HALL OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES,
DES MOINES, IOWA, JANUARY 9, 1961.

Pursuant to law, the House of Representatives of the Fifty-ninth General Assembly of Iowa convened at 10:00 a.m., Monday, January 9, 1961.

The House was called to order by the Honorable William S. Lynes from Bremer County.

Prayer was offered by Doctor John E. Eichorn, pastor of the First Congregational Church, Forest City, Iowa.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE

Leave of absence was granted as follows:

Millen of Van Buren and Carnahan of Wapello on request of Naden of Hamilton.

TEMPORARY OFFICERS

On motion of Dietz of Scott, William R. Kendrick of Polk County was elected Acting Chief Clerk. Mr. Kendrick presented himself and took and subscribed to the following oath:

"I do solemnly swear that I will support the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the State of Iowa and that I will faithfully discharge the duties of my office to the best of my ability, so help me God."

Walter of Hardin moved that the Honorable A. C. Hanson of Lyon County be elected Temporary Speaker.

Motion prevailed.

Den Herder of Sioux moved that a committee of two be appointed to escort the Temporary Speaker to the chair.

Motion prevailed and the following committee was appointed; Den Herder of Sioux and Stokes of Plymouth.

Mr. Hanson was escorted to the chair, and the oath of office was administered by Acting Chief Clerk Kendrick.

ELECTION OF SPEAKER

Cunningham of Story presented the name of the Honorable Henry C. Nelson of Winnebago County as candidate for Speaker of the

House of Representatives of the Fifty-ninth General Assembly, preceding such nomination with the following remarks:

Nelson of Winnebago, having received all of the votes cast for the office of Speaker of the House of Representatives of the Fifty-ninth General Assembly, was declared duly elected to that office.

PRESENTATION OF SPEAKER

A. C. Hanson presented Speaker-elect Nelson with the gavel and congratulated him on his unanimous election. Speaker Nelson thanked the House for the honor bestowed upon him and offered the following remarks:

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN OF THE FIFTY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY:

May I here and now say "thank you" and say it in simple terms to express my sincere appreciation for the honor you have conferred upon me. In accepting this honor the challenging and burdensome responsibility that is mine also to assume is of itself most humbling.

In fulfilling the duties of this office I pledge, with God's help, my very best and honest effort to preside with equal fairness to all and preside with dispatch, ever considerate and mindful of individual dignity and at once hopeful that a measure of your respect and confidence may be gained.

You are assured there will be no attempt on my part to dictate, and no shirking of leadership responsibility as your presiding officer.

The pattern of work for this session is before us. The people of Iowa rejected the plan for a constitutional convention that was aimed at reapportioning this Assembly. It is our responsibility, therefore, to effectively reapportion the Assembly during this session and am confident of your determination and ability to do so. This is not to say reapportionment is first for there are numerous other and equally weighty tasks before us. The distribution of road use tax funds is certain to present a most difficult problem, and the road study group's deliberations seem to assure no less.

A special committee is being created under the title of "institutions of higher learning" for the express purpose of dealing with recommendations contained in the Gibson study.

A tremendous problem is before us in the matter of increasing state aid for public schools and agricultural land tax credits appropriations and make these increases in such manner as to effectively reduce property taxes.

These are but a few of the major headaches before you. It is my feeling this Assembly means to approve an effective operating and capital improvement budget that calls for no tax increases.

We want to welcome especially the many new members of the House. The acquaintances and friends you'll develop here are certain to be enjoyable and long lasting. The work will surely be found interesting as well as educational.

In closing, let us here today resolve that we shall "bend to" in our effort with a seriousness and dignity of purpose commensurate with the task that lies before us these next several weeks. With divine guidance and full effort and cooperation among us all, we shall see this session of the Fifty-ninth General Assembly through to a successful conclusion.

President McManus announced a quorum present and the joint convention duly organized.

Senator Lynes moved that a committee of six, consisting of three members from the Senate and three members from the House, be appointed to notify Governor Loveless that the joint convention was ready to receive him.

Motion prevailed and the President appointed as such committee Senators O'Malley of Polk, Gilmour of Poweshiek and Walter of Taylor on the part of the Senate, and Representatives Swisher of Johnson, Falvey of Monroe and Eveland of Boone on the part of the House.

The committee waited upon Governor Loveless and escorted him to the Speaker's station.

President McManus then presented Governor Loveless who delivered the following address:

ADDRESS TO THE FIFTY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY

By Honorable Herschel C. Loveless, Governor of Iowa
Joint Session, January 10, 1961

MR. PRESIDENT, MR. SPEAKER, SENATORS AND REPRESENTATIVES OF THE FIFTY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:

It is the responsibility of the Chief Executive of this state to present to you, the elected representatives of the citizens of our state, and to all the people of Iowa, a report on the conduct of State Government during the biennium now drawing to a close. In my case, since I am retiring from office after two terms, this will be a brief summation of the record of this administration over a four-year period.

As is customary, I will also make reference to what I consider to be important objectives yet unattained as well as to those that have been accomplished. I hope these views may be considered more objective than partisan.

As I look out over familiar faces in this chamber on both sides of the aisle, and note the substantial dimension of the political majority, I can only say, as Custer is reported to have said of the Indians at his last stand: "My, aren't there a lot of them!"

To all of you, I say Godspeed in your important work, and may you find the strength and wisdom to carry out the will of the people in the critical years ahead.

At this point, with the opening of the new session of the legislature, I also want to pay tribute to the accomplishments of the Fifty-eighth General Assembly. Across the board, it seems to me that this session of our state legislature was one of the most constructive within my memory . . . and I think proper acknowledgment should be made.

It seems to me that the effectiveness of government, in any of its three branches, should be based on its handling of the totality of the responsibilities it bears. It is not enough that an administration should have attended to one or a few of its areas of responsibilities if it has ignored the rest. The scope of government covers the range of human life itself, and the achievements of government should be based on the total picture.

The mission of government, as I see it, is two-fold. On the one hand, we have the administration of the governmental machinery and the stewardship of public funds. In this function, government is something like a business organization, only on a massive scale.

The other main mission of government is the dispensing of the services of government—the meeting of vital human needs. In this category, come the vast programs of education, welfare, health, public safety and rehabilitation.

It has long been held that these two basic objectives of government are at odds—that government cannot hope to be efficient and fiscally sound, and at the same time, humane and attentive to human welfare.

In the long-range view, I am personally convinced that these two basic objectives are not in conflict, but in harmony, in the world today. In other words, I feel that well-conceived, long-range programs to help human beings help themselves have economic as well as moral justification.

It is the job of government to conserve and protect our economic resources. It is also the job of government to conserve and protect our human resources.

The past four years, I believe, have been marked by a strict adherence to sound fiscal policy and appreciable progress in improving the efficiency and economy of government operation on all fronts.

The most conspicuous gains, however, I believe have been in the improvement of the services of government in meeting vital human needs.

Here again, I would pay tribute to the achievements of the Fifty-eighth General Assembly which set a high mark in the enactment of constructive programs in the vast area of public welfare.

It is my sincere hope that these programs, well begun in the past four years, will be continued and expanded in the years to come.

Over a period of time, we have properly concerned ourselves with the conservation of our soil—our basic natural resource. Only recently have we begun to fully awaken to our enormous responsibilities in conserving and strengthening our human resources.

FISCAL POSITION

According to the most recent estimate of the State Comptroller, there will be an unencumbered balance in the State Treasury on June 30, 1961, of \$44,380,805.21.

During the three full fiscal years of this administration, the Tax Commission has collected \$404,738,522. The collections in this fiscal year are estimated to \$146,793,500, which will give a four year total of \$551,532,022.

During the past three years, some significant improvements in the administration of taxes have been put into effect. For example, the Tax Commission has collated the IT 5-A form (comparable to the Federal W-2) to personal income tax returns. For the 1957 tax year, it was discovered that some 50,000 individuals in the state who should have been paying taxes were not doing so. Collections for this tax year averaged \$20 a return—totaling an addition of one million dollars to the State General Fund, and there is every indication that the additional revenue will be as great for the other tax years now in the process of collection.

During the first year of this administration, as a result of executive veto, the sales and use tax and the income tax rates were returned to the rates in effect before the temporary increase of 1955. It is interesting to note that the dollar collections of the income tax have substantially exceeded collections under the higher tax rate. While this is partly due to economic growth, it may be readily seen that a share of the increase is the result of increased efficiency of administration.

Another large source of additional revenue has been from the investment of idle state funds in securities drawing interest for the state. Previously, these funds had been deposited in private lending institutions without drawing interest. This change in policy accounts for several millions of the present favorable balance in the State Treasury.

I would respectfully conclude these brief comments on the financial position of the state with a word of caution.

I have heard it suggested that the traditional idea of keeping a fairly substantial working balance in the general fund is not necessary. I would only remind you that the state government is a vast establishment, that flexibility and security of operation is desirable and that unforeseen contingencies do sometimes arise. I would earnestly recommend that a sound working balance be maintained. Dissipation of cash reserve for recurring appropriations would be a mark of fiscal irresponsibility.

GENERAL ECONOMIC CONDITIONS

Despite the impact of two recessions upon the nation in the past four years and despite the decline of farm income over that period, economic conditions in Iowa have been extremely favorable by comparison with other states. This attests to the remarkable stability of Iowa's economy—a sta-

bility resulting largely from an increasingly favorable balance between agricultural and industrial production.

Since the middle of the past year, Iowa has felt, along with the nation as a whole, some of the pressures of the current recession. Yet, according to the December 24 issue of *Business Week*, total personal income in Iowa showed a 6.1 percent increase over 1959 as compared to a 6.5 average increase for the nation. In the year ahead, *Business Week* predicts that Iowa's personal income growth will exceed the national average. The forecast is that Iowa's total personal income will increase 5.1 percent as compared to 3.9 percent for the nation. The rise in per capita income for Iowa is predicted to reach 4 percent as compared to 2.3 percent for the nation.

Although Iowa is weathering the current recession more satisfactorily than many of her sister states, there is no room for complacency. I am particularly concerned by the rising unemployment in our state—a situation which reflects the generally high level of joblessness in the nation. According to the Employment Security Commission, 3.8 percent of our total labor force was unemployed in December—a figure which is one and one-half percent higher than the normal percentage for that month.

Looking back over the past four years as a whole, it may be seen that Iowa has made giant strides toward its goal of diversifying its economy and stabilizing the sources of its revenue. In that period, the able work of the Iowa Development Commission and the efforts of 231 communities with organized development groups—whose initiative I cannot praise too highly—have resulted in the addition of 154 manufacturing plants in the state. In addition to this, there have been 148 expansions of existing industries.

This industrial growth, occurring at the same time the number of our farms is declining and the need for farm labor is sharply decreasing, has provided us with nearly 13,000 new job opportunities in industry alone, to say nothing of the number of job openings created simultaneously in the trades and services. Approximately \$400 million has been spent on new plants and equipment; payrolls have increased by nearly \$52 million; tax revenues have climbed correspondingly. It is a record that Iowa's progressive communities and the state's industrial promotional agency may view with justifiable pride.

There are many sets of statistics available that attest to Iowa's progress in economic development. I promised myself, however, that I would not overburden you with statistics in this message. You know what a statistician is, don't you? A fellow who knows more about money than those who have it.

I would point out, however, that Iowa's rate of industrial growth is increasing faster than that of the nation as a whole.

During the four-year period covered by the latest United States Census of Manufacturers, industrial payrolls rose 25.5 percent in Iowa as against 17.9 percent for the nation.

Value added by manufacturing in Iowa was up 35.7 percent while the national increase was only 21 percent.

The number of manufacturing employees in Iowa went up nearly two percent while the nation's dropped nearly seven percent.

Iowa increased the number of its manufacturing plants eight percent as against a rise of approximately four percent nationwide.

A reasonable conclusion from these facts and figures is that Iowa has made a very respectable record of industrial development in recent years. The fact that this growth has been steady rather than spectacular would seem to me to be all to the good. Our industrial growth has complemented our agricultural progress, as evidenced by the steady increase in the food

processing category of the state's manufacturers. The promotion of Iowa's agricultural assets has been co-ordinate with promotion of our industrial resources.

It should also be pointed out that the steady pace of our industrial growth has enabled our economy to absorb these new industries in a healthy fashion without bringing on the problems and unfairness to existing industry which befall a state where an industrial "explosion" occurs.

This has been extremely encouraging, but I think we all realize that we cannot afford to rest on our oars. The future health of our economy depends on continuing and accelerating this trend.

A state, like a business, does not stand still. It either forges ahead or falls behind. If Iowa is to grow and prosper, we must beef up this industrial growth—and there is no quick easy formula for accomplishing this. It must be done by continued hard work, sound planning, co-operative effort on the parts of government, private business and voluntary civic groups. The principal focus, I am convinced, must be on the local level.

It should be a matter of pride to Iowa that this expansion in the manufacturing segment of our economy has occurred under the impetus of private capital alone without direct government intervention or subsidy. There are now 113 Iowa communities which have industrial development corporations ready and able to provide necessary financial assistance to industries seeking a plant site location.

What can be done to assure the continuance and acceleration of this progress in the future? I would suggest the following points for your consideration:

1. The new programs that have been instituted in the Iowa Development Commission in recent years to help meet the state's need for diversification and development, should be continued and expanded. One example of these programs is the department of planning recently established to assist local development groups in providing for an orderly progress in growth and in the development of industrial sites.

2. There should be greater provision for training facilities in trades and industry courses at the high school and sub-college level for the thousands of our young people who enter the industrial field because they do not seek a college education and are not needed on the land. I would strongly recommend that consideration be given by the General Assembly to legislation pertaining to area vocational schools.

3. All possible support should be given to research in developing new uses for agricultural products grown in the Midwest. Last spring, I appointed a four-man, bi-partisan research utilization study committee, three members of which were from the state legislature. The recommendations of this group, which met with similar groups from other states, will be available to this Assembly.

4. More emphasis, I believe, should be placed on broader research into the economic and industrial potential of Iowa—research that will provide guide lines for the future development of our state. There is need for additional studies such as that undertaken for the Development Commission and the utilities on the economic effects of a navigable channel on the Missouri River and its effect on the future development of Western Iowa.

5. Lastly, greater efforts could be profitably put forth to attract a greater share of the nation's tourists to Iowa, thus adding a third dimension to the state's economic resources—the others, of course, being industry and agriculture. Reaction to the excellent tourist brochure published by the Development Commission in 1960—the first such travel publication the state

has ever had—indicates that this field can conceivably become a major source of economic activity.

HIGHWAYS, CONSERVATION

With reference to the interstate highway system, I would report to you that 189 miles of the super, four-lane highway has now been completed; and Iowa ranks in the top ten states in the percentage of total planned interstate mileage that has been completed.

In our highway program, we have adopted a sufficiency or need basis for allocating funds for the construction of primary roads. This objective policy assures the people of Iowa that the Iowa roads most in need of modernization or rebuilding will be taken care of first and that local pressures will not determine priorities.

In recent years, the conservation program in Iowa has made steady progress on all fronts. Extensive surveys have been made to determine the current needs of all of the people of the state in outdoor recreational facilities, and a well-organized effort has been conducted to meet those needs. The high caliber of the professional conservation staff is a matter in which Iowa can continue to take pride.

PENAL AFFAIRS

Twice in the past four years, I have been confronted with the most momentous responsibility that comes to a Chief Executive—the death penalty. Twice, I have spared a human life by commutation to life imprisonment. The decision in each case was made only upon the closest study of the specific case at hand. I felt that the constitutional power of executive clemency was given to the Governor to be used when he felt it was justified, and I have acted accordingly.

It is my deep conviction that capital punishment does not provide the deterrent that can be its only possible justification. Hence, it is my hope that some day, the law providing for the death penalty in Iowa will be removed from our statutes.

However, capital punishment is only a part of the general governmental responsibility in the area of crime prevention and correction.

In the past four years, encouraging progress has been made in penal affairs in the state of Iowa. The legislature, the Governor's Committee on Penal Affairs, the Probation and Parole Association, the District Judges Association, the Bar Association, the Iowa Welfare Association and law enforcement officials on all levels of government have co-operated with state agencies in giving this area the kind of study and effort it needed.

Among the forward steps taken are these: A nationally-known State Director of Corrections has been employed and is on the job. The number of parole agents of the State Board of Parole has been more than doubled in the past two years and the number of agents under the Board of Control has also been increased. A psychiatric hospital facility has been at long last established in connection with the ward for the criminally insane at Anamosa. Educational facilities for inmates have been dramatically upgraded; group therapy programs have been implemented; the prison chaplains program has been improved; psychiatric treatment for mentally ill prisoners and for youths in our training schools has been provided.

It is my sincere hope that this program of penal reform will be continued. The first responsibility of our corrections system is to protect society. But I am convinced that society is best protected by a strong parole system, by humane prison practices and by untiring efforts to rehabilitate the offender.

Two years ago, a valuable report was prepared by the Governor's Com-

mittee on Penal Affairs setting forth recommendations for legislative and administrative improvements in this field. The report was submitted to the Fifty-Eighth General Assembly and a number of the recommendations were enacted into law. A new report of this committee has been recently completed and probably is in the hands of the legislature and the new administration by this time. I sincerely hope that consideration will be given to the recommendations therein.

CIVIL RIGHTS

The new official highway map of the State of Iowa is a matter of pride to our citizens. It is of attractive design and color and full of compact information concerning the attractions of our state. Prominently displayed at the top of this map are the statutes of our state pertaining to the equal rights of citizens to public accommodations, facilities and services.

The printing of these civil rights statutes on our highway map was suggested by the Governor's Commission on Human Relations. Through such unspectacular but effective means, this voluntary state commission seeks to create a climate in our state wherein discrimination and injustice to minorities will not occur.

In April of 1958, I established our state commission by executive proclamation and indicated its functions and fields of activity along these lines:

"The fundamental purpose of this commission, as I envision it, is to help enable citizens of our state—whatever their religious, national, racial or economic background may be—to enjoy to the fullest extent the privileges and benefits of citizenship. We seek to guarantee our citizens the right to employment, to education, to housing, to the use of public accommodations, to health and welfare services and the right to live in peace and dignity."

In carrying out these objectives, the State Commission on Human Relations, within the limits of its authority, has made a significant contribution to human rights in the state during the short period it has been in existence.

* * *

One of the strong points of the people of Iowa through the years has been their keen interest in education on all levels. This interest has been reflected in the progress in public instruction and in higher education in Iowa in recent years.

Questions of financing education will properly occupy top places on the agenda of this assembly and of the Congress.

In the past four years, school reorganization in Iowa and other activities of the Department of Public Instruction have moved ahead on schedule. I would note that the recent resignation of J. C. Wright, the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, is a reminder that a number of departments of state government, including this one, are losing key personnel because of inability to compete in salaries.

The three state-supported institutions of higher education have commendably met the problem of rising enrollments in these years without sacrifice in the quality of courses offered. The major improvement in higher education has been the substantial upward revision of professors' salaries—a trend that clearly needs to be continued. Building programs in the institutions under the Board of Regents are progressing on schedule. The awarding of a number of grants for research to all three state institutions of higher learning is testimony to the excellence of the educational standards in those institutions.

One of the outstanding advancements in state government in recent years has been the dramatic improvement in activities for the blind under the Iowa Commission for the Blind. The Blind Commission in its new location provided by the Fifty-eighth General Assembly, is training and placing in

gainful employment five times the number of blind persons they were able to train five years ago. There is every indication that Iowa will soon be recognized throughout the nation as one of the leaders in the orientation and training of the blind.

In my opinion, one of the major unmet problems of our state is the problem of alcoholism which involves an estimated 45,000 alcoholics in the state with an annual cost to the taxpayers of more than 20 million dollars. During the past two years, a number of voluntary groups have been studying this problem, and a statewide commission on alcoholism appointed by me held a state conference last year to develop practical methods of dealing with this vital need. Out of this conference came legislative recommendations which will be submitted to this assembly and which I sincerely hope will receive favorable attention.

In a brief report such as this, it is impossible to touch upon the work of all of the departments of state government or even to summarize the accomplishments of a few with any degree of adequacy. To the personnel of those departments whose achievements go unmentioned, I apologize. Their contribution is no less significant, I assure you.

As a matter of fact, the dominant characteristic of our efforts in the past four years have been to meet the total responsibilities of the state government. In order that the personnel of the various departments might become acquainted with the work of other departments and gain some perspective on the government as a whole, several series of inter-departmental meetings have been held regularly over the past four years. These meetings have been valuable in coordinating the activities of agencies with related responsibilities; eliminating duplications of effort; and creating a unity of purpose.

In this administration, probably greater use than ever before has been made of voluntary citizens' committees. I do not refer to honorary, "paper" committees, but to working groups of dedicated individuals which have served as valuable adjuncts to the state government. One of the most heartening things I have encountered as governor has been the willingness of talented private citizens to contribute their efforts to public service—if they can see any reasonable possibility of getting significant results.

Among the citizens groups that have contributed much to our efforts in government are: The Citizens Mental Health Committee; the Professional Advisory Committee on Mental Health; the Committee on Penal Affairs; the Committee for the Employment of the Physically Handicapped; the Reapportionment Action Committee; the Commission on Economic and Social Trends; the Commission for Senior Citizens; the Commission on Alcoholism; the Human Relations Commission; the United Nations Committee.

To the members of these and many other citizens groups which have served during this administration, I express my gratitude for their valuable contribution in the public interest.

MENTAL HEALTH

Considering the fact that more than half of the hospital beds in the United States are occupied by victims of mental illness, it is apparent that the problem of mental health is one of the major issues facing this or any other state of the union.

In my opinion, the people of Iowa deserve to be commended for the progress that has been made in public attitude and progressive effort in the care of the mentally ill and the mentally retarded in the past few years. We know that infinitely more remains to be done, but what has been accomplished marks a transition from the dark ages to the twentieth century.

In this area, voluntary citizens committees appointed by the governor, working in conjunction with state and local associations, were indispensable in gaining public and legislative support for far-reaching improvements.

A highly qualified State Director of Mental Health was employed. An all-out effort was begun to transform the six mental institutions into modern hospitals for the active treatment of the mentally ill and the active habilitation of the mentally retarded.

The first step was the difficult one of recruiting competent professional personnel. A measure of the progress in this field may be seen by the fact that between 1957 and 1960, we have increased our complements of professional people in our institutions—physicians, psychologists, social workers, special therapists and registered nurses from 266 to 443. Along with the professional staff, the number of attendants, administrative and maintenance personnel have been correspondingly increased.

Although the number of admissions to the hospitals has risen, the total number of patients has decreased from 8,505 in 1956 to 7,359 in 1960. These figures simply mean that more people are given treatment and returned to normal life in their own communities, rather than being condemned for the rest of their natural lives to confinement without hope and without effective treatment.

In recent years, increasing attention has been given to out-patient treatment. In 1959-1960, 8,513 out-patients were seen, as contrasted to 526 in 1956.

One of the main steps of progress was the implementation of "in-service training" for personnel in the institutions. Today, the mental health institutes at Cherokee and Independence are among the small number of hospitals in the nation with "three years approved training" for psychiatrists.

The affiliate nurses' training has been expanded at Independence and established at Cherokee. The Mental Health Institutes have joined hands with the University of Iowa in providing training workshops in nursing care of mental patients resident in county homes and nursing homes.

To assure the availability of adequately trained psychiatrists for future needs, a cooperative program is now in operation which combines training at the State Psychopathic Hospital at Iowa City with internships at the State Mental Health Institutions.

Mental health services to the correctional and juvenile institutions have been established during the past two years. A team of four psychiatrists, three psychologists, and four social workers provide this service. The security of the mental health hospital unit at Anamosa has thus been staffed for the first time in history, as I mentioned elsewhere in this report.

To me, the most sensitive area of our mental health program is the care and education of the retarded. Those of you who have visited a ward of retarded children will know what I mean.

In this area and in other areas of human welfare, we have embraced the concept that every human being is entitled to an opportunity to develop his capacities to the fullest possible extent, whatever those capacities may be. This means the best possible programs for the retarded, the blind, the mentally disturbed, the physically handicapped, and the needy, as well as opportunities for the education and development of the normal child and the gifted child.

We cannot, as I see it, set our goals lower, and I hope that this concept will live and grow stronger in future administrations.

PUBLIC SAFETY

In 1957, when I first took office, one of the gravest problems facing this administration was the mounting toll of highway fatalities. To cope with

this problem, I appointed a professionally trained safety director who was given full authority to apply proven methods of reducing injuries and fatalities on the state's roads. The record shows that we got results.

His successor, a vigorous, young man with excellent law enforcement background, continued the professional program to control traffic accidents, and energetically turned his attention to other fields of law enforcement under the public safety department.

In 1960, there was a nine percent reduction in Iowa traffic deaths—a fact which attests to the effectiveness of the department's program. It was the present commissioner, I might add, who suggested the procedure recently adopted by our Highway Commission of painting white guide lines on the edges of highways at curves and on the approaches to bridges.

A number of effective innovations have been adopted in Iowa's traffic safety program in recent years. However, major credit should be given to the able and conscientious work of Iowa's Highway Patrol and to the excellent cooperation of county and municipal law enforcement officials.

One of the most valuable contributions of the Public Safety Department, in my opinion, has been the Commissioner's crack-down on illegal dope peddling in Iowa—one of the most vicious rackets known to man. It is my opinion that this is a much more serious problem in the state than is generally recognized and I hope that consideration will be given by this session to improved administrative machinery to deal with it from the state level.

One of the finest records in Public Safety has been that of the State Fire Marshal's Office in prevention, inspection, investigation and other services. It is worth noting that deaths from fire have been reduced by 21 percent in the past ten years. In 1960, there was a total of approximately 2,900 fires in Iowa, as compared to 4037 in 1956. Much credit for this reduction must be given to effort on the local level, but the efficient state program was certainly a major factor.

SOCIAL WELFARE

In the past few years, steady progress has been made in meeting human needs through the various welfare programs administered by the state.

The central objective of good welfare programs is to help people to help themselves.

The Department of Social Welfare has taken a realistic view of this goal. No one can function well—either in his work or in his personal relationships if he is hungry.

Therefore, the department has given particular attention to improving standards for basic minimum living requirements for recipients—on the premise that individuals are entitled to a healthful and decent standard of living, in accordance with Iowa law, and that recipients cannot be rehabilitated to self-support on sub-standard levels of assistance.

In the past year, basic allowances for several of the living necessities, such as food, shelter and fuel, were increased to bring these allowances more nearly in line with current costs.

I would point out that there is one conspicuous inequity in allotments for the categorical assistance programs. The Aid to Dependent Children program has been hampered for several years by inadequate grants and the increases which I have just mentioned have not been extended to ADC.

I would urge, with all the power at my command, that appropriations be increased to the ADC program to permit bringing the living standards of dependent children up to the levels of those received by people on the other categorical assistance programs.

In my opinion, the State Department of Social Welfare should be enabled

to apply the same basic standards to all categories of needy persons in similar circumstances, without partiality to one categorical group as compared to another.

Of major importance in the welfare field was the inauguration of the Medical and Remedial Care Plan which became effective January 1, 1959. This plan permitted "vendor payments" for medical care.

On January 1, 1960, first payments were made under the federal-state aid to the Totally Disabled Program, as authorized by the 58th General Assembly. Iowa was one of the last states of the nation to have such a program. However, because of a limited state appropriation, it was necessary to establish a very restricted definition of disability so that many severely disabled persons, between the ages of 18 and 65, fail to qualify for the program. I would respectfully recommend consideration of additional funds for this important and long-needed program.

An important development in the welfare programs was the adoption of the care cost evaluation plan for determining the amount of the allowance for recipients in need of custodial or nursing care.

During the past year, the average grants for recipients of public assistance have been increased as follows:

Old Age Assistance from \$73.37 to \$84.25. Aid to the Blind from \$88.36 to \$101.30. Aid to Dependent Children from \$34.75 to \$40.37.

As you all know, one of the greatest accomplishments of the 58th General Assembly was the abolition of the "notice to depart" and the reduction from two years to one year of the time required for "legal settlement" in public assistance cases.

I would call your attention to the fact that it might be necessary to clarify this legislation to carry out what was generally construed to be the legislative intent.

According to an interpretation by the Attorney General's office last year, some of the harsh restrictions of the old law were ruled to be still in effect. If, for example, while a person is in the process of acquiring his legal settlement in a county, he receives an emergency ten dollar grocery order in public assistance, it appears he is disqualified and must begin the period of legal settlement all over again.

It would be a considerable service to the state if the legislative intent in this law could be clarified by the present assembly.

RECOMMENDATIONS

In my reports to the legislature and in other public addresses during my two terms of office, I have made recommendations for innovations and reorganizational measures in the state government. Now, in this final statement, I would like to repeat some of these recommendations that have not been touched upon elsewhere in this report.

In the area of government reorganization, I would suggest, as I have in the past, a four-year term for governor and lieutenant-governor, provision for item veto in appropriation bills; making state elective offices appointive except for the governor, lieutenant-governor, (and possibly the auditor); establishment of a non-political civil service system for state employees.

Along these lines, I would recommend for re-reading, the report of the Governor's Commission on Economic and Social Trends in Iowa of December, 1958, entitled "Iowa's Future—A Citizens' View."

I recommend that the necessary legislation be enacted to establish a sound, long-range financing program for capital improvements at our state-supported institutions, either by a revenue bond plan or a general obligation bond issue.

I recommend, as I have in the past, that provision be made for adequate pensions for retired teachers.

I repeat the recommendations of my inaugural address in January of 1959: "The multitude of inspections made by over a half a dozen different agencies and departments of state government should be placed under a single, unified agency."

Quoting again from this inaugural message, I would recommend that this Assembly consider setting up a merit scholarship program for exceptional high school students who, because of financial reasons, are unable to attend college.

I recommend that this Assembly restore the right of freedom of contract to workers and employers by removing the statutory prohibition of "union shop" contracts.

I recommend the adoption of the Public Defender system in Iowa.

I recommend that the following voluntary state commissions which have served during the past four years be retained in modified form and be given statutory authorization: the Commission on Human Relations, the Commission for Senior Citizens, the Commission on Alcoholism.

Lastly, I think I express the devout hopes of hundreds of thousands of Iowans, when I voice my own hope that this Assembly will work out a just solution to the most urgent problem of all—the need for legislative reapportionment.

The Governor-Elect and the majority leaders in the legislature have pledged themselves to work for a fair re-districting plan. We regard this pledge to be in good faith and I can assure you that the minority members will support any fair reapportionment plan you may propose.

As you are all aware, at the present time our legislative apportionment is such that some thirty per cent of our people control the state's legislative processes.

No issue in Iowa's history has ever been so buried in confusion and misinformation. I am personally convinced that if all of the citizens of our state could really know and understand the basic terms and issues involved, we could solve this problem in a manner acceptable to all.

In the meantime, reapportionment must be dealt with as a matter of semantics before it can properly become a matter of state.

The word "reapportionment" and the phrase "one house on area, one on population" are meaningless unless they provide reasonable equality of representation.

We cannot solve the problem simply by reducing or rearranging present inequities. This may be reapportionment of a sort, but it is not fair representation.

I believe that both rural and urban people in Iowa have an innate sense of justice and fair play. I am sure that most of the people in less populous counties see the injustice in a situation wherein one rural vote may outweigh an urban vote by as great a ratio as fourteen to one. On the other hand, rural people have economic problems that are real, not illusory, problems that have been heightened in recent years by the critical decline of farm income.

Such problems deserve fair and unbiased consideration.

But in the final analysis, the question involved in legislative reapportionment is the central question of democracy itself—equality of representation in government.

Those who seek to preserve the status quo by sowing fears in the minds of our people as to their competence to govern themselves inflict upon us the greatest spiritual damage of all.

With the opening of the 59th General Assembly, I wish the members of both houses success as you undertake the difficult but crucially important task of correcting existing laws that permit more than one class of citizenship in this great state of a free nation.

I leave the governorship of my native state with profound feelings of gratitude and good will towards all of its citizens. The warm courtesy Mrs. Loveless and I have received from people of both parties has enriched our lives and at times misted our eyes. Our heartfelt thanks to all of you.

Soon after the blizzard that took place on November 8, I sent word to Governor-Elect Erbe that my staff and I would cooperate in every way possible in the orderly transition to the new administration. This we have done our utmost to do.

Cynics may say that we members of the minority in Iowa should be graceful in defeat since we have had considerable practice through the years. I can only say, looking ahead to 1962 and 1964, that we now feel we have served an adequate apprenticeship in that respect and do not plan to continue the trend.

In conclusion, may I offer one final bit of advice based on the experience of the previous session?

It is this: "Be careful what you do about the mourning doves."

On the Part of the Senate.

Report adopted.

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced the arrival of Governor-elect Erbe and Lieutenant-elect Mooty, accompanied by the Governor's staff.

Governor-elect Erbe and Lieutenant Governor-elect Mooty were escorted to the Speaker's rostrum.

The invocation was delivered by the Reverend G. W. Lobeck, pastor, Saint Paul's Lutheran Church, Council Bluffs, Iowa, as follows:

Dear Father in Heaven, make us to realize at all times that Thou art over all, and that the powers that be are ordained of Thee. Teach us to respect those who are in authority as Thy representatives, to uphold the arms of our government, to cooperate with our chosen leaders to the fullest for the welfare of the State, and to intercede for them before the Throne of Grace so that they may rule well and we be enabled to lead a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and honesty.

In this hour we come before Thee imploring Thy grace especially for the Governor-elect and the Lieutenant Governor-elect of our State of Iowa. Pour out a rich measure of Thy spirit upon Thy servants, Norman Erbe and W. L. Mooty. Help them to walk before Thee in Thy fear. Lead them to come before Thee with any and all problems with which they may be confronted, and to seek Thy divine guidance in the performance of their several duties.

