


MELVIN D. SYNHORST


C. B. (Chet) AKERS


M. L. ABRAHAMSON





The Capitol Building



The capitol building stands as a symbol of the state, and the center of its government, on an eminence east of the Des Moines River. Its golden dome, visible from the far reaches of the valley, surmounts a dignified structure of modified Romanesque architecture, typical of the style of the 1870's and 1880's, when it was built.

Broad lawns and great stone steps sweep down westward from the capitol toward the river and the Des Moines business district. Lawns, with flower beds, trees, shrubs and monuments, extend to the south, and parking lots and auxiliary buildings to the east and north. The entire area of capitol grounds includes 93 acres.

The capitol houses the offices of the governor, secretary of state, auditor, treasurer, attorney general and secretary of agriculture, the chambers of the supreme court, the state senate and house of representatives, and the law library. Other offices of state government are found also in the capitol, and in the state office building, the state historical building and other buildings on and adjacent to the capitol grounds and in downtown Des Moines.

The corner stone of the capitol was laid Sept. 29, 1873, and the building was dedicated in 1884. Construction was brought to a close in 1886. The cost was \$2,875,594.59. Expenditures were increased to a total of \$3,296,256 by repairs, restoration and redecorating following a fire in the north wing Jan. 4, 1904.

The exterior of the building is entirely of stone, with elaborate columns and handsomely designed cornices and capitals. The substructure is of dark Iowa stone topped by a heavy course of vari-colored granite cut from glacial boulders gathered from the Iowa prairies. The superstructure, or main part of the building, is of buff colored sandstone from quarries along the Mississippi River in Missouri.

The capitol is 364 feet long, north and south, by 247 feet wide. The dome, rising 275 feet above the ground floor, is overlaid with 22 carat gold.

Center of State Government

The government of Iowa centers in the venerable, golden-domed capitol, which presides over a constellation of 11 other buildings on its park-like 93 acres, and eight buildings or quarters which the state owns or leases in downtown Des Moines. Planned in 1870, the capitol was designed to house all the state's activities, but they have overflowed into one building after another as the state has grown and its functions have multiplied. Although the capitol no longer houses all the government, it still is the center of administration, of legislation and of judicial interpretation.

Here come the committees from communities, the lobbyists to see the legislators, the litigants and lawyers to contest appealed cases. Here also come the sight-seeing delegations, men wearing badges, women wearing badges, and throngs of school children. Especially during legislative sessions the children come, marshaled by their teachers, to parade up the grand staircase, look at the murals, gaze into the dome, sit in the legislative galleries, maybe even to be introduced to the legislature or to meet the governor.

There were 418 persons employed in the capitol when the Iowa State Capitol planning Commission made a recent survey. But when the legislature is in session there are also 158 legislators and their 158 secretaries and a staff of some 60 legislative clerks and assistants. And visitors throng the corridors at a rate of 400 to 500 a day; there have been 2,300. Focal point of activity, aside from the legislative halls, is the cafeteria in the ground floor corridor, where hundreds have a meal or a lunch or at least a cold drink, in the course of the day. And serious business is discussed.

Rivaling the capitol for historic interest is the state historical building, where library resources and museum exhibits abound and guided tours are conducted. First in volume of employment is the state office building, with some 1,347 persons employed. State employees in other buildings in Des Moines aside from the capitol numbered 820 when the planning commission survey was made.

How Site Was Selected And Capitol Was Built

Location of the capitol on its commanding site resulted from a series of decisions that began almost with statehood. The new state quickly recognized that the capital should be farther west than Iowa City, and the First General Assembly in 1846 authorized a commission to select a location. Amidst rivalries a Jasper County selection was made, and then rejected. In 1854, the Fifth General Assembly decreed a location "within two miles of the Raccoon forks of the Des Moines River." The exact spot was chosen when Willson Alexander Scott gave the state $9\frac{1}{2}$ acres where the capitol now stands.

A group of Des Moines citizens built a temporary capitol (which was later bought by the state), near where the soldiers' and sailors' monument now stands. In 1857 Governor Grimes proclaimed Des Moines to be the capital city, and state papers and functions were transported thither. The temporary capitol was in use for 30 years, until destroyed by fire, but in the meantime the permanent capitol was being planned and built.

The General Assembly in 1870 established a capitol commission to employ an architect, choose a plan for a building, not to cost more than \$1,500,000, and to proceed with the work, but only by using funds available without increasing the tax rate.

Left from the historical building, with smokestack, is the heating plant, which has carpentry and paint shops, paper warehouse and document storage clustered around it, and the vocational rehabilitation building on the far side. The empty lot, with trees, at left of the heating plant is the site of the new \$1,500,000 employment security commission building. A proposal that the state purchase the property as far east as 14th Street, which cuts diagonally across the upper right of the picture, has been made by the capitol planning commission. The suggested north boundary would be the alley beyond (to the left of) Grand Avenue. The state's present holdings, of 93 acres, extend toward the viewer to include the agricultural laboratory building (former International Harvester Building) and the state garage, not shown in the picture.

The board employed Edward Clark, architect of the capitol extension at Washington, to aid in selecting plans and modifying them to keep the cost within the limits of appropriations. The board also instituted tests to ascertain whether Iowa stone could be found suitable for building. John C. Cochrane and A. H. Piquenard were designated as architects, and a corner stone was laid Nov. 23, 1871. A smaller, fulltime commission was appointed in 1872. Much of the original stone had deteriorated through waterlogging and severe weather, and had to be replaced, and the cornerstone was relaid Sept. 29, 1873.

Although the building, as planned, could not be constructed for \$1,500,000, the Cochrane & Piquenard design was retained and modifications were undertaken. Mr. Cochrane resigned in 1872 but Mr. Piquenard continued until his death in 1876. He was succeeded by two of his assistants, M. E. Bell and W. F. Hackney. Mr. Bell resigned in 1883 to become supervising architect for the treasury department in Washington, and Mr. Hackney continued until completion of the building.

Successive legislatures made appropriations and the commission built within the limits of the funds appropriated. The building was dedicated in January, 1884, when the General Assembly was in session. The governor's and other offices were occupied in 1885. The supreme court room was dedicated in 1886.

The building commission made its final report June 29, 1886. The cost had totaled \$2,873,294.59. The audit showed only \$3.77 unaccounted for in the 15 years. The commission bemoaned that it could not have had another \$30,000 to finish the frescoes and build the south and west steps.

In 1902, in order to modernize and repair the building, a third capitol commission was created. While work proceeded, a disastrous fire in the north wing, Jan. 4, 1904, ruined the house chamber and damaged other offices. The commission restored the building, purchased paintings and mosaics, and redecorated almost all the interior. The original decorations are still in the senate. These expenditures raised the total cost of the capitol to \$3,296,256.

Design of Capitol And Its Appearance

The architectural design of the capitol, rectangular in form, with great windows and high ceilings, follows the traditional pattern of the nineteenth century planning for public buildings, a modified and refined Romanesque style which gives the impression of strength and dignity combined with utility.

The commanding feature is the central towering dome. This is constructed of steel and stone and covered with 22 carat gold, which, glistening in the sunlight, can be seen from far distant places. The dome is surrounded by a lookout lantern that may be reached by long and winding stairs, and it terminates in a finial that is 275 feet above the ground floor. The rotunda beneath the dome is 67 feet in diameter. Four smaller domes of simple design rise from the four corners of the capitol. The pediment over the front entrance discloses a fine piece of allegorical sculpture.

Stone for the basement was quarried in Johnson County, Iowa; granite came from Iowa boulders; stone of the main structure from St. Genevieve and Carroll counties, Missouri; steps, columns and other parts from Anamosa, Iowa; Cleveland, Ohio; Sauk Rapids, Minn.; Lamont and Joliet, Ill. Imported and domestic marble of 29 kinds was used in the interior; and the wood used was nearly all from Iowa forests of walnut, cherry, catalpa, butternut and oak. As is so often the case with public buildings, visitors are likely to enter on the ground floor. Although the majestic approach is up the long hill and stone steps from the west, the convenient entrance is from the parking lots on the east. The ground floor corridors are busy with cafeteria service, and in the busy season this area is thronged. Here visiting groups may stop at the custodian's office to obtain information and to inquire about guide service. There are information desks also on the upper floors.

The beauty, dignity and arrangement of the interior become apparent as the visitor stands under the dome on the first floor. Broad, lofty corridors extend west, north and south. Walls are highly decorated. The prevailing tones are brown and tan, with brighter colors in the decorations. The grand staircase is to the east. Suites opening from the south corridor are those of the governor, auditor of state, treasurer of state and the executive council. The supreme court and secretary of agriculture are to the north, the secretary of state to the west and the attorney general to the east.

The grand staircase ascends to a landing and divides north and south to bring visitors to the floor above, where the house of representatives is on the north, the senate on the south and the law library on the west.

The senate hall is 58 feet long, 91 feet wide and 41.9 feet in height. It is finished in marble, white oak and scagliola, and is furnished in mahogany. The figures in the ceiling represent Industry, Law, Agriculture, Peace, History and Commerce.

The hall of the house of representatives is 74 by 91.4 feet, and 47.9 feet in height. It is finished in marble, scagliola and black walnut.

The law library is 108.4 feet long, 52.6 feet wide and 44.9 feet high. It is furnished in ash and chestnut and beautifully wainscoted in marble.

The Mural "Westward" And Other Decoration

Extending full width of the east wall over the staircase is the great mural painting, "Westward," an idealized representation of the coming of the people who made Iowa. This was completed as part of the 1904 decoration. Edwin H. Blashfield, the artist, wrote of it:

"The main idea of the picture is a symbolical presentation of the Pioneers led by the spirits of Civilization and Enlightenment to the conquest by cultivation of the Great West. Considered pictorially the canvas shows a prairie schooner drawn by oxen across the prairie. The family ride upon the wagon or walk at its side. Behind them and seen through the growth of stalks at the right come crowding the other pioneers and later men. In the air and before the wagon are floating four female figures: one holds the shield with the arms of the State of Iowa upon it; one holds a book symbolizing enlightenment; two others carry a basket and scatter the seeds which are symbolical of the change from wilderness to plowed fields and gardens that shall come over the prairie. Behind the wagon and also floating in the air, two female figures hold respectively a model of a stationary steam engine and of an electric dynamo to suggest the forces which come with the later men. In the right hand corner of the picture melons, pumpkins, etc., among which stand a farmer and a girl, suggest that here is the fringe of cultivation and the beginning of the prairie. At the left a buffalo skull rather emphasizes this suggestion."

On the upper floor level above the "Westward" painting are six mosaics in six arched panels depicting Defense, Charities, the Executive, the Legislative, the Judiciary, and Education. These were made in Venice from small pieces of colored stone, according to designs by Frederick Dielman of New York, who also designed the mosaic panels Law and History in the Congressional Library.

Twelve statues, high within the rotunda, beginning north of the library door, represent History, Science, Law, Fame, Art, Industry, Peace, Commerce, Agriculture, Victory, Truth and Justice.

Eight lunettes, or half-moon-shaped paintings, surrounding the rotunda are the work of Kenyon Cox, famous American artist. They are entitled: Hunting, Herding, Agriculture, the Forge, Commerce, Education, Science, Art. They are allegorical and indicate the progress of civilization.

At the top of the staircase on the south wall is a painting of a basket of corn by Floyd V. Brackney, a native of Marshall County. This picture was the center of the Iowa exhibit at the Panama-Pacific Exposition in San Francisco.

The battle flags carried by the Iowa regiments in various wars are preserved in niches on the main floor—Civil War 36; Spanish-American War 13; First World War 26. In the west hall is a plaque done by Nellie V. Walker in commemoration of the work of Iowa women in the fight for civic and political equality. In the south hall is a 26-foot photographic enlargement, showing the grand review of the 168th Infantry on the capitol grounds following their return from France in 1919.

Above the grand stairway, facing the large "Westward," are quotations. On the south side is one by Patrick Henry: "No free government or the blessings of Liberty can be preserved to any people but by a firm adherence to Justice, Moderation, Temperance, Frugality and Virtue and by a frequent recurrence to fundamental principles."

On the north side is one by G. W. Curtis: "Courageous confidence in the intelligence of the community is the sure sign of leadership and success."

Underneath it is one by Solon: "The ideal state—that in which an injury done to the least of its citizens is an injury done to all."


To the west is a quotation from William Pitt: "Where law ends tyranny begins."

Around the rotunda on the frieze above the columns is the famous Abraham Lincoln quotation: "That government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth."

The Governor's Office Has Its Own History

On Jan. 1, 1885, Governor Buren R. Sherman became the first occupant of the present offices of the Governor of Iowa, following dedication of the state capitol building the year before. Much of the decoration and original furnishings of that day still are preserved in the four-room suite. The large, ornate mahogany table in the center of the reception room is an example. The frescoed ceilings were painted on the wet plaster 75 years ago.

The governor's private office was moved from the center room to the west office by Governor Albert B. Cummins in 1902. The governor's desk, in front of a large French glass mirror, also was installed at that time

Governor Nathan Kendall (1921-1925) provided the solid, straight-back chairs for visitors.

The grandfather clock in the governor's private office dates from about 1750 and once was owned by the prominent Iowa author Emerson Hough of Newton (1857-1923). The tall clock in the office of the executive secretary is the original master clock controlling other clocks in the law library, supreme court, and legislative chambers. Operated by air, the clock must be wound once a week.

The offices are 23 feet 9 inches from floor to ceiling. The window hangings are of a fine, plush material. Lamps in the inner office are of pewter. Prisms of cut Czechoslovakian crystal decorate the chandelier in the reception room. The woodwork was carved in cherry and mahogany by skilled German craftsmen. The hearths and wainscoting are of fine domestic and imported marble. Paintings in the offices are the works of Iowa artists.

Striking Monuments

On Capitol Grounds

The most striking monument on the capitol grounds is the granite shaft rising 145 feet, erected to the memory of the soldiers and sailors of the Civil War. The heroic bronze figure "Victory" is predominant, while at the base there are four groups representing different branches of the military or naval service, and numerous historical plaques and medallion portraits of typical soldiers. The original design was by Harriet A. Ketcham and work was commenced in 1894. A small and appropriate memorial to Christopher Columbus, erected by Iowa citizens of Italian ancestry, stands nearby.

General Grenville Dodge erected a monument honoring Iowa's longtime Senator William B. Allison. This is an allegorical design of heroic dimensions, depicting civic duties in the public service, and it is encompassed by a flower bed.

West of the capitol is an impressive bronze statuary group depicting the Pioneer. The cannon and mortar on the grounds are of Civil War days. The grave of Willson A. Scott, one of those who gave the state the capitol grounds, is near where he lived and is appropriately marked. A bronze cannon taken in the Spanish-American War and the headpiece of the Battleship Iowa are near the historical building. A granite block dedicated to the soldiers of the Spanish-American War also stands on the plaza east of the capitol.

In 1950, the fine record of Iowa citizens in war bond drives was rewarded with the presentation of a replica of the Liberty Bell, and it is properly stationed just across the street west of the state office building. Boy Scouts presented a replica in miniature of the Statue of Liberty and it is erected between Grand Avenue and the parking area east of the capitol building. A stone erected by the W. R. C. in honor of Crocker Post No. 12, Department of Iowa, was set in 1944.

A site for Iowa's memorial to Abraham Lincoln, a statue by Fred Torey, depicting the Civil War president and his son Tad, was scheduled to be dedicated Nov. 19, 1961. This was commissioned by Friends of Lincoln, Inc.

State Offices Overflow Into 20 Other Buildings

Originally the whole state government was housed in the capitol, but departments through the years have outgrown it, one by one or in groups, until now a 1961 map shows 13 state-owned buildings on or adjacent to the capitol grounds, one state-owned building in downtown Des Moines, and seven downtown buildings in which space is leased. There is also to be a new building for the employment security commission.

First major building to be added to the capitol group was the state historical building, planned originally in 1896 to house the Aldrich historical collection, but now the home of the state historical department

and of a variety of library and museum functions. Known as the Historical Memorial and Art Building, it is 260 by 110 feet in size, built at the turn of the century and enlarged by an addition in 1908.

The limited area of the capitol grounds became a major political issue, and the Thirty-fifth General Assembly in 1913 set up a tax to raise 3,000,000 to purchase lots, buildings and residences to clear the way for expansion to $93\frac{1}{4}$ acres. The land was landscaped, drives were put in and a system of lighting was installed to enhance the beauty of the capitol.

The six-story-and-basement office building, 120 by 246 feet in size, was started with an appropriation by the Forty-ninth General Assembly of \$1,650,000, available July 1, 1941. First department to move in was social welfare, Sept. 1, 1951, and occupancy was completed when the department of public instruction moved, April 24, 1952. Total cost of the building was \$4,935,892.45. A tunnel from the new office building to the state house was completed early in 1953 at a cost of \$92,841.71.

The International Harvester Building, on the southwest corner of the state house grounds, was bought in 1945. Total cost including remodeling of its five floors was \$541,972.

The Amos Hiatt school building, southeast on the grounds, was remodeled for use of the commerce commission. An old school building on the northwest corner of the grounds was razed. The former home for governors north of the capitol was fitted for training of disabled persons.

Purchase of the old Y.M.C.A. building at Fourth Street and Keosauqua Way for \$300,000 was authorized by the Fifty-eighth General Assembly in 1959.

Construction of a building for the employment security commission was authorized by the Fifty-ninth General Assembly in 1961, with an appropriation of \$1,500,000. The site at East Ninth Street and Grand Avenue was designated by the state executive committee.

Locations of state departments are given in the list on page 22, which would be longer if all offices within departments were named. The telephone directory of state departments has 250 listings.

Proposals for Future Buildings and Grounds

Proposals for the future development of the capitol and its grounds were presented to the Fifty-ninth General Assembly in 1961 by the Iowa State Capitol Planning Commission. Immediate first fruit of these recommendations was the appropriation of \$1,500,000 for construction of the Employment Security Commission Building.

The planning commission pointed out: that the number of employees to be provided for will increase by about 20 per cent in the next 20 years; that present quarters already are overcrowded; that several of the buildings are in such states of disrepair or inappropriate structure or location that they should be removed; that additional parking space must be provided; that the beauty and dignity of the capitol grounds should be preserved and enhanced. Accordingly the commission proposed:

Purchase of additional property and expansion of the capitol grounds east to Fourteenth Street, north to the alley between Grand Avenue and Des Moines Street, and south to the railroad tracks.

Construction of the Employment Security Building.

Construction of a library building and conversion of the state historical building into a modern museum building.

Construction of a new agricultural building to bring together all agricultural agencies now housed in the capitol and in the agricultural laboratory building.

Construction of a small new office building to accommodate nonagricultural departments to be removed from the agricultural laboratory building (Harvester Building) and the Amos Hiatt Building, both of which would be taken down.

Removal of the vocational rehabilitation training facility from the capitol grounds to a site adjacent to one of the hospitals.

Removal of the highway patrol and civil defense offices to the edge of the city.

Construction of a new heating plant and maintenance facilities in a location less detrimental to the appearance of the grounds.

Suggested incidentally also was the possibility that a small downtown office building be erected if a survey should show that certain departments could best function by remaining in locations in the Des Moines business district.

The Government of Iowa

The government of the State of Iowa is based on a constitution adopted by the people and upon statute laws enacted from time to time by the general assembly.

Iowa has always used the separation of powers doctrine, dividing the governmental authority into its legislative, executive and judicial components. Iowa has had two state constitutions, the first approved in 1846, the second in 1857. Only eight states are now using constitutions adopted prior to the Iowa constitution of 1857. The present constitution has been amended 21 times.

The Iowa constitution's "Bill of Rights," Article I, is one of the best sections of the state constitution. It has been used as a reference guide for the model state constitution written by the National Municipal League and by the framers of the 1948 New Jersey constitution.

The Electorate—All men and women who have lived in Iowa for six months, in the county in which they claim residence for 60 days, and in the precinct 10 days, are entitled to vote if they are citizens of the United States 21 years of age or over. Persons convicted of infamous crimes and those declared idiotic or insane are, however, disfranchised. The right of women to vote in Iowa is based upon the nineteenth amendment to the United States constitution.

Election Days—The regular elections for national, state, district and county officers are held on the Tuesday following the first Monday of November of the even-numbered years. Candidates, with a few exceptions, are nominated at the primary election held on the first Monday in June preceding the general election. Provision is also made for nominations by petition or convention. Political parties must use the primary for nominating candidates, except for the judiciary, but in case no candidate receives the necessary 35 per cent at the primary, a convention may nominate.

The regular election date for municipal officers is the first Tuesday following the first Monday of November of the odd-numbered years. If a municipal primary election is necessary it is held on the second Tuesday prior to the regular municipal elections.

Legislative Department

General Assembly—The legislative authority of the State of Iowa is vested by the constitution in a general assembly which consists of a senate and a house of representatives. The terms of both senators and representatives begin on the first day of January following their election. Regular sessions are held biennially, commencing on the second Monday of January of the odd-numbered years. Special sessions of the general assembly may be called by the proclamation of the governor.

House of Representatives—The house of representatives consists of 108 members, elected for two years. Each of the 99 counties is entitled to one representative and each of the nine counties having the largest population elects an additional representative. Any person who has resided in the state for one year and has the qualifications of a voter is eligible for election as a representative. Women were admitted to the general assembly by an amendment of the state constitution adopted in 1926.

The house of representatives elects a speaker and other officers. Each house makes its own rules of procedure.

Senate—The senate consists of 50 members, elected by districts for a term of four years. A senatorial district contains from one to three counties, and elects one senator. According to the constitution, approximately one-half the senators are to be elected at each alternate biennial election, but due to changes in the districts, the terms of 21 senators now expire at the end of each alternate legislative biennium and those of 29 in the intervening years. Senators must be 25 years of age and have the other qualifications required of representatives. Members of both houses of the Iowa general assembly are paid \$30 for each day that they are in session. The speaker and lieutenant governor are paid \$60 per diem.

The last change in the apportionment of the Iowa legislature occurred in 1904.

Executive Department

Elective Officers—The constitution of Iowa makes provisions for a governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, auditor of state. treasurer of state and attorney general, who are elected for terms of two years at the regular biennial elections in the even-numbered years. In addition, the general assembly has made provision for a secretary of agriculture, elected for two years. A board of commerce commissioners of three members, at present elective, will become appointive by the governor in 1963. A superintendent of public instruction is chosen by a state board of public instruction, consisting of one member from each congressional district in Iowa and one appointed at large by the governor.

Governor—The supreme executive power of the state is vested in the governor. It is his duty to see that the laws are enforced, to supervise the official business of the state, to make recommendations to the general assembly, and to appoint various officers and boards. Most major appointments are subject to confirmation by the senate. He has the power to call special sessions of the legislature and veto acts passed by the general assembly, but a majority of two-thirds of each house may pass a bill over his veto. To qualify as governor, a person must have been a citizen of the United States and a resident of the state for at least two years and must be 30 years of age or over at the date of election.

Lieutenant Governor—The lieutenant governor, who must possess the same qualifications as the governor, succeeds the governor in case of his death, resignation or disability. His chief function is to act as president of the senate.

Appointive Officers—In addition to the elected executive officers mentioned, there are a number of appointive officers, including the comptroller, the superintendent of banking, the insurance commissioner, the labor commissioner, the adjutant general, the commissioner of public health, the industrial commissioner and commissioner of public safety, all appointed by the governor, usually with the approval of the senate. The governor also appoints the members of a number of administrative boards, including the state board of regents, the board of control of state institutions, the state tax commission, the board of parole, the state board of conservation, the liquor control commission, the state highway commission and the unemployment compensation commission.

Executive Council—The executive council is an ex-officio board made up of the governor, secretary of state, auditor, treasurer and secretary of agriculture. State Printing Board—The state printing board has three ex-officio members—the secretary of state, auditor and attorney general—and two members appointed by the governor. The board appoints the superintendent of printing.

Judicial Department

The judicial department of the State of Iowa is vested by the constitution in a supreme court, district court and inferior courts as the general assembly shall provide.

Supreme Court—The supreme court consists of nine justices, elected for terms of six years, approximately one-third being elected at each regular biennial election. The justices name one of their number as chief justice, and he serves in that capacity until the expiration of his term. The supreme court appoints a reporter of the supreme court who is also the code editor, a supreme court statistician, and a clerk.

Attorney General—The constitution also provides for an attorney general who is elected at the regular biennial election for a term of two years. He represents the state in legal matters, gives advice to state officers, and has, in addition, certain administrative functions.

Judicial Districts—The State of Iowa is divided by law into 21 judicial districts, composed of from one to nine counties. The voters in each district elect from two to eight judges.

There are now 75 district judges in the state. One of the district judges presides over the district court sessions in each county. A county attorney and a clerk of the court are elected by the voters in each county.

Inferior Courts.—The general assembly has provided also for other inferior courts. Each township is authorized to elect two justices of the peace who hear cases involving minor offenses and hold preliminary hearings on more serious charges. Municipal courts, superior courts, police courts and mayors' courts are authorized in cities and towns under various restrictions. Municipal courts are optional in cities having a population of 5,000 or more and superior courts in cities with 4,000 or over. Both municipal and superior court judges are elected for four-year terms.

Municipal Courts—If a city of the first class has neither a municipal nor a superior court, the council shall appoint a police judge in commission governed and city manager cities and may provide for the election or appointment of a police judge in such cities under the general law. In all municipalities having none of these special courts, the mayor acts as the police judge.

Jury Trials—Jury trials are the rule for serious cases, but under certain conditions may be waived or denied. Petit juries consist of 12 persons who must be "electors," except in some courts of restricted jurisdiction where the number of jurors may be six persons.

Local Government

County Officials—The State of Iowa is divided into 99 counties, the boundaries of which may not be changed unless the change is approved by the voters of each county concerned. A board of supervisors consisting of three, five or seven members is the chief administrative agency in the county. They appoint a county engineer, county home steward, medical examiner, county welfare director and other administrative officials. In addition, an auditor, who is the clerk of the board of supervisors, a sheriff, county attorney, recorder, treasurer, and clerk of the district court are elected by the voters, the terms being four years except for the county attorney, who is elected for two years.

A county superintendent of schools is chosen every three years by a county board of education. The county assessor is chosen by the board of supervisors, county board of education and the mayors of the various towns in the county, for a term of six years. They likewise fix his salary.

Local Functions—The Iowa county is a quasi-political corporation which collects municipal, school, county and state taxes, enforces state laws, has charge of poor relief and certain other welfare activities, and shares with the state highway commission the management of the roads and bridges in the county.

Townships, which in earlier days were effective units of local government within the counties, have lost almost all of their functions, except for the election of justices of the peace, in which many townships default.

City Government—The laws of Iowa also authorize the incorporation of cities and towns. These municipalities derive their authority from the general assembly and have only the powers specifically granted to them. Four cities and towns are governed by special charters granted before the adoption of the present constitution which forbids such acts of incorporation. Four cities have the commission form of government; seven have adopted the city manager plan by popular election; and 13 others have a city manager by ordinance. Members of the commission are elected by the voters. The city manager in cities adopting that plan by a popular vote is appointed by the council.

Municipal Classes—All other municipalities are under the general law. Municipalities are classified according to population into cities having over 15,000 population; cities having from 2,000 to 15,000 population; and towns having less than 2,000 population. Nine hundred and sixteen municipalities have the mayor-council form of government, both the mayor and the members of the council being elected by the voters for two-year or four-year terms.

City Councils—The council is the policy-making body in municipal government and it is also the chief administrative agency in the mayorcouncil cities. The mayor presides over the council, although he is not a member, and has the power to veto acts of the council subject to a two-thirds majority vote over his veto. He supervises municipal activiities and in cities and towns which do not have a municipal, superior or police court, he serves as police judge. He also appoints certain officers, including the marshal or chief of police, the city health officer, and members of the police and fire board, and other officials that the council may direct him to appoint. The city solicitor and clerk, and in some cases the engineer and members of the zoning board of adjustment are chosen by the council.

Taxation

Tax Sources—Taxation is probably the most important governmental power. The present state tax system of Iowa is a multiple tax system based largely on sales, personal income and corporation taxes. There are also taxes on inheritance, gasoline, cigarettes, beer and chain stores. The property tax is the primary source of revenue for local government in Iowa.

Tax Levies—Property is assessed by the county assessors with some aid from the state tax commission. Assessments are subject to revision by local boards and by the state tax commission. Various mill levies for state, county, school and municipal purposes are computed by the county auditor on the assessed valuation. Tax money is paid to the county treasurer, who distributes it to the proper fund. Levies for county, school or municipal purposes are, in most cases, limited by state law. In larger cities, city assessors function in addition to the county assessors.

Calendar of Official Dates

Code 1958, section 541.85, provides that the following designated days "... Shall be regarded as holidays for all purposes relating to the pres-entation for payment or acceptance, and for the protesting and giving notice of the dishonor of bills of exchange, drafts, bank checks, orders and promissory notes, and any bank or mercantile paper falling due on any of the days below named shall be considered as falling due on the succeeding business day."

Filing Nomination Papers

State and National-For United States senator, representatives in congress, and all elective state offices, to be filed in the office of the secretary of state not more than 85 nor less than 65 days prior to the date set for holding the primary election. (C., '58, §43.11.)

County-For all elective county offices, to be filed in the office of the county auditor at least 55 days prior to the date fixed for holding the primary election. (C., '58, \$43.11.)

Township or Precinct—For elective offices of a subdivision of a county to be filed with the county auditor 55 days prior to the primary. (C., '58, \$43.21.)

Cities and Towns—For elective offices in all cities and towns to be filed at least four weeks prior to primary election. (C., '58, §363.11.)

School-For all elective offices in each independent city, town or consolidated district, shall be filed with the secretary of the school board not earlier than 30 nor less than 10 days before the election. (C., '58, §277.4)

Primary Election Dates

Municipal—The primary election in all cities and towns on the second Tuesday prior to the regular election. (C., '58, \$363.17.)

General—The primary election shall be held the first Monday in June in each even-numbered year. (C., '58, \$43.7.)



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Election Dates

Cities and Towns—Regular city and town elections shall be held biennially on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November of oddnumbered years.

School—The regular school election shall be held annually on the second Monday in September; except in cities over 125,000 population, where the election will be held biennially on the second Monday in September of odd-numbered years. (GA'58, ch 186,\$5.)

General—The general election for state, district, county and township officers shall be held on the first Tuesday next after the first Monday in November of each even-numbered year. (C., '58, \$39.1.)

Political Convention Dates

County—Each political party shall hold its county convention on the fourth Friday following each primary election. (C., '58, §43.89.)

State—Each political party shall hold a state convention not earlier than the first nor later than the fifth Wednesday following the county convention. (C., '58, \$43.107.)

Judicial—Each political party shall hold a state judicial convention not less than one or more than two weeks after their regular state convention. (C., '58, \$46.1.)

District—Each political party shall hold a district judicial convention in districts where judges are to be elected not earlier than the first nor later than the fifth Thursday following the county convention. (C., '58, \$46.8.)

Presidential or Special—Precinct caucuses, county conventions and state conventions of each political party are held in the years presidents are elected and usually during the months of March and April on call of the state chairmen of the political parties.

Election of State Officials

Each two years in Iowa, the people elect their governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, auditor of state, treasurer of state, secretary of agriculture and attorney general.

State commerce commissioners were elective officials until 1959 when the 58th General Assembly enacted legislation providing for their appointment by the governor. The superintendent of public instruction is named by a state board of public instruction, consisting of one member from each congressional district and one appointed at large by the governor.

The justices of the supreme court are elected for terms of six years. District judges are elected for terms of four years.

Members of the senate are elected for four years; house members for two years.


County Officers Given Four Year Terms

In 1960 a clerk of courts, auditor and sheriff were elected for four years; the treasurer and recorder two years. Then in 1962 and thereafter all will hold office four years. The county attorney will be elected every two years.

Elections in Iowa occur in even-numbered years.

Election of Federal Officials

Federal elections occur each four years, on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November of even years. The next election will be in 1964. The constitution provides that the only elected federal officials are the president, vice-president, U. S. senators and U. S. representatives. All other officers are appointive--practically all by the president. U. S. senators serve a term of six years; house members serve terms of two years. House members will be elected in 1962.



United States Senator From Iowa





Iowa Congressional Districts

The eight representatives from Iowa who were elected to the Eightyseventh Congress in 1960 were elected from eight congressional districts which were established by act of the Forty-ninth General Assembly which convened Jan. 13, 1941.

Senate File 540, "to redistrict the state into eight congressional districts," became effective as to the nomination and election of representatives in congress in 1942.







Reapportionment for Coming Sessions

The state constitution requires that the state be redistricted after each census, but with the stipulation that no county may have more than one senator. The number of districts is fixed at 50. Acting on this mandate, the 59th General Assembly redistricted the state as shown herewith.



Senators will be elected in 1962 from the districts so indicated, and in 1964 from the districts so indicated. Terms will be for four years, except as indicated. Seven counties, as designated, will be attached to certain designated present districts for the purpose of representation in the 1963 session. The act does not affect the terms of office of senators already elected.

Constitutional Amendment

Further reapportionment, more fully representing population, is pro-posed in a constitutional amendment, passed by the Fifty-ninth General Assembly. This amendment (the Shaff plan) would permit a populous county to have more than one senator, and would increase the number of senators to 58. To become effective, this proposal must be approved by the Sixtieth General Assembly and by vote of the people, to whom it could be presented in 1964. If approved, it would permit election in 1966 of senators to serve in a 1967 General Assembly under the new plan. The 58 districts would be delineated by a joint committee of the Republican and Democratic parties.

The Fifty-ninth General Assembly 1961

The Fifty-ninth General Assembly tackled reapportionment promptly. And it put off budget-tax decisions almost to the end. The session covered a record-breaking 118 days. Appropriations totaled a recordbreaking \$193,800,000, and the cost of the session was over \$1,000,000.

The Fifty-ninth General Assembly had inherited several critical sluations. Legislative apportionment required adjustment (17,756 persons in two of the least populous counties had the same senate-house representation as 266,315 persons in the most populous county). Total population growth had slowed until the state was losing a congressman. And needs cited by state agencies were \$70 million a year greater than the governor was willing to budget.

Republican Majority in Control

The Fifty-ninth General Assembly convened Jan. 9, 1961, and its sessions closed May 6. The gavels finally fell May 10. There were 78 Republicans and 30 Democrats in the house, and 35 Republicans and 15 Democrats in the senate. The number of resolutions and bills introduced was 1,337, of which the general assembly passed 357. The governor vetoed seven.

One of the first resolutions introduced was one to reapportion the legislature. And almost the last bill to be killed was one to raise an additional \$25 million by various forms of taxation.

There was no tax increase. State departments did not receive the appropriations they had asked, and property tax payers did not get the relief they had asked for. Yet for many departments and for tax relief there was a little gain over the preceding biennium.

Reapportionment Amendment Passed

Reapportionment of the legislature was complicated by two factors. First was the desire of each county to keep all the representation it had. Second was the state constitution itself, which had been amended in 1904 to require that each county have one representative in the lower house, and in 1928 to prohibit any county from having more than one senator.

Thus reapportionment required amending the constitution. The Fiftyeighth General Assembly had attempted a constitutional amendment and failed. And the people in the 1960 election had voted down a constitutional convention.

The Fifty-ninth General Assembly soon had more than 20 reapportionment plans spread on the records of one house or the other, including a proposal for a unicameral legislature. Finally adopted was the so-called Shaff plan, for a house of 99 members, one from each county, and a senate of 58 members, apportioned according to population. Only 10 per cent deviation from a unit of 47,544 population per senator was permitted, and to achieve this exactness a crossing of county lines was allowed.

The Shaff amendment to the constitution will become effective only if repassed by the Sixtieth General Assembly in 1963 and approved by popular vote in 1964. If approved, it can take effect in the election of 1966 for election of legislators to serve in 1967. The boundaries of senate districts will be determined by a commission appointed by the Republican and Democratic state central committees, or by the supreme court if the parties should fail to act.

Reapportionment and Redistricting for 1962

The Fifty-ninth General Assembly also had an obligation, under the constitution, to reapportion the legislature according to the 1960 census. In the lower house, each of the nine most populous counties has two representatives. Inasmuch as Johnson County was now the ninth most populous county, the legislature took one representative away from Wapello County and allotted one more to Johnson.

Senators, the constitution provides, must be apportioned according to population, except that no county shall have more than one senator. A plan to meet these requirements was adopted, as shown on pages 38 and 39.

Also the number of congressional districts had to be reduced from eight to seven. The problem was to divide the state into seven districts of nearly equal population and, from the political standpoint, to let the loss of one congressman fall on the minority party. A dozen plans were drawn, and each house passed its own bill. A conference committee report was then adopted. The new districts are shown on page 33.

\$193.800.000 Appropriated

The \$193,800,000 appropriation, without tax increase, followed closely Governor Erbe's recommendation of \$189.4 million. This budget contemplated taking \$14.9 million a year from the state surplus. About \$3.75 million of the legislature's increase resulted from extending budget control to include the liquor control commission.

Proposals to impose new taxes earmarked for purposes such as agricultural land tax credit were discussed until the session ended, but never passed.

Other Actions of Major Interest

Among actions of major interest, the legislature:

Divided the \$116.5 million-a-year road use tax fund, allotting 47 percent to the primary system, 40 per cent to the secondary system, and 13 per cent to the municipal system, after taking between \$3 million and \$4 million off the top for the state's share of the interstate system and certain other expenses.

Approved a constitutional amendment to take the state's judiciary out of partisan politics. This amendment, passed by the 1959 legislature, now goes to a vote of the people.

Changed the name of Iowa State Teachers College to State College of Iowa, and permitted the college to offer a liberal arts degree and a wider range of courses.

Authorized Iowa's participation in the Kerr-Mills plan for federal medical aid to the aged, but made no appropriation to pay the state's share.

Established the Iowa-Nebraska boundary at the center of the main channel of the Missouri River, except that the town of Carter Lake would remain in Iowa. The Nebraska legislature refused to accept this decision.

Permitted cities with more than 75,000 population to enter the federal urban renewal program for low rental housing, on a 60 per cent vote of the people. Excepted sparklers and toy snakes from the prohibition against fireworks.

Permitted store owners to detain and search suspected shop lifters.

Made the oak Iowa's official state tree.

Required the sale of unwanted and unclaimed dogs for medical research.

Required a three-day waiting period for marriage licenses.

Increased the marriage age from 14 to 16 years for girls, and from 16 to 18 for boys.

Exempted savings deposits from 5 mills of the money and credits tax.

Proposals Which Were Not Adopted

Among proposals which were under discussion but not adopted were: A moratorium on all school reorganization for two years; an appointed board of public instruction instead of an elected board; an "implied consent" law requiring blood or urine tests in drunken driving cases; a statewide driver education program; penalties for school boards raising their budgets more than 3 per cent per pupil over the previous year; general school aid for unapproved schools; compulsory brucellosis testing for cattle; a public utilities commission; cash discounts in lieu of trading stamps; a ban of billboards from the interstate highway; legalized cigarette vending machines; a commission to combat communist activities; liquor by the drink; annual sessions of the legislature; voting age lowered to 18; 60-foot-long trucks on the highways; four-year terms for elected state officials; a state civil service system; a change in methods of selecting county attorneys.

This legislative service was established by the general assembly in 1955 and has been in operation since December of that year.

The Research Bureau does legislative research and reference work and drafts bills for legislators. The general policy for the operation of

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the bureau is set by the six-member Legislative Research Committee.

Through a small, professionally trained staff the research bureau furnishes services to individual legislators and conducts research studies at the request of the legislature as a whole, legislative committees, or five-member groups of legislators. The 58th General Assembly provided that joint legislative advisory committees may be appointed to assist the research bureau on any interim research study. These committees report their findings to the legislature.

Research study reports are sent to all members of the legislature. Neither the research committee nor bureau makes recommendations in these reports.

This committee, often referred to as The Interim Committee, acts under authority of sections 2.41, 2.42, 2.43 and 2.44, Code of Iowa, 1958. The committee gathers information relative to budget matters for the purpose of aiding the legislature to properly appropriate money for the functions of the government, and reports its findings to the legislature.

It is the duty of the committee to approve the expenditure of capital improvement funds appropriated by the legislature, if it finds the expenditure of said funds in the best interest of the state. The committee has charge of a general contingent fund, from which it can authorize expenditures for emergencies that may arise during the interim between legislative sessions. Committee members also visit all state owned institutions once each year.

This special committee, with members from the Iowa senate and house, members appointed by the governor, and one from the state department of history and archives, was set up by the Fifty-eighth General Assembly to further Iowa's participation in the nation-wide observance of the Civil War Centennial. It is to continue until adjournment of the Sixty-first General Assembly in 1965.

Memorial services were held in the House Chamber March 21, 1961, commemorating the life, character and public services of former members of the General Assembly who had died since the previous session. Rep. William E. Darrington presided at the memorial session.



Terms of court commence on the second Tuesday in January; the first Tuesday after the first Monday in May; the first Tuesday after the third Monday in September.

Judges are elected for terms of six years. They elect one of their number as chief justice and he holds this office until expiration of his term.

The supreme court has general appellate jurisdiction in both civil and criminal cases. There is no intermediate appellate court. The supreme court has authority to supervise the inferior courts, to prescribe the procedure in matters brought before it and the rules for admission of attorneys to the practice. It also has the power to prescribe rules of civil procedure, and any rules prescribed by the supreme court and reported to the legislature become law unless vetoed by the legislature.










The District Court of Iowa

The district court is the court of general jurisdiction in Iowa in civil and criminal cases and in probate matters. The state is divided into 21 judicial districts, each composed of from one to nine counties. Each district has from two to eight judges. Court holds four or more terms a year in each county seat, and all judges in the district take their turns in each county. District court schedules for the biennium are published in a pamphlet compiled and distributed by the secretary of state, and obtainable from his office. This pamphlet contains also the names of judges, clerks, sheriffs and court reporters.

SUPERIOR COURT

The Iowa statutes provide that any city of 4,000 population, or over, may establish a superior court. It replaces the police court or mayor's court. There is at present one such court located in Keokuk. The judges are elected for terms of four years and receive an annual salary, which is paid quarterly, the first two quarters being paid from the city treasury and the last two quarters from the county treasury in the county in which court is located.

The judges appoint shorthand reporters, whose compensation is fixed by order of the court for the time actually employed.

MUNICIPAL COURT

Any city, having a population of 5,000 or more, as shown by the last preceding United States census, may establish a municipal court. All civil townships in which said city or any part thereof is located shall constitute the municipal court district and its jurisdiction is co-extensive with the territorial limits of the county in which the court is located.

When a municipal court is established, all police courts, mayors' courts, justice of the peace courts and superior courts within the municipal court district are automatically abolished.

