamed in 1929 to honor its foundress and the foundress of the community which conducts the college, the Sisters of Charity, B.V.M. Clarke's seven buildings are spread over a 50-acre campus on one of Dubuque's seven hills.

Chicago Evangelistic Institute, University Park

Chicago Evangelistic Institute at University Park, was organized in 1910, Chicago, and conducted a Bible College for forty-one years. In the summer of 1951, Chicago Evangelistic Institute moved to University Park, Iowa, campus. The college is an accredited member of the Accrediting Association of Bible Institutes and Bible Colleges, Collegiate Division. The Accrediting Association is a constituent of the American Council of Education. The college is interdenominational, coeducational and is a Bible College offering courses leading to the Bachelor of Arts Degree in Bible and the Bachelor of Music Degree.

Coe College, Cedar Rapids

Coe college was founded in 1851 by the Rev. Williston Jones, a clergyman who opened a school in his home. The original enrollment of 16 received the basic liberal arts courses—a tradition that Coe has never abandoned.

Operating fitfully as the "Cedar Rapids Collegiate Institute" and the "Parsons Seminary," the college received from Daniel Coe, a Pennsyl-

vania farmer, money needed to buy an 80 acre tract of land. Other endowments followed, and later, in 1879, the college was incorporated as Coe College.

A co-educational college, Coe maintains an informal relationship with the Presbyterian Church. Enrollment during the past few years has averaged over 750, and the college has gained the reputation of being one of the finest independent liberal arts colleges in the Midwest.

Cornell College, Mount Vernon

Cornell college, at Mount Vernon, was opened November 14, 1853, as the Iowa Conference of the Methodist Church male and female seminary, but was renamed in 1855. The Chicago Symphony orchestra has presented a concert at the annual May music festival for 52 years.

Drake University, Des Moines

Drake University, at Des Moines, was established in 1881 and named after Governor Francis Marion Drake of Centerville. The university is an independent, non-tax-supported school and includes nine colleges: liberal arts, business administration, education, fine arts, pharmacy, community, law school, Divinity school, and graduate division. The university grants nine undergraduate and seven graduate degrees. Home of the famous Drake Relays, the school has a campus of about 35 acres in northwest Des Moines.

University of Dubuque, Dubuque

The University of Dubuque now in its second century was founded in 1852 as a Theological School. It is now a fully accredited College of Liberal Arts and Theological Seminary with separate student bodies living on the same campus. First known as The German Theological School for the Northwest, it has been and is now actively affiliated with the Presbyterian Church U. S. A.

Grinnell College, Grinnell

Grinnell college, at Grinnell, is the oldest co-educational four-year college in continuous operation in the state. It was founded in 1846 by the "Iowa Band" (a group of young ministers who came to Iowa as missionaries in 1843) as Iowa college, at Davenport, and was opened to students in 1848. Grinnell college was founded in Grinnell in 1855 and four years later Iowa college of Davenport was merged with it. It is privately endowed, non-sectarian and coeducational.

Iowa Wesleyan College, Mount Pleasant

Iowa Wesleyan college, older than nearly four-fifths of the present colleges in the United States, was first organized as the Mount Pleasant Literary Institute in 1842 and reorganized the following year as the Mount Pleasant Collegiate Institute, and is the oldest college in Iowa having a continuous history from the time it was founded. The college has always been under the control of the Methodist church. The name was changed to Iowa Wesleyan university in 1849 and to Iowa Wesleyan college in 1911.

Loras College, Dubuque

Loras college, a Catholic church institution, at Dubuque, developed from St. Raphael's seminary founded in 1839. The school is under the supervision of the archbishop of the Dubuque archdiocese. The college has one of the largest private libraries in the state, over 115,000 volumes. It was formerly called Columbia college.

Luther College, Decorah

Luther college, at Decorah, founded in 1861 as a college for men, became coeducational in 1936, and amalgamating with the Decorah college for women. It is controlled by the Evangelical Lutheran church. Koren library contains a notable collection of Norwegian Americana and the Norwegian American Historical Museum, maintained by the college,

is devoted to the preservation and culture of Norwegian pioneers in America.

Marycrest College, Davenport

Marycrest college is a corporate unit of St. Ambrose college, formerly known as the women's division. Founded in 1939, it is conducted by the Sisters of the Humility of Mary.

Morningside College, Sioux City

Morningside college at Sioux City, was founded by the Methodist church, by merging the University of the Northwest of Sioux City and the Charles City college in 1894. It has ten modern buildings on a 23-acre campus.

Parsons College, Fairfield

Parsons college, at Fairfield, was founded in 1875, under the endowment fund provided in the will of Lewis C. Parsons (1793-1855). It is controlled by the Presbyterian church. The first class was graduated in 1880.

Simpson College, Indianola

Simpson college, at Indianola, named in honor of Methodist Bishop Matthew Simpson, will celebrate its centennial in 1960. A four-year, coeducational Christian Liberal Arts institution affiliated with the Methodist Church, Simpson emphasizes highly personalized education believing that, in general, education is creative and effective in proportion as it is personal. A new curriculum at Simpson called the "Vital Center" currently is being praised by educational leaders.

St. Ambrose College, Davenport

St. Ambrose college, Davenport, is a four year liberal arts college for men, founded in 1882 under the auspices of the Roman Catholic diocese of Davenport. In 1930, Marycrest college for women was established in Davenport as a corporate unit of St. Ambrose college.

Upper Iowa University, Fayette

Upper Iowa University, at Fayette, was founded in 1857 as Fayette Seminary. It was formerly sponsored by the Methodist church. Primarily a college of Liberal Arts, there are schools of Education, Music, and Business. The new museum is one of the finest to be found in schools of this size.

Wartburg College, Waverly

Wartburg college is a co-educational liberal arts college of the American Lutheran church. It offers courses leading to the degrees: Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Music and Bachelor of Science in Education. It is a member of the North Central Association of colleges and secondary schools, of the American Association of colleges for teacher education, of the National Council on social work education, and an associate member of the National Association of schools of music. Its origin dates back to 1852.

Westmar College, LeMars

Westmar college, at LeMars, was founded in 1900 by the Evangelical United Brethren church as a successor to the Northwestern Normal school founded by J. Wernli in 1887 and the Le Mars Normal school established in 1892. The campus has expanded from the original fifteen acres and one building to the present thirty-seven acres and twenty-three buildings. From 1900 through 1948 this school was known as Western Union college. In 1948 the name was changed to the present Westmar college.

William Penn College, Oskaloosa

William Penn college, at Oskaloosa, operated under the auspices of the Society of Friends, was opened in September, 1873. Following the destruction of the first building by fire in 1916, several new buildings were erected on a 30-acre campus near the original site.

The Government of Iowa

Prepared for the Iowa Official Register by the State Historical Society of Iowa.



HE government of the State of Iowa is based upon a constitution adopted by the people and upon statute laws enacted from time to time by the General Assembly. Iowa has had two state constitutions, the first approved in 1846, the second one in 1857. The present constitution has been amended a number of times.

The Electorate—All men and women who have lived in Iowa for six months and in the county in which they claim residence for sixty days are entitled to vote if they are citizens of the United States and are twenty-one years of age or over. Persons convicted of infamous crimes and those declared idiotic or insane are, however, disfranchised. The right of women to vote in Iowa is based upon the nineteenth amendment to the United States constitution.

Election Days—The regular elections for national, state, district and county officers are held on the Tuesday following the first Monday of November of the even-numbered years. Candidates, with a few exceptions, are nominated at the primary election held on the first Monday in June preceding the general election. Provision is also made for nominations by petition or convention. Political parties must use the primary for nominating candidates, except for the judiciary, but in case no candidate receives the necessary thirty-five per cent at the primary, a convention may nominate.

The Legislative Department

General Assembly—The legislative authority of the State of Iowa is vested by the constitution in a General Assembly which consists of a Senate and a House of Representatives. The terms of both senators and representatives begin on the first day of January following their election. Regular sessions are held biennially, commencing on the second Monday of January of the odd-numbered years. Special sessions of the General Assembly may be called by the proclamation of the governor.

House of Representatives—The House of Representatives consists of one hundred eight members, elected for two years. Each of the ninety-nine counties is entitled to one representative and each of the nine counties having the largest population elects an additional representative. Any person who has resided in the state for one year and has the qualifications of a voter is eligible for election as a representative. Women were admitted to the General Assembly by an amendment to the state constitution adopted in 1926. The House of Representatives elects a speaker and other officers.

Senate—The Senate consists of fifty members, elected by districts for a term of four years. A senatorial district contains from one to three counties, according to population, and elects one senator. According to the constitution, approximately one-half the senators are to be elected at each alternate biennial election, but due to changes in the districts, the terms of twenty-one senators now expire at the end of each alternate legislative biennium and those of twenty-nine in the intervening years. Senators must be twenty-five years of age and have the other qualifications required of representatives.

The Executive Department

Elective Officers—The constitution of Iowa makes provisions for a governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, auditor of state, treasurer of state and attorney general, who are elected for terms of two

years at the regular biennial elections in the even-numbered years. In addition, the General Assembly has made provision for a secretary of agriculture, elected for two years; a board of commerce commissioners of three members elected for a term of four years. A superintendent of public instruction is chosen by a State Board of Public Instruction, consisting of one member from each congressional district in Iowa and one appointed at large by the governor.

Governor—The supreme executive power of the state is vested in the governor. It is his duty to see that the laws are enforced, to supervise the official business of the state, to make recommendations to the General Assembly, and to appoint various officers and boards. He has the power to call special sessions of the Legislature and veto acts passed by the General Assembly, but a majority of two-thirds of each house may pass a bill over his veto. To qualify as governor, a person must have been a citizen of the United States and a resident of the state for at least two years and must be thirty years of age or over at the date of election.

Lieutenant Governor—The lieutenant governor succeeds the governor in case of his death, resignation or disability. His chief function is to act as president of the Senate.

Appointive Officers—In addition to the executive officers mentioned, all of whom are elected, there are a number of appointive officers, including the comptroller, the superintendent of banking, the insurance commissioner, the labor commissioner, the adjutant general, the commissioner of public health, the industrial commissioner and commissioner of public safety, all appointed by the governor, usually with the approval of the senate. The governor also appoints, with the approval of the senate, the members of a number of administrative boards, including the state board of regents, the board of control of state institutions, the state tax commission, the board of parole, the state board of conservation, the liquor control commission, the state highway commission and the unemployment compensation commission.

Executive Council—The executive council is an ex-officio board made up of the governor, secretary of state, auditor, treasurer and secretary of agriculture.

State Printing Board—The state printing board has three ex-officio members—the secretary of state, auditor and attorney general—and two members appointed by the governor. This board appoints the superintendent of printing.

The Judicial Department

The judicial department of the State of Iowa is vested by the constitution in a supreme court, districts courts and municipal and superior courts as the General Assembly shall provide.

Supreme Court—The supreme court consists of nine justices, elected for terms of six years, approximately one-third being elected at each regular biennial election. The senior in time of service is chief justice for six months until each judge has served in that capacity. The supreme court appoints a reporter of the supreme court who is also the code editor, and a clerk. Both appointments are for four years.

Attorney General—The constitution also provides for an attorney general who is elected at the regular biennial election for a term of two years. He represents the state in legal matters, gives advice to state officers, and has, in addition, administrative functions.

Judicial Districts—The State of Iowa is divided by law into twenty-one judicial districts, composed of from one to nine counties. Each district elects from two to six judges, being at present seventy-two district judges in the state. One of the district judges presides over the district

court sessions in each county. A county attorney and a clerk of the court are elected by the voters in each county.

Inferior Courts—The General Assembly has provided also for other inferior courts. Each township is authorized to elect two justices of the peace who hear cases involving minor offenses and hold preliminary hearings on more serious charges. Municipal courts, superior courts, police courts and mayors' courts are authorized in cities and towns under various restrictions. Municipal courts are optional in cities having a population of five thousand or more and superior courts in cities with four thousand or over. Both municipal and superior court judges are elected for four-year terms.

Municipal Courts—If a city of the first class has neither a municipal nor a superior court, the council shall appoint a police judge in commission governed and city manager cities and may provide for the election of a police judge in such cities under the general law. In all municipalities having none of these special courts, the mayor acts as the police judge.

Jury Trials—Jury trials are the rule for serious cases, but under certain conditions may be waived or denied. Petit juries consist of twelve persons who must be "electors," except in some courts of restricted jurisdiction where the number of jurors may be six persons.

Local Government in Iowa

County Officials—The State of Iowa is divided into ninety-nine counties, the boundaries of which may not be changed unless the change is approved by the voters of each county concerned. A board of supervisors consisting of three, five or seven members is the chief administrative agency in the county. They appoint a county engineer. In addition, an auditor, who is the clerk of the board of supervisors, a sheriff, county attorney, recorder, treasurer, coroner and clerk of the district court are elected biennially by the voters. A county superintendent of schools is chosen every three years by a county board of education. The county assessor is chosen by the board of supervisors, county board of education and the mayors of the various towns in the county, for a term of four years. They likewise fix his salary.

Local Functions—The Iowa county is a quasi-political corporation which collects municipal, school, county and state taxes, enforces state laws, has charge of poor relief and certain other welfare activities, and shares with the state highway commission the management of the roads and bridges in the county. Townships, which in earlier days were effective units of local government within the counties, have lost almost all their functions, except for the election of justices of the peace in which many townships default.

City Government—The laws of Iowa also authorize the incorporation of cities and towns. These municipalities derive their authority from the General Assembly and have only the powers specifically granted to them. Four cities and towns are governed by special charters granted before the adoption of the present constitution which forbids such acts of incorporation. Seven cities have the commission form of government; three have adopted the city manager plan by popular election; and a few others have a city manager by ordinance. Members of the commission are elected by the voters. The city manager in cities adopting that plan by a popular vote is appointed by the commission.

Municipal Classes—All other municipalities are under the general law. They are classified according to population into cities of the first class, having over 15,000 population; cities of the second class, having from 2,000 to 15,000 population; and towns having less than 2,000 population. All these municipalities have the mayor-council form of government, both the mayor and the members of the council being elected by the voters for two-year terms. A treasurer, assessor and park commissioners, and

in most cases, limited by state law. In larger cities city assessors function.

City Councils—The council is the law-making body in municipal government and it is also the chief administrative agency. The mayor presides over the council, although he is not a member, and has the power to veto acts of the council subject to a two-thirds majority vote over his veto. He supervises municipal activities and in cities and towns which do not have a municipal, superior or police court, he serves as police judge. He also appoints certain officers, including the marshal or chief of police, the city health officer, and members of the police and fire board. The city solicitor and clerk, and in some cases the engineer and members of the zoning board of adjustment are chosen by the council.

Taxation

Tax Sources—Taxation is probably the most important governmental power. The present tax system of Iowa is based largely on property, sales, income and corporation taxes, although there are taxes on inheritance, and sales or license taxes on gasoline, cigarettes, beer and chain stores.

Tax Levies—Property is assessed by the county assessors. Assessments are subject to revision by local boards and by the state tax commission. The various mill levies for state, county, school and municipal purposes are computed by the county auditor on the assessed valuation and the tax money is paid to the county treasurer who distributes it to the proper fund. Levies for county, school or municipal purposes are, in most cases, limited by state law. In larger cities, city assessors function.

Calendar of Official Dates

Filing Nomination Papers

State and National—For United States senator, representative in congress, and all elective state offices, to be filed in the office of the secretary of state not more than eighty-five nor less than sixty-five days prior to the date set for holding the primary election. (§43.11) (56 G.A.)

County—For all elective county offices, to be filed in the office of the county auditor at least fifty-five days prior to the date fixed for holding the primary election. (C., §43.11.)

Township or Precinct—For elective offices of a subdivision of a county to be filed with the county auditor fifty-five days prior to the primary. (C. '54, §43.21)

Cities and Towns—For elective offices in all cities and towns to be filed at least four weeks prior to primary election. (56 G.A.)

School—For all elective offices in each independent city, town or consolidated district, shall be filed with the secretary of the school board not earlier than thirty nor less than ten days before the election. (C, '54, §277.4)

Primary Election Dates

Municipal—The primary election in all cities and towns on the second Tuesday prior to the regular election. (54 G.A., Ch. 145.)

General—The primary election shall be held the first Monday in June in each even-numbered year. (C. '54, §43.7.)

Election Dates

Cities and Towns—Regular city and town elections shall be held biennially on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November of odd-numbered years.

School—The regular school election shall be held annually on the second Monday in March; except in cities over 125,000 population, where the election will be held biennially on the second Monday in March of odd-numbered years. (C. '54, §277.1)

General—The general election for state, district, county and township officers shall be held on the first Tuesday next after the first Monday in November of each even-numbered year. (C. '54 §39.1)

Political Convention Dates

County—Each political party shall hold its county convention on the fourth Friday following each primary election. (C. '54, §43.89.)

State—Each political party shall hold a state convention not earlier than the first nor later than the fifth Wednesday following the county convention. (C, '54, §43.107.)

Judicial—Each political party shall hold a state judicial convention not less than one or more than two weeks after their regular state convention. (C. '54, §46.1.)

District—Each political party shall hold a district judicial convention in districts where judges are to be elected not earlier than the first nor later than the fifth Thursday following the county convention, (C, '54, §46.8.)

Presidential or Special—Precinct caucuses, county conventions and state conventions of each political party are held in the years presidents are elected and usually during the months of March and April on call of the state chairman of the political parties.

Election of State Officials

Each two years in Iowa, the people elect their Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, Auditor of State, Treasurer of State, Secretary of Agriculture and Attorney General.

State Commerce Commissioners are elected for four-year terms. The Superintendent of Public Instruction is named by a state Board of Public Instruction, consisting of one member from each Congressional district and one appointed at large by the Governor.

The Justices of the Supreme Court are elected for terms of six years. District Judges are elected for terms of four years.

County and township officials are elected each two years. Members of the Senate are elected for four years; House members for two years.