Grant that they may govern well in our beloved State and that with keen insight and judicious prudence they may so guide the affairs of the State, that during their tenure of office righteousness may prevail, the welfare of the individual citizen be enhanced, all true arts and useful knowledge may flourish, commerce and industry may expand, and the priceless gift of liberty be retained.

We commend them to Thy care, direction, and benediction. Bless them, we beseech Thee, and make them a blessing to many. We ask it in the name of our blessed Savior. Amen.

The oath of office was administered to Governor-elect Norman A. Erbe by the Honorable Theodore G. Garfield, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Iowa.

Lieutenant Governor Mooty, President of the Senate, presiding, presented Governor Erbe, who delivered the following inaugural address:

MR. PRESIDENT, MR. SPEAKER, MR. CHIEF JUSTICE, SENATORS AND REPRESENTATIVES, STATE OFFICIALS, DISTINGUISHED GUESTS, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:

Today, probably more than in any recent decade, we stand at the threshold of a legislative session with unlimited opportunities to solve and resolve the problems and issues facing Iowa. Because of our unique great natural assets in this state, our people, and the fertile land upon which we live, we must strive to continue to make good the dream of greatness which we hope to pass on to our children.

This challenge is ours, and I say "ours" purposefully. It is neither yours alone, as members of the legislative body, nor is it mine alone, as the chief executive of this state. It is a cooperative effort on the part of both of us working together for the good of the State of Iowa. If we are to successfully adopt and carry out a program of progress for this great state that we love, it can be accomplished only if the members of the legislative branch and the executive branch of our government operate in an atmosphere of mutual respect, confidence, and true partnership.

First, I want to congratulate you upon your willingness to spend so much of your time in the cause of good government by serving in our legislative body, in most cases at great financial hardship to each of you, and I pledge to each one of you that I am dedicated to assist you in any way that I may during the coming months of your deliberations in the legislative session. I hope that I may be of help.

It is my belief that the people of Iowa expect, deserve, and must have as efficient and economical a government as it is humanly possible to provide. We join in recognizing the many urgent needs of our state, and it is our responsibility during this session to resolve these needs through the process of debate and passage of legislation so that we may fully discharge this responsibility to our constituents and ourselves for a better Iowa. In this message, it is impossible to consider all the facets of state government that will demand our attention, however, I will discuss with you the most pressing needs of the state. It is with this philosophy in mind and in accord with a true spirit of cooperation that I respectfully submit to you, our lawmakers who will provide the course for our ship of state in the next biennium, a number of recommendations for the path which I hope we may chart.

The voters of our state, under the right given them by the framers of our Constitution, in their wisdom decided that the work of amending our Constitution should be done through our regular legislative process by you, their elected legislators, selected from among them to perform this function. The interest of our people in the enacting of vital changes in our Constitution is not diminished by their selection of your body as the means to effect that change, but rather is a vote of assurance and confidence that you will meet the problems of constitutional amendment and fully discharge that obligation in a representative manner. Reapportionment of the General Assembly was given thorough consideration during the Fifty-eighth General Assembly. I join Iowans throughout the state in the hope that this vital issue will be favorably resolved at an early stage in your proceedings on the federal basis of providing one house on area and one house on population with district representation in those counties with multiple legislators in the population house. Automatic reapportionment every ten years would, of

course, continue to provide fair representation for those who follow us in government and should be included in the amendment.

You wisely took the first step in the constitutional amending process of the judiciary branch through the passage of SJR 7 in the last session of the Legislature. I urge your favorable action on the second step of this process during this session so that this issue of modernization of our court system can be presented to the electorate for its consideration.

I commend you for your legislation during the Fifty-eighth General Assembly enabling most county officers to serve terms of four years. This good government decision of yours did not, however, extend to county attorneys who are constitutional officers. I not only urge your favorable consideration of lengthening the term of county attorneys but I also invite your attention to the archaic method of compensation of these law enforcement officials who now, by law, must depend for a portion of their salaries on fines levied by the courts against violators of the law. This method of compensation of public law enforcement officials is completely contrary to modern principles of government and should be abolished. Perhaps in connection with this review of the status of our county attorneys you could profitably consider the desirability of adopting a system of district attorneys elected to serve the judicial district for four-year terms with adequate compensation for fulltime work.

Your recognition of the need for four-year terms for county officials indicates the even greater desirability of four-year terms for elective state officials in order to provide stability and efficiency in the administration of state government. In the interest of good government, I urge your favorable consideration of a constitutional amendment to provide four-year terms for state elective officials as well as your consideration of annual sessions of the Legislature, limited as to time, with one session each biennium devoted to fiscal affairs.

I submit for your careful consideration and approval the proposition of lowering the minimum voting age requirement to 18 in Iowa. The young men and women of Iowa are sufficiently mature at 18 to become a valuable part of the electorate and this fact has been recognized by President Eisenhower in his recommendations as well as by two of our sister states.

I have been informed officially that the Iowa representation in the United States House of Representatives commencing with the Eighty-eighth Congress will be reduced from its present eight-member delegation to seven representatives. I am confident that you will wisely redistrict the counties of the State of Iowa so that our total population will have equal representation in the national Congress.

Our youngsters constitute our most valuable asset in the Iowa of tomorrow and it is our obligation to them to continue to provide for them the best in education so that they may be better prepared to meet the challenge of the future. You have recognized this obligation by requiring reorganization of school districts and consolidation of teaching services so that they may receive the best in education. However, this has, in many cases, thrown a disproportionate financial load on the property owner. I am sure that you share with me the conviction that some means must be provided in this session of the Legislature for property tax relief through increased agricultural land tax credit payments and a program of increased state aid for schools.

Iowa's three state institutions of higher learning are among the leaders in the nation in their respective fields. Everything possible must be done to insure that each maintains its ranking. The recently-completed interim study "Resources and Needs for Higher Education in Iowa" provides you

with an authoritative report upon which to base legislative action during this session. I especially invite your attention to the need for legislative approval and commitment to a long-range building program for the Board of Regents institutions so that capital planning can be carried on now for the future needs of our students in the fields of higher education. The severe statutory limitation of alumni representation on the Board of Regents also merits your inquiry as to its usefulness. I recommend authorization for greater representation by alumni on that important agency.

I suggest a re-examination of the report of the interim study committee on election and election practices headed by your very able colleague and public servant, the late Clark McNeal, and the enactment of legislation which will prevent inequities in our voting laws and preserve for every citizen this most valuable of his rights in our governmental system.

Iowa's highways have been properly called her "lifeline." The report of the Iowa Highway Study Committee created by you during the Fifty-eighth General Assembly points out the many problems facing our primary, secondary and urban road and street systems in the next twenty years. The allocation of funds will properly receive serious consideration by your body and, I am sure, will result in a distribution which will be in the best interests of the people of Iowa. Continued progress in the improvement and construction of our secondary, urban, primary and interstate systems is, of course, mandatory and expected by all Iowans. Prompt removal of curbs from our narrow primary roads is a project which I am confident our highway commission will carry out in the interests of safety for the traveling public.

I invite your attention to a re-examination of the requirement of the last session of your body that speed limits on secondary roads should be effective only upon posting by the Board of Supervisors. Experience has demonstrated that enforcement has been rendered more difficult because of the problem of proof of existence of speed signs and the lack of uniformity. Additionally, the counties have been required to assume a substantial increased financial burden as a result of the requirement of posting.

Those of us who drive upon the roads of our state are, in my judgment, entitled to protection from the drinking driver. I urge the adoption of an implied consent law as well as a manslaughter by motor vehicle provision to protect us from the driver who endangers our life and property.

In these days of the shorter work week, the outboard motor and the vacation trailer, the responsibility of our State Conservation Commission becomes greater, not only to provide better recreational areas so that Iowans will enjoy their free time in Iowa, but also to acquaint our fellow Iowans and tourists from other states with the many fine vacation spots in our state. A balanced conservation program designed to fit the needs and desires of all Iowans is vital if we are to continue to attract industry and its people from without our state.

Great strides have been made in recent years in caring for our less fortunate ones who suffer from mental illness. I commend you for your passage of enabling legislation authorizing the establishment of local mental health centers which have done such an outstanding job in the field of treatment and care at the local level. We must continue the program of local and state care and treatment so that these patients may be restored to the status of useful members of our society.

Our senior citizens who provided for us the heritage which we enjoy today are greater in per-capita numbers than any other state in the nation with the exception of Vermont, and we, in Iowa have done less than our best in properly discharging our obligations to them in the golden years of their

lives. Confusing regulations administered by agencies with overlapping powers have hampered the wonderful work which private and church organizations have done and are doing in this most important field. It is my hope that you as members of the Fifty-ninth General Assembly will arrive at a program which will combine the best resources of government, private enterprise and the groups providing health care, to solve the housing and economic problems of domiciliary and health care for the aged in Iowa. Such a program should include enabling legislation authorizing participation by this state in the provisions of the Kerr-Mills Bill granting medical care for the aged as well as legislation permitting local political subdivisions, following an election by its citizens, to provide nursing homes and homes for the aged in their communities if they so desire.

Historically, Iowa's economy has been termed "agricultural" in nature. The first half of the twentieth century has seen a healthy evolution of the partnership between agriculture and industry in our state. Today we have an ideal and fertile climate for the greater promotion of our state in the vital area of industry. Favorable tax laws coupled with a plentiful labor supply of excellent quality and our ideal location in the heart-land of our continent present conditions which are attractive not only to our existing industry but also to those companies seeking new locations.

It is not, however, sufficient for us to say that we have what it takes for promotion of these valuable assets. We must strive to do something about them. This necessitates an aggressive program of salesmanship for our state including promotion of Iowa as the land of opportunity for new industries, promotion of our existing industries, development of our outstanding labor supply, and last, and by no means least the advancement of our basic industry, agriculture, all of which will provide a better future for our children.

This means a challenge for you and me, today, and not tomorrow, for the need is with us now to develop a better Iowa. We are all immensely proud of the outstanding achievements in their respective fields by Dr. Spedding at the Institute for Atomic Research at Iowa State University at Ames, and Dr. Van Allen of the Department of Physics at the State University of Iowa at Iowa City which chart for us the course of the future in technological and scientific development. In order that we may meet the challenge of today in the fields of agriculture, industry and scientific development, it is vital that we develop the proper climate here at home through our Iowa Development Commission and promote our many assets beyond our borders. It is not enough to say that one state department or agency should do this work since it is the obligation of all Iowans, whether a part of state government or not, to put their shoulder to the wheel and do their best to promote a greater Iowa.

You and I as elected officials of this great state have a deeper obligation which extends over the length and breadth of state government and that is, through the laws of this state as well as through its administration, to operate state government at the greatest peak of efficiency and economy that is possible. This should be true in any year but it is especially true in the coming biennium when our people are carrying an ever-increasing tax burden and are entitled to the best use of their tax dollar. I share with you the view that full and complete collection of the taxes now authorized by law must be effected by our tax commission and I pledge to you that I will do all in my power to assist in this vital task.

The budget hearings provided for me and your colleagues on the budget and financial control committee a unique opportunity to inquire into the operations of our state departments and agencies. As a result of these

hearings and my studies and personal experiences in state government, I am convinced that the purchasing practices of state government should be drastically revised so that the lowest prices can be obtained for volume purchases.

Not only consolidation of purchases but consolidation of the many machine records operations at the seat of government will provide for the taxpayer the greatest return on his investment in government. The solution to a number of these problems can, I am sure, be obtained by administrative cooperation but it is possible that legislation may be required and if this is so, I shall confer with you during the course of the legislative session.

Additionally, the budget hearings disclosed a continuing complaint by agency heads of the competition provided by other states and the outside business world for their skilled employees. This problem can, in my opinion, be solved by the enactment of a civil service system which will provide open competition for employment, selection on the basis of ability, equal pay for equal work, and career employees who can and will give their best to government service in Iowa without fear of the results of the next election or the requirement of having to participate in a political campaign in order to insure their jobs.

You and I have the unique opportunity at the present time to complain as taxpayers about the cost of government and, best of all, the good fortune to be able, through appropriate legislation, to provide a more efficient government for ourselves and our constituents. The enactment of a civil service law, a restudy of the Brookings Report of the 1930's, a review of the Little Hoover Committee report and its recommendations, and the views of the recent Interim Tax Study Committee should be considered so that needed changes which provide economy and efficiency in government can be adopted at this session.

These problems, which I have discussed today, are most assuredly not all of the problems facing the people of Iowa. No doubt many of you can think of other problems which are also of great importance. Frankly, I would like to visit with you today about not only each of the issues which I have mentioned but also the many others which are of concern to Iowans. As you know the budget message of the executive will contain a discussion of the fiscal problems to be considered by you during this period. Suffice it to say that you and I will be counselling together many times during the course of the legislative session ahead concerning the problems and solutions for a greater Iowa.

As stated at the outset, it is my belief that the people of Iowa expect, deserve, and must have as efficient and economical a government as it is humanly possible to provide. It is likewise the right of our people to be fully informed concerning the operation of their state government, and it is my intention to provide this flow of information during the course of our administration to the best of my ability so that our friends and neighbors may know and take a greater interest in government, which is theirs.

During the months ahead, you, the elected legislators of Iowa, have an opportunity which is unparalleled to provide a legislative program of vision and progress for the people of our state. They are watching you with confidence that such a program will be the result of your efforts. In all humility I want you to know that I am proud to have the opportunity to be associated with you, the Fifty-ninth General Assembly, in the work which lies ahead. At any time that I can be of assistance to you in any way, either individually or collectively, my door will always be open. With the ever-present help of the Almighty, I am confident that the challenge will be met and that the work will be done.

The benediction was offered by the Reverend J. Stanley Schmidt, pastor, First Presbyterian Church, Boone, Iowa.

Our Father in Heaven, grant unto us now the ability to experience Thy presence in our midst.

We ask Thy blessing to be upon Norman Erbe and William Mooty and all other elected and appointed officials of this state. Grant to them the wisdom to realize that it is better to fail in a cause that will ultimately succeed than to succeed in a cause that will ultimately fail.

May Thy will be done in this state and may Thy program be carried out, above party and personality, beyond time and circumstance, for the good of the citizens of Iowa and the welfare of the nation. May the Lord bless you and keep you and the Lord make His face shine upon you and be gracious unto you and the Lord lift up His countenance upon you and give you peace—in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit. Amen.

REPORT OF IOWA INTERSTATE COOPERATION COMMISSION
TO THE MEMBERS OF THE FIFTY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY
JANUARY, 1961

What the Commission Is For

There is an increasing awareness of the need for and benefits of cooperation among the states. To maintain our federal system of government, there is no doubt that states must stick together to strengthen state governments and to promote the states' point of view in federal-state relations.

There are other reasons why this cooperation is necessary and beneficial. In our modern society, each state government deals with matters that affect people of other states. Secondly, state government is more complex and provides more services than it used to. Therefore, responsible state officials realize that they can benefit from the experiences of other states in dealing with the many problems which come up. Also there is increasing recognition that states can make agreements or take joint action in handling certain problems and services to each other's mutual benefit.

For many years state administrators have worked together on administrative matters through their national associations and personal contacts.

The Iowa Interstate Cooperation Commission gives the State of Iowa a way to cooperate with, and to take advantage of, the experiences of other states in the policy-making field. Therefore, the Iowa Commission is comprised mostly of legislators. Five members of the Senate, five members of the House, and three state officials appointed by the Governor make up the Commission. The Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House are ex officio members of the committee.

Members of the Commission

The members of the Commission during 1959 and 1960 were Senator Shaff, Chairman; Senators Eppers, Hansen, Rigler and Stuart; Representatives Allen, Falvey, Gray, Kimball, Johns and Reppert; and John Hansen of the Board of Control, Harold Martin of the Board of Parole, and Melvin Synhorst, Secretary of State. Representative Johns resigned from the Commission because he left the General Assembly; he was replaced by Representative Gray. The Commission chose Representative Reppert to be the Iowa delegate to the Board of Managers of the Council of State Governments. Mr. Ringgenberg, Director of the Research Bureau, was Secretary to the Commission.

The Commission: Its Creation and Functions

Until 1959, members of the Commission were appointed by authority of concurrent resolutions of each General Assembly. In 1959, legislation was passed to establish the Commission by law (Chapter 83 of the Acts of the Fifty-eighth General Assembly).

This law gives the Commission the following duties:

1. To carry forward the participation of this state as a member of the Council of State Governments.

2. To encourage and assist the legislative, executive, administrative and judicial officials and employees of this state to develop and maintain friendly contact by correspondence, by conference, and otherwise, with officials and employees of the other states, of the federal government, and of local units of government.

3. To encourage cooperation between this state and other units of government in the adoption of compacts and uniform laws and in working relationships with officials of other states.

What the Present Commission Has Done

The Commission took part in three meetings of the Council of State Governments, the biennial meeting of the North Central Legislative Conference, and the organizational meeting of the Midwestern Agricultural Committee. Iowa was the host for these last two meetings. In addition, individual members of the Commission worked on special committees dealing with interstate cooperation matters.

1. Midwestern Regional Conference at Kansas City

The interstate cooperation commissions of the 12 midwest states met in Kansas City on August 30-September 2, 1959. Major matters discussed were state regulation of retirement funds, migratory farm labor problems, water problems, state revenue problems, investment of state funds, and handling of mental health programs.

A report was made about the increasing number of retirement systems being used by business, industry, labor, etc. It was suggested that all states should have proper legislation to assure that the participants in these retirement plans are adequately protected from mishandling of the large sums of money involved in these plans.

Representative Johns of the Iowa Commission urged that a midwestern agricultural committee of legislators be set up to work cooperatively on farm legislative matters of mutual interest. A resolution was passed at the Kansas City meeting to create such a committee.

Senator Hansen and Representative Reppert represented Iowa at the meeting of the Midwestern Committee on Highways and Highway Safety Problems on September 2 and 3 in Kansas City. At this meeting, the key role that the legislature plays in highway safety was emphasized. One suggestion from this meeting was that each state should have a continuing legislative study committee to study, recommend and review highway safety programs. Another suggestion was that states should do everything possible to get uniformity in driving rules, signs and signals among the states.

2. Meeting of Midwestern Agriculture Committee

The Iowa Commission hosted the organizational meeting of the Midwestern Agriculture Committee in Des Moines on February 21-23, 1960. This committee is comprised of two legislators from each of the 12 midwest states. The heads of the departments of agriculture of these states are ex officio members. Representative Gray and Senator Harbor were chosen by the Commission to represent Iowa.

At the Des Moines meeting, the committee discussed the following possibilities to study and consider in its future meetings:

1. Coordination of Agricultural Research
2. Marketing of Farm Surpluses
3. Problems Created by Alarm over Residues, Pesticides, Herbicides, and Antibiotics

4. Tax Burdens on Farmers
5. Plant and Animal Quarantine in Great Lakes States
6. Problems of Interstate Shipment of Dairy Products and Seed, etc.
7. Uniform Rural Zoning Laws
8. Uniform Animal Disease Laws
9. Uniform Seed Law
10. Utilization of Farm Products

Of these topics, the committee decided to begin its work by considering numbers "3," "5," "6," "8," and "9." Later meetings were held in Chicago in June and in Michigan in July. At the Michigan meeting, a resolution was approved by the 12 states asking that Congress, the Federal Food and Drug Administration, and the U. S. Department of Agriculture (1) approve funds so that research could be done to remove uncertainties about the effects of food additives and economic poisons (pesticides, herbicides, etc.) on human health and (2) substitute a more justifiable regulation providing standards for minimum safe additive levels of products to which these chemicals have been added.

3. Midwestern Regional Meeting at Mackinac Island, Michigan

The 12 midwest state interstate cooperation commissions met in Michigan July 27-30, 1960. Important topics discussed at this meeting were (1) the legislature's role in budgeting, (2) the work of the Midwest Agriculture Committee, (3) the plans for airborne television for high schools in the states around lower Lake Michigan, (4) governing boards for state colleges, (5) interstate compacts, (6) the federal highway program, and (7) highway safety matters.

4. General Assembly of the States in Chicago

Representatives of interstate cooperation commissions from all states met in Chicago November 30-December 2, 1960. Topics discussed at this meeting were:

1. An appraisal of higher education and public school education
2. Interstate compacts
3. Suggested state legislation on regulation of private employment agencies, state records management, compact on placement of children, and degree mills
4. State laws relating to atomic energy
5. Children's problems
6. Driver license compacts and commercial vehicle lighting and wind-shield stickers
7. Metropolitan transportation problems
8. State taxation of interstate business and income
9. Problems of the aging
10. State-county relationships

5. Meeting of the North Central Legislative Conference in Des Moines

The Iowa Legislative Research Committee hosted this meeting, and several members of the Iowa Interstate Cooperation Commission attended along with about 25 other Iowa legislators. The North Central Legislative Conference is comprised of the research committees of both Dakotas, Minnesota, Wisconsin and Iowa. Its purpose is to provide a means for these legislators to meet every two years to discuss mutual legislative problems and subjects they are studying between sessions of their legislatures.

At this meeting, the following topics were discussed: (1) property tax assessment methods, (2) state and local taxes, (3) investment of state funds, (4) possibilities for joint institutional care for states of this region, (5) merits of separate or combined departments to handle welfare pro-

grams and state institutions, (6) state aids for education, (7) state park fees, (8) water resources legislation, and (9) pollution control. Copies of the proceedings of this meeting are available in our Research Bureau office.

6. Senator Stuart represented Iowa on the nationwide Committee on Suggested State Legislation. This group prepares model legislation on topics of current interest in many state legislatures and prepares a report containing these suggested laws, which are made available to all states.

Senator Hansen represented Iowa on the Rules Committee of The Midwestern Interstate Cooperation Commission at the Chicago Meeting of the General Assembly of States effecting rules and suggested regulations for the next conference to be held in Black Hills region in the summer of 1961.

INTRODUCTION OF JOINT RESOLUTION

House Joint Resolution 13, by Kluever, Stanley, Riley, Naden, Darrington, Edgington, Loss, Freed and Johannes, a joint resolution pro-

posing to amend Article Five (V) of the Constitution of the State of Iowa relating to the supervisory and administrative control of the inferior courts by the Supreme Court; to the qualifications, selection, tenure, compensation, powers and duties of judicial nominating commission members, judges and other judicial officers and to the mandatory retirement with compensation of judges of the Supreme and District Courts.

Be It Resolved by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa:

Section 1. An amendment to the Constitution of the State of Iowa as it appears in the Code of 1958 is proposed as follows:

Article Five (V) is amended in the following manner:

1. Section four (4) is amended by striking from lines eight (8) and nine (9) of such section the words, "exercise a supervisory" and inserting in lieu thereof the words, "shall exercise a supervisory and administrative".

2. Sections three (3), five (5), nine (9) and eleven (11) are repealed.

3. The following sections are added thereto:

"Section 15. Vacancies in the Supreme Court and District Court shall be filled by appointment by the Governor from lists of nominees submitted by the appropriate judicial nominating commission. Three nominees shall be submitted for each Supreme Court vacancy, and two nominees shall be submitted for each District Court vacancy. If the Governor fails for thirty days to make the appointment, it shall be made from such nominees by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court.

"Section 16. There shall be a State Judicial Nominating Commission. Such commission shall make nominations to fill vacancies in the Supreme Court. Until July 4, 1973, and thereafter unless otherwise provided by law, the State Judicial Nominating Commission shall be composed and selected as follows: There shall be not less than three nor more than eight appointive members, as provided by law, and an equal number of elective members on such Commission, all of whom shall be electors of the state. The appointive members shall be appointed by the Governor subject to confirmation by the Senate. The elective members shall be elected by the resident members of the bar of the state. The judge of the Supreme Court who is senior in length of service on said Court, other than the Chief Justice, shall also be a member of such Commission and shall be its chairman.

"There shall be a District Judicial Nominating Commission in each judicial district of the state. Such commissions shall make nomina-

tions to fill vacancies in the District Court within their respective districts. Until July 4, 1973, and thereafter unless otherwise provided by law, District Judicial Nominating Commissions shall be composed and selected as follows: There shall be not less than three nor more than six appointive members, as provided by law, and an equal number of elective members on each such commission, all of whom shall be electors of the district. The appointive members shall be appointed by the Governor. The elective members shall be elected by the resident members of the bar of the district. The district judge of such district who is senior in length of service shall also be a member of such commission and shall be its chairman.

“Due consideration shall be given to area representation in the appointment and election of Judicial Nominating Commission members. Appointive and elective members of Judicial Nominating Commissions shall serve for six year terms, shall be ineligible for a second six year term on the same commission, shall hold no office of profit of the United States or of the state during their terms, shall be chosen without reference to political affiliation, and shall have such other qualifications as may be prescribed by law. As near as may be, the terms of one-third of such members shall expire every two years.

“Section 17. Members of all courts shall have such tenure in office as may be fixed by law, but terms of Supreme Court Judges shall be not less than eight years and terms of District Court Judges shall be not less than six years. Judges shall serve for one year after appointment and until the first day of January following the next judicial election after the expiration of such year. They shall at such judicial election stand for retention in office on a separate ballot which shall submit the question of whether such judge shall be retained in office for the tenure prescribed for such office and when such tenure is a term of years, on their request, they shall, at the judicial election next before the end of each term, stand again for retention on such ballot. Present Supreme Court and District Court Judges, at the expiration of their respective terms, may be retained in office in like manner for the tenure prescribed for such office. The General Assembly shall prescribe the time for holding judicial elections.

“Section 18. Judges of the Supreme Court and District Court shall receive salaries from the state, shall be members of the bar of the state and shall have such other qualifications as may be prescribed by law. Judges of the Supreme Court and District Court shall be ineligible to any other office of the state while serving on said court and for two years thereafter, except that District Judges shall be eligible to the office of Supreme Court Judge. Other judicial officers shall be selected in such manner and shall have such tenure, compensation and other qualification as may be fixed by law. The General Assembly shall

prescribe mandatory retirement for Judges of the Supreme Court and District Court at a specified age and shall provide for adequate retirement compensation. Retired judges may be subject to special assignment to temporary judicial duties by the Supreme Court, as provided by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing proposed amendment to the Constitution of Iowa, having been adopted and agreed to by the Fifty-eighth (58th) General Assembly, thereafter duly published, and now adopted and agreed to by the Fifty-ninth (59th) General Assembly in this Joint Resolution, shall be submitted to the people at a special election to be held for that purpose at the same time and in conjunction with the primary election to be held for the selection of political party candidates for public office in the year nineteen hundred sixty-two (1962). The submission at said special election shall in all respects be governed and conducted as prescribed by law for the submission of a Constitutional amendment at a general election.

Paul of Poweshiek asked and received unanimous consent to have the report of the Budget and Financial Control Committee printed in the House Journal.

REPORT OF THE BUDGET AND FINANCIAL CONTROL COMMITTEE

TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE, THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, AND THE MEMBERS OF THE FIFTY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

The Budget and Financial Control Committee of the Fifty-eighth General Assembly herewith submits the following report and recommendations.

The committee made annual visits to the institutions under the Board of Regents, the Board of Control, and also visited many of the projects under the State Conservation Commission. The General Assembly gave this committee the duty of releasing funds appropriated by the legislature for capital expenditures when, in this committee's judgment, it was for the best interests of the State of Iowa, and to carry out the intents and purposes of the legislature. In our best judgment, such policy has been followed in making every allocation or release of funds.

We recommend for the consideration of the Fifty-ninth General Assembly the following subjects:

CONTROL, BOARD OF

We recommend an act to establish a motor vehicle and motor vehicle registration revolving fund. Such a fund will expedite the purchase of materials for license plates, and make possible the manufacture of such plates on a year around basis.

We recommend that in accordance with the deficiency asked for in Board of Control letter No. 169, that an emergency appropriation bill be passed in the amount of \$70,000.00.

We recommend that Chapter 152, section 165, line 15, Acts of the Fifty-eighth General Assembly, be corrected where it is indicated that the terms "commitment" and "admission" are synonymous.

It is recommended that the Board of Control shall not establish a policy which prohibits custodial patient care in the various mental institutions under its jurisdiction.

We should continue to strengthen our penal, our rehabilitation, and parole systems, and set up stronger provisions for pre-sentence investigation.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

We recommend that a study be made of a proposed bill to repeal Chapter 106, Code, 1958, and rewrite the entire chapter, relating to boat registration, navigation regulations and water safety.

We recommend that a permanent prison labor camp be established in Yellow River Forest, and that the program of the use of prisoners in conservation areas be expanded.

EMPLOYMENT SECURITY COMMISSION

We recommend that the provisions of Chapter 199, Acts of the Fifty-eighth General Assembly, relating to teachers' allowance, be amended to remove the limitation, and to provide for an open end appropriation.

EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

The Budget and Financial Control Committee observes that there is a lack of coordination between the Department of Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds and the Executive Council, with respect to the expenditures of R.R. & A. funds, and that the budget appropriated be adhered to.

We recognize that there exists instances of overlapping and duplication of authority in our various state agencies, and that effort should be made in the Fifty-ninth General Assembly, in the interest of economy and efficiency, to correct this situation.

HIGHWAY COMMISSION, IOWA STATE

It is recommended that funds for the widening and improving of the Stange Road underpass of the Chicago and Northwestern Railroad on the campus of Iowa State University be appropriated from the Road Use Tax Fund, and that the Iowa State Highway Commission be charged with the responsibility of completing the project.

REGENTS, BOARD OF

We commend to the consideration of the legislature the proposal of the Board of Regents relative to the broadening of the functions of the Iowa State Teachers College educational program.

In an effort to reduce the time involved in committee hearings and to increase their effectiveness, and to improve communications, we invite the Board of Regents to install their audio-visual aides and devices in a legislative committee room, in order to demonstrate the value of such procedures.

The committee recommends that the Board of Regents proceed with a coordinated system of cost analysis of teaching, research and service. It is felt that this procedure will better enable the members of the legislature to arrive at a more accurate basis for determining appropriation needs.

The committee recommends that the Board of Regents present to the legislature a coordinated long-range plan of financing the construction of classroom, laboratory, office, and other educational structures.

It is recommended that the programs available under the provisions of Chapter 185, Acts of the Fifty-eighth General Assembly, providing for the financing of construction and equipping self-liquidating building projects from earned income and student fees on the campuses of our state-supported institutions of higher education be expanded.

The committee commends to the Board of Regents, and the state-supported institutions of higher education careful study of the efficiencies and economies that may be found in the construction of buildings, by the choice of architects available in each field, and in the consolidation of departmental facilities in larger educational structures. It is the committee's view that the development of the campuses of the Iowa institutions might well include structures which utilize multiple floors, requiring less land, and taking advantage of economies which may be realized in reducing the

costs of utility and other services, as well as other savings in time and convenience in their use.

GENERAL

Governmental agencies should make a study of their licensing and inspection fees, and make such recommendations to the legislature to increase such fees to cover the cost of licensing and inspections.

The work of the committee has been expedited by the excellent cooperation from the various boards and state departments.

The Fifty-eighth General Assembly appropriated \$2,000,000.00 to the Budget and Financial Control Committee for release in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 57, Acts of the Fifty-eighth General Assembly.

On December 31, 1960, the sum of \$386,510.50 remained in this fund.

JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the United States granting representation in the electoral college to the District of Columbia.

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled (two-thirds of each House concurring therein), That the following article is hereby proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution only if ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States within seven years from the date of its submission by the Congress:

"ARTICLE—

"SECTION 1. The District constituting the seat of Government of the United States shall appoint in such manner as the Congress may direct:

"A number of electors of President and Vice President equal to the whole number of Senators and Representatives in Congress to which the District would be entitled if it were a State, but in no event more than the least populous State; they shall be in addition to those appointed by the States, but they shall be considered, for the purposes of the election of President and Vice President, to be electors appointed by a State; and they shall meet in the District and perform such duties as provided by the twelfth article of amendment.

"SEC. 2. The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation".

Lynes of Bremer moved that a committee of four consisting of two members from the Senate and two members from the House be appointed to notify Governor Erbe that the joint convention was ready to receive him.

Motion prevailed and the President appointed as such committee Senator Stuart of Lucas and Senator Long of Delaware, on the part of the Senate, and Representatives Naden of Hamilton and Weichman of Benton on the part of the House.

The committee waited upon Governor Erbe and escorted him to the Speaker's station. President Mooty then presented Governor Erbe, who delivered the following budget address:

**BUDGET MESSAGE TO THE
FIFTY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY**
Honorable Norman A. Erbe, Governor of Iowa

MR. PRESIDENT, MR. SPEAKER, MEMBERS OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:

Chapter Eight of the Code of Iowa requires the Governor to present to the General Assembly a financial program for each year of the ensuing biennium. This message, comprising part one of the Budget, sets forth the present financial condition of the State Treasury, and the proposed fiscal program for the biennium beginning July 1, 1961.

Supplementary materials to be placed in your hands provide a more detailed statement of current and estimated balances in the General Fund of the State, and of recommended appropriations and sources of revenue, in accordance with the requirements set forth in section eight point twenty-two of the Code.

I would like to extend my personal thanks and appreciation to the members of the Budget and Financial Control Committee who generously gave of their time and effort to participate in the budget hearings this past December. The careful consideration and informed questioning by them at these hearings was a significant contribution to a better insight into the operations of our state agencies and departments and their askings.

Special thanks and appreciation are owing to Duane Wicker and the staff of the Office of State Comptroller for their outstanding work and long hours in preparing the way for this budget message.

BASIC CONSIDERATIONS

The welfare of each individual in the State of Iowa is vitally affected by a sound economical state government. It is important to all Iowans that a healthy economic climate be achieved. This means that it is incumbent upon the State Administration to have and to follow a sound fiscal program.