POLICE, MAYORS' AND JUSTICE COURTS

Police courts are found in all cities of 15,000 or more population. wherein there is no municipal or superior court. This is a court of record and is supposed to be always open for business. Police courts may be established in cities smaller than 15,000 if so provided by municipal ordinance. Police judges are appointed by the city council unless municipal ordinance provides that they shall be elected.

Mayors' courts are found in all cities and towns under 15,000 in population which do not have a municipal or superior court. The only qualification for the office is being elected to serve as mayor.

The Iowa Code provides for the election of two justices of the peace for each township except in townships where there is a municipal court. But of some 3,000 possible justices in the state, actually there are fewer than 500, because there have been no candidates for the vacancies. The jurisdiction of a justice of the peace is county-wide. A justice can act in place of a mayor, police judge or judge of a municipal or superior court if such judge is absent or unable to act. Justices of the peace are elected for two years. The only qualifications for the office are that the justice be a resident of the township and that he post bond.

The supreme executive power of the state is vested in the Governor, whose term of office is two years.

No person is eligible for the governorship who has not been a citizen of the United States and resident of this state two years next preceding the election, and attained the age of 30 years at the time of said election.

When any office, from any cause, becomes vacant, and no mode is provided by the constitution and laws for filling such vacancy, the governor has power to fill such vacancy.

He appoints all principal officers of the state not elected by the people, and certain officers connected with the state government, by and with the consent of the senate.

In addition, the governor has the following responsibilities as chief executive.

The governor is responsible for taking final action on all laws enacted by the general assembly. He may approve, by signing, a bill passed by both houses or disapprove, by veto, or he may allow a bill to become law without his signature.

Also, the governor may call an extra session of the assembly when he feels the necessity of such action; may order adjournment of the legislature if the members cannot reach agreement when to adjourn; and must report to the legislature the financial condition of the state and his recommendation for any appropriate action concerning the financial status.

The governor has the task of granting or denying executive elemency in the form of restoration of voting rights, commutation of sentences, pardons, and remission of fines and forfeitures.

The specific duties also include being commander-in-chief of the military forces of the state, chairman of the executive council, issuing notary public commissions, issuing land patents, and granting or denying extradition whenever there is a request for a fugitive from justice.

The governor has many obligations as the chief executive to the people of Iowa in addition to the specific statutory duties. These obligations consist of meeting different groups or individuals, to discuss their problems which in some way have effect upon the government; conferring with Iowa's national delegation to coordinate national situations which might affect Iowa; answering approximately 100 letters daily from the electorate; and endeavoring to meet all visitors who wish to come and visit the state capitol and the governor's office.

LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR

The Lieutenant Governor is elected for a term of two years and is required to have the same qualifications, as to age and residence, as the governor.

In case of the death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability of the governor, the powers and duties of that office devolve upon the lieutenant governor, as acting governor.

The lieutenant governor is president of the senate, but can vote only when the senate is equally divided. In case of his death or other disability incapacitating him from discharging the duties of his office, the same devolve upon the president pro tempore of the senate.

He receives the same mileage and expense allowances as a member and double the compensation of a senator. He maintains an office at the capitol building only during the meetings of the general assembly.

The office of Secretary of State is established by the Constitution of Iowa. Its three principal departments are the land office, the division of corporations and trademarks, and the general or custodial office.

Through his general office the Secretary of State serves as custodian of original and official documents of the state, including the constitution, the original statutes of Iowa, authenticated journals of the General Assembly, Administrative Rules and Regulations, and election records. The bonds of various elective and appointive officials are filed in this department.

The state land office maintains the records of the annexation or severance of land by the state and by incorporated cities and towns. Records of original patents issued by the state are also kept in the state land office.

Under the law of Iowa, charters of corporations for pecuniary profit, corporations not for pecuniary profit and cooperative associations are granted by the Secretary of State. Foreign corporations doing business in Iowa are required to obtain permits from that officer. Protective registration of trademarks, labels and forms of advertising is provided by the state department. These statutes are administered by the division of corporations and trademarks.

The Secretary of State is ex-officio chairman of the Iowa Real Estate Commission, is an ex-officio member of the State Executive Council, the State Board of Health, the State Printing Board, the State Permit Board and the Employment Agency Commission.

The Auditor of State is a constitutional official and at least once each year makes full settlement between the state and all state officers and departments and all persons receiving or expending state funds, and makes a complete audit of the books, records and accounts of every department of state. These departments include the office of the governor, the executive council, state comptroller, secretary of state, state treasurer, attorney general, supreme court, superintendent of printing, adjutant general, state board of control and all institutions under its control, department of health, board of regents and all institutions under its control, department of public instruction, department of agriculture, highway commission, liquor commission, state fair board, state tax commission (including sales, income and chain-store tax divisions), commerce commissions, state relief associations, and all other departments, boards and commissions.

The Auditor of State also has charge of the municipal finance department, the county accounting department, the fiscal affairs of all political subdivisions, including schools and school districts and building and loan associations. He appoints the county examiners, the municipal and school examiners, and the examiners of building and loan associations, examining their reports, conferring and discussing with said examiners the affairs of the counties, cities, etc., as disclosed by the reports, advising, suggesting and recommending such changes in policy as he deems expedient. No building and loan association can transact business in the state without a certificate of authority from the Auditor of State.

All offices of the 99 counties are examined annually, as well as all cities and townships of municipal corporations with a population of 2,000 or more and school districts with a population of 5,000 or more, but in cities, towns and school districts, the audits are optional with the governing bodies and are made upon request.

For the purpose of examining, auditing and checking, the various departments of the state may be classified roughly into three groups, viz.: all those departments, boards and commissions located in or adjacent to the state house; the state highway commission and the institutions under control of the board of control and the board of regents; counties, cities, towns and schools.

The Auditor of State submits annual and biennial reports to the governor. The annual reports are on municipal finances, and the biennial reports on the operations of the auditor's office, and on the state and county, and building and loan affairs, are as narrative and statistical as the auditor deems necessary. The audit reports contain schedules, exhibits, comparative figures, etc.

Ex officio, the Auditor of State is a member of the executive council, printing board, geological board, bonus boards and department of health.

The Treasurer of State is a constitutional official. The public revenues of the state are received and disbursed by the treasury department. A record is maintained to show the sources of all income, the funds to which such incomes apply, the dates received, and the amounts received. Disbursements are made only upon warrants issued as certified by the state comptroller. A record is kept of each warrant paid, as well as the date of issuance, date of payments, to whom paid and against which fund such warrant is drawn.

When remittance of state revenue is made by bank draft, check or money order, such items are deposited for collection in a bank or banks in the state, which have previously been duly designated and approved as depositories for state funds.

The Treasurer of State also handles funds diverted under the public fund deposit guarantee acts of the Forty-first General Assembly, reimbursing losses of public funds which may be sustained on deposits in banks placed in receivership for liquidation.

The Treasurer of State is ex-officio treasurer and custodian of the Unemployment Compensation Fund and ex-officio member of the State Board of Health, also, member of the board of trustees and custodian of funds of the Public Safety Peace Officers Retirement System, and member of the State Board of Appeal, World War I Soldiers Bonus Board. The State Treasurer serves as treasurer of the Iowa Centennial Memorial Foundation.

The Treasurer of State shall maintain in the state treasury a cash balance sufficient to pay the anticipated expenditures by the Highway Commission for the ensuing month. When necessary to restore the cash balance in the state treasury, he shall draw against the motor vehicle funds collected by the treasurers of each county of the state in proportion to the amounts in their possession, a sum sufficient in the aggregate to restore said cash balance. Such drafts shall be honored by the treasurer of each county upon presentation.

Acts of the 45th General Assembly Extraordinary Session provide for the refund of the license fee paid when gasoline is not used on the public highways.

Acts of the 55th General Assembly require the Treasurer of State to collect from distributors a license fee of 6c per gallon on all gasoline used in the State of Iowa except when used in federal and state owned cars.

The 53rd General Assembly created a Road Use Tax Fund embracing the following: all net proceeds of registration fees of motor vehicles; all net proceeds of motor vehicle fuel tax or license fees; the compensation tax on motor vehicle certified carriers; all revenues derived from use tax on motor vehicles, trailers, equipment and accessories for same; 10 per cent of net sales tax revenues and any other funds by law credited to the Road Use Tax Fund. The fund is distributed monthly as follows: to Primary Road 42 per cent; to Secondary Road Construction Fund 35 per cent; to Farm-to-Market Road Fund 15 per cent and to the Street Construction Fund of Cities and Towns on a population basis 8 per cent. A new allocation by the 59th General Assembly becomes effective in 1962.

All accounts are audited daily by the Auditor of State.

The constitution provides that there shall be an Attorney General whose term of office shall be two years. As the chief legal officer of the state, the attorney general appears for the state in all actions to which the state is a party, or where the state may be an interested party when in his judgment the interest of the state requires or when he is requested to appear by the governor, the executive council or the general assembly. The attorney general prosecutes and defends all cases for the state before the Iowa supreme court.

A major responsibility of the attorney general is the rendering of opinions on questions of law when he is requested to do so by a member of the general assembly or by a state officer. Formal opinions are published every two years in the "Report of the Attorney General" which is submitted to the governor and which also contains a report on the condition of the office and the other business handled. The greater bulk of legal opinions rendered by the attorney general and his staff, however, are "advisory" letter opinions which are not published in this biennial report.

The attorney general is the supervisor of the 99 county attorneys, in which capacity he gives counsel and assistance to them regarding problems that arise in the course of their official duties.

All contracts, drafts, forms and writings required for use by the state are prepared by the attorney general. He is also, an ex-officio member of the state printing board.

As the ex-officio chairman of the board of law examiners, he is in charge of preparing, giving and grading of the state bar examinations for the admission to the practice of law in Iowa.



The Iowa Department of Agriculture was established by the Fortieth General Assembly in 1923, consolidating several state divisions into one department. The object of the Department is to encourage, promote and advance the interests of agriculture, including horticulture, livestock industry, dairying, cheese making, poultry raising, beekeeping, production of wool and other kindred and allied industries; to promote and devise methods of conducting said industries with a view to increasing production and facilitating an adequate distribution of the same at the least cost to the producer; to administer efficiently and impartially the inspection service of the state as is now or may be hereafter placed under its supervision.

The following organizational chart gives an insight into the scope of duties under the administration of the State Department of Agriculture.



The Secretary of Agriculture is charged with the responsibility of carrying out the objects for which the Department was created; establishing and maintaining such divisions in the department as are necessary; consolidating the inspection service in cooperation with the United States Department of Agriculture; maintaining a weather division, a statistical division and a market news service; causing to be inspected all food establishments, including poultry and poultry products, all dairy and dairy products, restaurants, hotels, lockers, cold storage plants, scales, animal health and intrastate and interstate shipment of livestock.

Every Iowa citizen is in frequent contact with the services performed by the Iowa Department of Agriculture, which affects his life in many ways. It is a regulatory and service agency charged with executing laws designed to provide protection and service to producers, processors, distributors and consumers of agricultural products. Wholesomeness of food and drink, health of animals, the purity and germination of seed, the proper labeling of feed and fertilizer, the accuracy of the devices which measure anything purchased or sold by weight, volume or numerical count and innumerable other phases of daily life are part of the responsibilities of the Iowa Department of Agriculture.

Appointed a farmer member of the State Soil Conservation committee and later served as secretary to the committee. Appointed Assistant Secretary of Agriculture in 1943. Well known for furtherance of soil conservation practices and the organizing of soil districts. Member of the United Presbyterian Church, Chamber of Commerce and Masonic orders. Appointed Secretary of Agriculture July 1, 1950, to fill vacancy. Elected for short term Nov. 7 to Dec. 31, 1950. Re-elected 1952, 1954, 1956, 1958 and 1960. Served until the day of his death, June 14, 1961.

COMMISSION OF AERONAUTICS

Appointed by the Governor with approval of the Senate Term Six Years

The Fifty-first General Assembly created a new aeronautics commission and prescribed its duties and powers; also prescribed registration of persons engaged in aeronautics and operation of aircraft and aeronautics facilities; prescribed penalties and repealed old sections of the laws which authorized a commission of limited power. Commission membership carries no salary. Expenses and \$9 per diem, when engaged in duty for the commission, are authorized with a maximum of \$450 a year per member. The commission numbers five and the following have been appointed by the governor:

The Aeronautics Commission's primary purpose is to promote and foster development of aviation within the state of Iowa and to register all Iowa owned airplanes annually, as well as all Iowa airmen. During 1959 Iowa ranked 13th in the nation in the number of privately owned airplanes—1626. There are approximately 18,700 pilots in the state of Iowa and 7,686 of them are active. While ranking 22nd in population nationally, Iowa ranks fifth in the number of aircraft per capita.

The commission provides the following services to Iowa aviation: airport consultation, contractual agreements with cities and towns for the construction and development of airports, engineering services to cities and towns, Air Age Education, liaison with all flying groups and organizations, accident investigation, information service for all airmen and the enforcement of all the Iowa Aviation Laws.

As a result of the airport development program of the Aeronautics Commission there has been an increase in the number of municipally owned airports from 46 in 1948 to 87 in 1960. Of the total airports in Iowa there are 87 which are lighted all night; in this category, Iowa ranks third in the nation.

Board members receive no compensation. No person shall be eligible for more than two consecutive terms of office. Under the provisions of the law, the board meets at least four times during the year; at least two of such meetings shall be held in the state house. The examination fee for those taking an examination to qualify as certified public accountants is \$25. Persons granted a certificate to practice must fur-nish bond to the board of accountancy in the sum of \$5,000. However, in lieu of the \$5,000 bond, such person may file a certification from an insurance carrier that such person is insured, as an individual or a member of a partnership, under an accountancy liability policy in an equal or greater amount. The board publishes an annual register of all persons authorized to practice accountancy in this state.

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The adjutant general issues and transmits all orders of the commander-in-chief and keeps a record of all appointments of officers commissioned by the governor, of all general and special orders and regulations, and of such matters as pertain to the organization of the military forces and the duties thereof. He has charge of the state arsenal and grounds and all other property of the state kept or used for military purposes. He furnishes at the expense of the state such blanks and forms as are approved by the commander-in-chief. In each year, preceding a regular session of the General Assembly, or at any other time the governor may direct, he makes out a detailed report of the transactions of his office, the expenses thereof and such other matters as shall be required by the commander-in-chief for the period since the last preceding report.

All muster rolls, reports, returns, enlistments, discharges and complete records of the national guard and state guard are filed and made a matter of record in his office. The records of Iowa soldiers for the Civil, Spanish-American and World War I are on file in his office and all information desired from such records is furnished by him. Certificates of military service of Iowa soldiers of the late wars or past service in the organized militia and national and state guard are given by him under the seal of his office. He is disbursing officer of all state appropriations for the use and support of the national guard and as adjutant general all military property is committed to his custody, which he is required to issue for the use of the national guard and state guard, keeping an account of the same. He is required to furnish such reports of the national guard and state guard of the state as the war department may from time to time require.

The Forty-second General Assembly passed a law forming a board of architectural examiners, specifying that all persons who wish to practice architecture in Iowa under the title "architect" must secure a certificate from the board. Authority to revoke certificates is granted the board in case those holding same do not meet the requirements of the law. Three regular meetings are held each year in March, July and October and special meetings on call. Examinations are held in Des Moines in March and October.

The Commission for the Blind, created in 1926, offers services to the blind in Iowa in order that they may receive the necessary training and opportunity to become independent, competitive citizens. There are several departments of the commission through which such help is given.

At the rehabilitation center in Des Moines blind adults are given instruction in the skills of blindness. Courses for students include Braille, travel, home management (cooking, cleaning, shopping and sewing), shop work with regular industrial machinery, typing and personal grooming. There are also other courses in attitudes and techniques that bring to the student a true understanding of blindness that it need not mean helplessness and is, in fact, no more than a physical nuisance if training and opportunity are available. It is important to the blind person (especially the newly blind) to learn that blind persons are actually working as full time, regular electricians, machinists, farmers, lawyers, scientists, teachers, salesmen, etc. For those who are unable to attend the center, the home teaching department gives such instruction.

When a blind person has acquired proficiency in the skills of blindness, the vocational rehabilitation department offers him specific training in a vocational skill. The blind person is then helped in finding and obtaining employment. The library for the blind distributes, as does a public library, reading material to the blind of the state. This material is in the form of Braille books and magazines, recorded books and magazines on talking book records, and taped material. It also distributes talking book machines on which the records may be played. Library service is available to any blind person over five. Homework units are established in the homes of some blind persons, and products produced are marketed throughout the state.

A register of the blind in Iowa showing cause of blindness, age, and other statistical information valuable in program evaluation and planning, is maintained by the commission. There are an estimated 5,500 blind people in Iowa. About 1,500 use the library services; about 250 each year use the vocational rehabilitation program; about 400 people receive instruction through the home teachers; and about 125 are involved in homework production.



The Superintendent of Banking is charged by law with supervision, direction and control of all banks and trust companies operating under state charter, state chartered credit unions and loan companies operating under the Iowa Small Loan Act. Persons or organizations engaged in the sale of written instruments for transmission or payment of money are required by law effective July 4, 1961, to deposit bond with and submit a financial statement to the superintendent of banking. The superintendent of banking is an ex-officio member and chairman of the state banking board, which acts in an advisory capacity to the superintendent in most matters. The deputy superintendent of banking and other members of the staff of the department of banking are appointed by the superintendent of banking subject to approval of the state banking board, which fixes the salaries of such appointees within the limits prescribed by law. All applications to organize state chartered banks, trust companies and credit unions, all applications for licenses to operate under the Iowa Small Loan Act and all applications to operate bank offices and bank parking lot offices are passed upon by the superintendent of banking and the state banking board.

The basic science law enacted by the 46th General Assembly establishes a state board of examiners in the fundamental sciences underlying the practice of the healing arts, providing for its organization and powers, and that certification by such board following examination in the six basic sciences of anatomy, physiology, chemistry, pathology, bacteriology and hygiene is prerequisite to eligibility for examination for a license to practice medicine and surgery, osteopathy, osteopathy and surgery, and chiropractic. It establishes uniform educational standards in the fundamental sciences for all applicants for license to diagnose and treat human ailments. The act does not apply to dentists, dental hygienists, nurses, pharmacists, optometrists, embalmers, podiatrists, barbers or cosmetologists practicing within the limits of their respective professions, or Christian Scientists.

The personnel of the board consists of six members learned in the basic sciences, having no degrees in the healing arts. The members of the board receive as compensation \$15 per diem for the time actually employed and necessary expenses incurred in the discharge of their duties which is paid out of funds in the state treasury received as fees from applicants for examination.

The board meets in Des Moines and there conducts the examinations in the basic sciences four times each year, respectively on the second Tuesday in January, April, July and October. The examination fee is \$20.

The Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds of the state of Iowa, under the direction of the governor, is authorized to provide, furnish and pay for public utilities, service, heat, maintenance, minor repairs, and equipment in operating and maintaining the official residence of the governor of Iowa, located at 2900 Grand Avenue, Des Moines.

It also is the duty of the superintendent, except as otherwise provided by law, to have charge of, preserve and adequately protect the state capitol and grounds, and all other state grounds and buildings at the seat of government and all property connected therewith or used therein or thereon; to see that all parts and apartments of said buildings are properly ventilated and kept clean and in order; to see that all visitors at proper hours are properly escorted over said grounds and through said buildings, free of expense; to have at all times charge of and supervision over the police, janitors, and other employees of this department in and about the capitol and other state buildings at the seat of government; to institute in the name of the state, and with advice and consent of the attorney general, civil and criminal proceedings against any person for injury or threatened injury to any public property under his control; and to keep plans and surveys of the public grounds, buildings and underground constructions at the seat of government; to perform all duties required by law or order of the executive council.

The present staff consists of 121 regular employees. In addition to a janitorial group of 57, there are nine elevator operators, 14 firemen and engineers, 20 watchmen, three carpenters, three painters, four electricians, two gardeners, one mason, one plumber, four garage drivers and mechanics, one payroll clerk, one secretary and one assistant superintendent. The buildings and grounds department, with its handful of artificers, in addition to maintaining the grounds, gives attention to

alterations, repairs, replacements and general maintenance of all buildings on the capitol grounds of nearly 100 acres.

Many visitors trek to this seat of government each day of the year. The increase in number of visitors seems to indicate a growing interest in the affairs of state, as well as a desire to enjoy the beauty of the capitol buildings and grounds. The guest book for 1960 listed more than 75,000 visitors. The first four months of 1961 forecast an all-time record attendance. During the legislative session, the number of daily visitors varied from 500 to 2,300. In the past year there were guests from each of the 50 states and 37 foreign countries. In addition, several hundred foreign student exchange visitors spent a day at the capitol in 1960 and again in 1961.

STATE CAR DISPATCHER

Rex McMahill, Gladbrook, State Car Dispatcher

Authority to assign all state-owned motor vehicles to state officers and employees, and state offices, departments, bureaus and commissions was vested in the Governor by the Forty-eighth General Assembly, effective July 1, 1939. A state car dispatcher was appointed, and all cars were placed under control of this department. In 1941 the Forty-ninth General Assembly provided also for maintenance of all cars and trucks by the state car dispatcher. The costs of maintenance, plus administrative costs and depreciation, for each motor vehicle, are charged back to each department. Rules and regulations for this procedure were approved by the executive council. The car dispatcher department maintains a record of miles driven, cost per mile of each unit, and the overall operation cost.

In 1960 this department had 909 cars and 298 trucks, a total of 1,207 units.

The car dispatcher's office receives requests from the various departments desiring new units and with the approval of the executive council holds lettings, and purchases the new vehicles and sells the old vehicles by sealed bids. This office also approves and supervises all repairs to state vehicles and assists in settling insurance claims.

A complete stock of tires, batteries, anti-freeze, spark plugs and points for state vehicles is maintained at the state garage.

The car dispatcher's office operates under the jurisdiction of the governor's office. The state car dispatcher was appointed by the governor for an indefinite term and has a staff of eight, including office and garage personnel.

Authorized by the Thirty-eighth General Assembly. The examiners are appointed by the chief justice of the supreme court to conduct examinations of those seeking to become certified shorthand reporters. Under the law two of the examiners must be official shorthand reporters and one a practicing attorney of the state.

The Fifty-eighth General Assembly provided that "the terms of the presently elected Commerce Commissioners . . . are hereby extended through June 30, 1963. Within sixty (60) days after the convening of the regular session of the General Assembly in 1963, the Governor shall appoint, with the approval of two-thirds $(\frac{2}{5})$ of the Senate in executive session, successors for the Commerce Commission. One shall be appointed for a term beginning July 1, 1963, and ending June 30, 1965, one for a term beginning July 1, 1963, and ending June 30, 1967, and one for a term beginning July 1, 1963, and ending June 30, 1969." It further provided that "the Iowa State Commerce Commission shall be from the same political party, and each commissioner appointed in or after 1965 shall serve for six (6) years from July 1 of the year of his appointment."

In 1878, the Seventeenth General Assembly created a board of railroad commissioners consisting of three members to be appointed by the governor and confirmed by the executive council. In 1888, the Twenty-second General Assembly passed a law making the commissioners elective. In 1937, the Forty-seventh General Assembly, by House File 133, changed the name from "board of railroad commissioners" to "Iowa State Commerce Commission."

The powers and duties of the Iowa State Commerce Commission are: to generally supervise all railroads in the state, both steam and electric, except street railroads; to inquire into any neglect or violation of the laws of the state by any railroad corporation doing business therein; to make examinations and inspections of the physical condition, conduct and management of such railroads and report their conditions to said companies; to stop and prevent railroad companies, under certain circumstances, from running or passing their trains over unsafe bridges; to adjudge changes in station houses, rolling stock and rates of fare; to pass on necessity for spur tracks to be constructed and maintained not exceeding three miles in length to an existing industry under terms and conditions approved by the commission as set out by law; to make reasonable rules for the crossing of steam and interurban railways and to require, when necessary, interlocking switches at railroad crossings; to make report on the first Monday in December in each year to the govnor of its doings for the preceding year, accompanied by appropriate suggestions and recommendations; to receive, tabulate and report upon the annual reports filed with it by railroad companies; to examine any of the books, papers or documents of any such corporation; to examine under oath employees of such corporation; to issue subpoenas, administer oaths and compel the attendance of witnesses; to make and fix maximum schedules of freight rates for such corporations, such schedules to be deemed reasonable until disapproved; to examine into rates in force, upon complaint that the rate charged by a railroad company, or that the maximum rates fixed by the commission are unreasonably high or discriminating, and to fix the rate again, which must not be higher than any rate established by law, such decision of the commission being prima facie evidence that the rate so made is a reasonable maximum rate; to bring suits to enforce its orders; to inquire into the man-agement of the business of such carriers and to obtain from them full and complete information necessary to enable the commissioners to carry out the objects of the law; to hear, investigate and determine all complaints alleging unreasonable rates, unjust discrimination, undue preference, violation of the long and short haul clause, or other infractions of the commission law, and make proper orders thereupon; to establish joint through rates, upon application, over two or more connecting lines; and to have the same authority over express companies as the act confers concerning railroads.

Before a railroad company may appropriate coal, coke or oil received for shipment, it must first secure the written consent of the commerce commission.

Before any railroad company may condemn lands for additional depot grounds, or for straightening or relocating track, the permission of the commission must be obtained. Interlocking switches may be placed at grade railroad crossings or draw bridges, thus obviating the necessity of stopping trains before passing over such grade crossings or draw bridges, but before the interlocking switch may be used consent of the commission must be obtained.

The Thirty-fifth General Assembly, 1913, gave to the commission the power to grant to individuals or corporations "engaged in the manufacture, sale or distribution for sale of electric current for light, power or heating purposes, the right within the state, except in cities and towns, to erect and maintain poles, wires, towers, fixtures and other necessary construction for the purpose of conducting electricity for lighting, power and heating purposes, over, along and across any public lands, highways or streams or the land of any person or persons, and to acquire the necessary interests in real estate therefor." It also provided that transmission lines proceeding under the provisions of the law should be subject to "such reasonable regulations as the commission may from time to time prescribe."

The commission is directed by an act of the Thirty-ninth General Assembly, 1921, to "undertake and carry forward such investigation and preparation as shall be necessary to properly represent the interests of the state in connection with the valuation of the property of common carriers now being conducted by the interstate commerce commission."

An act of the Forty-sixth General Assembly, 1935, amended by the Forty-eighth General Assembly, 1939, provides that the operators of grain elevators must be licensed in order to receive grain for storage. It also makes provisions for using warehouse receipts issued by the warehouseman on his own products and on the products of others as collateral for financing loans. The act also provides for storage of other agricultural products, and products principally consumed on farms, in warehouses of types different from that of grain elevators which cover such products as wool, canned goods, sugar, seed, commercial feed, etc. Warehousemen must furnish approved bond to cover their operations,

The Fortieth General Assembly, 1923, conferred on the commission the power to issue certificates authorizing motor carriers to operate over the public highways of the state, upon a showing that the proposed service would promote "the public convenience" and authorized the board to prescribe rules and regulations for the operation of motor vehicles used by such carriers "for the protection and safety of the public." The Firty-first General Assembly, 1925, revised the laws on the subject, but left their administration with the railroad commission.

The Forty-third General Assembly, 1929, provided for the supervision or regulation by the commission of persons operating motor trucks principally used for public transporation of freight for compensation, not operating over regular routes nor between fixed termini.

The Forty-fourth General Assembly, 1931, provided that pipe lines shall be subject to regulation by the board under a permit issued by the board.

The Fifty-third General Assembly, 1949, provided for the supervision or regulation by the commission of persons operating motor trucks used for transportation of freight for compensation under contract.

The Fifty-seventh General Assembly, 1957, provided that persons engaged in transportation for compensation of liquid products in bulk upon any highway in this state should be required to obtain from the commission a certificate declaring that public convenience and necessity require such operation.

The Fifty-eighth General Assembly, 1958, created a highway grade crossing safety fund, which the commission was empowered to administer. On application, the commission will consider the need and benefits accruing to the railroad and governmental unit, as to public use, and after a hearing is held the commission will determine the allocation of costs between interested parties, the balance to be paid from the highway grade crossing fund. Provided, however, no part of the fund may be used in connection with the improvement or construction of a federal aid highway.

Commerce Counsel

The Thirty-fourth General Assembly, 1911, created the office of commerce counsel, to be appointed by the Iowa state commerce commission for a term of four years, subject to confirmation by the Senate. The law provides that the counsel may appoint assistants, subject to the approval of the commissioners.

The duties of the office briefly are as follows: to be legal advisor of the lowa state commerce commission; to investigate and present matters with reference to intrastate rates, and prosecute same before the Iowa state commerce commission or before any court to which same may be taken; to investigate on his own motion, or at request of the state commerce commission, all matters involving interstate rates in which the people of Iowa are interested or affected, and present same to the interstate commerce commission and prosecute to final determination; to act as attorney and counsel for and represent the Iowa state commerce commission in all courts of this state or the United States, in which the validity of any order of the state commerce commission is in issue; to institute and prosecute in any of the courts any and all suits necessary for proper enforcement of any rule or order of the said Iowa state commerce commission or make defense therein wherever said rule or order may be questioned or involved.

The state comptroller audits all demands by the state and preaudits all accounts submitted for the issuance of state warrants; controls the payment of all moneys into the state treasury and all payments from the state treasury; prescribes all accounting and business forms and the system of accounts and reports of financial transactions by all departments and agencies of the state government other than those of the legislative branch; keeps a central budget and proprietary control accounts of the state government; establishes a reasonable cash revolving fund for each department or institution for disbursement purposes where needed; has the custody of all books, papers, records, documents, conveyances, leases and other documents appertaining to the fiscal affairs and property of the state which are not required to be kept in some other office; apportions the interest of the permanent school fund; prepares biennially a list of all standing appropriations and furnishes a report of same to each member of the legislature; prepares the budget document and drafts the legislation to make it effective; reviews such requests for allotments as are submitted to the governor for approval; determines the need for all transfers of appropriations submitted to the governor; makes such investigations of the organizations, activities and methods of procedure of the several departments and establishments as he may be called upon to make by the governor and executive council or the legislature; furnishes any committee of either house of the legislature having jurisdiction over revenues or appropriations such aid and information regarding financial affairs of the government as it may request; prepares and submits to the governor and the legislature, on or before Dec. 1 of each year, an annual report setting forth in detail and in summary form the financial condition and operations of the government; and prepares such other reports as the governor or the general assembly may from time to time require of him.

The Conservation Commission makes recommendations for the acquisition of state parks and preserves, forests and other state conservation areas, and is charged with the duty of administering same. The com-mission is charged with the duty of protecting, propagating, increasing and preserving the fish, game and fur-bearing animals, and protecting the birds of the state and the enforcement of laws relating thereto. The administration and enforcement of laws relating to boats and navigation in the state-owned inland waters of the state is a duty of the commission. The commission has jurisdiction over the state-owned meandered lakes and streams of the state and the construction of dams and other improvements relating to such waters.

Commission Jurisdiction

The State Conservation Commission has jurisdiction over the following lands and water areas of the state: Eleven meandered streams, 800 miles; 123 wildlife refuges, 34,786.19 acres; 24 artificial lakes, 3,210 acres; 72 natural lakes, 43,235 acres; 193 public hunting grounds, 107,127 acres.





The Board of Control of State Institutions was created under the provisions of Chapter 118, laws of the Twenty-seventh General Assembly, which, with the amendments thereto, clothes the board with full power to manage, control and govern the institutions under its jurisdiction, subject only to the limitations contained in the act.

The board of control was organized on April 6, 1898, and took full control of the institutions as provided by statute on July 1, 1898.

The board is required to inspect county and private institutions in which mentally ill persons are kept.

The board is required to investigate the management and financial conditions of the state institutions under its control, to determine questions as to the sanity of patients in state hospitals, and to determine when persons shall be admitted to them as state charges, and is required to divide the state into hospital districts.

The board is required to make biennial reports to the governor and to the legislature, showing the cost of operating the institutions for the preceding two years, and to visit all institutions twice a year. Some member of the board or its agent is required to visit each hospital for the mentally ill once each month.

The board is required to meet the superintendents and other heads of institutions in quarterly conferences, to gather statistics, to require official bonds of certain institution officers, to have made an annual inventory of all the stores of the institutions, to fix the annual salaries of officers and employees not fixed by law, and to perform other duties provided by law.

The Board of Control of State Institutions, comprised of three members appointed by the governor for six-year terms, has the broad responsibility of administering, controlling, and operating the following 14 state institutions: six mental institutions, three adult correctional institutions, two juvenile correctional institutions, two children's institutions, and one veterans' home. These institutions are:



The Iowa Annie Wittenmyer Home, Davenport; James F. Holmes, superintendent.

State Juvenile Home, Toledo; Jesse M. Lamm, Ed. D., superintendent.

State Veterans Institutions:

Iowa Soldiers Home, Marshalltown; Ward M. Loftus, Commandant.

The Board of Control employs three directors to administer the institutions in their respective specialties:

The Director of Mental Health: James O. Cromwell, M.D., in charge of: the four mental health institutes located at Cherokee, Clarinda, Independence, and Mt. Pleasant; the two schools and hospital for mentally retarded and epileptics at Glenwood and Woodward.

The Director of Correctional Institutions: Benjamin F. Baer, in charge of adult correctional institutions at Ft. Madison, Anamosa, and Rockwell City; and two juvenile correctional institutions at Eldora and Mitchellville.

The Director of Child Welfare: Mrs. Elizabeth Palmer, in charge of the two homes for children located at Davenport and Toledo.

The Board of Control directly administers the home for veterans at Marshalltown.

Iowa Mental Health Institutions

Iowa's six mental institutions are administered by the state board of control under the direction of James O. Cromwell, M.D., appointed by the board as Director of Mental Health.

Four institutions for the care and treatment of the mentally ill are as follows:

Cherokee Mental Health Institute: Opened Aug. 18, 1902, as an institution for the care and treatment of mentally ill and inebriates. Now a modern psychiatric hospital, it has a fully accredited training program for psychiatric residents, and provides both in-patient and out-patient treatment and care services.

Clarinda Mental Health Institute: Admitted its first patients in 1888, when 222 male patients were transferred from the Mt. Pleasant Mental Health Institute. Now a modern psychiatric hospital for the care and treatment of the mentally ill and inebriates, it has recently been cited for achievement by its operation known as The Clarinda Plan.

Independence Mental Health Institute: The second mental institution in Iowa, was opened May 1, 1873, for the care of the mentally ill and inebriates. Now a modern psychiatric hospital, it has a fully accredited residency training program for psychiatrists and a nursing affiliate program for training in psychiatric nursing. It is one of the four mental hospitals in the entire United States which has an approved residential program in pastoral psychiatry. The hospital also has an accredited children's unit of 50 beds for the care and treatment of emotionally disturbed and mentally ill children.

Mt. Pleasant Mental Health Institute: The first patient was admitted in February, 1861, to this, the oldest mental institution in Iowa, and the second oldest west of the Mississippi River. Much new construction is replacing the old dilapidated buildings. Now a psychiatric institution for the treatment and care of the mentally ill and inebrlates, it constantly upgrades its standards as facilities and personnel become available.

Glenwood State School: This institution, operated for the care, treatment, and training of the mentally retarded, is located on the site of the western branch of the Iowa Soldiers Orphans Home, which institution opened in 1866 and operated until 1874, when the children were transferred to the Iowa Soldiers Orphans Home at Davenport. The first mentally retarded patients were admitted in 1876 to the institution then known as the asylum for feeble minded children. Great strides have been made in the past two years in the upgrading of this institution as a modern treatment, care, and training facility for the mentally retarded.

Woodward State Hospital and School: This institution admitted its first patient in 1917. An institution for the care and treatment of the mentally retarded and epileptic, it has placed emphasis in recent years on dynamic improvement of patients physically, mentally, emotionally, educationally, so that fluid movement back to the community and family living can be effected.

Iowa Correctional Institutions

Iowa's correctional institutions are administered by the state board of control under the direction of Benjamin F. Baer, appointed in June, 1960, by the board as Director of Correctional Institutions.

Three adult correctional institutions, one for women, and two for men, are as follows:

The Women's Reformatory, Rockwell City: Admitted to the reformatory are all females over the age of 18 and married females under the age of 18, who are convicted in the district court of offenses punishable in excess of 30 days. Many short-term offenders are sent to the reformatory instead of being detained in county jails. Opening in 1918, the reformatory received its first 22 women inmates by transfer from The Men's Reformatory at Anamosa. The women's section of the men's reformatory had been established in 1900 and was known as the Iowa Industrial Reformatory for Females. When the new institution was opened in 1918, the name was changed to The Women's Reformatory.

The State Penitentiary, Fort Madison: The state penitentiary was established in 1839, the year after Iowa became a territory, and seven years before it became a state. First offenders over the age of 30 and all recidivists are received on order of the court. The institution has achieved high ranking in correctional fields as a result of advances made in recent years. Outbreaks have been few and escapes infrequent. Selected men are permitted to work on prison farms, away from the enclosure. Some are allowed to work in other state institutions, where they live on the honor system.

As far as possible, all inmates are assigned to work in industries or in various sections of the prison. A special committee interviews all new admissions with a view to assigning them to the most suitable industry. Rehabilitation is strongly stressed in all activities. Radio headphones are installed in each cell and programs are furnished from central control. Athletics includes baseball, kittenball, tennis, boxing, wrestling, horseshoe pitching, football, and basketball. A good library is well patronized, and cinema and television are available at certain times. Training in industrial shops includes: furniture making, brush and broom, textile, garment, dry cleaning, shoe, book restoration, and braille book work. Extensive farming is carried on at the institution and at other prison farms.

The Men's Reformatory, Anamosa: The Men's Reformatory was founded in 1872, the first prisoner being admitted in May, 1873. Commitment is by court order, and first offenders under the age of 31 years are received. As a maximum security hospital for the criminal insane, it receives male patients from the general population and from other board of control institutions. Some of these patients are not classified as criminal, but are transferred for maximum security. With a total acreage of 1,536, the reformatory is operating under the Farm Conservation program, and a large herd of beef cattle is maintained. Modern machinery is making possible the expansion of industries. Inmate recreation includes athletics, library, moving pictures, radio, television, and hobbies. Parole work is supervised by the board of parole in Des Moines.

A complete psychiatric unit was established in 1958 at the maximum security hospital in the men's reformatory, for psychiatric diagnosis, care and treatment of the resident population in the security unit, and in the resident population of the reformatory. Included in its service is provision of psychiatric services to all non-mental board of control institutions through psychiatric teams stationed at Eldora and Ft. Madison. In 1960, a part-time out-patient parolee clinic was established in Des Moines to serve the parolees from the training school at Eldora. The clinic team in Des Moines comprises a psychologist, a social worker, and the consulting services of the psychologist from Anamosa.

Administratively, psychiatric services to non-mental institutions function under the three directors of board of control institutions, namely: the director of mental health, the director of child welfare, and the director of correctional institutions. The director of correctional institutions serves as executive secretary of this joint committee.

Industries Section: As a part of the rehabilitation and in-training programs of the Iowa Correctional Division, an industries section is operated at Fort Madison and at Anamosa under William Burke, director of industries.

Industries section includes: furniture manufacture and repair for tax supported governmental bodies, textiles, book binding, shoe manufacture and repair, tailoring, printing, the manufacture of license plates, tire recapping, and canning.

Two juvenile correctional institutions, one for girls and one for boys, are as follows:

Training School for Girls, Mitchellville: This was founded in 1880. A bill to establish the school was passed by the legislature and signed by the governor in 1868. The law provided for receiving both boys and girls in the institution, but it was decided to receive only boys until they could be moved to the training school for boys at Eldora. The institution receives delinquent and incorrigible girls between the ages of 10 and 18. Commitment is from the district, superior, juvenile, and municipal courts. Transfers from other state institutions under the jurisdiction of the board of control may be made. Care includes maintenance, academic, vocational and religious training—in short, all care provided by a home and school, plus medical, dental, and psychological services.

Recreation includes: playground, dramatics, vocational and instrumental music, parties, picnics, movies, dances, roller skating, games, radio, television, record playing, school programs, occasional outside talent programs, and occasional excursions off campus. Academic instruction includes ungraded through the twelfth grades. Vocational training includes domestic sciences and cosmetology.

Training School for Boys, Eldora: This was founded Oct. 4, 1868. The institution receives incorrigible and delinquent boys on commitment or admission by court order. Care provided includes: maintenance, clothing, medical, dental, surgical, psychological and sociological testing and counselling. Education includes regular grade school through high school and vocational education. Work details include: tailoring, mending room, auto mechanics, body and fender, machine shop, plumbing, dairy, carpentry, painting, laundry, power house, florist, wood working, fireman, farming, and gardening. Recreation is provided and includes: athletics, motion pictures, glee club, choir, individual instrumental instruction, swimming pool, home life, interscholastic high school competition.

Juvenile Parole Supervision: Parole agents function administratively under the director of correctional institutions, with direct case work under Maurice Beale, supervisor of field services.

Mitchellville: Three parole agents provide release placement and parole supervision for the girls leaving Mitchellville.

Eldora: Five parole agents provide release placement and parole supervision for the boys leaving Eldora.

Iowa Children's Homes

Iowa's two homes for children, located at Davenport and Toledo, are administered by the state board of control, under the direction of Mrs. Elizabeth Palmer, who is appointed by the board as director of child welfare.

The Iowa Annie Wittenmyer Home, Davenport: This institution admitted its first charges in July, 1864. The cottage type living arrangement prevails. Education provided at the home includes pre-school through the ninth grade. Students in the senior high school grades attend the Davenport high school. Vocational education and training are also provided. Children are placed in foster homes under the supervision of social workers. This placement may include adoption or boarding home care. Children may also be returned to their own homes.

State Juvenile Home, Toledo: This home was founded Sept. 1, 1920, for the care of neglected, dependent, and delinquent children. Since that time, a total of 3,293 boys and girls have been cared for in this home. Group living, planned by cottages according to sociological and chronological development, is arranged. Academic and vocational education are provided at the institution. Junior and senior high school students attend the Toledo public high school. Children are placed in foster homes or are returned to their own homes. This placement is under the supervision of social workers. Older children are also placed on jobs to enable them to become self-supporting. A few go on to college.

Iowa Soldiers Home

Iowa Soldiers Home. Marshalltown: The board of control manages the Iowa Soldiers Home at Marshalltown, founded in 1887. Honorably discharged United States soldiers, sailors, marines, or feminine members of the armed forces who served in any of its wars, and wives or widows of veterans, are admitted to this institution. The method of admission: an affidavit is signed by two members of the soldiers' relief commission of the applicant's home county, stating that such veteran is a resident of such county, and has been a resident of the State of Iowa for three years or more immediately preceding the date of application; that the applicant is unable to earn a livelihood; and that his income is less than \$1200 per annum, exclusive of pensions, compensation and war risk insurance payments. The care provided is domiciliary and nursing. Recreation includes: movies every week from September to June in the chapel and hospital, billiards and pool, card rooms in all buildings, cribbage tournaments, croquet, horseshoes, band concerts in summer, parties by various veterans' organizations and auxiliaries during the year, television sets in every building and fishing in the Iowa River.