Elections in Iowa occur in even-numbered years.

Election of Federal Officials

Federal elections occur each four years, on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November of even years. The next election will be in 1958. The Constitution provides that the only elected Federal officials are the President, Vice-president, U. S. Senators and U. S. Representatives. All other officers are appointive—practically all by the President. U. S. Senators serve a term of six years; House members serve terms of two years.

Tax Assessments

Section 427.13 of the 1954 Code of Iowa, states that all property, not specifically exempted by statute, is taxable.

Personal property is listed each year for taxation purposes; real estate was listed in 1957 and is to be listed in each fourth year thereafter.

In each year in which real estate is not listed, all new buildings erected since the last previous assessment must be listed and the valuation added to the valuation of the real estate on which the buildings are situated.

The statutes of Iowa require all property subject to taxation to be valued at its actual value, and to be assessed at 60 per cent of such actual value.

County Boards of Review. The boards of review shall meet on the first Monday in May, in the office of the county assessor and shall sit from day to day until their duties are completed which shall not be later than the first day of June. (Sec. 442.1)

It shall adjust assessments by raising or lowering the assessments of any person, partnership, corporation or association as to any of the items of their assessments in such manner as to secure the listing of property at taxable value.

It shall also add to the assessment rolls any taxable property not included therein, assessing the same in the name of the owner thereof.

All meetings of the board of review are public.

Taxpayers who are not satisfied with the valuation of their property as may be listed by the assessor may appear before said board of review and state their grievances. Failure of any taxpayer to appear before the board or to file a written statement setting out their grievances, the taxpayer will lose his rights of hearing or his right to appeal to the district court.

City Boards of Review meet on May 1 and may continue in session until August 1 if necessary. (Sec. 405.15)

Levies. The board of supervisors fixes the county tax levies at the September meeting. School corporations make their levies and certify them to the office of the county auditor on or before the fifteenth day of August. Cities and towns also certify their tax levies within the same time. Township trustees make, and the clerks certify, the township levies within the same time.

The state tax commission fixes the rates necessary to meet the amount required for any state levy authorized by the comptroller or treasurer.

All taxes are due and payable January 1 of each year. The first installment of taxes becomes delinquent April 1st and a penalty of three-fourths of one per cent per month attaches. The second installment of taxes becomes delinquent October 1 and a penalty of three-fourths of one per cent per month attaches.

Tax sales are held on the first Monday in December of each year. Prior to tax sales, an advertising fee of 45 cents attaches and, in case of sale, \$1.00 is added for each tax sale certificate.

Redemption. For redemption from tax sale, four per cent penalty is added to the sum paid by the purchaser at tax sale and all subsequent taxes paid by him under sale. Also six per cent interest is added from time of payment until time of redemption, together with 25 cents for redemption certificate.

Tax sales run three years before purchaser is entitled to a tax deed. Purchasers at a scavenger tax sale are entitled to a deed after one year.

Taxes a Lien on Real Estate. Taxes due from any person upon personal property are a lien upon any or all real estate owned or afterwards

acquired by such persons for a period of 10 years from December 31 of year in which levied. As against the purchaser, taxes are a lien against real estate on and after December 31 of the year in which they were assessed and levied.

Military Exemptions. The following should receive the attention of soldiers, sailors, marines and nurses who have participated in the several wars in which this country was engaged, subsequent to and including the war with Mexico, who are entitled to exemption from taxes. The exemptions are as follows:

\$3,000 assessed value of any soldier, sailor or marine of the Mexican or Civil Wars.

\$1,800 assessed value to any soldier, sailor, marine or nurse of the war with Spain, Indian wars, Chinese relief or Philippine insurrection.

\$750 assessed value to any serviceman or woman of World War I.

\$500 assessed value to any serviceman or woman of World War II.

\$500 assessed value to any serviceman or woman during the Korean war, from June 27, 1950 to July 27, 1953. Effective as to 1957 taxes.

The property, to the same extent, of the wife of any such soldier, sailor, marine or nurse, where they are living together and he has not otherwise received the benefits above provided; and the property to the same extent of the widowed mother, remaining unmarried, of any such soldier, sailor, marine or nurse where the said widowed mother is dependent upon any such soldier, sailor, marine or nurse for support and he has not otherwise received the benefits above provided; also the property to the same extent of the widow, remaining unmarried, or minor child or children of any of the persons entitled to exemption.

The above exemptions are to be made from any property and the exemption is to be allowed during the time such persons remain the owners of the property upon which exemption is granted, but must be claimed each year.

The law also requires that the person claiming any of the above exemptions must be a resident of and domiciled in the state of Iowa.

Soldiers in actual military service are permitted to retain their homestead rights even though they are not for the period of their service residents of or domiciled in Iowa.

Homestead Tax Credit Law. Every home owner in the State of Iowa, who resides upon his homestead six months out of the year, is entitled to a homestead tax credit upon his taxes.

The amount of credit to which he is entitled depends upon the value of his homestead and the millage rate of credit allowed by the Iowa state tax commission.

No home owner can receive a credit upon his taxes upon any value in excess of \$2,500 and the Iowa state tax commission cannot refund in excess of 25 mills upon such valuation. In other words, no home owner can receive in excess of \$62.50 refund.

Under this law, a home owner is:

- (1) One who holds fee simple title to the homestead.
- (2) A person occupying a homestead as a surviving spouse.
- (3) A person occupying property under contract of purchase where it can be shown that not less than ten per cent of the purchase price named in the contract has been paid and that such contract has been made a matter of record in the office of the county recorder.
- (4) A person occupying a homestead under devise or by operation of inheritance laws.
- (5) A person occupying property under deed which conveys a divided interest to other blood relatives or legally adopted children.

Under this homestead tax credit law, a dwelling house is defined as

any building which is occupied wholly or in part by the owner as a home. In rural districts it cannot exceed 40 acres and in towns and cities it cannot exceed a \$2,500 valuation.

A homestead may contain one or more contiguous lots or tracts of ground with buildings upon it, which is used in good faith as a homestead.

Home owners desiring to avail themselves of the benefits of this law must file application for such tax credit with the assessor or the county auditor each year between January first and up and including July first. This application is for taxes payable in the succeeding year.

Budgets Prepared and Submitted

Preparation—all taxing districts except townships must at least twenty days prior to August 15 of each year prepare a budget of anticipated expenditures and estimated amount to be raised by taxation by funds. Rural schools post budget estimate ten days before dates of hearing. Other taxing districts subject to the budget law publish their budgets in a newspaper.

Certification—After hearing and decision of local board, budgets are certified to the county auditor not later than August 15. (C. '54, §24.17.)

Submitted to State Comptroller—As soon as taxes are certified by each local board and have been computed by the county auditor he shall forward a copy of each budget, together with a summary of all budgets, to the state comptroller.

County Budget—On or before December 31 of each year, each county is required to appropriate in detail anticipated expenditures for every office or department for each and every purpose for which expenditures are authorized or demanded. The budget in detail must be completed and adopted by January 31 of the year to which it applies. This procedure is appropriating in detail the budget certified in August by funds.

State—On or before September first, next prior to each biennial legislative session, all departments and establishments of the government shall transmit to the state comptroller estimates of their expenditure requirements for each fiscal year of ensuing biennium.

The comptroller shall prepare and file in his office, on or before the first day of December of each even-numbered year, a state budget report.

Not later than February 1 of the year of each biennial legislative session, the governor shall transmit to the legislature a document to be known as a budget, setting forth his financial program for each of the fiscal years of the ensuing biennium.

Sec. 16 of the Iowa constitution, amended the election laws, and the election on Nov. 4, 1904, changed the state election to conform with the national election date. Certain officials, therefore, were granted an additional year to their term. Thereafter governors assumed office in uneven years.

LEGISLATIVE OFFICERS FOR THE TERRITORY OF IOWA

Before Iowa was admitted as a state in 1846, the Senate of the territory was called the Legislative Council. The presiding officer was known as the President of the Council. Iowa's constitution, approved by a vote of the people in 1857, created the office of Lieutenant Governor and named him as the ex officio President of the Senate.

The 1838, 1839 and 1840 sessions were held at the territorial capital at Burlington. The 1841 through 1845 sessions were held at Iowa City. In 1855 the 5th General Assembly voted to change the location of the capital to Des Moines.

Stevenson of Illinois and Estes Kefauver of Tennessee, were the Democratic candidates. Eisenhower received 457 electoral votes and Stevenson 74.

Meeting at the governor's office Monday, December 17, 1956, the following Presidential Electors cast the state's vote for Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Electors at large—Mrs. Daisy B. Long, Union; Phil R. Wilkinson, Winterset; District Electors—First, Ben Galer, Mt. Pleasant; Second, Abraham Pilicer, Cedar Rapids; Third, Carl Bluedorn, Waterloo; Fourth, Mrs. Anita Seitsinger, Oskaloosa; Fifth, Roy Tallman, Perry; Sixth, Angus Cotton, Lone Rock; Seventh, Rita Van Dercreek, Council Bluffs, elected, but Mrs. J. A. Lueth served; Eighth, Harvey Hindt, Rock Rapids.

Besides the honor, electors received \$5 each and 5 cents per mile for travel to and from the state house.

Data on Senatorial Successions

James Harlan resigned to accept the cabinet portfolio of Secretary of Interior in Lincoln's cabinet. Samuel Kirkwood was elected to fill vacancy.

James W. Grimes resigned. James W. Howell elected to fill vacancy. Wm. B. Allison elected for the balance of the unexpired term.

Samuel Kirkwood resigned in 1881 to accept the cabinet portfolio of Secretary of the Interior. James W. McDill named by the governor to fill the vacancy.

Senator William B. Allison died August 4, 1908 and Albert B. Cum-

mins was selected at the special session of the 32nd G. A. on November 24, 1908, to fill the balance of Senator Allison's term. Senator Cummins was also elected by the 33rd G. A. for the term beginning March 4, 1909.

John H. Gear died July 14, 1900. Jonathan P. Dolliver was appointed August 22, 1900, to fill the vacancy. He was also elected by the 29th G. A., January 9, 1902, to fill out the balance of the term ending March 4, 1907, and was elected for another full term.

Senator Dolliver died October 15, 1910. Lafayette Young was appointed November 12, 1910, to fill the vacancy. The 34th G. A. on April 12, 1911, elected William S. Kenyon to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Senator Dolliver. He resigned February 24, 1922, to accept an appointment as Judge of the Federal Circuit Court. Charles A. Rawson was appointed February 25, 1922, to fill vacancy of Senator Kenyon and served until November 7, 1922.

Smith W. Brookhart was elected November 7, 1922, for the unexpired term of Senator Kenyon and served until 1925.

Brookhart-Steck contest. In the election Nov. 4, 1924, the vote showed that Brookhart had 447,594 and Steck 446,840 votes. The election was contested. On April 2, 1926, the U. S. Senate voted 16 Republicans, 29 Democrats to unseat; 31 Republicans, 9 Democrats and 1 Farmer-Labor voted against unseating. Brookhart was elected in 1926 over Claude Porter.

Albert B. Cummins died July 21, 1926. David W. Stewart was appointed to fill the vacancy until election, November 2, 1926. Senator Stewart was elected to fill the unexpired term.

On the death of Louis Murphy in 1936, Guy Gillette was elected for the short term over Berry Halden. The term expired January 3, 1939.

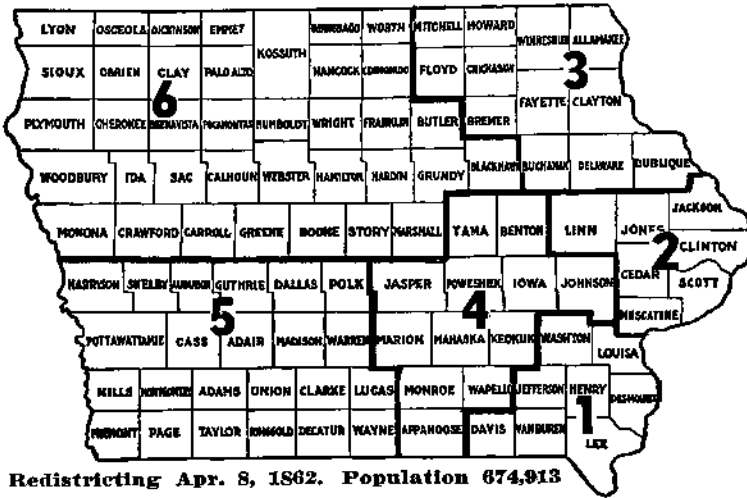
Districting Feb. 22, 1847. Population 102,388.



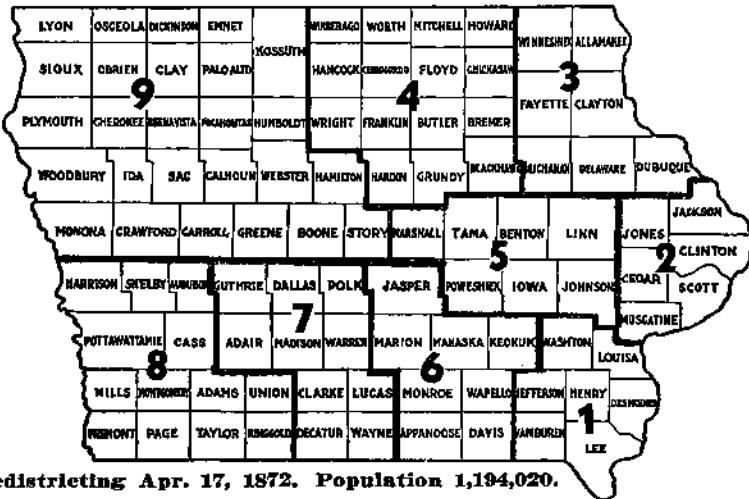
Redistricting Jan. 24, 1848. Population 102,914.



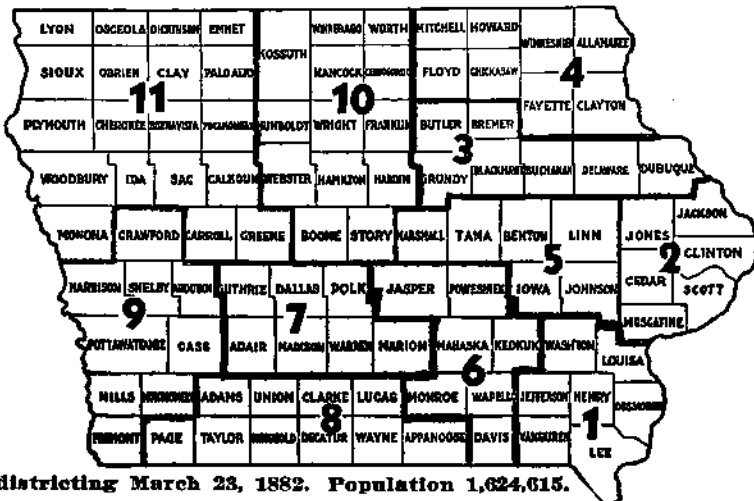
Redistricting Jan. 28, 1857. Population 674,913.



Redistricting Apr. 8, 1862. Population 674,913

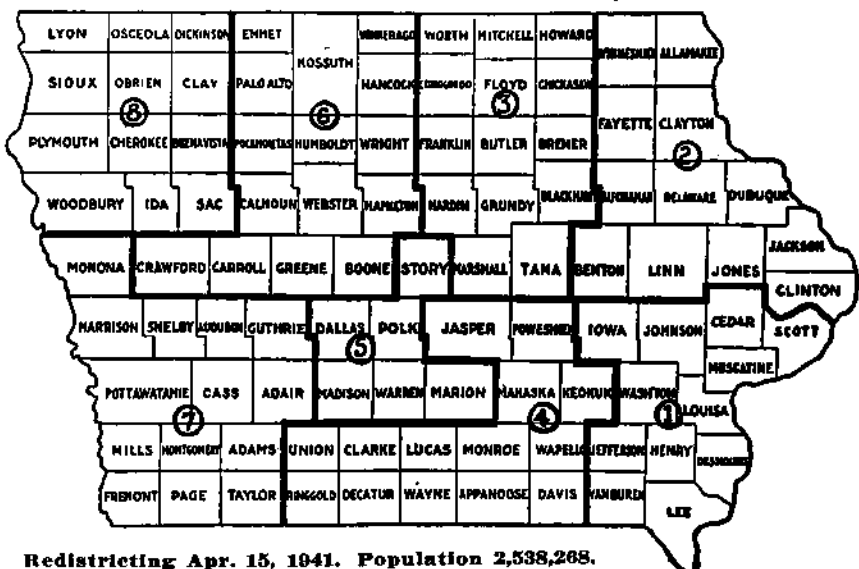
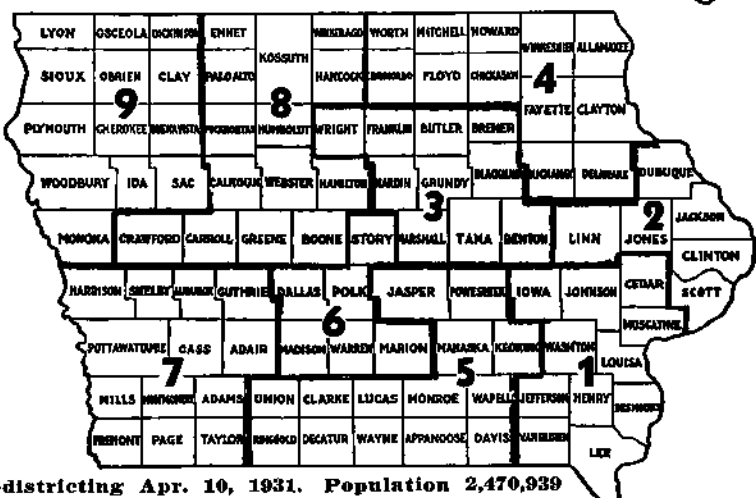
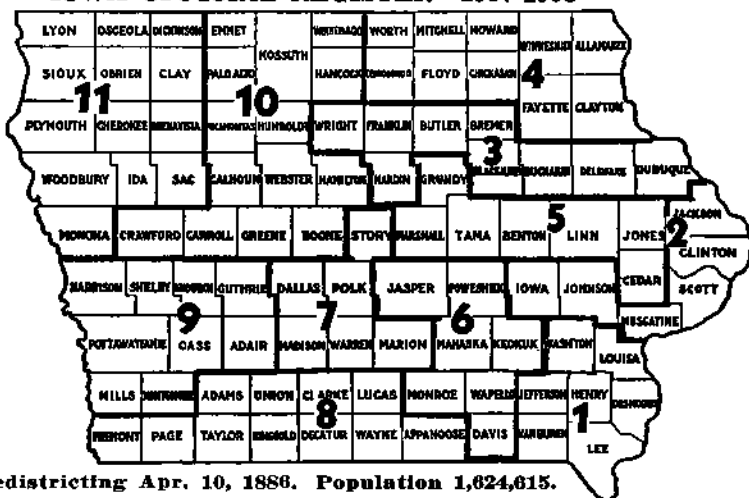


Redistricting Apr. 17, 1872. Population 1,194,020.