Iowans have traditionally adopted a wise course of living within our income and we must continue to pursue a policy which will preclude deficit financing. This is true not only of the State Government as a unit but also of each subdivision within our government. It is my considered judgment that budgets of state departments and agencies, as fixed by appropriations by you, should be strictly adhered to.

The executive practice previously followed of approving transfers of funds between departments has made a mockery of appropriation and budget limitations and must be stopped. A budget is meaningless if this practice is allowed to persist.

I am presenting to you a balanced budget which does not call for any tax increases. It is my belief that it will be possible to carry out the prevailing sentiment of our Iowa people regarding revenues and tax relief and still move ahead in all essential areas.

It must be kept in mind that only ten states in our nation levy more state and local taxes per \$1,000 of personal income than Iowa. It would seem to me to be imperative to keep the tax structure on a basis that will not strangle the individual initiative of our Iowa citizens.

RECOMMENDED EXPENDITURES

Total expenditures from the general fund of \$378,861,700 are recommended for the biennium beginning July 1, 1961, an average of \$189,430,850 per year.

This total includes investments in capital improvements, state aids to local schools and governments, and expenditures for the operation of state institutions, departments and agencies. It also is inclusive of estimated expenditures under standing limited and unlimited appropriations (such as Agriculture Land Tax Credits, Homestead Tax Credits and Tax Refunds), as well as those outlays requiring specific appropriations by the Fifty-ninth General Assembly.

The major components of average annual expenditures during the current biennium are compared with proposed annual average expenditures during the biennium beginning July 1, 1961, in the table below:

Average annual appropriations for the fifty-eighth biennium, annual askings, and recommended annual appropriations for the fifty-ninth biennium beginning July 1, 1961, are shown in "Exhibit A" of the budget materials. You will note that the items in this exhibit are set up under major groups of related activities.

I should like to discuss, briefly, the major items in the proposed budget.

EDUCATIONAL EXPENDITURES

Annual expenditures of \$92,816,630 are recommended for all types of education. This is an increase of nearly twelve million eight hundred thousand dollars per year over appropriations made by the Fifty-eighth General Assembly. With this proposed increase in expenditures, for educational purposes, state support of education accounts for forty-nine per cent of the total budget during the coming biennium. This, I feel, is where we must place the bulk of our increased spending. The cliché is over-used but it is still applicable that the future of our state depends upon our youth; that future will be bright only if we give our young people the best education possible. We cannot afford to slight either the higher educational institutions, the elementary, or the secondary educational programs. If we fail to provide as much state assistance to education as is humanly possible, we shall be failing the future generations and encouraging outward migration of our youth.

STATE AID FOR EDUCATION

In order to give some measure of property tax relief an increase of almost twenty-five per cent in aid to public schools is recommended over the appropriations of the last biennium. The 1961 fiscal year appropriation amounted to \$24,151,148 as contrasted with the 1962 fiscal year proposal of \$30,131,530. This is an increase of \$5,980,382.

Average annual direct aid of the fifty-eighth biennium was \$590,000 as contrasted with the annual recommendation for the fifty-ninth biennium of \$645,000.

The Agriculture Land Tax Credits payments during the last biennium amounted to \$10,500,000 each year. Under the present law this appropriation paid only 44 per cent of all claims filed on a proportionate basis.

It is my belief that some new formula must be found for payment of the Agriculture Land Tax Credit. Under the present budget that I recommend to you, I suggest payment of all Agriculture Land Tax Credits between 15 and 20 mills in those school districts that levy taxes above 15 mills.

To pay this formula during the two years of the next biennium, I recommend an average appropriation of \$11,250,000. The appropriation recommended calls for an increase of nearly 5 per cent over the present expenditure.

This amount which I recommend to you is not as much as I would like. However, under our present revenues and considering the total state aid to school program, this is as much as may be allocated.

HIGHER EDUCATION

The Fifty-eighth General Assembly appropriated an average \$36,577,822 for salaries, support and maintenance of the educational institutions under the Board of Regents. The annual recommendation for these institutions that is submitted to the Fifty-ninth General Assembly is slightly more than ten per cent above the previous appropriation and totals \$40,373,000. In order to begin a long range building program necessary to meet the demands for capital improvements at our institutions of higher education, I recommend a total of \$20,834,200 for Board of Regents institutions. This is an increase of over twenty-six per cent above the previous appropriations which actually constituted the capital building programs for four years 1956-60.

It should be noted that different recommendations are made for each of the two years in the biennium. This has been done at the request of the Board of Regents. It is my belief that this may well be a procedure that should be followed in all appropriations in the future. It is, however, a poor substitute for annual appropriations made if the General Assembly were to meet each year.

While I regret that it is impossible to grant as much capital improvements as has been requested, I do believe that with this excellent beginning the long range program proposed by the Board of Regents can be completed by 1973. It is vital to the welfare of our educational institutions for the next fifty years that we plan now for the buildings that will be needed for the enrollments of our institutions of higher learning in the last half of this decade and the decade of the seventies. All of us realize that it is impossible under our Constitution and laws for one legislature to bind another, but it is imperative that we assure the Board of Regents of a continuing source of income for capital improvements.

It is my contention that the capital improvements can and must come from the surplus that has been accumulating in our State Treasury. It is not the purpose of government to accumulate a surplus. I do not subscribe to the practice of exacting excessive taxes from the taxpayer so that we may have a surplus in the State Treasury for future use. I do believe we must be on a pay-as-you-go basis on current recurring expenditures but can in good conscience utilize the surplus to "catch up" on our overdue capital improvement programs.

BOARD OF CONTROL INSTITUTIONS

Total annual appropriations of \$24,922,640 are recommended for salary, support and maintenance, and capital improvements at institutions under

the State Board of Control. This is an increase of \$2,689,493 per year over the appropriations during the current biennium. Salaries, support and maintenance accounts for \$21,674,820 of the annual appropriations to the Board of Control, an increase of 10.30 per cent over the present annual rate of appropriations. A careful examination of the recommendations for the fourteen institutions governed by the Board and a comparison with the askings will reveal that the recommendations of the administrative agency have been followed as closely as possible. All of the institutions under the Board are important, particularly those dealing with the problems of our mentally ill. However, I do not believe we should slight one type of institution at the expense of others under the same administrative group.

The sum proposed for capital improvements at Board of Control Institutions is nearly 25.8 per cent greater than that given by the Fifty-eighth General Assembly which again was in reality a four-year capital improvement. Thus, I believe we will be able to make genuine progress toward a realistic building plan.

Although not as essential as in the Board of Regents situation, a long-range program of capital improvements should be established.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY

The last session of the Iowa General Assembly appropriated annually \$4,863,800 for the operation of the Department of Public Safety. My recommendation for this most important agency of state government is 12.6 per cent above this annual appropriation for an annual total of \$5,477,460.

This sum should permit the present programs to continue on a high level. If it is thought necessary to add personnel to the Iowa Highway Patrol, additional money will have to be provided to meet this increased expenditure. An obvious source, should the added personnel be allowed, is to increase the cost of the Iowa Drivers License. This has been utilized in the past but should be carefully studied before action is followed merely because "that's the way it's been done before."

Our Department of Public Safety compares favorably with those of our surrounding states and I believe the proposed recommendations will allow this agency to continue in an excellent comparable position.

ADMINISTRATIVE DEPARTMENTS

An increase of slightly more than eleven per cent above the fifty-eighth biennium is recommended for Administrative Departments of State Government. The appropriation recommended totals \$8,309,285.

It should be noted that this figure amounts to only 4.3 per cent of the total budget. The appropriation should allow most departments to give their employees at least a one step increase in pay during the two-year period.

During the budget hearings, many of the Administrative Departments indicated a desire to create new positions. These new posts have been carefully studied and in most instances they have not been included in my recommended appropriation. It is my belief that only in unusual circumstances should new jobs be allowed during this biennium. I am concerned about the number of administrative personnel that are leaving state employment and believe that two steps should be taken to curb this exodus. First, as suggested in the inaugural message, a civil service system established to assure career opportunities in State Government and, second, salary increases should be authorized to the efficient personnel now employed in State Government.

MISCELLANEOUS STATE AIDS TO LOCAL COMMUNITIES

I am recommending virtually the same appropriation that was made by the Fifty-eighth General Assembly for state aid to the agriculture societies

(county fairs), state soil conservation commission, and the state participation in county mental care activities. The present annual appropriation is \$1,262,500 and I recommend \$1,260,000 for each year of the coming biennium.

HOMESTEAD CREDITS

The Homestead Tax Credit is paid under a standing unlimited appropriation, therefore it is impossible to determine the exact amount that will be disbursed during the coming biennium. The estimate on the basis of recent trends in Homestead Tax Credit claims, for the coming biennium, calls for an expenditure of \$29,165,000 in each year. This is an increase of \$965,000 over the present annual appropriation.

SOCIAL WELFARE DEPARTMENT PROGRAMS

It is recommended that the total appropriations for the State's share of Social Welfare programs be made in the amount of \$18,908,500 per year during the coming biennium. This represents an increase of \$573,000 each year over the current appropriation or an increase of 3.12 per cent. This will allow some adjustments to be made in the present Social Welfare programs. A corollary recommendation concerning the state's participation in the federal program of medical care for our senior citizens is presented elsewhere in this budget message.

MEDICAL CARE FOR THE AGED

In my inaugural message, I indicated my hope that you would give serious consideration to an enabling act that would allow Iowa to participate in the federal program of medical assistance to our senior citizens. You will note that I have not assigned an appropriation for this program. The estimates of the cost to the State of Iowa for participation range from one and one-half million to four million dollars. I would suggest that legislation allowing Iowa to participate provide that the surplus of money procured for payment of the Korean bonus be utilized for the initial phase of participation in the medical care for the aged program. Not only will this appropriation help to discharge our obligation to our senior citizens, but additionally enabling legislation in this field by your body during this session may serve to retard the announced goal of the National Administration to include these benefits within the structure of the Social Security system and the inevitable final result of socialized medicine. Developments in this field will, I believe, be stabilized by 1963 so that the Sixtieth General Assembly may then intelligently provide for a continuing program in this field.

TOTAL NON-EDUCATIONAL STATE AIDS

The recommendations for non-educational forms of state aid to local communities total \$49,333,500. This is an increase of \$1,536,000 over the present appropriations of \$47,797,500. This increase in non-educational aids to local communities accounts for eight and one-half per cent of the total budget increases recommended for the next biennium.

MISCELLANEOUS SERVICES

The sum recommended for miscellaneous services, including State Conservation Commission, Iowa Development Commission, District Court Judges, Iowa State Fair Board, the State Historical Society, Hoover Birthplace Society, National and State Guard, Civil Defense Administration, the Reciprocity Board, and the Mississippi Parkway Planning Commission, totals \$7,172,785. This category no longer contains the Teachers Retirement

Allowance, which has been transferred to the Standing Appropriations. The Conservation Commission recommendation is ten per cent above the amount appropriated by the Fifty-eighth Generally Assembly and represents \$641,850 each year of the total in this category. The increase proposed for the Iowa Development Commission is about twelve and one-half per cent above the current appropriation. The recommended figure is \$287,900, plus \$25,000 for Municipal Planning Assistance. An appropriation of \$942,900 is recommended for the National Guard and State Guard activities. The largest percentage increase is recommended for the Reciprocity Board which received \$30,750 from the Fifty-eighth General Assembly; an appropriation of \$40,470 is recommended to help get this new agency on a firm operating basis.

An eleven per cent increase is recommended for the Iowa State Historical Society bringing their recommended appropriation to \$104,500, while \$12,000 is suggested for the Hoover Birthplace Society.

The District Court Judges appropriation of \$900,665 is relatively inflexible and that total requested is recommended.

TOTAL CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS APPROPRIATIONS

Total capital appropriations of \$29,866,940 are recommended for the fifty-ninth biennium, equivalent to \$14,933,470 for each year. It is my recommendation that this money be appropriated from the Treasury surplus, since it is regarded as a non-recurring appropriation.

Of the total capital appropriations of nearly thirty million dollars for the biennium, \$20,834,200 would be allocated to the Board of Regents Institutions, and \$6,495,640 for improvements at institutions under the Board of Control.

Miscellaneous capital improvements appropriation recommendations total \$2,537,100. This amount includes \$1,960,600 for the Conservation Commission's capital needs, an increase of \$442,950 over that appropriated by the Fifty-eighth General Assembly. A total of \$234,650 is recommended for the State Fair Board, \$226,250 for National Guard Armories and Armory construction and \$115,600 for the capital improvements needed by the Department of Public Buildings and Grounds during the two-year period. These recommendations for the miscellaneous capital improvement appropriations represent a decrease of \$259,300 annually from the appropriations of the current biennium.

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED EXPENDITURES

The budget as submitted is the result of careful analysis of the department and agency requests, as filed with the State Comptroller's Office. Each unit was given full opportunity to explain their requests in the budget hearings held in December.

I am sure that you are aware that the budget requests totaled a great deal more than I have found it possible to recommend. The requests amounted to \$259,821,508, as contrasted with the recommended expenditures of \$189,430,850.

No doubt, in your collective judgment, you will decide to appropriate amounts in some instances greater than recommended and in others less than suggested in the executive's budget. This is your right as the policy making, representative body of our sovereign state. I have presented to you a budget which in my judgment, after many hours of study, will provide for all essential services and a capital program that will help us gain in many areas where we have lagged.

RECOMMENDED SOURCES OF REVENUE

Under existing statutes general revenue appropriable receipts during the next biennium will total \$348,994,760. Of this amount, \$172,298,515 will be received during the first year of the biennium and \$176,696,245 in the second, an average of \$174,497,380. The unencumbered balance June 30, 1961, is estimated at \$45,898,788.37.

It is my belief that the steady growth in revenue will continue during the coming biennium. The estimate figures are computed with a conservative economic growth rate factor of four per cent per year in the four major tax revenue areas, sales, use, individual income and corporation income tax.

This budget is so constructed that the recurring appropriation will be met by the current annual income, thus avoiding deficit spending in the recurring appropriation areas. The proposals for the regular operating expenditures during the biennium are: (1) For current state purposes, \$83,782,350, and (2) Current state aid to local communities, \$90,715,030, for a total of \$174,497,380, which is the equivalent of the average estimated annual current revenue. Capital improvements recommended total an average annually, \$14,933,470.

This amount I recommend be taken from the Treasury balance presently on hand.

If this program outlined is followed, the estimated Treasury balance on June 30, 1963, will be \$16,031,848.37.

I am confident that this program can be carried out, providing the 10 per cent of the sales tax can be transferred to the road use tax in the last three months of each fiscal year. This will allow for a lower working balance than has been previously needed.

Legislation allowing this transfer in the final quarter of each year will be introduced. I urge you to give it favorable consideration.

I have purposely refrained from trying to project an estimate of additional funds available from such sources as more efficient and complete tax collection procedures, consolidation of some of our myriad costly inspection services, centralization of state purchasing procedures, coordination of machine records operations at the seat of government and greater budgetary control by the executive, all of which, in my opinion, will provide for the taxpayer better and more economical government for his tax dollar. I am dedicated to the view that these reforms and changes must be accomplished and I hope to have your support and assistance in those areas where legislation is required.

SUMMARY

The people of our state have been justifiably proud of the great heritage of our forefathers of fiscal conservatism and this has been reflected in past sessions of your body by appropriations based on a pay-as-you-go basis. This has resulted in the sound economy which has made the State of Iowa one of the bright spots in the nation insofar as a stable and healthy fiscal climate is concerned, and, I am sure, has been a persuading influence for the relocation of many of the industries to our state from other areas. I congratulate you for achieving and maintaining this climate.

During the last year in our travels about the state you and I heard from many of our fellow citizens their justified expressions of concern regarding the ever-increasing property tax load which we are carrying. The budget as presented today proposes to provide tax relief in this area. Some will say that it is not enough. To those of our constituents who desire more, I would respond that additional tax relief for property invites the answers to certain questions from our neighbors back home.

1. Have they in the past and will they in the future attend and influence the budget hearings of the local tax levying bodies who in the first instance determine the rate of local property taxes?

2. Do they want more from their government, both state and national, and, most importantly, are they ready and willing to pay higher taxes into government in order to get more from their government?

3. Are they ready to face the challenge of the future by providing better education of our youth and willing now to pay the price in increased taxes?

4. Do they want and will they demand a reversal of this trend toward centralized government and can they continue to afford this monster of state and national government which grows larger with each succeeding year thus placing a heavier tax burden on our people?

5. Do they still believe that government was created by them to do only those things which they could not do themselves, or are we to become a welfare state looking to government for all our needs and paying the inevitable high price for those things which we receive?

6. Do they want a reduction in the number of state boards, commissions and agencies with a resultant lower cost or are they apathetic about the use of their tax dollar?

7. Is our state to be the master of our people with our every move controlled and directed by government or shall government be the servant of man, held in check and controlled by him?

My friends, all of Iowa looks to you during this session of the legislature to determine the answers to these questions. Simple arithmetic clearly shows that existing revenues and taxes will provide the program of appropriations which I have outlined. The burden now rests with our constituents to tell you whether this is adequate and, if it is not, whether they are ready and willing to pay the price for more. I hope and pray that they will call upon you, counsel with you and advise you and that you will be guided by their views in reaching your conclusions.

Wier of Louisa presented a petition signed by thirty-four residents of Lyon County opposing House File 117 and Senate File 6.

REPORT OF PUBLIC ASSISTANCE STUDY COMMITTEE TO THE MEMBERS OF THE FIFTY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY

January 1961

ORGANIZATION

The Fifty-eighth General Assembly by Joint Resolution 3 created a joint bipartisan committee to study public assistance in this state, and to make a written report and recommendations to the Fifty-ninth General Assembly.

The committee has been composed of six members from the House of Representatives and six members from the Senate; three Republicans and three Democrats from each chamber. After the initial organizational meeting, the committee was composed as follows:

Mrs Winfred Dalrymple was employed as secretary by the committee and took minutes of all meetings. These have been retained and are available for study by the members of the Fifty-ninth General Assembly. As a result of the information received, the following summaries and recommendations are made.

WELFARE PROGRAMS OF IOWA

Following is a brief explanation of the welfare programs in Iowa:

Categorical Relief

Aid to Dependent Children, Aid to the Blind, Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, Old Age Assistance are welfare programs that are supported by funds from the federal, state, and county government. These are commonly called the categorical relief programs. Although the contributions to the programs vary, they are approximately on the following basis: The federal government contributes 50 per cent and the state and county government, 25 per cent each.

These programs in accordance with the Social Security Act are administered by the State Department of Social Welfare. These programs must be administered according to broad rules and regulation promulgated by the Social Security office. Failure to comply with these basic requirements by the federal government can result in the State of Iowa being deprived of federal matching funds.

On the local level, these programs are directed by the the county board of social welfare "with only such powers and duties as are prescribed in the laws relating thereto" (Section 234.11, 1958 Code of Iowa). This means that the local welfare boards must comply with the rules and regulations of the Social Security Board as well as the State Board of Social Welfare and do not have a free hand in administering these funds.

These programs are actually under the supervision of the director of social welfare who is employed by the county board of social welfare. The competency of all employees in the office of the director of social welfare, other than clerical or stenographic, is subject to review by the State Board of Social Welfare. The director of social welfare and his employees interview and investigate all applicants and those who are on the categorical relief roles.

Applicants for categorical relief cannot be summarily denied relief by the director or his staff or the county board of social welfare. They have the opportunity to appeal to the State Board of Social Welfare. If they are denied by the State Board, they may appeal to the proper District Court of the State of Iowa, with the exception of Aid to the Blind applicants.

In addition to the programs heretofore mentioned, there are two other programs administered by the State Board of Social Welfare. They are Emergency Relief and Child Welfare. These programs are not direct aid programs; that is, they do not have recipients on their roles receiving aid.

Under Chapter 235 of the 1958 Code of Iowa, the State Department of Social Welfare is given many responsibilities and duties regarding the welfare of children in Iowa. These range from providing child welfare workers in the various counties; cooperating with the various other state agencies concerned with child welfare, i.e., juvenile court, probation office and the State Board of Control; and approve, supervise and inspect the various public and private institutions for the care of dependent, neglected and delinquent children.

The duties of the State Board of Social Welfare relating to Emergency Relief are established in Chapter 251 of the 1958 Code of Iowa. Emergency Relief is as its name implies. The fund appropriated for this welfare program is primarily a revolving fund.

County Relief

For want of a better name, the remaining public welfare programs shall be classified as county relief. All funds for this relief come from the county. The programs are "Support of the Poor," as established by Chapter 252 of the Code of Iowa, and "Relief for Soldiers, Sailors, and Marines," as established by Chapter 250 of the Code of Iowa.

These programs are directly under the control of the board of supervisors. Since only county money is expended, the State Board of Social Welfare has no control over the disbursement of these funds. The office of the overseer of the poor administers the county poor relief fund. Relief may be in the form of clothing, fuel, etc., or in the form of money. This differs from the categorical relief programs in which all relief is in money except medical assistance. The fact that this is a county program means that an applicant has recourse only to the county board of supervisors if his request for relief is denied.

It should be stated that Chapter 182 of the Acts of the Fifty-eighth General Assembly modified the residence requirements for this type of aid and, in analyzing this program, members of the Fifty-ninth General Assembly should refer to it.

Soldiers' and sailors' relief is administered by a three-man relief commission, all of whom must be veterans. In most counties an executive secretary is appointed who actually directs the program. The county board of supervisors appoints the members of the commission who are responsible to the board.

The relief supplied, as in poor relief, can be either in money or fuel, food, clothing, etc. As the name of the program implies, only veterans are eligible. In addition to the normal welfare activities, the commission is responsible to provide data required by the bonus board and maintain graves for veterans if such be demanded of them.

The office of the overseer of the poor may be combined with that of the director of social welfare at the option of the board of supervisors. This creates what is called an integrated county since the county welfare functions, i.e., poor relief, are integrated with the categorical relief programs in one office. This does not change the authority of either the State Board of Social Welfare or the county board of supervisors or their control over the respective funds. It merely allows the director of social welfare and his staff to administer both programs.

Section 250.12 of the Code of Iowa prohibits the combining of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Relief Commission with any other relief agency. Therefore, even in the integrated counties there exists two welfare offices. In the non-integrated counties, there are three welfare offices, separate and distinct from the other: the Overseer of the Poor, the director of Soldiers' and Sailors' Relief, and the director of Social Welfare.

Purpose

The State of Iowa is dispensing approximately \$58 million annually in federal, state and county funds for welfare purposes. These expenditures are continually growing and constitute one the greatest burdens on the taxpayers of this state.

The Fifty-eighth General Assembly, being aware of the growing criticism of the welfare programs throughout the State of Iowa, authorized this committee to inquire into the validity of the various welfare programs in effect in this state, and to determine whether changes are needed to insure maximum benefit of the welfare dollar expended in this state. To accomplish this purpose, meetings were held in all sections of the state, in counties of various sizes, and all welfare agencies, both public and private, and all individuals and organizations interested were heard upon request. The committee also met with the Board of Social Welfare and a representative of the Social Security Commission in an attempt to more clearly understand the various programs.

As a result of these hearings, the following summaries and recommendations are made.

AID TO DEPENDENT CHILDREN

I

It is the opinion of the committee that basically there are enough statutes now on the books of the State of Iowa to prevent fraud and deceit on the part of ADC recipients, but that a failure of law enforcement agencies to adequately prosecute the cases has resulted in a breakdown of collection of the welfare payments from responsible parents and the failure to

prosecute cases of fraud. In order to overcome this failure, the committee recommends the following steps be taken:

A. It shall be the duty and responsibility of the Attorney General to file Informations in the various counties where welfare support cases and fraud cases are not adequately prosecuted by the local county attorney. It is the feeling of the committee that this would encourage the local county attorney to be more diligent in this area of law enforcement.

II

The committee found that in some instances the recipients of ADC have failed to manage their funds properly, and therefore the money supplied to the recipient is not being used for the benefit of the children as is the intention of the program. The committee recommends the following steps be taken:

A. That provisions be inserted in the Iowa law for a compulsory guardianship in cases where there was mismanagement of the welfare funds by individual recipients. The Iowa law now allows the guardian to be appointed under Section 239.5 of the 1958 Code of Iowa, but the appointment of such guardianship is not mandatory.

B. That there be regularity and close supervision by case workers in calling on ADC recipients.

C. That the local welfare workers should encourage the ADC recipient to avail himself of educational programs in the community to prepare the recipient to support himself at such time as he would be removed from the ADC roll. This program would be particularly advantageous when a mother was removed from the ADC roll due to the fact that her children became self-supporting, left home, or reached the age of 18 years. It was also suggested that the children on ADC that were not receiving their formal education should be encouraged to enter into some type of vocational training. It was hoped this would greatly reduce the number of second generation ADC recipients.

D. It was suggested that a member of the Board of Trustees of a township act in an advisory capacity to the Board of Social Welfare in determining the eligibility of prospective recipients. It was the consensus that the local Trustee would be more aware of the circumstances surrounding the applicant's financial status.

III

The amount of an ADC grant has been too small which has caused the recipient to live at a substandard level and encourage recipients to violate some of the departmental regulations. The grant of an ADC recipient is computed as follows: The State Department of Social Welfare, using a 1950 price schedule, determines the amount of money necessary for the minimum daily requirements of children of various age groups and for adults to live in Iowa. An ADC family grant is then computed by adding the grant of each member of the family. However, due to the shortage of funds, the recipients are paid only 85 per cent of this amount. In accordance with federal regulations, the recipient is allowed 100 per cent of his minimum daily requirements. An Iowa ADC recipient is allowed to earn the difference between 100 per cent of minimum daily requirements and the amount of his grant. Therefore, an Iowa recipient can earn up to 15 per cent of his minimum daily requirements without having it deducted from his grant.

A. The committee suggests that the Fifty-ninth General Assembly increase the appropriation for the ADC program in order to pay the recipient a higher percentage of his minimum daily requirements based on 1960 prices.

B. The committee feels that the recipient should be allowed to earn more

than 100 per cent of his minimum daily requirements without having it deducted from his grant. It is also suggested that the State Department of Social Welfare base its requirements on 1960 prices.

C. The committee recommends the enactment of legislation making it a misdemeanor if a recipient of welfare fails to provide law enforcement agencies with information, within his knowledge, necessary to prosecute those responsible for the support of the recipient.

D. In event that these suggestions conflict with federal laws or regulations which would deny Iowa participation in the program, it was recommended that the Fifty-ninth General Assembly pass a resolution urging Congress to change the federal regulation to allow enactment of such legislation.

OLD AGE ASSISTANCE

I

County Homes

The subcommittee studying county homes found that every county home operation is different. The cost per person ranges from \$1.25 per week to \$15.00 per week depending on the size of the county farm and the number of people in the home. Some homes are well equipped and provide excellent care for their poor and mental patients. The corrections must be made at the local level. The committee does not feel it is possible to recommend any set of standards for county homes. The committee feels that it would be advantageous for them to survey their needs in the line of capital improvements to the extent that they could be licensed for custodial care and provide wards for mental patients that could be cared for in the county home, thereby reducing the county's expense of care at the state institutions. The committee is of the opinion that county homes licensed for custodial care could serve the state better, being able to keep OA recipients in the county home, making use of the facilities to the approximate capacity of the county home.

II

Private Nursing Homes

A. It is the suggestion of the committee that nursing homes receive the grant of OA recipients in their home direct on a vendor payment basis rather than sending each recipient his individual check. The personal grant of each recipient would still be paid individually, however. The committee felt that often it was difficult for the nursing home operators to obtain the signatures on the check of some of the older and sometimes senile recipients.

B. The committee suggests that action should be taken through legislation or by the Board of Social Welfare to encourage unlicensed nursing homes to become licensed. This could be accomplished by—

1. Requiring an old age recipient to live in a licensed home whenever space was available in the locality, or
2. Reducing the grant to old age recipients who are living in an unlicensed home.

III

Responsibility of Children

A. It was suggested that the State Department of Social Welfare should investigate the possibility of paying OA recipients' grants in full even where there are responsible children and having the state collect the money due from the children. The Board of Social Welfare reported to the committee that this would greatly increase the administrative costs. If it is found to be too expensive, this suggestion could be ignored.

ADMINISTRATION

The committee found that there is some overlapping and duplication in administering the various welfare programs in Iowa. In some counties administrative costs of the local offices were exceedingly high. Consideration should be given to integrating all welfare agencies into one office to reduce the costs of administration and to expedite the handling of cases.

SUPPLEMENTAL REPORT OF STATE REPRESENTATIVE
ROBERT FULTON, MEMBER OF PUBLIC ASSISTANCE
STUDY COMMITTEE

PURPOSE

This report is not intended as a criticism of the report by the committee, but as a supplement to that report. The committee in their report made only the most general recommendations as to administrative changes needed to improve the public welfare program in Iowa. As it is the writer's opinion that this is the area in which the most can be accomplished, it appeared necessary to prepare this supplementary report.

GENERAL IMPRESSIONS

Before recommending specific action to be taken by the Fifty-ninth General Assembly, it would seem logical to set forth the general impressions upon which these various recommendations are based.

The categorical assistance programs, as defined by the report of the committee, are continually criticized for being the cause of various ills of our society. The ADC program receives the bulk of these complaints. However, it appeared that there was little foundation to the often repeated accusation of wholesale fraud by recipients on ADC. This is not to say that there is no basis whatsoever to the extended criticism. However, as is often the case, those who criticize only recognize the effect and are oblivious to the cause.

The very fact that a family unit is on ADC is indicative that the family has recently been subjected to some abnormal situation. Whether the cause be divorce, death or injury of the wage earner, or an illegitimate birth, the family has suffered a hardship that involves more than financial difficulties.

The answer supplied by the welfare office is almost invariably to place the family on the rolls, as it should be, with little time or effort expended on the situation that has caused the family to apply for the assistance. The failure to cope with the underlying cause is not due to lack of effort by the social worker, but due to extreme case loads of the individual workers and the administrative procedure on the local level, that often discourages the applicant from availing himself of the appropriate service.

An additional factor those critical of the program overlook is that even though the categorical relief program only seems to be perpetuating a bad situation, it is the best solution to a difficult problem.

From a cost analysis alone, supporting children on ADC is far less expensive to the taxpayer than either foster home care or institutional care. Add to this factor the advantage of keeping the family together and the fact that often there are not foster homes or institutional space available, and the reason for granting of the categorical assistance is apparent. The question is resolved to supporting the family on ADC or allowing the children to go hungry. When asked in this light, there can be only one answer.

This is not to infer that at least partial solutions are not available. However, these solutions include some radical changes in the present administrative organization that will be ardently opposed by those directly affected. These solutions would also call for a careful study of the entire health and welfare field by a professional agency in order to accomplish the desired end and the passage of a massive amount of legislation that would actually be a complete recodification of the laws of Iowa in this field.

The following suggestions are to alleviate the problems in the public welfare field. These suggestions are based upon the premise that the impressions of the program set out above have some validity. If the various assistance programs are the cause of many of the problems of society, as many would have us believe, rather than an effect of these problems, then these suggestions are valueless. Otherwise, these suggestions may, if implemented, change the basic character of our assistance programs from that of a remedial program to a preventive one.

STATE ADMINISTRATION

It is impossible for an individual, even after intensive study, to suggest any possible reorganization of the State Department of Social Welfare. The initial problem is that the problem transcends the State Department of Social Welfare and includes many other state departments. Charts which are on file in the Iowa Legislative Research Bureau show the basic organization of Health, Education and Welfare in Iowa at the present. These tables indicate the multiplicity of boards and agencies that are dealing with this problem in Iowa. It is also apparent that each is autonomous of the other regardless of the amount of cooperation required between the agencies. The functions of the various boards and agencies have grown over the years and have never been subjected to a reorganizational plan instituted by the legislature.

It would seem to logically follow that it would be impossible for the Fifty-ninth General Assembly, with the aid of the Legislative Research Bureau, to draft the legislation necessary for such a reorganization of Public Welfare. The members of the legislature have far too many responsibilities in the short bi-annual sessions to undertake a problem of such magnitude. It is therefore the suggestion of this report that the Fifty-ninth General Assembly adopt a general government reorganization plan similar to that passed by the House of Representatives of the Fifty-eighth General Assembly and referred to as House File 630. It would then be the suggestion that the Governor of Iowa, in accordance with the provisions of this legislation, have a comprehensive study of the field of Health, Education and Welfare in the State of Iowa by professional personnel, and submit their recommendations to the Sixtieth General Assembly in bill form.

If the preceding suggestion is not adopted by the Fifty-ninth General Assembly, I would then suggest the following steps be taken to improve the administration of Social Welfare:

1. Repeal Chapter 250.12 of the 1958 Code of Iowa entitled Soldiers, Sailors and Marine Relief and integrate the duties of this office with those of the office of general relief.

2. Make it mandatory that all counties integrate their welfare programs with the State Department of Social Welfare as is allowed by Section 234.12 of the Code of Iowa.

3. Remove all county residential requirements but retain the state residential requirements.

4. Pass permissive legislation allowing counties to combine the Social

Welfare offices under a single director and thereby be able to employ qualified personnel that a single county could not.

5. Appropriate enough money to pay trained social workers an amount commensurate with their training and education. This would also allow the Department of Social Welfare to compete for qualified personnel with the Board of Control, the private welfare agencies and our sister states.

The implementation of the first two suggestions would alleviate useless duplication of effort and costs that now exist. These suggestions would not lessen local control, but would merely place the administration of the direct relief and categorical assistance programs within one office. The additional administrative costs incurred by the three separate offices only adds to expenses and lessens the value of the service supplied the recipient.

Suggestion is based on the belief that the State of Iowa is an entirety and not separate sovereignties. Little is gained by shipping records back and forth between counties as required by the present law and only adds to administrative problems and again weakens service to the individual. Suggestion number four would simply allow the residents of the various counties, in their own discretion, to combine some or all of their welfare function to save on costs and improve service.