The Iowa Employment Security Commission, under Chapter 96, Code of Iowa, administers a program designed to promote security against unemployment. This program assists all types of workers in finding jobs and helps employers to secure qualified employees.

The Employment Security Law levies a tax upon employers of four or more workers in commercial and industrial employment areas. This money accumulates in a Trust Fund and is paid to eligible unemployed workers as protection against severe economic hardship while they look for other jobs.

In Iowa each employer is rated on his actual experience with unemployment. If his employment record is stable, his contribution may be lower than the standard rate. This plan provides another strong incentive to employers to provide steady work and avoid lay-offs. For several years almost one-half of all covered employers have so stabilized their employment that they have not been required to pay any state contribution tax. The Trust Fund balance at the close of the 1960 fiscal year was \$114,071,111.

Workers who are employed by liable employers build up wage credits, and if they become unemployed they may file a claim at their local employment service office. When a worker meets all the eligibility requirements and no suitable work is available, he is paid weekly benefits based upon his earnings and his family status for as many as 26 weeks in a 12-month period. During the fiscal year ending June 30, 1960, the amount of Iowa unemployment benefit payments totaled \$12,396,683.

The Iowa State Employment Service, established by legislative action in 1915, was put under the administrative control of the Iowa Employment Security Commission by the enactment of the Iowa Employment Security Law in 1936. Thirty-four offices located in key cities provide an employment service to all Iowa. Staffed by career professionals, selected from registers established by the Iowa Merit System, these offices specialize in employment problems. The employment service offices in Iowa are part of a Federal-State system of 1,800 public employment offices.

Placement service, job counseling, and aptitude and proficiency testing are available for any type of occupation. The Iowa State Employment Service gathers, analyzes and disseminates labor market information and cooperates with other community groups to solve employment problems. Special service is offered to veterans, older workers, youth and the handicapped. During the 1960 fiscal year 123,712 job placements were made.

Under terms of an agreement with the U.S. Department of Labor, the Employment Security Commission administers the payment of unemployment insurance to ex-servicemen and to unemployed federal civilian employees under Title XV of the Federal Social Security Law.

The Commission administers the Iowa Public Employees Retirement System, Chapter 97B, Code of Iowa, which includes the collection of employer and employee contributions, the taking of applications and the payment of retirement benefits to public employees.

Chapter 97C, Code of Iowa, together with Title II of the Federal Social Security Act, extends to employees of the state and its political subdivisions the protections and benefits of the Federal Social Security Act. In administering this program, the Commission is responsible for requiring the filing of Social Security wage reports and for the collecting of Social Security taxes from the State of Iowa and its political subdivisions.

Business of the Executive Council

Among the duties placed upon the executive council by the laws of Iowa are the following: To act upon all state activities and to notify all interested persons of action taken thereon; to determine the value at which property may be taken by Iowa corporations and amount of stock which may be issued on account thereof; to approve articles of incorporation and by-laws of building and loan associations, and plan for liquidation of said associations; to approve property purchases and acceptance of gifts; to authorize department leases; to approve the issuance of patents, corrected patents and easements; to approve and purchase all state vehicles; to authorize and pay special assessments; to authorize and pay court costs, and special attorney general fees; to authorize condemnation proceedings; to authorize payment of institutional vouchers; approve bank depositories of public funds; authorize issuance of "dummy" plates; approve compromise tax settlements; reimburse school district taxes under Sec. 284, Code 1958; to purchase all stores, supplies and furniture for the state departments and offices; to execute contracts for fuel, lights and repairs; to approve all requisitions, issue purchase orders and authorizations; to have custody of supplies for state offices and commissions; the canvass of votes cast for state and district officers; the declaration of changes in classifications of cities; the assignment of office rooms to state officers; the approval of out-of-state travel; the appointment of the board of examiners of mine

inspectors; the approval of plans for state buildings; the authorization of printing pamphlets, posters and booklets for various departments.

The secretary of the executive council is also secretary of the conservation commission and of the board of engineering examiners. He also has the direct supervision of the state postoffice employees and the telephone office employees.

Report of Executive Council Secretary

Section 19.6, Code of Iowa, 1958, requires that a report of the secretary of the executive council be published in the Iowa Official Register. That portion of the report of the secretary dealing with matters of general interest is presented here. Other matters required in the report as to Iowa cities and the official canvass of Iowa election results are presented in tables elsewhere.

There were 51 council meetings held during the year 1959, and 10 special meetings. In 1960 there were 46 council meetings and 10 special meetings.

It is the duty of the Geological Survey to collect, interpret, and report information on basic geologic features of the state. These include surface and underground water supplies, coal, gypsum, sand and gravel, ceramic clay and shale, limestone and dolomite, raw materials for the manufacture of cement, ore deposits, and other mineral resources. Studies are continuing on the oil and gas possibilities in Iowa, particularly in the southwestern portion of the state, and the geological sections of the oil and gas law are being administered. Geological studies of dam sites are made on some of the flood control and recreational prospects of federal and state agencies, and reports on the mineral resources of such reservoir areas are frequently prepared.

The Survey is the repository for all basic geologic data obtained in the state.

Collection and dissemination of data on water wells, water levels, stream flow and sediment loads, lake levels, and other hydraulic data are accomplished in cooperation with the Water Resources Division of the U. S. Geological Survey. Topographic mapping of the state, by quadrangles approximately 220 square miles in area, is being conducted in cooperation with the Topographic Division of the U. S. Geological Survey.

As a part of the result of its work, the Survey has published 38 volumes of annual reports and accompanying scientific papers. These publications include special reports and maps covering the geology and mineral production of all but six of the 99 counties, as well as special reports on mineral production of all sorts. There are also three technical papers on Iowa coal and six water-supply bulletins. Geological and mineral resources maps of the state have been prepared. Other summaries of specialized geological studies have been published in geological periodicals. These published reports, together with the large file of unpublished data obtained during more than half a century of continued study, serve as a reliable basis for up-to-the-minute reports to federal, state and municipal agencies and to private concerns and individuals who request and need the available information on water supply and other mineral resources of Iowa. Information, advice and direct assistance in the increasing development of large water supplies are freely given to the limit of funds and personnel.

Under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Health, the State Department of Health works with individuals and organizations throughout the state to improve the health of all Iowa citizens.

Every day the Health Department gets reports of communicable disease from physicians and health officers throughout the state. Members of the Division of Preventable Diseases make field investigations to study the cause of outbreaks of disease and to assist with control measures. These staff members cooperate at all times with local physicians and health officers to prevent the spread of infection.

Laboratory services for the diagnosis and control of disease are available to Iowa medical personnel, hospitals, laboratories and health organizations through the Hygienic Laboratory at Iowa City.

In the field of tuberculosis control the Health Department cooperates with the Iowa Tuberculosis and Health Association to provide three mobile X-ray units, and patch and intradermal tuberculin testing. During 1960 about 48,000 Iowans were X-rayed and about 700 cases of suspected tuberculosis found.

Venereal disease is reported to the Division of Venereal Disease, which traces the sources and contacts to get them under early treatment and so render them non-infectious.

The public health veterinarian is concerned with diseases spread from animal to man. He assists local health authorities in setting up control programs to prevent the spread of rabies, brucellosis, trichinosis and other animal diseases. An educational program conducted by the Division of Cancer Control promotes early diagnosis, prevention and treatment of cancer. The division gives financial assistance to tumor clinics located throughout the state.

Iowa children and mothers are given special attention through the Division of Maternal and Child Health. Physicians, nurses, hospital staffs, parents and children are contacted in an effort to better the health and reduce the death rates of mothers and their children.

The Division of Dental Hygiene is in the 32nd year of its long-range program with all Iowa school children to advance the prevention and care of dental diseases. It seeks to promote fluoridation of community water supplies in an effort to reduce tooth decay.

As the population grows older, the greater incidence of heart and chronic diseases gets more attention from the Health Department. A Division of Gerontology, Heart and Chronic Diseases promotes better facilities for the rehabilitation of our senior citizens.

Some 57 county nurses and 227 school and industrial nurses are directed by the Division of Public Health Nursing. They work with physicians, dentists, sanitarians, hospitals, welfare agencies and other community groups to improve family and community health.

Improved family and community nutrition is stressed through statewide educational programs and local health workers. Public health trained nutritionists assist in writing guides for program planning, give consultation service to hospitals without dietitians, and dietary consultation to nursing homes, children's homes and day-care centers.

The 166 Iowa hospitals and 727 nursing and custodial homes are inspected annually and licensed under the Division of Hospital Services. This division administers the Federal Grants-in-Aid Program of the Hill-Burton program to help local communities in the construction of hospitals and health facilities. All planning, construction and equipping of these projects is supervised to insure compliance with federal standards and state licensing requirements.

The Division of Public Health Engineering supervises construction, maintenance and operation of the 731 public water supplies and 408 sewerage and refuse disposal systems throughout the state. It advises local boards of health on enforcement of sanitation laws and regulations.

A major function of this division is the enforcement of the stream and lake pollution law, issuing orders to clean up existing pollution and issuing permits for new sewer installations.

Other functions include administration of the Mobile Home Park Law, including the regulation of sanitation and approval of licenses; general supervision over local enforcement of the housing law; inspection of child-care institutions and public swimming pools. The division also prepares amendments to the State Plumbing Code.

Grade A milk supplies are inspected and their sanitary quality certified to the State Department of Agriculture and to other states where shipped.

An advisory service is offered on control of occupational diseases caused by industrial operations. The division cooperates with the federal government and with other state agencies in studies of air pollution and potential hazards resulting from exposures to radioactive materials. An important service of the Health Department is the registration, collection, preservation and certification of records of birth, death, fetal death, marriage and divorce and activities related to those records and functions. The Division of Vital Statistics annually receives about 130,000 records to tabulate, analyze and publish.

The licenses of approximately 4,400 Iowa barbers and 11,784 cosmetologists are annually renewed through the Health Department. In addition, the Division of Barbering annually licenses 2,125 barber shops and the Division of Cosmetology does the same for 20 cosmetology schools. Sanitary inspections are made regularly of all barber shops and beauty salons.

The Division of Licensure maintains a permanent registry for licenses. Applications for examination and licenses are received for the Boards of Examiners for Medicine, Osteopathy, Chiropractic, Podiatry, Optometry, Dentists and Dental Hygiene, Embalming and Funeral Directors and Optometrists.

Health information is distributed through newspapers, radio, television, films, conferences, exhibits, lectures and other media. The Division of Health Education cooperates with other divisions, regional health services and county and city health departments to develop health programs in schools, communities, county and state organizations.

The advisory board of the Iowa Pharmaceutical Association annually recommends to the governor a list of six persons for appointment (Code of Iowa, 1954, section 147.12), who have the qualifications prescribed for examiners of the profession, and the governor in making the appointment to the board shall select one of the persons so named. Confirmation by the senate is not required.

It is the duty of the pharmacy examiners to enforce the laws governing the uniform narcotics act which controls the use of morphine, cocaine, marijuana, and other narcotic drugs of both illegal and legal distribution.

It is the duty of the board to enforce the drug store licensing act. The original retail drug license and wholesale drug license fee is \$25; the renewal fee is \$15.

It is the duty of the board to enforce the laws governing the sale and distribution of drugs for the licensing of pharmacists. The examination fee is \$10. A record is kept of all pharmacists licensed and a fee of \$5 is required each year for the renewal of certificates; \$2.50 of this amount is retained by the pharmacy department and \$2.50 is remitted to the treasurer of the Iowa Pharmaceutical Association. Itinerant vendors of medicines are licensed by the department and the license fee is \$50 per year.

The Iowa Board of Nurse Examiners was made a department separate from the State Department of Health by S. F. 50, passed by the Fortysixth General Assembly and became effective upon publication. The board gives examinations and issues licenses to two classifications of nurses: 1. registered nurse; 2. licensed practical nurse. Examinations are held semi-annually in Des Moines.

The examination fee is \$10; endorsement fee \$10; certification fee \$5, and annual renewal of license \$2.

Through the executive secretary, the board keeps records pertaining to the licensing of nurses in the state, receives all applications for licensure, collects all fees and issues all licenses.

It is the duty of the board to enforce the laws governing the practice of nursing in this state.

Since 1907, when the first regulatory measure affecting the practice of nursing in Iowa was enacted, 33,689 nurses have become registered, giving them the right to use the title Registered Nurse. At the close of the 1961 fiscal year 22,105 registered nurses had renewed their licenses.

Since 1949, when regulatory measures were enacted pertaining to the practice of practical nursing, 2,660 individuals have qualified to use the title Licensed Practical Nurse in Iowa. At the close of the 1961 fiscal year 2,063 licensed practical nurses had renewed their licenses.

The board sets minimum standards for the 24 schools of professional nursing and the eight schools of practical nursing. Schools of nursing are usually visited annually by a representative of the board.

History and Development of State Highway Commission

The law creating a state highway commission in Iowa was adopted by the general assembly in 1904. That law stated that Iowa State College should act as a state highway commission. Acting under this law, the state board of education appointed Dean Anson Marston of the engineering division, and Dean Charles F. Curtis of the agricultural department of Iowa State College as the directors of the commission. Thomas H. MacDonald was appointed by the directors as secretary and engineer for the commission. The duties of the commission at that time were to make investigations and studies of highway conditions and to advise local authorities with respect to highway improvements.

This organization continued until 1913, when the Thirty-fifth General Assembly passed an act creating a state highway commission of three members and separated the commission from Iowa State College. The commission was composed of the dean of engineering and one member appointed from each political party.

In 1927 the general assembly passed an act, which now appears as chapter 307 of the Code of 1958, creating a state highway commission of five members, all to be appointed by the governor, not more than three of whom could be from the same political party.

The law of 1927 placed the primary road system under the direct control and supervision of the state highway commission. Thomas H. Mac-Donald, who became secretary and engineer of the highway commission in 1904, was designated as chief engineer of the highway commission in 1913 and continued in that capacity until 1919, when he resigned and F. R. White was appointed to the position.

E. F. Koch was appointed chief engineer in October, 1952, upon the retirement of Mr. White.

When Mr. Koch resigned on March 31, 1954, John G. Butter was named chief engineer. He served until his retirement, February 1, 1960, when L. M. Clauson was appointed chief engineer.

Organization of State Highway Commission

In August, 1959, the highway commission adopted a new organization plan. Under this plan, put into operation on Feb. 1, 1960, the functions, duties, and personnel of the commission were centralized under three divisions. These divisions are Engineering, Planning and Services, each headed by an engineer.

Outline of State Highway Commission Work

The commission is charged with all matters pertaining to the expenditure of state and federal funds for the improvement and maintenance of primary highways, including Interstate. It must conduct the affairs of the organization, interpret and apply the directives set forth by the statutes, make policy, control and direct, through the office of the Chief Engineer, the activities and duties of the highway commission staff.

The Highway Commission's duties are five-fold:

First: Plan, design, build and maintain all primary roads.

Second: Mark and sign primary roads for safe operation.

Third: Cooperate with county authorities in approving plans and contracts for secondary road construction.

Fourth: Approve budgets for secondary roads.

Fifth: Provide engineering assistance to other state departments.

Commission meetings are held every two weeks at the main office headquarters in Ames. Commission members transact necessary business and the chief engineer, as secretary, keeps official minutes, which are preserved as public records. All business meetings are conducted under the "open door policy."

The commission is responsible for all construction and maintenance work on the primary road system. It conducts surveys, prepares plans and specifications, purchases right of way, lets contracts and supervises the construction work. It has charge of the expenditure of all federal aid road funds allotted to the State of Iowa. After the road is built, it must be maintained year-round throughout its existence.

The highway commission employs uniformed officers to enforce laws with reference to size, weight, registration and load of vehicles operated on the primary highways of Iowa. Their duties and functions are entirely apart from those of the Iowa Highway Patrol, a division of the department of public safety.

In addition to the commission's duties of full control over the operation of primary roads, the statutes impose the duties of joint control with the 99 county boards of supervisors over the construction of the farm to market road system. Statutes provide for the cooperation with the boards of supervisors for joint control of the farm to market fund, because federal law requires that the secondary federal aid fund be administered by the state. All farm to market programs and projects are initiated by the various boards of supervisors for work in their respective counties. The highway commission has no authority to originate these programs or projects, but action by the counties is subject to commission approval.

Location of farm to market projects, preparing necessary plans and supervising construction is the responsibility of each county, subject to approval of the commission. Iowa law also requires the commission to approve secondary road budgets, construction programs, and contracts for construction of roads and bridges when the cost of the work is estimated to be \$5,000 or more. The commission must also furnish standards of design for roads and bridges, and advise secondary road officials on special road problems.

Further assistance to the counties is furnished through inspection service for materials, and conducting instructional schools for secondary road officials.

The 58th General Assembly of Iowa required the Highway Commission to provide for construction and maintenance of all state park roads, and institutional roads, stipulating that the cost would be paid from the primary road fund. On January 1, 1960, these roads totaled 249 miles. Expenditures for their maintenance for fiscal 1959-60 was \$117,779.77.

The state board of engineering examiners was created by the Thirtyeighth General Assembly in 1919. No person can practice professional engineering or land surveying without first being registered with this board. The board meets from time to time and conducts examinations of applicants for registration.

The law provides that the membership of the board shall consist of five members who shall be appointed by the governor. Each member of the board shall be a professional engineer at least 35 years of age and shall have been a resident of this state for at least three years immediately preceding his appointment and shall have had at least ten years active practice preceding his appointment and during such time shall have had charge of engineering work as principal or assistant for at least two years, and shall be a member in good standing of a recognized state or national engineering society. No two members of said board shall be from the same branch of the profession of engineering.

The State Historical Department was organized in 1892 by Charles Aldrich. The State Historical Building was erected in 1898, and an addition in 1908. The department was reorganized in 1939 as the Iowa State Department of History and Archives.

The chief purpose of the department is the preservation of Iowa history from earliest geological time through the days of the Indians, the coming of the pioneers, to the present; to bring this history to life and make it available to the people of Iowa.

Following its founding, the Iowa Historical Department quickly became an important part of the educational and cultural activities of the state. From a small beginning the department has grown until it now overflows the original building and the addition. The Kasson Memorial Building, a block away, was purchased to serve as a workshop for the archivist and provide storage for the state archives.

Here is a unique and unrivaled institution in which all Iowa takes pride; its people visit both individually and in groups for conducted tours; its doors are open every day. Here the people of the state can see how the Iowa of today arose from the Iowa of yesterday; how the land, mines, quarries, rocks, and minerals came to be; how the Indian lived before the coming of the white man; how the pioneer changed the face of the land and the way of life. Here too are many sources of reference on Iowa history, ranging from newspapers to manuscripts, including books and census records; here are the state archives, readily available to officials of the state and to serious students of Iowa history.

In the museum is a wide range of exhibits. Displayed are tools, utensils and implements used by Iowa pioneers to conquer the wilderness; there is a collection tracing the history of pioneer transportation, including horse drawn vehicles and early automobiles; pioneer agricultural implements and many household articles from the time of the very earliest settlers. There is a fine collection of Kentucky rifles, both flintlock and percussion, as well as many other early firearms. The extensive G.A.R. collection, including portraits of all past commanders, is now housed in the Historical Museum.

Indian history of Iowa is traced from the time of the mound builders, to modern times; many ancient Indian artifacts are on display along with an unusually fine collection of modern Indian materials including bead work, cances, and wickiup.

Iowa's geology is represented by rock samples and fossils from every formation of the state, covering a billion years of geologic time. There is an outstanding exhibit of fossil crinoids from LeGrand, an area known throughout the world for the fine specimens which have come from it.

Many study collections are of interest and use to the citizens of the state—a large collection of maps of Iowa and of the country as a whole: an extensive collection of Iowa wildlife, many of which are record specimens; specimens of mounted birds and animals, some of which were common in pioneer days but are gone from the state today; the beautiful and elaborate silver service of the Battleship Iowa; a collection of photographs of people and places of historic interest, many of them the only pictures available. In addition many thousands of items are catalogued and stored for future display, and the collection is constantly growing.

In connection with the museum, the department maintains guided tour service for school groups, approximately 1500 annually, covering all phases of history and natural history, and at all levels, from kindergarten through college; each group is given a special tour, depending on the age of the students and the subject they are studying. The museum serves as an "identification bureau" for all manner of objects of natural and historic interest which citizens, teachers, and students bring in.

The Department has a large collection of autograph letters and papers of authors, explorers and statesmen, including several letters signed by Abraham Lincoln. On this foundation has been built the manuscript division, used for research by historians from all over North America.

On the shelves of the Historical Library are approximately 50,000 books by Iowa authors or about Iowa, Iowa state and county histories, family records and references for research in genealogy.

The census department is used in establishing records of birth and genealogy and in many cases can supply the only records of birth and residence available to many citizens.

The Newspaper division receives all the leading daily and weekly newspapers in the state, adding them to a systematic collection which dates back to the very earliest newspapers published in Iowa. These publications are an invaluable source for the historian and the growing file of present day papers is part of the Department's work of recording history day by day. All current newspapers are now preserved in permanent form on microfilm.

Portraits of many outstanding Iowans hang in the portrait gallery. A War History division contains many manuscripts, reports, official publications, enlistment records and other materials pertaining to Iowa's participation in six great wars.

The Annals of Iowa, a historical magazine issued quarterly, contains interpretive studies and articles on the history of the state.

The Iowa public archives comprise more than 35 million items beginning with the territorial government, all catalogued, so as to be readily available when needed by state officials or for historical research.

The Department also has jurisdiction over all monuments and mementos on the State House grounds.

All these divisions of the Department contribute to realization of its objectives, to preserve the history of the state of Iowa and make it readily available to the citizens of the state.

In fulfillment of these purposes a permanent program of activities has been gradually developed and put into execution. This includes (1) the discovery, collection and preservation of materials of Iowa history; (2) research in the field of Iowa history; (3) publication of the materials of Iowa history; (4) dissemination of the materials of Iowa history through public depositories and members. The society publishes a monthly magazine, *The Palimpsest*, and a quarterly magazine, the *Iowa Journal of History*. In addition, it issues numerous books on the political, social, economic and religious history of Iowa. It has published seven volumes on the Messages and Proclamations of the Governors of *Iowa*, six volumes in the Applied History Series dealing with the state, county and local government. Among the better known books are Mrs. Shambaugh's Amana That Was and Amana That Is, Gingerich's The Mennonites in Iowa, Swisher's Iowa—Land of Many Mills, Petersen's Steamboating on the Upper Mississippi and Iowa—The Rivers of Her Valleys, Richman's Ioway to Iowa, and Cole's Iowa Through the Years and I Remember, I Remember. 


The Workmen's Compensation Law was enacted by the Thirty-fifth General Assembly in 1913. Iowa was one of the first states to provide compensation benefits for injuries sustained by industrial workers. Succeeding legislatures have made many changes and increased benefits. The Fifty-first General Assembly established a second injury fund for the benefit of veterans who were maimed by loss of members, making it possible for an employer to hire a maimed veteran without taking undue risk. The Fifty-second General Assembly enacted an occupational disease law. Reports of all industrial injuries resulting in disability for more than seven days or death are required to be made to the industrial commissioner. Settlement agreements are submitted for his approval. In the event an amicable settlement is not reached an arbitration hearing before a deputy commissioner or arbitration commission is held in the county where the injury occurred and the claimant, employer or insurance carrier may appeal to the commissioner. Review hearings are held in the commissioner's office and an appeal may be taken to the district court of the county where the injury occurred.

The office of commissioner of insurance, as the executive head of the insurance department of Iowa, was created by chapter 146, of the laws of the Thirty-fifth General Assembly (1913) and the first commissioner took office July 1, 1914. Previous to that time, the supervision of insurance had been under the direction of the auditor of state.

The commissioner of insurance has general control, supervision, and direction over all insurance business transacted in the state, and is charged with the responsibility of enforcing the laws of the state relating to insurance.

Under the law, all securities in which the reserves of Iowa life insurance companies are invested are required to be deposited with the commissioner and complete records are kept showing each item on deposit at all times. The amount of approved securities representing these and other incidental deposits in the hands of the commissioner on Dec. 31, 1960, was \$2,139,696,768.62.

The commissioner supervises all transactions relating to the organization, reorganization, liquidation and dissolution of domestic insurance corporations. He supervises the sale in the state of all stock or other evidences of interest either by domestic or foreign insurance companies. He is the statutory receiver in the event of liquidation of any Iowa insurance company.

All foreign companies, as well as all local companies, must, before engaging in the insurance business in this state, obtain a certificate of



authority from the commissioner of insurance. These certificates expire annually on April 1, and action is taken on their renewals after analysis of complete financial statements filed covering the condition of the company as of the previous year end. All insurance agents must likewise obtain individual licenses to solicit business. In 1960 there were 901 insurance companies authorized to do business in the state, and approximately 100,000 individual agents' licenses were issued.

A state statute requires insurance companies to file all rates with the insurance commissioner for approval, and a rating division has been set up with the insurance department to handle rate filings together with supporting statistical information. There are approximately 1,200 filings per month.

The commissioner conducts examinations of all domestic insurance organizations every three years. He may also make an examination of any foreign insurance company authorized or seeking to be authorized to do business within the state. All policy forms used by any company within the state are required to be approved by the department.

Securities Department

The state securities laws, designed to protect the Iowa investing public through regulation of securities dealers and qualification of securities offered for sale, are administered by the commissioner of insurance.

The volume of business handled by the securities division has nearly doubled in the past two years.

The commissioner also has jurisdiction over the sale of stock on the installment plan and sale of memberships or certificates of membership entitling the holder thereof to purchase merchandise, materials or services on a discount or cost-plus basis.

Purpose of the Iowa Development Commission

The activities of the Iowa Development Commission are centered on achieving and maintaining in the state an economy diversified between industry and agriculture, and within industry itself. Iowa's rich soil has been and will always remain one of the mainstays of the state's economic life; its industrial assets—location, transportation facilities, natural resources, productive labor force, governmental climate, and others—have become recognized throughout the nation as conducive to the profitable operation of manufacturing facilities. It is the function of the development commission to present these assets to industry, to assist manufacturers presently located in the state, to help Iowa advance in the field of agriculture, and to make known the state's widespread recreational, cultural, and historical resources.

Records of Iowa's accomplishments in agriculture and assessments of its assets in industrial development, together with evaluation of changing conditions which affect the state's economic future, are maintained by the commission through its department of research and statistics.

The industrial promotion department and industrial relations department devote themselves to the attraction of new industries and to assisting those firms already operating in Iowa. These departments work closely with chambers of commerce and local development groups to create a favorable industrial climate. Assistance to communities and to industry is rendered in the fields of community education, financing and promotion. Close liaison is maintained at the executive level with manufacturing firms throughout the nation, with management consulting firms and with all organizations interested in industrial development.

The responsibility for creating favorable public opinion for Iowa, recognition of its agricultural accomplishments, and for developing an awareness in the nation of Iowa's cultural, social and economic advantages lies with the department of education and publications. The commission uses all available media—newspapers, magazines, radio, television, periodicals and business publications—to get the story of Iowa across to the public. The department of education and publications is also responsible for publication of travel and tourist guides and for providing information on the state to educational publications such as encyclopedias and school book publishers. The department also lends its cooperation to other state agencies in preparing publications for distribution to the general public. Requests for information of various types about Iowa number approximately 100,000 annually.

Through its department of planning, the development commission administers the federal planning assistance program and assists communities and counties in setting out comprehensive programs for their future growth. The program covers land use, road use, community facilities, public improvements, zoning and subdivision regulation. The planning department also aids communities in selection and development of industrial sites, on request.

Because of Iowa's agricultural heritage and the state's tremendous farm resources, the commission staff includes an agricultural engineer, whose task it is to seek a closer liaison between industry and agriculture, to promote greater utilization of agricultural products by manufacturing concerns, and to keep abreast of developments in both fields which could favorably affect the economic welfare of the state.

The office of Labor Commissioner was created by the Twentieth General Assembly in 1884.

Under the provisions of law, the commissioner is also a member of the board of vocational education and rehabilitation, and the employment agency commission. The commissioner is executive secretary of the employment agency commission.

The bureau is responsible for the enforcement of laws relating to health and safety, child labor, passenger and freight elevators, installation and inspection of steam boilers, generators and superheaters, private employment agencies, arbitration and conciliation, and industrial accidents for reinspection and statistical purposes.

Eight factory inspectors devote full time to inspection of factories, mills, work shops, theatres, buildings, public buildings, passenger and freight elevators, private employment agencies and general employment conditions. The law requires that one of the inspectors shall be a woman who shall give special attention to places employing women and children. The chief boiler inspector for the state works under the commissioner and is responsible for the inspection of all boilers over 15 pounds pressure.

Since July of 1949 the bureau has dropped its publication "Iowa Employment Survey" because of the duplication with the report of the Iowa Employment Security Commission. However, the Bureau undertook to publish reports on Child Labor, Apprenticeship Registration, Construction Activity, and Iowa Work Injuries. At this time monthly statistical reports are being published and distributed throughout the state to aid both labor and management.

The bureau recognizes the need for a broader survey and hopes that in the near future it will be able to furnish more extensive and pertinent information.

THE STATE LIBRARIES

A board of trustees, composed of the governor, the state superintendent of public instruction and a member of the supreme court, controls the state law library and the state medical library. The law library is located in the state house, the other in the Historical building.

STATE MEDICAL LIBRARY

(Second Floor, Historical Building)

The Iowa state medical library was established as a department of the state library in July, 1919, and became a separate library in the reorganization of the state libraries by the Forty-eighth General Assembly in 1939.

The library contains 56,000 accessioned volumes and receives 350 medical and scientific periodicals annually, having over 100,000 unbound periodicals. The main work of the medical library is its mailing service, whereby proper material is selected and placed in the mail the same day doctors request literature by mail, phone or telegram.

The library also has a small museum of old medical instruments.

The Fifty-sixth General Assembly established the Iowa State Traveling Library Board of Trustees consisting of five members, who are appointed by the governor. No member of the board shall be a practicing librarian; three members may be chosen from a list submitted by the Iowa Library Association; and one member may be from a list submitted by the superintendent of public instruction. Members are appointed for terms of five years.

The board meets at least once in each quarter of each fiscal year and at the first meeting in each new year elects a chairman. Biennial reports are made to the governor.

The board of trustees is a policy making board charged with appointing a director who is responsible to the board for carrying out the functions of the library as set forth in Code Section 303.16-23. Among the functions enumerated are the following:

To give advice and counsel to all public libraries in the state and to all political subdivisions which may propose to establish libraries.

To print necessary lists and circulars of information and instruction.

To continuously survey the needs of libraries throughout the state, and to ascertain the requirements for additional libraries and for improving existing libraries to provide adequate service to all residents of the state.

To loan books and related materials to libraries, schools, colleges, universities, library associations, farmers' institutes, granges, study clubs, charitable or penal institutions, public officials and individuals without library service.

During the last biennium the Iowa State Traveling Library has grown in resources of books and staff. It is giving better service to state departments, public libraries, organizations and individuals. Greatly strengthened extension services have been provided by the field offices in Cedar Falls, Mason City and Jefferson. A strong program of statewide library extension and improvement of local libraries has been promoted by the use of federal funds made available on a matching basis.



The Iowa Merit System Council has been in operation since Jan. 1, 1940. The Federal Social Security Act, as amended in 1939, required each of the several states to employ personnel on the basis of merit, in order to qualify for federal funds. The Merit System Council serves as the central personnel office, and in cooperation with the participating agencies establishes a system of personnel administration based on merit principles and scientific methods governing the appointment, promotion, transfer, lay-off, removal, discipline and welfare of its civil employees.

The Merit System Council is composed of three members, appointed by the governor upon recommendation of the agencies. The regulations require that the members shall be public-spirited persons of recognized standing, of known interest in the improvement of public administration and the impartial selection of efficient government personnel. No member of the council shall have held political office or have been an officer in a political organization during the year preceding his appointment, nor shall he hold such office during his term.

It is the duty of the council to establish general policies for the administration of merit examinations and office procedures, to hear personnel appeals, to review the classification and compensation plans, and to advise with the state agencies on their revisions, to make recommendations to the agencies relative to their internal personnel practices to assure conformity with the regulations, to approve the budget to be submitted to the agencies covering costs of merit system activities, and to promote public understanding of the purposes, policies, and practices of the merit system.

It is also the duty of the council to appoint a Merit System Director, with the approval of the agencies, to advise with him in formulating procedures, and to inspect and review his activities for the purpose of assuring conformity with the regulations. The director is charged with the responsibility of developing and putting into continuous effect policies and procedures which are based on the principles requisite to merit system administration. These involve the recruitment of qualified candidates for possible public employment; the preparation, administration, and scoring of examinations; the preparation, custody, and maintenance of registers of eligibles; certification of the eligible list to the agencies as vacancies occur; maintenance of complete personnel records including appointments, salary advancements, promotions, and terminations; and auditing the payrolls to insure compliance with the regulations in all personnel actions.

Approximately 1,800 employees are covered under the system. Each employee must meet the minimum requirements, as defined in the job specification for the position he is holding, pass a practical examination for the class, be selected from among the top three individuals available on the register, normally begin employment at the first step of the range established for the class, and serve a six months probationary period. Permanent employees may be terminated only for specific cause, and have the right to appeal to the council in case they are of the opinion that any agency action has been unfair or discriminatory.

The operation of Iowa coal and gypsum mines is hedged by exacting laws designed for the safe operation of the mines, the safety of the workers in mines and other incidentals.

Laws provide for safeguards against fire, for adequate ventilation, for escape ways and other safety features.

The work of the inspectors consists of examination of mines and mine working conditions. Safety devices for workers, ventilation measures, escape ways, maps of mines and all regulations concerning operations of mines come in for their check.

The Iowa Natural Resources Council was created in 1949 as the agency of state government to promote the water resources policy enacted by the Fifty-third General Assembly. The act, contained in Chapter 455A, Code of Iowa, declared it to be the policy of the state to correlate and vest the powers of the state in a single agency, the Iowa Natural Resources Council, with the duty and authority to establish and enforce an appropriate comprehensive, state-wide plan for control of water and for the protection of surface and underground waters of the state.

The Fifty-seventh General Assembly passed an act for the conservation and control of water resources as an amendment to Chapter 455A, confirming the fact that all waters within the state, both surface and underground, belong to the people of the state and declaring them subject to regulated use for beneficial purposes. This act became law on May 16, 1957. It is believed to be the first comprehensive water rights law to become effective in the 31 Eastern States. The enactment of this law enlarged the scope of the responsibilities of the resources council and called for the employment of a water commissioner and deputies to administer the provisions of the law.

The resources council is composed of nine members who are electors of the State of Iowa and appointed for six-year terms by the governor and confirmed by the senate. The director of the council serves as the executive officer and has charge of the work under the direction and orders of the council.

The functions and duties of the resources council include the establishment of a comprehensive state-wide program for the conservation, de-velopment and use of the waters of the state. It has been designated as the agency with which the federal government agencies carry on relations for cooperation in cases involving investigations and studies for works or improvements for navigation and flood control affecting the state. The resources council also acts as a coordinating agency for flood control and water resources projects initiated on the local or state level.

In accordance with the law, the resources council receives, reviews, and determines the issuance of approval or disapproval of orders for the erection of any structure, dam obstruction, deposit or excavation in or on any floodway and has the power to abate as a nuisance any of the foregoing which adversely affect flood control. It may also establish council floodways which are deemed reasonably required to carry and discharge the flood flows of a stream.

The water rights law establishes a permit system for regulated uses of water and assigns to the council the additional responsibility of adopting policies, rules, and regulations for administration of the program.

The law provides for the diversion, storage, or withdrawal of water from any natural watercourse, underground basin or watercourse, drainage ditch or settling basin for any regulated use upon compliance with the provisions of the law. Except for a few non-regulated uses, any use of 5,000 gallons or more a day is subject to regulation. Permits may be granted for any period of time not exceeding 10 years, and must be reviewed before they may be extended by the resources council. Priority is given only to the use of water for ordinary household purposes, for poultry, livestock, and domestic animals. The resources council is authorized to determine and establish an average minimum flow for a given point on a watercourse and may issue permits for beneficial use of water provided that the average minimum flow is preserved.



Centralized Printing Division Kenneth L. Widener, Director

By act of the 55th General Assembly, under S. F. 377, there was established a centralized printing department, to operate under the control of the State Printing Board. Multilith machines that had been located in the several state offices were assembled in a room on the ground floor of the state office building, for printing of work to be produced for short runs and quick service. Paper and envelope supplies were transferred from the executive council to be distributed as requisitioned, on signed orders from each department.

PESCH, Carl H., Des Moines Republican

Commissioner of Public Safety Carl H. Pesch, 31, was appointed Commissioner, Iowa Department of Public Safety, Jan. 23, 1961, by Governor Norman Erbe. Pesch was born in Mt. Pleasant, Iowa, July 25, 1929. He attended elementary and high school in Rowan, and was graduated from Iowa State Teachers College in 1950. After a semester at Jefferson, Iowa, High School as an industrial arts teacher, Pesch served in the United States Army from 1951 to 1953, including 11 months in combat areas in Korea. He entered the State University College of Law in 1955 and was graduated with a J.D. degree in 1958. In the same year he was appointed assistant attorney general assigned to the public safety department and, later, to the state board of control. Married and the father of one daughter, Pesch is a member of the American Bar Association and the Iowa State Bar Association.



Duties of State Department of Public Safety

The Iowa State Department of Public Safety was created by the Forty-eighth General Assembly (1939) by consolidating several departments and divisions under one executive designated as Commissioner of Public Safety. The purpose of this consolidation was to facilitate coordination among enforcement agencies and safety organizations on all levels of government within Iowa. Today, the State Department of Public Safety includes the following divisions:

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Division of Highway Safety Patrol

DAVID G. HERRICK, Cass County, Colonel.

The Iowa Highway Safety Patrol was created by the Forty-sixth General Assembly (1935) and brought to its present strength of 300 uniformed members by the Fifty-eighth General Assembly (1959).

The duties of the Highway Patrol are to enforce all motor vehicle laws, to exercise general police powers (with restrictions stated in Chapter 80, Code of Iowa, 1958); to investigate serious traffic accidents occurring on the highways; to conduct hearings in connection with the suspension of operators' and chauffeurs' licenses; and to conduct examinations and issue drivers' licenses. Lt. Colonel James Machholz is first assistant chief, and Major Howard Miller is second assistant chief of the Patrol.

Criminal Investigation Division

TILLMAN A. THOMPSON, Wright County, Chief.

The Criminal Investigation Division is a service organization to which county and municipal enforcement agencies may come for assistance in difficult criminal investigations. The division also is responsible for certain matters relating to the internal security of the State of Iowa. In addition, the division is called upon to investigate matters involved in the functioning of state government, and to co-operate with elective and appointive officials in such investigations. The division is not, however, a local policing unit.

The division is divided into an investigative section, an indentification section, and a technical laboratory. The investigative section assigns special agents to work with local peace officers who have requested assistance in specific criminal cases. The identification section is a storehouse of information, including fingerprints, criminal records, photographs and other information necessary to effective criminal law enforcement. The technical laboratory is a modern crime laboratory which includes the scientific equipment and the technicians necessary to criminal investigation and crime prevention.

Division of Radio Communications

BOYD F. PORTER, Polk County, Director.

This division is responsible for providing radio communications for the Iowa Highway Safety Patrol, the Criminal Investigation Division, and other state agencies. Services and facilities of this division, through the Police Radio Network, also are available to all county and municipal enforcement agencies, to State and Federal Offices of Civil Defense, and for interstate police communication.

The division operates on a 24-hour daily basis through nine police radio stations located at Des Moines, Cedar Falls, Storm Lake, Atlantic, Fairfield, Maquoketa, Belmond, Cedar Rapids and Denison, and through automatic repeater stations at Ladora, Van Wert, Calmar, Burlington, Lake Park, Merrill and Glenwood.

Division of Fire Protection and Investigation

ED J. HERRON, Linn County, Fire Marshal.

The duties of this division are to enforce all state laws relating to arson, to investigate causes of fires, and to promote fire safety and prevention through education. The division is charged with enforcing all laws, and rules and regulations of the State Department of Public Safety, relating to the transportation, storage and handling of fiammable liquids, liquefied petroleum gas, and explosives. In addition, this division is responsible for enforcement of laws and regulations pertaining to fire safety, equipment, design and exit in buildings where the public congregates.

Division of Motor Vehicle Registration

JOHN F. CARLSON, Polk County, Director.

This division has direct jurisdiction over the licensing and titling of motor vehicles, official vehicles, and nonresident vehicles, and also over the issuing of licenses to itinerant merchants. The division maintains complete records of all motor vehicle licenses and titles issued and of revenue collected. With certain exceptions, all revenue collected from issuance of motor vehicle registrations and titles goes to the state's road use tax fund.

Division of Motor Vehicle Dealers' License

D. H. DAY, Franklin County, Director.

It is the responsibility of this division to prevent fraud in the sale of motor vehicles at retail in Iowa, and to prevent irresponsible persons from engaging in the retail sale of motor vehicles. In addition, the division administers the dealers disclosure law. All expenses of this division are paid out of a fund which accrues from the licensing and transfers of licenses of motor vehicle dealers.

Safety Responsibility and Drivers' License Division

BARRY MINEAR, Polk County, Director.

Administration of the Financial and Safety Responsibility Law and of the point system are responsibilities of this division. The division maintains cumulative records of accidents and convictions of traffic law violations on all licensed drivers. On the basis of these records, court recommendations or other evidence, it is the duty of this division to reexamine or interview drivers, issue warning letters or probationary agreements, or to suspend or revoke drivers' licenses. A research and statistics section of this division collects and analyzes accident and enforcement information for the guidance of the various public safety programs that are within the responsibility of the safety department.

Division of Safety Education

WILLIAM BURNETT, Cerro Gordo County, Director.

The purpose of this division is to promote highway safety through its own programs of public information and education, and to co-operate with official and private organizations working toward the same goal. This division carries out its work through lectures, film showings, demonstrations, and issuance of material to all media of public information. This division maintains a film library and exchange service, and stocks safety material from official and private sources. Fieldmen serve as contact and technical service personnel to schools and club and civic organizations in the promotion of driver education and other traffic safety programs.