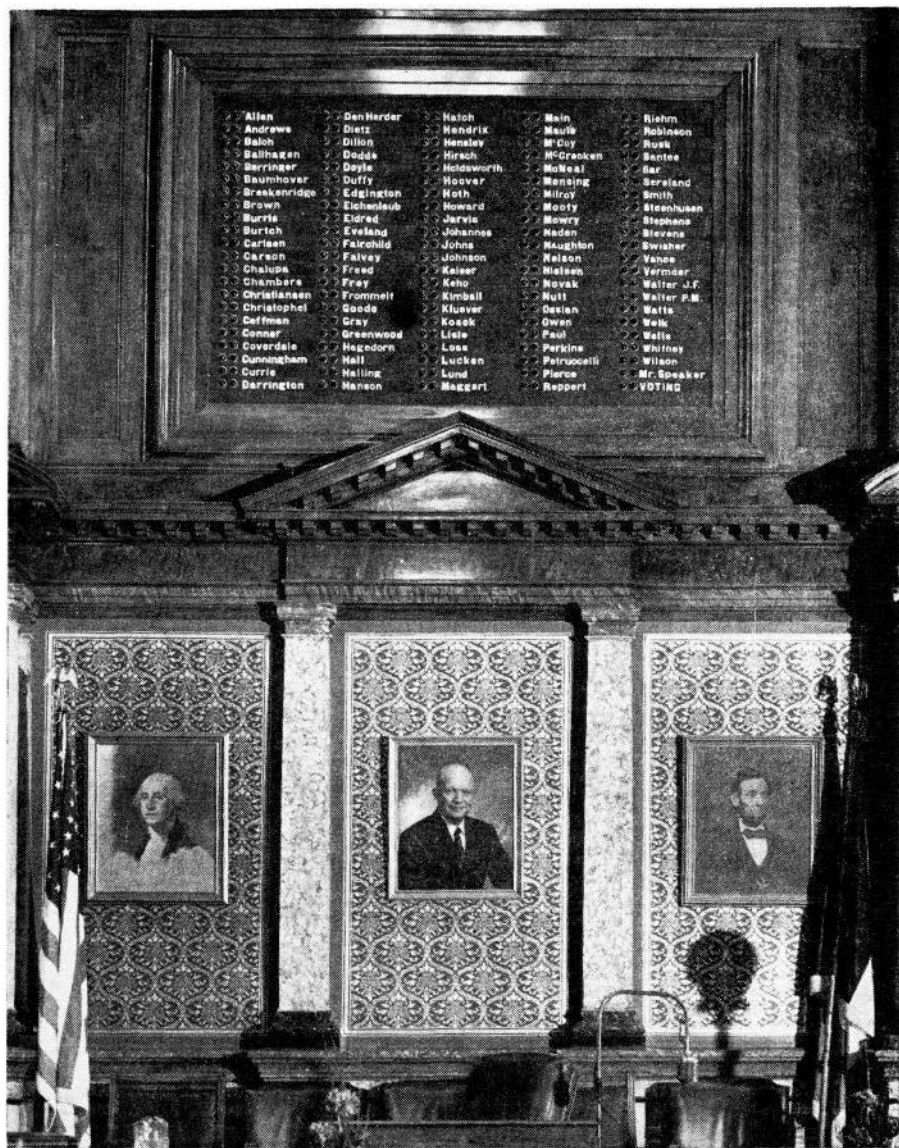

The Great Seal of the United States, adopted by Congress June 20, 1782, carries on its obverse side the Coat of Arms of the United States. The stripes on the shield represent the states; the blue above represents Congress. In its talons the eagle grasps an olive branch and a cluster of arrows—the Congressional power to make peace or war. The constellation of thirteen stars above denotes a new Nation in the world.

The reverse of the seal shows a pyramid, to signify "strength and duration," while the eye over it and the motto, "Annuit Coeptis" (He has favored our beginning), allude to "the many signal interpositions of Providence in favor of the American cause." The Roman numerals give the year of Independence; the motto, "Novus Ordo Seclorum" (a new order of the ages), signifies the beginning of the new American era.

The national motto, "E Pluribus Unum," was first suggested on August 10, 1776, by a Congressional Committee, consisting of Benjamin Franklin, John Adams and Thomas Jefferson.

If you are curious to see these seals and shield, look at a one dollar bill.

Old Glory

On June 14, 1777, the Second Continental Congress adopted a resolution that brought into being the U. S. Flag: "Resolved, That the Flag of the United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field representing a new constellation."

The action of the Continental Congress came almost a year after the Declaration of Independence. The flag with thirteen stripes and thirteen stars continued to be used as the national emblem until Congress passed the following act, which President Washington signed:

"That from and after May 1, 1795, the flag of the United States be fifteen stripes, alternate red and white; and that the union be fifteen stars, white in a blue field."

This action was necessitated by the admission of the States of Vermont and Kentucky to the Union. The flag of 1795 had the stars arranged in three rows of five each instead of in a circle, and served for 23 years.

With the admission of more new states, however, it became apparent that the 1795 flag would have to be further modified; hence in 1818 a law was passed by Congress providing:

"That from and after the fourth day of July next, the flag of the United States be thirteen horizontal stripes, alternate red and white; that the union have twenty stars, white in a blue field.

"That on the admission of every new state into the Union, one star be added to the union of the flag; and that such addition shall take effect on the Fourth of July next succeeding such admission."

Iowa was admitted to the union as the 29th state. When Arizona was admitted in 1912, it added the 48th star to the flag.

The Flag Speaks!

Former Secretary of Interior Franklin K. Lane apostrophized the U. S. flag in this way:

"I am what you make me—nothing more. I am your belief in yourself; the dream of what a people may become. I am all you hope to be and have courage to die for.

"I swing before your eyes, a bright gleam of color, the pictured suggestion of that big thing which makes this nation great.

"My stars and my stripes are your dreams and your labors. They are bright with cheer, brilliant with courage, firm with faith, because you have made them so out of your hearts.

"For you are the makers of the Flag, and it is well that you glory in the making."

When the flag is draped down, the blue field always must be at the left. * * * The flag never must be used as a drape, nor as background for some ornament. * * * The correct shield does not have any stars—just a plain blue field at the top, and seven white and six red stripes. * * * When the National Anthem has been played, do not applaud. It would be just as correct to applaud a minister's prayer.—National Flag Code Committee.

The American's Creed

I believe in the United States of America as a government of the people, by the people, for the people; whose just powers are derived from the consent of the governed; a Democracy in a Republic; a sovereign Nation of many sovereign States; a perfect Union, one and inseparable; established upon those principles of freedom, equality, justice, and humanity for which American patriots sacrificed their lives and fortunes.

I therefore believe it is my duty to my Country to love it; to support its Constitution; to obey its laws; to respect its Flag; and to defend it against all enemies.

(The above creed was written by William Tyler Page, Clerk of the U. S. House of Representatives, in 1917. It was accepted by the House of Representatives on behalf of the American people, April 8, 1918.)

Lincoln's Gettysburg Address

Four score and seven years ago our fathers brought forth, upon this continent, a new nation, conceived in Liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal.

Now we are engaged in a great civil war, testing whether that nation, or any nation, so conceived, and so dedicated, can long endure. We are met here on a great battle-field of that war. We ~~and~~ ^{have} come ~~and~~ to dedicate a portion of it as ^a final resting place ^{for} of those who here gave their lives that that nation might live. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this.

But in a larger sense we can not dedicate—we can not consecrate—we can not hallow this ground. The brave men, living and dead, who struggled here, have consecrated it far above our ^{poor} power to add or detract. The world will little note, nor long remember, what we say here, but can never forget what they did here. It is for us, the living, rather to be dedicated here to the unfinished ^{WORK}, which they have, thus far, so nobly carried on. It is rather

for us to be here dedicated to the great
 tasks remaining before ^{us}— that from their
 honored dead we take increased devotion
 to ^{that} the cause for which they here gave ~~you~~
 the last full measure of devotion— that
 we here highly resolve that these dead
 shall not have died in vain; that this
 nation shall have a new birth of freedom,
 and that this government of the people, by
 the people, for the people, shall not perish
 from the earth.

These two pages are facsimiles of the manuscript of the address delivered by President Abraham Lincoln at the Gettysburg Cemetery grounds on November 19, 1863. After the President had delivered his short address, he turned to Marshall Lamon, who had presented him less than five minutes before, and said, "Lamon, that speech won't scour. It is a flat failure."

There are five known copies in President Lincoln's handwriting of the Gettysburg address. The original and second drafts were given by the President to his secretary, John Hay. On April 11, 1916, they were presented to the Government by Colonel Hay's three children.

That Lincoln wrote the address on a rough bit of paper on the way to Gettysburg is an exploded but persistent legend. Actually, the first sheet of the first draft was written in Washington, on Executive Mansion stationery. The corrections and the second page were written in lead pencil, probably at Judge Wills' house in Gettysburg, the night of the 18th.

The second draft, believed to be the reading copy at the dedication ceremony, is assumed to have been written on the 19th, between breakfast and the start to the cemetery. There are changes from the first version, slight matters of punctuation, or of a single word—a "that nation" and a "this nation" for "the nation", "consecrated" for "hallowed," "but" for "while," and the like. Lincoln's eye evidently strayed in copying, for "We have come" of the first version was changed to "We are met," then crossed out and the original form restored above it. The first important change is "those who here gave their lives" instead of "those who died here." The sentence, "This we may, in all propriety do," became "It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this." The entire beginning of the first draft's third paragraph is rephrased. Instead of "It is rather for us, the living, we here be dedicated to the great task remaining before us" ["we here be dedicated" had been corrected in pencil above the scratched-out "to stand here"] Lincoln added a parallel sentence: "It is for us, the living, rather to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they have, thus far, so nobly carried on. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us—".—Cuts and data from Library of Congress.

CONSTITUTION OF THE *State of Iowa*

WE, THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF IOWA grateful to the Supreme Being for the blessings hitherto enjoyed, and feeling our dependence on Him for a continuation of those blessings, do ordain, and establish a free and independent government, by the name of the *State of Iowa*, the boundaries whereof shall be as follows:

Beginning in the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi River, at a point due East, of the middle of the mouth of the main channel of the Des Moines River, thence up the middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines River, to a point on said river where the Northern boundary line of the State of Missouri—as established by the constitution of that State—adopted June 12th. 1820—crosses the said middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines River, thence Westward by along the said Northern boundary line of the State of Missouri, as established at the time aforesaid, until an extension of said line intersects the middle of the main channel of the Missouri River, thence up the middle of the main channel of the said Missouri River to a point opposite the middle of the main channel of the Big Sioux River, according to Nicoll's Map; thence up the main channel of the said Big Sioux River, according to the said map, until it is intersected by the parallel of forty three degrees and thirty minutes North Latitude; thence East along said parallel of forty three degrees and thirty minutes until said parallel intersects the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi River, thence down the middle of the main channel of said Mississippi River to the place of beginning.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF IOWA

INTRODUCTION

Iowa was organized as a separate Territory by an act of Congress approved on June 12, 1838, but it was not until 1844 that steps were taken to secure admission into the Union. A constitutional convention met at Iowa City in October, 1844. The Constitution drafted by this convention was twice submitted to the voters of the Territory of Iowa and twice rejected by them, largely because of dissatisfaction with the boundaries of the proposed State.

A second constitutional convention met at Iowa City in May, 1846. The Constitution drafted by this convention was ratified by a majority of 456 votes at an election held on August 3, 1846, and Iowa was admitted as a State on December 23, 1846.

The Constitution of 1846, however, contained a number of provisions which were found to be unsatisfactory in practice. One of these was the prohibition of banking institutions. As a result of this dissatisfaction, the legislature in 1855 provided for an election on the question of calling a convention to revise or amend the Constitution of 1846. The vote was 32,390 for a convention and 14,162 against a convention. Delegates were elected on November 4, 1856, and the convention met at Iowa City on January 19, 1857.

The delegates drafted a new constitution which was submitted to the people at an election held on August 3, 1857, and ratified by a vote of 40,311 to 33,681. This Constitution went into effect by proclamation of the governor on September 3, 1857.

The Constitution of 1857 has, since that time, remained the fundamental law of the State of Iowa; but it has been amended a number of times.

THE CONSTITUTION¹

WE, THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF IOWA, grateful to the Supreme Being for the blessings hitherto enjoyed, and feeling our dependence on Him for a continuation of those blessings, do ordain and establish a free and independent government by the name of the STATE OF IOWA, the boundaries whereof shall be as follows:

Beginning in the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi River, at a point due East of the middle of the mouth of the main channel of the Des Moines River, thence up the middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines River, to a point on said river where the Northern boundary line of the State of Missouri—as established by the Constitution of that State—adopted June 12th, 1820—crosses the said middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines River; thence Westwardly along the said Northern boundary line of the State of Missouri, as established at the time aforesaid, until an extension of said line intersects the middle of the main channel of the Missouri River; thence up the middle of the main channel of the said Missouri River to a point opposite the middle of the main channel of the Big Sioux River, according to Nicollet's Map; thence up the main channel of the said Big Sioux River, according to the said map, until it is intersected by the parallel of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes North latitude; thence East along said parallel of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes until said parallel intersects the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi River; thence down the middle of the main channel of said Mississippi River to the place of beginning.

ARTICLE I. BILL OF RIGHTS

SECTION 1. All men are, by nature, free and equal, and have certain inalienable rights—among which are those of enjoying and defending life and liberty, acquiring, possessing and protecting property, and pursuing and obtaining safety and happiness.

SEC. 2. All political power is inherent in the people. Government is instituted for the protection, security, and benefit of the people, and they have the right, at all times, to alter or reform the same, whenever the public good may require it.

SEC. 3. The General Assembly shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; nor shall any person be compelled to attend any place of worship, pay tithes, taxes, or other rates for

building or repairing places of worship or the maintenance of any minister, or ministry.

SEC. 4. No religious test shall be required as a qualification for any office, or public trust, and no person shall be deprived of any of his rights, privileges, or capacities, or disqualified from the performance of any of his public or private duties, or rendered incompetent to give evidence in any court of law or equity, in consequence of his opinions on the subject of religion; and any party to any judicial proceedings shall have the right to use as a witness, or take the testimony of, any other person not disqualified on account of interest, who may be cognizant of any fact material to the case; and parties to suits may be witnesses, as provided by law.

SEC. 5. Any citizen of this State who may hereafter be engaged, either directly, or indirectly, in a duel, either as principal, or accessory before the fact, shall forever be disqualified from holding any office under the Constitution and laws of this State.

SEC. 6. All laws of a general nature shall have a uniform operation; the General Assembly shall not grant to any citizen, or class of citizens, privileges or immunities, which, upon the same terms shall not equally belong to all citizens.

SEC. 7. Every person may speak, write, and publish his sentiments on all subjects, being responsible for the abuse of that right. No law shall be passed to restrain or abridge the liberty of speech, or of the press. In all prosecutions or indictments for libel, the truth may be given in evidence to the jury, and if it appears to the jury that the matter charged as libelous was true, and was published with good motives and for justifiable ends, the party shall be acquitted.

SEC. 8. The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects, against unreasonable seizures and searches shall not be violated; and no warrant shall issue but on probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons and things to be seized.

SEC. 9. The right of trial by jury shall remain inviolate; but the General Assembly may authorize trial by a jury of a less number than twelve men in inferior courts; but no person shall be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law.

SEC. 10. In all criminal prosecutions, and in cases involving the life, or liberty of an individual the accused shall have a right to a speedy and public trial by an impartial jury; to be informed of the accusation against him, to have a copy of the same when demanded; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for his witnesses; and, to have the assistance of counsel.

SEC. 11. All offenses less than felony and in which the punishment does not exceed a fine of one hundred dollars, or imprisonment for thirty days, shall be tried summarily before a Justice of the Peace, or other officer authorized by law, on information under oath, without indictment, or the intervention of a grand jury, saving to the defendant the right of appeal; and no person shall be held to answer for any higher criminal offense, unless on presentation or indictment by a grand jury², except in cases arising in the army, or navy, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war or public danger.

SEC. 12. No person shall after acquittal, be tried for the same offence. All persons shall, before conviction, be bailable, by sufficient sureties, except for capital offences where the proof is evident, or the presumption great.

SEC. 13. The writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended, or refused when application is made as required by law, unless in case of rebellion or invasion, the public safety may require it.

SEC. 14. The military shall be subordinate to the civil power. No standing army shall be kept up by the State in time of peace; and in time of war, no appropriation for a standing army shall be for a longer time than two years.

SEC. 15. No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war except in the manner prescribed by law.

SEC. 16. Treason against the State shall consist only in levying war against it, adhering to its enemies, or giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason, unless on the evidence of two witnesses to the same overt act, or confession in open Court.