The last suggestion would be paying those who administer the program a salary commensurate with their responsibility. This would allow the State of Iowa to retain the welfare workers, trained at the expense of the State of Iowa, for more than the two-year mandatory period.

It is the opinion of this report that if the suggestions contained herein are implemented along with the suggestions of the report of the whole study committee, the public welfare program in the State of Iowa will be greatly strengthened.

The report shall contain full information as to the number of pupils who participated in the course and the number of students who received passing grades. The names of students for whom reimbursement is claimed shall be retained in the school records and shall be available to law-enforcement officers."

"When a township or county has complied with all of the above provisions of this section every owner of breeding cattle in said township or county shall confine his cattle in a proper place so that examination and test can be applied. Official calfhood vaccinated cattle under thirty (30) months of age shall be exempted from said test. An owner may be granted one hundred

twenty (20) days to prepare for test, but such cattle shall be quarantined. During the period of such quarantine, the owner may obtain a special permit for the sale or slaughter of any of said cattle.

"When eighty-five (85) per cent of the counties have presented petitions and the same have been accepted by the department, including all petitions that have been presented and accepted by the department prior to, on or subsequent to July 4, 1961, it shall become compulsory upon the entire state, and all counties therein shall be area-test counties and shall comply with laws and regulations governing area-test counties.

"Nothing contained in this section shall apply to those exceptions listed in section one hundred sixty-four point eleven (164.11)."

Sec. 4. Chapter one hundred sixty-four (164), Code 1958, is hereby amended by adding the following section:

"Any person found guilty of violating the provisions of this chapter shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and punished by a fine not to exceed one hundred (100) dollars nor less than twenty-five (25) dollars, and the department shall quarantine said person's cattle to prohibit the sale or transfer of said cattle until said person shall have complied with this chapter."

Fischer of Grundy offered, from the floor, the following amendment to the Walter amendment and moved its adoption:

2. The secretary of state shall at state expense furnish blank nomination papers to any qualified elector who desires to petition for the nomination of any candidate or to any person who intends to be a candidate for the office of state board member.

3. Each nominee shall secure from each county of the state board district the number of signatures equal to two per cent (2%) of the qualified voters voting in the preceding regular school election in that county. Such papers must be filed with the proper number of signatures 30 days prior to the second Monday in September.

4. The secretary of state shall certify to the school districts within the state board districts the name of the qualified nominees of that district who shall cause the same to be printed on the ballot to be voted upon at the regular school election.

5. The secretary of the various school districts shall certify to the secretary of state the results of said election within their district and the secretary of state shall, after canvassing the vote of the district, issue a certificate of election to the candidate having the most number of votes.

6. Further amend the title to House File 117 to read as follows: An Act relating to the method of election of the state board of public instruction."

President Mooty announced the arrival of Governor Norman A. Erbe and the Honorable Fred Schwengel in the House chamber.

On a bright November afternoon when the autumn leaves were tinged with a thousand hues of beauty, upon an eminence in the midst of a great plain bounded by lofty mountains, I saw a vast concourse of men and women. I saw among them illustrious warriors, gifted poets, profound statesmen. I saw ambassadors of mighty empires, governors of great commonwealths, ministers of cabinets, men of high position and power. I saw in the midst of that vast assemblage a man of sober but serene significance.

When he essayed to speak, such solemn silence reigned as when within consecrated halls men come into the presence of divine Deity. Each sentence slowly but earnestly pronounced sank into every patriotic heart, gave a strange luster to every eye and nerved every arm. In those utterances, the abstract, the condensation, the summing up of American patriotism were contained the hopes, the aspirations, the stern resolves, the consecration, the dedication upon the altar of humanity of a great people. From the time of that solemn dedication the final triumph of the loyal host was assured.

As the Christian day by day repeats the solemn words of prayer given to

him by his Saviour, so shall the American patriot continue to repeat those inspired sentences. While the Republic lives, he will continue to repeat them and while realizing the solemn consecration, he continues to repeat them, the Republic will live.

The Speaker presented the Honorable Paul W. Knowles who played his guitar and sang three folk songs of Lincoln's day from Carl Sandburg's "Song Bag."

President Mooty presented to the joint convention Governor Norman Erbe and the Honorable Fred Schwengel.

The Honorable Fred Schwengel addressed the joint convention on "Life of Abraham Lincoln."

President Mooty expressed the appreciation of the legislature to all who participated in the Lincoln Memorial Service.

Chalupa of Jefferson offered the following amendment filed by him:

Amend House Joint Resolution 20 by striking all after the resolving clause and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"Section 1. The following amendment to the constitution of the State of Iowa is hereby proposed:

1. Section six (6) of article three (III), section thirty-four (34) of article three (III) as amended in 1904 and 1928, sections thirty-five (35) and thirty-six (36) of article three (III) as amended in 1904, and section thirty-seven (37) of article three (III) are hereby repealed and the following proposed in lieu thereof:

'Section 6. Senatorial districts shall be formed by two counties with adjacent boundaries and as nearly equal in population as possible to form a senatorial district. The senatorial district shall be established by law at the first regular session of the General Assembly held after adoption of this amendment and not oftener than once in each ten-year period thereafter. The terms of all senators elected prior to the effective date of this amendment shall terminate on December 31, 1966. In the 1966 general election, the senators representing the odd-numbered districts listed in the amendment shall be elected for four-year terms and the senators representing the even-numbered districts shall be elected for two-year terms. Thereafter, all shall be elected for four-year terms.

'Section 34. It shall be the duty of the General Assembly to number the senatorial districts and if there should be any odd number of counties, the largest county in square miles, as determined by the latest preceding decennial national census, shall be declared a single senatorial district.

'Section 35. The House of Representatives shall consist of members elected at each general election and apportioned in the following manner: The ratio of representation shall be the whole number of inhabitants of the state, as shown by the latest preceding decennial national census, divided by the fraction of one-one hundredth (1/100). Each county having a population factor greater than one-one hundredth (1/100) or multiple thereof consisting of $\frac{3}{4}$ of a factor shall have an additional subdistrict. Each county having a population equal to one (1) ratio or less shall elect one (1) representative and each county shall elect one (1) additional representative for each full ratio above one (1) or $\frac{3}{4}$ additional ratio. On the taking of each decennial census of the United States the Secretary of State shall certify, to the next succeeding regular General Assembly and to the Supreme Court, the official whole number of inhabitants of the state and the population of each county.

'Section 36. Upon receipt by the Supreme Court of the official certification by the Secretary of State of the population of the state and counties after each decennial national census, the Supreme Court shall appoint, in each county entitled to more than one (1) representative, a commission of three (3) resident members, one (1) of whom shall be a senior member of the district court in and for such county, which commission shall divide such county into representative subdistricts of contiguous territory, as compact and nearly equal in population as may be, in each of which one (1) representative shall be elected at the succeeding general election.

1. Subdistrict lines shall conform to township and voting district boundaries.

'Section 37. When a congressional district shall be composed, it shall not be entirely separated by any county belonging to another district, and no county shall be divided."

Sec. 2. The foregoing proposed amendment is hereby referred to the general assembly to be chosen at the next general election for members of the general assembly and if approved such amendment shall be submitted to the people at the 1964 general election, and the secretary of state shall cause the same to be published for three consecutive months previous to the date of said election as provided by law.

Chalupa of Jefferson asked and received unanimous consent to withdraw his amendment.

Knowles of Scott offered the following amendment filed by him :

Amend House Joint Resolution 20 as follows:

1. By striking all after line two (2) of section one (1) and substituting in lieu thereof the following:

1. The amendment to section thirty-four (34) of Article Three (III) of the constitution of the State of Iowa adopted in the year 1928 is hereby repealed.

2. Section thirty-seven (37) of Article Three (III) of the constitution of the State of Iowa is hereby repealed and the following adopted in lieu thereof:

"When a congressional or senatorial district shall be composed of two (2) or more counties, it shall not be entirely separated by any county belonging to another district, and no county shall be divided in forming a congressional district."

Knowles of Scott asked and received unanimous consent to withdraw his amendment.

Smith of O'Brien moved that the joint resolution be read a last time now and placed upon its passage which motion prevailed and the resolution was read a last time.

House Joint Resolution 20, a joint resolution proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Iowa relating to the composition of the general assembly, the basis of representation of the members thereof, and to amend such Constitution by repeal of section six (6), article three (III) thereof, section thirty-four (34) of such article three (III) thereof and the 1904 and 1928 amendments thereto, sections thirty-five (35) and thirty-six (36) of such article three (III), and the 1904 amendment to each such section, and section thirty-seven (37) of said article three (III), and proposing substitutes in lieu thereof.

Be It Resolved by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa:

Section 1. The following amendment to the constitution of the State of Iowa is hereby proposed:

1. Section six (6) of article three (III), section thirty-four (34) of article three (III) and the 1904 and 1928 amendments thereto, sections thirty-five (35) and thirty-six (36) of article three (III) and the 1904 amendment to each such section, and section thirty-seven (37) of article three (III) are hereby repealed and the following proposed in lieu thereof:

"Section 6. The senate shall consist of fifty-six (56) senators, one (1) senator elected from each senatorial district. For each redistricting, changed senatorial districts shall be so classified by lot by the redistricting authority so that as nearly as possible one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) of the senators shall be elected every two (2) years.

"However, if a senatorial district is reduced in size and no new territory is added to it, and the incumbent senator resides in the district of reduced size, he shall be permitted to complete the term for which he was elected, and the senatorial district shall remain in the same class of districts.

"The redistricting authority shall provide in its redistricting law or court order for the cutting short of terms of senators, where necessary. Any senator whose term is cut short by redistricting shall not be compensated for the uncompleted part of his term.

"Section 34. The house of representatives shall consist of ninety-nine (99) members, one (1) elected from each county as county lines existed on January 1, 1961.

"Section 35. Senatorial districts shall meet the following requirements:

1. Each shall have a population as nearly equal as possible to every other district, as shown by the most recent decennial United States census.

2. Each shall consist of compact and contiguous territory; areas joined only at the point of a corner shall not be regarded as contiguous.

3. A county shall be divided only if it is entitled to more than one (1) district, and senatorial district lines shall conform to township and voting district boundaries.

"Section 36. In the year nineteen hundred sixty-five (1965) and in the year ending in three (3) of each decade thereafter the senatorial districts shall be redistricted by the general assembly in a single legislative enactment by May one (1) of such year, which redistricting shall be final until the next regular redistricting period.

"If the general assembly fails to redistrict within the time allotted, the supreme court shall redistrict by October one (1) of such year. The action of the court shall be entered and certified to the secretary of state by court order, which shall be final until the next regular redistricting period.

"Redistricting shall take effect beginning for the nomination and election of members of the general assembly for the next regular session of the general assembly following the adoption of the redistricting law or court order.

"Section 37. When a congressional or senatorial district shall be composed of two (2) or more counties, it shall not be entirely separated by any county belonging to another district, and no county shall be divided in forming a congressional district."

Sec. 2. The foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of Iowa is hereby referred to the legislature to be chosen at the next general election, and the secretary of state is directed to cause the same to be published as provided by law for three (3) months previous to the time of making such choice.

EXPLANATION

My amendment to House Joint Resolution 5, filed on February 10, 1961, was withdrawn because the amendment does not appear to be necessary. If the people vote for a constitutional convention, and if the General Assembly fails to provide for the election of delegates, the Supreme Court of Iowa already has the power and, in my opinion, the duty to provide for the election of delegates.

The Supreme Court of Iowa has already stated, in a 1936 opinion, that this is a mandatory duty of the legislature.

If the legislature violates the Constitution by refusing to perform this mandatory duty, surely the Supreme Court of Iowa has power to provide for an adequate remedy so that the will of the people cannot be overruled by legislative inaction.

**REPORT OF THE IOWA LEGISLATIVE ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON THE STUDY OF THE NEEDS OF HIGHER EDUCATION IN IOWA TO THE MEMBERS OF THE FIFTY-NINTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY
JANUARY, 1961**

The 1959 Legislature appropriated \$25,000 to the Legislative Research Bureau to make a comprehensive study of the needs of higher education in Iowa. The legislature intended that this study should apply to the private college of Iowa as well as the public institutions, including the junior colleges.

We members of the legislative advisory committee were appointed to assist the Legislative Research Bureau in making this study. Our appointment was authorized by the Legislative Research Committee because of the importance of this survey. Our job has been to advise Mr. Ringgenberg, Director of the Research Bureau, in planning this study and in employing a

consultant to make the survey and to follow the progress of the study. The following paragraphs outline our activity and those of the Research Bureau in getting this survey completed. We have also made suggestions of ways we think the legislature can make best use of results of the survey.

Advisory Committee of Educators

In the summer of 1959, Mr. Ringgenberg chose three persons, one from the state schools, one from the private colleges and one from the junior colleges to advise the committee and Research Bureau on this study. These men were: Dr. Dean Zenor, Institute of Public Affairs, State University of Iowa; Dr. A. O. Davidson, Vice-President, Luther College, Decorah; and Mr. Paul Sharar, Dean, Clinton Junior College. We on the legislative advisory committee want to express our thanks to these men for their suggestions and other assistance.

Subjects Which Were Studied

This study was assigned to the Legislative Research Bureau two years ago after efforts to appropriate a substantially larger amount of money to the Iowa Study Committee on Higher Education for such a study failed. That committee is comprised of 13 members, representing the private colleges, the three state schools, the junior colleges, the State Board of Regents, and the State Board of Public Instruction. It was established in the fall of 1955 in recognition of the problems which would be facing higher education in Iowa the next 10 to 15 years. Its purpose is to provide a means for studying jointly some of the matters and problems of common interest to the public and private colleges. Mr. David Cassat, member of the board of trustees of the University of Dubuque, is chairman of the committee.

This committee has made several studies relating to higher education in Iowa; these have been financed by assessments on each college of ten cents per student. We on the legislative advisory committee requested that the Research Bureau work closely with the Study Committee on Higher Education to take advantage of the knowledge and experience of the members of that committee and to avoid any duplication of effort.

Most states have been or are making surveys of their colleges. The advisory committees and Mr. Ringgenberg studied the reports of some of these states. At the outset, one conclusion we reached was that there was not enough money available to make as comprehensive a survey as many of these states have made. Therefore we agreed that our survey would have to be limited to several basic topics relating to higher educational policy. These, we hoped, would provide some basic information and ideas for the legislature, the Board of Regents, the boards of trustees of our private colleges, our public and private junior colleges, and our college presidents to use in making their plans and decisions for the decade ahead. We believed also that these studies would provide a basis for future studies which need to be made.

From a listing of some 25 possible subjects for study submitted to the committee by the Legislative Research Bureau, we chose eight which seemed most important to us. These were:

1. Facilities of Public and Private Colleges and Use of These Facilities.
2. Predictions of Increased Enrollments, the Implications of These Enrollments, and the Needs of Our Higher Educational System to Take Care of These Enrollments.
3. What Are the Needs for Education Beyond the High School in Iowa? Does Our Present Educational System and Training Facilities (Public and Private) Take Care of These Needs? This would include vocational or technical schooling beyond the high school.

4. How Well are Our High School Graduates Prepared for College Work or Other Post High School Education or Training?

5. The Role of the Junior Colleges: What Is This Role Now? What Kind of a Job Are they Doing? What Should Be Their Role in Helping to Meet Future Educational Needs?

6. Inventory of the Problems Iowa Can Expect From Increasing Enrollments? What Research Has Been Done, and What Steps Have Been Taken to Deal With These Problems?

7. Study of the Financing of Education Beyond the High School in Iowa. This would be comprehensive survey of revenues and costs, especially of public schools, and would deal with such matters as methods of financing increasing enrollments.

8. Training, Recruiting, Keeping and Utilization of Faculty.

We discussed these possibilities for study with two persons. One was Dr. Robert Keller, Professor of Higher Education at the University of Minnesota, who at that time was in charge of a comprehensive survey of the entire educational system of Kansas. The other person was Dr. Ernest Hollis, Director of College and University Administration, U. S. Office of Education. His office has made surveys of higher education in a number of states. These two consultants estimated that it would cost \$40,000 to \$45,000 to hire a person or agency to study the three subjects we were most interested in: (1) facilities, (2) enrollments, and (3) the needs for education beyond the high school in Iowa.

It was decided to go ahead with the three studies mentioned in the previous paragraph, to employ a consultant in higher education from outside Iowa to make the survey, and to try to get additional funds so that the three studies could be completed. An attempt was made, unsuccessfully to finance a part of the needs study from money allotted to Iowa under the Federal Defense Education Act. The Department of Public Instruction was very helpful in trying to get this money assigned to this study.

Rather than to hold up the study, we employed Dr. Raymond Gibson, Professor of Higher Education at Indiana University, in November, 1959, to direct this survey. The contract with him required him to make: 1. A prediction of Iowa college enrollments to 1970, 2. An analysis of the educational program, faculties, costs, and a general analysis of facilities of the public and private colleges in Iowa, 3. A study of manpower needs in Iowa in occupations requiring education beyond the high school, particularly terminal education and whether Iowa's present educational system meets these needs, 4. An analysis of the Iowa junior colleges. The Budget and Financial Control Committee then allocated \$5,000 additional for this survey so that it could be completed as planned. Dr. Gibson agreed to carry on this study at a policy-making level so that the results of this survey would be particularly useful to the legislature and boards of trustees of our public and private colleges.

Because of the shortage of money and because there was some doubt about the usefulness of the results of such a survey, a detailed analysis of the facilities, and their use, of the colleges was not made.

Method Used in Making the Survey

As part of the research for the survey, Dr. Gibson visited the campus of every private and public college in the state. In addition he obtained statistical information on enrollments, faculties, and facilities from each school. A member of Dr. Gibson's survey team visited each junior college in the state. In addition Dr. Gibson met with the Iowa College Presidents' Association and the Iowa Study Committee on Higher Education several

times. From these personal contacts and the information sent to him, Dr. Gibson evaluated Iowa's public and private colleges and junior colleges.

On the manpower study, Dr. Gibson sought the advice and assistance of many individuals and groups in Iowa. He and members of his survey team prepared a questionnaire which was reviewed and criticized by several persons in Iowa before it was used. This questionnaire was sent to about 4,000 Iowans who are in occupations which more than likely require some type of education beyond the high school. In addition, 2,000 questionnaires were sent to leaders of the state in industry, business, agriculture, and education. With the fine assistance of interested groups in the state, the questionnaire was sent to persons in every county.

A good response to the questionnaire produced 3,652 answers. Through the questionnaire Dr. Gibson was able to get the views of these Iowans about the needs of our system of higher education and the needs of our youth and certain adults for various types of education beyond the high school. This information, along with the results of interviews with Iowans concerning the manpower needs of Iowa, enabled Dr. Gibson to make use of these views to check against his findings from his other research. These views also influenced his conclusions and recommendations.

Dr. Gibson prepared four detailed reports:

1. Projection of Enrollments for 51 Public and Private Junior and Senior Colleges and Universities in Iowa, 1960-1970.
2. Manpower Problems in Higher Education in Iowa: A New Alliance.
3. An Appraisal of Iowa Colleges: Faculties, Costs, Scholarships and Administration.
4. The Junior Colleges of Iowa.

In addition, Dr. Gibson prepared a summary report entitled, "Resources and Needs for Higher Education in Iowa, 1960-1970." This report was distributed widely throughout the state.

In the final stages of his work, Dr. Gibson met with the advisory committee of educators, the Iowa Study Committee on Higher Education, representatives of the boards of trustees of Iowa colleges, with us and with other individuals to sound out his findings and recommendations. He considered this a vital part of his research to get the reaction of Iowans and several out-of-state leaders in education to the results of his survey.

After the reports were printed Dr. Gibson and Mr. Ringgenberg, at the request of the legislative advisory committee, met with legislators at four regional meetings to bring the results of this survey first hand to legislators before the legislative session began. About 45 legislators attended these meetings.

During the course of the entire study Mr. Ringgenberg worked closely with Dr. Gibson so that the survey would be completed as planned and on schedule. This work involved a considerable portion of Mr. Ringgenberg's time during this legislative interim.

Making Use of the Survey

Now that the survey has been completed, we feel that the General Assembly has an immediate responsibility to study and evaluate the findings and recommendations of Dr. Gibson and to provide leadership in initiating and carrying out needed legislation and programs. As you will note at the end of Dr. Gibson's summary report he has listed recommendations for (1) legislative action, (2) recommendations for boards of control and administrators of colleges, and (3) recommendations for the State Department of Public Instruction. We feel that with the investment that has gone into this survey that the legislature should do all within its power to encourage

each of these groups to give serious study and consideration to the recommendations made.

We believe that the present General Assembly has acted wisely in setting up a special higher education standing committee in the House and a special subcommittee in the Senate. The Gibson report merits this special attention, and bills need to be prepared to spell out the details of some of the more important recommendations. Since the large jump in college enrollments will occur in 1964 and 1965 it is important that whatever legislation is adopted should be adopted as soon as possible. We also commend Governor Erbe for urging in his inaugural speech that the legislature make use of the Gibson report.

In one of his reports Dr. Gibson said, "Wise planning on the part of leaders and boards of control has made it possible for the state to approach this decade of rapidly increasing enrollments with confidence so that the doors of higher education will remain open for capable and serious young people." We, too, commend the boards of trustees and presidents of our private and public colleges for the fine work they are doing. We hope that the suggestions made in the Gibson reports will encourage them to develop improved methods of operating our colleges so that they can continue to provide quality education making best use of the resources that will be made available to them. We also hope that they will provide educational leadership in filling any gaps in our educational programs beyond the high school.

As pointed out earlier in this report we believe that the survey which was made during this past interim was a foundation study which should be followed by a series of studies on particular problems facing our system of higher education in this state. One example of the kind of study which probably should be made is an analysis of student drop-outs. The Gibson study on enrollments shows that 30 per cent of the freshmen in all Iowa colleges drop out by the sophomore year and that 30 per cent of the sophomores drop out by the junior year. We believe that this matter of drop-outs should be carefully studied to determine the reasons for this.

We suggest that any further research that is made should be made cooperatively with the Iowa College Presidents' Association, the Iowa Study Committee on Higher education, and the Iowa Junior Colleges Association. We believe that studies made with these groups would be well worth the investment and would help establish a fine working relationship between the legislature and the public and private colleges of our state.

Summary

In summary we believe that the challenge of providing adequate opportunities for education beyond the high school for an increasing number of our youth during the next decade has been squarely put before us by the Gibson report. We believe the General Assembly has the opportunity and responsibility to provide the leadership and necessary policies and resources so that the colleges of Iowa can meet the needs of our youth and state.

JOURNAL OF THE HOUSE

HALL OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES,
DES MOINES, IOWA, FEBRUARY 20, 1961.

The House met pursuant to adjournment, Speaker Nelson in the chair.

Prayer was offered by the Reverend Ralph Kitterman, pastor of the Methodist Church, Webster City, Iowa.

The Journal of February 17 was approved.

PRESENTATION OF GUEST

Dietz of Scott presented to the House Mr. Bahadur Bhatla, exchange teacher from India to the United States. Mr. Bhatla is teaching mathematics in Walcott Community School District. The Speaker invited Mr. Bhatla to come to the Speaker's station, where he addressed the House briefly.

MR. SPEAKER AND MEMBERS OF THE HOUSE:

I consider it a rare privilege to have this opportunity of addressing this distinguished body of legislators, and I would like to express my heartfelt thanks for this opportunity.

India is a young republic, but we are an ancient people whose history goes back thousands of years. We achieved our freedom from British rule on the 15th of August, 1947, under the leadership of Mahatma Gandhi in a peaceful and non-violent way—a unique and unprecedented phenomenon in the political history of the world. Our new constitution came into force on the 26th of January, 1950. As a result of our centuries long association with the British and also having been inspired by the writings of great American presidents like Jefferson and Abraham Lincoln, our constitution derives its main features from the British and the American constitutions making due allowance for the peculiarities and historical genius of our country.

India is a secular state. The constitution recognizes no discriminations on grounds of religion, caste, creed or sex. The constitution incorporates an elaborate declaration of fundamental human rights. It guarantees to all citizens freedom and equality and other rights relating to freedom of religion, property, culture, education and constitutional remedies.

India is a union of fourteen states and six union territories, which are directly administered by the central government. The states have no power to secede from the indissoluble union. The government of the Indian republic is a government by the people both in the center and in the states. The constitution provides universal adult franchise; that is, the right of vote to every adult citizen at the attainment of twenty-one years of age, irrespective of any considerations.

The Central Parliament consists of two houses, the House of the People and the Council of States. The House of the People consists of nearly 500 members directly elected on the basis of adult franchise from all over the country from territorial constituencies. The presiding officer of the House

of the People is designated the speaker. The Council of States is a permanent body, and one-third of its members retire after every two years. The Vice President of India is ex-officio chairman of this House. At the head of the central government is the president of India, who is indirectly elected by an electoral college consisting of the members of both houses of Parliament and the Legislative Assemblies of all the states. The Vice President of India is elected by the members of two houses of Parliament assembled at a joint sitting. The real executive is the Council of Ministers, headed by the prime minister.

The system of government in the states is like that in the center. The governors, appointed by the president, are the constitutional heads of the states. Each state has a cabinet of its own headed by a Chief Minister. Most of the states have bicameral legislatures; that is, the legislative assembly and the legislative council, whereas other states have unicameral legislatures.

The constitution provides a system of independent judiciary. The Supreme Court of India is the highest judicial tribunal of the land. It acts as the interpreter and custodian of the constitution. In the case of violation of fundamental rights, any citizen can seek the intervention of the high court or Supreme Court. In order to ensure the independence of judges the constitution lays down that judges are irremovable except through a process of impeachment in the legislature.

About a month ago we celebrated the eleventh anniversary of our republic.^o Eleven years is a short period in the life of a nation, but it is a time of profound significance in our country when we are busy in laying the foundations, deep and secure, of a democratic state, whose guiding principles are human dignity and individual freedom.

During the past few years India has made some significant strides toward progress in all walks of life, economic, social and cultural. The economic reconstruction of India is being carried out in a planned way within a democratic framework. Steps are being taken to raise the standard of living of the people by raising agricultural production and laying down the foundations of a self sustaining industrial economy. We have yet to go a long and arduous way, but we are determined to work patiently toward economic prosperity without sacrificing our freedom and faith in human dignity, which is the dominant note of our ancient spiritual thought. We are in no mood to repudiate our cultural heritage in the hurry of material advancement. Although the results achieved under a democratic process may initially appear to be slow and pedestrian as compared with those secured under the authoritarian discipline of a totalitarian regime, but in the long run, they are more worthwhile and abiding.

Before I conclude, I take this opportunity to voice the feelings of my countrymen in expressing a deep sense of gratitude toward the people and government of the United States of America for the generous economic assistance they have given us in the task of building our country in the post independence era. I strongly hope and believe that the coming years will see a better understanding and a still further strengthening of the friendly ties already extending between our two countries in the interest of democracy and world peace.

- 3. Any person who is in charge of the watercraft and of the use and operation thereof with the express or implied consent of the owner.

Sec. 3. The original notice of suit filed with the secretary of state shall be in form and substance the same as now provided in suits against residents of this state, except that the part of said notice pertaining to the return day shall be in substantially the following form, to wit:

"and unless you appear thereto and defend in the district court of Iowa in and for county at the courthouse in, Iowa before noon of the sixtieth day following the filing of this notice with the secretary of state, default will be entered and judgment rendered against you."

Sec. 4. Plaintiff in any such action shall cause the original notice of suit to be served as follows:

- 1. By filing a copy of said original notice of suit with said secretary of state, together with a fee of two dollars, and
- 2. By mailing to the defendant, and to each of the defendants if more than one, within ten days after said filing with the secretary of state, by restricted certified mail addressed to the defendant at his last known residence or place of abode, a notification of the said filing with the secretary of state.

Sec. 5. The notification, provided for by this Act, shall be substantially in the following form, to wit:

"To (Here insert the name of each defendant and his residence or last known place of abode.)

You will take notice that an original notice of suit against you, a copy of which is hereto attached, was duly served upon you at Des Moines, Iowa, by filing a copy of said notice on the day of, 19....., with the secretary of state.

Dated at, Iowa, this day of, 19.....

Plaintiff

By.....

Attorney for plaintiff"

Sec. 6. In lieu of mailing said notification to the defendant in a foreign state, plaintiff may cause said notification to be personally served in the foreign state on the defendant by any adult person not a party to the suit, by delivering said notification to the defendant or by offering to make such delivery in case defendant refuses to accept delivery.

Sec. 7. Proof of the filing of a copy of said original notice of suit with the secretary of state, and proof of the mailing or personal delivery of said notification to said nonresident shall be made by affidavit of the party doing said acts. All affidavits of service shall be indorsed upon or attached to the originals of the papers to which they relate. All proofs of service, including the restricted certified mail return receipt, shall be forthwith filed with the clerk of the district court.

Sec. 8. The foregoing provisions relative to service of original notice of suit on nonresidents shall not be deemed to prevent actual personal service in this state upon the nonresident in the time, manner, form and under the conditions provided for for service on residents.

Sec. 9. Actions against nonresidents as contemplated by this Act may be brought in the county of which plaintiff is a resident, or in the county in which the injury was received or damage done.

Sec. 10. The court in which such action is pending shall grant such continuances to a nonresident defendant as may be necessary to afford him reasonable opportunity to defend said action.

Sec. 11. The secretary of state shall keep a record of all notices of suit filed with him, shall not permit said filed notices to be taken from his office except on an order of court and shall, on request, and without fee, furnish any defendant with a certified copy of the notice in which he is defendant.

Sec. 12. If judgment is rendered against the plaintiff upon the trial of said action, said judgment shall include the reasonable expenses incurred by the defendant and his attorney in appearing to and defending against said action, provided that in the judgment of the trial court said action was commenced maliciously or without probable cause.

Sec. 13. The dismissal of an action after the nonresident has entered a general appearance under the substituted service herein authorized, shall bar the recommencement of the same action against the same defendant unless said recommenced action is accompanied by actual personal service of the original notice of suit on said defendant in this state.

Sec. 14. Any contract insuring the liability of a nonresident operator of a motor boat in Iowa shall, in case of the death of said nonresident, be considered an asset of his estate having a situs in Iowa in any civil action arising out of an accident in which said nonresident may be liable.

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 9

By Naden, Mensing and Grassley

A concurrent resolution making application to the Congress of the United States for the calling of a convention to propose an amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

Whereas, Article V of the Constitution of the United States provides that upon application of two-thirds ($\frac{2}{3}$) of the states, Congress shall call a convention for proposing amendments to such Constitution, which shall be submitted to the state legislatures or state conventions for ratification;

Therefore, Be It Resolved by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa, that application is hereby made by this General Assembly to the Congress of the United States to call a convention for the purpose of proposing an amendment to such Constitution under which, except for trust fund expenditures and receipts, the expenditures of the Federal Government during any fiscal year may not exceed the estimated receipts of such Government during such fiscal year, unless a substantial majority of the Congress, on recommendation of the President and because of war or other grave national emergency, votes to suspend the limitation on expenditures for a specified period of time.

Be It Further Resolved, that the secretary of state of the State of Iowa is hereby directed to send certified copies of this concurrent resolution to the secretary of the Senate of the United States, to the clerk of the House of Representatives of the United States, to each member of Congress from the State of Iowa, and the chief executive and presiding officers of the legislative bodies of each of the several states.

The joint resolution having received a constitutional majority was declared to have passed the House and the title was agreed to.

House File 108, a bill for an act relating to the operation of a motor vehicle while intoxicated; providing for the testing of body substances; providing for the administration of tests, revocation of operator's license, administrative hearings, judicial review, interpretation of tests, and proof in civil or criminal actions, with report of committee recommending passage, was taken up for consideration.

Riley of Linn offered the following amendments, filed by him:

Amend House 108 by striking all after the enacting clause and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

Chapter three hundred twenty-one (321), Code 1958, is hereby amended by adding thereto the following sections:

Section 1. Any person who operates a motor vehicle in this state upon a public highway shall be deemed to have given consent to the withdrawal from his body of specimens of his blood or urine, and to a chemical test or tests thereof, for the purpose of determining the alcoholic content of his blood, subject to the provisions hereinafter set out. The withdrawal of such body substances, and the test or tests thereof, shall be administered at the written request of a peace officer having reasonable grounds to believe the person to have been operating a motor vehicle while in an intoxicated condition, and only after the peace officer has placed such person under arrest.

Sec. 2. Only a licensed physician or a registered nurse acting at the written request of a peace officer may withdraw such body substances for the purpose of determining the alcoholic content of the person's blood. Such person may have an independent chemical test or tests administered in addition to any administered at the direction of a peace officer. The failure or inability of the person to obtain an independent chemical test or tests shall not preclude the admission in evidence in any criminal action or proceeding against him of the results of the test or tests taken at the direction of the peace officer, except that the results of the test or tests taken at the direction of the peace officer shall not be admissible in evidence in any criminal action or proceeding against the person if the peace officer did not timely inform the person of his right to an independent test or tests and did not afford such person a reasonable opportunity to obtain an independent test or tests. Upon the request of the person who is tested, the results of the test or tests taken at the direction of the peace officer shall be made immediately available to him.

Sec. 3. Any person who is dead, unconscious or who is otherwise in a condition rendering him incapable of consent or refusal shall be deemed not to have withdrawn the consent provided by section one (1) of this Act, provided that a licensed physician or registered nurse shall certify in advance of the withdrawal that such person is dead, unconscious or otherwise in a condition rendering him incapable of consent or refusal; provided, further, that in such case such condition shall obviate the requirement of arrest and notice of right for independent test.