Director Iowa Real Estate Commission Born Oct. 20, 1894, son of Francis J. and Mary Hart. Educated in Council Bluffs public schools, graduated from Abraham Lincoln high school, and attended the University of Omaha. Married Dorothy Hinkel of Council Bluffs, June 4, 1928. Father of a son, Warren B. Hart, Omaha, Neb., and daughter, Dorothy, wife of Dr. Norman R. Eade, Sacramento, Calif. Past master of Bluff City Lodge No. 71, A.F. & A.M., Council Bluffs, member of the Consistory in Omaha and Shrine at Des Moines. Past adjutant of Rainbow Post No. 2, American Legion, and past district adjutant for the 7th district. Assessor in Council Bluffs six years, and supervisor of ald age assistance for Pottawattamie county nine years. Individual operator in real estate since 1914. Secretary to the late Wayne M. Ropes, secretary of state and real estate commissioner from 1943 to 1946. First director of the Iowa real estate commission effective in 1946. President, 1951, life member of the executive committee of the National Association of License Law Officials.

The first real estate license law was enacted by the 43rd General Assembly and became effective Jan. 1, 1930. The law was administered by the secretary of state, who was designated as real estate commissioner. This law was amended and revised by the 51st General Assembly and among other things provided that as of Jan. 1, 1946, the law would be administered by a five-member commission composed of the secretary of state as chairman and four additional members appointed by the governor with the approval of the Senate.

During the past ten years it has been the administrative policy of the Real Estate department to correct most of the evils in the real estate brokerage business which have developed over many years of uncontrolled practice. This has resulted in elevating the real estate business to a professional status and has tended to encourage men and women in all walks of life to enter this business where income is based on intelligence, initiative and hard work.

While the present law requires a rather complete and comprehensive written examination for all applicants it has not tended to deter or discourage the many people who are endeavoring to get into this business. During the calendar year of 1960 more than 1,000 men and women were examined and as of the end of the first quarter in 1961 nearly 7,600 licenses have been issued. The examinations are held once a month at a specific time and place set by the Commission.

The fees for a Broker's and Salesman's examination are \$10.00 and \$5.00 respectively. The same amount is charged each year for renewal of the license, which expires on Dec. 31 of the year of issuance. For the last audit period the total received from all fees amounted to \$70,400,

from which amount \$25,200 was allotted for operational expense and the balance was left in the general fund as revenue to the state. Since the first years of its operation the department has lived within its income and not required an appropriation.

The department prepares and distributes to the citizens of Iowa a Real Estate Primer which is a basis for the qualifying examination and which has been accepted and used as a textbook by many high schools, colleges and universities in Iowa and many other states. This Primer and the educational institutes held over the state each year have contributed materially in reducing law violations to a minimum and have facilitated the economical and efficient operation of the department.

The department is also required to regulate and investigate the business conduct of all real estate licensees in their relationships with the public and to hold hearings on formal complaints which contain evidence which would indicate a violation of the law.

DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL WELFARE

(Office located on fourth floor State Office Building)

The board of social welfare was created by act of the Forty-seventh General Assembly in 1937. The Forty-eighth General Assembly amended the original law by enacting legislation relating to membership, salary, terms of office and removal from office of its members.

The board of social welfare has authority to administer state and federal funds appropriated by the federal social security law and the Iowa Legislature for old age assistance, aid to the blind, child welfare services, aid to dependent children, aid to disabled and emergency relief.

Under the terms of the law, county social welfare boards, also bipartisan, are appointed by the county boards of supervisors. The county welfare boards receive applications for assistance from needy aged, children, disabled and blind in the various counties and make recommendations for assistance to the state board. Further enactment of the Fortyeighth General Assembly provided for the administration of funds made available to the counties for emergency relief, and relating to relief labor and the powers and duties of the boards of supervisors in connection therewith. The county boards also cooperate with the state board in giving service to neglected and dependent children.

The board of social welfare is required to cooperate with the federal government according to the provisions of the federal social security law, to make reports to the federal social security board on administration of assistance, and the federal children's bureau of the U.S. department of labor on its services to children.

The division of child welfare will carry on services to children in the State of Iowa except those performed by the institutions under the jurisdiction of the board of control.

PUBLIC WELFARE PROGRAMS OF ASSISTANCE AND SERVICE

State-wide monthly aid to needy persons in Iowa is provided under the programs of Old-Age Assistance, Aid to Blind, Aid to Disabled, and Aid to Dependent Children. The State Department of Social Welfare also administers, through its 99 county offices, the Remedial Blind program and Child Welfare Services. It also supervises the distribution of food, made available through the United States Department of Agriculture, to the needy people of the state.

Through these programs cash payments are provided on a need basis to individuals meeting specific eligibility requirements. As of June 30, 1960, there were 33,585 recipients of Old-Age Assistance, 1,888 Aid to Blind (including Remedial Blind) recipients, 8,945 families including 33,305 individuals receiving Aid to Dependent Children benefits, and 410 Aid to Disabled recipients. For the 12 months ending June 30, 1960, the cost of assistance payments to recipients was \$47,395,647.84; this included payments for medical care paid directly to doctors and druggists on behalf of these recipients. Of this total, approximately 64.46 percent was paid from federal funds, 29.43 percent from state funds, and 6.11 percent from county funds.

In Iowa, approximately 10.1 percent of all persons past 65 years received Old-Age Assistance. About 6,400, or approximately 19 percent of these recipients, received allowances for nursing care.

In addition to regular assistance payments the state provided funeral expenses for Old-Age Assistance recipients totalling \$338,491.53. The state and counties shared equally the \$4,505.38 approved for funerals of children in Aid to Dependent Children families. Funeral expenses for Aid to Blind recipients totaled \$6,744.16, of which the state paid threefourths and the counties one-fourth.

The Remedial Blind program, costing \$87,806.53 for the year, provided medical and hospital services to needy individuals of all ages requiring specialized treatment to restore vision or prevent blindness. The state pays three-fourths and the counties one-fourth of the total costs.

Effective July 4, 1959, an act of the legislature placed in the hands of the department responsibility for providing general relief to Indians living in settlements within the state, and made an appropriation of state funds for this purpose.

The legislature, through the State Department of Social Welfare, has provided for its needy aged, blind, adult disabled, and dependent children families with financial assistance and services which have contributed effectively to the welfare of these economically deprived groups.

Information on State Fair

For over 100 years, the Iowa State Fair has been gaining steadily in size, prestige and public service. Today, it is nationally recognized as America's greatest agricultural and livestock fair. Situated in the heart of the world's wealthiest agricultural empire, it is the focal point each year for exhibitors of the finest livestock and farm products. In attendance, too, it stands in the front rank of the great educational and entertainment expositions on the North American continent.

The Iowa State Fair, the original "State Fair" of a best-selling novel and of two hit motion pictures, is held in Des Moines each year. It runs for 10 days, starting in late August and sometimes carrying into the first few days of September.

The livestock show, largest of its kind in America, attracts over 8,000 of the finest farm animals from 20 leading agricultural states. The 4-H and F.F.A. shows, state-wide congresses of farm young people's organizations and their livestock and projects, add to the fame of the fair. Other major educational features include the corn and small grain show, farm machinery exposition, flower and garden show, art salon, photographic salon, school exposition, women's exposition, harness and saddle horse show, culinary and needlework departments, and the fish and game exhibit.

From the huge State Fair grandstand, one of the finest amphitheaters in the nation, fairgoers witness a varied series of spectacles and events, including national championship auto races, midwest circuit horse races, thrill day stunts, musical extravaganzas, fireworks and circus acts.

The first and second Iowa State Fairs were held in Fairfield, Iowa, in 1854 and 1855. From 1856 to 1879, the State Fair moved from city to city. It was held in Muscatine in 1856 and 1867; Oskaloosa, 1858 and 1859; Iowa City, 1860 and 1861; Dubuque, 1862 and 1863; Burlington, 1864-1866; Clinton, 1867 and 1868; Keokuk, 1869, 1870, 1874 and 1875; and Cedar Rapids, 1871, 1873 and 1876-1878.

In 1879 the State Fair moved to Des Moines to stay. In 1884 the Legislature appropriated \$50,000 to purchase a state fairgrounds, on condition that the city of Des Moines raise an equal amount for buildings and facilities. The city concurred, and Iowa thus became the second state in the Northwest to acquire a permanent site for its fair.

In 1923 the General Assembly changed the former method of fair administration by providing for an Iowa department of agriculture and a state fair board, and giving this board the duty of managing the fair and the custody of the fairgrounds. Under this law, the fair board comprises one director from each congressional district. These directors together with the president and vice president of the fair, are elected at the annual midwinter session of the state agricultural convention. Immediately after that convention, the state fair board elects its secretary and its treasurer.

All operating expense, maintenance and other costs of the fair are paid out of fair receipts, except where the Legislature may deem it advisable to make a special appropriation for such purposes. The law provides that the state will not be liable for any expenses or liabilities incurred by the fair.

Since 1902 the Legislature has appropriated \$1,130,500 for the construction of permanent buildings on the fairgrounds, purchase of additional land and for necessary improvements. In recent years, however, the State Fair has used only its own revenues for these purposes. Altogether, since 1902, the fair itself has expended \$3,755,847 for maintenance and improvements from actual profits of the fair. One of the latest major building projects financed by fair funds is the new fireproof 4-H Girls' dormitory, on which construction was begun in the spring of 1949. It was formally opened and presented to the Girls 4-H Club for their use at the 1950 Iowa State Fair. Another is the beautiful new Radio and Television Center providing studios for programs originating on the grounds as well as established programs featuring well known announcers and entertainers. This building was built and in use in 1956. Premiums, amounting to over \$190,000 a year, are also provided by the fair for winners in exhibits and contests.

How the State Fair has grown during over 100 years of progress can best be shown by comparing statistics on the first fair of 1854 with the average figures for the 1959 and 1960 fairs:

Duties of State Tax Commission

The state tax commission was established in 1929 and was originally known as the state board of assessment and review. The duties of the commission as fixed by law include the supervision of the assessment system of the state, and the assessment of public utilities, including railroads, telephone and telegraph lines, pipe lines, water works, transmission lines and plants producing electricity.

In addition to these duties the commission administers the individual and corporation income tax, sales and use tax, chain store tax, cigarette tax, beer and inheritance taxes and many other minor activities.

The total collection of taxes received by the tax commission for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1960, aggregated \$142,822,511.

In addition to duties in relation to the assessment and collection of taxes, the commission also administers the provisions of the homestead credit act, under which more than 24 and three-quarter million dollars annually is now being credited upon the real estate and personal property taxes of persons entitled to homestead grants.

The tax commission also administers the military service tax credit act under which local taxing bodies are reimbursed more than one million seven hundred thousand dollars annually for losses incurred through the exemption of property owned by persons who have been in military service.

The tax commission has supervision of local property assessments. It is in charge of the general direction of county and city assessors under the law enacted by the 52nd General Assembly.

State Permit Board

Chapter 124 of the 1954 Code of Iowa, provides for the issuance of permits for the manufacture, sale and taxation of certain nonintoxicating liquor, with the provision that such fees and taxes as shall be collected under this act, accrue to the general fund of the state of Iowa. The state permit board is constituted of the chairman of the state tax commission, who is also chairman of the board, the secretary of state and the auditor of state. The board reviews the action of any governing body in any case where a hearing has been had relative to the cancellation or revocation of a permit issued under the provisions of this act.

TAX ASSESSMENTS

Chapter 427, 1958 Code of Iowa, contains provisions as to property taxable and property exempt from taxation. Section 427.13 provides that all property not specifically exempted by statute is taxable.

Personal property shall be listed and assessed each year in the name of the owner thereof on the first day of January; real estate shall be

listed and valued in 1933 and every four years thereafter. (Sec. 428.4) 1961 is a regular real estate assessment year.

In each year in which real estate is not listed, all new buildings erected since the last previous assessment must be listed, and the valuation added to the valuation of the real estate on which the buildings are situated. (Sec. 428.4)

The statutes of Iowa require all property subject to taxation to be valued at its actual value, and to be assessed at sixty (60) per cent of such actual value.

There are 120 duly appointed, qualified and acting assessors in the state of Iowa, of whom 99 are county assessors and 21 are city assessors. All city and county assessors must qualify for the position by examination conducted by the state tax commission and by an examining board, and are appointed by the conference board of the city or county, as the case may be. The term of office of an assessor shall be for six (6) years.

*Sessions of Boards of Review. The city and county boards of review shall be in session from May 1 to May 31, both inclusive, each year and shall hold as many meetings as are necessary to discharge their duties. Such boards shall hold meetings in quarters provided by the board of supervisors. The assessor shall be clerk of the board of review.

The board of review shall have the power to equalize assessments by raising or lowering the individual assessments of real property, including new buildings, personal property or moneys and credits made by the assessor. It shall also add to the assessment rolls any taxable property which has been omitted by the assessor.

Any property owner or aggrieved taxpayer who is dissatisfied with his assessment may file a protest against such assessment with the board of review on or after May 1 to and including May 20, of the year of assessment. Said protest shall be in writing and signed by the one protesting or by his duly authorized agent. Taxpayer may have an oral hearing thereon if request therefor in writing is made at the time of filing the protest. Such protest must be confined to one (1) or more of the grounds specified in the statute.

Homestead Tax Credit Law. Every home owner in the state of Iowa, who resides upon his homestead six months out of the year and fulfills the other requirements of the law, is entitled to a homestead tax credit upon his taxes.

The amount of credit to which he is entitled depends upon the value of his homestead and the millage rate of credit allowed by the Iowa state tax commission.

No home owner can receive a credit upon his taxes upon any value in excess of \$2,500 and the Iowa state tax commission cannot refund in excess of 25 mills upon such valuation. In other words, no home owner can receive in excess of \$62.50 refund.

Under this law, a home owner is:

- (1) One who holds fee simple title to the homstead.
- (2) A person occupying a homestead as a surviving spouse.
- (3) A person occupying property under contract of purchase where it can be shown that not less than ten per cent of the purchase price named in the contract has been paid and that such contract has been made a matter of record in the office of the county recorder.

*Provided for in Chapter 291, Laws of 58th G. A.

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- (4) A person occupying a homestead under devise or by operation of inheritance laws.
- (5) A person occupying the homestead under a deed which conveys a divided interest where the divided interest is shared only by persons related or formerly related to each other by blood, marriage or adoption. (Chap. 301, Laws of the 58th G. A.)

Under this homestead tax credit law, a dwelling house is defined as any building which is occupied wholly or in part by the owner as a home.

In rural districts it cannot exceed 40 acres and in cities and towns, if its assessed valuation is less than twenty-five hundred dollars, the land area may be enlarged until its assessed valuation reaches that amount.

A homestead may contain one or more contiguous lots or tracts of ground with buildings upon it, used in good faith as a homestead.

Home owners desiring to avail themselves of the benefits of this law must file application for such tax credit with the assessor each year between Jan. 1 and up to and including July 1. This application is for taxes payable in the succeeding year.

Budgets Prepared and Submitted

Preparation—All taxing districts except townships must at least twenty days prior to Aug. 15 of each year prepare a budget of anticipated expenditures and estimated amount to be raised by taxation by funds. Rural schools post budget estimate ten days before dates of hearing. Other taxing districts subject to the budget law publish their budgets in a newspaper.

Certification—After hearing and decision of local board, budgets are certified to the county auditor not later than Aug. 15. (C. '58, §24.17.)

Submitted to State Comptroller—As soon as taxes are certified by each local board and have been computed by the county auditor he shall forward a copy of each budget, together with a summary of all budgets, to the state comptroller.

County Budget—On or before Jan. 31 of each year, each county is required to appropriate in detail anticipated expenditures for every office or department for each and every purpose for which expenditures are authorized or demanded. The budget in detail must be completed and adopted by Dec. 31 of the preceding year. This procedure is appropriating in detail the budget certified in August by funds.

State—On or before Sept. 1, next prior to each biennial legislative session, all departments and establishments of the government shall transmit to the state comptroller estimates of their expenditure requirements for each fiscal year of the ensuing biennium.

The comptroller shall prepare and file in his office, on or before the first day of December of each even-numbered year, a state budget report.

Not later than Feb. 1 of the year of each biennial legislative session, the governor shall transmit to the legislature a document to be known as a budget, setting forth his financial program for each of the fiscal years of the ensuing biennium.

Levies. The board of supervisors fixes the county tax levies at the September meeting. School corporations make their levies and certify them to the office of the county auditor on or before the fifteenth day of August. Cities and towns also certify their tax levies within the same time. Township trustees make, and the clerks certify, the township levies within the same time.

The state tax commission fixes the rates necessary to meet the amount required for any state levy authorized by the comptroller or treasurer. All taxes are due and payable Jan. 1 of each year. The first installment of taxes becomes delinquent April 1 and a penalty of three-fourths of one per cent per month attaches. The second installment of taxes becomes delinquent Oct. 1 and a penalty of three-fourths of one per cent per month attaches.

Tax sales are held on the first Monday in December of each year. Prior to tax sales, an advertising fee of 60 cents attaches and, in case of sale, \$1.00 is added for each tax sale certificate.

Redemption. For redemption from tax sale, four per cent penalty is added to the sum paid by the purchaser at tax sale and all subsequent taxes paid by him under sale. Also six per cent interest is added from time of payment until time of redemption, together with 25 cents for redemption certificate.

Tax sales run three years before purchaser is entitled to a tax deed. Purchasers at a scavenger tax sale are entitled to a deed after one year.

Taxes a Lien on Real Estate. Taxes due from any person upon personal property are a lien upon any or all real estate owned or afterwards acquired by such persons for a period of 10 years from Dec. 31 of the year in which levied. As against the purchaser, taxes are a lien against real estate on and after Dec. 31 of the year in which they were assessed and levied.

Military Exemptions. The following should receive the attention of soldiers, sailors, marines and nurses who have participated in the several wars in which this country has engaged, subsequent to and including the war with Mexico, who are entitled to exemptions from taxes. The exemptions are as follows:

\$3,000 assessed value to any soldier, sailor or marine of the Mexican or Civil War.

\$1,800 assessed value to any soldier, sailor, marine or nurse of the war with Spain, Indian wars, Chinese relief or Philippine insurrection.

\$750 assessed value to any serviceman or woman of World War I.

\$500 assessed value to any serviceman or woman of World War II.

\$500 assessed value to any serviceman or woman during the Korean war, from June 27, 1950 to July 27, 1953.

The property, to the same extent, of the wife of any such soldier, sailor, marine or nurse, where they are living together and he has not otherwise received the benefits above provided; also the property to the same extent of the widow, remaining unmarried, where they were living together at the time of the death of such person; and the property to the same extent of the widowed mother, remaining unmarried, of any such soldier, sailor, marine or nurse where the said widowed mother is, or was at the time of the death of the soldier, sailor, marine, or nurse, dependent upon such person for support and he has not otherwise received the benefits above provided; also the property to the same extent of a minor child or children of any such deceased soldier, sailor, marine or nurse.

The above exemptions may be made from any property owned by the claimant and said claim for exemption, if filed on or before July 1 of any year and allowed by the board of supervisors, shall be effective to secure an exemption only for the year in which such exemption is filed.

Designation of the property upon which the claimant desires to claim the exemption is to be made by July 1 of the year and if no designation is made, the exemption shall apply to the homestead, if any.

The law also requires that the person claiming any of the above exemptions must be a resident of and domiciled in the state of Iowa.

Soldiers in actual military service are permitted to retain their homestead rights even though they are not for the period of their service residents of or domiciled in Iowa.

IOWA STATE BOARD OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION

The statute establishing a Department of Public Instruction under the direction of a State Board was enacted by the Fifty-fifth General Assembly. The law provides for the election of members of the State Board and prescribes their powers and duties.

Eight members are elected by representatives of local and county school boards from districts which shall be coterminous with the eight congressional districts as they existed on Jan. 1, 1953, plus one board member who is appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Senate. The term of each is for six years.

The State Board of Public Instruction is a policy-making board made up of lay people. The State Board has the same relationship at the state level as a county board of education has to a county school system and a local board of education has to a local school district.

IOWA STATE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION

(Office on fifth floor of State Office Building)

Iowa law provides for the State Board of Public Instruction to appoint the superintendent of public instruction, assistant superintendents, and such other staff members and employees as necessary. The powers and duties of the superintendents and staff members are also prescribed by law.

The State Superintendent has responsibility for the over-all co-ordination of the work of the Department.

The Assistant Superintendent for Administration and Assistant Superintendent for Instruction are responsible to the State Superintendent. Each Assistant Superintendent has jurisdiction over a number of divisions which are responsible to the State Superintendent through the appropriate Assistant Superintendent.

The division of Research and Publications is responsible to the State Superintendent and the two Assistant Superintendents. The division of Vocational Rehabilitation is directly responsible to the State Superintendent.

The Department of Public Instruction is made up of 11 divisions as follows:

The functions of the Iowa State Department of Public Instruction are classified into three major categories: leadership, service, and regulatory. Educational leadership constitutes the major responsibility and is included in each of these categories. Consultative services are available upon request and without charge to public school administrators and lay people regarding educational problems.

Functions of the 11 divisions of the Department are described as follows:

Research and Publications

The division of Research and Publications was organized in 1955 to collect data on school facts and to coordinate the research activities of agencies concerned with research in education. A central file on research information is maintained. The division also coordinates all news releases and supervises the preparation of publications.

Vocational Rehabilitation

Vocational Rehabilitation is a public service offered to help develop and conserve the working usefulness of disabled men and women to the extent that they may become gainfully employed. Any Iowa resident of employable age who has a disability that prevents satisfactory employment (except aged or helpless persons requiring custodial care, or blind persons being assisted by the Iowa Commission for the Blind) may apply. Persons with disabilities resulting from birth, disease, accident, or emotional causes may be eligible.

Services, provided free, include medical diagnosis and vocational evaluation; vocational guidance and planning; job training, and placement on a job.

Administration and Finance

The Division of Administration and Finance is primarily a service division in administration, finance, school district reorganization, and school plant facilities.

The division endeavors to provide leadership in the development of better financial practices in the expenditure and reporting of school moneys. School district reorganization is a continuing challenge which gives the Department an opportunity to assist county and local boards and lay groups in their study of the school districts. The division has

During the period from 1954-1955 to 1960-1961 the total number of school districts of all types was reduced from 4,417 to 1,575, or 2,842: the number of districts maintaining approved four year high schools from 819 to 562, or 257; the number of one-room rural schools from 3.261 to 354. or 2.907.

Administration and Finance is responsible for the distribution of the following state aids: general, supplemental, transportation, handicapped children, vocational, mining camp and emergency.

School Lunch

The State Department of Public Instruction operates under a contract with the U.S. Department of Agriculture which covers the general administrative procedures of the lunch program. The Division of School Lunch in the State Department in turn negotiates a similar agreement with each approved public school district. Since 1946, the number of Iowa schools participating in the school lunch program has increased from 735 to 1,334.

Surplus Property

The State Agency for Surplus Property accepts Federal surplus property for distribution on an equitable basis to all tax-supported and tax-exempt schools, colleges, public health institutions and civil defense units within the state.

The agency is self-supporting. Each participant pays a nominal charge. Whenever surplus property is received in sufficient quantities (three or four thousand units of a particular item) a statewide bulletin is mailed. A centralized warehouse is maintained at the Iowa State Fairgrounds in Des Moines. Approximately 65 per cent of the schools and colleges in Iowa have participated during the biennium.

Transportation

The Department of Public Instruction, under the provision of Chapter 285, Code of Iowa, is responsible for general supervision of public school transportation. The Division of Transportation has continued to place major emphasis upon the health and safety of children and the efficient and economical operation of equipment.

All school buses, and private cars used as buses, are inspected annually by personnel of the Division of Transportation with the assistance of the Iowa Highway Safety Patrol.

Veterans' Education and Training:

The Department of Public Instruction is designated by the Governor as the Iowa State Approval Agency for the training of veterans under the provisions of Title 38, United States Code. The program provides vocational readjustment and restoration of educational opportunities to service men and women whose educational or vocational plans were interrupted by service in the Armed Forces.

The Veterans' Education and Training Division is responsible for inspection and supervision of industrial establishments and educational institutions offering courses and training to veterans under Federal laws.

Advanced Education and Instructional Services:

The Division of Advanced Education and Instructional Services is comprised of the five sections: Community Colleges, Continuing Education, Curriculum Services, Guidance Services, and Teacher Education and Certification.

The Community Colleges Section maintains contact with and renders service to the public junior colleges of the state. Annual visits are made to these institutions to offer consultative services and to evaluate them in terms of the approval standards established. Workshops and other types of meetings for administrators and teachers in these two-year institutions are held each year.

The Continuing Education Section is concerned with coordination of the educational services offered by the public school districts to citizens of all ages. It seeks the services of the personnel and the use of the facilities of public schools and colleges, and it fosters active cooperation of the schools and the many public and private community agencies concerned with continuing or adult education.

The Curriculum Services Section assumes leadership in the preparation and distribution of guides on both the elementary and secondary school levels. Although the development of these handbooks is directed by members of the State Department, the planning and writing is done cooperatively by selected teachers and administrators from colleges and school systems in the state. Thus, these guides are likely to reflect the thinking of highly qualified persons who are currently working directly with the children in Iowa classrooms. This Section seeks to improve the curriculums of the local school systems. In addition to the preparation and distribution of handbooks, work is done with local schools, in cooperation with the Division of Supervision, to help them develop their own curriculums.

The Guidance Services Section has the responsibility of providing leadership and service in the development, initiation, expansion, and evaluation of programs of guidance for school pupils. The activities of the Section cover information, consultation, and research. This Section also supervises the Iowa Plan of Title V-A of the National Defense Education Act entitled, "Guidance, Counseling, and Testing; Identification and Encouragement of Able Students."

The Teacher Education and Certification Section exercises leadership in the improvement of programs of preparation for teachers. It carries out the rules and regulations governing the approval of college and university programs of teacher education and the certification and approval of school personnel for the public schools of the state.

The State Board of Public Instruction establishes rules, as provided by law, for the approval of teacher education programs in colleges and for the certification of teachers. County superintendents are required to enforce the state law requiring that each teacher have a proper certificate.

The classes of certificates issued are: Permanent Professional, valid for lifetime; Professional, valid for ten-year term; Pre-Professional, valid for six-year term (available for original issuance only to teachers

of trade and industrial classes); Substitute, valid for six-year term; and Temporary, valid for one-year term. Each class of certificate is endorsed for the specific type of service which the holder is authorized to perform in the public schools.

Bulletin No. 32, "Certification and Approval of School Personnel," available without charge, gives additional information.

Special Education:

The Division of Special Education was created by an Act of the Iowa Legislature to promote, direct and supervise special education for handicapped children in the public schools. This original act (Chapter 281, Iowa Code) also defines "handicapped children" as those under 21 years of age who, by reason of physical defect, emotional maladjustment or mental retardation, cannot attend regular public school classes or profit sufficiently from ordinary instructional methods.

Consultative services from this division are available upon request, without charge.

Supervision:

It is the policy of the State Department of Public Instruction to maintain constant contact with local school districts through periodic visitations. These visitations provide opportunities to help persons in individual districts see their local school situations in relation to other districts throughout the state and in relation to desirable standards and trends as revealed by research.

It is the policy of the Department of Public Instruction to visit each high school district at least once every school year. Following the visitation a written evaluation is mailed to each superintendent, school board member, school board secretary and appropriate county superintendent.

Vocational Education:

The Division of Vocational Education promotes, develops, and supervises vocational programs for which state and federal monies are available to aid local schools. These programs consist of agricultural, distributive education, home economics education, practical nurses training, trade and industrial education, and area vocational programs.

Vocational programs are conducted by local boards of education in cooperation with the State Board of Public Instruction. All programs must meet the standards of the Iowa State Plan for Vocational Education. The State Plan is developed by the state and approved by the Federal Office of Education, Division of Vocational Education, and conforms with the provisions of the Smith-Hughes and George-Barden Acts of Congress.

"The Division of Vocational Education makes provision for the training of teachers for each service of vocational education. The three tax supported institutions of Iowa are designated for the training of vocational teachers. Iowa State University, Ames, trains teachers in the fields of agriculture, home economics, trade and industrial education, and guidance. The State College of Iowa, Cedar Falls, provides training for distributive education, home economics, and the State University of Iowa, Iowa City, offers a teacher-training program for practical nurses training and guidance."

Federal and state funds are made available for each year to aid local schools to finance vocational programs. These funds are used to reimburse approved local programs.

IOWA'S PUBLIC JUNIOR COLLEGE SYSTEM

The first public junior college in Iowa was organized as a department of the public schools of Mason City, and began operations in September, 1918. It was established without legal sanction, as there was no law on the statute books at the time authorizing the organization of junior colleges as a part of the public school system.

The first law authorizing the establishment of public junior colleges was enacted in 1927 by the Forty-second General Assembly. In recent years, as these colleges have extended their services more and more into the areas of terminal and adult education, they have come to be looked upon as community institutions. Hence, in 1959 the Fifty-eighth General Assembly amended the law to provide that these institutions could be designated as community colleges.

In 1949 the Fifty-third General Assembly first established a system of state aid of 25 cents per day of attendance for each junior college student carrying 12 or more semester hours of college work. In 1957 the Fifty-seventh General Assembly increased this amount to one dollar per day.

Burlington Junior College was organized in 1920. From then on, the movement spread rapidly, until by 1930 thirty towns in Iowa had organized junior colleges as a part of their public school systems. The junior college movement in Iowa reached its crest in 1927, during which year nine were added to the list. After 1930, no more junior colleges were added until 1946, when Clinton Junior College was organized. Keokuk Community College followed in 1953.

To be considered comprehensive in function, a junior college should encompass the following areas:

Academic: Each junior college should provide the first two years of senior college work for the students who plan a transfer to a senior college after completion of two years in junior college. This training should be broad enough to include the first two year requirements in the liberal arts, scientific, engineering, and professional fields.

Terminal Education: A complete training should be given those who will finish their period of formal education in the junior college. This training commonly referred to as terminal education should be designed to achieve occupational competence, civic competence, and personal adequacy.

Adult Education: Every junior college should co-operate with other educational institutions in providing instruction to meet the needs of adults living in the community. The program of training should include cultural and vocational education.

Guidance, Counseling, Testing: Another important function of public community or junior colleges is that of furnishing an adequate testing and guidance program for students enrolled in the institution. Such a program will tend to encourage those who can profit from additional college work to go on to a four-year institution of higher learning for the two additional years needed to acquire a Bachelor of Arts degree, or a degree in one of the professional fields.



IOWA BRAILLE AND SIGHT-SAVING SCHOOL

Vinton

Lee A. Iverson, Superintendent

The Iowa Braille and Sight-Saving School was opened at Iowa City on April 5, 1853. Nine years later (August, 1862) the school was moved to its present location at Vinton.

The Iowa Braille and Sight-Saving School is an educational institution which offers complete educational opportunity to visually handicapped boys and girls from the kindergarten through the high school. The curriculum parallels that found in the best public schools for the

fully sighted.

In addition to academic subjects, special emphasis is placed on music, industrial arts and physical education. After satisfactorily completing the four-year high school course, students may enter colleges and universities. The records of those who have done so have been excellent.

Supported by appropriations made by the State Legislature, the school is governed by the State Board of Regents. No charges are made for room, board, laundry, tuition and educational supplies. School is in session for a nine months' period.

In September, 1943, a sight-saving department was established to meet the needs of pupils with partial vision. Students in this department study large-type print instead of Braille and do their school work in classrooms especially equipped with excellent lighting, special desks, green chalk boards and other materials designed for this purpose.

The purpose of the Iowa Braille and Sight-Saving School is to prepare its boys and girls to take a contributory place in life. In addition to the regular academic course of study, pupils may enroll in industrial arts, music, home economics and physical education. Parties, dances, swiming, wrestling, band, chorus, track, 4-H Clubs, and skating are a few of the extra activities.

The annual enrollment is about 165 students.

From its establishment at Oakdale in 1908 until 1947 the State Sanatorium was supervised by the State Board of Control. In the latter year the 52nd General Assembly transferred the Sanatorium to the supervision of the State Board of Education. The proximity of the University Hospitals and the College of Medicine of the University to Oakdale and the importance of their services to the Sanatorium influenced this decision. The function of the State Sanatorium is to provide: 1) diagnosis of pulmonary tuberculosis and its complications; 2) treatment which includes rest, a well balanced diet, medical therapy and thoracic surgery and a period of graduated exercise before discharge, and 3) after-care of the discharged patient to discover any reactivation of the disease and insure permanent arrest.

Patients are admitted to Oakdale on certification by attending physicians, cost for their care being charged to the counties where they reside.

Recognizing that the tuberculosis patient needs help in adjustments and in pleasantly disposing of his time while his disease is undergoing arrest, the Sanatorium employs two registered occupational therapists to teach crafts to ambulatory patients and on the wards as well.

Since in most cases the patients cannot return to their former employment, a rehabilitation program is conducted to assist them in preparing for less strenuous vocations. Rehabilitation service is provided by the State Rehabilitation Division, with a resident counselor training patients while they are still under treatment, helping them locate suitable employment, and further assisting them in the period following their discharge from the Sanatorium.

The Sanatorium occupies approximately 575 acres, six miles northwest of Iowa City. Approximately 425 acres of this area is in farm lands.

The Sanatorium has an average of 325 resident patients and treats as many as 5,000 outpatients a year.

IOWA SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF

Council Bluffs

The Iowa School for the Deaf was founded in 1855, and was first located at Iowa City and then moved to Council Bluffs in 1870. In 1902, fire destroyed the main building, which housed the executive quarters and dormitories for pupils. A substantial fire-proof structure now stands in its place, where sufficient room is provided for 375 pupils.

The school represents a capital investment for the state of \$2,000,000 and occupies 200 acres, with twelve fine buildings and beautiful grounds. There is a separate building to accommodate 75 of the youngest pupils. The school affords an education for children of the state too deaf to make progress in the hearing schools. The entrance age is five years and students are required to remain in school until 19 years of age unless excused for good cause. The work embraces 13 years, with training largely through writing, speech, lip-reading and through the use of hearing aids where possible. The course of study provides a strong elementary education, together with substantial vocational training. The philosophy of the school is to bring the child with impaired hearing as near to normal as possible. Pupils of the school become skilled workmen, and graduates, with remarkably few exceptions, are selfsupporting, useful citizens of the state. Among the vocations taught are baking, shoe repairing, book-binding, printing, cabinet making and upholstering. Instruction in rhythm is also given, and a well-rounded course in almost everything which will make life more pleasant for those bereft of their hearing.

State University of Iowa

Iowa City

The pioneering vision of the First General Assembly of the State of Iowa created the State University of Iowa by an act adopted on Feb. 25, 1847. The state and its university have grown and developed together, and the influence of the institution has touched and benefited every city, village and home within the boundaries of Iowa.

The university's objectives have been three-fold: to educate in her classrooms, to advance the frontiers of knowledge through research, and to carry the wealth of knowledge from her libraries, her laboratories, and her learned faculty to the people of Iowa.

Throughout her history, the university has maintained an educational program of the highest integrity as the base for all her activities and the foundation upon which a superstructure of professional, semiprofessional, and graduate education has been erected. The university is a member of the Association of American Universities, an association of 41 of the outstanding institutions of higher learning in the United States and Canada.

The university has pioneered in liberal education, for both men and women students, and today ranks with the leaders in the general education movement.

Teaching and research functions have been carefully integrated at the university to achieve the greatest efficiency

in the teaching and learning processes. Balanced living with proper attention to pleasant housing, maintenance of good health, and recreational, religious, and cultural activities has been provided as no less important to a rounded college experience.

The University Today

From the days when she stood in the midst of Iowa's physical wilderness, the State University of Iowa has been on the world's educational frontier. While the university can point with justifiable pride to many distinguished contributions which its staff and students have made to the well-being of the State of Iowa and to the advancement of knowledge, the search for new knowledge is seldom spectacular in itself and only occasionally will public attention be drawn to some of the hundreds of university researchers who quietly seek to add to man's store of useful knowledge.

International attention has been focused on the university, for instance, because of the contribution which SUI physicists are making to this nation's scientific study of space. To cite yet another example of the university's research efforts, victims of the nervous disorder known as "Parkinson's Disease"-and their doctors-are looking hopefully to SUI's department of neurosurgery, where careful tests are being made of a device which utilizes high-frequency sound waves for delicate brain operations. And the recent launching of the American College Testing Program, important though it may ultimately be to hundreds of thou-

sands of college-age youth, is but another milestone in SUI's emergence as an internationally-recognized testing and test-processing center.

To provide instruction, foster research and respond to Iowa's demands for service, the State University of Iowa is organized into ten colleges, four schools, and several bureaus and institutes related to one or more of the colleges. To protect and restore the health of Iowa's people, the university offers the facilities of its medical center, which embraces four hospital units—the university general hospital, children's hospital, psychopathic hospital, and hospital school for severely handicapped children —and the state bacteriological laboratory.

The university's growth has proceeded apace with the general upward trend of college enrollment. The enrollment of 1,542 different campus students of college grade in 1900-01 rose to 9,283 in 1940-41, 40 years later.

During the war, in 1943-44, the campus enrollment of college grade went down to a low of 4,891. Then came the overwhelming influx of veteran students. Just four years later, 1948-49, the enrollment had risen to 13,354. This pattern is comparable to the experience of other large universities.

The enrollments in higher educational institutions fell away sharply beginning in 1950, due to the decline in the World War II veterans' enrollment of about 40 per cent from the post-war peak and because of the Korean conflict.

However, since 1953 the enrollment at the university has increased steadily and in the fall of 1960 an all-time high for one semester of 11,113 students was reached. Barring a major depression or war, enrollments are expected to continue to rise through the years for which predictions can now be made. A conservative estimate places the university's enrollment at 16,000 by the fall of 1970. The forecasts are based on the increased birth rate of the 1940's and 1950's and the fact that a greater percentage of college-age persons in the population now attends college. Of the 11,113 enrolled the first semester of the 1960-61 year, 7,791 were undergraduates, 2,302 were graduate students, and 1,020 were in the professional colleges.

The university usually enrolls from 21 to 23 per cent of the 4-year college enrollment in the State of Iowa, and grants about 30 per cent of all the degrees granted by Iowa colleges. This is perhaps the best evidence of the relationship of the university to the total pattern of higher education in the State of Iowa. The university is a partner with the four-year colleges and junior colleges of Iowa in the field of general education.

Beyond that level the university provides the professional and specialized programs which offer opportunities for further study at an advanced level for the graduates of junior colleges and four-year colleges, as well as for her own students. In so doing, the university is an integral and indispensable part of the total program of higher education in the State of Iowa.

Public Service

Service to the state stems naturally from the university's teaching and research functions. In addition to the variety of help and service provided by SUI's colleges and departments in the course of carrying out their day-to-day work, the university has established specialized teaching and research units which offer additional opportunities for direct service through making direct application of the knowledge gained in those units.

Some of the principal service units are: The University Hospitals, Psychopathic Hospital, the Hospital School for Severely Handicapped Children, the State Bacteriological Laboratory, and other affiliated organizations in the medical service field; the Iowa Child Welfare Research Station; the Extension Division with its bureaus of Audio-Visual Instruction and Correspondence Study; the Bureau of Business and Economic Research; the Bureau of Labor and Management; the News and Information Service; the Institute of Hydraulic Research; the Institute of Public Affairs; the Iowa Center for Continuation Study; the Institute of Gerontology; the Institute of Agricultural Medicine; the Agricultural Law Center; and the Iowa Urban Community Research Center.

Courses of Study

A minimum of four academic years of study is required for a baccalaureate degree from the College of Liberal Arts with its affiliated schools, and the same time is required for a bachelor's degree from the College of Business Administration. Engineering requires a minimum of four and one-half years and Pharmacy requires five, including one prepharmacy year.

Six years of study at the minimum, two in pre-professional and four in professional study, are required for a degree from the College of Dentistry. Law requires three and one-half years beyond the three years of liberal arts, while at least seven years are necessary, three in pre-medical and four in medical study, for the degree of Doctor of Medicine. A four-year course in nursing leads to the Bachelor of Science in Nursing. A one-year course for Practical Nurses is offered by the College of Nursing. Graduate work in nursing is available through the Graduate College and the College of Nursing.

Advanced degrees from the Graduate College are earned under approved programs of study and research, with a minimum of one year required for a master's degree and three years at the graduate level for the doctorate.

The various courses of study and the fields of specialization and the degrees conferred upon graduation are as follows:



BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION—Accounting, Economics, Labor and Management, Marketing, Office Management and Business Education, and General Business majors lead to the degree of Bachelor of Business Administration. Graduate work through the Ph.D. is offered.

DENTISTRY—Four-year course, in addition to two years of pre-dental study in the College of Liberal Arts, leading to the degree Doctor of Dental Surgery.

Graduate work leading to the degree of Master of Science from the Graduate College is available in several specialties. A course for the training of women in Dental Hygiene is offered.

EDUCATION—Courses for the professional preparation of undergraduate level teachers are integrated with the curricula of the Colleges of Liberal Arts and Business Administration and lead to degrees in those colleges. Graduate programs for teachers, principals, supervisors, superintendents, directors of student teaching, and research and teaching positions in higher education lead to the M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in the Graduate College.

ENGINEERING—Chemical, Civil, Electrical, and Mechanical Engineering leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in the designated curriculum; and Commercial leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science without designation. The bachelor's degree is typically attained in five years. In each curriculum certain specialized options may be elected; for example, automotive, industrial, aeronautical, hydraulic, sanitary, structural, communication, power, or metallurgical. Considerable emphasis is placed on graduate work leading to the Master of Science and Ph.D. degrees in Sanitary Engineering, Industrial and Management Engineering, and Mechanics and Hydraulics, as well as in the primary branches: Chemical, Civil, Electrical, and Mechanical.

LIBERAL ARTS—Actuarial Science, American Civilization, Art, Astronomy, Bacteriology, Biochemistry, Botany, Chemistry, Child Welfare, Chinese, Classics, Economics, Education, English, European Literature and Thought, Geography, Geology, German, Greek, History, Home Economics, Humanities, Hygiene, Journalism, Latin, Library Education, Mathematics, Medical Technology, Museum Training, Music, Occupational Therapy, Oriental Studies, Philosophy, Physical Education, Physics, Political Science, Psychology, Religion, Romance Languages (French, Spanish, Italian), Russian, Social Science, Social Work, Sociology and Anthropology, Speech and Dramatic Art, Speech Pathology and Audiology, and Zoology leading to the degree Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Music, Bachelor of Fine Arts or to advanced degrees through the Doctor of Philosophy.

Specialized courses in the Department of Chemistry and the Physical Education departments for men and women lead to the degree Bachelor of Science in the respective fields.

Students who select courses to prepare for dentistry, law, and medicine may study pre-professional subjects in the College of Liberal Arts for the required number of years and then enter the professional college. If all specific requirements for the bachelor's degree are included in the preprofessional program and the first year of professional study is completed successfully, the student may receive a bachelor's degree from the College of Liberal Arts, since the college will give credit for one year of professional work in lieu of the fourth year necessary for a bachelor's degree.