SEC. 17. Excessive bail shall not be required; excessive fines shall not be imposed, and cruel and unusual punishment shall not be inflicted.

SEC. 18. Private property shall not be taken for public use without just compensation first being made, or secured to be made to the owner thereof, as soon as the damages shall be assessed by a jury, who shall not take into consideration any advantages that may result to said owner on account of the improvement for which it is taken.

[The General Assembly, however, may pass laws permitting the owners of lands to construct drains, ditches, and levees for agricultural, sanitary or mining purposes across the lands of others, and provide for the organization of drainage districts, vest the proper authorities with power to construct and maintain levees, drains and ditches and to keep in repair all drains, ditches, and levees heretofore constructed under the laws of the State, by special assessments upon the property benefitted thereby. The General Assembly may provide by law for the condemnation of such real estate as shall be necessary for the construction and maintenance of such drains, ditches and levees, and prescribe the method of making such condemnation.]³

SEC. 19. No person shall be imprisoned for debt in any civil action, on mesne or final process, unless in case of fraud; and no person shall be imprisoned for a militia fine in time of peace.

SEC. 20. The people have the right freely to assemble together to counsel for the common good; to make known their opinions to their representatives and to petition for a redress of grievances.

SEC. 21. No bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts, shall ever be passed.

SEC. 22. Foreigners who are, or may hereafter become residents of this State, shall enjoy the same rights in respect to the possession, enjoyment and descent of property as native born citizens.

SEC. 23. There shall be no slavery in this State; nor shall there be involuntary servitude, unless for the punishment of a crime.

SEC. 24. No lease or grant of agricultural lands, reserving any rent, or service of any kind, shall be valid for a longer period than twenty years.

SEC. 25. This enumeration of rights shall not be construed to impair or deny others, retained by the people.

[SECTION 26. No person shall manufacture for sale, or sell, or keep for sale, as a beverage any intoxicating liquors whatever, including ale, wine and beer. The General Assembly shall by law prescribe regulations for the enforcement of the prohibition herein contained, and shall thereby provide suitable penalties for the violation of the provisions thereof.]⁴

ARTICLE II.

RIGHT OF SUFFRAGE

SECTION 1. Every white⁵ male⁶ citizen of the United States, of the age of twenty-one years, who shall have been a resident of this State six months next preceding the election, and of the County in which he claims his vote sixty days, shall be entitled to vote at all elections which are now or hereafter may be authorized by law.

SEC. 2. Electors shall, in all cases except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest on the days of election, during their attendance at such election, going to and returning therefrom.

SEC. 3. No elector shall be obliged to perform military duty on the day of election, except in time of war, or public danger.

SEC. 4. No person in the military, naval, or marine service of the United States shall be considered a resident of this State by being stationed in any garrison, barracks, or military or naval place, or station within this State.

SEC. 5. No idiot, or insane person, or persons convicted of any infamous crime, shall be entitled to the privilege of an elector.

SEC. 6. All elections by the people shall be by ballot.

[The general election for state, district, county and township officers shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November.]⁷

[SEC. 7. The general election for state, district, county and township officers in the year 1916 shall be held in the same month and on the same day as that fixed by the laws of the United States for the election of presidential electors, or of president and vice-president of the United States; and thereafter such election shall be held at such time as the General Assembly may by law provide.]⁸

ARTICLE III.

OF THE DISTRIBUTION OF POWERS

SECTION 1. The powers of the government of Iowa shall be divided into three separate departments—the Legislative, the Executive, and the Judicial; and no person charged with the exercise of powers properly belonging to one of these departments shall exercise any function appertaining to either of the others, except in cases hereinafter expressly directed or permitted.

LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT

SECTION 1. The Legislative authority of this State shall be vested in a General Assembly which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives; and the style of every law shall be, "Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa."

SEC. 2. The sessions of the General Assembly shall be biennial, and shall commence on the second Monday in January next ensuing the election of its members; unless the Governor of the State shall, in the meantime, convene the General Assembly by proclamation.

SEC. 3. The members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen every second year, by the qualified electors of their respective districts, on the second Tuesday in October, except the years of the Presidential election, when the election shall be on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November,⁹ and their term of office shall commence on the first day of January next after their election, and continue two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

SEC. 4. No person shall be a member of the House of Representatives who shall not have attained the age of twenty-one years, be a *free white*¹⁰ male¹¹ citizen of the United States and shall have been an inhabitant of this State one year next preceding his election, and at the time of his election shall have had an actual residence of sixty days in the County, or District he may have been chosen to represent.

SEC. 5. Senators shall be chosen for the term of four years, at the same time and place as Representatives; they shall be twenty-five years of age, and possess the qualifications of Representatives as to residence and citizenship.

SEC. 6. The number of Senators shall not be less than one third, nor more than one half the representative body; and shall be so classified by lot, that one class, being as nearly one half as possible, shall be elected every two years. When the number of Senators is increased, they shall be annexed by lot to one or the other of the two classes, so as to keep them as nearly equal in numbers as practicable.

SEC. 7. Each house shall choose its own officers, and judge of the qualification, election, and return of its own members. A contested election shall be determined in such manner as shall be directed by law.

SEC. 8. A majority of each house shall constitute a quorum to transact business; but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and may compel the attendance of absent members in such manner and under such penalties as each house may provide.

SEC. 9. Each house shall sit upon its own adjournments, keep a journal of its proceedings, and publish the same; determine its rules and proceedings, punish members for disorderly behavior, and, with the consent of two thirds, expel a member, but not a second time for the same offense; and shall have all other powers necessary for a branch of the General Assembly of a free and independent State.

SEC. 10. Every member of the General Assembly shall have the liberty to dissent from, or protest against any act or resolution which he may think injurious to the public, or an individual, and have the reasons for his dissent entered on the journals; and the yeas and nays of the members of either house, on any question, shall, at the desire of any two members present, be entered on the journals.

SEC. 11. Senators and Representatives, in all cases, except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, shall be privileged from arrest during the session of the General Assembly, and in going to and returning from the same.

SEC. 12. When vacancies occur in either house, the Governor, or the person exercising the functions of Governor, shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies.

SEC. 13. The doors of each house shall be open, except on such occasion, as in the opinion of the house, may require secrecy.

SEC. 14. Neither house shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which they may be sitting.

SEC. 15. Bills may originate in either house, and may be amended, altered, or rejected by the other; and every bill having passed both houses, shall be signed by the Speaker and President of their respective houses.

SEC. 16. Every bill which shall have passed the General Assembly, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the Governor. If he approve, he shall sign it; but, if not, he shall return it with his objections, to the house in which it originated, which shall enter the same upon their journal, and proceed to reconsider it; if, after such reconsideration, it again pass both houses, by yeas and nays, by a majority of two thirds of the members of each house, it shall become a law, notwithstanding the Governor's objections. If any bill shall not be returned within three days after it shall have been presented to him, Sunday excepted, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the General Assembly, by adjournment, prevent such return. Any bill submitted to the Governor for his approval during the last three days of a session of the General Assembly, shall be deposited by him in the office of the Secretary of State, within thirty days after the adjournment, with his approval, if approved by him, and with his objections, if he disapproves thereof.

SEC. 17. No bill shall be passed unless by the assent of a majority of all the members elected to each branch of the General Assembly, and the question upon the final passage shall be taken immediately upon its last reading, and the yeas and nays entered on the journal.

SEC. 18. An accurate statement of the receipts and expenditures of the public money shall be attached to and published with the laws, at every regular session of the General Assembly.

SEC. 19. The House of Representatives shall have the sole power of impeachment, and all impeachments shall be tried by the Senate. When sitting for that purpose, the senators shall be upon oath or affirmation; and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two thirds of the members present.

SEC. 20. The Governor, Judges of the Supreme and District Courts, and other State officers, shall be liable to impeachment for any misdemeanor or malfeasance in office; but judgment in such cases shall extend only to removal from office, and disqualification to hold any office of honor, trust, or profit, under this State; but the party convicted or acquitted shall nevertheless be liable to indictment, trial, and punishment, according to law. All other civil officers shall be tried for misdemeanors and malfeasance in office, in such manner as the General Assembly may provide.

SEC. 21. No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he shall have been elected, be appointed to any civil office of profit under this State, which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which shall have been increased during such term, except such offices as may be filled by elections by the people.

SEC. 22. No person holding any lucrative office under the United States, or this State, or any other power, shall be eligible to hold a seat in the General Assembly; but offices in the militia, to which there is attached no annual salary, or the office of justice of the peace, or postmaster whose compensation does not exceed one hundred dollars per annum, or notary public, shall not be deemed lucrative.

SEC. 23. No person who may hereafter be a collector or holder of public monies, shall have a seat in either House of the General Assembly, or be eligible to hold any office of trust or profit in this State, until he shall have accounted for and paid into the treasury all sums for which he may be liable.

SEC. 24. No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in consequence of appropriations made by law.

SEC. 25. Each member of the first General Assembly under this Constitution, shall receive three dollars per diem while in session; and the further sum of three dollars for every twenty miles traveled, in going to and returning from the place where such session is held, by the nearest traveled route; after which they shall receive such compensation as shall be fixed by law; but no General Assembly shall have power to increase the compensation of its own members. And when convened in extra session they shall receive the same mileage and per diem compensation, as fixed by law for the regular session, and none other.

SEC. 26. No law of the General Assembly, passed at a regular session, of a public nature, shall take effect until the fourth day of July next after the passage thereof. Laws passed at a special session, shall take effect ninety days after the adjournment of the General Assembly by which they were passed. If the General Assembly shall deem any law of immediate importance, they may provide that the same shall take effect by publication in newspapers in the State.

SEC. 27. No divorce shall be granted by the General Assembly.

SEC. 28. No lottery shall be authorized by this State; nor shall the sale of lottery tickets be allowed.

SEC. 29. Every act shall embrace but one subject, and matters properly connected therewith; which subject shall be expressed in the title. But if any subject shall be embraced in an act which shall not be expressed in the title, such act shall be void only as to so much thereof as shall not be expressed in the title.

SEC. 30. The General Assembly shall not pass local or special laws in the following cases:

For the assessment and collection of taxes for State, County or road purposes;
 For laying out, opening, and working roads or highways;
 For changing the names of persons;
 For the incorporation of cities and towns;
 For vacating roads, town plats, streets, alleys, or public squares;
 For locating or changing county seats.

In all the cases above enumerated, and in all other cases where a general law can be made applicable, all laws shall be general, and of uniform operation throughout the State; and no law changing the boundary lines of any county shall have effect until upon being submitted to the people of the counties affected by the change, at a general election, it shall be approved by a majority of the votes in each county, cast for and against it.

SEC. 31. No extra compensation shall be made to any officer, public agent, or contractor, after the service shall have been rendered, or the contract entered into; nor, shall any money be paid on any claim, the subject matter of which shall not have been provided for by pre-existing laws, and no public money or property shall be appropriated for local, or private purposes, unless such appropriation, compensation, or claim, be allowed by two-thirds of the members elected to each branch of the General Assembly.

SEC. 32. Members of the General Assembly shall, before they enter upon the duties of their respective offices, take and subscribe the following oath or affirmation: "I do solemnly swear, or affirm, (as the case may be) that I will support the Constitution of the United States, and the Constitution of the State of Iowa, and that I will faithfully discharge the duties of Senator, (or Representative, as the case may be), according to the best of my ability." And members of the General Assembly are hereby empowered to administer to each other the said oath or affirmation.

SEC. 33. *The General Assembly shall, in the years One thousand eight hundred and fifty nine, One thousand eight hundred and sixty three, One thousand eight hundred and sixty five, One thousand eight hundred and sixty seven, One thousand eight hundred and sixty nine, and One thousand eight hundred and seventy five, and every ten years thereafter, cause an enumeration to be made of all white¹² inhabitants of the State.¹³*

SEC. 34. *The number of senators shall, at the next session following each period of making such enumeration, and the next session following each United States census, be fixed by law, and apportioned among the several counties, according to the number of white¹⁴ inhabitants in each.*

[SECTION 34. The Senate shall be composed of fifty members to be elected from the several senatorial districts, established by law and at the next session of the General Assembly held following the taking of the state and national census, they shall be apportioned among the several counties or districts of the state, according to population as shown by the last preceding census, (but no county shall be entitled to more than (1) Senator.)¹⁵

SEC. 35. *The Senate shall not consist of more than fifty members, nor the House of Representatives of more than one hundred; and they shall be apportioned among the several counties and representative districts of the State, according to the number of white¹⁵ inhabitants in each, upon ratios to be fixed by law; but no representative district shall contain more than four organized counties, and each district shall be entitled to at least one representative. Every county and district which shall have a number of inhabitants equal to one-half of the ratio fixed by law, shall be entitled to one representative and any one county containing in addition to the ratio fixed by law one-half of that number or more, shall be entitled to one additional representative. No floating district shall hereafter be formed.*

[SEC. 35. The House of Representatives shall consist of not more than one hundred and eight members. The ratio of representatives shall be determined by dividing the whole number of the population of the state as shown by the last preceding state or national census, by the whole number of counties then existing or organized, but each county shall constitute one representative district and be

entitled to one representative, but each county having a population in excess of the ratio number, as herein provided of three fifths or more of such ratio number shall be entitled to one additional representative, but said addition shall extend only to the nine counties having the greatest population.]

SEC. 36. *At its first session under this Constitution, and at every subsequent regular session, the General Assembly shall fix the ratio of representation, and also form into representative districts those counties which will not be entitled singly to a representative.*¹⁷

[SEC. 36. The General Assembly shall, at the first regular session held following the adoption of this amendment, and at each succeeding regular session held next after the taking of such census, fix the ratio of representation, and apportion the representatives, as hereinbefore required.]¹⁸

SEC. 37. When a congressional, senatorial, or representative district shall be composed of two or more counties, it shall not be entirely separated by any county belonging to another district; and no county shall be divided in forming a congressional, senatorial, or representative district.

SEC. 38. In all elections by the General Assembly, the members thereof shall vote viva voce and the votes shall be entered on the journal.

ARTICLE IV.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT

SECTION 1. The Supreme Executive power of this State shall be vested in a Chief Magistrate, who shall be styled the Governor of the State of Iowa.

SEC. 2. The Governor shall be elected by the qualified electors at the time and place of voting for members of the General Assembly, and shall hold his office two years from the time of his installation, and until his successor is elected and qualified.

SEC. 3. There shall be a Lieutenant Governor, who shall hold his office two years, and be elected at the same time as the Governor. In voting for Governor and Lieutenant Governor, the electors shall designate for whom they vote as Governor, and for whom as Lieutenant Governor. The returns of every election for Governor, and Lieutenant Governor, shall be sealed up and transmitted to the seat of government of the State, directed to the Speaker of the House of Representatives, who shall open and publish them in the presence of both Houses of the General Assembly.

SEC. 4. The persons respectively having the highest number of votes for Governor and Lieutenant Governor, shall be declared duly elected; but in case two or more persons shall have an equal and the highest number of votes for either office, the General Assembly shall, by joint vote, forthwith proceed to elect one of said persons Governor, or Lieutenant Governor, as the case may be.

SEC. 5. Contested elections for Governor, or Lieutenant Governor, shall be determined by the General Assembly in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

SEC. 6. No person shall be eligible to the office of Governor, or Lieutenant Governor, who shall not have been a citizen of the United States, and a resident of the State, two years next preceding the election, and attained the age of thirty years at the time of said election.

SEC. 7. The Governor shall be commander in chief of the militia, the army, and navy of this State.

SEC. 8. He shall transact all executive business with the officers of the government, civil and military, and may require information in writing from the officers of the executive department upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices.

SEC. 9. He shall take care that the laws are faithfully executed.

SEC. 10. When any office shall, from any cause, become vacant, and no mode is provided by the Constitution and laws for filling such vacancy, the Governor shall have power to fill such vacancy, by granting a commission, which shall expire at the end of the next session of the General Assembly, or at the next election by the people.

SEC. 11. He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene the General Assembly by proclamation, and shall state to both houses, when assembled, the purpose for which they have been convened.

SEC. 12. He shall communicate, by message, to the General Assembly, at every regular session, the condition of the State, and recommend such matters as he shall deem expedient.

SEC. 13. In case of disagreement between the two Houses with respect to the time of adjournment, the Governor shall have power to adjourn the General Assembly to such time as he may think proper; but no such adjournment shall be beyond the time fixed for the regular meeting of the next General Assembly.

SEC. 14. No person shall, while holding an office under the authority of the United States, or this State, execute the office of Governor, or Lieutenant Governor, except as hereinafter expressly provided.

SEC. 15. The official term of the Governor, and Lieutenant Governor, shall commence on the second Monday of January next after their election, and continue for two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified. The Lieutenant Governor, while acting as Governor, shall receive the same pay as provided for Governor; and while presiding in the Senate, shall receive as compensation therefor, the same mileage and double the per diem pay provided for a Senator, and none other.

SEC. 16. The Governor shall have power to grant reprieves, commutations and pardons, after conviction, for all offenses except treason and cases of impeachment, subject to such regulations as may be provided by law. Upon conviction for treason, he shall have power to suspend the execution of the sentence until the case shall be reported to the General Assembly at its next meeting, when the General Assembly shall either grant a pardon, commute the sentence, direct the execution of the sentence, or grant a further reprieve. He shall have power to remit fines and forfeitures, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; and shall report to the General Assembly, at its next meeting, each case of reprieve, commutation, or pardon granted, and the reasons therefor; and also all persons in whose favor remission of fines and forfeitures shall have been made, and the several amounts remitted.

SEC. 17. In case of the death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability of the Governor, the powers and duties of the office for the residue of the term, or until he shall be acquitted, or the disability removed, shall devolve upon the Lieutenant Governor.

SEC. 18. The Lieutenant Governor shall be President of the Senate, but shall only vote when the Senate is equally divided; and in case of his absence, or impeachment, or when he shall exercise the office of Governor, the Senate shall choose a President pro tempore.