Sec. 4. If the person refuses to submit to the test or tests, there shall be no withdrawal of his body substances and no tests shall be made. If the person so refuses, and he is under arrest at the time of such refusal, and the arresting peace officer has reasonable grounds to believe the person to have been operating a motor vehicle while in an intoxicated condition, the arresting peace officer shall forward to the commissioner his (the peace officer's) sworn statement that the person was under arrest, that he had reasonable grounds for believing that the person had been operating a motor vehicle while in an intoxicated condition, setting forth the facts and evidence supporting such belief, and that the person refused to submit to the test or tests while under arrest. If the commissioner is satisfied that the facts and evidence set forth in the peace officer's sworn statement are sufficient to constitute reasonable grounds for believing that the person had been operating a motor vehicle while in an intoxicated condition, he shall revoke the person's license or permit to drive and any nonresident operating privilege for a period of one year; or if the person is a resident without a license or permit to operate a motor vehicle in this state, the commissioner shall deny to the person the issuance of license or permit within one year from the date of the alleged violation, subject to review as hereinafter provided. The

effective date of any such revocation as hereinbefore provided shall be: (a) upon expiration of the time permitted such person to request an administrative hearing as hereinafter provided if the person does not request such a hearing; (b) upon expiration of the time permitted such person to petition the district court for review as hereinafter provided, if an administrative hearing is had at which the revocation is sustained and if the person does not file such petition for review; (c) upon affirmation by the district court of the revocation if timely appeal to and review by such court is had.

Sec. 5. The commissioner shall immediately notify the person of such revocation or denial of his privilege to drive. The person may, within 30 days after the commissioner has forwarded to him such notification, request of the commissioner in writing an opportunity to be heard. Upon receipt of such request, the commissioner shall afford the person an opportunity for a hearing before the commissioner or his duly authorized agent as early as practical within and not to exceed twenty days after the receipt of such request in the county wherein the person was arrested, unless the person requesting such hearing requests that the hearing be held in some other county, in which case it shall be held in such other county. All testimony given at such hearing shall be under oath and shall be recorded. The hearing shall relate to all matters contained in the sworn statement of the arresting peace officer which had been forwarded to the commissioner, as hereinbefore provided, and the sworn statement shall become part of the record of the hearing. The commissioner or his authorized agent shall order either that the revocation or denial be rescinded or sustained.

Sec. 6. If the revocation or denial is sustained, the person may, within 30 days after such determination, file a petition for hearing of the matter in the district court in the county in which the administrative hearing was held. It shall be the duty of the court to set the matter for hearing upon 20 days written notice to the commissioner. Within fifteen days after receipt of the notice, the commissioner shall file in the office of the clerk of the district court a certified transcript of the testimony given at the administrative hearing along with a copy of the peace officer's sworn statement. The court shall hear and determine the matter as an original proceeding upon the transcript of the testimony given at the administrative hearing, the peace officer's sworn statement, and upon additional evidence and testimony offered by the commissioner and the petitioner. The court shall order either that the revocation or denial be rescinded or sustained, and the person may appeal to the Supreme Court in accordance with the Iowa Rules of Civil Procedure, provided that such appeal will not delay the aforesaid revocation or denial.

Sec. 7. Upon the trial of any civil or criminal action or proceeding arising out of acts alleged to have been committed by any person while driving or in actual physical control of a vehicle upon a public highway of this state while in an intoxicated condition, evidence of the amount of alcohol in the person's blood at the time of the act alleged as shown by a chemical analysis of his blood or urine is admissible, except as hereinbefore provided. For the purpose of this section:

1. Evidence that there was, at that time, five-hundredths of one per cent or less, by weight of alcohol in his blood, is prima facie evidence that the person was not in an intoxicated condition.

2. Evidence that there was, at that time, more than five-hundredths of one per cent and less than fifteen-hundredths of one per cent by weight of alcohol in the person's blood is relevant evidence, but it is not to be given

prima facie effect in indicating whether the person was in an intoxicated condition.

3. Evidence that there was, at that time, fifteen-hundredths of one per cent or more by weight of alcohol in his blood, shall be admitted as prima facie evidence that the person was in an intoxicated condition.

4. Per cent by weight of alcohol in the blood shall be based upon milligrams of alcohol per one hundred milligrams of blood.

Sec. 8. In any civil or criminal action or proceeding arising out of acts alleged to have been committed while the person was allegedly operating a motor vehicle upon a public highway of this state while in an intoxicated condition, proof of the following shall be admissible evidence:

1. Refusal of the person while under arrest to submit to a chemical test or tests for the purpose of determining the alcoholic content of his blood.

2. Failure of the arresting peace officer to request the person to submit to such a test or tests.

3. Refusal of the arresting peace officer to immediately provide the person with such test or tests upon request by the person therefor.

Sec. 9. The provisions of section seven (7) of this Act shall not be construed as limiting the introduction of any other competent evidence bearing on the question of whether the person was in an intoxicated condition.

Sec. 10. When a nonresident's privilege to operate a motor vehicle in this state has been revoked or denied in accordance with this Act, the department of public safety shall file information in writing of the action taken to the official in charge of traffic control or public safety of the state of the person's residence and of any state in which he has a license.

Sec. 11. This Act may be cited as the Uniform Chemical Test for Intoxication Act.

Senate Joint Resolution 14, a joint resolution proposing to amend Article Five (V) of the Constitution of the State of Iowa relating to the supervisory and administrative control of the inferior courts by the Supreme Court; to the qualifications, selection, tenure, compensation, powers and duties of judicial nominating commission members, judges and other judicial officers and to the mandatory retirement

with compensation of judges of the Supreme and District Courts, was taken up for consideration.

On motion by Naden of Hamilton, the House recessed until 2:00 p.m.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The House reconvened, Speaker Nelson in the chair.

The House resumed consideration of Senate Joint Resolution 14.

Pursuant to the rules relating to a Call of the House, roll call was ordered. The roll call revealed all members present except John P. Kibbie of Palo Alto, who had previously been excused.

Kluever of Cass moved that the joint resolution be read a last time now and placed upon its passage which motion prevailed and the joint resolution was read a last time.

Senate Joint Resolution 14, a joint resolution proposing to amend Article Five (V) of the Constitution of the State of Iowa relating to the supervisory and administrative control of the inferior courts by the Supreme Court; to the qualifications, selection, tenure, compensation, powers and duties of judicial nominating commission members, judges and other judicial officers and to the mandatory retirement with compensation of judges of the Supreme and District Courts.

Be It Resolved by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa:

Section 1. An amendment to the Constitution of the State of Iowa as it appears in the Code of 1958 is proposed as follows:

Article Five (V) is amended in the following manner:

1. Section four (4) is amended by striking from lines eight (8) and nine (9) of such section the words, "exercise a supervisory" and

inserting in lieu thereof the words, "shall exercise a supervisory and administrative".

2. Sections three (3), five (5), nine (9) and eleven (11) are repealed.

3. The following sections are added thereto:

"Section 15. Vacancies in the Supreme Court and District Court shall be filled by appointment by the Governor from lists of nominees submitted by the appropriate judicial nominating commission. Three nominees shall be submitted for each Supreme Court vacancy, and two nominees shall be submitted for each District Court vacancy. If the Governor fails for thirty days to make the appointment, it shall be made from such nominees by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court.

"Section 16. There shall be a State Judicial Nominating Commission. Such commission shall make nominations to fill vacancies in the Supreme Court. Until July 4, 1973, and thereafter unless otherwise provided by law, the State Judicial Nominating Commission shall be composed and selected as follows: There shall be not less than three nor more than eight appointive members, as provided by law, and an equal number of elective members on such Commission, all of whom shall be electors of the state. The appointive members shall be appointed by the Governor subject to confirmation by the Senate. The elective members shall be elected by the resident members of the bar of the state. The judge of the Supreme Court who is senior in length of service on said Court, other than the Chief Justice, shall also be a member of such Commission and shall be its chairman.

"There shall be a District Judicial Nominating Commission in each judicial district of the state. Such commissions shall make nominations to fill vacancies in the District Court within their respective districts. Until July 4, 1973, and thereafter unless otherwise provided by law, District Judicial Nominating Commissions shall be composed and selected as follows: There shall be not less than three nor more than six appointive members, as provided by law, and an equal number of elective members on each such commission, all of whom shall be electors of the district. The appointive members shall be appointed by the Governor. The elective members shall be elected by the resident members of the bar of the district. The district judge of such district who is senior in length of service shall also be a member of such commission and shall be its chairman.

"Due consideration shall be given to area representation in the appointment and election of Judicial Nominating Commission members. Appointive and elective members of Judicial Nominating Com-

missions shall serve for six year terms, shall be ineligible for a second six year term on the same commission, shall hold no office of profit of the United States or of the state during their terms, shall be chosen without reference to political affiliation, and shall have such other qualifications as may be prescribed by law. As near as may be, the terms of one-third of such members shall expire every two years.

“Section 17. Members of all courts shall have such tenure in office as may be fixed by law, but terms of Supreme Court Judges shall be not less than eight years and terms of District Court Judges shall be not less than six years. Judges shall serve for one year after appointment and until the first day of January following the next judicial election after the expiration of such year. They shall at such judicial election stand for retention in office on a separate ballot which shall submit the question of whether such judge shall be retained in office for the tenure prescribed for such office and when such tenure is a term of years, on their request, they shall, at the judicial election next before the end of each term, stand again for retention on such ballot. Present Supreme Court and District Court Judges, at the expiration of their respective terms, may be retained in office in like manner for the tenure prescribed for such office. The General Assembly shall prescribe the time for holding judicial elections.

“Section 18. Judges of the Supreme Court and District Court shall receive salaries from the state, shall be members of the bar of the state and shall have such other qualifications as may be prescribed by law. Judges of the Supreme Court and District Court shall be ineligible to any other office of the state while serving on said court and for two years thereafter, except that District Judges shall be eligible to the office of Supreme Court Judge. Other judicial officers shall be selected in such manner and shall have such tenure, compensation and other qualification as may be fixed by law. The General Assembly shall prescribe mandatory retirement for Judges of the Supreme Court and District Court at a specified age and shall provide for adequate retirement compensation. Retired judges may be subject to special assignment to temporary judicial duties by the Supreme Court, as provided by law.”

Sec. 2. The foregoing proposed amendment to the Constitution of Iowa, having been adopted and agreed to by the Fifty-eighth (58th) General Assembly, thereafter duly published, and now adopted and agreed to by the Fifty-ninth (59th) General Assembly in this Joint Resolution, shall be submitted to the people at a special election to be held for that purpose at the same time and in conjunction with the primary election to be held for the selection of political party candidates for public office in the year nineteen hundred sixty-two (1962).

The submission at said special election shall in all respects be governed and conducted as prescribed by law for the submission of a Constitutional amendment at a general election.

commissioner has mailed such notice of revocation or denial, file a petition for judicial review of such revocation or denial in the district court in the county in which the person was arrested or the county in which the person resides. It shall be the duty of the court to set the matter for hearing upon ten days written notice to the commissioner, which notice shall be given by the court within three days after the filing of the petition. The court shall hear and determine the matter as an original proceeding, and all parties may offer evidence. The hearing shall relate to and shall be limited to the issues of whether the arresting peace officer had reasonable grounds to believe the person to have been operating a motor vehicle while in an intoxicated condition; whether the person was placed under arrest; and whether the person refused to submit to the test or tests while under arrest. The court shall order either that such revocation or denial be rescinded or sustained, and shall order that it be sustained unless it finds the evidence insufficient to warrant the conclusion of the commissioner. The person may appeal to the Supreme Court in accordance with the Iowa Rules of Civil Procedure. Such petition, hearing or appeal shall not delay the effective date of such revocation or denial."

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 10

A concurrent resolution relating to an expression of confidence in the Committee on Un-American Activities of the House of Representatives of the Congress of the United States.

Whereas, alert and informed Americans have long recognized that the sole and overriding objective of communist Russia is complete domination of the free world and the tyrannical destruction and enslavement of its people; and

Whereas, they have recognized, also, that to achieve this objective com-

munist Russia has employed, and will continue to employ, espionage, subversion, and sedition against the republic of the United States whenever and wherever possible within our borders; and

Whereas, these hostile acts by communist agents are sometimes aided and abetted by well-meaning, but misinformed, citizens who have allowed themselves to become persuaded that subversion and sedition must be tolerated so long as they are falsely disguised, however flimsily, under the cloak of the various freedoms established for the citizens of our republic; and

Whereas, the only defense against these communist tactics is an alert citizenry and government, fully informed at all times on the subversive activities and tactics employed by communist agents and supporters within the borders of our republic; and

Whereas, the Committee on Un-American Activities of the House of Representatives has established a long and impressive record as a "watch-dog committee", dedicated only to guarding the security of our republic and preserving the rights and freedoms of its people; and

Whereas, this committee, regardless of the partisan political persuasions of its members and its chairman, has always served diligently in its functions of informing our citizens and thus better equipping them in the struggle to establish a realistic and lasting peace; and

Whereas, the committee on Un-American Activities has been unjustly attacked with false and unsubstantiated accusations by known communist agents and well-meaning, but misinformed, citizens who frequently endorse any "cause" that has been represented to be "idealistic", "noble", or "democratic"; and

Whereas, the false and unsubstantiated charges against the Committee on Un-American Activities have been fully answered and completely repudiated by the chairman of the committee, Congressman Francis E. Walter, on page 1162 of the Congressional Record for January 24, 1961; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives, the Senate Concurring, That the members of the General Assembly of this state go on record as expressing confidence in the Committee on Un-American Activities of the House of Representatives of the Congress of the United States, its objectives, its methods, and its demonstrated policy of respecting and protecting the rights and freedoms of the citizens of this republic; and

Be It Further Resolved, That the members of the General Assembly of this state urge members of the House of Representatives of Congress to take whatever action is necessary to insure the continuance of the activities of the Committee on Un-American Activities.

SPECIAL ORDER SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION 16

The hour of 9:45 a.m. o'clock having arrived, the Speaker announced the special order of business for the consideration of Senate Joint Resolution 16.

Senate Joint Resolution 16, a joint resolution proposing a constitutional amendment to the Constitution of the State of Iowa relating to the composition of the general assembly, the basis of representation of the members thereof, and to amend such Constitution by repeal of section six (6), article three (III) thereof, section thirty-four (34) of such article three (III) thereof and the 1904 and 1928 amendments thereto, sections thirty-five (35) and thirty-six (36) of such article three (III), and the 1904 amendment to each such section, and section

thirty-seven (37) of said article three (III), and proposing substitutes in lieu thereof.

Chalupa of Jefferson offered, from the floor, the following amendment:

Amend Senate Joint Resolution 16 by striking everything after the resolving clause and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

Section 1. The following amendment to the constitution of the State of Iowa is hereby proposed:

1. Section six (6) of Article Three (III), section thirty-four (34) of Article Three (III) as amended in 1904 and 1928, sections thirty-five (35) and thirty-six (36) of Article Three (III) as amended in 1904, and section thirty-seven (37) of Article Three (III) are hereby repealed and the following proposed in lieu thereof:

"Section 6. Senatorial districts shall be formed by two counties with adjacent boundaries and as nearly equal in population as possible to form a senatorial district. The senatorial district shall be established by law at the first regular session of the General Assembly held after adoption of this amendment and not oftener than once in each ten-year period thereafter. The terms of all senators elected prior to the effective date of this amendment shall terminate on December 31, 1966. In the 1966 general election, the senators representing the odd-numbered districts listed in the amendment shall be elected for four-year terms and the senators representing the even-numbered districts shall be elected for two-year terms. Thereafter, all shall be elected for four-year terms.

"Section 34. It shall be the duty of the General Assembly to number the senatorial districts and if there should be any odd number of counties, the largest county in square miles, as determined by the latest preceding decennial national census, shall be declared a single senatorial district.

"Section 35. The House of Representatives shall consist of members elected at each general election and apportioned in the following manner: The ratio of representation shall be the whole number of inhabitants of the state, as shown by the latest preceding centennial national census, divided by the fraction of one one-hundredth (1/100). Each county having a population factor greater than one one-hundredth (1/100) or multiple thereof consisting of three-fourth ($\frac{3}{4}$) of a factor shall have an additional sub-district. Each county having a population equal to one (1) ratio or less shall elect one (1) representative and each county shall elect one (1) additional representative for each full ratio above one (1) or three-fourth ($\frac{3}{4}$) additional ratio. On the taking of each decennial census of the United States the Secretary of State shall certify, to the next succeeding regular General Assembly and to the Supreme Court, the official whole number of inhabitants of the state and the population of each county.

"Section 36. Upon receipt by the Supreme Court of the official certification by the Secretary of State of the population of the state and counties after each decennial national census, the Supreme Court shall appoint, in each county entitled to more than one (1) representative, a commission of three (3) resident members, one (1) of whom shall be the senior member of the district court in and for such county, which commission shall divide such county into representative subdistricts of contiguous territory, as compact and nearly equal in population as may be, in each of which one (1) representative shall be elected at the succeeding general election.

1. Subdistrict lines shall conform to township and voting district boundaries.

“Section 37. When a congressional district shall be composed, it shall not be entirely separated by any county belonging to another district, and no county shall be divided.”

Sec. 2. The foregoing proposed amendment is hereby referred to the General Assembly to be chosen at the next general election for members of the General Assembly and if approved such amendment shall be submitted to the people at the 1964 general election, and the Secretary of State shall cause the same to be published for three consecutive months previous to the date of said election as provided by law.

On motion of Naden of Hamilton, the House recessed until 1:30 p.m.

Amend Senate Joint Resolution 16 by striking everything after the resolving clause and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

Section 1. The following amendment to the constitution of the State of Iowa is hereby proposed:

Section six (6) of Article three (III) of the constitution of the State of Iowa is hereby repealed. Sections thirty-four (34), thirty-five (35) and thirty-six (36) of Article three (III) as adopted by amendment in 1904 A. D. and the amendment to section thirty-four (34) of Article three (III) as adopted in 1928 A. D. are hereby repealed and the following adopted in lieu thereof:

"Section 34. The senate shall be composed of fifty members to be elected from the several senatorial districts, established by law and at the next session of the general assembly held following the taking of the national census, they shall be apportioned among the several counties or districts of the state, according to population as shown by the last preceding census, but no county shall be entitled to more than one senator. The senators shall be so classified by lot, that one class, being as nearly one-half as possible, shall be elected every two years.

"Section 35. The house of representatives shall consist of members elected at each general election and apportioned in the following manner. The ratio of representation shall be the whole number of inhabitants of the state, as shown by the latest preceding decennial national census, divided by the whole number of counties then existing and organized. Each county shall have one representative, and each county having a population of more than one ratio shall elect one representative for each full ratio and one additional for each fraction in excess thereof if three-fifths or more of a ratio. On the taking of each decennial census of the United States the secretary of state shall certify, to the next succeeding regular general assembly and to the supreme court, the official whole number of inhabitants of the state and the population of each county.

"Section 36. The general assembly shall at the first regular session held following the adoption of this amendment, and at each succeeding regular session held next after the taking of the national census, fix the representative districts. If the general assembly fails to redistrict the representative districts at the first session of the general assembly after the official census has been certified, the supreme court shall redistrict the representative districts and its order shall be entered and certified to the governor and to the presiding officers of the general assembly and shall be effective until reapportionment after the next succeeding federal decennial census.

"Upon receipt by the supreme court of the official certification by the secretary of state of the population of the state and counties after each decennial national census, the supreme court shall appoint, in each county entitled to more than one representative, a commission of three resident members, one of whom shall be the senior member of the district court in and for such county, which commission shall divide such county into township or voting districts of contiguous territory, as compact and nearly equal in population as may be, in each of which one representative shall be elected at the succeeding general election."

Sec. 2. The foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of Iowa is hereby referred to the general assembly to be chosen at the next general election and the secretary of state is directed to cause the same to be published as provided by law for three months previous to the time of making such choice.

Senate Joint Resolution 16, a joint resolution proposing a constitutional amendment to the Constitution of the State of Iowa relating to the composition of the general assembly, the basis of representation of the members thereof, and to amend such Constitution by repeal of Section six (6), Article three (III) thereof, Section thirty-four (34)

of such Article three (III) thereof and the 1904 and 1928 amendments thereto, Sections thirty-five (35) and thirty-six (36) of such Article three (III), and the 1904 amendment to each such section, and Section thirty-seven (37) of said Article three (III), and proposing substitutes in lieu thereof.

Be It Resolved by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa :

Section 1. The following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Iowa is hereby proposed.

“Section six (6) of Article three (III), section thirty-four (34) of Article three (III) and the 1904 and 1928 amendments thereto, sections thirty-five (35) and thirty-six (36) of Article three (III) and the 1904 amendment to each such section, and section thirty-seven (37) of Article three (III) are hereby repealed and the following proposed in lieu thereof :

“Section 6. The senate shall consist of fifty-eight (58) senators, one (1) senator elected from each senatorial district. For each redistricting, changed senatorial districts shall be so classified by lot by the redistricting authority so that as nearly as possible one-half of the senators shall be elected every two (2) years.

“If a senatorial district is unchanged or is reduced in size and no new territory is added to it, and the incumbent senator resides in the district of reduced size or the unchanged district, he shall be permitted to complete the term for which he was elected, and the senatorial district shall remain in the same class of districts.

“The redistricting authority shall provide in its redistricting statement, law, or court order for the cutting short of terms of senators, where necessary. Any senator whose term is cut short by a redistricting shall not be compensated for the uncompleted part of his term.

“Section 34. The house of representatives shall consist of ninety-nine (99) members, one (1) elected from each county as county lines existed on January 1, 1961.

“Section 35. Senatorial districts shall meet the following requirements :

“1. Each shall have a population, as shown by the most recent decennial United States census, equal to that of every other district, a deviation of no more than ten (10) percent from the population unit (the state population divided by fifty-eight (58)) being allowed.

“2. Each shall consist of compact and contiguous territory ; areas joined only at the point of a corner shall not be regarded as contiguous.

"3. So far as practicable, a county shall not be divided unless it is entitled to more than one (1) district, and senatorial district lines shall conform to township and voting district boundaries.

"Section 36. In 1965 and in the year ending in three (3) of each decade thereafter, the senatorial districts shall be redistricted.

"By November fifteen (15) in 1964 and in the year ending in two (2) of each decade thereafter, a ten (10) member redistricting commission shall be appointed to redistrict senatorial districts. The state central committee of the two (2) political parties casting the largest number of votes for governor in the last preceding election shall each appoint five (5) qualified voters. If a party fails to submit such names to the secretary of state by November fifteen (15), the supreme court shall promptly appoint the members from such party. Compensation for members of the commission shall be established by law.

"By February one (1) of the year following its appointment, the redistricting commission shall file with the secretary of state a statement of its action, including the boundaries and classification of senatorial districts. To be valid, this statement must be signed by seven (7) members. The general assembly may amend this statement or enact a substitute, but such action must be taken by May one (1) of such year.

"If the redistricting commission does not file its redistricting statement by February one (1) of the year following its appointment, the general assembly shall redistrict the senatorial districts in a single legislative enactment by May one (1) of such year.

"If the commission and the general assembly fail to redistrict within the time allotted, the supreme court shall redistrict by October one (1) of such year. The action of the court shall be entered and certified to the secretary of state by court order, which shall be final.

"Before June one (1) of such year, any ten (10) members of the general assembly may petition the supreme court to determine whether the redistricting of the commission or the general assembly substantially complies with the redistricting provisions of the constitution. If the redistricting substantially complies, the court shall so notify the secretary of state, and the decision shall be final. If the court determines that the redistricting does not substantially comply, it shall redistrict as provided in the preceding paragraph of this section.

"Section 37. Redistricting shall take effect beginning for the nomination and election of senators for the next regular session of the general assembly following the adoption of the redistricting statement, law, or court order. When a congressional or senatorial district shall

be composed of two (2) or more counties, it shall not be entirely separated by any county belonging to another district, and no county shall be divided in forming a congressional district."

Sec. 2. The foregoing proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Iowa is hereby referred to the legislature to be chosen at the next general election, and the secretary of state is directed to cause the same to be published as provided by law for three (3) months previous to the time of making such choice.

Dear Sir:

Reference is herein made to your letter dated March 8, 1961, posing several questions arising out of lines 27 to 38 both inclusive of section 1 of Senate Joint Resolution 16, referred to by you as "Section 35, of Senate Joint Resolution 16."

You specifically desire information concerning the following questions:

"Are subsections 1 and 3 inconsistent with each other; and if so, how; and if not, how will they work together?"

Does subsection 3 allow for the crossing of Township and/or voter district lines?"

In response thereto it is to be borne in mind that the foregoing Resolution and its contents is a proposed constitutional amendment and not a statute, and therefore, if adopted becomes part of the organic law, is not self-executing and requires legislation to implement its authority. In that aspect, I answer as follows:

Insofar as any claimed inconsistency existing between subsections 1 and 3 of that portion of the Resolution which you refer to as "Section 35" I am of the opinion that while the county and its lines are initially the basis of representation, under situations encompassed within the Resolution, the county may be the subject of more than one district, and in that event, absent authority to elect at large, crossing of township and precinct lines is the normal if not necessary step in the establishment of senatorial districts within the county or the district if it embraces more than one county or portions thereof. In that view, I see no difficulty in resolving both the consistency and the workability of "Section 35."

I therefore report to you my opinion that the section is in proper form and provides the basis for appropriate legislation to evidence its plain intent.

SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 16

By Nystrom

Whereas, July 2, 1962, marks the centennial of legislation providing for the establishment of the national system of land-grant colleges and universities; and

Whereas, this system of land-grant colleges and universities has fully justified the hope of its founders, now contributes annually more than half of the nation's trained scientists and nearly half of the regular and reserve officers for its defense forces, awards approximately 40 per cent of all doctoral degrees, and enrolls approximately one-fifth of all students in degree-granting colleges and universities of the nation; and

Whereas, the land-grant idea has been widely accepted throughout the world as one of America's great contributions to education and to the enrichment of the lives of men everywhere; and

Whereas, the State of Iowa, on September 11, 1862, became the first state in the nation to accept the principles and the terms of the historic Land-Grant Act; and

Whereas, Iowa State University of Science and Technology throughout the century of land-grant history has been ever among the leaders of these institutions which now number 63 in every state and Puerto Rico; and

Whereas, land-grant education as exemplified by Iowa State University of Science and Technology has been of inestimable value to the agricultural and industrial interests of Iowa and to each of her citizens; and

Whereas, the land-grant philosophy which extends through teaching, research and service to all people, promises even more to the next century;

Now Therefore, Be It Resolved by the Senate, the House Concurring, That it is deemed fitting and proper to commemorate the one hundredth anniversary of the establishment of the land-grant system by the first Morrill Act, approved July 2, 1862, granting public lands to the states and territories in support of colleges to emphasize branches of learning relating to agriculture and mechanic arts without excluding other scientific and classical studies and including military tactics.

Be It Further Resolved, that the Fifty-ninth General Assembly extends its felicitations and good wishes to the distinguished faculties of the land-grant colleges and universities who have so successfully carried to new

frontiers the vision of the pioneers in molding institutions admirably suited to the needs of our times and to our great nation.

COMMUNICATION FROM THE CHIEF CLERK

There is on file in the office of the Chief Clerk a copy of House Resolution, Legislature of the State of Washington, urging the enactment of Senate Joint Resolution 40 of the United States Senate, relating to Lewis and Clark National Tourway.

EXPLANATION OF VOTE

(Senate Joint Resolution 16)

I voted for Senate Joint Resolution 16, the Shaff reapportionment plan, because it is better than nothing. I supported all of the better reapportionment plans which were offered, but all of them were defeated. Now we need to face these facts:

1. This minority-ruled legislature has shown that it will not pass any plan which really solves the problem of unfair representation.

2. If we don't take the Shaff plan, we will probably get something worse. The House has already passed a plan (House Joint Resolution 20) which is so bad that it makes the Shaff plan look good by comparison.

3. The Shaff plan does give the people more representation than they have now. The gain in the Senate will be greater than the loss in the House.

4. The Shaff plan will at least give the people some bargaining power. The people will control the Senate; the small counties will control the House. The majority of Iowans now have no bargaining power in either house.

5. The Shaff plan will not silence the demand for fair reapportionment. The 99-member House will be controlled by such a tiny minority, and will kill so much good legislation, that there will soon be a strong demand for a change. I support the idea of "one house on area, one house on popula-

tion". But a 99-member House is not an area house; it is a courthouse house. It is too bad to last very long.

Let us accept the Shaff plan as a small step forward. Then we will keep working for something better.

When the people vote on the constitutional convention question in 1970, I doubt that they will be fooled again by fancy promises and false fears.

The fight for fair representation will go on. The people of Iowa will win this fight, even if it takes another 10 or 20 years.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

The House resumed consideration of the Denman amendment to House File 261, a bill for an act relating to the licensing of private, fraternal, service, golf and country clubs or associations which allow their members to consume alcoholic beverages in excess of four (4) percent alcohol by weight that such members or guests bring upon the premises of such club or association, as follows:

Amend House File 261 by striking everything after the enacting clause and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

Section 1. For the purposes of this Act, a "club" is defined as any association of any number of persons, incorporated or unincorporated, having a common meeting place for social intercourse or any common object, and which allows its members to keep or consume alcoholic liquor upon the premises of such meeting place.

Sec. 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to keep or consume upon the premises of a club, or for any club to permit any person to keep or consume

upon such premises, any alcoholic liquor, unless such club has first obtained from the city or town council or the county board of supervisors a license.

Sec. 3. The council of any incorporated city or town shall have power upon proper application to issue to a club a license authorizing any member to keep upon the premises of its meeting place alcoholic liquor for consumption by such member or his bona fide guests. The board of supervisors of any county shall have like power with respect to any club having its meeting place outside the corporate limits of a city or town.

Sec. 4. No club shall be granted a license under this Act:

1. If it is a proprietary club or operated for pecuniary profit.

2. If the premises or meeting place of such club were formerly operated as a tavern for the premises of which a class "B" beer permit was issued and the permittee, owner, lessee, manager, or proprietor of such tavern is retained by the club in any employer-employee relationship or managerial capacity.

3. Unless it is incorporated under the laws of the State of Iowa or is a regularly chartered branch of a nationally incorporated organization or a chapter of one of the organizations enumerated in section five hundred four point five (504.5) of the Code.

4. Unless such club has a permanent local membership of not less than fifty (50) adult members.

5. Unless the application for such license is approved by a majority of the bona fide members present and voting at a regular meeting or a special meeting called to consider the same.

6. Unless consent is given for members of the fire, police and health departments and the building inspector to enter upon the premises without warrant to inspect for violations of ordinances and regulations.

Sec. 6. Every club making application for such license shall furnish a bond with good and sufficient sureties to be approved by the authorities issuing the license conditioned upon the faithful observance of this Act and local ordinances and regulations adopted hereunder. Such bond shall be in the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00). Said bond shall be further conditioned to the effect that the permittee and his surety, as a part of the license granted hereunder, shall consent to forfeiture of the principal sum of said bond in the event of revocation of such license by the issuing authority. The provisions of section one hundred twenty-four point forty (124.40) of the Code shall be applicable to such revocation and forfeiture.

Sec. 7. The annual fee for such license shall be fixed by the authorities empowered by this Act to issue licenses, but the amount of said fee shall not be less than one hundred dollars (\$100.00), nor more than one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00). Said issuing authorities shall have the power to adopt a graduated scale of fees based upon number of members. This provision shall not be construed as imposing a tax on club membership but, rather, as in recognition of the fact that the cost of policing is related to the number of members who may consume liquor upon the premises of the licensee.

Sec. 8. It is expressly provided that cities and towns and boards of supervisors shall have the power and authority to revoke any license issued under their authority for a violation of any of the provisions of this Act, or of Title six (VI) of the Code, or any ordinance adopted by a city or town under the provisions hereof, or any rule or regulation adopted by a board of supervisors, or for any cause which in the judgment of the governing body may be inimical to or prevent the carrying out of the intent and purposes of this Act. Cities and towns are hereby empowered to adopt ordinances for the enforcement of this Act and are further empowered to adopt ordinances providing for the limitation of licenses; for the fixing of hours during which

liquor may be consumed on the premises of a licensee, and any other matters or activities with respect to the consumption of liquor on such premises which may affect the welfare and morals of the community involved.

Sec. 9. The provisions of this Act relating to licensure shall have no application to temporary hospitality rooms operated in connection with bona fide conventions where mixed drinks are served to delegates without cost. All other provisions of this Act shall be applicable to such rooms.

Sec. 10. Any club upon the premises of which alcoholic liquor is kept or consumed and which has not obtained a license as in this Act provided or which, having obtained such license, suffers or permits any violation of this Act, or of Title six (VI) of the Code, or of any ordinance or regulation duly adopted under authority of this Act by a city or town council or county board of supervisors, is hereby declared to be a liquor nuisance within the meaning of chapter one hundred twenty-eight (128) of the Code, and may be enjoined, abated, and mulct tax imposed in the same manner and to the same extent as is in that chapter provided.

Sec. 5. Every club desirous of obtaining a license shall make written application therefor, executed by its president and attested by its secretary or other similar officers performing the duties usually performed by a president and secretary which application shall state under oath:

1. The name of the club and the location of the premises occupied by it.
2. The names of the officers of said club.
3. The purposes for which such club was formed and is maintained and the number of the bona fide members thereof regularly paying dues.
4. That the application for such license was approved by a majority of the bona fide members present and voting at a regular meeting or a special meeting called to consider the same.
5. That consent is given for members of the fire, police and health departments and the building inspector to enter upon the premises without warrant to inspect for violations of ordinances and regulations.

Carstensen of Clinton offered the following amendment to the Denman amendment filed March 21 and moved its adoption:

Amend the Denman amendment filed March 21, section 5, item three (3), line two (2), by inserting after the word "number" the words "and the names and addresses".