SCHOOL OF FINE ARTS—Combines departments of art, music, and dramatic art. Students enroll in the College of Liberal Arts or the Graduate College and may be candidates for one of the degrees of Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Music, Bachelor of Fine Arts, Master of Arts, Master of Fine Arts, or Doctor of Philosophy. SCHOOL OF JOURNALISM—Offers study sequences through the College of Liberal Arts in Community Journalism, Editorial Journalism, Radio Journalism, Television Journalism, Advertising, Magazine Journalism, Pictorial Journalism, High School Journalism Teaching, and Public Relations. Offers a Certificate of Journalism on the basis of scholarship and concentration in the field, and programs for the Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts degrees, and the Doctor of Philosophy degree in mass communications.

SCHOOL OF RELIGION—In cooperation with the College of Liberal Arts offers a field of concentration leading to Bachelor of Arts, Master of Arts, and Doctor of Philosophy degrees. It is inter-faith in nature and Catholic, Jewish, and Protestant professorships are maintained by the respective faiths.

SCHOOL OF SOCIAL WORK—Offers a two-year graduate curriculum as preparation for social work. Some undergraduate subjects recommended as preparation for professional training are given.

LAW—Three and one-half academic year course, in addition to three years of pre-law study in the College of Liberal Arts, leading to the degree LL.B. or J.D.

MEDICINE—Four-year course, in addition to at least three years of pre-medical study in the College of Liberal Arts, leading to the degree Doctor of Medicine.

The College of Medicine offers postgraduate work leading to advanced degrees in the Graduate College. Special training is also offered in Physical Therapy, Occupational Therapy, and Radiology.

At frequent intervals each year, the College of Medicine also offers postgraduate conferences designed to provide new and refresher information for practitioners in the State of Iowa.

NURSING—The degree Bachelor of Science in Nursing is offered at the conclusion of the four-year program, of which the first year is completed in the College of Liberal Arts.

Work is offered through the Graduate College toward the Master's degree in Nursing. A one-year course for Practical Nurses is offered.

PHARMACY—Five-year course, leading to the degree Bachelor of Science in Pharmacy, including unique training in Hospital Pharmacy. Advanced work through the Ph.D. is also offered.

GRADUATE—Opportunity for study at the graduate level is available in all fields listed above at this time. It is also available in the fields of Child Welfare and Hospital Administration. Such study leads to the degrees Master of Arts, Master of Fine Arts, Master of Science, and Doctor of Philosophy.

CORRESPONDENCE STUDY—Courses at the college level are offered in many of the departments through the Extension Division for students who cannot be in residence but wish to prepare themselves for more effective work in their respective occupations, or who wish to continue work toward degrees while out of residence.

The Campus

Symbolic center of the State University of Iowa's 1,300-acre campus is Old Capitol, last capitol of the Iowa Territory and first capitol of the State of Iowa. In its pioneer simplicity it is one of the State's most beautiful structures. Some 80 other buildings and facilities on the campus comprise a physical plant valued today at approximately \$68,500,000. As of June 30, 1960, tax funds had provided 43 per cent of building construction costs, gifts had provided 16 per cent, and earnings from self-liquidating facilities had provided 41 per cent. During the 1959-61 biennium, the following construction was completed at the University: Law Center; utilities (improvement of water and power plant facilities; improvement and expansion of water and steam distribution systems); Volatile Solvent Storage Building; University Library addition; Chemistry Building addition (classrooms, laboratories, and offices); Student Infirmary; Psychopathic Hospital addition (emotionally disturbed children's facilities); Hillcrest Dormitory dining addition; Hawkeye Apartments for married students and accompanying central utilities plant; running track and accompanying outdoor track and field facilities. Budgets for these projects totaled \$7,711,145, of which \$4,846,400 was provided by appropriated (tax) funds, the remainder being met from gifts, grants, athletic earnings or anticipated earnings of self-liquidating housing units.

A number of individual repair, replacement and alteration projects have also been completed in the past biennium, financed from legislative appropriations made for this purpose. Other "RR&A" projects will be undertaken in the current biennium, as the university seeks to preserve its valuable physical plant and meet current needs for modernized instructional space.

During the 1961-63 biennium, work will proceed on the following major construction projects at the State University of Iowa:

Completion of Pharmacy Building and Psychopathic Hospital research addition.

(A total of \$1,635,000 was appropriated by the Fifty-eighth General Assembly for the two preceding projects.)

Utilities (construction of water treatment plant, power supply study, increase of electrical capacity); building to house accelerator (Physics Department); general classroom and educational building (Board of Regents authorized by the General Assembly to build separate facilities, or any combination of facilities, in the form of a Physics and Mathematics Building, Engineering Building addition, and a Business Administration Building in lieu of the general classroom and educational building if the separate facilities are found to be more practical and economical); Zoology Building addition; Chemistry Building addition (lecture auditorium); University Hospitals Minimal Care Unit; and Mentally Retarded Children's Center.

(To accomplish the seven preceding projects, \$8,381,000 was appropriated by the Fifty-ninth General Assembly. The total appropriation by the General Assembly to the State University of Iowa, including State Services units, for capital improvements, repairs, replacements, alterations, and equipment was \$10,290,000.)

Educational Testing

The State University of Iowa has long been recognized in educational circles as a leading institution for the development of educational tests. Most recent of the testing programs to originate at the university is the American College Testing (ACT) program, launched in late 1959 to provide hundreds of U. S. colleges and universities with new and statistically sound information on their entering freshmen. During the 1960-61 school year the tests were administered to some 200,000 students who planned to seek enrollment among 535 participating institutions of higher learning.

That the State University of Iowa has come to occupy this position of leadership in educational testing depends to no little extent upon three electronic test-scoring machines designed and to a great extent built at the university. Greatly out-performing any previous scoring equipment, the first of these units went into operation in the mid 1950's.

Designer of the unique equipment is Dr. E. F. Lindquist, professor of education, director of the Iowa Testing Programs at SUI since 1929, and



COMPUTATIONS DONE HERE BY MILLIONS




originator of the universally used Iowa Tests of Educational Development and Iowa Tests of Basic Skills. Dr. Lindquist also heads Measurement Research Center, an independent, non-profit corporation devoted to research in electronic test processing, which makes its headquarters on the Iowa City campus. The center is a development of the university's growing activity in the testing field. MRC now employs the most extensive electronic data-processing facilities used for educational testing and research anywhere in the world.

Widespread use of the Iowa Tests of Educational Development and the Iowa Tests of Basic Skills had outstripped the scoring and reporting capacity of even the large number of clerical workers, equipped with the most modern business machines, which Dr. Lindquist had assembled in the Iowa Testing Programs headquarters. Dr. Lindquist spent nearly four years in designing, building and testing the first scoring unit, used for the first time in 1955. Two other machines have since been built and put into operation, and these in turn led to the design and construction of yet another unique machine, called the "Document Reader," which is making possible the rapid processing of great quantities of educational data. In combination, two powerful electronic computers, IBM models 7070 and 1401, are used in the millions of computations involved in the many testing programs processed by Measurement Research Center, and also provide computing for University of Iowa faculty members and students engaged in hundreds of research projects.

Iowa State University of Science and Technology

Ames

As America's people flooded westward a century ago an industrial revolution was stirring the land. In this pioneering age were ardent supporters of education. But they dreamed of a new sort of education, particularly at the higher levels, which was to be tailored to new times

and a great new nation.

Where, heretofore, colleges and universities had confined themselves to classical studies and the training for such professions as teaching, the ministry, medicine and law, it was now proposed that they should meet more directly the practical needs of all citizens. This new education was to be made available at minimum cost to the individual.

Particularly did Americans want emphasis on research and instruction which would increase agricultural production and improve conditions of rural life. Joined with this was an insistence on research and instruction in technology and engineering.

Iowans were believers in this new philosophy. Almost from the beginning of statehood in 1846 they had talked about the establishment of an agricultural college, since agriculture was almost the sole industry on the Iowa prairie more than 100 years ago.

The bill creating such a college was drafted by three young and progressive farmers who were members of the Seventh General Assembly which passed the measure. Benjamin F. Gue was from Scott County, Robert A. Richardson from Fayette County, and Ed Wright from Cedar County.

Governor Ralph P. Lowe signed the bill into law on March 22, 1858, making that the official birthday of the institution.

Meanwhile, in Congress, Justin P. Morrill had been advocating federal aid for the new education. It was his bill, passed by Congress, and signed by President Abraham Lincoln on July 2, 1862, that provided for federal lands to be sold in each state for endowment. In the new colleges the leading object would be "without excluding other scientific and classical studies, and including military tactics, to teach such branches of learning as are related to agriculture and the mechanic arts, in such manner as the legislatures of the States may respectively prescribe, in order to promote the liberal and practical education of the industrial classes in the several pursuits and professions in life."

Iowa was the first state to accept the provisions of the Morrill Land-Grant Act.

It was a broad charter to make higher education available on a more nearly universal level, and to include areas of study which heretofore had not been taught by the classical colleges and universities.

The Land-Grant idea became an amazing success and as a vital force in our present system of higher education is successfully meeting the problems of our times. For 100 years Iowa State has been a leader in Land-Grant affairs. During that time it has become a great scientific and technological university. Iowa State was the first Land-Grant institution to admit women from the beginning. It became a pioneer in Home Economics, and today has the largest program in this area to be found anywhere in the world.

Iowa State was the first to establish a school of Veterinary Medicine at a state institution.

Iowa State took the lead in teaching and research in Agriculture. Its faculty almost from the beginning worked with all Iowa through institutes and short courses in various parts of the state. It developed the first pattern of the Extension Service in Agriculture and Home Economics now used throughout the nation. It began early to work with farm youth in the program that later became the 4-H.

In Engineering Iowa State was the first (with Illinois) to organize its research into an Engineering Experiment Station, and it developed one of the large and fine engineering schools of the nation.

In Science it achieved wide fame in the physical and biological sciences. During World War II, Iowa State scientists solved some key problems in the production of uranium for defense uses. Following the war the United States Atomic Energy Commission located a major laboratory on the campus as a part of the Iowa State Institute for Atomic Research.

By act of the Iowa General Assembly, Iowa State officially became Iowa State University of Science and Technology on July 4, 1959. In its early days it had been known as "Iowa State Agricultural College and Model Farm" and in 1896 its name had been changed to "Iowa State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts." The change to the title of Iowa State University came as a recognition that in its program of education and research in various sciences it had, in fact, attained the scope and function of a university.

The year 1962 has been designated for a nationwide observance of the centennial of the signing of the Morrill Land-Grant Act. The observance will recognize the philosophy involved in the Act as perhaps the most important contribution of America to education. Similar philosophy has been incorporated into many colleges and universities abroad in the past century.

The idea of opening the doors of universities to all persons capable of learning instead of only a chosen few has received wide approval. The joining of practical studies to the liberal arts to serve social and economic ends as well as cultural purposes also has been acclaimed.


When Lincoln signed the Land-Grant Act, one farm worker in America was producing enough food for himself and three and one-half other persons. Today a single farm worker in this country produces enough for himself and 26 others.

This ratio of output is unprecedented in world history. It has been in a large part the result of research and education by the Land-Grant colleges and universities, working in cooperation with their states and the United States Department of Agriculture.

Besides granting almost all degrees in agricultural subjects, these institutions confer about one-half of all U. S. doctorates in the sciences, in engineering, and the health professions, and one-fourth of the total in arts and languages, business and education.

The Land-Grant Centennial will emphasize the importance of looking to the future and continuing to make these institutions truly "people's colleges." Iowa State's aim always has been to keep abreast of the needs of the people.

In the fall of 1960 the University began the operation of a Technical Institute within the College of Engineering. The Institute trains the type of highly-skilled technician who is much in demand in Iowa's expanding industrial economy. The technician serves as a connecting link between the engineer or scientist on one hand and the production worker on the other. Programs of the Technical Institute are two years in



length, and options are offered in electronics technology, mechanical technology, and construction technology.

At the Ames Laboratory of the United States Atomic Energy Commission the AEC currently is completing approximately \$6,000,000 of new construction, which has included a new Metals Development Building and a 5,000 kilowatt nuclear reactor. These additional facilities have been added in recognition of the importance of the Laboratory in contributing to the advancement of nuclear science and the development of new materials essential in the AEC program.

Near Ames the Agricultural Research Service of the United States Department of Agriculture began operation in 1961 of a \$16,000,000 National Animal Disease Laboratory which is to employ several hundred scientists, technicians and auxiliary workers. The Laboratory will serve as a national center for research in the control and eradication of livestock diseases which annually cost producers and the public large sums in loss of animals. While operating independently from Iowa State, the laboratory will work in close cooperation with it. Location of the laboratory at Ames came in part as recognition of the excellent programs in animal industry, veterinary medicine and basic science at Iowa State, as well as the extensive collections of scientific journals in its library.

Iowa State began a program in conjunction with Baroda University of India and the Ford Foundation in 1960 to put the science of home economics to work more effectively for the Indian people. With Ford funds and Iowa State guidance, Baroda is strengthening its home economics teaching and research. Through Baroda's leadership much may be done to improve the nutrition, sanitation, child care and housing of India's immense population. Twofold objective of the Baroda-Iowa State-Ford project is the development of a program of study, in India, at the M.S. and Ph.D levels, and the establishment of research programs. The research is to be directed to problems of families in India, with special emphasis on village families.

Enrollment on the campus at Iowa State increased by 485 in the fall quarter of 1960 as compared with the fall quarter of 1959, and reached a total of 9,726 students.

New departments of nuclear engineering and biochemistry and biophysics were formed in 1960, reflecting the advancement of science and engineering into new areas.

The University continues to serve Iowa, in the three areas of resident undergraduate and graduate instruction, research and statewide service.

The following curricula, leading to the degree Bachelor of Science, are now offered:

AGRICULTURE—Agricultural Business (with options in Farm Management, Marketing Management, Agricultural Economics, Public Service and Administration), Agricultural Education, Agricultural Engineering, Agricultural Journalism, Agronomy, Animal Husbandry, Dairy Husbandry, Dairy Industry (with options in Chemistry or Economics), Entomology, Farm Operation, Fish and Wildlife Management, Food Technology, Forestry (with options in Forest Management and Forest Products), Horticulture, Industrial Education, Landscape Architecture (with option in Urban Planning), Plant Pathology, Poultry Husbandry, Rural Sociology.

ENGINEERING—Aerospace Engineering, Agricultural Engineering, Architecture, Architectural Engineering, Ceramic Engineering, Chemical Engineering, Civil Engineering, Electrical Engineering, Engineering Operations, Engineering Science, Industrial Engineering, Mechanical Engineering.

HOME ECONOMICS—Applied Art, Child Development, Food and Nutrition (with majors in Dietetics, Experimental Foods or Community Nutrition), Home Economics for General Education, Home Economics Journalism, Home Economics and Related Science, Home Economics Education, Home Management, Household Equipment, Institution Management (with majors in College Food and Housing Administration, Restaurant Management or School Food Service), Textiles and Clothing, Textiles and Clothing Merchandising, Physical Education for Women.

SCIENCE AND HUMANITIES—Bacteriology, Biochemistry, Biophysics, Botany, Chemistry, Distributed Studies, Economics, English and Speech, Genetics, Geology, Government, History, Industrial Administration, Mathematics, Modern Languages, Naval Science, Physical Education for Men, Physical Education for Women, Physics, Psychology, Sociology, Statistics, Technical Journalism, Zoology. (Also special programs in preparation for human medicine and preparation for veterinary medicine.)

In addition, the University offers studies leading to the degree of Bachelor of Architecture (five-year program) and Doctor of Veterinary Medicine (six-year program), and offers graduate courses leading to the degrees of Master of Science and Doctor of Philosophy.

Research Program

Research at the University is organized within six units, each of which has a responsibility in a particular area:

THE IOWA AGRICULTURAL AND HOME ECONOMICS EXPERI-MENT STATION conducts research on the campus at Ames and at farms near Ames and Ankeny, as well as in outlying farms and experimental plots in major soil areas of the state.

THE IOWA ENGINEERING EXPERIMENT STATION has as its objectives to foster and develop the industries of Iowa through engineering research, to aid in the development of raw materials and natural resources of the state, to increase utilization of agricultural by-products, and to aid in the solution of engineering problems for industry and for the state and local governments.

THE INDUSTRIAL SCIENCE RESEARCH INSTITUTE provides fundamental facts and principles which underlie the successful solution of agricultural and industrial problems of Iowa.

THE INSTITUTE FOR ATOMIC RESEARCH includes the Ames Laboratory of the United States Atomic Energy Commission, where basic research is conducted in the field of nuclear energy.

THE STATISTICAL LABORATORY is a cooperative project with the Bureau of Agricultural Economics of the United States Department of Agriculture, and has developed techniques of great assistance to modern research.

THE VETERINARY MEDICAL RESEARCH INSTITUTE works on problems of controlling or eradicating disease in food producing animals.


Extension Services

THE COOPERATIVE EXTENSION SERVICE IN AGRICULTURE AND HOME ECONOMICS is part of a nationwide Extension Service operating through the United States Department of Agriculture. In addition to several hundred paid employees, nearly 50,000 volunteers each year assist in carrying extension activities to every county in Iowa. In a single year information from the Extension Service results in changed practices on more than 125,000 Iowa farms, and in 70,000 homes.

ENGINEERING EXTENSION operates in the fields of public service, industry, technology and engineering. It conducts vocational-educational training for persons in semi-technical or technical positions for which an engineering degree is not required. It carries on professional education for engineers, executives and supervisory personnel of industry. It gives specific advisory and information assistance to Iowa industries, municipalities, associations and citizens.

In addition, the University maintains public services such as its radio and television stations, which devote large portions of their programming to education and public service features, and its largely self-supporting seed testing laboratory and soil testing laboratory.

A further public service are the 100 or more special short courses and conferences held on the campus each year.



MILLIONTHS OF AN INCH Mechanical measurements in the order of millionths of an inch are made possible by this equipment at the Institute for Atomic Research. Institute for Atomic Research


The unusual services of Iowa State scientists, and especially of Dr. F. H. Spedding, in World War II led to the creation of the Institute for Atomic Research which operates the Ames Laboratory of the United States Atomic Energy Commission.

The Institute and the Laboratory currently employ approximately 600 persons on the campus of the university. Facilities for operations have been erected at a cost of more than \$14,000,000, with most of the funds coming from the Atomic Energy Commission. Dr. Spedding serves as director of the Institute and of the Laboratory.

Although a new era in science began in 1939 with discovery of nuclear

fission, it was not until the advent of World War II that an all-out effort in the development of atomic energy was begun by the federal government as part of the national defense effort.

Early in 1942 the Plutonium Project was established at the University of Chicago. Dr. Spedding was invited to set up and direct the chemical program which would be needed to accompany the program in physics. Dividing his time between Ames and Chicago, Dr. Spedding enlisted the aid of colleagues on campus in setting up a small laboratory at Iowa

State. The laboratory at Ames was to carry the bulk of the metallurgical research and would also conduct fundamental studies of certain phases of the chemistry of plutonium and other materials of importance in the development of machines for the release of atomic energy.

The most pressing of many problems facing the group was the preparation of large amounts of pure uranium metal. At this time metallic uranium was a laboratory curiosity costing about a thousand dollars a pound.


The problems of preparation of the pure metal and of melting and casting it were solved by Dr. Spedding and his Ames group. An old campus building served as a production plant to help supply the muchneeded uranium for reactors at Chicago, Ill., Oak Ridge, Tenn., and Hanford, Wash.

During a very crucial period of the war, the major uranium metal needs of the American atomic effort depended upon metal processing at Ames. More than 2,000,000 pounds were produced.

This pilot project also served to demonstrate the then little understood process of producing uranium metal. Trips to the laboratory were frequent, and the engineers who came left with vital information on plant design—information unobtainable elsewhere. The Ames process supplanted all others, which even at their cheapest point were 20 times more expensive. Other research developments at Ames played highly important if somewhat less spectacular roles in the national defense program.

Following the war, the Institute for Atomic Research was formally organized in 1947, and the Ames Laboratory of the AEC officially located on the Iowa State campus.

Since then significient contributions to the field of chemistry, physics, metallurgy and engineering have continued to come from the laboratories of the Institute.

Many of these have been in the development of new materials for the atomic energy program and determination of the properties of these materials. Processes for obtaining a number of metals generally known as "the rare earths" have been devised. These processes have been developed to the point where they have been turned over to industry. Research on the rare earths has resulted in important basic information on the thermodynamic, magnetic and electrical properties of the metals and their salts.

A large number of other research projects, including large scale production of thorium and yttrium, have been completed.

Iowa State has conferred the Ph.D. degree on more than 300 students who have received research experience at the Institute as part of their graduate study. The University has granted upwards of 275 M.S. degrees for which research requirements have been met through Institute programs. Many of these scientists now hold important positions at other atomic research laboratories.


In 1961 a \$4.4 million research reactor was authorized by the Atomic Energy Commission for its Ames Laboratory. Completion is scheduled for early in 1963.

State College of Iowa

Formerly Iowa State Teachers College

Cedar Falls

The State of Iowa maintains at Cedar Falls an institution of higher education whose primary responsibility is the preparation of teachers and other educational personnel for schools, colleges, and universities, and the provision of consultative and other services, including experimentation with instructional content, method and materials, for the improvement of the educational program of the state.

The Fifty-Ninth General Assembly authorized the college at Cedar Falls, effective July 5, 1961, to broaden its function by of-"programs of infering struction in the liberal and vocational arts and such other educational programs as the State Board of Regents may from time to time approve." The same General Assembly also approved the changing of the name of the institution to State College of Iowa as of July 5, 1961.

The institution had its origin in an act of the Sixteenth General Assembly creating the Iowa State Normal School; instruction began on Sept. 6, 1876. In 1904 the institution was authorized to offer a fouryear curriculum and the bachelor's degree. In 1909 the name of the institution was changed to the Iowa State Teachers College. In 1952 the State Board of Education (now the State Board of Regents) approved a graduate curricu-

lum leading to a Master of Arts in Education degree, and, in 1960, the Board of Regents authorized the addition of a second year of graduate work leading to a Specialist in Education (Ed. S.) degree.

The enrollment of 3,610 full-time students during the fall semester of 1960 represents an increase of 62% since the fall of 1953. Ordinarily, 30% to 35% of the undergraduate students plan to become elementary teachers; 50% to 55%, secondary teachers; 10% specialists in such areas as teachers of art or music and school librarians; and only 5% to 8% plan for careers other than in the field of education. Enrollment of graduate students amounts to 4% to 6% of the total enrollment during the academic year but increases to approximately 35% during the summer session. From 80% to 85% of each year's teacher-education graduates begin to teach within a short time after graduation; the vast majority teach in Iowa public schools.

(1) Undergraduate Education

Most students are planning to become teachers, and for these the college offers three curricula: elementary teaching (kindergarten through grade six), junior high school teaching (grades seven, eight and nine), and high school teaching. High school teachers are prepared in the following areas: art, business education, English, foreign languages (French, Spanish, German, and Latin), home economics, industrial arts, mathematics, music, physical education (for both men and women), physical science, biological science, safety education, social science, speech and speech correction, and school librarianship.

Each undergraduate curriculum for the education of teachers has three parts: (a) the general education program, designed to improve the student as a person and as a citizen; (b) work in areas of specialization, designed to give depth of understanding in one or more subjectmatter areas necessary for success as a teacher, and (c) the professional education program, designed to assist the prospective teacher in developing knowledge of the teaching-learning process, of the school as a social institution, and of materials and methods of instruction, as well as skill in actual teaching in the public schools.

The general education program consists of a common core of courses, amounting to approximately three-eights of the four-year program, with work in social science, science and mathematics, the humanities, and communication skills.

The professional education program, amounting to about one-sixth of the four-year program for prospective high school teachers and about one-fourth for those who plan to teach at the elementary or junior high school level, provides for study and practical experiences in the art of teaching and in the understanding of children and the modern school.

The college maintains the Malcolm Price Laboratory School primarily to provide opportunities for students to observe children in classroom situations and to see how good teachers handle specific teaching problems. The laboratory school enrolls some 800 students of the Cedar Falls community school system.


A curriculum laboratory containing instructional materials from all over the nation, as well as audio-visual aids, is widely used by students and teachers. A very limited number of students do their student teaching in the laboratory school. Most student teaching is done in affiliated public schools—Waterloo, Mason City, Fort Dodge, Newton and the Iowa Braille and Sight-Saving School at Vinton.

The work in the area of specialization seeks to provide the depth in one or more fields deemed necessary for teaching in this subject at a specified level.

Undergraduate degree programs for those students who are not interested in teaching are available in the same general fields as for high school teachers: art, business, English, Spanish, French, German, physical science, biological science, mathematics, industrial arts, home economics, music, history, geography and social science, speech, and physical education. The non-teaching curricula require the same general education program as the teaching curricula and a few additional courses to give greater academic breadth. Many of the non-teaching curricula require evidence of proficiency in a foreign language; specific course requirements in the area of specialization are frequently somewhat different from those required in teacher preparation programs.

(2) Graduate Education

Since 1952, the college has offered graduate work leading to the Master of Arts in Education degree. Curricula are available for elementary teachers and for secondary teachers of art, business education, English, mathematics, music, industrial arts, speech, science, and social science,



and for such school administrative positions as superintendent, principal, supervisor and counselor.

Beginning with the summer of 1960, a second year of graduate work leading to the Specialist in Education degree has been offered. The following curricula have been approved by the State Board of Regents: school superintendents, high school and elementary principals and supervisors, and guidance and counseling.

(3) In-Service Education

The college feels that it has a definite responsibility to assist school administrators and teachers throughout the state with instructional and administrative problems. To do this, many conferences are held on the campus each year; some thirty pamphlets, monographs, and books have been published and are distributed at cost; staff members serve as consultants at workshops and conferences; by radio and television a dozen programs are broadcast each week; and extension classes and correspondence study are made available to teachers in service. The college owns and operates an FM-radio station, the equipment for which was purchased from funds donated by alumni and friends of the college. The FM station is on the air four hours a day, five days a week.

Most significant is the program of consultant services to the schools of the state. Under this program, staff members are relieved of their regular departmental duties for a semester and are scheduled to visit schools which have asked for assistance. In addition to the aid given to the school system, this program provides an excellent opportunity for members of the college staff to keep in touch with the public schools.

The State College of Iowa is primarily a residential college; nearly one-half of the men students and five-sixths of the women live on campus. Although there are fraternities and sororities, these organizations are not permitted to maintain houses. Extra-curricular activities of both the recreational and educational types are available at all seasons of the year.

Private Colleges and Universities

In addition to its three state institutions of higher learning, Iowa has a group of privately endowed liberal arts colleges and universities which are material factors in making this state stand first in literacy and intelligence. There are few places in Iowa more than 40 to 50 miles distant from some institution of higher learning well fitted by curriculum and faculty to teach those things which lead to the higher and better life and provide the education that makes for culture and higher citizenship.

Private colleges of Iowa which offer four-year liberal arts courses are the following, arranged alphabetically:

Buena Vista College, Storm Lake

Buena Vista is a Christian, four-year, coeducational liberal arts college related to the United Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. It is a fully accredited member of the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

Having a faculty and administration numbering 50 and a full-time student body of 525 with an evening and part-time enrollment of about 190 persons, the college offers majors and minors in religion and philosophy, biology, business administration, chemistry, elementary education, English, health and physical education, history, mathematics, physics, music, sociology, and speech, plus minors in art, economics, foreign languages, general science, and medical technology. The campus contains six major buildings.

Antedated by an academy at Calliope and Fort Dodge, the college at Storm Lake was organized July 8, 1891, by a committee representing the presbyteries of Fort Dodge and Sioux City. At its next meeting, the Synod of Iowa unanimously adopted Buena Vista College as its own.

the Synod of Iowa unanimously adopted Buena Vista College as its own. President since Feb. 1, 1961, is the Rev. Wendell Q. Halverson, D.D. Registrar is William D. Brown.

Briar Cliff College, Sioux City

Briar Cliff College, founded in 1930 and conducted by the Sisters of St. Francis of the Holy Family, Dubuque, is a fully accredited four-year Catholic liberal arts college for women. The campus covers 70 acres. With an enrollment approximating 500, this small college of distinction offers programs leading to B.A., B.S., and B.M. degrees with provision for advanced placement for especially well prepared freshmen and special guidance for gifted students. Sister Mary Matilda Adams, O.S.F., is president.

Central College, Pella

Central College, at Pella, was opened in 1853 as a Baptist institution. In 1916, the sponsorship was transferred to the Reformed Church in America. Accredited by the North Central Association and the Association of American Colleges, this four-year Christian liberal arts college now has 500 students from 19 states and seven foreign countries, representing 21 religious denominations. A faculty of 38 offers major work in art, biology, botany, chemistry, dramatics, economics and business administration, English, French, German, geography, history, home economics, Latin, mathematics, music, physical education, physics, political science, psychology, philosophy, sociology, speech and zoology, plus background courses in religion, social service, education (elementary and secondary), law, engineering and government service. A new library was dedicated in 1957 and an addition to the women's dormitory and a new dining hall were built during 1958. Two chemistry laboratories, an electronic learning center, book store and FM radio station are more recent additions. President is Arend D. Lubbers and registrar is Mrs. Wilma Rempe.

Clarke College, Dubuque

Known formerly as Mount St. Joseph College, Clarke was renamed in 1929 to honor the foundress of the Sisters of Charity, B.V.M., who administer the college and who staff it with the assistance of sisters of other orders, priests, lay men and lay women. It is a college for women, with a faculty student ratio of 1-14. On its 70-acre campus on the bluffs of the Mississippi River, Clarke has eight large buildings. The 920 students come from 27 states and 12 foreign countries.

Fully accredited, Clarke holds membership in the American Association of University Women and in the National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education. It offers majors in art, biology, chemistry, economics, English, French, history, home economics, Latin, mathematics, music, psychology, sociology, Spanish, speech and drama, and it prepares students for teaching.

Under Clarke's junior year abroad plan, students enroll at the University of Vienna, University of Madrid, or the University of Paris. Sister Mary Benedict, B.V.M., is president, and Sister Mary Francine, B.V.M., is registrar.

Coe College, Cedar Rapids

Coe College was founded in 1851 by the Rev. Williston Jones, who opened a school in his home for 16 young scholars. When incorporated in 1881, the college had acquired its present site as a gift from Daniel Coe. Leander Clark and Western Colleges were absorbed in 1919. Coeducational, and related to the Presbyterian Church, Coe is a liberal arts college, with faculty members selected from leading universities. On a foundation in the humanities, social sciences, and natural sciences, majors are offered in some twenty fields.

Coe has a chapter of Phi Beta Kappa, belongs to the Associated Colleges of the Midwest, its chemistry department is accredited by the American Chemical Society. Its teacher education program is recognized by the state. Enrollment is approximately 800. Modern techniques of teaching include a language laboratory, independent study, and honors work.

Cornell College, Mount Vernon

Cornell College, Mount Vernon, founded in 1853, is a coeducational, liberal arts college with an enrollment of 760 students. Cornell has a chapter of Phi Beta Kappa and six other national honor societies. An honors program and advanced standing for students of superior ability are recent additions to the college program. Although the college is related to the Methodist Church, it is non-sectarian in student body and staff. The campus consists of 29 buildings on a wooded hilltop.

The student-faculty ratio is 11 to 1, and over half the faculty have their doctorates. The college provides an opportunity to study in 29 different fields. Admission is selective, and the Scholastic Aptitude Test of the College Entrance Board is required of all applicants. A scholarship, grant-in-aid, and work program is provided for worthy students in need of financial assistance, and a generous loan program is available.

Drake University, Des Moines

Drake University was founded in Des Moines in 1881 by a group of civic leaders, educators, ministers and laymen of the Christian Church. Drake was named after Governor Francis Marion Drake of Centerville. Drake is an independent, non-tax-supported university consisting of nine colleges: liberal arts, business administration, education, fine arts, pharmacy, law, Divinity, community (evening study) and the graduate division. The university grants seven undergraduate degrees, eight graduate degrees and two professional degrees. Drake has been on the approved list of the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools since that association was establised in 1913. Special events at Drake each year include the famous Drake Relays; "The Messiah," which Drake has presented for more than 70 consecutive years; and numerous concerts, lectures, recitals, plays, etc. The campus is situated in northwest Des Moines. Nine buildings of prize-winning contemporary design have been added to the campus since 1949. Dr. Henry G. Harmon has been president since 1941.

University of Dubuque, Dubuque

The University of Dubuque, now in its second century, was founded in 1852 by Adrian Van Vliet as a theological school. It now consists of both a college of liberal arts and a theological seminary. The college is one of 45 and the seminary one of seven such institutions in the United States affiliated with the United Presbyterian Church, U. S. A. Both are fully accredited institutions with separate student bodies sharing the same campus with separate facilities and separate faculties.

President of the university is Dr. Gaylord M. Couchman. Dr. Calvin Schnucker is dean of the seminary and Dr. Victor C. Arnold is dean of the college of liberal arts. Prof. William Rozeboom serves as college registrar and Miss Margaret Saum as seminary registrar. The college enrollment is about 610 and the seminary regularly enrolls some 150 students.

The university attracts students from 20 foreign nations and from all parts of the United States. The seminary is nationally known for its pioneering efforts in town and country ministry.

Graceland College, Lamoni

Graceland College was founded in 1895 by the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. From the beginning the college was intended to be a non-sectarian school where young people could receive a good education, coupled with standards of high Christian ideals. George N. Briggs became president in 1915 and the institution became an accredited junior college. In April of 1960, Graceland was accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools as a baccalaureate degree granting institution. The first four-year offering was a major in religion. During the 1961-62 school year curriculums are offered leading to a B.A. degree with majors in religion, biological science, physical science, elementary education, physical education, medical technology, business administration, executive secretarial. An Associate in Arts degree is awarded to those completing two years. The 1960-61 student body of 847 represented 45 states and 15 foreign nations. Oliver Houston is registrar, and Dr. Harvey H. Grice, president.

Grinnell College, Grinnell

Grinnell College was founded in 1846, the same year that Iowa became a state. Established as Iowa College at Davenport by the "Iowa Band" of young Congregational ministers, the college moved to Grinnell in 1859 to merge with Grinnell University, which had been founded in 1856. The two continued as Iowa College until 1909, when the present name was adopted.

Grinnell is a privately endowed, residential, coeducational liberal arts college. Its 1,175 students come from 42 states and several foreign countries; and the faculty numbers 98, of whom more than two-thirds hold the Ph.D. degree or its equivalent. Since 1955, the college has been headed by Dr. Howard R. Bowen, its seventh president. While emphasis is strongly placed on liberal arts, the curriculum provides preprofessional preparation for medicine, dentistry, law, engineering, theology, business, government service and teaching. On its 90-acre campus the college has more than 30 buildings, including a new \$1,200,000 library and a new \$1,500,000 fine arts center.

Iowa Wesleyan College, Mount Pleasant

Iowa Wesleyan College was first organized as the Mount Pleasant Literary Institute in 1842 and reorganized the following year as the Mount Pleasant Collegiate Institute, and is the oldest college in Iowa having a continuous history from the time it was founded. The college has always been under the control of the Methodist Church. The name was changed to Iowa Wesleyan University in 1849 and to Iowa Wesleyan College in 1911.

Emphasis is on liberal arts. Among the areas strengthened have been religion, language, psychology, and education. In recent years, a Student Union, and Women's Dormitory have been constructed. A \$1,250,000 Hall of Science was dedicated in 1961. The faculty numbers about 42. Dr. J. Raymond Chadwick is president, and Harold A. Renwick, registrar.

Loras College, Dubuque

Loras College, a Catholic Church institution, at Dubuque, developed from St. Raphael's seminary founded in 1839. The school is under the supervision of the archbishop of the Dubuque archdiocese. The college has one of the largest private libraries in the state, over 126,000 volumes. Iowa's oldest college, Loras has an enrollment of 1,270 students.

A fully accredited liberal arts college, Loras has an instructional staff of 42 priests and 43 laymen. Majors are offered in 24 fields, and preprofessional programs in five. On the 50-acre campus are 12 buildings. The Rt. Rev. Msgr. Dorance V. Foley is president, and Gerard B. Noonan is in charge of admissions.

Luther College, Decorah

Luther College, at Decorah, was founded in 1861 as a college for men, and became coeducational in 1936. It is a college of the American Lutheran Church. The historical record of Norwegian pioneers in Iowa and elsewhere in the United States is preserved in notable collections in Koren Library and in the Norwegian-American Historical Museum maintained by the college.

Marycrest College, Davenport

Marycrest College, founded 1939, is a fully accredited four-year liberal arts college for women, conducted by the Sisters of the Humility of Mary. Over 1,000 full-time and part-time students represent all regions of the United States and 17 foreign countries. Liberal arts courses, professional and pre-professional training are offered. Scholarships and college placement service are available. Close faculty-student association prevails, with coordinating seminars. The social calendar and cocurricular activities are coordinated with nearby St. Ambrose College for men.

Morningside College, Sioux City

Morningside College is a church-related liberal arts college founded by the Methodist Church in 1894 on the present campus which had been established as the University of the Northwest in 1889. In 1914, Charles City College was merged with Morningside and moved to Sioux City. Facilities include eleven buildings on a 23 acre suburban campus serving 1,100 students and 67 faculty members. The college is Christian in purpose and welcomes students of all denominations. Morningside enjoys highest accreditation and retains its essential character as a liberal arts college while offering professional training in business administration, teaching, and music. A wider range of pre-professional training is offered in such fields as engineering, law, medicine, nursing, and theology. President J. Richard Palmer has implemented a "Twelve Year Blueprint for Morningside College," now in its fourth year, to further strengthen the college in every area.

Mount Mercy College, Cedar Rapids

Mount Mercy College, a four-year college for women, is conducted by the Sisters of Mercy at Cedar Rapids. It is fully accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and offers a program approved for teacher certification on both the elementary and secondary levels. Mount Mercy began as a junior college in 1928 and became a four-year degree granting institution in 1957. Its campus consists of 51 acres of wooded slopes. Mount Mercy confers the following degrees: Bachelor of Arts. Bachelor of Science in Biology, Home Economics, Medical Technology or Business. There are 10 major fields and eight additional minors. President, Sister Mary Agnes, R.S.M. Registrar, Sister Mary Eleanor, R.S.M.

Northwestern College, Orange City

Founded as an academy by the Reformed Church in America in 1882, Northwestern developed into a fully accredited junior college in 1928. Since 1957, a program for a four-year bachelor's degree in teacher training at the elementary and secondary levels has been developed. As a church-related college, there is a stress upon a Christian education in all curricular and co-curricular activities. Students during recent years come from a wide geographical area including several foreign nations.

Parsons College, Fairfield

During the past six years under the presidency of Millard G. Roberts, Parsons College has received recognition as the fastest-growing college in Mid-America. During the summer of 1960, Parsons adopted the Trimester Plan, allowing teachers a semester's credit in a full college curriculum. Fifty-three per cent of its full-time faculty hold the earned doctorate.

The college was incorporated in 1875, after the estate of Lewis B. Parsons, a successful merchant of New York state, had provided an endowment of 3,560 acres. For 86 years, Parsons College has continued to offer a liberal arts education of high quality. Recently Parsons was ranked in 77th place as to the number of its graduates now listed in "Who's Who in America." The Presbyterian related school had an enrollment of 1,658 in the Spring Trimester of 1961.

Courses are offered in the College of Arts and Sciences, the School of Education and the School of Business Administration. There are 22 departments.

Simpson College, Indianola

Simpson College, at Indianola, celebrated its centennial in 1960-1961. A four-year, coeducational Christian liberal arts institution affiliated with the Methodist Church, Simpson emphasizes highly personalized education believing that, in general, education is creative and effective in proportion as it is personal. A new curriculum at Simpson called the "Vital Center" currently is being praised by educational leaders, as in *Time* magazine, Dec. 5, 1960. The enrollment is 700, and the facul-ty numbers 44. Dr. William E. Kersetter is president. The registrar is Mary Grassfield, and the director of admissions Daniel Seaton.

St. Ambrose College, Davenport St. Ambrose College, Davenport, is a four year liberal arts college for men founded in 1882 under the auspices of the Roman Catholic diocese of Davenport. Affiliated with the Catholic University of America and registered by the State Board of Regents of New York. Accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools and the Iowa Department of Public Instruction. Operated by the priests of the Diocese of Davenport.

Upper Iowa University, Fayette

Upper Iowa University was founded in 1857. An independent, nontax-supported liberal arts college with strong programs in education, music, the sciences and business. Four new buildings since 1955. Dickman Recreation Hall, 1955; Zinita B. Graf Hall for Women, 1956 (50), enlarged 1958 (79), 1960 (108); Colegrove-Walker Memorial Building, 1956; Maltbie-McCosh Hall for men 1960 (219). Enrollment spring 1953—179; spring 1961—634. New science building planned for 1962, new athletic facilities for 1963. Located in the beautiful Northeast Iowa hills. An outstanding faculty offering Christian higher education in an independent liberal environment. Eugene E. Garbee, president, 1952. Wilson C. Gill, registrar, 1947.

Vennard College, University Park

Vennard College was organized in Chicago in 1910 as the Chicago Evangelistic Institute. In 1951 it was moved to University Park, Iowa. Later the name was changed to Vennard College, honoring the founder and first president. On the 75-acre campus are seven buildings. A 180-acre farm adjoins the campus.

Vennard College provides professional preparation for Christian service. A Bachelor of Arts degree is offered, including a major in Bible with a minor from one of the following areas: Theology, Christian education, missions, Christian social service, and music. The college is an accredited member of the Accrediting Association of Bible Colleges, which is a constituent member of the American Council on Education. It is interdenominational and coeducational. John Sutherland Logan is president, and Merne A. Harris, academic dean.

Wartburg College, Waverly

Wartburg College is a coeducational liberal arts college of The American Lutheran Church and is regionally and nationally accredited by such groups as the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, the Iowa State Board of Educational Examiners and the National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education. Memberships also include the National Council of Social Work Education and the National Association of Schools of Music. Degrees offered include Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Music, Bachelor of Music Education and Bachelor of Science in Education. Dating back to 1852, the school has an enrollment of over 1,000 students, a faculty numbering more than 60 and a campus of more than 40 acres. Dr. C. H. Becker is president.

Westmar College, Le Mars

Westmar College, at LeMars, formerly known as Western Union College, merged with York College in 1955, sponsored by the Evangelical United Brethren Church. The college offers three divisions of study under the departments of humanities, natural sciences, and social sciences. Faculty and administration staff number 62. Registrar, Thomas Stone. The college has 33 buildings on a campus of 40 acres. It was founded in 1890.

William Penn College, Oskaloosa

William Penn College, at Oskaloosa, operated under the auspices of the Society of Friends, was opened in September, 1873; 40-acre campus; five educational buildings besides dormitories; total enrollment of 500; full liberal arts curriculum; teacher training, summer school.

IOWA STATE BANNER

On March 29, 1921, the Thirty-ninth General Assembly adopted a resolution designating a design for a flag to be known as the "State Banner."