SEC. 19. If the Lieutenant Governor, while acting as Governor, shall be impeached, displaced, resign, or die, or otherwise become incapable of performing the duties of the office, the President pro tempore of the Senate shall act as Governor until the vacancy is filled, or the disability removed; and if the President of the Senate, for any of the above causes, shall be rendered incapable of performing the duties pertaining to the office of Governor, the same shall devolve upon the Speaker of the House of Representatives.

SEC. 20. There shall be a seal of this State, which shall be kept by the Governor, and used by him officially, and shall be called the Great Seal of the State of Iowa.

SEC. 21. All grants and commissions shall be in the name and by the authority of the people of the State of Iowa, sealed with the Great Seal of the State, signed by the Governor, and countersigned by the Secretary of State.

SEC. 22. A Secretary of State, Auditor of State and Treasurer of State, shall be elected by the qualified electors, who shall continue in office two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified; and perform such duties as may be required by law.

ARTICLE V.

JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT

SECTION 1. The Judicial power shall be vested in a Supreme Court, District Courts, and such other Courts, inferior to the Supreme Court, as the General Assembly may, from time to time, establish.

SEC. 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of three Judges, two of whom shall constitute a quorum to hold Court.

SEC. 3. The Judges of the Supreme Court shall be elected by the qualified electors of the State, and shall hold their court at such time and place as the General Assembly may prescribe. The Judges of the Supreme Court so elected, shall be classified so that one Judge shall go out of office every two years, and the Judge holding the shortest term of office under such classification, shall be Chief Justice of the Court, during his term, and so on in rotation. After the expiration of their terms of office, under such classification, the term of each Judge of the Supreme court shall be six years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified. The Judges of the Supreme Court shall be ineligible to any other office in the State, during the term for which they have been elected.

SEC. 4. The Supreme Court shall have appellate jurisdiction only in cases in chancery, and shall constitute a Court for the correction of errors at law, under such restrictions as the General Assembly may, by law, prescribe; and shall have power to issue all writs and process necessary to secure justice to parties and exercise a supervisory control over all inferior Judicial tribunals throughout the State.

SEC. 5. The District Court shall consist of a single Judge, who shall be elected by the qualified electors of the District in which he resides. The Judge of the District Court shall hold his office for a term of four years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified; and shall be ineligible to any other office, except that of Judge of the Supreme Court, during the term for which he was elected.

SEC. 6. The District Court shall be a court of law and equity, which shall be distinct and separate jurisdictions, and have jurisdiction in civil and criminal matters arising in their respective districts, in such manner as shall be prescribed by law.

SEC. 7. The Judges of the Supreme and District Courts shall be conservators of the peace throughout the State.

SEC. 8. The style of all process shall be, "The State of Iowa," and all prosecutions shall be conducted in the name and by the authority of the same.

SEC. 9. The salary of each Judge of the Supreme Court shall be two thousand dollars per annum; and that of each District Judge, one thousand six hundred dollars per annum, until the year Eighteen hundred and sixty; after which time they shall severally receive such compensation as the General Assembly may, by law, prescribe; which compensation shall not be increased or diminished during the term for which they shall have been elected.

SEC. 10. *The State shall be divided into eleven Judicial Districts; and after the year Eighteen hundred and sixty, the General Assembly may re-organize the Judicial Districts and increase or diminish the number of Districts, or the number of Judges of the said Court, and may increase the number of Judges of the Supreme Court; but such increase or diminution shall not be more than one District, or one Judge of either Court at any one session; and no re-organization of the districts, or diminution of the number of Judges, shall have the effect of removing a Judge from office. Such re-organization of the districts, or any changes in the boundaries thereof, or increase or diminution of the number of Judges, shall take place every four years thereafter, if necessary, and at no other time.*¹⁹

[at any regular session of the General Assembly, the State may be divided into the necessary judicial districts for district court purposes, or the said districts may be re-organized and the number of the districts and the judges of said courts increased or diminished; but no re-organization of the districts or diminution of the judges shall have the effect of removing a judge from office.]²⁰

SEC. 11. The Judges of the Supreme and District Courts shall be chosen at the general election; and the term of office of each Judge shall commence on the first day of January next, after his election.

SEC. 12. The General Assembly shall provide, by law, for the election of an Attorney General by the people, whose term of office shall be two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

SEC. 13. *The qualified electors of each judicial district shall, at the time of the election of District Judge, elect a District Attorney, who shall be a resident of the district for which he is elected, and who shall hold his office for the term of four years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.*

[SECTION 13. The qualified electors of each county shall, at the general election in the year 1886, and every two years thereafter, elect a County Attorney, who shall be a resident of the county for which he is elected, and shall hold his office for two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.]²²

SEC. 14. It shall be the duty of the General Assembly to provide for the carrying into effect of this article and to provide for a general system of practice in all the Courts of this State.

[The grand jury may consist of any number of members not less than five, nor more than fifteen, as the General Assembly may by law provide, or the General Assembly may provide for holding persons to answer for any criminal offense without the intervention of a grand jury.]²³

ARTICLE VI.

MILITIA.

SECTION 1. The militia of this State shall be composed of all able-bodied white²⁴ male citizens between the ages of eighteen and forty-five years, except

such as are or may hereafter be exempt by the laws of the United States, or of this State, and shall be armed, equipped, and trained, as the General Assembly may provide by law.

SEC. 2. No person or persons conscientiously scrupulous of bearing arms shall be compelled to do military duty in time of peace; provided, that such person or persons shall pay an equivalent for such exemption in the same manner as other citizens.

SEC. 3. All commissioned officers of the militia, (staff officers excepted,) shall be elected by the persons liable to perform military duty, and shall be commissioned by the Governor.

ARTICLE VII

STATE DEBTS

SECTION 1. The credit of the State shall not, in any manner, be given or loaned to, or in aid of, any individual, association, or corporation; and the State shall never assume, or become responsible for, the debts or liabilities of any individual, association, or corporation, unless incurred in time of war for the benefit of the State.

SEC. 2. The State may contract debts to supply casual deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts, direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the General Assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

SEC. 3. All losses to the permanent, School, or University fund of this State, which shall have been occasioned by the defalcation, mismanagement or fraud of the agents or officers controlling and managing the same, shall be audited by the proper authorities of the State. The amount so audited shall be a permanent funded debt against the State, in favor of the respective fund, sustaining the loss, upon which not less than six per cent annual interest shall be paid. The amount of liability so created shall not be counted as a part of the indebtedness authorized by the second section of this article.

SEC. 4. In addition to the above limited power to contract debts, the State may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, or defend the State in war; but the money arising from the debts so contracted shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever.

SEC. 5. Except the debts hereinbefore specified in this article, no debt shall be hereafter contracted by, or on behalf of this State, unless such debt shall be authorized by some law for some single work or object, to be distinctly specified therein; and such law shall impose and provide for the collection of a direct annual tax, sufficient to pay the interest on such debt, as it falls due, and also to pay and discharge the principal of such debt, within twenty years from the time of the contracting thereof; but no such law shall take effect until at a general election it shall have been submitted to the people, and have received a majority of all votes cast for and against it at such election; and all money raised by authority of such law, shall be applied only to the specific object therein stated, or to the payment of the debt created thereby; and such law shall be published in at least one newspaper in each County, if one is published therein, throughout the State, for three months preceding the election at which it is submitted to the people.

SEC. 6. The Legislature may, at any time, after the approval of such law by the people, if no debt shall have been contracted in pursuance thereof, repeal the same; and may, at any time, forbid the contracting of any further debt, or liability, under such law; but the tax imposed by such law, in proportion to the debt or liability, which may have been contracted in pursuance thereof, shall remain in force and be irrevocable, and be annually collected, until the principal and interest are fully paid.

SEC. 7. Every law which imposes, continues, or revives a tax, shall distinctly state the tax, and the object to which it is to be applied; and it shall not be sufficient to refer to any other law to fix such tax or object.

ARTICLE VIII.

CORPORATIONS

SECTION 1. No corporation shall be created by special laws; but the General Assembly shall provide, by general laws, for the organization of all corporations hereafter to be created, except as hereinafter provided.

SEC. 2. The property of all corporations for pecuniary profit, shall be subject to taxation, the same as that of individuals.

SEC. 3. The State shall not become a stockholder in any corporation, nor shall it assume or pay the debt or liability of any corporation, unless incurred in time of war for the benefit of the State.

SEC. 4. No political or municipal corporation shall become a stockholder in any banking corporation, directly or indirectly.

SEC. 5. No act of the General Assembly, authorizing or creating corporations or associations with banking powers, nor amendments thereto shall take effect, or in any manner be in force, until the same shall have been submitted, separately, to the people, at a general or special election, as provided by law, to be held not less than three months after the passage of the act, and shall have been approved by a majority of all the electors voting for and against it at such election.

SEC. 6. Subject to the provisions of the foregoing section, the General Assembly may also provide for the establishment of a State Bank with branches.

SEC. 7. If a State Bank be established, it shall be founded on an actual specie basis, and the branches shall be mutually responsible for each other's liabilities upon all notes, bills, and other issues intended for circulation as money.

SEC. 8. If a general Banking law shall be enacted, it shall provide for the registry and countersigning by an officer of State, of all bills or paper credit designated to circulate as money and require security to the full amount thereof, to be deposited with the State Treasurer, in United States stocks, or in interest paying stocks of States in good credit and standing, to be rated at ten per cent, below their average value in the City of New York, for the thirty days next preceding their deposit; and in case of a depreciation of any portion of said stocks, to the amount of ten per cent, on the dollar, the bank or banks owning such stock shall be required to make up said deficiency by depositing additional stocks; and said law shall also provide for the recording of the names of the stockholders in such corporations, the amount of stock held by each, the time of any transfer, and to whom.

SEC. 9. Every stockholder in a banking corporation or institution shall be individually responsible and liable to its creditors, over and above the amount of stock by him or her held, to an amount equal to his or her respective shares so held for all of its liabilities, accruing while he or she remains such stockholder.

SEC. 10. In case of the insolvency of any banking institution, the bill-holders shall have a preference over its other creditors.

SEC. 11. The suspension of specie payment by banking institutions shall never be permitted or sanctioned.

SEC. 12. Subject to the provisions of this article, the General Assembly shall have power to amend or repeal all laws for the organization or creation of corporations, or granting of special or exclusive privileges or immunities, by a vote of two-thirds of each branch of the General Assembly; and no exclusive privileges, except as in this article provided, shall ever be granted.

ARTICLE IX.

EDUCATION AND SCHOOL LAWS.

1st. EDUCATION.

SECTION 1. The educational interest of the State, including Common Schools and other educational institutions, shall be under the management of a Board of Education,²⁵ which shall consist of the Lieutenant Governor, who shall be the presiding officer of the Board, and have the casting vote in case of a tie, and one member to be elected from each judicial district in the State.

SEC. 2. No person shall be eligible as a member of said Board who shall not have attained the age of twenty-five years, and shall have been one year a citizen of the State.

SEC. 3. One member of said Board shall be chosen by the qualified electors of each district, and shall hold the office for the term of four years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. After the first election under this Constitution, the Board shall be divided, as nearly as practicable, into two equal classes, and the seats of the first class shall be vacated after the expiration of two years; and one-half of the Board shall be chosen every two years thereafter.

SEC. 4. The first session of the Board of Education shall be held at the Seat of Government, on the first Monday of December, after their election; after which the General Assembly may fix the time and place of meeting.

SEC. 5. The session of the Board shall be limited to twenty days, and but one session shall be held in any one year, except upon extraordinary occasions,

when, upon the recommendation of two-thirds of the Board, the Governor may order a special session.

SEC. 6. The Board of Education shall appoint a Secretary, who shall be the executive officer of the Board, and perform such duties as may be imposed upon him by the Board, and the laws of the State. They shall keep a journal of their proceedings, which shall be published and distributed in the same manner as the journals of the General Assembly.

SEC. 7. All rules and regulations made by the Board shall be published and distributed to the several Counties, Townships, and School Districts, as may be provided for by the Board, and when so made, published and distributed, they shall have the force and effect of law.

SEC. 8. The Board of Education shall have full power and authority to legislate and make all needful rules and regulations in relation to Common Schools, and other educational institutions, that are instituted, to receive aid from the School or University fund of this State; but all acts, rules, and regulations of said Board may be altered, amended or repealed by the General Assembly; and when so altered, amended, or repealed they shall not be re-enacted by the Board of Education.

SEC. 9. The Governor of the State shall be, *EX OFFICIO*, a member of said Board.

SEC. 10. The Board shall have no power to levy taxes, or make appropriations of money. Their contingent expenses shall be provided for by the General Assembly.

SEC. 11. The State University shall be established at one place without branches at any other place, and the University fund shall be applied to that institution and no other.

SEC. 12. The Board of Education shall provide for the education of all the youths of the State, through a system of Common Schools, and such schools shall be organized and kept in each school district at least three months in each year. Any district failing, for two consecutive years, to organize and keep up a school as aforesaid may be deprived of their portion of the school fund.

SEC. 13. The members of the Board of Education shall each receive the same per diem during the time of their session, and mileage going to and returning therefrom, as members of the General Assembly.

SEC. 14. A majority of the Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; but no rule, regulation, or law, for the government of Common schools or other educational institutions, shall pass without the concurrence of a majority of all the members of the Board, which shall be expressed by the yeas and nays on the final passage. The style of all acts of the Board shall be "Be it enacted by the Board of Education of the State of Iowa."

SEC. 15. At any time after the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, the General Assembly shall have power to abolish or re-organize said Board of Education, and provide for the educational interest of the State in any other manner that to them shall seem best and proper.

2ND. SCHOOL FUNDS AND SCHOOL LANDS.

SECTION 1. The educational and school funds and lands, shall be under the control and management of the General Assembly of this State.

SEC. 2. The University lands, and the proceeds thereof, and all monies belonging to said fund shall be a permanent fund for the sole use of the State University. The interest arising from the same shall be annually appropriated for the support and benefit of said University.

SEC. 3. The General Assembly shall encourage, by all suitable means, the promotion of intellectual, scientific, moral, and agricultural improvement. The proceeds of all lands that have been, or hereafter may be, granted by the United States to this State, for the support of schools, which may have been, or shall hereafter be sold, or disposed of, and the five hundred thousand acres of land granted to the new States, under an act of Congress, distributing the proceeds of the public lands among the several States of the Union, approved in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-one, and all estates of deceased persons who may have died without leaving a will or heir, and also such per cent, as has been or may hereafter be granted by Congress, on the sale of lands in this State, shall be, and remain a perpetual fund, the interest of which, together with all rents of the unsold lands, and such other means as the General Assembly may provide, shall be inviolably appropriated to the support of Common Schools throughout the State.

SEC. 4. The money which may have been or shall be paid by persons as an equivalent for exemption from military duty, and the clear proceeds of all fines collected in the several Counties for any breach of the penal laws, shall be exclusively applied, in the several Counties in which such money is paid, or fine collected, among the several school districts of said Counties, in proportion to the number of youths subject to enumeration in such districts, to the support

of Common Schools, or the establishment of libraries, as the Board of Education shall from time to time provide.

SEC. 5. The General Assembly shall take measures for the protection, improvement, or other disposition of such lands as have been, or may hereafter be reserved, or granted by the United States, or any person or persons, to this State, for the use of the University, and the funds accruing from the rents or sale of such lands, or from any other source for the purpose aforesaid, shall be, and remain, a permanent fund, the interest of which shall be applied to the support of said University, for the promotion of literature, the arts and sciences, as may be authorized by the terms of such grant. And it shall be the duty of the General Assembly as soon as may be, to provide official means for the improvement and permanent security of the funds of said University.

SEC. 6. The financial agents of the school funds shall be the same, that by law, receive and control the State and county revenue for other civil purposes, under such regulations as may be provided by law.

SEC. 7. The money subject to the support and maintenance of Common Schools shall be distributed to the districts in proportion to the number of youths, between the ages of five and twenty-one years, in such manner as may be provided by the General Assembly.

ARTICLE X.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION.

SECTION 1. Any amendment or amendments to this Constitution may be proposed in either House of the General Assembly; and if the same shall be agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each of the two Houses, such proposed amendment shall be entered on their journals, with the yeas and nays taken thereon, and referred to the Legislature to be chosen at the next general election, and shall be published, as provided by law, for three months previous to the time of making such choice; and if, in the General Assembly so next chosen as aforesaid, such proposed amendment or amendments shall be agreed to, by a majority of all the members elected to each House, then it shall be the duty of the General Assembly to submit such proposed amendment or amendments to the people, in such manner, and at such time as the General Assembly shall provide; and if the people shall approve and ratify such amendment or amendments, by a majority of the electors qualified to vote for members of the General Assembly, voting thereon, such amendment or amendments shall become a part of the Constitution of this State.

SEC. 2. If two or more amendments shall be submitted at the same time, they shall be submitted in such manner that the electors shall vote for or against each of such amendments separately.

SEC. 3. At the general election to be held in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and in each tenth year thereafter, and also at such times as the General Assembly may, by law, provide, the question, "Shall there be a Convention to revise the Constitution, and amend the same?" shall be decided by the electors qualified to vote for members of the General Assembly; and in case a majority of the electors so qualified, voting at such election, for and against such proposition, shall decide in favor of a Convention for such purpose, the General Assembly, at its next session, shall provide by law for the election of delegates to such Convention.

ARTICLE XI.

MISCELLANEOUS.

SECTION 1. The jurisdiction of Justices of the Peace shall extend to all civil cases, (except cases in chancery, and cases where the question of title to real estate may arise,) where the amount in controversy does not exceed one hundred dollars, and by the consent of parties may be extended to any amount not exceeding three hundred dollars.