3. Amend section four (4) by adding the following: "No assistance shall be granted to:

1. Any unmarried applicant whose income exceeds one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) annually, or to any married applicant and spouse living together whose combined income exceeds two thousand two hundred dollars (\$2,200.00). Income shall not include the shelter value of a residence occupied by the applicant nor the value of gifts or services contributed in kind to the applicant.

2. Any unmarried applicant whose resources exceed two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00), or any married applicant and spouse living together whose combined resources exceed three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00). The value of resources shall be the current market value minus any encumbrances against such resource or resources. In determining the foregoing, the following resources shall be excluded: real property occupied as a residence, household goods and furnishings, an automobile, personal effects and tools necessary for the pursuit of a trade, occupation or profession."

4. Amend section seven (7) line four (4) by striking the word "eligibility" and inserting in lieu thereof the word "need".

5. Amend section eight (8) line three (3) by adding after the word "aged" the following: "rendered prior to the date of application".

6. Amend section thirteen (13) line seven (7) by striking the word "property" and inserting in lieu thereof the words "any resource".

SPEAKER: Your committee on judiciary 2 to whom was referred **House File 215**, a bill for an act relating to unfair trade practices by organizations owning, maintaining, or operating cemeteries, begs leave to report it has had the same under consideration and has instructed me to report the same back to the House with the recommendation that the same **be amended as follows, and when so amended the bill do pass:**

Amend House File 215 by striking all after the enacting clause and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

Section 1. Chapter five hundred sixty-six A (566A), Code 1958, is hereby amended by adding thereto the following section:

"No organization subject to the provisions of this chapter shall, by contract, deed, rule, regulation, or by any other device or method, limit or restrict the purchase of any flowers or receptacles therefor, decorations, vault, monument, or marker to be used or installed in any cemetery described in section five hundred sixty-six A point one (566A.1) of this chapter, in such manner that the same (a) must be purchased from any particular person, firm, or corporation, or (b) must be purchased from or through one of several particular persons, firms, or corporations, or (c) is not permitted to be purchased from one or more particular persons, firms, or corporations.

"All rules, regulations, fees, and charges in any such cemetery shall be on a uniform basis, without regard to the source from which any such flowers or receptacles therefor, decorations, vault, monument, or marker is purchased.

"No organization subject to the provisions of this chapter and no officer, partner, agent, or employee of any such organization shall include in any contract or deed any provision contrary to this section, or execute any contract or deed containing any provisions contrary to this section, or represent to any person that the purchase of any of the things referred to in this section is or must be limited or restricted in any manner contrary to the provisions of this section.

"Nothing in this section shall limit the right of any organization subject to the provisions of this chapter reasonably to regulate or restrict the location, size, type, material, and installation of any such vault, marker, or monument.

"This section shall not apply to, and shall not affect the validity or invalidity of, any contract entered into or deed given before the effective date of this Act.

"With respect to organizations subject to the provisions of this chapter, this section shall prevail over any inconsistent provisions of section three hundred fifty-nine point thirty-seven (359.37), Code 1958."

SENATE AMENDMENT TO HOUSE FILE 6

Amend House File 6 as follows:

1. By striking all after the enacting clause and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"Section 1. In any county having a population of more than seventy-five thousand (75,000) the board of supervisors may, and in all counties the board of trustees of any township may, purchase, lease, or otherwise acquire tracts of lands in areas reasonably accessible to all residents and may establish thereon public disposal grounds for the deposit of garbage, rubbish, junk, and other abandoned items unless another governing body of competent jurisdiction has already provided a facility deemed adequate to serve that area.

"Sec. 2. Said boards within their respective jurisdictions may provide for the operation, maintenance and identification of such disposal grounds, either directly or by contract, and shall adopt and enforce such rules and regulations and provide for such uniform fees for use thereof as it shall deem necessary. Said boards may enter into contracts with cities and towns for use of such disposal grounds on a fee basis. All fees collected shall be paid into a 'dump fund' as hereinafter provided.

"Sec. 3. Said boards may establish a dump fund from which all cost of obtaining, operating and maintaining such disposal grounds shall be paid.

"Sec. 4. Said boards may within their respective jurisdictions, levy a tax of one-fourth mill for one year only, on all the property outside the limits of any city or town for the purpose of acquiring such disposal grounds.

"Sec. 5. Any person using such disposal grounds without paying the established fee or having made arrangements with the county auditor or township clerk as the case may be, to pay said fee on a periodic basis shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not more than one hundred dollars or imprisonment in the county jail not to exceed thirty days."

2. Amend the title by striking all after the word "Act" in line 1 and inserting in lieu thereof the following: "to permit the county board of supervisors in counties having a population of more than seventy-five thousand (75,000), and to permit the board of trustees of any township to establish public disposal grounds and operate and maintain them from fees collected, or under a tax levy on property within their jurisdiction and outside the limits of any city or town, or both, and to provide penalties for failure to pay fees."

- 1. The owner of watercraft whether it is being used and operated personally by said owner or by his agent.
- 2. An agent using and operating the watercraft for his principal.
- 3. Any person who is in charge of the watercraft and of the use and operation thereof with the express or implied consent of the owner.

Sec. 3. The original notice of suit filed with the secretary of state shall be in form and substance the same as now provided in suits against residents of this state, except that the part of said notice pertaining to the return day shall be in substantially the following form, to wit:

"and unless you appear thereto and defend in the district court of Iowa in and for county at the courthouse in, Iowa, before noon of the sixtieth day following the filing of this notice with the secretary of state, default will be entered and judgment rendered against you."

Sec. 4. Plaintiff in any such action shall cause the original notice of suit to be served as follows:

1. By filing a copy of said original notice of suit with said secretary of state, together with a fee of two dollars, and

2. By mailing to the defendant, and to each of the defendants if more than one, within ten days after said filing with the secretary of state, by restricted certified mail addressed to the defendant at his last known residence or place of abode, a notification of the said filing with the secretary of state.

Sec. 5: The notification, provided for by this Act, shall be substantially in the following form, to wit:

"To (Here insert the name of each defendant and his residence or last known place of abode.)

You will take notice that an original notice of suit against you, a copy of which is hereto attached, was duly served upon you at Des Moines, Iowa, by filing a copy of said notice on the day of, 19....., with the secretary of state.

Dated at, Iowa, this day of, 19.....

Plaintiff

By.....

Attorney for plaintiff"

Sec. 6. In lieu of mailing said notification to the defendant in a foreign state, plaintiff may cause said notification to be personally served in the foreign state on the defendant by any adult person not a party to the suit, by delivering said notification to the defendant or by offering to make such delivery in case defendant refuses to accept delivery.

Sec. 7. Proof of the filing of a copy of said original notice of suit with the secretary of state, and proof of the mailing or personal delivery of said notification to said nonresident shall be made by affidavit of the party doing said acts. All affidavits of service shall be indorsed upon or attached to the originals of the papers to which they relate. All proofs of service, including

the restricted certified mail return receipt, shall be forthwith filed with the clerk of the district court.

Sec. 8. The foregoing provisions relative to service of original notice of suit on nonresidents shall not be deemed to prevent actual personal service in this state upon the nonresident in the time, manner, form and under the conditions provided for for service on residents.

Sec. 9. Actions against nonresidents as contemplated by this Act may be brought in the county of which plaintiff is a resident, or in the county in which the injury was received or damage done.

Sec. 10. The court in which such action is pending shall grant such continuance to a nonresident defendant as may be necessary to afford him reasonable opportunity to defend said action.

Sec. 11. The secretary of state shall keep a record of all notices of suit filed with him, shall not permit said filed notices to be taken from his office except on an order of court and shall, on request, and without fee, furnish any defendant with a certified copy of the notice in which he is defendant.

Sec. 12. If judgment is rendered against the plaintiff upon the trial of said action, said judgment shall include the reasonable expenses incurred by the defendant and his attorney in appearing to and defending against said action, provided that in the judgment of the trial court said action was commenced maliciously or without probable cause.

Sec. 13. The dismissal of an action after the nonresident has entered a general appearance under the substituted service herein authorized, shall bar the recommencement of the same action against the same defendant unless said recommenced action is accompanied by actual personal service of the original notice of suit on said defendant in this state.

Sec. 14. Any contract insuring the liability of a nonresident operator of a motor boat in Iowa shall, in case of the death of said nonresident, be considered an asset of his estate having a situs in Iowa in any civil action arising out of an accident in which said nonresident may be liable.

SENATE AMENDMENT CONSIDERED

Fisher of Greene called up for consideration House File 6, a bill for an act to permit the county board of supervisors to establish, under certain circumstances, public disposal grounds and operate and maintain them from fees collected or a general tax levy, or both, amended by the Senate, and moved that the House refuse to concur in the following Senate amendment:

Amend House File 6 as follows:

1. By striking all after the enacting clause and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"Section 1. In any county having a population of more than seventy-five thousand (75,000) the board of supervisors may, and in all counties the board of trustees of any township may, purchase, lease, or otherwise acquire tracts of lands in areas reasonably accessible to all residents and may establish thereon public disposal grounds for the deposit of garbage, rubbish, junk, and other abandoned items unless another governing body of

competent jurisdiction has already provided a facility deemed adequate to serve that area.

"Sec. 2. Said boards within their respective jurisdictions may provide for the operation, maintenance and identification of such disposal grounds, either directly or by contract, and shall adopt and enforce such rules and regulations and provide for such uniform fees for use thereof as it shall deem necessary. Said boards may enter into contracts with cities and towns for use of such disposal grounds on a fee basis. All fees collected shall be paid into a 'dump fund' as hereinafter provided.

"Sec. 3. Said boards may establish a dump fund from which all costs of obtaining, operating and maintaining such disposal grounds shall be paid.

"Sec. 4. Said boards may within their respective jurisdictions, levy a tax of one-fourth mill for one year only, on all the property outside the limits of any city or town for the purpose of acquiring such disposal grounds.

"Sec. 5. Any person using such disposal grounds without paying the established fee or having made arrangements with the county auditor or township clerk as the case may be, to pay said fee on a periodic basis shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not more than one hundred dollars or imprisonment in the county jail not to exceed thirty days."

2. Amend the title by striking all after the word "Act" in line 1 and inserting in lieu thereof the following: "to permit the county board of supervisors in counties having a population of more than seventy-five thousand (75,000), and to permit the board of trustees of any township to establish public disposal grounds and operate and maintain them from fees collected, or under a tax levy on property within their jurisdiction and outside the limits of any city or town, or both, and to provide penalties for failure to pay fees."

Senate File 103, a bill for an act to amend section one hundred seventy-six A point ten (176A.10), Code 1958, relating to county agricultural extension education tax, with report of committee recommending passage, was taken up for consideration.

Amend Senate File 103 by adding the following section:

Chapter one hundred seventy-six A (176A), Code 1958, is amended by adding thereto the following section:

"Any two or more extension districts may be consolidated to form a single extension district, by resolution duly adopted by the extension council of each such extension district. Upon adoption of such resolutions providing for such consolidation, the extension councils shall do all things which may be necessary or convenient to carry into effect such consolidation. The initial extension council for such new extension district shall consist of the members of the extension councils of the consolidated extension districts. The extension council of such new extension district shall promptly elect officers as provided in this chapter, and upon such election the terms of the officers of the extension councils of the consolidated extension districts shall terminate. The extension council of the new extension district shall select a name for such district and shall file the name, together with copies of the resolutions providing for such consolidation, with the recorder of each county affected thereby. The new extension district shall be regarded for all purposes as an extension district, the same as if such extension district consisted of a single county, and its extension council and officers thereof shall have all the powers and duties which now or hereafter may pertain to extension councils and officers thereof. All assets and liabilities of the consolidated extension districts shall become the assets and liabilities of the new extension district. The millage rate for the "county agricultural extension education fund" shall be the same in each county included in an extension district formed by consolidation. For the purposes of any law requiring extension districts to file any document with or certify any information to any county officer or board, an extension district formed by consolidation

shall file or certify the same with or to the appropriate officer or board of each county included in the extension district. An extension district formed by consolidation may be dissolved and the original extension districts as they existed prior to such consolidation may be re-established, by resolution duly adopted by the extension council of such extension district; and upon adoption of such resolution, the extension council shall do all things which may be necessary or convenient to carry into effect such dissolution and the re-establishment of the original extension districts.

A concurrent resolution requesting Congress to propose an amendment to the United States Constitution; and for other purposes.

Be It Resolved by the General Assembly of the State of Iowa, that the members of the General Assembly of the State of Iowa respectfully request the Congress of the United States to propose to the people an amendment to the Constitution of the United States or to call a convention for such purpose, as provided by law, to add to said Constitution an Article providing that:

"ARTICLE _____

Section 1. Where the Legislatures of over one-fourth of the several states conclude that a United States Supreme Court decision has transferred powers not authorized by the Constitution of the United States, and where said decision transfers powers from the several States to the Federal Government, said decision shall, upon the application and request of the Legislatures of over one-fourth of the several States, be invalid until subsequently approved by the Legislatures of three-fourths of the several States; provided, however, that said application and request shall be made within three years after the day of said decision.

Section 2. All provisions of Article 3 of the Constitution of the United States that conflict with this amendment are hereby repealed."

Be It Further Resolved, that certified copies of this concurrent resolution shall be sent by the Secretary of State to the Governors and members of the Legislatures of the several States, the President of the United States, the President of the United States Senate, the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, and to each member of the United States Congress.

The President was escorted to the Speaker's station, the Secretary to the Chief Clerk's desk, and the members of the Senate were seated throughout the House chamber.

JOINT CONVENTION

In accordance with law and Senate Concurrent Resolution 9 duly adopted, the joint convention was called to order, President Mooty presiding.

President Mooty announced a quorum present and the joint convention duly organized.

Hanson of Lyon moved that a committee of five, consisting of two members from the Senate and three members from the House, be appointed to notify the Honorable Barry Goldwater and the Honorable Norman Erbe that the joint convention was ready to receive them.

Motion prevailed and the President appointed as such committee Senator Rigler of Chickasaw and Senator Fisher of Clarke, on the part of the Senate, and Representatives Hanson of Lyon, Lynes of Bremer and Lisle of Page, on the part of the House.

The committee waited upon the Honorable Barry Goldwater and the Honorable Norman Erbe and escorted them to the Speaker's rostrum.

President Mooty presented to the joint convention the Honorable Barry Goldwater with these remarks:

I am indeed proud and pleased to have the opportunity to introduce to you, this morning, our guest, the Honorable Barry Goldwater, United States Senator from Arizona.

Our guest is married and father of four children. He is a Brigadier General in the Air Force Reserve and received his education at Staunton Military Academy and the University of Arizona. He is chairman of the Board of Goldwaters, having been associated with that firm since 1929.

Senator Goldwater is chairman of the Republican senatorial campaign committee, he is a member of the labor and public welfare committee, the interior and insular affairs committee and serves on the committee on improper activities in the labor or management field. His early political background consisted of four years' service as a member of the City Council of Phoenix. He was elected to the United States Senate in 1952 and re-

elected in 1958. It is with great pleasure that I present to you, at this time, the Honorable Barry Goldwater.

The Honorable Barry Goldwater addressed the joint convention with the following remarks:

Mr. Goldwater said the tough attitude toward the Russians being expressed by President Kennedy is eminently correct and long overdue. He called the President's pronouncement on the situation in Laos in the right direction. He advocated an extension of the same attitude and same toughness toward Cuba and recommended that the President deliver a similar ultimatum to Cuba as quickly as possible. He said that this attitude does run the risk of war, but he has never known the American people to not fight for the freedoms that are ours. He said, however, that he does not expect war will result. Every time we have stood up to the Russians they have backed down, he commented.

Senator Goldwater said the biggest domestic problem facing the nation is the trend toward centralization in Washington, and both parties have been guilty of this practice; the trend is dangerous because it violates the concepts of our constitution. He said that under one version of the minimum wage debate, it would be possible to consider a boot black as being under federal control through interstate commerce regulations because he had to buy his polish across state lines. Senator Goldwater called legislation on federal aid to education an attempt to acquire control of education at the Washington level, and that the tenth amendment to the constitution contains no authority of the federal government to control or a right to enter into the problems of the state. He commended Iowa as being one of the three states which has not adopted an enabling act to qualify this state for federal housing financial aid, and said that the people of New Jersey have learned that, to get one dollar of federal aid, it costs them two dollars and forty-seven cents.

Senator Goldwater said that both parties have great hope, and their prayers are for the success of President Kennedy, and added that no American should wish the President ill because our country has reached the point where we can no longer indulge in such politics. He commended Iowa on its state capitol, which he described as one of the most beautiful he has ever seen in this country, and said that such a venerable building should be preserved.

President Mooty expressed to Senator Goldwater the appreciation of the members of the legislature, employees and guests for appearing and addressing the joint convention.

The committee previously appointed came forward and escorted the Honorable Barry Goldwater and the Honorable Norman Erbe from the House chamber.

Senator Lynes of Bremer moved that the joint convention be now dissolved.

The motion prevailed.

The House reconvened, Speaker Nelson in the chair.

SPEAKER: Your committee on judiciary 1 to whom was referred **Senate File 202**, a bill for an act to repeal sections six hundred twenty-two point twenty-eight (622.28) and six hundred twenty-two point twenty-nine (622.29), Code 1958, relating to admissibility of records as evidence and to enact a substitute therefor, begs leave to report it has had the same under consideration and has instructed me to report the same back to the House with the recommendation that the same be amended as follows, and when so amended the bill do pass:

Amend Senate File 202 by striking all of lines five (5) through nineteen (19) of section 1 thereof and insert in lieu thereof the following:

"Any writing or record, whether in the form of an entry in a book, or otherwise, including electronic means and interpretations thereof, offered as memoranda or records of acts, conditions or events to prove the facts stated therein, shall be admissible as evidence if the judge finds that they were made in the regular course of a business at or about the time of the act, condition or event recorded, and that the sources of information from which made and the method and circumstances of their preparation were such as to indicate their trustworthiness.

Evidence of the absence of a memorandum or record from the memoranda or records of a business of an asserted act, event or condition, shall be admissible as evidence to prove the non-occurrence of the act or event, or the non-existence of the condition, if the judge finds that it was in the regular course of that business to make such memoranda of all such acts, events or conditions at the time thereof or within a reasonable time thereafter, and to preserve them.

The term business, as used in this section, include business, profession, occupation, and calling of every kind."

Fryer, U. S. Air Force; Colonel Millard G. Gray, U. S. Army; Ray C. Stiles, Commander, Department of Iowa American Legion; Mrs. Deverre Harper, President, Iowa Department American Legion Auxiliary; Dale Clark, Commander, Iowa Department of AmVets; Vinton E. Jones, Commander, Sons of Union Veterans; Carl Betts, Executive Director of National Civil War Centennial Commission; and the following members of the Iowa Civil War Centennial Commission: Willard Archie, Fleming Fraker, Jr., Amy Noll, Ralph Evans, Senator Eugene M. The Civil War was the greatest test our country ever faced, built of the heroism and endurance that were drawn from men and women of both sections by devotion to principles valued more than life itself, and the loss, the gain, and the experience itself are a common national possession. More Iowans gave their lives to their country in that conflict than in both World Wars, the Korean War and the Spanish-American War combined, and more than 76,000 citizens of Iowa served in the Union forces during that conflict out of a population of 674,000, and 13,000 of them made the supreme sacrifice for their convictions.

The Honorable Joseph B. Flatt presented to the joint convention the distinguished National Chairman of the National Civil War Centennial Commission, Major General Ulysses S. Grant III, of Washington, D. C.

Major General Grant III addressed the joint convention on "The War Was Won in the West", and explained the strategy by which the Union forces held the Confederacy in the East while crumpling up the Confederates in campaigns along the Mississippi River and tributaries, extending eastward to the Atlantic Ocean.

Senator Flatt thanked General Grant in behalf of the members of the legislature and guests for appearing and addressing the joint convention.

President Mooty presented to the joint convention the East High Choir of Des Moines and their director Mary Gunther. The choir sang "Battle Hymn of the Republic" and "The Prayer," accompanied by Larry Cortner and Kaye Rogerson.

The committee previously appointed came forward and escorted

Governor and Mrs. Norman Erbe, Major General U. S. Grant III, and the Honorable Joseph B. Flatt from the House chamber.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

SENATE FILE 144 SUBSTITUTED FOR HOUSE FILE 283

Johannes of Osceola asked and received unanimous consent to substitute Senate File 144 for House File 283.

Senate File 144, a bill for an act to amend chapter four hundred twenty-nine (429), Code 1958, relating to moneys and credits tax, was taken up for consideration.

Mowry of Marshall asked and received unanimous consent to withdraw the amendment filed by him on March 24 and found on pages 811 and 812 of the House Journal.

Andersen of Woodbury offered the following amendment field by him and moved its adoption:

Amend Senate File 144 by striking everything after the enacting clause and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

Section 1. Section four hundred twenty-nine point two (429.2), Code 1958, is hereby amended as follows:

1. By striking from line nineteen (19) the words "five mills" and inserting in lieu thereof the words "one mill".

2. By adding the following after the word "resides" at the end of said section:

"The tax provided for in section four hundred thirty point seven (430.7) of the Code and section four hundred thirty-one point thirteen (431.13) of the Code shall be at the rate of five mills on the dollar."

Sec. 2. Chapter four hundred twenty-nine (429), Code 1958, is hereby amended by adding the following new section:

"All transfers as defined in this section made within sixty days of the time for declaration of moneys and credits, which result in avoidance of the tax imposed by this chapter, shall be presumed to have been made to evade the tax on moneys and credits and as a transfer to evade tax shall be taxed at actual value in present form. The burden shall be on the owner to overcome such presumption. When used in this section transfers shall be construed to mean:

"1. The borrowing of money and the use of such debt to reduce the total dollar value of moneys and credits declared, while the money borrowed is retained in such form on the date for declaration so as to be noninterest bearing.

"2. The exchanging of taxable moneys and credits for nontaxable moneys and credits prior to the day for assessment, and the exchange back to taxable moneys and credits within six months after the time for declaring moneys and credits."

Sec. 3. Chapter four hundred twenty-nine (429), Code 1958, is further amended by adding the following new section:

"The owner of moneys and credits shall declare to the assessor all such

moneys and credits notwithstanding the fact that such moneys and credits may be subject to exemption or deduction."

Sec. 4. Section four hundred twenty-nine point four (429.4), Code 1958, is hereby repealed and the following enacted in lieu thereof:

"1. After declaration of all moneys and credits whatsoever each person may deduct from the actual taxable value of such moneys and credits in order to compute the tax the sum of five thousand dollars, and a married person may deduct an additional five thousand dollars for his spouse without regard as to legal ownership of such moneys and credits. In no case shall a married couple claim more than ten thousand dollars as a deduction under this subsection whether they declare jointly or severally.

"2. A person may deduct the gross amount of good-faith debts owing by him from the actual dollar value of the declared moneys and credits before computing tax.

"3. Noninterest bearing moneys and credits and accounts receivable are tax exempt, except that they shall be declared and deducted from the allowable deduction provided for in subsection one (1) of this section."

Sec. 5. Section four hundred twenty-seven point one (427.1), Code 1958, is hereby amended as follows:

1. By striking subsection five (5).

2. By striking subsection twenty (20) and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"The shares of capital stock of corporations not organized for profit."

Sec. 6. Section four hundred thirty-one point thirteen (431.13), Code 1958, is hereby repealed and the following enacted in lieu thereof:

"A sum which equals five percent of the amount paid in by members and credited on shares shall be taxed and assessed as moneys and credits against every mutual building and loan or savings and loan association at its principal place of business.

Sec. 7. Section four hundred thirty-one point nine (431.9), section four hundred thirty-one point ten (431.10), section four hundred thirty-one point twelve (431.12), and section four hundred thirty-one point sixteen (431.16), Code 1958, are hereby repealed.

Sec. 8. Chapter four hundred thirty-one (431) is hereby amended by adding the following new section:

"There is hereby levied and imposed against the owners of shares of mutual building and loan or savings and loan associations a tax of one mill on the dollar on the actual value of such shares. The actual value of the share shall be determined at the close of the business day on December 31, and shall equal the amount shown to the credit of the shareholder by the association."

REPORT OF IOWA-NEBRASKA BOUNDARY STUDY COMMITTEE

Pursuant to House Joint Resolution No. 8 adopted by the Fifty-seventh General Assembly of Iowa, Chapter 307 of the Acts of the 1957 General Assembly, a special legislative committee of the State of Iowa was established to meet and confer with a boundary commission established by the State of Nebraska to make a survey and study of the present boundary line between the States of Iowa and Nebraska and to report thereon to this session of the General Assembly.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 17 adopted by the Fifty-eighth General Assembly of the State of Iowa extended the scope of study. The committee was directed to confer with the Nebraska commission relative to the boundary line between Iowa and Nebraska and further to make a determination if a boundary line problem does exist between the State of Iowa and South Dakota due to reported channel realignments by the Corps of Engineers U. S. Army along the Big Sioux River.

The members originally appointed to this committee under House Joint Resolution No. 8, Fifty-seventh General Assembly, were, from the Senate: Frank M. Hoxie, D. C. Nolan, Jim O. Henry; and from the House: William E. Darrington, Fred L. Johnson and Henry Stevens. The committee filed a report and it was made a part of the record in the Senate Journal, February 13, 1959, page 301. The committee, following numerous public hearings and study of reports of the Corps of Engineers U. S. Army, along with visual inspections of the Missouri river concluded that a sufficient degree of stream stabilization had not been attained to warrant a committee recommendation to proceed with boundary line negotiations at that time. This finding was concurred in by the Nebraska commission.

Under Senate Joint Resolution No. 17, Acts of the Fifty-eighth General Assembly, the committee was reactivated in December of 1959. Replacement committee members added were, from the Senate: Robert G. Moore and J. T. Dykhous; and from the House: Fred M. Jarvis and Willard M. Freed. Representative Jarvis resigned from the House following the December, 1959, organizational meeting and was replaced by Lester L. Cluever. For the purpose of this report we respectfully refer to the committee report found on page 301 of the Senate Journal, February 13, 1959, Acts of the Fifty-eighth General Assembly, to supplement historical background of the present committee's conclusions.

The Iowa committee in consultation with the Nebraska Boundary Study

Commission during August of 1960 concluded from the reports of the District Office of the Corps of Engineers U. S. Army and visual inspections that a sufficient degree of channel stabilization had been attained to attempt a boundary line determination. The unanimous conclusion of the Iowa committee and the Nebraska commission to proceed with boundary negotiations was based on the premise that the twenty-eight miles of wild river, so-called because of lack of stabilization work, would be under contract with completion date August, 1961, with the exception of some five miles. Involved in this work is an eight mile realignment at Decatur Bend which additional shortens the river length. The proposed realignment eliminates an oxbow, substituting for it long sweeping curves designed to lower the river bed, making a deeper, more navigable channel.

The Nebraska commission made the proposal that the middle channel of the Missouri River be the center line of the proposed stabilized channel of the Missouri River as established by the District Office of the Corps of Engineers U. S. Army, Omaha, Nebraska, and shown on the construction maps of the Missouri River from Sioux City, Iowa, to Hamburg, Iowa, and identified by file numbers M400-61-18 through M400-61-47 inclusive, file number M400-61-51A and file numbers M400-61-51 through M400-61-84 inclusive, which maps are now on file in the District Office of the Corps of Engineers U. S. Army, Omaha, Nebraska.

Further negotiations between the Iowa committee and the Nebraska commission came to an impasse when an Iowa proposal making the center of the river the boundary with the exception of the Carter Lake area was declined by the Nebraska commission.

The Iowa committee then held a public hearing at Carter Lake September 17, 1960, to permit an expression of the views held by Carter Lake citizens.

Essential facts developed during negotiations point to the findings that in a 121 mile span of the river from Sioux City to Omaha, Nebraska, the Missouri River straightening by the Corps of Engineers U. S. Army has eliminated, or will eliminate, some 40 miles of river bends on the Iowa side. The losses in river frontage under the 1943 compact are principally at Blackbird Bend, Tieville Bend and Decatur Bend. No one lives in the area to the knowledge of the committee.

The oxbow cutoffs are well adapted to conservation and recreational uses and should be preserved for this use. A determination of the feasibility of industrial sites indicates a potential need in the vicinity of Sioux City, Missouri Valley, Carter Lake, Council Bluffs and Hamburg.

Carter Lake residents are practically unanimous in their opposition to becoming a part of Nebraska. Carter Lake is now the second largest city in Pottawattamie county with a population count of 2,287 according to the 1960 census.

On December 21, 1960, the Iowa committee considered the following resolution by Senator Moore:

"Be It Resolved that this committee is of the consensus that the following boundary line between the States of Iowa and Nebraska should be established:

Commencing at the northern boundary of the State of Missouri, thence up the middle of the main channel of the Missouri River to a point opposite the middle of the main channel of the Big Sioux River.

The said middle of the main channel of the Missouri River referred to in this Resolution shall be the center line of the proposed stabilized channel of the Missouri River as established by the United States Engineers' Office, Omaha, Nebraska, and shown on the alluvial plain maps of the Missouri River from Sioux City, Iowa, to Rulo, Nebraska, and identified by file numbers

dated
 and file numbers.....
 dated.....
 which maps are now on file in the United States Engineers' Office at Omaha, Nebraska."

The maps referred to in the Resolution as quoted are as follows:

File numbers M400-61-18 through M400-61-47 inclusive, dated February 21, 1961, file number M400-61-51A, dated February 21, 1961 and file numbers M400-61-51 through M400-61-84, inclusive, dated February 21, 1961, which maps are now on file in the District Office of the Corps of Engineers U. S. Army, Omaha, Nebraska.

Senator Hoxie offered an amendment to the Resolution which provided that Carter Lake be made an exception and thereby remain a part of Iowa. On roll call the amendment was lost. The motion on the Resolution by Senator Moore was then considered and adopted by the following vote: Ayes—Moore, Dykhouse, Freed, Kluever; Nays—Hoxie, Darrington.

The adoption of this Resolution thereby became the recommendation of the Iowa Boundary Study Committee.

The chairman and secretary were instructed to work with the Nebraska commission to determine the design maps to use in drafting a boundary line bill to be submitted to the Iowa and Nebraska Legislatures for their consideration. The chairman was further instructed to prepare a report of the committee's study for presentation to the Fifty-ninth General Assembly of Iowa.

It is the belief of this committee that an exhaustive survey and study has been made of this problem, as evinced by the several public hearings held on both the Iowa and Nebraska sides of the river. The committee has had the complete cooperation of the District Office of the Corps of Engineers U. S. Army in the presentation of their work, and, therefore, wish to take this opportunity to express their appreciation to them for their help; also a note of appreciation on behalf of the chairman of the Iowa committee and the General committee to Mr. R. N. Towl, chairman of the Nebraska commission, and other members for their work.

The committee finds no basis for a study at this time of realignments proposed by the Corps of Engineers U. S. Army which may result in channel shifts of the Big Sioux River between the Iowa and South Dakota boundaries.

In conclusion we recommend that a committee be continued until negotiations now in progress are completed.

Your committee appointed to resolve the differences between the House and Senate on the passage of House File 6 makes the following recommendation:

Amend House File 6 by striking all after the enacting clause and inserting the following:

Section 1. The board of supervisors of any county may determine that a public disposal ground is needed in their county and may make a finding as to where such disposal ground shall be located.

Reference is herein made to your oral request for our view of the meaning of the term "trading stamps" as used in House File 307.

We find that the term as defined in the foregoing numbered bill is substantially the definition of the term as it appears in Webster's New International Dictionary, Second Edition. It does not, in our view, include a "coupon" or a "certificate", or "ticket" or a comparable device, but is what it says, a stamp passing between a seller and a purchaser in a present transaction of sale and purchase, and is the equivalent of a cash discount in such transaction. It does not include coupons, certificates, etc., offered as gifts that may or may not result in a future sale or purchase.

Section 1. Section two (2), article three (III), of the constitution of the State of Iowa, is repealed and the following adopted in lieu thereof:

"The General Assembly shall meet in regular session on the second Monday in January of each year. In the interim the General Assembly may be convened by the governor by proclamation. In even-numbered years the session shall be limited to consideration of the budget, the production, distribution and appropriation of revenue, review and revision of the tax structure, legislation designed to meet emergencies, and such other legislation involving subject matters authorized for consideration by the General Assembly under rules

adopted by the majority of not less than two-thirds of its elected members of each house or authorized by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing proposed amendment to the constitution of the State of Iowa is hereby referred to the General Assembly to be chosen at the next general election, and the secretary of state is directed to cause the same to be published, as provided by law, for three (3) months previous to the time of making such choice.

The remaining fifty percent shall be credited to the county conservation board of the county where the boat or boat motor is licensed, but if said board prefers, the said fifty percent that would have gone to said board may be credited to the state conservation commission and if such county does not have a county conservation board, the fifty percent that would have been credited to such conservation board shall be credited to the state conservation commission."

WHEREAS, the board of education of the Marion Rural Community School District, having passed a resolution objecting to any boundary-line changes of school districts by legislative action as drawn up in the original bill known as House File 492 by Riley and Ely, and

WHEREAS, the board of education of the Marion Rural Community School District, and the board of education of the Cedar Rapids Community School District having met for the purpose of studying the costs and needs of suitable building sites within the Cedar Rapids Community School District, and

WHEREAS, the board of education of the Marion Rural Community School District, not wishing to cause any additional expense to the taxpayers of the Cedar Rapids Community School District or cause any inconvenience or hindrance to the program of education carried on by the Cedar Rapids Community School District for the students of their district, willingly withdraws its objections to the bill as amended herein, but still wishing to remain on record as being opposed to any other boundary-line changes of school districts by any method other than an election wherein a majority of the voters living within the district from which territory is taken approve such boundary change;

Senate File 105, an act relating to the rules and regulations promulgated by the various state agencies of the State of Iowa, in accordance with the provisions of Article III, Section 16, Constitution of the State of Iowa, is disapproved for the following reasons:

While I am in complete sympathy with the purpose of the act, I have been advised by the Attorney General's office that there is a serious question as to its constitutionality. Constitutional objection is made to conferring such power upon State agencies to make rules to govern its operation as being a delegation of Legislative power. However, the courts have supported the delegation in its strictest sense as not true delegation of power, but a blending of permissive Legislative and judicial power.