The banner was designed by the Iowa Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution, and consists of three vertical stripes of blue, white and red, with the blue stripe nearest the staff and the white stripe in the center depicting a spreading eagle bearing in its beak blue streamers on which is inscribed in white letters the state motto, "Our liberties we prize and our rights we will maintain." The word "Iowa" in red letters is just below the streamers.

History of Iowa

Long before the coming of the white man the ancestors of the Indian roamed the land that is now Iowa. Frequently referred to as Mound Builders, these shadowy inhabitants are best commemorated in the Effigy Mound National Park above McGregor. Dr. Charles R. Keyes, who served for 30 years as state archaeologist, identified at least six different prehistoric cultures—the Algonkian, Hopewell, Oneota, Mill Creek, Effigy Mound, and Glenwood. The Algonkian culture was found over nine-tenths of Iowa, while the other five were more localized the Hopewell, Oneota, and Mound Builders being largely in eastern Iowa, the Glenwood in southwest Iowa and the Mill Creek in northwest Iowa. Evidence of their presence in Iowa is recorded in village sites, cave and rock shelters, shell heaps, mounds, cemeteries, trails, spirit places, rock carvings and paintings, stone dams or fish traps, flint and hematite quarries, boulder effigies, caches, workshops, and enclosures.

The Indian who roamed Iowa in historic times knew little of nothing about these ancient people. Almost a score of tribes belonging to three different linguistic stocks have been associated with the Iowa country since the advent of the white man. The Ioways, Winnebago, Osage, Oto, Missouri, Omaha, Ponca, Sisseton, and Wahpeton were tribes belonging to the Dakota or Siouan Linguistic Stock or Family. They are commonly referred to as Plains Indians. Their bitter enemies were the Woodland or cance people—members of the Sauk, Fox, Mascoutin, Illinois, Chippewa (Ojibway), Miami, Ottawa, and Potowatomi tribes. These were members of the Algonquian Linguistic Stock or Family. The Iroquoian stock is only remotely associated with Iowa, being mainly responsible for driving other tribes from the Michigan, Ohio, and Indiana area west of the Mississippi into Iowa.

The French in Iowa

The written history of Iowa begins on June 17, 1673, when Joliet and Marquette and their five rugged voyageurs paddled out of the Wisconsin River and into the Mississippi opposite present-day McGregor. Eight days later, on June 25, Joliet and Marquette met the Illinois Indians near the mouth of the Iowa River. It was the first meeting between the white man and the Indians on Iowa soil.

The French lost no time in exploring the vast wilderness drained by the Mississippi and its tributaries. In 1680 LaSalle sent an expedition under Michel Aco to discover the headwaters of the Mississippi. Aco and his two companions, Father Hennepin and Antoine Auguel, were captured by the Sioux Indians above the mouth of the Wisconsin River but were later released and fled down the Mississippi. Another Frenchman, Nicholas Perrot, taught the Miami Indians how to mine lead in the Galena-Dubuque area and hunted buffalo with them in Iowa. Perrot was the first white man to meet and describe the Ioway Indians. Lahontan and LeSueur left records of their exploits, and William DesLisle drew an amazingly accurate map of Louisiana in 1718 showing the first river-to-river road across Iowa from the mouth of the Wisconsin to the Big Sioux River. DesLisle located Ioway Indian villages on Lake Okoboji and the Big Sioux. The expedition of Joseph Des Noyelles with 80 French soldiers and their Indian allies against the Sauk and Fox Indians ended in a pitched battle at the Raccoon Fork of the Des Moines on April 19, 1735.

Spain in Iowa . . .

The Spanish Period covers a scant four decades from 1762 to 1800. Jonathan Carver and Peter Pond, two Connecticut Yankees who visited northeast Iowa in 1766 and 1773 respectively, were the first to appear during the Spanish regime. Jean Marie Cardinal mined lead in the Dubuque area during the Revolutionary War and actually lost his life in the defense of St. Louis. Thereafter, Spain assumed control and made three land grants in Iowa—to Julien Dubuque in 1796, to Louis Honore Tesson in 1799, and to Basil Giard in 1800. Dubuque was the only permanent settler in the Spanish Period, living at the mouth of Catfish Creek from 1788 until his death in 1810.

Louisiana Purchase


In 1800 Spain retroceded the land west of the Mississippi to France. Napoleon in turn sold it to Jefferson in 1803. One hundred and thirty years had passed under French and Spanish rule since the discovery of Iowa by Joliet and Marquette, but a scant score of names are remembered in history. On March 26, 1804, Congress provided for the government of the newly acquired territory by dividing it into two separate jurisdictions—the Territory of Orleans and the District of Louisiana. The Iowa country formed a part of the District of Louisiana, which was placed under the jurisdiction of the Governor and Judges of the Territory of Indiana. In 1805 Iowa became a part of the Territory of Louisiana, in 1812 it was a part of Missouri Territory, and in 1821, when Missouri was admitted into the Union, Iowa was left unorganized territory without government of any kind.

Exploration of the Iowa country promptly followed the Louisiana Purchase. Lewis and Clark ascended the Missouri in 1804, requiring 33 days to pass along the western border of Iowa. Sergeant Charles Floyd, the only man to die on this expedition, was buried on the present site of Sioux City. In 1805 Pike ascended the Upper Mississippi, recommending the present site of Burlington and the bluff below McGregor as suitable locations for military posts. Other notable Americans explored Iowaland: Stephen H. Long, Henry R. Schoolcraft, and Stephen Watts Kearney were outstanding military men. Manuel Lisa was a Missouri River fur trader, while George Catlin spent eight years painting pictures of Indians on the Upper Mississippi and Missouri frontier. Caleb Atwater, G. C. Beltrami, Nicollet, Father DeSmet, Marryat, Murray, and Fredrika Bremer left eye-witness accounts of Iowaland more than a century ago. As a result of Kearny's Dragoon expedition of 1835, Lieutenant Albert Miller Lea wrote his Notes on the Wisconsin Territory: Particularly with Reference to the Iowa District or Black Hawk Purchase. Published in Philadelphia in 1836, this was the first book dealing specifically with Iowa. In the years that followed, John Plumbe, Jr., Isaac Galland, John B. Newhall and a dozen others published books that focused the attention of millions on Iowa.

Forts in Iowa . . .

The presence of the Indian and the fur trader led to the establishment of forts in the Iowa country. Fort Madison, the first American fort in Iowa, was erected in 1808 and evacuated and burned in 1813. Fort Edwards, located opposite the mouth of the Des Moines River, was erected in 1815. Fort Armstrong was erected on Rock Island in 1816, and Fort Crawford at Prairie du Chien the same year. Fort Des Moines No. 1 was built on the present site of Montrose by Colonel Kearny in 1834. Fort Atkinson, Fort Dodge, Fort Des Moines No. 2, Fort Sanford, and Fort Crogan are other military establishments associated with early Iowa history.

The Western Engineer made the first steamboat voyage up the Missouri as far as present-day Council Bluffs in 1819, while the Virginia

Ten years later, on June 1, 1833, permanent settlement began in Iowa. Iowa was attached to Michigan Territory for purposes of government in 1834, and formed a part of the newly-created Wisconsin Territory in 1836. The first Federal census showed 10,531 inhabitants in the Black Hawk Purchase that year.

Iowa As a Territory

On July 4, 1838, the Territory of Iowa was born, with Robert Lucas serving as first governor. The territory was named by Albert M. Lea in 1836 from the Iowa River, which derived its title from the Ioway Indians. Twenty-two counties containing 23,242 inhabitants had been established west of the Mississippi in the Black Hawk Purchase and other Indian cessions in 1838. Between 1833 and 1838, churches were founded, schools, academies, and seminaries established, newspapers published, and a bank opened. The first public surveys were begun in 1837, and two land offices established the following year at Burlington and Dubuque.

Statehood!

Scarcely had the Territory of Iowa been established when a clamor arose for statehood. In 1844 a constitution was adopted featuring low salaries, limited indebtedness and restrictions on banks and corporations. Congress refused to accept the boundaries requested by the people in 1844, and they in turn rejected those proposed by Congress. A new constitution with the present-day boundaries (embracing 56,147 square miles) was adopted in 1846. Iowa was admitted into the Union as the first free state in the Louisiana Purchase on Dec. 28, 1846.

Politics . . .

Democrats dominated state politics between 1846 and 1854. Ansel Briggs was elected first governor, and A. C. Dodge and George W. Jones were named United States senators. A steady flow of northern immigrants during the 1850's, coupled with the successful campaign of dynamic James W. Grimes in 1854, swept the Whigs into office. Two years later Grimes founded the Republican Party in Iowa. Subsequently Dodge and Jones were defeated, the Constitution of 1857 adopted, and the capital moved from Iowa City to Des Moines. Ralph P. Lowe became the first Republican governor in 1858. Only four Democrats—Horace Boies (1890-94), Clyde Herring (1933-1937), Nelson Kraschel (1937-1939), and Herschel Loveless (1957-1961)—have served as governors in the intervening one hundred years that were marked largely by Republican chief executives.

The names of many Iowans are written boldly in the annals of the Republican party. James W. Grimes, James Harlan, Samuel J. Kirkwood, William Boyd Allison, Jonathan P. Dolliver, and Albert B. Cummins achieved high distinction in their day. Allison served 36 years in the United States Senate. Among the Representatives the names of C. C. Dowell, Gilbert N. Haugen, J. A. T. Hull, William P. Hepburn, and David B. Henderson loom large. In addition to these legislators, Iowans have achieved high rank in the councils of the nation: 15 have served in presidents' cabinets, Henry A. Wallace was elected vice president, and Herbert Hoover gained the presidency.

Although Republicans dominated state politics, there have been occasional revolts. These revolts have come mainly from the tillers of the soil. Iowa is an agricultural state. Farmers drew up the constitution of 1846, formed the first agricultural societies in 1852, held the first state fair in 1854, founded an agricultural college in 1858, and established in 1877 a society that grew into the Iowa state dairy association. When hard times came, however, thousands of Iowa farmers deserted the Republican party to support third-party movements. James B. Weaver was twice nominated for the presidency and the Granger and Populist movements won strong support.

Iowa and War

The settlement of Iowa grew out of the Black Hawk War. Iowa men fought gallantly in the Mexican War. Such place names as Buena Vista, Butler, Cerro Gordo, Guthrie, Hardin, Mills, Palo Alto, Ringgold, and Taylor commemorate famous men and battles.

Iowa furnished almost 80,000 men in the Civil War. Her troops were especially prominent in such battles as Wilson's Creek, Pea Ridge, Shiloh, Iuka, Corinth, the siege of Vicksburg, the capture of Fort Donelson, and Sherman's march to the sea. Over 12,000 Iowa men were killed, 9,000 wounded, and another 10,000 discharged because of ill-health.

Iowa men served with equal distinction in the Spanish-American War, World War I, World War II, and the Korean conflict. Veterans from these wars have played an important role in state and local politics. At its peak, the G.A.R. counted 20,324 members, whereas the American Legion numbered over 44,000 members before World War II.

[,] Transportation—Communication

Steamboats plied the Upper Mississippi and the Missouri before the opening of white settlement in 1833. In 1848 the telegraph reached Iowa; in 1854 the first railroad reached the Mississippi opposite Davenport; in 1856 the first bridge spanned the Father of Waters between Rock Island and Davenport. The North Western was the first railroad to reach Council Bluffs, the first bridge to span the Missouri was built at that point. Railroad mileage reached its peak in 1914 with over 10,000 miles of track in Iowa.

Telephone construction in Iowa began about 1878. Today almost every farm in Iowa can boast a telephone. The introduction of the automobile around the opening of the 20th century was followed by actual horseless carriage manufacture in Iowa.

Religion and Education

The first church in Iowa was erected by the Methodists at Dubuque in 1834. By 1838 the Baptists, Congregationalists, Quakers, Presbyterians, and Roman Catholics had established churches. Inspired Christian leaders are associated with the Iowa story, many notable names being associated with the numerous academies, seminaries, and colleges that dotted the state during the 19th century. Iowa Wesleyan College, established in 1842, is the oldest collegiate institution in Iowa, and Grinnell College is the second oldest college. A score of other denominational schools, supported by church-going citizens who have often expressed their faith in the temperance movement and moral crusades, attest Iowa's claim to the title of "Corn and Bible Commonwealth." In addition to denominational colleges, the State University of Iowa at Iowa City, Iowa State University at Ames, the State College of Iowa at Cedar Falls, and 16 junior colleges afford Iowa children an opportunity to receive collegiate training.

Iowa's richest asset over the years has been its crop of fine children. These have grown and achieved fame as artists and actors, baseball players and billiard players, musicians and novelists, architects and industrialists, preachers and poets, statesmen, scientists and scholars. Whether serving in their home town, their state, in the nation, or in some far-flung corner of the world, these sons and daughters of Iowa demonstrate by their actions and accomplishments the truth of Sidney Foster's toast to his native state in 1886: "In all that is good, Iowa affords the best."

The Indians in Iowa

The Mesquakie Indians who are residents and voters in Iowa number around 500. Iowa was for many years the cherished home of their ancestors and friends.

They own, as a tribe or family, 3,600 acres of land in the Iowa River valley in Tama County. This is their collective farm, bought by them with their own money, managed and cultivated by them, on which they live, where they study and have their religious services. The State of Iowa many years ago by law gave them authority to own tribal land and property and the title is held in trust for them. They pay taxes and those qualified are voters.

They have a genuine democratic government for themselves, elect a council of managers, and the council has a chief or president. They have a school and all of the younger people can write the English language. Some of the older ones have never learned other than their own language, which is used by all of them.

The Mesquakie tribe is of the Algonquin family. They formerly lived on the Atlantic coast, then moved westward through New York and Canada, and in Wisconsin in the early fur trading days, they formed a federation with their kinsmen, the Sacs, or Saukies. The Mesquakies were called by the traders Reynards or Foxes and their name means the "people of the red earth." A century ago they lived in several camps along the Mississippi River, then moved into the Des Moines valley, followed the agency and army to Raccoon forks, and departed from Des Moines when Iowa was admitted as a state.

Some of the Mesquakies so loved their homes in Iowa that they gave up their government payments and returned from their southwestern reservations. The state gave them permission to live in Iowa as a tribe, and with money received in settlement with the government they bought their present lands.

On their Tama County farm they live in comfortable houses and dress, in the main, as their white neighbors. Formerly the head men resisted efforts at educating the young, but now they go to school and are apt scholars. They keep their wickiups, not to live in, but for their visits and ceremonies. They also have one large tribal hall in which they hold their religious ceremonies regularly, several services each week, conducted in their own language by their own leaders and preserving their own forms of worship.

They are quite skillful in various industries—weaving, basket making, bead work and in leather. One-third of the land is cultivated but the remainder is largely rough pasture land. The tribe has a tractor, but uses horses for farm work. They raise cattle, hogs and chickens.

Iowa Veterans' Organizations

GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC

The Grand Army of the Republic was a patriotic and fraternal organization of the Union survivors of the military and naval forces of the Civil War who served between April 12, 1861, and April 9, 1865.

Iowa was one of the first states of the Union to attempt organization of the Grand Army of the Republic, receiving as a department its first charter on July 12, 1866. Its permanent organization dates from Jan. 23, 1879.

There were over 519 posts chartered in Iowa. Membership stood at its peak in 1890 when 52,013 veterans held membership.

Six veterans of the Civil War served as governors of Iowa: Colonel William M. Stone of Knoxville, 1864-1868; Colonel Samuel Merrill of McGregor, 1868-1872; Colonel Cyrus C. Carpenter of Fort Dodge, 1872-1875; Captain Joshua G. Newbold of Mount Pleasant, 1877-1878; Captain Buren R. Sherman of Vinton, 1882-1886; Lieutenant Colonel Francis M. Drake of Centerville, 1896-1898.

To the Grand Army of the Republic goes the credit for having instituted Memorial Day, with all the tender and reverent patriotism which that occasion always reveals, and for having kept alive, in history and story, the brave deeds performed upon the battlefields by many a gallant soldier. To them goes the credit of having preserved the Union at a critical priod in its history. Their average age when they fought the war was nineteen.

Nate E. Kendall, former governor of Iowa, was principal speaker at the dedication of the Iowa monument on the battlefield of Shiloh. He eulogized the veterans of that sanguine conflict, when he said: "No soldiery ever entered a field with such noble purpose, and none ever emerged with a record of such glorious accomplishment. When our beloved flag was insulted, when our territorial integrity was threatened, when our national life was imperiled, they promptly responded to the appeal of President Lincoln, and cheerfully embraced self-immolation to secure the perpetuity of the government of the people, by the people and for the people, and to render forever positive the certainty that the government, after being baptized in the sacred blood of the Revolutionary fathers, should not disappear from the earth, but that it, under God, should have everlasting life.

"And over the graves of the fallen dead the spring has cast its tender violets, the summer its gorgeous field of flowers, the autumn its golden withered leaves, the winter its blanket of snow. All is forgiven, all is forgotten except the glorious results of the combat in which our soldiers were engaged.

"The United State of America! The immortal principles of justice and equity which underlie it! The incomparable benefits which it secures to its citizenship. The inestimable sacrifices which have been suffered to maintain it! It is our home, our country, our beloved government, bequeathed to us forever by the venerated fathers, the most invaluable inheritance ever bestowed upon the sons of men."

The Iowa Department lost its last member in the death on Sept. 20, 1949, of James P. Martin of Sutherland. Thus the last Iowa member of that long line of the Grand Army of the Republic answered "taps" and bivouaced on the eternal camping grounds.

The 55th General Assembly dismantled the G.A.R. room in the capitol and stored the records with the History and Archives department.

SPANISH-AMERICAN WAR

The United Spanish War Veterans came into existence because of the desire to carry on the comradeship that came from their associations in the service with the only 100 per cent volunteer war the world has ever known.

In this organization, the Iowa Department is one of 52 departments and maintains its headquarters in room 100 in the north corridor, basement floor of the state capitol. Here are kept the records of the organization and personnel. Plans are made for the annual encampment, service work given in claims for pensions for widows and the orphans of deceased veterans. Burt Wolcott, a past state commander of the United Spanish War Veterans, is state adjutant.

The men who served in Iowa's four regiments of infantry and the two batteries of light artillery numbered 5,696; there were two killed in action, 38 wounded and 163 died of disease.

Out of the war came men who later served their state and national governments in high positions—Dan Turner, Corning, governor, 1931-1933; Joe Hanley, Muscatine, later lieutenant governor of New York state; Lloyd Thurston, Osceola, member of the state legislature, and the U. S. Congress, national commander in chief, 1954-1955, United Spanish War Veterans; Horace M. Havner, national commander in chief of the United Spanish War Veterans 1947-1948.

The leaders of the American Army in World War I were all veterans of this war. Among them were such men as Matthew A. Tinley, Council Bluffs, colonel of the famous Iowa Regiment, the 168th Infantry, and all of the field officers of that regiment.

The war was the only one fought by an army of this country where the returns were greater than the total cost of the war.

IOWA IN WORLD WAR I

In the army, 96,726 enlisted men, 4,975 officers, 611 nurses.

In the marines, 1,044 enlisted men, 30 officers.

In the navy, 10,211 enlisted men, 525 officers, 40 nurses, 42 yeomen. Cadets at West Point, 20.

These Iowa soldiers came from every walk of life. The adjutant general reported to the government that, of the men drafted in Iowa, 51.7 per cent were farmers and farm laborers.

THE AMERICAN LEGION IN IOWA

The American Legion was born in Paris, March 15, 1919. The Legion was launched formally at St. Louis, May 8, 1919, by World War veterans from nearly every state in the Union, who had been selected by temporary secretaries named at the request of Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., who acted under instructions from the Paris caucus.

The first Towa state convention was held in Des Moines, Sept. 4, 1919. The first national convention of delegates from the newly organized state departments was held in Minneapolis on Armistice Day, 1919.

The American Legion Auxillary of mothers, wives, sisters and daughters of Legionnaires was organized in 1921. The Iowa department was launched at Sioux City. Hanford MacNider established the Iowa Legionnaire, with Frank Miles as editor on March 4, 1921. He was succeeded as editor on April 1, 1946, by A. F. Faber.

The Department of Iowa headquarters is located at Argonne Armory, East First and Des Moines Streets, Des Moines. There are nine districts in Iowa with 662 local posts and an approximate annual membership of 100,000.

The Iowa Department has been the winner of the James A. Drain national community service trophy for the past 23 consecutive years.

Iowa has been in the national American Legion's Big Ten Departments for 17 years, since 1934.

THE DISABLED AMERICAN VETERANS IN IOWA

The Disabled American Veterans, commonly known as the D. A. V., was organized nationally in 1920 by groups of disabled veterans then undergoing vocational training courses, and chartered by Congress in 1932, to render service to, for and by disabled veterans. The D. A. V. has, ever since its inception, been the spokesman for the disabled war veterans of America, in Congress and before its various committees as well as before the Veterans Administration and its local regional offices and facilities.

During 1920 and 1921 the first three chapters of the Iowa department were organized in the vocational training centers at Des Moines, Iowa City and Ames. The department of Iowa D. A. V. held its first state convention in 1922 at Iowa City.

The Disabled American Veterans in Iowa have grown to 32 chapters and over 3,000 members. The national service officer in Iowa is Buford L. Phillips, located at 603-604 Federal Building, Fourth and Walnut, Des Moines. The state headquarters is in Des Moines. The address is P. O. Box 793 and the adjutant and business manager is Buford L. Phillips.

AMERICAN VETERANS OF WORLD WAR II

The American Veterans of World War II, commonly known as the AMVETS, were organized nationally in September, 1944, at Kansas City, Mo. The AMVETS were granted a national charter by an act of Congress and President Truman signed the measure on July 23, 1947. AMVETS is the only nationally chartered World War II veterans' organization.

AMVETS got their start in Iowa at Atlantic in 1944, and were incorporated as the Iowa Department of AMVETS on May 2, 1945. The first state convention was held in Des Moines in 1947. AMVETS were recognized as a nationally chartered World War II veterans' organization by the Iowa Legislature in March, 1949, and entered as such in the Iowa Code.

The AMVETS principles are (1) to promote world peace, (2) to perpetuate the American way of life, (3) to help the veteran help himself.

The AMVETS have a national and state auxiliary comprised of the wives, mothers and sisters of World War II veterans.

The Iowa Department headquarters are located in Des Moines at 1655 Harding Road, with Ralph J. Rossignuolo as executive director. Currently the Iowa Department has 70 AMVET posts covering all parts of Iowa, and is the third largest AMVET department in the nation. Ed Corry, formerly of Des Moines, now of Chicago, a past state commander, was national commander. Ed Gallagher of Waterloo, past state commander, was president of the AMVETS National Service Foundation for several terms. Herbert Bennett of Fort Dodge, also a past state commander, served as president of the AMVETS National Convention Corporation for several terms. Charles Scherrer of Dubuque, also a former state commander, is a member of the AMVETS National Personnel Committee. Robert Renken of Aplington, also a past state commander, is the national executive committeeman from Iowa. Edward Falk of Waterloo is the 1961-62 State Commander.

Iowa AMVETS assemble in convention each year to elect new officers. The fiscal year begins in September and ends in August. Any person who served actively in the Armed Forces any length of time between Sept. 16, 1940, and Jan. 31, 1955, when cessation of hostilities was formally proclaimed, is eligible to become a member.

IOWA VETERANS OF FOREIGN WARS

The Veterans of Foreign Wars, Department of Iowa, was granted its charter by the national organization on May 28, 1921. Its objects are fraternal, patriotic, historical and educational; to preserve and strengthen comradeship among its members and to assist worthy comrades; to perpetuate the memory and history of its dead, and to assist their widows and orphans; to maintain true allegiance to the government of the United States and fidelity to its constitution and laws. V. F. W. is composed only of American men who have served honorably in the army, navy, marine corps or coast guard of the United States, in hostile waters or on foreign soil during any foreign war, insurrection, or expedition.

Veterans of Foreign Wars has a Ladies Auxiliary of mothers, wives, sisters and daughters, and a fraternal order consisting of the Military Order of Cooties of V. F. W. members.

The Department of Iowa, consisting of approximately 200 posts, has its headquarters at 3601 Beaver Avenue, Des Moines 10.

Iowans in United States Supreme Court

SAMUEL F. MILLER-Born April 5, 1816, at Richmond, Kentucky. Located at Keokuk, Iowa, in 1850. Was personally acquainted with President Lincoln who nominated him for the United States Supreme Court in 1862 where he served for 28 years.

WILEY BLOUNT RUTLEDGE, JR.—Born July 20, 1894, at Cloverport, Kentucky. Professor of law and dean of the College of Law at the University of Iowa from 1935 to 1939. Appointed Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia in 1939. Appointed Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court and sworn into office February 16, 1943. Served until his death in 1949.

Iowans in Presidents' Cabinets

Fifteen Iowa men have served in the cabinets of thirteen presidents of the United States. The list of these is as follows:

JAMES H. HARLAN—Mount Pleasant. Served as secretary of the interior in the cabinet of President Andrew Johnson in 1865 and 1866.

WILLIAM W. BELKNAP—Secretary of war in the two administrations of President Ulysses S. Grant. Made his home in Keokuk for a number of years.

GEORGE W. McCRARY—Served as secretary of war in the cabinet of President Rutherford B. Hayes.

SAMUEL J. KIRKWOOD--Iowa's Civil War governor was secretary of the interior under President James A. Garfield.

FRANK HATTON—Burlington. Co-publisher with Robert J. Burdette of the Hawk-Eye, was assistant postmaster general from 1881 to 1884 and postmaster general in the cabinet of President Chester A. Arthur from October 14, 1884, to March 4, 1885.

JAMES WILSON—Served as secretary of agriculture for sixteen years in the cabinets of Presidents McKinley, Roosevelt and Taft.

LESLIE M. SHAW—Denison. Served as secretary of the treasury in the two administrations of President Theodore Roosevelt.

EDWIN T. MEREDITH—Secretary of agriculture in the cabinet of President Woodrow Wilson. Born in Avoca, Iowa, in 1876.

HENRY C. WALLACE—Secretary of agriculture in the cabinets of Presidents Harding and Coolidge.

HERBERT HOOVER—Served as secretary of commerce in the cabinets of Presidents Harding and Coolidge, 1921 to 1929. Elected president of the United States in 1928, the first man born west of the Mississippi river to attain this high position.

CURTIS DWIGHT WILBUR—Born at Boonesboro, Iowa, on May 10, 1867. Served as secretary of navy in cabinet of President Coolidge.

RAY LYMAN WILBUR—Born at Boonesboro, Iowa, on April 13, 1875. Served as secretary of the interior in the cabinet of President Hoover.

JAMES WILLIAM GOOD—Born near Cedar Rapids in 1866. Became secretary of war in the cabinet of President Herbert Hoover.

HENRY AGARD WALLACE—Son of Henry C. Wallace. Served as secretary of agriculture in the first two terms of Franklin D. Roosevelt. Elected vice president in 1940. Appointed as secretary of commerce in 1945.

HARRY L. HOPKINS—Born in Sioux City in 1890. Secretary of commerce under President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

TREND TOWARD URBANIZATION OF IOWA'S POPULATION

Iowa's population is now 53 per cent urban, as is shown in the first line of the table below. The change from 1950 to 1960 is also shown. To carry the comparison back to 1940, it is necessary to note that the census bureau made a change to classify people living in certain densely populated urbanfringe areas as urban, even though they were not within incorporated limits. This change, in 1950, transferred 21,505 Iowa persons from rural to urban classification. The effect on percentages is small but makes necessary two sets of figures. The minus sign (--) indicates a decrease.







LEGISLATIVE OFFICERS FOR THE TERRITORY OF IOWA

Before Iowa was admitted as a state in 1846, the Senate of the territory was called the Legislative Council. The presiding officer was known as the President of the Council. Iowa's constitution, approved by a vote of the people in 1857, created the office of Lieutenant Governor and named him as the ex officio President of the Senate.

The 1838, 1839 and 1840 sessions were held at the territorial capital at Burlington. The 1841 through 1845 sessions were held at Iowa City. In 1855 the 5th General Assembly voted to change the location of the Capital to Des Moines.

SENATORS IN CONGRESS

Data on Senatorial Successions

James Harlan resigned to accept the cabinet portfolio of Secretary of Interior in Lincoln's cabinet. Samuel Kirkwood was elected to fill vacancy.

James W. Grimes resigned. James B. Howell elected to fill the unexpired term and George C. Wright elected for the new term.

Samuel Kirkwood resigned in 1881 to accept the cabinet portfolio of Secretary of the Interior. James W. McDill named by the governor to fill the vacancy.

John H. Gear died July 14, 1900. Jonathan P. Dolliver was appointed Aug. 22, 1900, to fill the vacancy. He was also elected by the 29th General Assembly, Jan. 9, 1902, to fill out the remainder of the term ending March 4, 1907, and was elected for another full term.

Senator William B. Allison died Aug. 4, 1908 and Albert B. Cummins was selected at the special session of the 32nd General Assembly on Nov. 24, 1908 to fill the remainder of Senator Allison's term. Senator Cummins was also elected by the 33rd General Assembly for the term beginning March 4, 1909.

Senator Dolliver died Oct. 15, 1910. Lafayette Young was appointed Nov. 12, 1910, to fill the vacancy. The 34th General Assembly on April 12, 1911, elected William S. Kenyon to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Senator Dolliver. He resigned Feb. 24, 1922, to accept an appointment as judge of the Federal Circuit Court. Charles A. Rawson was appointed Feb. 25, 1922, to fill vacancy of Senator Kenyon and served until Nov. 7, 1922.

Smith W. Brookhart was elected Nov. 7, 1922, for the unexpired term of Senator Kenyon and served until 1925.

Brookhart-Steck contest. In the election of Nov. 4, 1924, the vote showed Brookhart 477,594 and Steck 446,840 votes. The election was contested. On April 2, 1926, the U. S. Senate voted 16 Republicans, 29 Democrats to unseat; 31 Republicans, 9 Democrats and 1 Farmer-Labor voted against unseating. Brookhart was elected in 1926 over Claude Porter.

Albert B. Cummins died July 21, 1926. David W. Stewart was appointed to fill the vacancy until election, Nov. 2, 1926. Senator Stewart was elected to fill the unexpired term.

On the death of Louis Murphy in 1936, Guy Gillette was elected for the short term over Berry Halden. The term expired Jan. 3, 1939.



TERMS OF COUNTY OFFICERS—In each county, as a result of action by the 1959 legislature, the auditor, clerk of court and sheriff were elected in 1960 to serve for four years. The treasurer and recorder were elected for two years, but their successors, when elected in 1962, will serve for four years. The county attorney is elected for two years. The superintendent of schools is appointed by the county board of education for three years. The county assessors (and city assessors in the larger cities) are appointed by conference boards representing the taxing bodies, for six-year terms. The medical examiner is appointed for two years by the board of supervisors; his office, beginning in 1961, takes the place of the elective office of coroner, abolished by the 1959 legislature. County supervisors are elected for overlapping three-year terms, so that there will always be experienced members on the board.


Congressional Districts Since 1847


Iowa's first two congressmen took their seats Dec. 29, 1846, and the state continued with two congressional districts through the next eight sessions, a little more than 16 years. There were two redistrictings in that period, after the first districting.


Redistricting of 1862, taking effect in 1863, gave Jowa six congressmen for 10 years. Then redistricting of 1872 provided for nine congressmen for 10 years.


Iowa had 11 congressmen for 50 years, through the 48th to the 72nd congresses, 1883 to 1933, under redistrictings of 1882 and 1886. The number then dropped to nine for 10 years, 1933 to 1943, and to eight for 20 years, 1943 to 1963.

Each of Iowa's seven congressmen, beginning in 1963, will represent an average of 393,934 constituents. Constituency in 1847 was 51,194.









Populations given under the first three maps are state census figures of 1846, 1847 and 1856. The acts of 1848 and 1857 were not based on census requirements, since Iowa had two congressmen until 1862. Congressmen seated in 1846 were elected from the state at large. The districting of 1847 was based on the August vote on adoption of the constitution. The 1848 act merely shifted Poweshiek County and had little apparent significance. The 1857 act, transferring three counties, equalized population and had Republican political advantages. All other redistrictings, except in 1886, were necessitated by federal census returns. The 1886 redistricting was based on the 1880 federal census, but state maps displayed the 1885 state census figures. Purposes of the 1886 act were avowedly political.

Iowa Statehood Centennial Commemorative Half Dollar



IOWA CENTENNIAL MEMORIAL FOUNDATION

The sale of memorial half dollars in Iowa's Centennial Year, 1947, brought the state \$188,000. This fund is administered by the Iowa Centennial Memorial Commission, and has grown to \$200,000. The commission is authorized to spend the income from the fund for awards and scholarships, amounting to about \$4,000 yearly. This amount provides for 17 to 20 scholarships each year.

In 1951 the Iowa Award was created and presented to ex-President Herbert Hoover, and in 1956 to Jay N. Darling. More than 100 scholarships to Iowa colleges and universities have been granted.

Membership of the commission includes all former governors, four citizen members, and several state officials who serve ex officio. The commission was set up in 1949 by Governor Robert D. Blue. Members include the governor, who is chairman; president of the state board of regents, secretary; state treasurer, treasurer; and attorney general, attorney.

Citizen members are Mrs. Mary Humeston, Albia; Mrs. Helen Mitchell, Mason City; Ralph Evans, Davenport; and John M. Henry, Des Moines.

GREAT SEAL OF THE UNITED STATES

The Great Seal of the United States, adopted by Congress June 20, 1782, carries on its obverse side the Coat of Arms of the United States. The stripes on the shield represent the states; the blue above represents Congress. In its talons the eagle grasps an olive branch and a cluster of arrows—the Congressional power to make peace or war. The constellation of thirteen stars above denotes a new Nation in the world.

The reverse of the seal shows a pyramid, to signify "strength and duration," while the eye over it and the motto, *Annuit Coeptis* (He has favored our beginning), allude to "the many signal interpositions of Providence in favor of the American cause." The Roman numerals give the year of Independence; the motto, *Novus Ordo Sectorum* (a new order of the ages), signifies the beginning of the new American era.

The national motto, *E Pluribus Unum*, was first suggested on August 10, 1776, by a Congressional Committee, consisting of Benjamin Franklin, John Adams and Thomas Jefferson.

If you are curious to see these seals and shield, look at a one dollar bill.



The Flag of the United States

On June 14, 1777, the Second Continental Congress adopted a resolution that brought into being the U. S. Flag: "Resolved, That the Flag of the United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field representing a new constellation."

The action of the Continental Congress came almost a year after the Declaration of Independence. The Flag with thirteen stripes and thirteen stars continued to be used as the national emblem until Congress passed the following act, which President Washington signed:

"That from and after May 1, 1795, the flag of the United States be fifteen stripes, alternate red and white; and that the union be fifteen stars, white in a blue field."

This action was necessitated by the admission of the States of Vermont and Kentucky to the Union. The flag of 1795 had the stars arranged in three rows of five each instead of in a circle, and served for 23 years.

With the admission of more new states, however, it became apparent that the 1795 flag would have to be further modified; hence in 1818 a law was passed by Congress providing:

"That from and after the fourth day of July next, the flag of the United States be thirteen horizontal stripes, alternate red and white; that the union have twenty stars, white in a blue field.

"That on the admission of every new state into the Union, one star be added to the union of the flag; and that such addition shall take effect on the Fourth of July next succeeding such admission."

Iowa was admitted to the union as the 29th state.

Alaska made the 49th star, and Hawaii added the 50th, July 4, 1960.

United States Flag Etiquette

When the flag is draped down, the blue field always must be at the left. * * * The flag must never be used as a drape, nor as background for some ornament. * * * The correct shield does not have any stars—just a plain blue field at the top, and seven white and six red stripes.

. . .

'The Pledge of Allegiance

I pledge allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America and to the Republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.

* * *

The American's Creed

I believe in the United States of America as a government of the people, by the people, for the people; whose just powers are derived from the consent of the governed; a Democracy in a Republic; a sovereign Nation of many sovereign States; a perfect Union, one and inseparable; established upon those principles of freedom, equality, justice, and humanity for which American patriots sacrificed their lives and fortunes.

I therefore believe it is my duty to my Country to love it; to support its Constitution; to obey its laws; to respect its Flag; and to defend it against all enemies.

(The creed was written by William Tyler Page, Clerk of the U. S. House of Representatives, in 1917. It was accepted by the House of Representatives April 3, 1918.)

... The Gettysburg Address

(See page 485)

The text on page 485 was copied from the bronze plaque in the rotunda of the Iowa State Capitol. The address was delivered by President Abraham Lincoln at the Gettysburg Cemetery grounds on November 19, 1863. After the President had delivered his short address, he turned to Marshall Lamon, who had presented him less than five minutes before, and said, "Lamon, that speech won't scour. It is a flat failure."

There are five known copies in President Lincoln's handwriting of the Gettysburg address. The original and second drafts were given by the President to his secretary, John Hay. On April 11, 1916, they were presented to the Government by Colonel Hay's three children.

That Lincoln wrote the address on a rough bit of paper on the way to Gettysburg is an exploded but persistent legend. Actually, the first sheet of the first draft was written in Washington, on Executive Mansion stationery. The corrections and the second page were written in lead pencil, probably at Judge Wills' house in Gettysburg, the night of the 18th.

The second draft, believed to be the reading copy at the dedication ceremony, is assumed to have been written on the 19th, between breakfast and the start to the cemetery. There are changes from the first version, slight matters of punctuation, or of a single word-a "that nation" and a "this nation" for "the nation", "consecrated" for "hallowed," "but" for "while," and the like. Lincoln's eye evidently strayed in copying, for "We have come" of the first version was changed to "We are met," then crossed out and the original form restored above it. The first important change is "those who here gave their lives" instead of "those who died here." The sentence, "This we may, in all propriety do," became "It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this." The entire beginning of the first draft's third paragraph is rephrased. Instead of "It is rather for us, the living, we here be dedicated to the great task remaining before us" ["We here be dedicated" had been corrected in pencil above the scratched-out "to stand here"] Lincoln added a parallel sentence: "It is for us, the living, rather to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they have, thus far, so nobly carried on. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before -".—Data from Library of Congress. us-

A final addition in the fourth line from the last of the address was made after the word "nation." The two words are "under God." This final form was placed in the rotunda of the State House by the Department of Iowa, Woman's Relief Corps, Auxiliary to the Grand Army of the Republic, February 12, 1927.

. . . The Lincoln Plaque

A plaque hangs in the rotunda of the capitol which includes the complete Gettysburg address. Below is pictured a portion of the plaque, together with the text of the historical address as it appears on the plaque. Further details on page 484.



Four score and seven years ago our fathers brought forth on this continent a new nation, conceived in Liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal.

Now we are engaged in a great civil war, testing whether that nation, or any nation so conceived and so dedicated, can long endure. We are met on a great battlefield of that war, we have come to dedicate a portion of that field as a final resting place for those who here gave their lives that that nation might live. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this.

But in a larger sense we can not dedicate—we can not consecrate—we can not hallow—this ground. The brave men, living and dead, who struggled here, have consecrated it far above our poor power to add or detract. The world will little note nor long remember what we say here, but can never forget what they did here. It is for us, the living, rather to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us—that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they here gave the last full measure of devotion; that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain; that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom; and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth.

Constitution of the State of Iowa

Introduction

Iowa was organized as a separate Territory by an act of Congress approved on June 12, 1838, but it was not until 1844 that steps were taken to secure admission into the Union. A constitutional convention met at Iowa City in October, 1844. The Constitution drafted by this convention was twice submitted to the voters of the Territory of Iowa and twice rejected by them, largely because of dissatisfaction with the boundaries of the proposed State.

A second constitutional convention met at Iowa City in May, 1846. The Constitution drafted by this convention was ratified by a majority of 456 votes at an election held on August 3, 1846, and Iowa was admitted as a State on December 28, 1846.

The Constitution of 1846, however, contained a number of provisions which were found to be unsatisfactory in practice. One of these was the prohibition of banking institutions. As a result of this dissatisfaction, the legislature in 1855 provided for an election on the question of calling a convention to revise or amend the Constitution of 1846. The vote was 32,390 for a convention and 14,162 against a convention. Delegates were elected on November 4, 1856, and the convention met at Iowa City on January 19, 1857.

The delegates drafted a new constitution which was submitted to the people at an election held on August 3, 1857, and ratified by a vote of 40,311 to 38,681. This Constitution went into effect by proclamation of the governor on September 3, 1857.

The Constitution of 1857 has, since that time, remained the fundamental law of the State of Iowa; but it has been amended a number of times.

The Constitution¹

WE, THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF IOWA, grateful to the Supreme Being for the blessings hitherto enjoyed, and feeling our dependence on Him for a continuation of those blessings, do ordain and establish a free and independent government by the name of the STATE OF IOWA, the boundaries whereof shall be as follows:

Beginning in the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi River at a point due East of the middle of the mouth of the main channel of the Des Moines River, thence up the middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines River, to a point on said river where the Northern boundary line of the State of Missouri-as established by the Constitution of that State-adopted June 12th, 1820-crosses the said middle of the main channel of the said Des Moines River; thence Westwardly along the said Northern boundary line of the State of Missouri, as established at the time aforesaid, until an extension of said line intersects the middle of the main channel of the Missouri River; thence up the middle of the main channel of the said Missouri River to a point opposite the middle of the main channel of the Big Sioux River, according to Nicollett's Map; thence up the main channel of the said Big Sioux River, according to the said map, until it is intersected by the parallel of forty-three degrees and thirty mintes North latitude; thence East along said parallel of forty-three degrees and thirty minutes until said parallel intersects the middle of the main channel of the Mississippi River; thence down the middle of the main channel of said Mississippi River to the place of beginning.

Article I.

Bill of Rights

Section 1. All men are, by nature, free and equal, and have certain inalienable rights—among which are those of enjoying and defending life and liberty, acquiring, possessing and protecting property, and pursuing and obtaining safety and happiness.

Sec. 2. All political power is inherent in the people. Government is instituted for the protection, security, and benefit of the people, and they have the right, at all times, to alter or reform the same, whenever the public good may require it.

¹The text of the Constitution was taken directly from the original manuscript copy preserved in the office of the Secretary of State. Compiled, edited, and documented by Benjamin F. All words, phrases, and sections which have been eliminated from the Constitution or rendered inoperative by amendment appear in *italic*. Material added to the Constitution by amendment is enclosed within brackets. Besides being indicated in their proper place in the text, the amendments are also printed in full chronological order following the Constitution.

sec. 3. The General Assembly shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; nor shall any person be compelled to attend any place of worship, pay tithes, taxes, or other rates for building or repairing places of worship, or the maintenance of any minister, or ministry.

sec. 4. No religious test shall be required as a qualification for any office, or public trust, and no person shall be deprived of any of his rights, privileges, or capacities, or disqualified from the performance of any of his public or private duties, or rendered incompetent to give evidence in any court of law or equity, in consequence of his opinions on the subject of religion; and any party to any judicial proceeding shall have the right to use as a witness, or take the testimony of, any other person not disqualified on account of interest, who may be cognizant of any fact material to the case; and parties to suits may be witnesses, as provided by law.