SEC. 2. No new County shall be hereafter created containing less than four hundred and thirty-two square miles; nor shall the territory of any organized county be reduced below that area; except the County of Worth, and the counties west of it, along the Northern boundary of this State, may be organized without additional territory.

SEC. 3. No county, or other political or municipal corporation shall be allowed to become indebted in any manner, or for any purpose, to an amount, in the aggregate, exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property within such county or corporation—to be ascertained by the last State and county tax lists, previous to the incurring of such indebtedness.

SEC. 4. The boundaries of the State may be enlarged, with the consent of Congress and the General Assembly.

SEC. 5. Every person elected or appointed to any office, shall, before entering upon the duties thereof, take an oath or affirmation to support the Constitution of the United States, and of this State, and also an oath of office.

SEC. 6. In all cases of elections to fill vacancies in office occurring before the expiration of a full term, the person so elected shall hold for the residue of the unexpired term; and all persons appointed to fill vacancies in office, shall hold until the next general election, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

SEC. 7. The General Assembly shall not locate any of the public lands, which have been, or may be granted by Congress to this State, and the location of which may be given to the General Assembly, upon lands actually settled, without the consent of the occupant. The extent of the claim of such occupant, so exempted, shall not exceed three hundred and twenty acres.

SEC. 8. The seat of Government is hereby permanently established, as now fixed by law at the City of Des Moines, in the County of Polk; and the State University, at Iowa City, in the County of Johnson.

ARTICLE XII.

SCHEDULE.

SECTION 1. This Constitution shall be the supreme law of the State, and any law inconsistent therewith, shall be void. The General Assembly shall pass all laws necessary to carry this Constitution into effect.

SEC. 2. All laws now in force and not inconsistent with this Constitution, shall remain in force until they shall expire or be repealed.

SEC. 3. All indictments, prosecutions, suits, pleas, complaints, process, and other proceedings pending in any of the courts, shall be prosecuted to final judgment and execution; and all appeals, writs of error, certiorari, and injunctions, shall be carried on in the several courts, in the same manner as now provided by law; and all offenses, misdemeanors, and crimes that may have been committed before the taking effect of this Constitution, shall be subject to indictment, trial and punishment, in the same manner as they would have been, had not this Constitution been made.

SEC. 4. All fines, penalties, or forfeitures due, or to become due, or accruing to the State, or to any County therein, or to the school fund, shall inure to the State, county, or school fund, in the manner prescribed by law.

SEC. 5. All bonds executed to the State, or to any officer in his official capacity, shall remain in force and inure to the use of those concerned.

SEC. 6. The first election under this Constitution shall be held on the second Tuesday in October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty seven, at which time the electors of the State shall elect the Governor and Lieutenant Governor. There shall also be elected at such election, the successors of such State Senators as were elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, and members of the House of Representatives, who shall be elected in accordance with the act of apportionment, enacted at the session of the General Assembly which commenced on the first Monday of December one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

SEC. 7. The first election for Secretary, Auditor, and Treasurer of State, Attorney General, District Judges, Members of the Board of Education, District Attorneys, members of Congress, and such State officers as shall be elected at the April election, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, (except the Superintendent of Public Instruction,) and such county officers as were elected at the August election, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, except Prosecuting Attorneys, shall be held on the second Tuesday of October, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight: PROVIDED, That the time for which any District Judge or other State or County officer elected at the April election in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, shall not extend beyond the time fixed for filling like offices at the October election in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight.

SEC. 8. The first election for Judges of the Supreme Court, and such County officers as shall be elected at the August election, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, shall be held on the second Tuesday of October, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.

SEC. 9. The first regular session of the General Assembly shall be held in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, commencing on the second Monday of January of said year.

SEC. 10. Senators elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, shall continue in office until the second Tuesday of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, at which time their successors shall be elected as may be prescribed by law.

SEC. 11. Every person elected by popular vote, by a vote of the General Assembly, or who may hold office by executive appointment, which office is continued by this Constitution, and every person who shall be so elected or appointed, to any such office, before the taking effect of this Constitution, (except as in this Constitution otherwise provided,) shall continue in office until the

term for which such person has been or may be elected or appointed shall expire; but no such person shall continue in office after the taking effect of this Constitution, for a longer period than the term of such office, in this Constitution prescribed.

SEC. 12. The General Assembly, at the first session under this Constitution, shall district the State into eleven Judicial Districts, for District Court purposes; and shall also provide for the apportionment of the members of the General Assembly, in accordance with the provisions of this Constitution.

SEC. 13. This Constitution shall be submitted to the electors of the State at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the several election districts in this State. The ballots at such election shall be written or printed as follows: Those in favor of the Constitution, "New Constitution—Yes." Those against the Constitution, "New Constitution—No." The election shall be conducted in the same manner as the general election of the State, and the poll-books shall be returned and canvassed as provided in the twenty-fifth chapter of the code, and abstracts shall be forwarded to the Secretary of State, which abstracts shall be canvassed in the manner provided for the canvass of State officers. And if it shall appear that a majority of all the votes cast at such election for and against this Constitution are in favor of the same, the Governor shall immediately issue his proclamation stating that fact, and such Constitution shall be the Constitution of the State of Iowa, and shall take effect from and after the publication of said proclamation.

SEC. 14. At the same election that this Constitution is submitted to the people for its adoption or rejection, a proposition to amend the same by striking out the word 'white' from the article on the Right of Suffrage, shall be separately submitted to the electors of this State for adoption or rejection in the manner following—Namely: A separate ballot may be given by every person having a right to vote at said election, to be deposited in a separate box; and those given for the adoption of such proposition shall have the words, "Shall the word 'White' be stricken out of the Article on the Right of Suffrage? Yes." And those given against the proposition shall have the words, "Shall the word 'White' be stricken out of the Article on the Right of Suffrage? No." And if at said election the number of ballots cast in favor of said proposition shall be equal to a majority of those cast for and against this Constitution, then said word 'White' shall be stricken from said Article and be no part thereof.²⁶

SEC. 15. Until otherwise directed by law, the County of Mills shall be in and a part of the sixth Judicial District of this State.

[SEC. 16. The first general election after the adoption of this amendment shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and general elections shall be held biennially thereafter. In the year one thousand nine hundred and six there shall be elected a governor, lieutenant-governor, secretary of state, auditor of state, treasurer of state, attorney general, two judges of the supreme court, the successors of the judges of the district court whose terms of office expire on December 31st, one thousand nine hundred and six, state senators who would otherwise be chosen in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, and members of the house of representatives. The terms of office of the judges of the supreme court which would otherwise expire on December 31st, in odd number years, and all other elective state, county and township officers whose terms of office would otherwise expire in January in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and members of the general assembly whose successors would otherwise be chosen at the general election in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The terms of offices of senators whose successors would otherwise be chosen in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The general assembly shall make such changes in the law governing the time of election and term of office of all other elective officers as shall be necessary to make the time of their election and terms of office conform to this amendment, and shall provide which of the judges of the supreme court shall serve as chief justice. The general assembly shall meet in regular session on the second Monday in January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and also on the second Monday in January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, and biennially thereafter.]²⁷

Done in Convention at Iowa City, this fifth day of March in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, and of the Independence of the United States of America, the eighty-first.

Governor Grimes' Proclamation

Proclamation

Whereas an instrument known as the New Constitution of the State of Iowa adopted by the constitutional Convention of said State on the fifth day of March A.D. 1857 was submitted to the qualified electors of said State at the annual election held on Sunday the third day of August 1857 for their approval or rejection and whereas an official canvass of the votes cast at said election shows that there were Forty thousand three hundred and sixteen votes cast for the adoption of said Constitution and Fifty eight thousand six hundred and eighty one votes were cast against its adoption, having a majority of sixteen hundred and thirty votes in favor of its adoption.

Now therefore I, James W. Grimes Governor of said State, by virtue of the authority conferred upon me, hereby declare the said New Constitution to be adopted, and declare it to be the supreme law of the State of Iowa.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and affixed the Great Seal of the State of Iowa Done at Iowa City this third day of September A.D. 1857 of the Independence of the United States the eighty second year of the State of Iowa the Eleventh

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF IOWA

AMENDMENTS OF 1863²⁸

- 1st. Strike the word "white" from section one of article two thereof.
- 2d. Strike the word "white" from section thirty-three of article three thereof.
- 3d. Strike the word "white" from section thirty-four of article three thereof.
- 4th. Strike the word "white" from section thirty-five of article three thereof.
- 5th. Strike the word "white" from section one of article six thereof.

AMENDMENT OF 1880²⁹

Strike out the words "free white" from the third line of section four (4) of article three (3) of said constitution, relating to the legislative department.

AMENDMENT OF 1882³⁰

Add as section 26 to article I of said Constitution the following: Section 26. No person shall manufacture for sale, or sell, or keep for sale, as a beverage, any intoxicating liquors whatever, including ale, wine and beer. The General Assembly shall by law prescribe regulations for the enforcement of the prohibition herein contained, and shall thereby provide suitable penalties for the violation of the provisions hereof.

AMENDMENTS OF 1884³¹

Amendment 1. The general election for state, district, county and township officers shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November.

Amendment 2. At any regular session of the General Assembly, the State may be divided into the necessary Judicial Districts for District Court purposes, or the said Districts may be reorganized and the number of the Districts and the Judges of said Courts increased or diminished; but no reorganization of the Districts or diminution of the Judges shall have the effect of removing a Judge from office.

Amendment 3. The grand jury may consist of any number of members not less than five, nor more than fifteen, as the General Assembly may by law provide, or the General Assembly may provide, for holding persons to answer for any criminal offense without the intervention of a grand jury.

Amendment 4. That section 13 of article 5 of the Constitution be stricken therefrom, and the following adopted as such section:

SECTION 13. The qualified electors of each county shall, at the general election in the year 1886, and every two years thereafter elect a County Attorney, who shall be a resident of the county for which he is elected, and shall hold his office for two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

AMENDMENTS OF 1904³²

Add as section 16, to article XII of the Constitution, the following:

SEC. 16 The first general election after the adoption of this amendment shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and general elections shall be held biennially thereafter. In the year one thousand nine hundred and six there shall be elected a governor, lieutenant-governor, secretary of state, auditor of state, treasurer of state, attorney general, two judges of the supreme court, the successors of the judges of the district court whose terms of office expire on

December 31st, one thousand nine hundred and six, state senators who would otherwise be chosen in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, and members of the house of representatives. The terms of office of the judges of the supreme court which would otherwise expire on December 31st, in odd numbered years, and all other elective state, county and township officers whose terms of office would otherwise expire in January in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and members of the general assembly whose successors would otherwise be chosen at the general election in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The terms of office of senators whose successors would otherwise be chosen in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The general assembly shall make such changes in the law governing the time of election and term of office of all other elective officers as shall be necessary to make the time of their election and terms of office conform to this amendment, and shall provide which of the judges of the supreme court shall serve as chief justice. The general assembly shall meet in regular session on the second Monday in January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and also on the second Monday in January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, and biennially thereafter.

That sections thirty-four (34), thirty-five (35) and thirty-six (36) of article three (3) of the Constitution of the State of Iowa, be repealed and the following adopted in lieu thereof:

SEC. 34. The Senate shall be composed of fifty members to be elected from the several senatorial districts, established by law and at the next session of the general assembly held following the taking of the state and national census, they shall be apportioned among the several counties or districts of the state, according to population as shown by the last preceding census.

SEC. 35. The House of Representatives shall consist of not more than one hundred and eight members. The ratio of representatives shall be determined by dividing the whole number of the population of the state as shown by the last preceding state or national census, by the whole number of counties then existing or organized, but each county shall constitute one representative district and be entitled to one representative, but each county having a population in excess of the ratio number, as herein provided of three fifths or more of such ratio number shall be entitled to one additional representative, but said addition shall extend only to the nine counties having the greatest population.

SEC. 36. The General Assembly shall, at the first regular session held following the adoption of this amendment, and at each succeeding regular session held next after the taking of such census, fix the ratio of representation, and apportion the additional representatives, as hereinbefore required.

AMENDMENT OF 1908³³

That there be added to Section eighteen (18) of Article one (1) of the Constitution of the State of Iowa, the following:

"The General Assembly, however, may pass laws permitting the owners of lands to construct drains, ditches, and levees for agricultural, sanitary or mining purposes across the lands of others, and provide for the organization of drainage districts, vest the proper authorities with power to construct and maintain levees, drains and ditches and to keep in repair all drains, ditches, and levees heretofore constructed under the laws of the state, by special assessments upon the property benefitted thereby. The General Assembly may provide by law for the condemnation of such real estate as shall be necessary for the construction and maintenance of such drains, ditches and levees, and prescribe the method of making such condemnation."

AMENDMENT OF 1916³⁴

To repeal Section seven (7) of Article two (2) of the Constitution of Iowa and to adopt in lieu thereof the following, to wit:

"The general election for state, district, county and township officers in the year 1916 shall be held in the same month and on the same day as that fixed by the laws of the United States for the election of presidential electors, or of

president and vice-president of the United States; and thereafter such election shall be held at such time as the general assembly may by law provide."

AMENDMENT OF 1926³⁵

Strike out the word "male" from Section four (4) of Article three (3) of said Constitution, relating to the legislative department.

AMENDMENT OF 1928³⁶

That the period (.) at the end of said Section thirty-four (34) of Article three (3) of the Constitution of the State of Iowa be stricken and the following inserted:

" , but no county shall be entitled to more than one (1) senator."

AMENDMENT OF 1936³⁷

Amend Article three (III) by repealing Section thirty-three (33) relating to the state census.

AMENDMENT OF 1942³⁸

That Article seven (VII) of the Constitution of the State of Iowa be amended by adding thereto, as Section eight (8) thereof, the following:

"All motor vehicle registration fees and all licenses and excise taxes on motor vehicle fuel, except cost of administration, shall be used exclusively for the construction, maintenance and supervision of the public highways exclusively within the state or for the payment of bonds issued or to be issued for the construction of such public highways and the payment of interest on such bonds."

AMENDMENTS OF 1952³⁹

Amendment 1. That section four (4) of Article IV of the Constitution of Iowa be amended by adding thereto the following: "If, upon the completion of the canvass of votes for Governor and Lieutenant Governor by the General Assembly, it shall appear that the person who received the highest number of votes for Governor has since died, resigned, is unable to qualify, fails to qualify, or for any other reason is unable to assume the duties of the office of Governor for the ensuing term, the powers and duties of the office shall devolve upon the person who received the highest number of votes for Lieutenant Governor until the disability is removed and, upon inauguration, he shall assume the powers and duties of Governor."

Amendment 2. That section nineteen (19) of Article IV of the Constitution of Iowa be repealed and the following adopted in lieu thereof: "If there be a vacancy in the office of Governor and the Lieutenant Governor shall by reason of death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability become incapable of performing the duties pertaining to the office of Governor, the President pro tempore of the Senate shall act as Governor until the vacancy is filled or the disability removed; and if the President pro tempore of the Senate, for any of the above causes, shall be incapable of performing the duties pertaining to the office of Governor the same shall devolve upon the Speaker of the House of Representatives; and if the Speaker of the House of Representatives, for any of the above causes, shall be incapable of performing the duties of the office of Governor, the Justices of the Supreme Court shall convene the General Assembly by proclamation and the General Assembly shall organize by the election of a President pro tempore by the Senate and a Speaker by the House of Representatives. The General Assembly shall thereupon immediately proceed to the election of a Governor and Lieutenant Governor in joint convention."

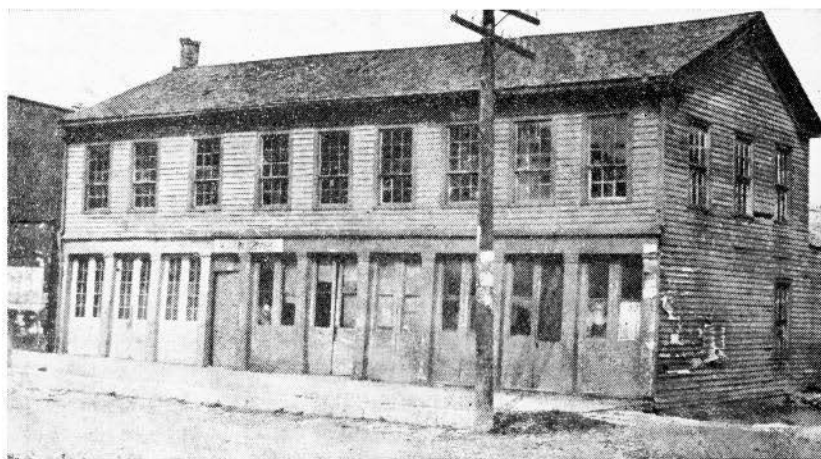

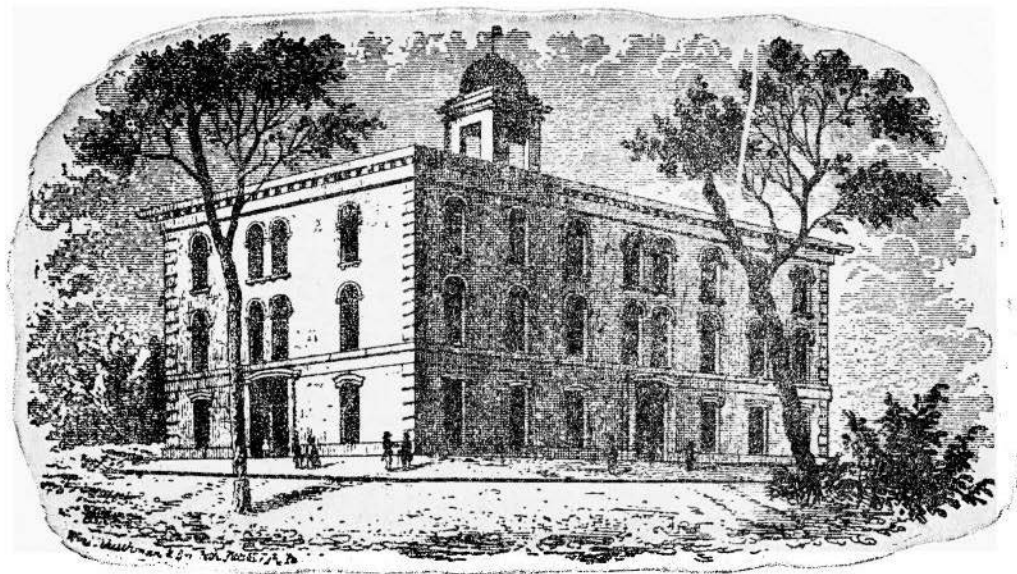


FIRST BUILDING USED AS STATE CAPITOL AT IOWA CITY

The two houses of the Fourth Territorial Legislative Assembly of Iowa convened on Monday, December 16, 1841, in the frame building erected by Walter Butler on the corner of Clinton and Washington Streets in Iowa City, where Whetstone's drug store now stands.