Precedent for the enactment of Senate File 105 is claimed in Section 684.19, Code of Iowa 1958, with respect to rules of the Supreme Court, which Section provides:

"Report of general assembly—enrollment. Any such rules or forms prescribed by the supreme court shall be reported by it to the general assembly within twenty days after the commencement of a regular session and shall take effect July 4 following the adjournment of such session, with such changes, if any, as may have been enacted at such session; and thereafter all laws in conflict therewith shall be of no further force or effect.

"At adjournment of the general assembly where such report has been filed, an enrolled copy thereof, together with any changes, shall be made in substantially the same manner as acts are enrolled. The enrolled copy shall be certified as to whether or not any action was taken by the general assembly and if any, what action, and thereupon it shall be filed with the secretary of state and bound with the acts of the general assembly."

However, this Section deals with Rules of Civil Procedure, as opposed to the delegation made to the state agency in making rules to govern their power.

Reasonable search discloses no exact precedent to Senate File 105. It would appear that what the Legislature has conferred is not the delegation of Legislative power, and what it seeks to recapture by this act is likewise not legislative power but administrative power. Therefore, it is an invasion

of the administrative authority and a violation of the constitutional separation of the legislative and administrative branches.

We voted for House File 686 because the adoption of the amendment striking lines 10 to 12 removed the dangerous part of the bill, and made the remainder a good bill.

SENATE FILE 441 VETOED

Dear Sir:

Senate File 441, an Act relating to the reorganization of certain school districts in a county of more than 100,000 bordering on the Mississippi River, in accordance with the provisions of Article III, Section 16, Constitution of the State of Iowa, is disapproved for the following reasons:

1. One reason advanced for the signing of this Bill has been that we must have a favorable tax climate for industry. This is certainly true, but if it is to be the policy of the State of Iowa to grant favorable tax treatment to industry then it should be applicable to all industries in all ninety-nine counties in Iowa rather than limited to one county.

2. It has been for several years the declared policy of the State of Iowa to encourage the reorganization of school districts into units as are necessary, economical and efficient, which will insure an equal opportunity for education to all children of the state. It is my belief that Senate File 441 is contrary to both the spirit and purpose of this policy. In fact, the provisions of this Act will seriously hinder proper school reorganization with equal educational opportunity for the children of Iowa.

3. The schools in the county affected by the Act have requested for the 1961-62 school year \$88,733 in emergency school aid from the state. This is nearly 89 per cent of the total emergency aid available from the state for school purposes in all of Iowa. If this Bill were enacted into law the requests for emergency state school aid would probably be even greater.

4. Property owners in the State of Iowa are justifiably distressed by the high rate of property taxes brought about by school reorganization. These taxes are at the present time paid and shared by all of the property tax owners in all of the ninety-nine counties. This Bill would provide preferential tax treatment for one school district of the more than 1,575 school districts in the State of Iowa.

5. The principle established by Senate File 441 represents a sharp deviation from previously announced legislative policy in the field of school reorganization and if this new approach to the problem is sound, then it should not be limited in its application to one of our ninety-nine counties but should be applicable throughout the entire state.

Be It Further Resolved, that the General Assembly of the State of Iowa pledge its support in the planning of an educational television network which will adequately serve the State of Iowa and its cooperation with the proposed Upper Midwest Six-state Educational Television Network.

HOUSE RESOLUTION 6

By Committee on Institutions of Higher Learning

House Resolution directing the department of public instruction to prepare a statewide plan for the development of public area community colleges and to study and make recommendations concerning high-school vocational and technical education programs.

Whereas, the Gibson report on the resources and needs for higher education in Iowa pointed out that public policy governing higher education in Iowa must recognize the educational and vocational aspirations of all persons who will need education beyond the high school; and

Whereas, such report states that less than one-tenth of college-age youth receive the bachelor's degree; and

Whereas, such report recommends that public area community colleges be authorized by the legislature and that the planning of such colleges be the responsibility of the state board and department of public instruction; and

Whereas, more than seventy percent of Iowa youth go to work with a high-school education or less, and there is need to examine the vocational and technical education programs at the high school level to determine whether they are adequate to meet the educational needs of workers who have to adjust to changing opportunities; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives, that the department of public instruction be directed to study and prepare a plan for a statewide system of public area community colleges, such plan to include all areas of the state and to take into consideration the program now offered by the existing junior colleges of the state.

Be It Further Resolved, that from the results of its findings from this study the department submit, by December 1, 1962, to the members of the General Assembly its recommendations, with proposed legislation to implement such recommendations and plan, such recommendations and plan to relate to, but not limited to, the following matters:

1. Criteria for establishment of such colleges;
2. Organization, legal control, supervision and financial support of such colleges;
3. Regional location of such colleges;
4. Functions to be performed by such colleges in offering:
 - a. the first two years of regular college work including preprofessional education,
 - b. vocational and technical education,
 - c. programs for in-service training and retraining of workers,
 - d. guidance and counseling services to assist local students in planning their education and occupational careers, and
 - e. community services;
5. Relationships of such community colleges with other parts of the educational system in this state.

Be It Further Resolved, that as part of such study the department of public instruction shall study the availability of vocational and technical education in Iowa high schools, and from this study recommend to the General Assembly and local school authorities ways and means to provide the necessary vocational and technical training for Iowa youth and adults at this level of education, such study to be concerned primarily with the availability of and plans for vocational and technical education in the fields of trades and industry and business, both at the high-school level and the adult education level.

EXPLANATION

The Gibson Report, authorized by the study committee last session, was not received in full until the middle of this session. It points out the problems but does not specifically give us the answers that we can use and the

bills to implement them at this session. This resolution directs the Department of Public Instruction to research this problem relating to vocational and terminal education and have the bills ready to be considered in the next session of the legislature. It also directs the department to examine the problem of vocational education in the high schools.

"However, the amount estimated and certified to apply on principal and interest for any one year may exceed seven mills but shall not exceed ten mills on the dollar of the taxable property of the school corporation, if the school corporation has more than half of its land area in a county having more than 25,000 population or in two or more such counties; and if this provision is at any time applicable to a school corporation, it shall continue to apply to such school corporation or its successor notwithstanding any change in such land area or population."

(70) proof; four cents an ounce for liquor of proof between fifty (50) and seventy (70) proof; three cents an ounce for liquor between thirty (30) and fifty (50) proof; and two cents an ounce for liquor of less than thirty (30) proof.

Sec. 3. Section one hundred twenty-three point fifty (123.50), Code 1958, is amended by adding the following:

"In computing gross sales for the purposes of this section, the receipts from special seals for use when possession is surrendered or a charge is made for handling, dispensing or mixing liquor shall not be included. All funds received for such seals shall be distributed among all of the public school districts of Iowa in proportion to their pupils in average daily attendance as defined in subsection two (2) of section two hundred eighty-three point one (283.1), of the Code.

Sec. 4. Chapter one hundred twenty-three (123), Code 1958, is amended by adding thereto the following:

Anything to the contrary notwithstanding, no such surrendered-possession seals shall be required for beer and malt liquors as defined in chapter one hundred twenty-four (124) of the Code.

No liquor shall be used or kept or consumed outside of an individual's home in any place where possession is surrendered or a charge is made for handling, dispensing or mixing it unless a special surrendered-possession seal is attached to each bottle used, kept or consumed in any such place.

Any violation of this section shall be considered a nuisance under section one hundred twenty-three point sixty (123.60) of the Code.

SIFTING COMMITTEE NONCONTROVERSIAL CALENDAR

Senate File 191, a bill for an act to amend, clarify, broaden and improve the laws of the State of Iowa concerning municipalities; especially relating to sanitary sewer systems, by amending chapter three hundred ninety-three (393), Code 1958, relating to sewer rentals, with report of committee recommending passage, was taken up for consideration.

1. By adding the following new sections:

"Sec. 4. Any municipality in which is located a state institution of higher learning under the control of the board of regents may purchase a privately owned waterworks and its entire distribution system, including such portions of the system which are located in nearby or adjacent municipalities and areas. Any such municipality shall finance, maintain and operate such waterworks under the provisions of chapters three hundred ninety-seven (397), three hundred ninety-eight (398) and three hundred ninety-nine (399), where applicable, except as otherwise provided in sections five (5) through eight (8) of this Act.

"Sec. 5. When any such municipality described in section four (4) of this Act purchases a waterworks, any right, title or interest in the waterworks property may be transferred to such municipality including property located in nearby or adjacent municipalities and areas. Such municipality is hereby authorized to acquire any right, title or interest of such waterworks property.

"Sec. 6. Any such municipality described in section four (4) of this Act which purchases a privately owned waterworks may contract with persons, corporations and municipalities located in nearby or adjacent areas to

provide water services and extensions of water services to such areas. The provisions of section three hundred ninety-seven point twenty-seven (397.27) of the Code shall not apply to such municipalities.

"Sec. 7. Any contract for water services between the municipalities described in section six (6) of this Act shall not become effective until the following procedures have been followed:

1. The proposed contract shall be adopted by the council of both municipalities.

2. Notice of the adoption of such contract shall be published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in the county where the municipalities are located at least once each week for two consecutive weeks. Such notice shall set forth the terms of the proposed contract.

3. If within twenty days of the first publication of the notice, a petition is filed with the clerk of either municipality requesting that the question of whether to approve such proposed contract be submitted to an election, such election shall be held in the municipality whose qualified voters make such petition. The petition must be signed by a number of qualified voters of such municipality at least equal to twenty percent of the votes cast by such municipality for governor at the last general election. Notice and time of such election shall be governed by section three hundred ninety-seven point seven (397.7) of the Code. The contract shall become effective only if a majority of the votes cast in such election are in favor of such contract.

4. If a petition is not filed within twenty days as provided in subsection three (3) of this section, the contract shall become effective without a vote of the electors.

"Sec. 8. Cities and towns which are located nearby or adjacent to institutions under the control of the state board of regents shall have power to acquire, own, construct, establish, purchase, maintain, alter and operate a waterworks plant, distribution lines, or any part thereof, in cooperation with any institution under the control of the state board of regents, located nearby or adjacent to said city or town, and receive from any such state controlled institution, financial grants and assistance for the purchase, construction, operation, and maintenance of such waterworks utility, and to serve said state controlled institution as a customer upon such terms and conditions as may be made between such institution and the city or town, and to do all acts necessary for carrying out the purposes of this section, whether said state controlled institution and the waterworks utility or any part thereof, lies within or without the corporate limits of any such city or town, and to finance the cost thereof by the issuance of bonds under the provisions of chapters three hundred ninety-seven (397), three hundred ninety-eight (398) and three hundred ninety-nine (399), as the same may be applicable."

2. By striking all of the title after the word "concerning" in line two (2) and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"municipal sanitary sewer and waterworks systems."

EXPLANATION OF VOTE

I voted for the Knowles amendment to Senate File 80 because this amendment would have raised \$10 million for schools on liquor by the drink as it is now served in Iowa. In polling over 1,000 through my Advise and Brief Club, I received 750 answers to a questionnaire on tax policy. The following are the results of this poll as they came in:

Q. 1. Local property taxes are going up at the rate of \$30 million per year throughout Iowa. About two-thirds of this increase, \$20 million, is the increasing cost of school tax. \$30 million increased state aid to schools could reduce local school taxes by \$30 million the first year if expenses were kept the same. This would mean a savings of \$30 per year tax on a \$5,000 assessed home.

Favor 582. Oppose 130. No ans. 138.

If so, how should the money be raised?

2. Economies in state government? Yes 623. No 10. No ans. 7.

5. Other taxes? Liquor by drink, service tax, luxury tax—375.

Fourth district shall consist of the Counties of Marshall, Tama, Benton, Jasper, Poweshiek, Iowa, Warren, Marion, Mahaska, Keokuk, Clarke, Lucas, Monroe, Wapello, Decatur, Wayne, Appanoose and Davis.

Fifth district shall consist of the Counties of Hamilton, Hardin, Boone, Story and Polk.

Sixth district shall consist of the Counties of Lyon, Osceola, Dickinson, Emmet, Sioux, O'Brien, Clay, Palo Alto, Plymouth, Cherokee, Buena Vista, Pocahontas, Woodbury, Ida, Sac, Calhoun and Webster.

Seventh district shall consist of the Counties of Monona, Crawford,

SENATE AMENDMENT TO HOUSE FILE 187

(a) 'Persons of low income' means persons or families whose combined gross income does not exceed thirty-six hundred (3,600) dollars per annum, except that in case of families with one or more dependents said annual income shall not exceed an additional one hundred (100) dollars for each such dependent. When the annual income of the person or family exceeds thirty-six hundred (3,600) dollars plus one hundred (100) dollars for each such dependent by the sum of six hundred (600) dollars he shall be required to vacate within six (6) months.

(b) 'Gross income' shall mean the adjusted gross income as defined by the Federal Internal Revenue Code increased by the amount of government or private retirement or disability pensions and payments received, and excluding the first five hundred (500) dollars of earnings of students who attended a regular public or private school for a period of at least five (5) months of the previous calendar year.

(c) 'Dependent' means members of the household, other than the spouse or head of the household, who qualify as dependents under the Federal Internal Revenue Code.

2. Amend section 7, line 13, by adding after the word "project." the following:

"Provided, however, such determination of eligibility shall be within the limits of the income limits hereinbefore set out."

JOINT CONVENTION

President Mooty announced a quorum present and the joint convention duly organized.

Naden of Hamilton moved that a committee of six, consisting of three members from the Senate and three members from the House, be appointed to notify Governor and Mrs. Amano of Yamanashi Prefecture, Japan, that the joint convention was ready to receive them.

Motion prevailed and the President appointed as such committee Senators Flatt of Madison, Wilson of Appanoose and Scott of Fayette on the part of the Senate and Representatives Naden of Hamilton, Lisle of Page and Hagedorn of Clay on the part of the House.

The committee waited upon Governor and Mrs. Norman Erbe and Governor and Mrs. Hisashi Amano and escorted them to the Speaker's station. President Mooty presented Governor Erbe who introduced Governor Hisashi Amano, Governor of Yamanashi Prefecture, Japan.

Governor Amano of our sister state of Yamanashi, Japan, addressed the joint convention briefly.

The committee previously appointed came forward and escorted Governor and Mrs. Norman Erbe and Governor and Mrs. Hisashi Amano from the House chamber.

Lynes of Bremer moved that the joint convention be now dissolved. The motion prevailed.

The House reconvened, Speaker Nelson in the chair.

CONSIDERATION OF BILLS

SIFTING COMMITTEE CALENDAR

Senate File 466, a bill for an act relating to allocations from the road use tax fund and to the apportionment thereof, with report of committee recommending passage, was taken up for consideration.

Goode of Davis offered the following amendment filed by him and moved its adoption:

Amend Senate File 466 by striking all after the enacting clause and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"Section 1. Section three hundred twelve point two (312.2), Code 1958, is hereby amended by striking subsections one (1), two (2), three (3), and four (4) and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

1. To the primary road fund, forty-eight percent.
2. To the secondary road fund of the counties thirty percent.
3. To the farm-to-market road fund, ten percent.
4. To the street construction fund of cities and towns, twelve percent.

The treasurer of state shall before making the above allotments credit annually to the highway grade crossing safety fund the sum of \$120,000.00, and credit annually to the primary road fund the sum of \$500,000.00 for carrying out chapter two hundred seven (207), Acts of the Fifty-eighth General Assembly. All unobligated funds provided by this subsection at the end of each year shall revert to the road use tax fund.

Sec. 2. Section three hundred twelve point three (312.3), Code 1958, is hereby amended by striking subsection one (1) and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"1. Apportion among the counties in the ratio that the needs of the secondary roads of each county bear to the total needs of the secondary roads of the state for the twenty-year improvement program developed by the automotive safety foundation and filed with the Iowa Highway study committee created by chapter four hundred twenty-six (426), Acts of the Fifty-eighth General Assembly, and which is on record at the state highway commission, sixty percent of the allocation from road use tax funds which he has credited to the secondary road fund of the counties, and apportion among the counties in the ratio that the area of such county bears to the total area of the state, forty percent of the allocation from road use tax funds which he has credited to the secondary road fund of the counties."

Sec. 3. Section three hundred twelve point three (312.3), Code 1958, is hereby amended by striking from line six (6) of subsection two (2) the word "eight" and inserting in lieu thereof the word "twelve".

Sec. 4. Section three hundred twelve point five (312.5), Code 1958, is hereby repealed, and the following inserted in lieu thereof:

"The road use tax funds credited to the farm-to-market road fund by the treasurer of state, are hereby divided as follows, and are to be known respectively as:

1. Need allotment farm-to-market road funds, sixty percent; and
2. Area allotment farm-to-market road funds, forty percent.

All farm-to-market road funds, except funds which under section 310.20 come from any county's allotment of the road use tax funds, shall be allotted among the counties by the state highway commission. Area allotment farm-to-market road funds and federal aid secondary road funds received by the state, shall be allotted among all the counties of the state in the ratio that the area of each county bears to the total area of the whole state.

Need allotment farm-to-market road funds shall be allotted among the counties in the ratio that the needs of the farm-to-market roads in each county bear to the total needs of the farm-to-market roads in the state for the twenty-year program developed by the automotive safety foundation and filed with the Iowa Highway study committee created by chapter four hundred twenty-six (426), Acts of the Fifty-eighth General Assembly, and which is on record at the state highway commission."

Sec. 5. Chapter three hundred twelve (312), Code 1958, is hereby amended by adding thereto the following new section:

"To maintain eligibility for the receipt of road use tax funds on and after January 1, 1963, each city or town in the state shall have on file with

the state highway commission a map showing the arterial street system and the local street system of such city or town as approved by the state highway commission.”.

Sec. 6. Chapter three hundred twelve (312), Code 1958, is hereby amended by adding thereto the following new section:

“Cities and towns which receive allotments of funds from road use tax funds and which have a population of at least five thousand shall prepare and submit annually by the first day of December in each year to the state highway commission for examination and review, a program of proposed road and street improvements on both the arterial street system and the local street system of such city or town for a period of three years subsequent to the year in which the program is submitted. Cities and towns which receive allotments of funds from road use tax funds and which have a population less than five thousand shall prepare and submit by December 1 each year to the state highway commission for examination and review, a program of proposed road and street improvements on both the arterial street system and the local street system of such city or town for a period one year subsequent to the year in which the program is submitted.”.

Sec. 7. Chapter three hundred twelve (312), Code 1958, is hereby amended by adding thereto the following new section:

“Cities and towns which receive allotments of funds from road use tax funds shall prepare and submit by December 1 each year to the state highway commission for examination and review, a budget showing proposed projects, location of projects and proposed expenditures from funds from all sources on roads and streets in the arterial street system and in the local street system during the ensuing calendar year.”.

Sec. 8. Chapter three hundred twelve (312), Code 1958, is hereby amended by adding thereto the following new section:

“Cities and towns in the state which receive allotments of funds from road use tax funds shall prepare and submit by February 1 each year to the state highway commission an annual report showing the nature of work and expenditure of funds from all sources of roads and streets in the arterial street system and in the local street system during the preceding calendar year.”.

Sec. 9. No funds shall be allocated to any city or town until such city or town shall have complied with the provisions of sections six (6) through eight (8) of this Act.

Sec. 10. Section three hundred nine point seven (309.7), Code 1958, is hereby amended in subsection two (2) by striking the remainder of the subsection after the word “towns” in line four (4) and inserting in lieu thereof a period (.).

attended a regular public or private school for a period of at least five (5) months of the previous calendar year.

(c) 'Dependent' means members of the household, other than the spouse or head of the household, who qualify as dependents under the Federal Internal Revenue Code."

2. Amend section 7, line 13, by adding after the word "project." the following:

"Provided, however, such determination of eligibility shall be within the limits of the income limits hereinbefore set out."

When an insurer decides not to renew an agent's certificate, the certificate shall be returned to the commissioner of insurance on or before April first.

Sec. 6. Further amend section five hundred eleven point twenty-five (511.25), Code 1958, by adding a new subsection:

"4. For certifying an agent's certificate to do business in another state, two dollars."

CONFERENCE COMMITTEE REPORT ON HOUSE FILE 565

TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE AND THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE:

We, the undersigned members of the conference committee appointed to consider the difference between the Senate and House on House File 565, an act relating to commerce commission fees of motor vehicle common and contract carriers, beg leave to report and make the following recommendations:

Dear Sir:

House File 397, an Act to exempt county homes from nursing-home licensing, in accordance with the provisions of Article III, Section 16, Constitution of the State of Iowa, is disapproved.

The Attorney General advises that House File 397 relates not only to the requirement of issuance of a license to county homes but that its scope extends to relieving the county homes from the many safeguards and requirements found in Chapter 135. This Chapter was enacted for the protection of human life as a result of the tragic fire in a nursing home at Council Bluffs.

I disapprove of House File 397 for the following reasons:

1. Our fellow citizens staying in county homes are entitled to the same protection from fire and dangerous conditions as are those who reside in private nursing homes.

The legislature wisely decided that conditions in nursing and custodial homes should be supervised and regulated by the state for the protection of the residents. Enactment of this Bill would relegate our less fortunate people located in county homes to the status of second class citizens. This is in violation of our social mores and "Equal protection under the law" in its truest sense.

2. The state and its political subdivisions should set the example of compliance with laws relating to the protection of human life especially in the care of the aged and infirm rather than be excepted from such provisions.

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 16

By Dietz and Swisher

A concurrent resolution directing the legislative research committee and bureau to study state school aid programs, particularly minimum foundation programs.

Whereas, one of the major issues which faces each General Assembly is the problem of providing adequate state aids to help finance our public schools; and

Whereas, some \$35 million in state-collected taxes are allocated each year for state aids to schools and for payment of agricultural land tax credits; and

Whereas, the present system of school aids has developed on a piecemeal basis; and

Whereas, if state aids are distributed on a basis related to local property taxes to provide the same level of basic financial support for schools throughout the state, property tax assessments should be equalized to be uniform throughout the state;

Therefore, Be It Resolved by the General Assembly: That the legislative research committee and bureau study prior to the 1963 legislature the following matters:

1. Present programs of state aids for schools in Iowa.
2. State aid programs of other states, particularly minimum foundation programs.
3. Uniformity of assessed valuations in Iowa and methods used in other states to achieve uniformity, particularly in those states where state school aids are largely related to local property tax effort.

In carrying out this study, the research committee should authorize the appointment of a legislative advisory committee as provided in sections 2 and 3 of chapter 63 of the Acts of the Fifty-eighth General Assembly. Such committee should consider the advisability of a minimum foundation program of school aids in Iowa and suggest means of making assessments more uniform.

The report from this study should be made available to members of the General Assembly by December 1, 1962, and if the legislative advisory committee makes recommendations, these recommendations should be supported by bills.

SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 31

By Nystrom, Walker, Gray, Lynes and Elijah

A concurrent resolution providing for a joint advisory committee under chapter sixty-three (63), Laws of the Fifty-eighth General Assembly, to

conduct a study of the trade practices being used in the dairy industry.

Whereas, dairy products are necessary products of human food and that the proper supply of them is vital to the public health and welfare; and,

Whereas, the production, transportation, processing, storage, and distribution, wholesale and retail sales of milk are elements of commerce affecting the public health; and

Whereas, trade practices presently being carried on in the production, sale, processing and distribution of milk and other dairy products have a great effect on the stability of the dairy industry and of the economy of the State of Iowa; and,

Whereas, in order to present a well considered program for the continuation of fair competition among all businesses and to guarantee to the citizens of this state a proper supply of wholesome milk and other dairy products, it is desirable and necessary that a thorough study be made of all related problems concerning the production, transportation, processing, storage, and sale at wholesale and retail of milk and other dairy products and their non-milk fat imitations and to investigate the trade practices in the dairy industry throughout this state; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the Senate, the House of Representatives Concurring: That the legislative research committee designated by this General Assembly create a joint advisory committee of legislators under the provisions of chapter sixty-three (63), Acts of the Fifty-eighth General Assembly, and more specifically under section two point fifty-two (2.52), Code 1958, as amended by said act.

Be It Further Resolved, that said committee shall have full power and authority during the session of the Fifty-ninth General Assembly, and following its adjournment to conduct hearings and make comprehensive inquiry into the production, processing, distribution, sale at wholesale, sale at retail and trading practices of the dairy industry in this state. It is further recommended that the committee shall, in addition to studying the trade practices presently being conducted in the dairy industry, review the trade practices in the dairy industry of our neighboring states and the legislative programs enacted by the various states which affect the dairy industry, confer with producers, processors, distributors and retailers of dairy products.

Be It Further Resolved, that said committee shall make a complete report to the next regular session of the General Assembly as by said act provided.

Section 3. At the general election to be held in the year one thousand nine hundred and seventy, and in each tenth year thereafter, and also at such times as the General Assembly may, by law,

provide, the question, "Shall there be a Convention to revise the Constitution, and propose amendment or amendments to same?" shall be decided by the electors qualified to vote for members of the General Assembly; and in case a majority of the electors so qualified, voting at such election, for and against such proposition, shall decide in favor of a Convention for such purpose, the General Assembly, at its next session, shall provide by law for the election of delegates to such Convention, and for submitting the results of said Convention to the people, in such manner and at such time as the General Assembly shall provide; and if the people shall approve and ratify such amendment or amendments, by a majority of the electors qualified to vote for members of the General Assembly, voting thereon, such amendment or amendments shall become a part of the constitution of this state. If two or more amendments shall be submitted at the same time, they shall be submitted in such a manner that electors may vote for or against each such amendment separately.

Such application shall set forth at least one affidavit of some competent and disinterested person stating such facts as to age and qualification of the parties as the clerk may deem necessary to determine the competency of the parties to contract a marriage. Upon the filing of the application for a license to marry the clerk of the district court shall file the application in a record kept for that purpose and no license shall be issued until the expiration of three days

from the date of filing the application. After the expiration of three days from the date of filing the clerk shall issue the license to the parties if he is satisfied as to the competency of the parties to contract a marriage.'"

Eldred of Jones called up for consideration the conference committee report on Senate File 466, a bill for an act relating to allocations from the road use tax fund and to the apportionment thereof among the counties, cities, and towns, as follows:

CONFERENCE COMMITTEE REPORT ON SENATE FILE 466

TO THE PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE AND THE SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE:

We, the undersigned members of the conference committee appointed to consider the differences between the Senate and House on Senate File 466, an act relating to allocations from the road use tax fund and to the apportionment thereof, beg leave to report and make the following recommendations:

1. Amend Senate File 466 as passed by the Senate by striking sections one (1) through five (5) and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"Section 1. Section three hundred twelve point two (312.2), Code 1958, is hereby amended by striking subsections one (1), two (2), three (3), and four (4) and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

1. To the primary road fund, forty-seven percent.
2. To the secondary road fund of the counties thirty percent.
3. To the farm-to-market road fund, ten percent.
4. To the street construction fund of the cities and towns, thirteen percent.

5. The treasurer of state shall before making the above allotments credit annually to the highway grade crossing safety fund the sum of \$120,000.00, credit annually to the primary road fund the sum of \$500,000.00 for carrying out chapter two hundred seven (207), Acts of the Fifty-eighth General Assembly, and credit annually to the primary road fund the sum of \$500,000.00 to be used for paying expenses incurred by the secondary and urban

road departments of the commission other than expenses incurred for extensions of primary roads in cities and towns. All unobligated funds provided by this subsection at the end of each year shall revert to the road use tax fund.

6. The treasurer of state shall before making the above allotments credit annually to the primary road fund the sum of \$2,500,000.00 or an amount equal to one-ninth percent of the federal allotment whichever is the smaller, said sum to be used for matching the federal allotment of the State of Iowa for the use of the interstate and national defense highways in the State of Iowa.

Sec. 2. Section three hundred twelve point three (312.3), Code 1958, is hereby amended by striking subsection one (1) and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"1. Apportion among the counties in the ratio that the needs of the secondary roads of each county bear to the total needs of the secondary roads of the state for the twenty-year improvement program developed by the automotive safety foundation and filed with the Iowa highway study committee created by chapter four hundred twenty-six (426), Acts of the Fifty-eighth General Assembly, and which is on record at the state highway commission, sixty percent of the allocation from road use tax funds which he has credited to the secondary road fund of the counties, and apportion among the counties in the ratio that the area of such county bears to the total area of the state, forty percent of the allocation from road use tax funds which he has credited to the secondary road fund of the counties."

Sec. 3. Section three hundred twelve point three (312.3), Code 1958, is hereby amended by striking from line six (6) of subsection two (2) the word "eight" and inserting in lieu thereof the word "thirteen".

Sec. 4. Section three hundred twelve point five (312.5), Code 1958, is hereby repealed, and the following inserted in lieu thereof:

"The road use tax funds credited to the farm-to-market road fund by the treasurer of state, are hereby divided as follows, and are to be known respectively as:

1. Need allotment farm-to-market road funds, sixty percent; and
2. Area allotment farm-to-market road funds, forty percent.

All farm-to-market road funds, except funds which under section 310.20 come from any county's allotment of the road use tax funds, shall be allotted among the counties by the state highway commission. Area allotted farm-to-market road funds and federal aid secondary road funds received by the state, shall be allotted among all the counties of the state in the ratio that the area of each county bears to the total area of the whole state.

Need allotment farm-to-market road funds shall be allotted among the counties in the ratio that the needs of the farm-to-market roads in each county bear to the total needs of the farm-to-market roads in the state for the twenty-year program developed by the automotive safety foundation and filed with the Iowa Highway study committee created by chapter four hundred twenty-six (426), Acts of the Fifty-eighth General Assembly, and which is on record at the state highway commission."

2. Further amend Senate File 466 by renumbering section six (6) as section five (5).

3. Further amend by renumbering section seven (7) as section six (6) and adding thereto the following:

"provided, however, that if any city or town council by resolution declares that the seventy-five percent is not needed on its arterial streets, then it may be used on any other streets in the city or town.

4. Renumber section eight (8) as section seven (7).
5. Renumber section nine (9) as section eight (8).

6. Renumber section ten (10) as section nine (9).

7. Renumber section eleven (11) as section ten (10) and strike the words and figures "eight (8)" and "ten (10)" and insert in lieu thereof the words and figures "seven (7)" and "nine (9)" and add the following:

"The state highway commission shall notify the treasurer of state if any city or town fails to comply with the provisions of this act."

HONORABLE MEMBERS OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY:

I hereby acknowledge receipt of your official notification that the Fifty-ninth General Assembly stands ready to adjourn sine die, pursuant to Senate Concurrent Resolution 27.

As the Fifty-ninth General Assembly concludes its deliberations, I wish to commend the members for their many hours of diligent attention to the many proposals submitted for consideration during the session now being concluded.

No legislative session in the history of the state ever pleased every citizen by its actions. This will always be true. I do want to take this opportunity to commend you for your many major accomplishments.

There is always a "fallout" of lost bills during the final days of a legislative session and as a result the accomplishments sometimes are overlooked.

Some have lost sight of the fact, for example, that the Fifty-ninth General Assembly performed a legislative miracle in reapportioning itself. Here is something that had not been accomplished in Iowa for more than half a century, and something many people insisted could not be done. If everyone was not satisfied with the reapportionment plan, we have to remember that it was a job of rare difficulty.

The re-districting of the Senate was another self-operation which I think we have let pass with too little appreciation.

This legislature resisted terrific pressures to reach deeper into the taxpayer's pocket. There was no tax increase. At the same time, the legislature provided the maximum increase in state aid to schools allowed by our income.

An important thing not generally recognized is that this legislature spent more time in detailed committee examination of departmental appropriations than at any time in the past 20 years. This is hard, unspectacular work that does not capture headlines, but it is necessary work that was done extremely well in this session. Unfortunately, the result of most of this committee work still is below the surface, like the bulk of an iceberg. But it will be seen in the efficiency and economy of our state departments during the next two years.

While this General Assembly has been accused of a rural bias, it should be remembered that legislation was passed for urban renewal and centralized purchasing for cities. Similarly, the division of the Road Use Tax Fund recognized the greater needs of our municipalities.

The Judicial Reform Bill, passed for the second time in this session, is important and progressive governmental reorganization.

We should not lose sight of the fact that the legislative process often is most sound when it is a careful, well-fought movement. I do not believe we want a legislature adept at producing "insane laws", or one that feels the taxpayer's money is part of the petty cash. In the way of things, the good legislation that failed in this session will succeed in another.

We should remember that this General Assembly was caught in the narrowing space between what we want and what we will pay for. During this session, that space was more confining than ever.

Naturally, there were some internal disagreements and, naturally, these got more attention than the agreements.

But, in general, the Fifty-ninth General Assembly performed well, considering the space in which it had to operate.

As you return to your respective communities, I extend to each of you my appreciation for the many courtesies you have shown me. It has been a pleasure to work with you during this session.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGES ON SENATE FILES

House File 397, an Act to exempt county homes from nursing-home licensing, in accordance with the provisions of Article III, Section 16, Constitution of the State of Iowa, is disapproved.

The Attorney General advises that House File 397 relates not only to the requirement of issuance of a license to county homes but that its scope extends to relieving the county homes from the many safeguards and requirements found in Chapter 135. This Chapter was enacted for the protection of human life as a result of the tragic fire in a nursing home at Council Bluffs.