Sec. 5. Any citizen of this State who may hereafter be engaged, either directly, or indirectly, in a duel, either as principal, or accessory before the fact, shall forever be disqualified from holding any office under the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 6. All laws of a general nature shall have a uniform operation; the General Assembly shall not grant to any citizen, or class of citizens, privileges or immunities, which, upon the same terms shall not equally belong to all citizens.

Sec. 7. Every person may speak, write, and publish his sentiments on all subjects, being responsible for the abuse of that right. No law shall be passed to restrain or abridge the liberty of speech, or of the press. In all prosecutions or indictments for libel, the truth may be given in evidence to the jury, and if it appear to the jury that the matter charged as libelous was true, and was published with good motives and for justifiable ends, the party shall be acquitted.

Sec. 8. The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects, against unreasonable seizures and searches shall not be violated; and no warrant shall issue but on probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons and things to be seized.

Sec. 9. The right of trial by jury shall remain inviolate; but the General Assembly may authorize trial by a jury of a less number than twelve men in inferior courts; but no person shall be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law.

Sec. 10. In all criminal prosecutions, and in cases involving the life, or liberty of an individual the accused shall have a right to a speedy and public trial by an impartial jury; to be informed of the accusation against him, to have a copy of the same when demanded; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for his witnesses; and, to have the assistance of counsel.

Sec. 11. All offenses less than felony and in which the punishment does not exceed a fine of one hundred dollars, or imprisonment for thirty days, shall be tried summarily before a Justice of the Peace, or other officer authorized by law, on information under oath, without indictment, or the intervention of a grand jury, saving to the defendant the right of appeal; and no person shall be held to answer for any higher criminal offense, unless on presentment or indictment by a grand jury2 except in cases arising in the army, or navy, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war or public danger.

Sec. 12. No person shall after acquittal, be tried for the same offense. All persons shall, before conviction, be bailable, by sufficient sureties, except for capital offenses where the proof is evident, or the presumption great.

Sec. 13. The writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended, or refused when application is made as required by law, unless in case of rebellion, or invasion, the public safety may require it.

Sec. 14. The military shall be subordinate to the civil power. No standing army shall be kept up by the State in time of peace; and in time of war, no appropriation for a standing army shall be for a longer time than two years.

sec. 15. No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war except in the manner prescribed by law.

Sec. 16. Treason against the State shall consist only in levying war against it, adhering to its enemies, or giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason, unless on the evidence of two witnesses to the same overt act, or confession in open Court.

Sec. 17. Excessive bail shall not be required; excessive fines shall not be imposed, and cruel and unusual punishments shall not be inflicted.

Sec. 18. Private property shall not be taken for public use without just compensation first being made, or secured to be made to the owner thereof, as soon as the damages shall be assessed by a jury, who shall not take into consideration any advantages that may result to said owner on account of the improvement for which it is taken.

[The General Assembly, however, may pass laws permitting the owners of lands to construct drains, ditches, and levees for agricultural, sanitary or mining purposes across the lands of others, and provide for the organization of drainage districts, vest the proper authorities with power to construct and maintain levees, drains and ditches and to keep in repair all drains, ditches, and levees heretofore constructed under the laws of the State, by special assessments upon the property benefited thereby. The General Assembly may provide by law for the condemnation of such real estate as shall be necessary for the construction and maintenance of such drains, ditches and levees, and prescribe the method of making such condemnation.]⁸

sec. 19. No person shall be imprisoned for debt in any action, on mesne or final process, unless in case of fraud; and no person shall be imprisoned for a militia fine in time of peace.

sec. 20. The people have the right freely to assemble together to counsel for the common good; to make known their opinions to their representatives and to petition for a redress of grievances.

sec. 21. No bill of attainder, ex post facto law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts, shall ever be passed.

Sec. 22. Foreigners who are, or may hereafter become residents of this State, shall enjoy the same rights in respect to the possession, enjoyment and descent of property as native born citizens.

Sec. 23. There shall be no slavery in this State; nor shall there be involuntary servitude, unless for the punishment of crime.

Sec. 24. No lease or grant of agricultural lands, reserving any rent, or service of any kind, shall be valid for a longer period than twenty years.

Sec. 25. This enumeration of rights shall not be construed to impair or deny others, retained by the people.

[Sec. 26. No person shall manufacture for sale, or sell, or keep for sale, as a beverage any intoxicating liquors whatever, including ale, wine and beer. The General Assembly shall by law prescribe regulations for the enforcement of the prohibition herein contained, and shall thereby provide suitable penalties for the violation of the provisions hereof.]4

Article II.

Right of Suffrage

section 1. Every white⁵ male⁵ citizen of the United States, of the age of twenty-one years, who shall have been a resident of this State six months next preceding the election, and of the County in which he claims his vote sixty days, shall be entitled to vote at all elections which are now or hereafter may be authorized by law.

Sec. 2. Electors shall, in all cases except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest on the days of election, during their attendance at such election, going to and returning therefrom.

sec. 3. No elector shall be obliged to perform military duty on the day of election, except in time of war, or public danger.

Sec. 4. No person in the military, naval, or marine service of the United States shall be considered a resident of this State by being stationed in any garrison, barrack, or military or naval place, or station within this State.

Sec. 5. No idiot, or insane person, or person convicted of any infamous crime, shall be entitled to the privilege of an elector.

On April 21, 1833, the Supreme Court of Jowa, in declang Koenler and Lange V. Sec. 6. All elections by the people shall be by ballot.

[The general election for state, district, county and township officers shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November.]7

[Sec. 7. The general election for state, district, county and township officers in the year 1916 shall be held in the same month and on the same day as that fixed by the laws of the United States for the election of presidential electors, or of president and vice-president of the United States; and thereafter such election shall be held at such time as the General Assembly may by law provide.]^a

Article III.

Of the Distribution of Powers

Section 1. The powers of the government of Iowa shall be divided into three separate departments—the Legislative, the Executive, and the Judicial; and no person charged with the exercise of powers properly belonging to one of these departments shall exercise any function appertaining to either of the others, except in cases hereinafter expressly directed or permitted.

Legislative Department

Section 1. The Legislative authority of this State shall be vested in a General Assembly, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives; and the style of every law shall be, "Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa."

Sec. 2. The sessions of the General Assembly shall be biennial, and shall commence on the second Monday in January next ensuing the election of its members; unless the Governor of the State shall, in the meantime, convene the General Assembly by proclamation.

sec. 3. The members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen every second year, by the qualified electors of their respective districts, on the second Tuesday in October, except the years of the Presidential election, when the election shall be on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November;⁹ and their term of office shall commence on the first day of January next after their election, and continue two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

Sec. 4. No person shall be a member of the House of Representatives who shall not have attained the age of twenty-one years, be a *free white*¹⁰ male¹¹ citizen of the United States, and shall have been an inhabitant of this State one year next preceding his election, and at the time of his election shall have had an actual residence of sixty days in the County, or District he may have been chosen to represent.

Sec. 5. Senators shall be chosen for the term of four years at the same time and place as Representatives; they shall be twenty-five years of age, and possess the qualifications of Representatives as to residence and citizenship.

Sec. 6. The number of senators shall not be less than one third, nor more than one half the representative body; and shall be so classified by lot, that one class, being as nearly one half as possible, shall be elected every two years. When the number of Senators is increased, they shall be annexed by lot to one or the other of the two classes, so as to keep them as nearly equal in numbers as practicable.

Sec. 7. Each house shall choose its own officers, and judge of the qualification, election, and return of its own members. A contested election shall be determined in such manner as shall be directed by law.

Sec. 8. A majority of each house shall constitute a quorum to transact business; but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and may compel the attendance of absent members in such manner and under such penalties as each house may provide.

Sec. 9. Each house shall sit upon its own adjournments, keep a journal of its proceedings, and publish the same; determine its rules of proceedings, punish members for disorderly behavior, and, with the consent of two thirds, expel a member, but not a second time for the same offense; and shall have

of 1916. ¹⁰The words "free white" were stricken from this section by an amendment adopted in 1880.

all other powers necessary for a branch of the General Assembly of a free and independent State.

Sec. 10. Every member of the General Assembly shall have the liberty to dissent from, or protest against any act or resolution which he may think injurious to the public, or an individual, and have the reasons for his dissent entered on the journals; and the yeas and nays of the members of either house, on any question, shall, at the desire of any two members present, be entered on the journals.

Sec. 11. Senators and Representatives, in all cases, except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, shall be privileged from arrest during the session of the General Assembly, and in going to and returning from the same.

Sec. 12. When vacancies occur in either house, the Governor, or the person exercising the functions of Governor, shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies.

sec. 13. The doors of each house shall be open, except on such occasions as, in the opinion of the house, may require secrecy.

Sec. 14. Neither house shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which they may be sitting.

sec. 15. Bills may originate in either house, and may be amended, altered, or rejected by the other; and every bill having passed both houses, shall be signed by the Speaker and President of their respective houses.

Sec. 16. Every bill which shall have passed the General Assembly, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the Governor. If he approve, he shall sign it; but if not, he shall return it with his objections, to the house in which it originated, which shall enter the same upon their journal, and proceed to reconsider it; if, after such reconsideration, it again pass both houses, by yeas and nays, by a majority of two thirds of the members of each house, it shall become a law, notwithstanding the Governor's objections. If any bill shall not be returned within three days after it shall have been presented to him, Sunday excepted, the same shall be a law in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the General Assembly, by adjournment, prevent such return. Any bill submitted to the Governor for his approval during the last three days of a session of the General Assembly, shall be deposited by him in the office of the Secretary of State, within thirty days after the adjournment, with his approval, if approved by him, and with his objections, if he disapproves thereof.

Sec. 17. No bill shall be passed unless by the assent of a majority of all the members elected to each branch of the General Assembly, and the question upon the final passage shall be taken immediately upon its last reading, and the yeas and nays entered on the journal.

Sec. 18. An accurate statement of the receipts and expenditures of the public money shall be attached to and published with the laws, at every regular session of the General Assembly.

Sec. 19. The House of Representatives shall have the sole power of impeachment, and all impeachments shall be tried by the Senate. When sitting for that purpose, the senators shall be upon oath or affirmation; and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two thirds of the members present.

Sec. 20. The Governor, Judges of the Supreme and District Courts, and other State officers, shall be liable to impeachment for any misdemeanor or malfeasance in office; but judgment in such cases shall extend only to removal from office, and disqualification to hold any office of honor, trust, or profit, under this State; but the party convicted or acquitted shall nevertheless be liable to indictment, trial, and punishment, according to law. All other civil officers shall be tried for misdemeanors and malfeasance in office, in such manner as the General Assembly may provide.

Sec. 21. No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he shall have been elected, be appointed to any civil office of profit under this State, which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which shall have been increased during such term, except such offices as may be filled by elections by the people.

Sec. 22. No person holding any lucrative office under the United States, or this State, or any other power, shall be eligible to hold a seat in the General Assembly; but offices in the militia, to which there is attached no annual salary, or the office of justice of the peace, or postmaster whose compensation does not exceed one hundred dollars per annum, or notary public, shall not be deemed lucrative. Sec. 23. No person who may hereafter be a collector or holder of public monies, shall have a seat in either House of the General Assembly, or be eligible to hold any office of trust or profit in this State, until he shall have accounted for and paid into the treasury all sums for which he may be liable.

Sec. 24. No money shall be drawn from the treasury but in consequence of appropriations made by law.

Sec. 25. Each member of the first General Assembly under this Constitution, shall receive three dollars per diem while in session; and the further sum of three dollars for every twenty miles traveled, in going to and returning from the place where such session is held, by the nearest traveled route; after which they shall receive such compensation as shall be fixed by law; but no General Assembly shall have power to increase the compensation of its own members. And when convened in extra session they shall receive the same mileage and per diem compensation, as fixed by law for the regular session, and none other.

Sec. 26. No law of the General Assembly, passed at a regular session, of a public nature, shall take effect until the fourth day of July next after the passage thereof. Laws passed at a special session, shall take effect ninety days after the adjournment of the General Assembly by which they were passed. If the General Assembly shall deem any law of Immediate Importance, they may provide that the same shall take effect by publication in newspapers in the State.

Sec. 27. No divorce shall be granted by the General Assembly.

sec. 28. No lottery shall be authorized by this State; nor shall the sale of lottery tickets be allowed.

Sec. 29. Every act shall embrace but one subject, and matters properly connected therewith; which subject shall be expressed in the title. But if any subject shall be embraced in an act which shall not be expressed in the title, such act shall be void only as to so much thereof as shall not be expressed in the title.

Sec. 30. The General Assembly shall not pass local or special laws in the following cases:

For the assessment and collection of taxes for State, County, or road purposes; For laying out, opening, and working roads or highways;

For changing the names of persons;

For the incorporation of cities and towns;

For vacating roads, town plats, streets, alleys, or public squares;

For locating or changing county seats.

In all the cases above enumerated, and in all other cases where a general law can be made applicable, all laws shall be general, and of uniform operation throughout the State; and no law changing the boundary lines of any county shall have effect until upon being submitted to the people of the counties affected by the change, at a general election, it shall be approved by a majority of the votes in each county, cast for or against it.

Sec. 31. No extra compensation shall be made to any officer, public agent, or contractor, after the service shall have been rendered, or the contract entered into; nor, shall any money be paid on any claim, the subject matter of which shall not have been provided for by pre-existing laws, and no public money or property shall be appropriated for local, or private purposes, unless such appropriation, compensation, or claim, be allowed by two-thirds of the members elected to each branch of the General Assembly.

Sec. 32. Members of the General Assembly shall, before they enter upon the duties of their respective offices, take and subscribe the following oath or affirmation: "I do solemnly swear, or affirm, (as the case may be) that I will support the Constitution of the United States, and the Constitution of the State of Iowa, and that I will fainfully discharge the duties of Senator, (or Representative, as the case may be), according to the best of my ability." And members of the General Assembly are hereby empowered to administer to each other the said oath or affirmation.

Sec. 33. The General Assembly shall, in the years One thousand eight hundred and fifty nine, One thousand eight hundred and sixty three, One thousand eight hundred and sixty five. One thousand eight hundred and sixty seven, One thousand eight hundred and sixty nine, and One thousand eight hundred and seventy five, and every ten years thereafter, cause an enumeration to be made of all white¹² inhabitants of the State.¹³

Sec. 34. The number of senators shall, at the next session following each period of making such enumeration, and the next session following each United States census, be fixed by law, and apportioned among the several counties, according to the number of white¹⁴ inhabitants in each.¹⁵

[Sec. 34. The Senate shall be composed of fifty members to be elected from the several senatorial districts established by law and at the next session of the General Assembly held following the taking of the state and national census, they shall be apportioned among the several counties or districts of the state, according to population as shown by the preceding census,¹⁸ (but no county shall be entitled to more than one (1) Senator.)] 1^7

sec. 35. The Senate shall not consist of more than Afty members, nor the House of Representatives of more than one hundred; and they shall be apportioned among the several counties and representative districts of the State, according to the number of white¹⁸ inhabitants in each, upon ratios to be fixed by law; but no representative district shall contain more than four organized counties, and each district shall be entitled to at least one representative. Every county and district which shall have a number of inhabitants equal to one-half of the ratio fixed by law, shall be entitled to one representative; and any one county containing in addition to the ratio fixed by law one-half of that number, or more, shall be entitled to one additional representative. No floating district shall hereafter be formed.¹⁵ [Sec. 35. The House of Representatives shall consist of not more than one

hundred and eight members. The ratio of representation shall be determined by dividing the whole number of the population of the state as shown by the last preceding state or national census, by the whole number of counties then existing or organized, but each county shall constitute one representative district and be entitled to one representative, but each county having a population in excess of the ratio number, as herein provided of three fifths or more of such ratio number shall be entitled to one additional representative, but said addition shall extend only to the nine counties having the greatest population.]17

Sec. 36. At its first session under this Constitution, and at every subsequent regular session, the General Assembly shall fix the ratio of representation, and also form into representative districts those counties which will not be entitled singly to a representative,15

[Sec. 36. The General Assembly shall, at the first regular session held following the adoption of this amendment, and at each succeeding regular session held next after the taking of such census, fix the ratio of representation, and apportion the representatives, as hereinbefore required.]¹⁷

Sec. 37. When a congressional, senatorial, or representative district shall be composed of two or more counties, it shall not be entirely separated by any county belonging to another district; and no county shall be divided in forming a congressional, senatorial, or representative district.

Sec. 38. In all elections by the General Assembly, the members thereof shall vote viva voce and the votes shall be entered on the journal.

Article IV.

Executive Department

section 1. The Supreme Executive power of this State shall be vested in a

Chief Magistrate, who shall be styled the Governor of the State of Iowa. Sec. 2. The Governor shall be elected by the qualified electors at the time and place of voting for members of the General Assembly, and shall hold his office two years from the time of his installation, and until his successor is elected and qualified.

Sec. 3. There shall be a Lieutenant Governor, who shall hold his office two years, and be elected at the same time as the Governor. In voting for Governor and Lieutenant Governor, the electors shall designate for whom they vote as Governor, and for whom as Lieutenant Governor. The returns of every election for Governor, and Lieutenant Governor, shall be sealed up and transmitted to the seat of government of the State, directed to the Speaker of the House of

Representatives, who shall open and publish them in the presence of both Houses of the General Assembly.

Sec. 4. The persons respectively having the highest number of votes for Governor and Lieutenant Governor, shall be declared duly elected; but in case two or more persons shall have an equal and the highest number of votes for either office, the General Assembly shall, by joint vote, forthwith proceed to elect one of said persons Governor, or Lieutenant Governor, as the case may be. [If, upon the completion of the canvass of votes for Governor and Lieutenant Governor by the General Assembly, it shall appear that the person who received the highest number of votes for Governor has since died, resigned, is unable to qualify, fails to qualify, or for any other reason is unable to assume the duties of the office of Governor for the ensuing term, the powers and duties of the office shall devolve upon the person who received the highest number of votes for Lieutenant Governor until the disability is removed and, upon inauguration, he shall assume the powers and duties of Governor.]¹⁹

Sec. 5. Contested elections for Governor, or Lieutenant Governor, shall be determined by the General Assembly in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

Sec. 6. No person shall be eligible to the office of Governor, or Lieutenant Governor, who shall not have been a citizen of the United States, and a resident of the State, two years next preceding the election, and attained the age of thirty years at the time of said election.

sec. 7. The Governor shall be commander in chief of the militia, the army, and navy of this State.

sec. 8. He shall transact all executive business with the officers of government, civil and military, and may require information in writing from the officers of the executive department upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices.

Sec. 9. He shall take care that the laws are faithfully executed.

Sec. 10. When any office shall, from any cause, become vacant, and no mode is provided by the Constitution and laws for filling such vacancy, the Governor shall have power to fill such vacancy, by granting a commission, which shall expire at the end of the next session of the General Assembly, or at the next election by the people.

Sec. 11. He may, on extraordinary occasions, convene the General Assembly by proclamation, and shall state to both houses, when assembled, the purpose for which they shall have been convened.

Sec. 12. He shall communicate, by message, to the General Assembly, at every regular session, the condition of the State, and recommend such matters as he shall deem expedient.

Sec. 13. In case of disagreement between the two Houses with respect to the time of adjournment, the Governor shall have power to adjourn the General Assembly to such time as he may think proper; but no such adjournment shall be beyond the time fixed for the regular meeting of the next General Assembly.

Sec. 14. No person shall, while holding any office under the authority of the United States, or this State, execute the office of Governor, or Lieutenant Governor except as hereinafter expressly provided.

Sec. 15. The official term of the Governor, and Lieutenant Governor, shall commence on the second Monday of January next after their election, and continue for two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified. The Lieutenant Governor, while acting as Governor, shall receive the same pay as provided for Governor; and while presiding in the Senate, shall receive as compensation therefor, the same mileage and double the per diem pay provided for a Senator, and none other.

Sec. 16. The Governor shall have power to grant reprieves, commutations and pardons, after conviction, for all offenses except treason and cases of impeachment, subject to such regulations as may be provided by law. Upon conviction for treason, he shall have power to suspend the execution of the sentence until the case shall be reported to the General Assembly at its next meeting, when the General Assembly shall either grant a pardon, commute the sentence, direct the execution of the sentence, or grant a further reprieve. He shall have power to remit fines and forfeitures, under such regulations as may be prescribed by law; and shall report to the General Assembly, at its next meeting, each case of reprieve, commutation, or pardon granted, and the reasons therefor; and also all persons in whose favor remission of fines and forfeiture shall have been made, and the several amounts remitted.

Sec. 17. In case of the death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability of the Governor, the powers and duties of the office for the residue of the term, or until he shall be acquitted, or the disability removed, shall devolve upon the Lieutenant Governor.

sec. 18. The Lieutenant Governor shall be President of the Senate, but shall only vote when the Senate is equally divided; and in case of his absence, or impeachment, or when he shall exercise the office of Governor, the Senate shall choose a President pro tempore.

Sec. 19. If the Lieutenant Governor, while acting as Governor, shall be impeached, displaced, resign, or die, or otherwise become incapable of performing the duties of the office, the President pro tempore of the Senate shall act as Governor until the vacancy is filled, or the disability removed; and if the President of the Senate, for any of the above causes, shall be rendered incapable of performing the duties pertaining to the office of Governor, the same shall devolve upon the Speaker of the House of Representatives.²⁰

[Sec. 19. If there be a vacancy in the office of Governor and the Lieutenant Governor shall by reason of death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability become incapable of performing the duties pertaining to the office of Governor, the President pro tempore of the Senate shall act as Governor until the vacancy is filled or the disability removed; and if the President pro tempore of the Senate, for any of the above causes, shall be incapable of performing the duties pertaining to the office of Governor the same shall devolve upon the Speaker of the House of Representatives; and if the Speaker of the House of Representatives; for any of the above causes, shall be incapable of performing the duties of the office of Governor, the Justices of the Supreme Court shall convene the General Assembly by proclamation and the General Assembly shall organize by the election of a President pro tempore by the Senate and a Speaker by the House of Representatives. The General Assembly shall thereupon immediately proceed to the election of a Governor and Lieutenate Governor in joint convention.] 20

Sec. 20. There shall be a seal of this State, which shall be kept by the Governor, and used by him officially, and shall be called the Great Seal of the State of Iowa.

Sec. 21. All grants and commissions shall be in the name and by the authority of the people of the State of Iowa, sealed with the Great Seal of the State, signed by the Governor, and countersigned by the Secretary of State.

sec. 22. A Secretary of State, Auditor of State and Treasurer of State, shall be elected by the qualified electors, who shall continue in office for two years, and until their successors are elected and qualified; and perform such duties as may be required by law.

Article V.

Judicial Department

Section 1. The judicial power shall be vested in a Supreme Court, District Courts, and such other Courts, inferior to the Supreme Court, as the General Assembly may, from time to time, establish.

Sec. 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of three Judges, two of whom shall constitute a quorum to hold Court.²¹

sec. 3. The Judges of the Supreme Court shall be elected by the qualified electors of the State, and shall hold their court at such time and place as the General Assembly may prescribe. The Judges of the Supreme Court so elected, shall be classified so that one Judge shall go out of office every two years; and the Judge holding the shortest term of office under such classification, shall be Chief Justice of the Court, during his term, and so on in rotation. After the expiration of their terms of office, under such classification, the term of each Judge of the Supreme Court shall be six years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified. The Judges of the Supreme Court shall be ineligible to any other office in the State, during the term for which they shall have been elected.

sec. 4. The Supreme Court shall have appellate jurisdiction only in cases in chancery, and shall constitute a Court for the correction of errors at law. under such restrictions as the General Assembly may, by law, prescribe; and shall have power to issue all writs and process necessary to secure justice to parties, and exercise a supervisory control over all inferior Judicial tribunals throughout the State.

sec. 5. The District Court shall consist of a single Judge, who shall be elected by the qualified electors of the District in which he resides. The Judge of the District Court shall hold his office for the term of four years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified; and shall be ineligible to any other office, except that of Judge of the Supreme Court, during the term for which he was elected.

Sec. 6. The District Court shall be a court of law and equity, which shall be distinct and separate jurisdictions, and have jurisdiction in civil and criminal matters arising in their respective districts, in such manner as shall be prescribed by law.

sec. 7. The Judges of the Supreme and District Courts shall be conservators of the peace throughout the State.

The style of all process shall be, "The State of Iowa," and all Sec. 8. prosecutions shall be conducted in the name and by the authority of the same.

Sec. 9. The salary of each Judge of the Supreme Court shall be two thousand dollars per annum; and that of each District Judge, one thousand six hundred dollars per annum, until the year Eighteen hundred and sixty; after which time they shall severally receive such compensation as the General Assembly may, by law, prescribe; which compensation shall not be increased or diminished during the term for which they shall have been elected.

sec. 10. The State shall be divided into eleven Judicial Districts; and after the year Eighteen hundred and sixty, the General Assembly may re-organize the Judicial Districts and increase or diminish the number of Districts, or the number of Judges of the said Court, and may increase the number of Judges of the Supreme Court; but such increase or diminution shall not be more than one District, or one Judge of either Court at any one session; and no reorganization of the districts, or diminution of the number of Judges, shall have the effect of removing a Judge from office. Such re-organization of the districts, or any change in the boundaries thereof, or increase or diminution of the number of Judges, shall take place every four years thereafter, if necessary, and at no other time.22

[At any regular session of the General Assembly, the State may be divided into the necessary judicial districts for district court purposes, or the said districts may be re-organized and the number of the districts and the judges of said courts increased or diminished; but no re-organization of the districts or diminution of the judges shall have the effect of removing a judge from office]²³

Sec. 11. The Judges of the Supreme and District Courts shall be chosen at the general election; and the term of office of each Judge shall commence on the first day of January next after his election.

Sec. 12. The General Assembly shall provide, by law, for the election of an Attorney General by the people, whose term of office shall be two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

Sec. 13. The qualified electors of each judicial district shall, at the time of the election of District Judge, elect a District Attorney, who shall be a resident of the district for which he is elected, and who shall hold his office for the term of four years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified,24

[Sec. 13. The qualified electors of each county shall, at the general election in the year 1886, and every two years thereafter, elect a County Attorney, who shall be a resident of the county for which he is elected, and shall hold his office for two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and gualified. 125

Sec. 14. It shall be the duty of the General Assembly to provide for the carrying into effect of this article, and to provide for a general system of practice in all the Courts of this State.

Article VI.

Militia

section 1. The militia of this State shall be composed of all able-bodied white27 male citizens between the ages of eighteen and forty-five years, except such as are or may hereafter be exempt by the laws of the United States, or of this State, and shall be armed, equipped, and trained, as the General Assembly may provide by law.

sec. 2. No person or persons conscientiously scrupulous of bearing arms shall be compelled to do military duty in time of peace; provided, that such person or persons shall pay an equivalent for such exemption in the same manner as other citizens.

Sec. 3. All commissioned officers of the militia, (staff officers excepted,) shall be elected by the persons liable to perform military duty, and shall be commissioned by the Governor.

Article VII.

State Debts

Section 1. The credit of the State shall not, in any manner, be given or leaned to, or in aid of, any individual, association, or corporation; and the State shall never assume, or become responsible for, the debts or liabilities of any individual, association, or corporation, unless incurred in time of war for the benefit of the State.

Sec. 2. The State may contract debts to supply casual deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for; but the aggregate amount of such debts, direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the General Assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never exceed the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which . it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

sec. 3. All losses to the permanent, School, or University fund of this State. which shall have been occasioned by the defalcation, mismanagement or fraud of the agents or officers controlling and managing the same, shall be audited by the proper authorities of the State. The amount so audited shall be a permanent funded debt against the State, in favor of the respective fund, sustaining the loss, upon which not less than six per cent annual interest shall be paid. The amount of liability so created shall not be counted as a part of the indebtedness authorized by the second section of this article.

sec. 4. In addition to the above limited power to contract debts, the State may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, or defend the State in war; but the money arising from the debts so contracted shall be applied to the purpose for which it was raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other purpose whatever.

Sec. 5. Except the debts hereinbefore specified in this article, no debt shall be hereafter contracted by, or on behalf of this State, unless such debt shall be authorized by some law for some single work or object, to be distinctly specified therein; and such law shall impose and provide for the collection of a direct annual tax, sufficient to pay the interest on such debt, as it falls due, and also to pay and discharge the principal of such debt, within twenty years from the time of the contracting thereof; but no such law shall take effect until at a general election it shall have been submitted to the people, and have received a majority of all votes cast for and against it at such election; and all money raised by authority of such law, shall be applied only to the specific object therein stated, or to the payment of the debt created thereby; and such law shall be published in at least one newspaper in each County, if one is published

therein, throughout the State, for three months preceding the election at which it is submitted to the people.

sec. 6. The Legislature may, at any time, after the approval of such law by the people, if no debt shall have been contracted in pursuance thereof, repeal the same; and may, at any time, forbid the contracting of any further debt, or liability, under such law; but the tax imposed by such law, in proportion to the debt or liability, which may have been contracted in pursuance thereof, shall remain in force and be irrepealable, and be annually collected, until the principal and interest are fully paid.

Sec. 7. Every law which imposes, continues, or revives a tax, shall distinctly state the tax, and the object to which it is to be applied; and it shall not be sufficient to refer to any other law to fix such tax or object.

[Sec. 8. All motor vehicle registration fees and all license and excise taxes on motor vehicle fuel, except cost of administration, shall be used exclusively for the construction, maintenance and supervision of the public highways exclusively within the state or for the payment of bonds issued or to be issued for the construction of such public highways and the payment of interest on such bonds.]²⁸

Article VIII.

Corporations

Section 1. No corporation shall be created by special laws; but the General Assembly shall provide, by general laws, for the organization of all corporations hereafter to be created, except as hereinafter provided.

Sec. 2. The property of all corporations for pecuniary profit, shall be subject to taxation, the same as that of individuals.

sec. 3. The State shall not become a stockholder in any corporation, nor shall it assume or pay the debt or liability of any corporation, unless incurred in time of war for the benefit of the State.

sec. 4. No political or municipal corporation shall become a stockholder in any banking corporation, directly or indirectly.

Sec. 5. No act of the General Assembly, authorizing or creating corporations or associations with banking powers, nor amendments thereto shall take effect, or in any manner be in force, until the same shall have been submitted, separately, to the people, at a general or special election, as provided by law, to be held not less than three months after the passage of the act, and shall have been approved by a majority of all the electors voting for and against it at such election.

Sec. 6. Subject to the provisions of the foregoing section, the General Assembly may also provide for the establishment of a State Bank with branches.

Sec. 7. If a State Bank be established, it shall be founded on an actual specie basis, and the branches shall be mutually responsible for each other's liabilities upon all notes, bills, and other issues intended for circulation as money.

Sec. S. If a general Banking law shall be enacted, it shall provide for the registry and countersigning by an officer of State, of all bills or paper credit designed to circulate as money, and require security to the full amount thereof, to be deposited with the State Treasurer, in United States stocks, or in interest paying stocks of States in good credit and standing, to be rated at ten per cent. below their average value in the City of New York, for the thirty days next preceding their deposit; and in case of a depreciation of any portion of said stocks, to the amount of ten per cent. on the dollar, the bank or banks owning such stock shall be required to make up said deficiency by depositing additional stocks; and said law shall also provide for the recording of the names of all stockholders in such corporations, the amount of stock held by each, the time of any transfer, and to whom.

Sec. 9. Every stockholder in a banking corporation or institution shall be individually responsible and liable to its creditors, over and above the amount of stock by him or her held, to an amount equal to his or her respective shares so held for all of its liabilities, accruing while he or she remains such stockholder.

Sec. 10. In case of the insolvency of any banking institution, the billholders shall have a preference over its other creditors.

Sec. 11. The suspension of specie payment by banking institutions shall never be permitted or sanctioned.

Sec. 12. Subject to the provisions of this article, the General Assembly shall have power to amend or repeal all laws for the organization or creation of corporations, or granting of special or exclusive privileges or immunities, by a vote of two-thirds of each branch of the General Assembly; and no exclusive privileges, except as in this article provided, shall ever be granted.

Article IX.

Education and School Lands 1st. Education.

Section 1. The educational interest of the State, including Common Schools and other educational institutions, shall be under the management of a Board of Education,²⁹ which shall consist of the Lieutenant Governor, who shall be the presiding officer of the Board, and have the casting vote in case of a tie, and one member to be elected from each judicial district in the State.

Sec. 2. No person shall be eligible as a member of said Board who shall not have attained the age of twenty-five years, and shall have been one year a citizen of the State.

Sec. 3. One member of said Board shall be chosen by the qualified electors of each district, and shall hold the office for the term of four years, and until his successor is elected and qualified. After the first election under this Constitution, the Board shall be divided, as nearly as practicable, into two equal classes, and the seats of the first class shall be vacated after the expiration of two years : and one-half of the Board shall be chosen every two years thereafter.

Sec. 4. The first session of the Board of Education shall be held at the Seat of Government, on the first Monday of December, after their election; after which the General Assembly may fix the time and place of meeting.

Sec. 5. The session of the Board shall be limited to twenty days, and but one session shall be held in any one year, except upon extraordinary occasions, when, upon the recommendation of two-thirds of the Board, the Governor may order a special session.

Sec. 6. The Board of Education shall appoint a Secretary, who shall be the executive officer of the Board, and perform such duties as may be imposed upon him by the Board, and the laws of the State. They shall keep a journal of their proceedings, which shall be published and distributed in the same manner as the journals of the General Assembly.

Sec. 7. All rules and regulations made by the Board shall be published and distributed to the several Counties, Townships, and School Districts, as may be provided for by the Board, and when so made, published and distributed, they shall have the force and effect of law.

Sec. 8. The Board of Education shall have full power and authority to legislate and make all needful rules and regulations in relation to Common Schools, and other educational institutions, that are instituted, to receive aid from the School or University fund of this State; but all acts, rules, and regulations of said Board may be altered, amended or repealed by the General Assembly; and when so altered, amended or repealed they shall not be re-enacted by the Board of Education.

Sec. 9. The Governor of the State shall be, EX OFFICIO, a member of said Board.

Sec. 10. The Board shall have no power to levy taxes, or make appropriations of money. Their contingent expenses shall be provided for by the General Assembly.

Sec. 11. The State University shall be established at one place without branches at any other place, and the University fund shall be applied to that institution and no other.

sec. 12. The Board of Education shall provide for the education of all the youths of the State, through a system of Common Schools, and such schools shall be organized and kept in each school district at least three months in each year. Any district failing, for two successive years, to organize and keep up a school as aforesaid may be deprived of their portion of the school fund.

Sec. 13. The members of the Board of Education shall each receive the same per diem during the time of their session, and mileage going to and returning therefrom, as members of the General Assembly.

A majority of the Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; but no rule, regulation, or law, for the government of Common schools or other educational institutions, shall pass without the concurrence of a majority of all the members of the Board, which shall be expressed by the yeas and nays on the final passage. The style of all acts of the Board shall be "Be it enacted by the Board of Education of the State of Iowa."

Sec. 15. At any time after the year One thousand eight hundred and sixtythree, the General Assembly shall have power to abolish or re-organize said Board of Education, and provide for the educational interest of the State in any other manner that to them shall seem best and proper.

2nd. School Funds and School Lands.

Section 1. The educational and school funds and lands, shall be under the control and management of the General Assembly of this State.

Sec. 2. The University lands, and the proceeds thereof, and all monies belonging to said fund shall be a permanent fund for the sole use of the State University. The interest arising from the same shall be annually appropriated for the support and benefit of said University.

Sec. 3. The General Assembly shall encourage, by all suitable means, the promotion of intellectual, scientific, moral, and agricultural improvement. The proceeds of all lands that have been, or hereafter may be, granted by the United States to this State, for the support of schools, which may have been, or shall hereafter be sold, or disposed of, and the five hundred thousand acres of land granted to the new State, under an act of Congress, distributing the proceeds of the public lands among the several States of the Union, approved in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-one, and all estates of deceased persons who may have died without leaving a will or heir, and also such per cent. as has been or may hereafter be granted by Congress, on the sale of lands in this State, shall be, and remain a perpetual fund, the interest of which, together with all rents of the unsold lands, and such other means as the General Assembly may provide, shall be inviolably appropriated to the support of Common Schools throughout the State.

Sec. 4. The money which may have been or shall be paid by persons as an equivalent for exemption from military duty, and the clear proceeds of all fines collected in the several Counties for any breach of the penal laws, shall be exclusively applied, in the several Counties in which such money is paid, or fine collected, among the several school districts of said Counties, in proportion to the number of youths subject to enumeration in such districts, to the support of Common Schools, or the establishment of libraries, as the Board of Education shall from time to time provide.

Sec. 5. The General Assembly shall take measures for the protection, improvement, or other disposition of such lands as have been, or may hereafter be reserved, or granted by the United States, or any person or persons, to this State, for the use of the University, and the funds accruing from the rents or sale of such lands, or from any other source for the purpose aforesaid, shall be, and remain, a permanent fund, the interest of which shall be applied to the support of said University, for the promotion of literature, the arts and sciences, as may be authorized by the terms of such grant. And it shall be the duty of the General Assembly as soon as may be, to provide official means for the improvement and permanent security of the funds of said University.

Sec. 6. The financial agents of the school funds shall be the same, that by law, receive and control the State and county revenue for other civil purposes, under such regulations as may be provided by law.

Sec. 7. The money subject to the support and maintenance of Common Schools shall be distributed to the districts in proportion to the number of youths, between the ages of five and twenty-one years, in such manner as may be provided by the General Assembly.

Article X.

Amendments to the Constitution

Section 1. Any amendment or amendments to this Constitution may be proposed in either House of the General Assembly; and if the same shall be agreed to by a majority of the members elected to each of the two Houses, such proposed amendment shall be entered on their journals, with the yeas and nays taken thereon, and referred to the Legislature to be chosen at the next general election, and shall be published, as provided by law, for three months previous to the time of making such choice; and if, in the General Assembly so next chosen as aforesaid, such proposed amendment or amendments shall be agreed to, by a majority of all the members elected to each House, then it shall be the duty of the General Assembly to submit such proposed amendment or amendments to the people, in such manner, and at such time as the General Assembly shall provide; and if the people shall approve and ratify such amendment or amendments, by a majority of the electors qualified to vote for members of the General Assembly, voting thereon, such amendment or amendments shall become a part of the Constitution of this State.

sec. 2. If two or more amendments shall be submitted at the same time, they shall be submitted in such manner that the electors shall vote for or against each of such amendments separately.

Sec. 3. At the general election to be held in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy, and in each tenth year thereafter, and also at such times as the General Assembly may, by law, provide, the question, "Shall there be a Convention to revise the Constitution, and amend the same?" shall be decided by the electors qualified to vote for members of the General Assembly; and in case a majority of the electors so qualified, voting at such election, for and against such proposition, shall decide in favor of a Convention for such purpose, the General Assembly, at its next session, shall provide by law for the election of delegates to such Convention.

Article XI.

Miscellaneous.

Section 1. The jurisdiction of Justices of the Peace shall extend to all civil cases, (except cases in chancery, and cases where the question of title to real estate may arise,) where the amount in controversy does not exceed one hundred dollars, and by the consent of parties may be extended to any amount not exceeding three hundred dollars.

Sec. 2. No new County shall be hereafter created containing less than four hundred and thirty-two square miles; nor shall the territory of any organized county be reduced below that area; except the County of Worth, and the counties west of it along the Northern boundary of this State, may be organized without additional territory.

Sec. 3. No county, or other political or municipal corporation shall be allowed to become indebted in any manner, or for any purpose, to an amount, in the aggregate, exceeding five per centum on the value of the taxable property within such county or corporation—to be ascertained by the last State and county tax lists, previous to the incurring of such indebtedness.

sec. 4. The boundaries of the State may be enlarged, with the consent of Congress and the General Assembly.

Sec. 5. Every person elected or appointed to any office, shall, before entering upon the duties thereof, take an oath or affirmation to support the Constitution of the United States, and of this State, and also an oath of office.

Sec. 6. In all cases of elections to fill vacancies in office occurring before the expiration of a full term, the person so elected shall hold for the residue of the unexpired term; and all persons appointed to fill vacancies in office, shall hold until the next general election, and until their successors are elected and qualified.

Sec. 7. The General Assembly shall not locate any of the public lands, which have been or may be granted by Congress to this State, and the location of which may be given to the General Assembly, upon lands actually settled, without the consent of the occupant. The extent of the claim of such occupant, so exempted, shall not exceed three hundred and twenty acres.

Sec. S. The seat of Government is hereby permanently established, as now fixed by law at the City of Des Moines, in the County of Polk; and the State University, at Iowa City, in the County of Johnson.

Article XII.

Schedule.

Section 1. This Constitution shall be the supreme law of the State, and any law inconsistent therewith, shall be void. The General Assembly shall pass all laws necessary to carry this Constitution into effect.

Sec. 2. All laws now in force and not inconsistent with this Constitution, shall remain in force until they shall expire or be repealed.

Sec. 3. All indictments, prosecutions, suits, pleas, plaints, process, and other proceedings pending in any of the courts, shall be prosecuted to final judgment and execution; and all appeals, writs of error, certiorari, and injunctions, shall be carried on in the several courts, in the same manner as now provided by law; and all offenses, misdemeanors, and crimes that may have been committed before the taking effect of this Constitution, shall be subject to indictment, trial and punishment, in the same manner as they would have been, had not this Constitution been made.

Sec. 4. All fines, penalties, or forfeitures due, or to become due, or accruing to the State, or to any County therein, or to the school fund, shall inure to the State, county, or school fund, in the manner prescribed by law.

sec. 5. All bonds executed to the State, or to any officer in his official capacity, shall remain in force and inure to the use of those concerned.

Sec. 0. The first election under this Constitution shall be held on the second Tuesday in October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, at which time the electors of the State shall elect the Governor and Lieutenant Governor. There shall also be elected at such election, the successors of such State Senators as were elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, and members of the House of Representatives, who shall be elected in accordance with the act of apportionment, enacted at the session of the General Assembly which commenced on the first Monday of December one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

Sec. 7. The first election for Secretary, Auditor, and Treasurer of State. Attorney General, District Judges, Members of the Board of Education, District Attorneys, members of Congress, and such State officers as shall be elected at the April election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, (except the Superintendent of Public Instruction,) and such county officers as were elected at the August election in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, except Prosecuting Attorneys, shall be held on the second Tuesday of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight: PROVIDED, That the time for which any District Judge or other State or County officer elected at the April election in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, shall not extend beyond the time fixed for filling like offices at the October election in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight.

sec. 8. The first election for Judges of the Supreme Court, and such County officers as shall be elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, shall be held on the second Tuesday of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.