On December 2, 1842, the new Stone Capitol was occupied at the opening of the Fifth Legislative Assembly, having been erected at Iowa City as the permanent capitol of the territory.

THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE¹

When in the Course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the Powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.—We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.—That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed.—That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive to these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its power in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all experience hath shown, that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same Object evinces a design to reduce them under absolute Despotism, it is their right, it is their duty to throw off such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future security.—Such has been the patient sufferance of these Colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former Systems of Government. The history of the present King of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute Tyranny over these States. To prove this, let Facts be submitted to a candid world.—He has refused his Assent to Laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public good.—He has forbidden his Governors to pass Laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his Assent should be obtained; and when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them.—He has refused to pass other Laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of Representation in the Legislature, a right inestimable to them and formidable to tyrants only.—He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the depository of their Public Records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into complacency with his measures. He has dissolved Representative Houses repeatedly, for opposing with manly firmness his invasion on the rights of the people.—He has refused for a long time, after such dissolutions, to cause others to be elected; whereby the Legislative powers, incapable of Annihilation, have returned to the People at large for their exercise; the State remaining in the meantime exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without, and convulsions from within.—He has endeavored to prevent the population of these States; for that purpose obstructing the Laws for Naturalization of Foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migration hither, and raising the conditions of new Appropriations of Lands.—He has obstructed the Administration of Justice, by refusing his Assent to Laws for establishing Judiciary Powers.—He has made Judges dependent on his Will alone, for the tenure of their offices, and the amount and payment of their salaries.—He has erected a multitude of New Offices, and sent hither swarms of Officers to harass our People, and eat out their substance.—He has kept among us, in times of peace, Standing Armies, without the Consent of our legislatures.—He has affected to render the Military independent of and superior to the Civil Power.—He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution, and unacknowledged by our laws; giving his Assent to their acts of pretended Legislation:—For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us:—For protecting them, by a mock Trial, from Punishment for any Murders which they should commit on the Inhabitants of these States:—For cutting off our Trade with all parts of the world:—For imposing taxes on us without our Consent:—For depriving us in many cases, of the benefits of Trial by Jury:—For transporting us beyond Seas to be tried for pretended offenses:—For abolishing the free System of English Laws in a neighboring Province, establishing therein an Arbitrary government, and enlarging its Boundaries so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these Colonies:—For taking away our Charters, abolishing our most valuable Laws, and altering fundamentally

the Forms of our Government:—For suspending our own Legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with Power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever:—He has abdicated Government here, by declaring us out of his Protection and waging War against us.—He has plundered our seas, ravaged our Coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people.—He is at this time transporting large armies of foreign mercenaries to compleat the works of death, desolation and tyranny, already begun with circumstances of Cruelty & perfidy scarcely paralleled in the most hazardous ages, and totally unworthy the Head of a civilized nation.—He has constrained our fellow Citizens taken captive on the high Seas to bear Arms against their Country, to become the executioners of their friends and Brethren, or to fall themselves by their Hands.—He has excited domestic insurrection amongst us, and has endeavoured to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers, the merciless Indian Savages whose known rule of warfare, is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes and conditions. In every stages of these Oppressions We have Petitioned for Redress in the most humble terms: Our repeated Petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A prince, whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a Tyrant, is unfit to be the ruler of a free people. Nor have We been wanting in attention to our British brethren. We have warned them from time to time of attempts by their legislature to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity, and we have conjured them by the ties of our common kindred to disavow these usurpations, which would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They too have been deaf to the voice of justice and of consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity, which denounces our Separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind, Enemies in War, in Peace Friends.—

WE, THEREFORE, the REPRESENTATIVES of the UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, in General Congress, Assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the Name, and by Authority of the good People of these Colonies, solemnly publish and declare, That these United Colonies are, and of Right ought to be FREE AND INDEPENDENT STATES; that they are Absolved from all Allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain, is and ought to be totally dissolved; and that as Free and Independent States, they have full Power to levy War, conclude Peace, contract Alliances, establish Commerce, and to do all other Acts and Things which Independent States may of right do.—And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes and our sacred Honor.

The Birth of Americanism

In 1620 the Pilgrims, persecuted for conscience's sake, "braved the tempests of the vast and furious ocean and the terrors lurking in the American wilderness" to plant their State of Freedom. Even before landing they set up their government by a written Compact; the first charter of a government of the people, by the people and for the people known to history. In the cabin of the Mayflower humanity recovered its rights.

The Compact

Signed in the Cabin of the "Mayflower," Nov.
11th, Old Style, Nov. 21st, New Style, 1620.

"In the name of God, amen, we whose names are underwritten, the loyall subjects of our dread sovereigne Lord, King James, by the grace of God, of Great Britaine, Franc and Ireland king, defender of the faith, &c., haveing undertaken, for the glorie of God, and advancemente of the Christian faith, and honor of our king and countrie, a voyage to plant the first colonie in the northerne parts of Virginia, doe by these presents solemnly and mutuallly in the presence of God, and one of another, covenant and combine ourselves together into a civill body politick, for our better ordering and preservation and furtherence of the ends aforesaid; and by vertue hereof to enacte, constitute and frame such just and equall laws, ordenances, acts, constitutions and offices, from time to time, as shall be thought most meete and convenient for the general good of the colonie. unto which we promise all due submission and obedience. In witness whereof we have hereunto subscribed our names at Cap-Codd the 11 of November, in the year of the raigne of our sovereigne lord, King James of England, Franc and Ireland the eighteenth, and of Scotland the fifty-fourth, ANo Dom 1620."

Thus these men became the First Americans. They believed that God created all men equal; therefore, *without other precedent*; they made all men equal before the Law. Here was the birth of popular constitutional liberty, foreshadowing our Declaration of Independence and our American Constitution, which guarantees Freedom to all of us today. Tremendous suffering was endured as they grappled with the great unknown. Half their number perished in the struggle of that first terrible Winter. Under cover of darkness, the fast dwindling Company laid their dead; levelling the earth above them lest the Indians should learn how many were the graves.

"History records no nobler venture for Faith and Freedom than that of this Pilgrim band. In weariness and painfulness, in watchings often, in hunger and cold, they laid the foundations of a State wherein every man, through countless ages, should have liberty to worship God in his own way, in perpetuating and spreading, throughout the World, the lofty Ideals of our Republic."

The "Mayflower" started with ninety-eight passengers; one was born on the voyage, and four joined them from the ship. Forty-one men signed the "Compact." There were twelve other men, twenty-two women, twenty boys, and eight girls in the company. In December, six died; in January, eight; in February, seventeen; in March, thirteen; making forty-four. Forty-eight are believed to have left descendants.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES¹

We the People of the United States, in order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defence, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

Article I.

Section 1. All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

No Person shall be a Representative who shall not have attained the Age of twenty-five Years, and been seven Years a Citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an Inhabitant of that State in which he shall be chosen.²

Representatives and direct Taxes shall be apportioned among the several States which may be included within this Union, according to their respective Numbers, which shall be determined by adding to the whole Number of free Persons, including those bound to Service for a Term of Years, and excluding Indians not taxed, three-fifths of all other Persons. [counting the whole number of persons in each State, excluding Indians not taxed.]³ The actual Enumeration shall be made within three Years after the first Meeting of the Congress of the United States, and within every subsequent Term of ten Years, in such Manner as they shall by Law direct. The Number of Representatives shall not exceed one for every thirty Thousand, but each State shall have at Least one Representative; and until such enumeration shall be made, the state of New Hampshire shall be entitled to chuse three, Massachusetts eight, Rhode-Island and Providence Plantations one, Connecticut five, New York six, New Jersey four, Pennsylvania eight, Delaware one, Maryland six, Virginia ten, North Carolina five, South Carolina five, and Georgia three.

When vacancies happen in the Representation from any State, the Executive Authority thereof shall issue Writs of Election to fill such Vacancies.

The House of Representatives shall chuse their Speaker and other Officers; and shall have the sole Power of Impeachment.

Section 3. *The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature thereof, for six Years; and each Senator shall have one Vote.*⁴

[The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each Senator shall have one vote. The electors in each State shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the State Legislature.]

Immediately after they shall be assembled in Consequence of the first Election, they shall be divided as equally as may be into three Classes. The Seats of the Senators of the first Class shall be vacated at the Expiration of the second Year, of the second Class at the Expiration of the fourth Year, and of the third Class at the Expiration of the sixth Year, so that one third may be chosen every second Year; and if Vacancies happen by Resignation, or otherwise, during the Recess of the Legislature of any State, the Executive thereof may

*make temporary Appointments until the next Meeting of the Legislature, which shall then fill such Vacancies.*⁵

[When vacancies happen in the representation of any State in the Senate, the executive authority of such State shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies: *Provided*, That the legislature of any State may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointments until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.]

No Person shall be a Senator who shall not have attained to the Age of thirty Years, and been nine Years a Citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an Inhabitant of that State for which he shall be chosen.⁶

The Vice President of the United States shall be President of the Senate, but shall have no Vote, unless they be equally divided.

The Senate shall chuse their other officers, and also a President pro tempore, in the Absence of the Vice President, or when he shall exercise the Office of President of the United States.

The Senate shall have the sole Power to try all Impeachments. When sitting for that Purpose, they shall be on Oath or Affirmation. When the President of the United States is tried the Chief Justice shall preside: And no Person shall be convicted without the Concurrence of two-thirds of the Members present.

Judgment in Cases of Impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from Office, and disqualification to hold and enjoy any Office of honor, Trust or Profit under the United States: but the Party convicted shall nevertheless be liable and subject to Indictment, Trial, Judgment and Punishment, according to Law.

Section 4. The Times, Places and Manner of holding Elections for Senators and Representatives, shall be prescribed in each State by the Legislature thereof; but the Congress may at any time by Law make or alter such Regulations, except as to the Places of chusing Senators.

*The Congress shall assemble at least once in every Year, and such Meeting shall be on the first Monday in December, unless they shall by law appoint a different Day.*⁷

[The Congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall begin at noon on the 3d day of January, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.]

Section 5. Each House shall be the Judge of the Elections, Returns and Qualifications of its own Members, and a Majority of each shall constitute a Quorum to do Business; but a smaller Number may adjourn from day to day, and may be authorized to compel the Attendance of absent members, in such Manner, and under such Penalties as each House may provide.

Each house may determine the Rules of its Proceedings, punish its Members for disorderly Behavior, and, with the Concurrence of two thirds, expel a Member.

Each House shall keep a Journal of its Proceedings, and from time to time publish the same, excepting such Parts as may in their Judgment require Secrecy; and the Yeas and Nays of the Members of either House on any question shall, at the Desire of one-fifth of those Present, be entered on the Journal.

Neither House, during the Session of Congress, shall, without the Consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other Place than that in which the two Houses shall be sitting.

Section 6. The Senators and Representatives shall receive a Compensation for their Services, to be ascertained by Law, and paid out of the Treasury of the United States. They shall in all Cases, except Treason, Felony and Breach of the Peace, be privileged from Arrest during their Attendance at the Session of their respective Houses, and in going to and returning from the same; and for any Speech or Debate in either House, they shall not be questioned in any other place.

No Senator or Representative shall, during the Time for which he was elected, be appointed to any Civil office under the Authority of the United States, which shall have been created, or the Emoluments whereof shall have been increased during such time; and no Person holding any Office under the United States, shall be a Member of either House during his Continuance in Office.

Section 7. All Bills for raising Revenue shall originate in the House of Representatives; but the Senate may propose or concur with Amendments as on other Bills.

Every Bill which shall have passed the House of Representatives and the Senate, shall, before it becomes a Law, be presented to the President of the United States; If he approve he shall sign it, but if not he shall return it, with

his Objections to that House in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the Objections at large on their Journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If after such Reconsideration two-thirds of that House shall agree to pass the Bill, it shall be sent together with the Objections, to the other House, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and if approved by two-thirds of that House, it shall become a Law. But in all such Cases the Votes of both Houses shall be determined by Yeas and Nays, and the Names of the Persons voting for and against the Bill shall be entered on the Journal of each House respectively. If any Bill shall not be returned by the President within ten Days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the Same shall be a law, in like Manner as if he had signed it, unless the Congress by their Adjournment prevent its Return, in which Case it shall not be a Law.

Every Order, Resolution, or Vote to which the Concurrence of the Senate and House of Representatives may be necessary (except on a question of Adjournment) shall be presented to the President of the United States; and before the Same shall take Effect, shall be approved by him, or being disapproved by him, shall be repassed by two-thirds of the Senate and House of Representatives, according to the Rules and Limitations prescribed in the Case of a Bill.

Section 8. The Congress shall have power to lay and collect Taxes, Duties, Imposts and Excises, to pay the Debts and provide for the common Defence and general Welfare of the United States; but all Duties, Imposts and Excises shall be uniform throughout the United States;

To borrow Money on the credit of the United States;

To regulate Commerce with foreign Nations, and among the several States, and with the Indian Tribes;

To establish an uniform Rule of Naturalization, and uniform Laws on the subject of Bankruptcies throughout the United States.

To coin Money, regulate the Value thereof, and of foreign Coin, and fix the Standard of Weights and Measures;

To provide for the Punishment of counterfeiting the Securities and current Coin of the United States;

To establish Post Offices and post Roads;

To promote the Progress of Science and useful Arts, by securing for limited Times to Authors and Inventors the exclusive Right to their respective Writings and Discoveries;

To constitute Tribunals inferior to the Supreme Court;

To define and punish Piracies and Felonies committed on the high Seas, and Offences against the Law of Nations;

To declare War, grant Letters of Marque and Reprisal, and make Rules concerning Captures on Land and Water;

To raise and support Armies, but no Appropriation of Money to that Use shall be for a longer Term than two Years;

To provide and maintain a Navy;

To make Rules for the Government and Regulation of the land and naval Forces;

To provide for calling forth the Militia to execute the Laws of the Union, suppress Insurrections and repel Invasions;

To provide for organizing, arming, and disciplining, the Militia, and for governing such Part of them as may be employed in the Service of the United States, reserving to the States respectively, the Appointment of the Officers, and the Authority of training the Militia according to the discipline prescribed by Congress;

To exercise Legislation in all Cases whatsoever, over such District (not exceeding ten Miles square) as may be Cession of particular States, and the Acceptance of Congress, become the Seat of the Government of the United States, and to exercise like Authority over all Places purchased by the Consent of the Legislature of the State in which the Same shall be, for the Erection of Forts, Magazines, Arsenals, dock-Yards, and other needful Buildings;—And

To make all Laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into Execution the foregoing Powers, and all other Powers, vested by this Constitution in the Government of the United States, or in any Department or Officer thereof.

Section 9. The Migration or Importation of such Persons as any of the States now existing shall think proper to admit, shall not be prohibited by the Congress prior to the Year one thousand eight hundred and eight, but a Tax or duty may be imposed on such Importation, not exceeding ten dollars for each Person.

The Privilege of the Writ of Habeas Corpus shall not be suspended, unless when in Cases of Rebellion or Invasion the public Safety may require it.

No Bill of Attainder or ex post facto Law shall be passed.

No Capitation, or other direct, Tax shall be laid, unless in Proportion to the Census or Enumeration herein before directed to be taken.

[The Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from

whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several States, and without regard to any census or enumeration.]⁸

No Tax or Duty shall be laid on Articles exported from any State.

No Preference shall be given by any Regulation of Commerce or Revenue to the Ports of one State over those of another; nor shall Vessels bound to, or from, one State, be obliged to enter, clear, or pay Duties in another.

No Money shall be drawn from the Treasury, but in Consequence of Appropriations made by Law; and a regular Statement and Account of the Receipts and Expenditures of all public Money shall be published from time to time.

No Title of Nobility shall be granted by the United States; And no Person holding any Office of Profit or Trust under them, shall, without the Consent of the Congress, accept of any present, Emolument, Office, or Title, of any kind whatever, from any King, Prince or foreign State.

Section 10. No State shall enter into any Treaty, Alliance, or Confederation; grant Letters of Marque and Reprisal; coin Money; emit Bills of Credit; make any Thing but gold and silver Coin a Tender in Payment of Debts; pass any Bills of Attainder, ex post facto Law, or Law impairing the Obligation of Contracts, or grant any Title of Nobility.

No State shall, without the Consent of Congress, lay any Imposts or Duties on Imports or Exports, except what may be absolutely necessary for executing its Inspection Laws; and the net Produce of all Duties and Imposts, laid by any State or Imports or Exports, shall be for the Use of the Treasury of the United States; and all such Laws shall be subject to the Revision and Control of the Congress.

No State shall, without the Consent of Congress, lay any Duty of Tonnage, keep Troops, or Ships of War in time of Peace, enter into any agreement or Compacts, with another State, or with a foreign Power, or engage in War, unless actually invaded, or in such imminent Danger as will not admit of delay.

[All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside. No state shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.]⁹

Article II.

