



Lt. Gov. Adam Gregg and DCA unveil plaque at George Stout's boyhood home



Lt. Gov. Adam Gregg joined the Iowa Department of Cultural Affairs in **Winterset** on Friday to unveil a historical plaque marking the boyhood home of George Stout and to declare **October as Arts & Humanities Month in Iowa!**

Stout, who was **born 125 years ago** on Oct. 5, was a world-class expert in art preservation and

The Smithsonian and the U.S. Army created the Cultural Rescue Initiative, a modern-day "Monuments Men" program that trains the U.S. Army Civil Affairs Corps to help protect cultural heritage and stop the destruction or trafficking of artifacts.

Oct. 6: Visit the Abbie Gardner Sharp Cabin






Get the latest issue of The Annals of Iowa




"*Flora of Island Grove and Adjacent Prairies*," by B.O. Wolden.