Sec. 9. The first regular session of the General Assembly shall be held in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, commencing on the second Monday of January of said year.

Sec. 10. Senators elected at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, shall continue in office until the second Tuesday of October, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, at which time their successors shall be elected as may be prescribed by law.

Sec. 11. Every person elected by popular vote, by a vote of the General Assembly, or who may hold office by executive appointment, which office is continued by this Constitution, and every person who shall be so elected or appointed, to any such office, before the taking effect of this Constitution, (except as in this Constitution otherwise provided,) shall continue in office until the term for which such person has been or may be elected or appointed shall expire; but no such person shall continue in office after the taking effect of this Constitution, for a longer period than the term of such office, in this Constitution prescribed.

Sec. 12. The General Assembly, at the first session under this Constitution, shall district the State into eleven Judicial Districts, for District Court purposes; and shall also provide for the apportionment of the members of the General Assembly, in accordance with the provisions of this Constitution.

Sec. 13. This Constitution shall be submitted to the electors of the State at the August election, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the several election districts in this State. The ballots at such election shall be written or printed as follows: Those in favor of the Constitution, "New Constitution—Yes." Those against the Constitution, "New Constitution—No." The election shall be conducted in the same manner as the general elections of the State, and the poll-books shall be returned and canvassed as provided in the twenty-fifth chapter of the code, and abstracts shall be forwarded to the Secretary of State, which abstracts shall be canvassed in the manner provided for the canvass of State officers. And if it shall appear that a majority of all the votes cast at such election for and against this Constitution are in favor of the same, the Governor shall immediately issue his proclamation stating that fact, and such Constitution shall be the Constitution of the State of Iowa, and shall take effect from and after the publication of said proclamation. Sec. 14. At the same election that this Constitution is submitted to the people for its adoption or rejection, a proposition to amend the same by striking out the word 'white' from the article on the Right of Suffrage, shall be separately submitted to the electors of this State for adoption or rejection in the manner following—Namely: A separate ballot may be given by every person having a right to vote at said election, to be deposited in a separate box; and those given for the adoption of such proposition shall have the words, "Shall the word 'White' be stricken out of the Article on the Right of Suffrage? Yes." And those given against the proposition shall have the words, "Shall the word 'White' be stricken out of the Article on the Right of Suffrage? No." And if at said election the number of ballots cast in favor of said proposition shall be equal to a majority of those cast for and against this Constitution, then said word "White" shall be stricken from said Article and be no part thereof.³⁰

sec. 15. Until otherwise directed by law, the County of Mills shall be in and a part of the sixth Judicial District of this State.

[Sec. 16. The first general election after the adoption of this amendment shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and general elections shall be held biennially thereafter. In the year one thousand nine hundred and six there shall be elected a governor, lieutenant-governor, secretary of state, auditor of state, treasurer of state, attorney general, two judges of the supreme court, the successors of the judges of the district court whose terms of office expire on December 31st, one thousand nine hundred and six, state senators who would otherwise be chosen in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, and members of the house of representatives. The terms of office of the judges of the supreme court which would otherwise expire on December 31st, in odd numbered years, and all other elective state, county and township officers whose terms of office would otherwise expire in January in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and members of the general assembly whose successors would otherwise be chosen at the general election in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The terms of offices of senators whose successors would otherwise be chosen in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The general assembly shall make such changes in the law governing the time of election and term of office of all other elective officers as shall be necessary to make the time of their election and term of office conform to this amendment, and shall provide which of the judges of the supreme court shall serve as chief justice. The general assembly shall meet in regular session on the second Monday in January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and also on the second Monday in January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, and biennially thereafter.]⁸¹

Done in Convention at Iowa City, this fifth day of March in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, and of the Independence of the United States of America, the eighty-first.

Amendments of 1868 ³²

Strike the word "white" from section one of article two thereof. Strike the word "white" from section thirty-three of article three thereof. 1st. 2đ. Strike the word "white" from section thirty-four of article three thereof. Strike the word "white" from section thirty-five of article three thereof. Strike the word "white" from section one of article six thereof. 3đ. 4th. 5th.

Amendment of 1880³³

Strike out the words "free white" from the third line of section four (4) of article three (3) of said constitution, relating to the legislative department.

Amendment of 1882⁸⁴

Add as section 26 to article I of said Constitution the following: Section 26. No person shall manufacture for sale, or sell, or keep for sale, as a beverage, any intoxicating liquors whatever, including ale, wine and beer. The General Assembly shall by law prescribe regulations for the enforcement of the prohibition herein contained, and shall thereby provide suitable penalties for the violation of the provisions hereof.

Amendments of 1884 **

Amendment 1. The general election for the state, district, county and township officers shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November.

Amendment 2. At any regular session of the General Assembly, the State may be divided into the necessary Judicial Districts for District Court purposes, or the said Districts may be reorganized and the number of the Districts and the Judges of said Courts increased or diminished; but no reorganization of the Districts or diminution of the Judges shall have the effect of removing a Judge from office.

Amendment 3. The grand jury may consist of any number of members not less than five, nor more than fifteen, as the General Assembly may by law provide, or the General Assembly may provide for holding persons to answer for any criminal offense without the intervention of a grand jury.

Amendment 4. That section 13 of article 5 of the Constitution be stricken therefrom, and the following adopted as such section:

SECTION 13. The qualified electors of each county shall, at the general election in the year 1886, and every two years thereafter elect a County Attorney, who shall be a resident of the county for which he is elected, and shall hold his office for two years, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

Amendments of 1904³⁶

Add as section 16, to Article XII of the Constitution, the following:

SECTION 16. The first general election after the adoption of this amendment shall be held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and general elections shall be held biennially thereafter. In the year one thousand nine hundred and six there shall be elected a governor, lieutenant-governor, secretary of state, auditor of state, treasurer of state, attorney general, two judges of the supreme court, the successors of the judges of the district court whose terms of office expire on December 31st, one thousand nine hundred and six, State Senators who would

otherwise be chosen in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, and members of the House of Representatives. The terms of office of the Judges of the Supreme Court which would otherwise expire on December 31st, in odd numbered years, and all other elective state, county and township officers whose terms of office would otherwise expire in January in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and members of the General Assembly whose successors would otherwise be chosen at the general election in the year one thousand nine hundred and five, are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The terms of office of senators whose successors would otherwise be chosen in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven are hereby extended one year and until their successors are elected and qualified. The General Assembly shall make such changes in the law governing the time of election and term of office of all other elective officers as shall be necessary to make the time of their election and terms of office conform to this amendment, and shall provide which of the judges of the supreme court shall serve as chief justice. The General Assembly shall meet in regular session on the second Monday in January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and six, and also on the second Monday in January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and seven, and biennially thereafter.

That sections thirty-four (34), thirty-five (35) and thirty-six (36) of article three (3) of the Constitution of the State of Iowa, be repealed and the following adopted in lieu thereof:

SEC. 34 The Senate shall be composed of fifty members to be elected from the several senatorial districts, established by law and at the next session of the general assembly held following the taking of the state and national census, they shall be apportioned among the several counties or districts of the state, according to population as shown by the last preceding census.

SEC. 35. The House of Representatives shall consist of not more than one hundred and eight members. The ratio of representation shall be determined by dividing the whole number of the population of the state as shown by the last preceding state or national census, by the whole number of counties then existing or organized, but each county shall constitute one representative district and be entitled to one representative, but each county having a population in excess of the ratio number, as herein provided of three fifths or more of such ratio number shall be entitled to one additional representative, but said addition shall extend only to the nine counties having the greatest population.

SEC. 36. The General Assembly shall, at the first regular session held following the adoption of this amendment, and at each succeeding regular session held next after the taking of such census, fix the ratio of representation, and apportion the additional representatives, as hereinbefore required.

Amendment of 1908 **

That there be added to Section eighteen (18) of Article one (1) of the Constitution of the State of Iowa, the following:

"The General Assembly, however, may pass laws permitting the owners of lands to construct drains, ditches, and levees for agricultural, sanitary or mining purposes across the land of others, and provide for the organization of drainage districts, vest the proper authorities with power to construct and maintain levees, drains and ditches and to keep in repair all drains, ditches, and levees heretofore constructed under the laws of the state, by special assessments upon the property benefited thereby. The General Assembly may provide by law for the condemnation of such real estate as shall be necessary for the construction and maintenance of such drains, ditches and levees, and prescribe the method of making such condemnation."

Amendment of 1916 **

To repeal Section seven (7) of Article two (2) of the Constitution of Iowa and to adopt in lieu thereof the following, to-wit:

"The general election for state, district, county and township officers in the year 1916 shall be held in the same month and on the same day as that fixed by the laws of the United States for the election of presidential electors, or of president and vice-president of the United States; and thereafter such election shall be held at such time as the general assembly may by law provide."

Amendment of 1926³⁹

Strike out the word "male" from Section four (4) of Article three (3) of said Constitution, relating to the legislative department.

Amendment of 1928⁴⁰

That the period (.) at the end of said Section thirty-four (34) of Article three (3) of the Constitution of the State of Iowa be stricken and the following inserted :

", but no county shall be entitled to more than one (1) senator."

Amendment of 1936⁴¹

Amend Article three (III) by repealing Section thirty-three (33) relating to the state census.

Amendment of 1942 ⁴²

That Article seven (VII) of the Constitution of the State of Iowa be amended by adding thereto, as Section eight (8) thereof, the following:

"All motor vehicle registration fees and all licenses and excise taxes on motor vehicle fuel, except cost of administration, shall be used exclusively for the construction, maintenance and supervision of the public highways exclusively within the state or for the payment of bonds issued or to be issued for the con-struction of such public highways and the payment of interest on such bonds."

Amendments of 1952 48

Amendment 1. That section four (4) of Article IV of the Constitution of Iowa be amended by adding thereto the following: "If, upon the completion of the canvass of votes for Governor and Lieutenant Governor by the General Assembly, it shall appear that the person who received the highest number of votes for Governor has since died, resigned, is unable to qualify, fails to qualify, or for any other reason is unable to assume the duties of the office of Governor for the ensuing term, the powers and duties of the office shall devolve upon the person who received the highest number of votes for Lieutenant Governor until the disability is removed and, upon inauguration, he shall assume the powers and duties of Governor."

Amendment 2. That section nineteen (19) of Article IV of the Constitution of Iowa be repealed and the following adopted in lieu thereof: "If there be a vacancy in the office of Governor and the Lieutenant Governor shall by reason of death, impeachment, resignation, removal from office, or other disability become incapable of performing the duties pertaining to the office of Governor, the President pro tempore of the Senate shall act as Governor until the vacancy is filled or the disability removed; and if the President pro tempore of the Senate, for any of the above causes, shall be incapable of performing the duties pertaining to the office of Governor the same shall devolve upon the Speaker of the House of Representatives; and if the Speaker of the House of Representa-tives, for any of the above causes, shall be incapable of performing the duties of the office of Governor, the Justices of the Supreme Court shall convene the General Assembly by proclamation and the General Assembly shall organize by the election of a President pro tempore by the Senate and a Speaker by the House of Representatives. The General Assembly shall thereupon immediately proceed to the election of a Governor and Lieutenant Governor in joint convention."

The Declaration of Independence

When in the Course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the Powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.-We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.----That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed.-That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all experience hath shown, that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same Object evinces a design to reduce them under absolute Despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future security.-Such has been the patient sufferance of these Colonies; and such is now the necessity which con-strains them to alter their former Systems of Government. The history of the present King of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute Tyranny over these States. To prove this, let Facts be sub-mitted to a candid world.—He has refused his Assent to Laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public good.-He has forbidden his Governors to pass Laws of immediate and pressing importance, unless suspended in their operation till his Assent should be obtained; and when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them.---He has refused to pass other Laws for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would relinquish the right of Representation in the Legislature, a right inestimable to them and formidable to tyrants only.-He has called together legislative bodies at places unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the depository of their public Records, for the sole purpose of fatiguing them into compliance with his measures.-He has dissolved Representative Houses repeatedly, for opposing with manly firmness his invasions on the rights of the people.-He has refused for a long time, after such dissolutions, to cause others to be elected; whereby the Legislative powers, incapable of Annihilation, have returned to the People at large for their exercise; the State remaining in the meantime exposed to all the dangers of invasion from without, and convulsions within,-He has endeavored to prevent the population of these States; for that purpose obstructing the Laws for Naturalization of Foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their migration hither, and raising the conditions of new Appropriations of Lands.-He has obstructed the Administration of Justice, by refusing his Assent to Laws for establishing Judiciary Powers.—He has made Judges dependent on his Will alone, for the tenure of their offices, and the amount and payment of their salaries.—He has erected a multitude of New Offices, and sent hither swarms of Officers to harass our People, and eat out their substance.—He has kept among us, in times of peace, Standing Armies, without the Consent of our legislatures.—He has affected to render the Military independent of and superior to the Civil Power.-He has combined with others to subject us to a jurisdiction foreign to our constitution, and unacknowledged by our laws; giving

his Assent to their acts of pretended Legislation:-For quartering large bodies of armed troops among us:-For protecting them, by a mock Trial, from Punishment for any Murders which they should commit on the Inhabitants of these States :- For cutting off our Trade with all parts of the world:-For imposing taxes on us without our Consent:---For depriving us in many cases, of the benefits of Trial by Jury:-For transporting us beyond Seas to be tried for pretended offenses:-For abolishing the free System of English Laws in a neighboring Province, establishing therein an Arbitrary government, and enlarging its Boundaries so as to render it at once an example and fit instrument for introducing the same absolute rule into these colonies:-For taking away our Charters, abolishing our most valuable Laws, and altering fundamentally the Forms of our Governments:-For suspending our own Legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with Power to legislate for us in all cases whatsoever :--- He has abdicated Government here, by declaring us out of his Protection and waging War against us.—He has plundered our seas, ravaged our Coasts, burnt our towns, and destroyed the lives of our people.--He is at this time transporting large armies of foreign mercenaries to compleat the works of death, desolation and tyranny, already begun with circumstances of Cruelty & perfidy scarcely paralleled in the most barbarous ages, and totally unworthy the Head of a civilized nation.- He has constrained our fellow Citizens taken captive on the high Seas to bear Arms against their Country, to become the executioners of their friends and Brethren, or to fall themselves by their Hands.-He has excited domestic insurrections amongst us, and has endeavored to bring on the inhabitants of our frontiers, the merciless Indian Savages whose known rule of warfare, is an undistinguished destruction of all ages, sexes and conditions. In every stage of these Oppressions We have Petitioned for Redress in the most humble terms: Our repeated Petitions have been answered only by repeated injury. A Prince, whose character is thus marked by every act which may define a Tyrant, is unfit to be the ruler of a free people. Nor have We been wanting in attentions to our British brethren. We have warned them from time to time of attempts by their legislature to extend an unwarrantable jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the circumstances of our emigration and settlement here. We have appealed to their native justice and magnanimity, and we have conjured them by the ties of our common kindred to disayow these usurpations, which would inevitably interrupt our connections and correspondence. They too have been deaf to the voice of justice and of consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the necessity, which denounces our Separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of mankind, Enemies in War, in Peace Friends.-


We, Therefore, the Representatives of the United States of America, in General Congress, Assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the Name, and by Authority of the good People of these Colonies, solemnly publish and declare, That these United Colonies are, and of Right ought to be Free and Independent States; that they are Absolved from all Allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain, is and ought to be totally dissolved; and that as Free and Independent States, they have full Power to levy War, conclude Peace, contract Alliances, establish Commerce, and to do all other Acts and Things which Independent States may of right do.— And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes and our sacred Honor.

Constitution of the United States¹

Preamble

We the People of the United States, in order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defence, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

Article I.

Section 1. All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

No Person shall be a Representative who shall not have attained the Age of twenty-five Years, and been seven Years a Citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an Inhabitant of that State in which he shall be chosen.2

Representatives and direct Taxes shall be apportioned among the several States which may be included within this Union, according to their respective Numbers, which shall be determined by adding to the whole number of free Persons, including those bound to Service for a Term of Years, and excluding Indians not taxed, three-fifths of all other Persons. [counting the whole number of persons in each State, excluding Indians not taxed.]⁸ The actual Enumeration shall be made within three Years after the first Meeting of the Congress of the United States, and within every subsequent Term of ten Years, in such Manner as they shall by Law direct. The Number of Representatives shall not exceed one for every thirty Thousand, but each State shall have at Least one Representative; and until such enumeration shall be made, the state of New Hampshire shall be entitled to chuse three, Massachusetts eight, Rhode Island and Providence Plantations one, Connecticut five, New York six, New Jersey four, Pennsylvania eight, Delaware one, Maryland six, Virginia ten, North Carolina five, South Carolina five, and Georgia three,

When vacancies happen in the Representation from any State, the Executive Authority thereof shall issue Writs of Election to fill such Vacancies.

The House of Representatives shall chuse their Speaker and other Officers; and shall have the sole Power of Impeachment.

Section 3. The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature thereof, for six Years; and each Senator shall have one Vote.4

each State, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each Senator shall have one vote. The electors in each State shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the State Legislatures.]

Immediately after they shall be assembled in Consequence of the first Election, they shall be divided as equally as may be into three Classes. The Seats of the Senators of the first Class shall be vacated at the Expiration of the second Year, of the second Class at the Expiration of the fourth Year, and of the third Class at the Expiration of the sixth Year, so that one third may be chosen every second Year; and if Vacanoies happen by Resignation, or otherwise, during the Recess of the Legislature of any State, the Executive thereof may make temporary Appointments until the next Meeting of the Legislature, which shall then fill such Vacancies.⁵

[When vacancies happen in the representation of any State in the Senate, the executive authority of such State shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies: Provided, That the legislature of any State may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointments until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.]

No Person shall be a Senator who shall not have attained to the Age of thirty Years, and been nine Years a Citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an Inhabitant of that State for which he shall be chosen.6

The Vice President of the United States shall be President of the Senate, but shall have no Vote, unless they be equally divided.

The Senate shall chuse their other officers, and also a President pro tempore, in the Absence of the Vice President, or when he shall exercise the Office of President of the United States.

The Senate shall have the sole Power to try all Impeachments. When sitting for that Purpose, they shall be on Oath or Affirmation. When the President of the United States is tried the Chief Justice shall preside: And no Person shall

be convicted without the Concurrence of two-thirds of the Members present. Judgment in Cases of Impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from Office, and disqualification to hold and enjoy any Office of honor, Trust or Profit under the United States: but the Party convicted shall nevertheless be liable and subject to Indictment, Trial, Judgment and Punishment, according to Law.

Section 4. The Times, Places and Manner of holding Elections for Senators and Representatives, shall be prescribed in each State by the Legislature thereof; but the Congress may at any time by Law make or alter such Regulations, except as to the Places of chusing Senators.

The Congress shall assemble at least once in every Year, and such Meeting shall be on the first Monday in December, unless they shall by law appoint a different Day.

[The Congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall begin at noon on the 3rd day of January, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.]

Section 5. Each House shall be the Judge of the Elections, Returns and Qualifications of its own Members, and a Majority of each shall constitute a Quorum to do Business; but a smaller Number may adjourn from day to day. and may be authorized to compel the Attendance of absent members, in such Manner, and under such Penalties as each House may provide.

Each house may determine the Rules of its Proceedings, punish its Members for disorderly Behavior, and, with the Concurrence of two thirds, expel a Member.

Each House shall keep a Journal of its Proceedings, and from time to time publish the same, excepting such Parts as may in their Judgment require Secrecy; and the Yeas and Nays of the Members of either House on any question shall, at the Desire of one-fifth of those Present, be entered on the Journal.

Neither House, during the Session of Congress, shall, without the Consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other Place than that in which the two Houses shall be sitting.

Section 6. The Senators and Representatives shall receive a Compensation for their Services, to be ascertained by Law, and paid out of the Treasury of the United States. They shall in all Cases, except Treason, Felony and Breach of the Peace, be privileged from Arrest during their Attendance at the Session of

their respective Houses, and in going to and returning from the same; and for any Speech or Debate in either House, they shall not be questioned in any other place.

No Senator or Representative shall, during the Time for which he was elected, be appointed to any Civil office under the Authority of the United States, which shall have been created, or the Emoluments whereof shall have been encreased during such time; and no Person holding any Office under the United States, shall be a Member of either House during his Continuance in Office.

Section 7. All Bills for raising Revenue shall originate in the House of Representatives; but the Senate may propose or concur with Amendments as on other Bills.

Every Bill which shall have passed the House of Representatives and the Senate, shall, before it become a Law, be presented to the President of the United States; if he approve he shall sign it, but if not he shall return it, with his Objections to that House in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the Objections at large on their Journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If after such Reconsideration two-thirds of that House shall agree to pass the Bill, it shall be sent, together with the Objections, to the other House, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered, and if approved by two-thirds of that House, it shall become a Law. But in all such Cases the Votes of both Houses shall be determined by Yeas and Nays, and the Names of the Persons voting for and against the Bill shall be entered on the Journal of each House respectively. If any Bill shall not be returned by the President within ten Days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the Same shall be a law, in like Manner as if he had signed it, unless the Congress by their Adjournment prevent its Return, in which Case it shall not be a Law.

Every Order, Resolution, or Vote to which the Concurrence of the Senate and House of Representatives may be necessary (except on a question of Adjournment) shall be presented to the President of the United States; and before the Same shall take Effect, shall be approved by him, or being disapproved by him, shall be repassed by two-thirds of the Senate and House of Representatives, according to the Rules and Limitations prescribed in the Case of a Bill.

Section 8. The Congress shall have power to lay and collect Taxes, Duties. Imposts and Excises, to pay the Debts and provide for the common defense and general Welfare of the United States; but all Duties, Imposts and Excises shall be uniform throughout the United States;

To borrow Money on the credit of the United States;

To regulate Commerce with foreign Nations, and among the several States, and with the Indian Tribes;

To establish an uniform Rule of Naturalization, and uniform Laws on the subject of Bankruptcies throughout the United States;

To coin Money, regulate the Value thereof, and of foreign Coin, and fix the Standard of Weights and Measures;

To provide for the Punishment of counterfeiting the Securities and current Coin of the United States;

To establish Post Offices and post Roads;

To promote the Progress of Science and useful Arts, by securing for limited Times to Authors and Inventors the exclusive Right to their respective Writings and Discoveries;

To Constitute Tribunals inferior to the Supreme Court;

To define and punish Piracies and Felonies committed on the high Seas, and Offences against the Law of Nations;

To declare War, grant Letters of Marque and Reprisal, and make Rules concerning Captures on Land and Water;

To raise and support Armies, but no Appropriation of Money to that Use shall be for a longer Term than two Years;

To provide and maintain a Navy;

To make Rules for the Government and Regulation of the land and naval Forces;

To provide for calling forth the Militia to execute the Laws of the Union, suppress Insurrections and repel Invasions;

To provide for organizing, arming, and disciplining the Militia, and for governing such Part of them as may be employed in the Service of the United States, reserving to the States respectively, the Appointment of the Officers, and the Authority of training the Militia according to the discipline prescribed by Congress; To exercise exclusive Legislation in all Cases whatsoever, over such District (not exceeding ten Miles square) as may, by Cession of particular States, and the Acceptance of Congress, become the Seat of Government of the United States, and to exercise like Authority over all Places purchased by the Consent of the Legislature of the State in which the Same shall be, for the Erection of Forts, Magazines, Arsenals, Dock-Yards, and other needful Buildings;—And

To make all Laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into Execution the foregoing Powers, and all other Powers vested by this Constitution in the Government of the United States, or in any Department or Officer thereof.

Section 9. The Migration or Importation of such Persons as any of the States now existing shall think proper to admit, shall not be prohibited by the Congress prior to the Year one thousand eight hundred and eight, but a Tax or duty may be imposed on such Importation, not exceeding ten dollars for each Person.

The Privilege of the Writ of Habeas Corpus shall not be suspended, unless when in Cases of Rebellion or Invasion the public Safety may require it.

No Bill of Attainder or ex post facto Law shall be passed.

No Capitation, or other direct Tax shall be laid, unless in Proportion to the Census or Enumeration hereinbefore directed to be taken.

[The Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several States, and without regard to any census or enumeration.]⁸

No Tax or Duty shall be laid on Articles exported from any State.

No Preference shall be given by any Regulation of Commerce or Revenue to the Ports of one State over those of another; nor shall Vessels bound to, or from, one State, be obliged to enter, clear, or pay Duties in another.

No money shall be drawn from the Treasury, but in Consequence of Appropriations made by Law; and a regular Statement and Account of the Receipts and Expenditures of all public Money shall be published from time to time.

and Expenditures of all public Money shall be published from time to time. No Title of Nobility shall be granted by the United States; And no Person holding any Office of Profit or Trust under them, shall, without the Consent of the Congress, accept of any present, Emolument, Office, or Title, of any kind Whatever, from any King, Prince or foreign State.

Section 10. No State shall enter into any Treaty, Alliance, or Confederation; grant Letters of Marque and Reprisal; coln Money; emit Bills of Credit; make any Thing but gold and silver Coin a Tender in Payment of Debts; pass any Bills of Attainder, ex post facto Law, or Law impairing the Obligation of Contracts, or grant any Title of Nobility.

No State shall, without the Consent of the Congress, lay any Imposts or Duties on Imports or Exports, except what may be absolutely necessary for executing its Inspection Laws; and the net Produce of all Duties and Imposts, laid by any State on Imports or Exports, shall be for the Use of the Treasury of the United States; and all such Laws shall be subject to the Revision and Control of the Congress.

No State shall, without the Consent of Congress, lay any Duty of Tonnage, keep Troops, or Ships of War in time of Peace, enter into any Agreement or Compact with another State, or with a foreign Power, or engage in War, unless actually invaded, or in such imminent Danger as will not admit of delay.

[All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the Jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside. No state shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.]⁹

Article II.

Section 1. The executive Power shall be vested in a President of the United States of America. He shall hold his Office during the Term of four Years, and, together with the Vice President, chosen for the same Term, be elected as follows: Each State shall appoint, in such manner as the Legislature thereof may direct, a Number of Electors, equal to the whole Number of Senators and Representatives to which the State may be entitled in the Congress; but no Senator or Representative, or Person holding an office of Trust or Profit under the United States, shall be appointed an Elector.

The Electors shall meet in their respective States, and vote by Ballot for two Persons, of whom one at least shall not be an Inhabitant of the same State with themselves. And they shall make a List of all the Persons voted for, and of the Number of Votes for each; which List they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the Seat of Government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate. The President of the Senate shall, in the Presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the Certificates, and the Votes shall then be counted. The Person having the greatest Number of Votes shall be the President, if such Number be a Majority of the whole Number of Electors appointed; and if there be more than one who have such Majority, and have an equal Number of Votes, then the House of Representatives shall immediately chuse by Ballot one of them for President; and if no Person have a Majority, then from the five highest on the List the said House shall in like Manner chuse the President. But in chusing the President, the Votes shall be taken by States. the Representation from each State having one Vote; a quorum for this Purpose shall consist of a Member or Members from two-thirds of the States, and a Majority of all the States shall be necessary to a Choice. In every Case, after the Choice of the president, the Person having the greatest Number of Votes of the Electors shall be the Vice President. But if there should remain two or more who have equal Votes, the Senate shall chuse from them by Ballot the Vice President.10

The Electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for President and Vice-President, one of whom at least shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as President, and in distinct ballots the person voted for as Vice-President, and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as President, and of all persons voted for as Vice President, and of the number of votes for each, which lists they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate; The President of the Senate shall, in the presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the certificates and the votes shall then be counted ;---The person having the greatest number of votes for President, shall be the President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest number not exceeding three on the list of those voted for as President, the House of Representatives shall choose, immediately, by ballot, the President. But in choosing the President, the votes shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. And if the House of Representatives shall not choose a President whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the Vice-President shall act as President, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the President.11 The person having the greatest number of votes as Vice-president, shall be the Vice-President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed, and if no person have a majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list, the Senate shall choose the Vice President; a quorum for the purpose shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of Senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice. But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of President shall be eligible to that of Vice President of the United States.]12

The Congress may determine the Time of chusing the Electors, and the Day on which they shall give their Votes; which Day shall be the same throughout the United States.

[The terms of the President and Vice President shall end at noon on the 20th day of January, and terms of Senators and Representatives at noon on the 3d day of January, of the years in which such terms would have ended if this article had not been ratified; and the terms of their successors shall then begin.

[If, at the time fixed for the beginning of the term of the President, the President elect shall have died, the Vice President elect shall become 'President. If a President shall not have been chosen before the time fixed for the beginning of his term, or if the President elect shall have failed to qualify, the Vice President elect shall act as President until a President shall have qualified:

and the Congress may by law provide for the case wherein neither a President elect nor a Vice President elect shall have qualified, declaring who shall then act as President, or the manner in which one who is to act shall be selected, and such person shall act accordingly until a President or Vice President shall have qualified.

[The Congress may by law provide for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the House of Representatives may choose a President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them, and for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the Senate may choose a Vice President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them.]¹³

No Person except a natural born Citizen, or a Citizen of the United States, at the time of the adoption of this Constitution, shall be eligible to the Office of President; neither shall any Person be eligible to that Office who shall not have attained to the Age of thirty-five Years, and been fourteen Years a Resident within the United States.¹⁴

In Case of the Removal of the President from Office, or of his Death, Resignation, or Inability to discharge the Powers and Duties of the said office, the Same shall devolve on the Vice President, and the Congress may by Law provide for the Case of Removal, Death, Resignation, or Inability, both of the President and Vice President, declaring what Officer shall then act as President, and such Officer shall act accordingly, until the Disability be removed, or a President shall be elected.

The President shall, at stated Times, receive for his Services, a Compensation, which shall neither be encreased or diminished during the Period for which he shall have been elected, and he shall not receive within that Period any other Emolument from the United States, or any of them.

Before he enter on the Execution of his Office, he shall taken the following Oath or Affirmation:—"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the Office of President of the United States, and will to the best of my Ability, preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States."

Section 2. The President shall be Commander in Chief of the Army and Navy of the United States, and of the Militia of the several States, when called into the actual Service of the United States; he may require the Opinion, in writing, of the principal Officer in each of the executive Departments, upon any Subject relating to the Duties of their respective Offices, and he shall have Power to grant Reprieves and Pardons for Offenses against the United States, except in Cases of Impeachment.

He shall have Power, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, to make Treaties, provided two-thirds of the Senators present concur; and he shall nominate, and by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, shall appoint Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls, Judges of the Supreme Court, and all other Officers of the United States, whose Appointments are not herein otherwise provided for, and which shall be established by Law; but the Congress may by Law vest the Appointment of such inferior Officers, as they think proper, in the President alone, in the Courts of Law, or in the Heads of Departments.

The President shall have Power to fill up all Vacancies that may happen during the Recess of the Senate, by granting Commissions which shall expire at the End of their next Session.

Section 3. He shall from time to time give to the Congress Information of the State of the Union, and recommend to their Consideration such Measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient; he may, on extraordinary Occasions, convene both Houses, or either of them, and in Case of Disagreement between them, with Respect to the Time of Adjournment, he may adjourn them to such Time as he shall think proper; he shall receive Ambassadors and other public Ministers; he shall take Care that the Laws be faithfully executed, and shall Commission all the Officers of the United States.

Section 4. The President, Vice President and all civil Officers of the United States, shall be removed from Office on Impeachment for, and Conviction of, Treason, Bribery, or other high Crimes and Misdemeanors.

Article III.

Section 1. The judicial Power of the United States, shall be vested in one supreme Court, and in such inferior Courts as the Congress may from time to time ordain and establish. The Judges, both of the supreme and inferior Courts, shall hold their Offices during good Behaviour, and shall, at stated Times, receive for their Services, a Compensation, which shall not be diminished during their Continuance in Office.

Section 2. The judicial Power shall extend to all Cases, in Law and Equity, arising under this Constitution, the Laws of the United States, and Treaties made, or which shall be made, under their Authority;—to all Cases affecting Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls;—to all Cases of admiralty and maritime Jurisdiction;—to Controversies to which the United States shall be a Party;—to Controversies between two or more States;—between a State and Citizens of another State;—between Citizens of different States; —between Citizens of the same State claiming Lands under Grants of different States, and between a State, or the Citizens thereof, and foreign States, Citizens or Subjects.

[The Judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by Citizens of another State, or by Citizens or Subjects of any foreign State.]¹⁵

In all Cases affecting Ambassadors, other public Ministers and Consuls, and those in which a State shall be a party, the supreme Court shall have original Jurisdiction. In all the other Cases before mentioned, the supreme Court shall have appellate Jurisdiction, both as to Law and Fact, with such Exceptions, and under such Regulations as the Congress shall make.

The Trial of all Crimes, except in Cases of Impeachment, shall be by Jury; and such Trial shall be held in the State where the said Crimes shall have been committed; but when not committed within any State, the Trial shall be at such Place or Places as the Congress may by Law have directed. Section 3. Treason against the United States shall consist only in Levying

Section 3. Treason against the United States shall consist only in Levying War against them, or in adhering to their Enemies, giving them Aid and Comfort. No person shall be convicted of Treason unless on the Testimony of two Witnesses to the same overt Act, or on Confession in open Court.

The Congress shall have Power to declare the Punishment of Treason, but no Attainder of Treason shall work Corruption of Blood, or Forfeiture except during the Life of the Person attainted.

Article IV.

Section 1. Full Faith and Credit shall be given in each State to the public Acts, Records, and judicial Proceedings of every other State. And the Congress may by general Laws prescribe the Manner in which such Acts, Records and **Proceedings shall** be proved, and the Effect thereof.

Section 2. The Citizens of each State shall be entitled to all Privileges and Immunities of Citizens in the several States.

A Person charged in any State with Treason, Felony, or other Crime, who shall flee from Justice, and be found in another State, shall on Demand of the executive Authority of the State from which he fled, be delivered up to be removed to the State having Jurisdiction of the Crime.

No person held to Service or Labour in one State, under the Laws thereof, escaping into another, shall, in Consequence of any Law or Regulation therein, be discharged from such Service or Labour, but shall be delivered up on Claim of the Party to whom such Service or Labour may be due.¹⁶

Section 3. New States may be admitted by the Congress into this Union; but no new State shall be formed or erected within the Jurisdiction of any other State; nor any State be formed by the Junction of two or more States, or Parts of States, without the Consent of the Legislatures of the States concerned as well as of the Congress.

The Congress shall have Power to dispose of and make all needful Rules and Regulations respecting the Territory or other Property belonging to the United States; and nothing in this Constitution shall be so construed as to Prejudice any Claims of the United States, or of any particular State.

Section 4. The United States shall guarantee to every State in this Union a Republican Form of Government, and shall protect each of them against Invasion; and on Application of the Legislature, or of the Executive (when the Legislature cannot be convened) against domestic Violence.

Article V.

The Congress, whenever two-thirds of both Houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose Amendments to the Constitution, or, on the Application of the Legislatures of two-thirds of the several States, shall call a Convention for proposing Amendments, which, in either Case, shall be valid to all Intents and Purposes, as Part of this Constitution, when ratified by the Legislatures of three-fourths of the several States, or by Conventions in three-fourths thereof, as the one or the other mode of Ratification may be proposed by the Congress; Provided that no Amendment which may be made prior to the Year One thousand eight hundred and eight shall in any Manner affect the first and fourth Clauses in the Ninth Section of the first Article; and that no State without its Consent, shall be deprived of its equal Suffrage in the Senate.

Article VI.

All Debts contracted and Engagements entered into, before the Adoption of this Constitution, shall be as valid against the United States under this Constitution, as under the Confederation.

[The validity of the public debt of the United States, authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any State shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim for the loss or emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void.]17

This Constitution, and the Laws of the United States which shall be made in Pursuance thereof; and all Treaties made, or which shall be made, under the Authority of the United States, shall be the supreme Law of the Land; and the Judges in every State shall be bound thereby, any Thing in the Constitution or Laws of any State to the Contrary notwithstanding.

The Senators and Representatives before mentioned, and the Members of the several State Legislatures, and executive and judicial Officers, both of the United States and of the several States, shall be bound by Oath or Affirmation, to support this Constitution; but no religious Test shall ever be required as a Qualification to any Office or public Trust under the United States.

Article VII.

The Ratification of the Conventions of nine States, shall be sufficient for the Establishment of this Constitution between the States so ratifying the Same.

Amendments to the Constitution of the United States¹⁸

Article I.

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.

Article II.

A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed.

Article III.

No Soldier shall, in time of peace be quartered in any house, without the consent of the Owner, nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

Article IV.

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no Warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by Oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

Article V.

No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a Grand Jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the Militia, when in actual service in time of war or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offense to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law: nor shall private property be taken for public use, without just compensation.

Article VI.

In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the State and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the Assistance of Counsel for his defense.

Article VII.

In suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury, shall be otherwise re-examined in any Court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

Article VIII.

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.

Article IX.

The enumeration in the Constitution of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

Article X.

The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people.

Article XI.

The Judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity, commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by Citizens of another State, or by Citizens or Subjects of any Foreign State,19

Article XII.

The Electors shall meet in their respective states, and vote by ballot for President and Vice-President, one of whom, at least, shall not be an inhabitant of the same state with themselves; they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as President, and in distinct ballots the person voted for as Vice-President, and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as President, and of all persons voted for as Vice-President, and of the number of votes for each, which lists they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the President of the Senate; -The President of the Senate shall, in the presence of the Senate and House of Representatives, open all the certificates and the votes shall then be counted; -The person having the greatest number of votes for President, shall be the President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then from the persons having the highest numbers not exceeding three on the list of those voted for as President, the House of Representatives shall choose, immediately, by ballot, the President. But in choosing the President, the votes shall be taken by states, the representation from each state having one vote; a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the states, and a majority of all the states shall be necessary to a choice. And if the House of Representatives shall not choose a President whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the Vice-President shall act as President, as in the case of the death or other constitutional disability of the President. The person having the greatest number of votes as Vice-President, shall be the Vice-President, if such number be a majority of the whole number of Electors appointed, and if no person have a majority, then from the two highest numbers on the list, the Senate shall choose the Vice-President; a quorum for the purpose shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of Senators, and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice. But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of President shall be eligible to that of Vice-President of the United States.20

Article XIII.

Section 1. Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.

Section 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.21

Article XIV.

Section 1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside. No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

Section 2. Representatives shall be apportioned among the several States according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each State, excluding Indians not taxed. But when the right to vote at any election for the choice of electors for President and Vice-President of the United States, Representatives in Congress, the Executive and Judicial officers

of a State, or the members of the Legislature thereof, is denied to any of the male inhabitants of such State, being twenty-one years of age, and citizens of the United States. or in any way abridged, except for participation in rebellion, or other crime, the basis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of such male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens twenty-one years of age in such State.

Section 3. No person shall be a Senator or Representative in Congress, or elector of President and Vice-President, or hold any office, civil or military, under the United States, or under any State, who, having previously taken an oath, as a member of Congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as a member of any State legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any State, to support the Constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid or comfort to the enemies thereof. But Congress may by a vote of two-thirds of each House remove such disability.

Section 4. The validity of the public debt of the United States, authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection or rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any State shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim for the loss or emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations and claims shall be held illegal and void.

Section 5. The Congress shall have power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.22

Article XV.

Section 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

Section 2. The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.23

Article XVI.

The Congress shall have power to lay and collect taxes on incomes, from whatever source derived, without apportionment among the several States, and without regard to any census or enumeration.24

Article XVII.

The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, elected by the people thereof, for six years; and each Senator shall have one vote. The electors in each State shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the State legislatures.

When vacancies happen in the representation of any State in the Senate. the executive authority of such State shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies: Provided, That the legislature of any State may empower the executive thereof to make temporary appointments until the people fill the vacancies by election as the legislature may direct.

This amendment shall not be so construed as to affect the election or term of any Senator chosen before it becomes valid as part of the Constitution.26

Article XVIII.

Section 1. After one year from the ratification of this article the manufacture, sale, or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into, or the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes is hereby prohibited.

Section 4 was an addition to Article VI. ²³Amendment XV was proposed by Congress on February 27, 1869, and the Secretary of State proclaimed its ratification on March 30, 1870. ²⁴Amendment XVI, in effect an exception to the fourth paragraph of Section 9 of Article I, was proposed by Congress on July 12, 1909, and proclaimed duly ratified on February 25, 1913. ²⁵Amendment XVII was proposed by Congress on May 16, 1912, and proclaimed duly ratified on May 31, 1913. It is a substitute for the first two paragraphs in Section 3 of Article I. Article I.

Section 2. The Congress and the several States shall have concurrent power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

Section 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of the several States, as provided in the Constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the States by the Congress.26

Article XIX.

The right of the citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of sex.

Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.27

Article XX.

Section 1. The terms of the President and Vice-President shall end at noon on the 20th day of January, and the terms of Senators and Representatives at noon on the 3rd day of January, of the years in which such terms would have ended if this article had not been ratified; and the terms of their successors shall then begin.

section 2. The Congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall begin at noon on the 3rd day of January, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.

Section 3. If, at the time fixed for the beginning of the term of the President, the President elect shall have died, the Vice President elect shall become President. If a President shall not have been chosen before the time fixed for the beginning of his term, or if the President elect shall have failed to qualify, then the Vice President elect shall act as President until a President shall have qualified; and the Congress may by law provide for the case wherein neither a President elect nor a Vice President elect shall have qualified, declaring who shall then act as President, or the manner in which one who is to act shall be selected, and such person shall act accordingly until a President or Vice President shall have qualified.

section 4. The Congress may by law provide for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the House of Representatives may choose a President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them, and for the case of the death of any of the persons from whom the Senate may choose a Vice President whenever the right of choice shall have devolved upon them.

Section 5. Sections 1 and 2 shall take effect on the 15th day of October following the ratification of this article.

Section 6. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States within seven years from the date of its submission.²⁸

Article XXI.

section 1. The eighteenth article of amendment to the Constitution of the United States is hereby repealed.

Section 2. The transportation or importation into any State, Territory, or Possession of the United States for delivery or use therein of intoxicating liquors, in violation of the laws thereof, is hereby prohibited.

Section 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by convention in the several States, as provided in the Constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the States by the Congress.²⁹

Article XXII

Section 1. No person shall be elected to the office of the President more than twice, and no person who has held the office of President, or acted as President, for more than two years of a term to which some other person was elected President shall be elected to the office of the President more than once. But this Article shall not apply to any person holding the office of President when this Article was proposed by the Congress, and shall not prevent any person who may be holding the office of President, or acting as President during the term within which this Article becomes operative from holding the office of President or acting as President during the remainder of such term.

Section 2. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States within seven years from the date of its submission to the States by the Congress.³⁰