Section 1. The executive Power shall be vested in a President of the United States of America. He shall hold his Office during the Term of four Years, and, together with the Vice President, chosen for the same Term, be elected as follows: Each State shall appoint, in such manner as the Legislature thereof may direct, a Number of Electors, equal to the whole Number of Senators and Representatives to which the State may be entitled in the Congress; but no Senator or Representative, or Person holding an office of Trust or Profit under the United States, shall be appointed an Elector.

*The Electors shall meet in their respective States, and vote by Ballot for two Persons, of whom one at least shall not be an Inhabitant of the same State with themselves. And they shall make a List of all the Persons voted for, and of the Number of Votes for each; which List they shall sign and certify and transmit sealed to the Seat of Government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate. The President of the Senate, shall, in the Presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the Certificates, and the Votes shall then be counted. The Person having the greatest Number of Votes shall be the President, if such Number be a Majority of the whole Number of Electors appointed; and if there be more than one who have such Majority, and have an equal Number of Votes, then the House of Representatives shall immediately chuse by Ballot one of them for President; and if no Person have a Majority, then from the five highest on the List the said House shall in like Manner chuse the President. But in chusing the President, the Votes shall be taken by States, the Representation from each State having one Vote; A quorum for this Purpose shall consist of a Member or Members from two-thirds of the States, and a Majority of all the States shall be necessary to a Choice. In every Case after the Choice of the President, the Person having the greatest Number of Votes of the Electors shall be the Vice President. But if there should remain two or more who have equal Votes, the Senate shall chuse from them by Ballot the Vice Presidents.*¹⁰

The Congress may determine the Time of chusing the Electors, and the Day on which they shall give their Votes; which Day shall be the same throughout the United States.

[The Electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for President and Vice-President, one of whom, at least shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as President, and in distinct ballots the person voted for as Vice-President, and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as President, and of all persons voted for as Vice President, and of the number of votes for each, which lists they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate; The President of the Senate shall, in the presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the certificates and the votes shall then be counted;—The person having the greatest number of votes for President, shall be the President if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers not exceeding three on the list of those voted for President, the House of Representatives shall choose, immediately, by ballot, the President. But in choosing the President, the votes shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. *And if the House of Representatives shall not choose a President whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the Vice-President shall act as President, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the President.*¹¹ The person having the greatest number of votes as Vice-President, shall be the Vice-President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed, and if no person have a majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list, the Senate shall choose the Vice-President; a quorum for the purpose shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of Senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice. But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of President shall be eligible to that of Vice President of the United States.]¹²

[The terms of the President and Vice President shall end at noon on the 20th day of January, and terms of Senators and Representatives at noon on the 3d day of January, of the years in which such terms would have ended if this article had not been ratified; and the terms of their successors shall then begin.

If, at the time fixed for the beginning of the terms of the President, the President elect shall have died, the Vice President elect shall become President. If a President shall not have been chosen before the time fixed for the beginning of his term, or if the President elect shall have failed to qualify, then the Vice President elect shall act as President until a President shall have qualified; and the Congress may by law provide for the case wherein neither a President elect nor a Vice President elect shall have qualified, declaring who shall then act as President, or the manner in which one who is to act shall be selected, and such person shall act accordingly until a President or Vice President shall have qualified.

The Congress may by law provide for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the House of Representatives may choose a President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them, and for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the Senate may choose a Vice President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them.]¹³

No Person except a natural born Citizen, or a Citizen of the United States at the time of the adoption of this Constitution, shall be eligible to the Office of President; neither shall any Person be eligible to that Office who shall not have attained the Age of thirty-five Years, and been fourteen Years a Resident within the United States.¹⁴

In Case of the Removal of the President from Office, or of his Death, Resignation, or Inability to discharge the Powers and Duties of the said office, the Same shall devolve on the Vice President, and the Congress may by Law provide for the Case of Removal, Death, Resignation, or Inability, both of the President and Vice President, declaring what Officer shall then act as President, and such Officer shall act accordingly, until the Disability be removed, or a President shall be elected.

The President shall, at stated Times, receive for his Services, a Compensation, which shall neither be increased nor diminished during the Period for which he shall have been elected, and shall not receive within that Period any other Emolument from the United States, or any of them.

Before he enter on the Execution of his Office, he shall take the following

Oath or Affirmation:—I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the Office of President of the United States, and will to the best of my Ability, preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States."

Section 2. The President shall be Commander in Chief of the Army and Navy of the United States, and of the Militia of the the several States, when called into the actual Service of the United States; he may require the Opinion, in writing, of the principal Officer in each of the executive Departments, upon any Subject relating to the Duties of their respective Offices, and he shall have Power to grant Reprieves and Pardons for Offences against the United States, except in Cases of Impeachment.

He shall have Power, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, to make Treaties, provided two-thirds of the Senators present concur; and he shall nominate, and by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, shall appoint Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls, Judges of the Supreme Court, and all other Officers of the United States, whose Appointments are not herein otherwise provided for, and which shall be established by Law; but the Congress may by Law vest the Appointment of such inferior Officers, as they think proper, in the President alone, in the Courts of Law, or in the Heads of Departments.

The President shall have power to fill up all vacancies that may happen during the Recess of the Senate, by granting Commissions which shall expire at the End of their next Session.

Section 3. He shall from time to time give to the Congress Information of the State of the Union, and recommend to their Consideration such Measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient; he may, on extraordinary Occasions, convene both Houses, or either of them, and in Case of Disagreement between them, with Respect to the Time of Adjournment, he may adjourn them to such Time as he shall think proper; he shall receive Ambassadors and other public commissioned Ministers; he shall take Care that the Laws be faithfully executed, and shall Commission all the Officers of the United States.

Section 4. The President, Vice President and all civil Officers of the United States, shall be removed from Office on Impeachment, for, and Conviction of, Treason, Bribery, or other Crimes and Misdemeanors.

Article III.

Section 1. The judicial Power of the United States, shall be vested in one supreme Court, and in such inferior Courts as the Congress may from time to time ordain and establish. The Judges, both of the supreme and inferior Courts, shall hold their Offices during good Behaviour, and shall, at stated Times, receive for their Services, a Compensation, which shall not be diminished during their Continuance in Office.

Section 2. The judicial Power shall extend to all Cases, in Law and Equity, arising under this Constitution, the Laws of the United States, and Treaties made, or which shall be made, under their Authority;—to all Cases affecting Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls;—to all Cases of admiralty and maritime Jurisdiction;—to Controversies to which the United States shall be a Party;—to Controversies between two or more States;—between a State and Citizens of another State;—between Citizens of different States;—between Citizens of the same State claiming Lands under Grants of different States, and between a State, or the Citizens thereof, and foreign States, Citizens or Subjects.

[The Judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by Citizens of another State, or by Citizens or Subjects of any foreign State.]¹⁵

In all Cases affecting Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls, and those in which a State shall be a party, the supreme Court shall have original Jurisdiction. In all the other Cases before mentioned, the supreme Court shall have appellate Jurisdiction, both as to Law and Fact, with such Exceptions, and under such Regulations as the Congress shall make.

The Trial of all Crimes, except in Cases of Impeachment, shall be by Jury; and such Trial shall be held in the State where the said Crime shall have been committed; but when not committed within any State, the Trial shall be at such Place or Places as the Congress may by Law have directed.

Section 3. Treason against the United States shall consist only in Levying War against them, or in adhering to their Enemies, giving them Aid and Comfort. No Person shall be convicted of Treason unless on the Testimony of two Witnesses to the same overt Act, or on Confession in open Court.

The Congress shall have Power to declare the Punishment of Treason, but no Attainder of Treason shall work Corruption of Blood, or Forfeiture except during the Life of the Person attained.

Article IV.

Section 1. Full Faith and Credit shall be given in each State to the public Acts, Records, and judicial Proceedings of every other State. And the Congress may by general Laws prescribe the Manner in which such Acts, Records and Proceedings shall be proved, and the Effect thereof.

Section 2. The Citizens of each State shall be entitled to all Privileges and Immunities of Citizens in the several States.

A Person charged in any State with Treason, Felony, or other Crime, who shall flee from Justice, and be found in another State, shall on Demand of the executive Authority of the State from which he fled, be delivered up to be removed by the State having Jurisdiction of the Crime.

No person held to Service or Labour in one State, under the Laws thereof, escaping into another, shall, in Consequence of any Law or Regulation therein, be discharged from such Service or Labour, but shall be delivered up on Claim of the Party to whom such Service or Labour may be due.¹⁶

Section 3. New States may be admitted by the Congress into this Union; but no new State shall be formed or erected within the Jurisdiction of any other State; nor any State be formed by the Junction of two or more States, or Parts of States, without the Consent of the Legislatures of the States concerned as well as of the Congress.

The Congress shall have Power to dispose of and make all needful Rules and Regulations respecting the Territory or other Property belonging to the United States; and nothing in this Constitution shall be so construed as to Prejudice any Claims of the United States, or of any particular State.

Section 4. The United States shall guarantee to every State in this Union a Republican Form of Government, and shall protect each of them against Invasion; and on Application of the Legislature, or of the Executive (when the Legislature cannot be convened) against domestic Violence.

Article V.

The Congress, whenever two-thirds of both Houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose Amendments to the Constitution, or, on the Application of the Legislatures of two-thirds of the several States, shall call a Convention for proposing Amendments, which, in either Case, shall be valid to all Intents and Purposes, as Part of this Constitution, when ratified by the Legislature of three-fourths of the several States, or by Conventions in three-fourths thereof, as the one or the other mode of Ratification may be proposed by the Congress; Provided that no Amendment which may be made prior to the Year One thousand eight hundred and eight shall in any Manner affect the first and fourth Clauses in the Ninth Section of the first Article; and that no State without its Consent, shall be deprived of its equal Suffrage in the Senate.

Article VI.

All Debts contracted and Engagements entered into, before the Adoption of this Constitution, shall be as valid against the United States under this Constitution, as under the Confederation.

[The validity of the public debt of the United States, authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any State shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim for the loss of emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void.]¹⁷

This Constitution, and the Laws of the United States which shall be made in Pursuance thereof; and all Treaties made, or which shall be made, under the Authority of the United States, shall be the supreme Law of the Land; and the Judges in every State shall be bound thereby, any Thing in the Constitution or Laws of any State to the Contrary notwithstanding.

The Senators and Representatives before mentioned, and the Members of the several State Legislatures, and all executive and judicial Officers, both of the United States and of the several States, shall be bound by Oath or Affirmation, to support this Constitution; but no religious Test shall ever be required as a Qualification to any Office or public Trust under the United States.

Article VII.

The Ratification of the Conventions of nine States, shall be sufficient for the Establishment of this Constitution between the States so ratifying the Same. done in Convention by the Unanimous Consent of the States present the Seventeenth Day of September in the Year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and Eighty-seven and of the Independence of the United States of America the Twelfth. In witness whereof We have hereunto subscribed our Names.

AMENDMENTS¹⁸ TO THE CONSTITUTION
OF THE UNITED STATES

Article I.

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.

Article II.

A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed.

Article III.

No Soldier shall, in time of peace be quartered in any house, without the consent of the Owner, nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

Article IV.

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no Warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by Oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

Article V.

No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a Grand Jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the Militia, when in actual service in time of War or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offence to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use; without just compensation.

Article VI.

In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the State and district wherein the

crime, shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the Assistance of Counsel for his defence.

Article VII.

In suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury, shall be otherwise re-examined in any Court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

Article VIII.

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishment inflicted.

Article IX.

The enumeration in the Constitution of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

Article X.

The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people.

XI.

The Judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by Citizens or another State, or by Citizens or Subjects of any Foreign State.¹⁹

Article XII.

The Electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for President and Vice-President, one of whom, at least, shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as President, and in distinct ballots the person voted for as Vice-President, and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as President, and of all persons voted for as Vice-President, and of the number of votes for each, which lists they shall sign and certify and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate;—The President of the Senate shall, in the presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the certificates and the votes shall then be counted;—The person having the greatest number of votes for President, shall be the President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers not exceeding three on the list of those voted for as President, the House of Representatives shall choose, immediately, by ballot, the President. But in choosing the President, the votes shall be taken by states, the representatives from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. And if the House of Representatives shall not choose a President whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, *before the fourth day of March next following*, then the Vice-President shall act as President, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the President. The person having the greatest number of votes as Vice-President, shall be the Vice-President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed, and if no person have a majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list, the Senate shall choose the Vice-President; a quorum for the purpose shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of Senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice. But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of President shall be eligible to that of Vice-President of the United States.²⁰

Article XIII.

Section 1. Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.

Section 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.²¹

Article XIV.

Section 1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside. No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

Section 2. Representatives shall be apportioned among the several States according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each State, excluding Indians not taxed. But when the right to vote at any election for the choice of electors for President and Vice-President of the United States, Representatives in Congress, the Executive and Judicial officers of a State, or the members of the Legislature thereof, is denied to any male inhabitants of such State, being twenty-one years of age, and citizens of the United States, or in any way abridged, except for participation in rebellion, or other crime, the basis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of such male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens twenty-one years of age in such State.

Section 3. No person shall be a Senator or Representative in Congress, or elector of President and Vice-President, or hold any office, civil or military, under the United States, or under any State, who, having previously taken an oath, as a member of Congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as a member of any State legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any State, to support the Constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid or comfort to the enemies thereof. But Congress may by votes of two-thirds of each House, remove such disability.

Section 4. The validity of the public debt of the United States, authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any State shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim for the loss or emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void.

Section 5. The Congress shall have power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.²²

Article XV.

Section 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

Section 2. The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.²³

Article XVI.

The Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several States, and without regard to any census or enumeration.²⁴

Article XVII.

The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each Senator shall have one vote. The electors in each State shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the State legislatures.

When vacancies happen in the representation of any State in the Senate, the executive authority of such State shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies: *Provided*, That the legislature of any State may empower the

executive thereof to make temporary appointments until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.

This amendment shall not be so construed as to affect the election or term of any Senator chosen before it becomes valid as part of the Constitution.²⁵

Article XVIII.

Section 1. After one year from the ratification of this article the manufacture, sale, or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into, or the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes is hereby prohibited.

Section 2. The Congress and the several States shall have concurrent power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

Section 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of the several States, as provided in the Constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the State by the Congress.²⁶

Article XIX.

The right of the citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex.

Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.²⁷

Article XX.

Section 1. The terms of the President and Vice President shall end at noon on the 20th day of January, and the terms of Senators and Representatives at noon on the 3rd day of January, of the years in which such terms would have ended if this article had not been ratified; and the terms of their successors shall then begin.

Section 2. The Congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall begin at noon on the 3rd day of January, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.

Section 3. If, at the time fixed for the beginning of the term of the President, the President elect shall have died, the Vice President elect shall become President. If a President shall not have been chosen before the time fixed for the beginning of his term, or if the President elect shall have failed to qualify, then the Vice President elect shall act as President until a President shall have qualified; and the Congress may by law provide for the case wherein neither a President elect nor a Vice President elect shall have qualified, declaring who shall then act as President, or the manner in which one who is to act shall be selected, and such person shall act accordingly until a President or Vice President shall have qualified.

Section 4. The Congress may by law provide for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the House of Representatives may choose a President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them, and for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the Senate may choose a Vice President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them.

Section 5. Sections 1 and 2 shall take effect on the 15th day of October following the ratification of this article.

Section 6. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States within seven years from the date of its submission.²⁸

Article XXI.

Section 1. The eighteenth article of amendment to the Constitution of the United States is hereby repealed.

Section 2. The transportation or importation into any State, Territory, or Possession of the United States for delivery or use therein of intoxicating liquors, in violation of the laws thereof, is hereby prohibited.

Section 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by conventions in the several States, as

provided in the Constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the States by the Congress.²⁹

PROPOSED CHILD LABOR AMENDMENT

Section 1. The Congress shall have power to limit, regulate, and prohibit the labor of persons under eighteen years of age.

Section 2. The power of the several States is unimpaired by this article except that the operation of State laws shall be suspended to the extent necessary to give effect to legislation enacted by the Congress.³⁰

PRESIDENTIAL TERMS OF OFFICE

H. J. Resolution 27 proposed an amendment to the Constitution of the United States relating to the terms of office of the President.

ARTICLE XXII³¹

"Section 1. No person shall be elected to the office of the President more than twice, and no person who has held the office of President, or acted as President, for more than two years of a term to which some other person was elected President shall be elected to the office of the President more than once. But this Article shall not apply to any person holding the office of President when this Article was proposed by the Congress, and shall not prevent any person who may be holding the office of President, or acting as President during the term within which this Article becomes operative from holding the office of President or acting as President during the remainder of such term.

"Sec. 2. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States within seven years from the date of its submission to the States by the Congress."³²

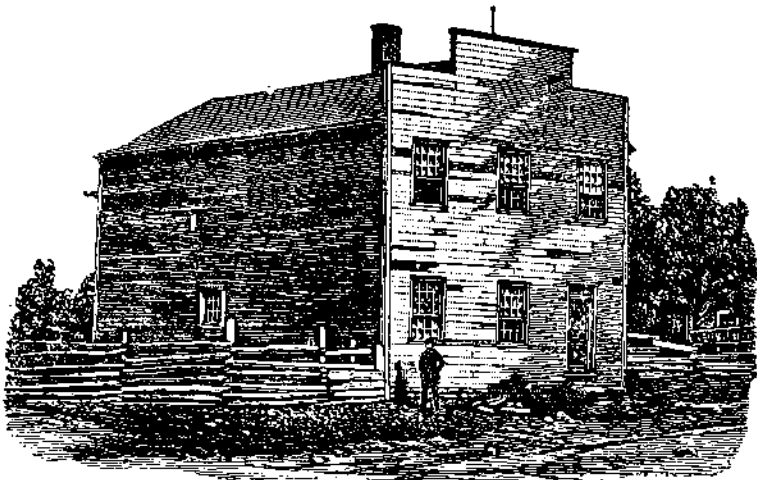