I disapprove of House File 397 for the following reasons:

1. Our fellow citizens staying in county homes are entitled to the same protection from fire and dangerous conditions as are those who reside in private nursing homes.

The legislature wisely decided that conditions in nursing and custodial homes should be supervised and regulated by the state for the protection of the residents. Enactment of this Bill would relegate our less fortunate people located in county homes to the status of second class citizens. This is in violation of our social mores and "Equal protection under the law" in its truest sense.

2. The state and its political subdivisions should set the example of compliance with laws relating to the protection of human life especially on the care of the aged and infirm rather than be excepted from such provisions.

Senate File 105, an act relating to the rules and regulations promulgated by the various state agencies of the State of Iowa, in accordance with the provisions of Article III, Section 16, Constitution of the State of Iowa, is disapproved for the following reasons:

While I am in complete sympathy with the purpose of the act, I have been advised by the Attorney General's office that there is a serious ques-

tion as to its constitutionality. Constitutional objection is made to conferring such power upon State agencies to make rules to govern its operation as being a delegation of Legislative power. However, the courts have supported the delegation in its strictest sense as not true delegation of power, but a blending of permissive Legislative and judicial power.

Precedent for the enactment of Senate File 105 is claimed in Section 684.19, Code of Iowa 1958, with respect to rules of the Supreme Court, which Section provides:

“Report of General Assembly—enrollment. Any such rules or forms prescribed by the supreme court shall be reported by it to the General Assembly within twenty days after the commencement of a regular session and shall take effect July 4, following the adjournment of such session, with such changes, if any, as may have been enacted at such session; and thereafter all laws in conflict therewith shall be of no further force or effect.

“At adjournment of the General Assembly where such report has been filed, an enrolled copy thereof, together with any changes, shall be made in substantially the same manner as acts are enrolled. The enrolled copy shall be certified as to whether or not any action was taken by the General Assembly and if any, what action, and thereupon it shall be filed with the secretary of state and bound with the acts of the General Assembly.”

However, this Section deals with the Rules of Civil Procedure, as opposed to the delegation made to the state agency in making rules to govern their power.

Reasonable search discloses no exact precedent to Senate File 105. It would appear that what the Legislature has conferred is not the delegation of Legislative power, and what it seeks to recapture by this act is likewise not legislative power but administrative power. Therefore, it is an invasion of the administrative authority and a violation of the constitutional separation of the legislative and administrative branches.

Senate File 441, an Act relating to the reorganization of certain school districts in a county of more than 100,000 bordering on the Mississippi River, in accordance with the provisions of Article III, Section 16, Constitution of the State of Iowa, is disapproved for the following reasons:

1. One reason advanced for the signing of this Bill has been that we must have a favorable tax climate for industry. This is certainly true, but if it is to be the policy of the State of Iowa to grant favorable tax treatment to industry then it should be applicable to all industries in all ninety-nine counties in Iowa rather than limited to one county.

2. It has been for several years the declared policy of the State of Iowa to encourage the reorganization of school districts into units as are necessary, economical and efficient, which will insure an equal opportunity for education to all children of the state. It is my belief that Senate File 441 is contrary to both the spirit and purpose of this policy. In fact, the provisions of this Act will seriously hinder proper school reorganization with equal educational opportunity for the children of Iowa.

3. The schools in the county affected by the Act have requested for the 1961-62 school year \$88,733 in emergency school aid from the state. This is nearly 89 percent of the total emergency aid available from the state for school purposes in all of Iowa. If this Bill were enacted into law the requests for emergency state school aid would probably be even greater.

4. Property owners in the State of Iowa are justifiably distressed by the high rate of property taxes brought about by school reorganization. These taxes are at the present time paid and shared by all of the property tax owners in all of the ninety-nine counties. This Bill would provide preferential tax treatment for one school district of the more than 1,575 school districts in the State of Iowa.

5. The principle established by Senate File 441 represents a sharp deviation from previously announced legislative policy in the field of school reorganization and if this new approach to the problem is sound, then it should not be limited in its application to one of our ninety-nine counties but should be applicable throughout the entire state.

1. It is my considered view that the existing statutory procedure for the selection of members of the State Central Committee of both parties is entirely adequate to properly dispose of any minor problems which may arise because of the loss of a congressman and the reduction of the congressional districts in Iowa from eight to seven.

2. Specific provisions of House File 711, if enacted, would only tend to promote confusion as to particular application in the selection of succeeding members of the State Central Committee from both parties and it is my view that the changes as proposed in House File 711 would compound the confusion brought about by it rather than to clarify the procedural requirements.

Senate File 452, an act relating to the Rules of Civil Procedure, to changes therein reported by the Supreme Court of Iowa, and amended Rules three hundred fifty (350), and one hundred forty-nine (149) thereof, is hereby disapproved and in accordance with Article III, Section 16, Constitution of Iowa, returned to the Secretary of State.

The disapproval is based on the following reasons:

1. The changes in the Rules of Civil Procedure were recommended by a group of distinguished members of the bench and bar of the State of Iowa following long study based upon the need for changes disclosed by experience in our court system in this State. I am convinced that these recommendations should not be set aside without cogent reasons and full debates in both houses of the Legislature.

2. The substance of the recommended changes in the Rules for Civil Procedure as submitted by the special committee of the bench and bar designated to review this problem results in more rapid handling of litigation in the courts of the State of Iowa. Legislation as set out in Senate File 452 would only serve to thwart expeditious administration of justice in this state.

Senate File 353, an act relating to controlled access highways amending Section 306A.1 of the 1958 Code of Iowa, is hereby disapproved and in accordance with Article III, Section 16, Constitution of Iowa, returned to the Secretary of State.

The disapproval is based on the following reasons:

1. The Supreme Court of Iowa and the high courts of various states have, in well-reasoned opinion, declared that owners of land adjacent to controlled access highways established on new locations have no right of direct access. Senate File 353 would create vested access interests in such newly established highways. It would require their acquisition to avoid the establishment on these highways of such ribbon development congestion as would restrict traffic movement and increase the hazards to the traveling public. There are presently miles of new high-type controlled access highways, including the Interstate System, where it would be either necessary or mandatory for the state to acquire access interests that would be created by this bill.

2. If the bill were to become effective, an immense expenditure would be required to give the traveling public the protection and benefits it now receives under existing law. To sanction payment for this purpose would create an unfair and unjustified cost to the taxpaying public in their investments in the establishment and preservation of adequate new public highways to serve the present and future needs of the highway system in Iowa.

3. As to controlled access roads established upon existing highway locations, our courts have declared that owners or occupants of land abutting thereon have the right of "free and convenient" access from such property to the highway, and that such right can only be extinguished by acquisition. Senate File 353 essentially restates the foregoing. In am directing the Highway Commission to make a careful and thorough review of the administration of the access control law to assure that it will be exercised in a reasonable and judicious manner, thus protecting the individual property rights as guaranteed by the federal and state constitutions."

House File 574, an act to amend section four hundred twenty-two point forty-two (422.42), Code of Iowa 1958, relating to retail sales tax and section four hundred twenty-three point one (423.1), Code of Iowa 1958, relating to the use tax and to redefine personal property sold for processing, is hereby disapproved and in accordance with Article III, section sixteen, Constitution of Iowa, transmitted to the Secretary of State.

The disapproval is based on the following reasons:

1. While in accord with the principle of the bill, I find it impossible to implement it at this time due to the reduction in revenue that would occur (approximately one million dollars per year). The budget as adopted by the Fifty-ninth General Assembly is nearly one million dollars larger than was recommended in the budget message with no appreciable added revenue provided; therefore, any reduction in income at this time might result in the necessity of imposing a state property tax to avoid a deficit.

2. The definition of "property" in the act "or is industrial material which is to be used and consumed or depleted directly in the actual fabrication, compounding, manufacture, or production of other tangible personal property" is so broad that it could well result in exemptions which would be far beyond the intent of the General Assembly.

THE 1897 CODE OF IOWA
BY REPRESENTATIVE SCOTT SWISHER OF JOHNSON COUNTY

SENATOR, GOVERNOR, SPEAKER, HONORED GUESTS, MEMBERS OF THE ASSEMBLY:

From a brief glance at the pioneer laws—and if we are going to talk about the Pioneer Lawmakers I think it is only probably right to also discuss some of the pioneer laws that we have been dealing with—from a brief examination of the pioneer laws as against the Pioneer Lawmakers, I would say from my observation the Pioneer Lawmakers are in better shape than the pioneer laws.

As our state came into being and laws began to get passed, one of the important things of course that had to be done was to find out some of the laws that had been passed to find out what they were, and, a few years after they had been passed, where they were. An attempt was made to put these together.

We have various codes in the State of Iowa, including the Code of 1873, which tried to compile the statutes, put them together so that somebody could tell what they were. Subsequently there were some private revisions, much better than anything the state had been able to do, one known as Miller's Code, one known as McClain's Annotated Code.

The 1897 Code that you see before you is quite a notable bit of work in Iowa law generally, and in that which we are particularly interested in today, because this is the first real advance made in the codification of the Iowa laws as they were up to that date. This was not easy. It was about as difficult as any of the bills that we have seen today, apparently, from reading some of the history. It would appear that these three volumes were probably just as tough to pass, or perhaps more so, than some of the fights we have had in the last few years on reapportionment or even fireworks.

The 1897 Code came about this way: The General Assembly of 1892 authorized a tax study committee. If that should come as a surprise, that is the 1892 tax study committee. Its report showed that in addition to having the tax laws overhauled we had a great need for the general overhaul of all statutes, and that it ought to be done all at the same time.

So in 1894 the Legislature created a commission with very broad powers to reorganize and complete all of the existing statutes into one book, to revise and rewrite them, to insert amendments, and to make them complete; and also authorize the members of this commission to consult with the other states, go over to the other states and see what they had done, with a little sub-amendment at their own expense.

The names on this commission are of interest to all of us because they are great names in the history of Iowa and the history of the legal profession of Iowa, led by Emlin McClain, former Chief Justice of the State of Iowa, a man whose name is known certainly throughout Iowa in all legal circles. Others are John Y. Stone, Charles Baker, H. F. Dale, H. S. Winslow, L. G. Kinne and H. O. Weaver.

Some of those names, as you well know, carry down to today. This commission rewrote the tax laws; they found the municipal laws, as they said in their own words, "unbelievably confused." They wrote the indeterminate sentence law, as far as criminal statute is concerned; rewrote the corporate law; and got into administrative law for the first time.

They came out with their suggestions in what is known as the Black Code, which is over to your right, as the commission report, and they presented it to the Twenty-sixth General Assembly in 1896. They fought this, apparently, on and off through the entire hundred days in 1896 and found

that it could not be completed during that time, to they resolved that it would be completed not later than January, 1897.

In other words, they, the Legislature itself, provided for a special session, and the special session was called in January by Governor Drake, and apparently took up the matter of the codification of the Iowa laws, going from January until May 7, of 1897. They agreed on all this, I guess, but it had to be printed. This is the original handwritten Code.

It was recessed to July 1, and it was turned over to the Code editor and his committee, again some great names—Ebersole, Trewin, Ellis, Finch, Cornwall and O'Connor—again names many of which today mean a great deal in the Iowa legal circles and the Iowa laws.

This is the largest single volume put out by the state at the time, and up to now it had the most changes in our law of any single thing that any legislature has done, and it continued in force longer than any Code that we have had; it continued in force as it is there for twenty-two years.

So as I say to you Pioneer Lawmakers, this is the sort of heritage that I think all of us expect to leave, and I think if you are trying to judge a man you judge him on the basis of how well he is remembered when he is gone. Certainly these are great names on the 1897 Code, and I think the most that most of us can expect is that we will be remembered as well. Thank you.

ADDRESS BY HONORABLE BOURKE B. HICKENLOOPER

United States Senator from the State of Iowa

MR. PRESIDENT, MR. SPEAKER, MEMBERS OF THE PIONEER LAWMAKERS ASSOCIATION AND THE JOINT SESSION OF THE IOWA LEGISLATURE, GUESTS, VISITORS AND FRIENDS:

I am delighted and honored at the opportunity to be here and visit with you today, especially on this traditional day, the day when the Pioneer Lawmakers of our state gather to renew the acquaintances, and those who still serve take a short respite from the arduous labors of lawmaking.

This day is an occasion for all of us to indulge in nostalgia, and the temptation to reminisce is almost uncontrollable. Many of you can reminisce much better than I, and I shall try to do my best to resist that temptation today. Needless to say, I am proud of my service in the Iowa legislature, and I look with nothing but fond and respectful memories upon the days when I first came here in January of 1935. Perhaps our hair is a little thinner, and we cannot run upstairs as quickly as we once could, but in retrospect it seems only yesterday, those twenty or more years that have gone by and have made us eligible to join the Pioneer Lawmakers. The memories of those days and the intervening events bring great comfort to those who have served.

I have said repeatedly in this chamber, and in the Senate chamber across the hall, that there is no public service that exceeds, and practically none that could possibly excel, the public service in the law making body of one's own state, because here in these chambers is the representative heart and fiber of American freedom and of individual responsibility; and here in these chambers is represented the obligation which citizens assume and discharge in their mutual responsibility to their fellow man.

I think one of the most outstanding differences between our own country and the other countries in the world is that under our system we pioneered the method by which a neighbor voluntarily assumed a part of the responsi-

bility for his own neighbor's welfare. Neighbors joined together to release a little of their own personal sovereignty and in the interest of common good built communities, counties, states, and constructed the fabric of the Federal Government.

Only by the assumption of such responsibility can government and its power remain with the people and not slip away to some centralized autocracy or bureaucracy.

Today think back and remember our acquaintances and friends. There are many in this chamber today, those who served when I served here, those who have served since, and those who served before my opportunity for service in the Legislature. I want to make a special reference to two members whom we all remember, one of whom has passed on but whose length of service wrote records in this body. I know you all join me today in a touch of sadness and regret that Arch McFarlane is no longer with us, and that Frank Byers is unable to be present on this occasion. I could go on, of course, and name many whose tenure of service is lengthening into the scores of years now, and the length of service which they rendered merits at least a special moment of thought today.

A legislative body requires dedication and service. Our legislative bodies, as we know them in this part of the United States, is not a profit-making venture, and compensation has never been adequate money-wise, and the reward comes from conscientiously serving.

This body constitutes a forum of strong convictions, and may it ever continue to be so. Those strong convictions result from the friction of the ideas of the people that we represent and the people of whom we are a part; and this body, the governing body of a sovereign state, defends the ramparts of our federal system of government.

Most of us do not give enough thought about the federal system of government which we have in this country. It is unique as there is no other government in the world exactly the same as ours. In our system the sovereign states unite in a federation for the common good, and under this basic concept the states and the people found it expedient over the years to delegate voluntarily some of their sovereignty and some of their control to a centralized government so that the whole nation could unite and receive the benefits of common and united effort when occasion demanded it.

We are a Republic in this country, but within that Republic are the instrumentalities and forms of democracy. The two are interlocked, but basically we have never strayed away from the federated system of independent states which are indeed sovereign. That is a thing that is most difficult to explain to people of other governments. They don't have the concept of the extent of basic sovereignty which the states of our nation possess. The interesting thing is that most other governments in this world today are not governments in which the power essentially and completely springs from the people.

This country was built from the bottom, and constructed on the basis that the individual is free and sovereign, and that his dignity is the controlling thing that must move men in the advancement of their social and political forms.

Our country in its broadest concept is a revolutionary type of government; not necessarily the armed, violent type. As a revolutionary system—a system of change, progress and advancement; we constantly face a danger. The major over-all danger, in my opinion, is the danger of slipping in times of emotion, stress and emergency from the system of responsibility in the individual to a system where we inadvertently or ineptly yield the

power, which was bitterly won, to a central government and to a bureaucracy which in turn can then inflict that power back upon the people.

Government cannot operate today as it did seventy-five years ago, as to keep abreast of the times, it is the responsibility of those who make up our system to see that in meeting these changes, that in delegating from time to time to either state government or federal government the responsibility for doing certain things that cannot be done locally to the best advantage of the people, that we do not chip away and abandon the basic responsibility which is fundamental in the American system.

The interesting thing today is that with all of the tensions in the world, with all of the uprisings of nations in other continents who seek and who acquire self-determination or sovereignty, it is probably fair to say that in every instance those countries who have this self-determination today are in the great struggle of history to divest themselves from the centralized governments that have been oppressing them throughout the years. They are moving toward our fundamental, and sometimes I think we are moving away from our fundamental toward centralization. In that field and in that area the responsibility of analysis, and the responsibility for calmness is so important in our legislative bodies, and it is more important in the thinking and the minds of the people.

Most of us here remember the depression of the late twenties and thirties. We remember that during that time economic distress was widespread in this country, and under the emotion of economic distress people turned, or were invited to turn, to the central government, and in that period many powers never before possessed by the central government were turned over to it in the hope that it would relieve a temporary distress. Most of those powers that were turned over in time of emergency have not been returned to the people, and today many of the restraints, regulations and restrictions—yes, and most of the taxes for internal matters result from the fact that that power was lodged in the central government then, in time of emergency, under the guise of emergency, and never returned to the responsibility of the people.

Now again we find that our country is allegedly in some kind of a recession. Again we are asked for emergency legislation, but the strange thing about emergency legislation is that once it is given it very seldom dislodges itself within the period for which it is given.

In that area, as I mentioned a moment ago, we as people, we as legislators, must exercise the greatest care that we do not under the guise of emergency unduly award to central government that which is remote and which does not contain the warmth and the association which goes with intimate contact with the people; power which oversteps and goes beyond that which is necessary to serve the people and which may in effect get over the boundary and into an area in which the people will serve the government.

It is a difficult balance to maintain, but it is a balance which must be maintained in the inherent common sense of the individuals and the people who are responsible for it.

We have heard a great deal about new frontiers these days, whatever that means, I am not quite certain. I don't mean to say that we should not continue exploration and advancement; of course we should, but in exploring so-called new frontiers we must not be deluded by will-o'-the-wisps. The targets which we set for ourselves must be real and not chimerical.

When our pioneers moved Westward in the settlement and the development of this country they moved toward new horizons; they didn't necessarily move toward new frontiers, but they moved toward new horizons

where the basic principles that they were determined to maintain could be maintained and could be exercised. It was the jealousy with which they guarded those principles that laid the strong foundation for the eventual success of our great country as a Federal Union.

The principles which guided and stimulated those people who developed this country as they moved toward these new horizons in our early days were so aptly set out by the Tenth Amendment to the Constitution, which, in effect, says that powers not delegated to the central government in Washington are reserved and retained by the state and by the people. They never forgot that the person, the individual, was sovereign, and that the states were the basic sovereignty of our country.

I am aware, as we all are, of the pressures from various groups that are constantly upon the legislators, whether it be in the state or whether it be in the nation. These pressures are usually well meaning, altruistic, forward looking in their fundamental concept; but often these pressures are for government to take over responsibility that should be discharged in the local areas and the local communities.

It is so easy to say, "Let's get state money; let's get federal money," and to forget that there is no state money, that there is no federal money, but that it is the money from the individual that he pays in taxes to support his government. The references to state money and federal money only refer to money that has been taken away from the individual, that has been paid by the individual to his government, and in return is to be used by his government either for the benefit of the country, or for its detriment, depending upon the interpretation.

The great danger that is facing us today, and has faced us for some years, is the constant effort on the part of many to shuck off responsibilities which the individuals in the local communities should exercise to the limit of their capacity onto the federal government. Bureaucracy is willing to assume the authority and is willing to govern you, rather than be governed by you.

Manifestly the national government, in the complexity of a society of 180,000,000 people, has been forced, in our own interest and in our own preservation, into the leadership of the free world. Government must do many things today that it never did before, and probably tomorrow it will have to do many things that it is not doing today. We face today as tense an international situation as we have ever faced in our history, and it is entirely possible that the tension may be greater, and that the threat may be greater today than ever before in our history, because of the bitter conflict between two great opposing ideologies—freedom on the one hand, as represented by the free nations of the world; autocratic communism, the slavery of the individual, on the other, as represented by the Kremlin. Each ideology is determined to prevail. One will not prevail in the long run.

We are determined that the philosophies of freedom will prevail, and I am thoroughly convinced, just as examples in the past few years have shown time after time, that if we as a representative of the free nations of the world, and our associates and our allies, stand free and vigorous in resisting the encroachments of communism, then communism cannot prevail; but if we as a free nation, and if our allies as free nations, yield or fail to show that vigor which is essential in the face of this encroachment of slavery, then the alternative of firmness is surrender and destruction.

Many times we say it can't happen, it won't happen; we are great, we have strength, the free nations will never let slavery and autocracy capture them. All I have to point to today is that other nations have been captured; other nations have been enslaved by communism and its allied

philosophies; other nations have lost that freedom which they once had; and we cannot, by neglect, refuse to recognize that possibility. We cannot through neglect weaken ourselves to the point where, as the communists say, capitalism and democracies will fall like ripe fruit from a tree if you give them just enough time. We must exercise the responsibilities of our freedom, we must exercise that responsibility for the generations to come.

I will not take the time today to discuss any details of the international situation that faces us, other than to say that in Laos, in Berlin, in Africa, in many other parts of the world today, humanity is boiling. Rightly or wrongly, that foment—and ferment, if you please—is occurring. The struggle now and in the foreseeable future will be the struggle to see whether that change and that alteration will be guided along the basic lines of freedom, human dignity and responsibility, or whether it will be captured by the philosophies of communism and autocracy.

These things are facing us today, and facing every citizen, and are not just the responsibilities of the government in Washington. These are the responsibilities of you and me as citizens, and the responsibilities of free men and free women every place.

It has been an honor to visit with you again and to see old friends. No public service that I have ever had do I value higher than that which I had in this building. I shall always remember it as a fundamental training ground in the business of government. Let us remember that government is all-important, because government can destroy or preserve all things.

I have enjoyed talking to you and sharing with you the responsibilities which you and I as Americans under a free system must assume in order to maintain that human dignity and that individual freedom which gives brightness and happiness for tomorrow. Let us not forget the oft repeated words of Henley, who said so ably a long time ago, and who put it rather succinctly, that "It matters not how straight the road, how charged with punishment the scroll; I am the master of my fate, I am the captain of my soul."

**REMARKS MADE BY GOVERNOR HISASHI AMANO OF
YAMANASHI PREFECTURE, JAPAN, BEFORE
JOINT CONVENTION MAY 1, 1961**

MR. SPEAKER, HONORABLE MEMBERS OF THE SENATE AND THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, GOVERNOR ERBE, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN:

It is the greatest honor and privilege to me throughout my whole life that I have visited the State of Iowa to which Yamanashi Prefecture is linked as Sister-State, the first such relationship between Japan and the United States of America and that I am given such a warm and hearty welcome.

In the United States of America which, brimful of high spirits of frontiers and building-up, has long been the excellent leader of the whole nations following freedom and democracy, your State of Iowa is our big sister and our ideal, standing unrivaled in the world as typical agricultural state.

Such a very cordial welcome given me by you and the people of Iowa so generous and intelligent is not only a great happiness to myself, but also an honor to the whole Japanese, for which I wish to express my most sincere appreciation.

The purpose of my visit to the State of Iowa is to convey to you in person on behalf of the people of Japan, especially the people of Yamanashi Prefecture, the untold gratitude and appreciation for the warm friendship

and generous expression of sympathy which you demonstrated to us when Yamanashi suffered from unprecedented typhoon disasters in August and September of 1959.

The typhoons which hit us in 1959 inflicted enormous damage throughout the whole island of Japan. Particularly, a fatal damage amounting to 40.5 billion yen was inflicted to our Prefecture of Yamanashi where 105 persons were killed or lost, and 13,639 houses were washed away or broken down.

On that occasion, many citizens of the state extended hands of deep sympathy and encouragement to us, and for enhancement of our agriculture, seriously ravaged by the typhoons, donated us with thirty-five head of breeding hogs produced in Iowa and 60,000 bushels of corn to feed those hogs, with the cooperation of the United States Department of Agriculture.

Those contributions sent over the ocean from the far-away American continent, with the best wishes of the citizens of Iowa, so greatly encouraged us whole people of the Prefecture that we have decided to redouble our efforts for the rehabilitation of our Prefecture to repay the overwhelming kindness.

I am highly honored that I can take this opportunity to express my sincere appreciation for your warm friendship and heartfelt reliefs.

Yamanashi is an agricultural prefecture as large as 4,465 square kilometers with a population of about 800,000. The density of population being high, the farming acreage of farm household is nothing but 5.3 hectares on an average. We are now making every possible effort to obtain as much earnings as possible out of such a small cultivated acreage. Rapid improvement is seen in the raising of grapes, peaches and sericultures and particularly in the growing of livestock raising.

Therefore, the biggest question given me at the present time is how to raise better products out of such a petty farming and obtain higher income. Ever since I was elected the Governor, I have exerted utmost effort to solve this question, and I am now trying hard to accomplish my purpose through the promotion of fruit-growing and livestock farming.

The donation of Iowa breeding hogs, together with a large quantity of feed grains, to the Yamanashi Prefecture placed in such circumstances stimulated all the more the concerns of the people of the Prefecture for stock-raising and gave them great hope and expectations for future.

Taking advantage of my visit to your state, I fervently wish to learn as much as possible about agricultural pursuits of Iowa and thereby build up Yamanashi and Japan into a richer agricultural prefecture and nation.

I would like to express the deep thanks of the whole people of Yamanashi also for the formal resolution by your legislature on the sister-state relationship to tie our two states everlastingly.

I swear that I will make Yamanashi worthy of the sister-state relationship with Iowa, which is making marvelous progress, based upon brilliant history and tradition, and at the same time I sincerely entreat continued friendship and kind assistance of the citizens of Iowa.

I do hope that my present visit to your state will contribute to the strengthening of the ties of friendship and understanding between Japan and the United States of America and pave the way for the eternal friendship and prosperity between Iowa and Yamanashi.

Last of all please let me extend to all of you, and through you to the people of Iowa, my best wishes for good health, great happiness and prosperity. Thank you.

WILLIAM BECKER

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character and public service of the late Honorable William Becker, begs leave to submit the following memorial:

William Becker was born in Elkader, Iowa, on March 26, 1874, and passed away January 22, 1961, at Memorial Hospital in Prairie du Chien, Wisconsin, at the age of 86.

He was a graduate of Elkader High School and the State University of Iowa. On October 3, 1899, he was united in marriage with Mollie Schmidt. To this union one daughter was born, Mildred. His wife preceded him in death in 1913, his daughter in 1930. In 1923 he married Minerva Meyer, who preceded him in death in 1953. Surviving is one stepson, Dr. H. D. Meyer, of Evanston, Illinois.

After graduating from the college of pharmacy he and his brother, John, established a drug store in Elkader on January 18, 1892. His brother left the partnership in 1907 and William continued in the store alone until 1916, when he sold it to his nephew. After selling the store he continued to be

interested in pharmacy and had periodically given assistance in the apothecary department of the store ever since. Had he continued until March he would have completed 69 years as a pharmacist. He was one of the oldest registered pharmacists in the state.

He attended the Peace E and R Church, and was a member of the Masonic Lodge and Eastern Star; also was a former member of the Elkader school board and mayor of that city. He was elected as Republican representative to the Iowa General Assembly from Warren County for the Forty-fourth, Forty-fifth, Forty-fifth Extra and Forty-sixth sessions.

Mr. Felter had been president of the Warren County Agricultural Association, Iowa Horticultural Association, Iowa Fruit Growers Association, Iowa Fair Managers Association, Iowa Bee Keepers Association and the Indianola Garden Club. In 1953 he was presented the Iowa Horticulture Association's Gold Merit Award.

Mr. and Mrs. Felter celebrated their Golden Wedding anniversary on June 8, 1954. Mr. Felter passed away on May 15, 1960.

JOHN RANKIN IRWIN

John Rankin Irwin, former businessman, state representative, civic official, and community leader, died at his home in Keokuk, Iowa, August 10, 1959. He was born of a distinguished Iowa family in Keokuk, August 24, 1883, the son of John Nichol and Mary Love Rankin Irwin.

He attended the local public schools, entered Lawrenceville Preparatory School in Lawrenceville, New Jersey, in 1899, was graduated in 1902, and received his bachelor of letters degree from Princeton University in 1906. He began the study of law in the office of Ralston & Siddons in Washington, D. C., attending classes at the National University law school there at the same time.

He returned to Keokuk the next year to work as a clerk with the Irwin & Phillips Dry Goods Company, established by his grandfather, Stephen Irwin, in 1856; he became a director of the company in 1908, was subsequently made secretary, and served in both capacities until 1927.

As a boy he traveled widely with his parents, meeting many eminent personalities of the day. On July 9, 1909, he married Florence V. Johnstone of Keokuk. They had two sons, Alexander Johnstone Irwin and John N. Irwin, II.

Mr. Irwin enlisted during World War I and took officer's training at the University of Iowa in the summer of 1917, but was rejected for active service because of his eyesight. Later he became a director in the Keokuk public library, president of the Keokuk Country Club, and director of the Y.M.C.A. in Keokuk; was a member of the Elks Club, and an elder in the Westminster Presbyterian Church.

As a Republican, he was elected State Representative from Lee County in 1928; appointed postmaster of Keokuk by President Herbert Hoover in 1929, and spent the remainder of his life in public service; again returned to the Iowa House of Representatives in 1934, 1936, and 1938, being elected Speaker in the Forty-eighth General Assembly.

John Rankin Irwin is survived by his wife and two sons, Alexander Johnstone Irwin of Chicago; and John N. Irwin II of Washington and New York, deputy secretary of defense for international affairs, and two grandchildren.

GEORGE M. LUDWIG

Mr. Ludwig, a Republican in politics, was elected Johnson County representative in the Iowa legislature in 1950 and was re-elected in 1952. He had a keen interest in institutions of higher learning and, as a member of the schools committee, was very active in rewriting the school reorganization laws. He also worked with the interim study committee dealing with social security.

Surviving Mr. Ludwig are: His widow; three daughters, Phyllis J. Ludwig, Redbird Mission, Beverly, Kentucky; Mrs. Genevieve Merck, Deep River, Iowa; Mrs. Nona L. Walker, Iowa City, Iowa; and two sons, George H. and Robert L. Ludwig of Iowa City, Iowa. A third son, Dean, died August 16, 1951.

FRANK L. MARTIN

Frank L. Martin was born in Keokuk, Iowa, July 8, 1926, the son of Floyd and Beatrice Martin. From 1944 to 1946 he served in the U. S. Naval

Air Corps. Upon graduation from St. Ambrose College, Davenport, in 1949, Frank went on to the University of Iowa to secure a law degree in 1952. He married Mary A. Mallon of Cedar Rapids on June 21, 1952.

He was a member of the Cedar Rapids law firm of Martin and McGuire, from the summer of 1952 until his death.

Frank, as a boy, got his start in politics by helping his mother tack up Roosevelt posters. His first try in politics ended in defeat in 1956, but in 1958 he again sought and this time won election to the Iowa House of Representatives.

Despite only a single term in the Fifty-eighth General Assembly, Frank distinguished himself by winning widespread friendship and respect among the members of both parties. The *Cedar Rapids Gazette* editorialized, "Even though only a 'freshman' in service, he was credited with saving the proposed constitutional amendment for a non-partisan judiciary by proposing successfully a 10-year trial period amendment. Until his amendment was adopted, the resolution was headed for almost certain defeat. With his amendment, it passed with two votes to spare."

For those who knew him well, Frank's humor was his hallmark. Always smiling, he had a fund of stories for any occasion. His hearty and heart-felt laughter will be long remembered by his many friends.

The state was shocked to hear of Frank Martin's death from a heart attack on July 15, 1959, at the age of 33, and at the end of his first session as a Democrat representative from Linn County to the Iowa House of Representatives.

Mr. Martin is survived by a widow, and four sons, and a daughter, who was born shortly after the father's death. Also surviving are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. F. L. Martin, one brother and two sisters.

ARCH W. McFARLANE

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character and public service of the late Honorable Arch W. McFarlane, begs leave to submit the following memorial.

Arch W. McFarlane was born April 14, 1885, in Waterloo, Iowa, the son of William W. and Emma J. Moss McFarlane. He passed away on July 24,

1960, while attending the National Republican Convention in Chicago, at the age of seventy-five years.

Mr. McFarlane was educated in the Waterloo schools. On April 6, 1908, he married the former Elsie Hawkins in Clinton, Iowa. They had no children. He was active in the wholesale coal business in Waterloo all his life and was still active at the time of his death. He was a member of the Episcopal Church.

Mr. McFarlane gave his first speech as a youngster in breeches in the early 1900's by delivering Lincoln's Gettysburg Address to a full house in the old Brown's Opera House in Waterloo. As a youth he was the first editor of the "Orange and Black," the Waterloo East High School paper. His wife was society editor of this paper.

Arch W. McFarlane, a Republican, began his legislative career in 1914 at the age of twenty-nine years, when he was elected to the Iowa House of Representatives. He was re-elected to the House in 1916, 1918 and 1920. In 1926 he was elected to the Iowa Senate, and in 1928 and 1930 he was Lieutenant Governor. In 1932 he was again elected to the House of Representatives; and re-elected in 1934, 1938, 1940, 1942, 1944, 1946, 1950 and 1952. In 1954 he returned to the Senate as the first man to represent the new senatorial district composed of Black Hawk County alone.

He was the only Iowan ever to preside over the Senate as Lieutenant Governor, and be sworn in as a returning House member on the same day. He was twice Speaker of the House, and often cited his battles in 1917 to save the infant Iowa Highway Commission as the incident that gave him the greatest satisfaction.

Arch McFarlane's activities and interests went further than politics. He was president of the Waterloo Baseball Association, a member of Waterloo's Lodge No. 105, the A. F. & A. M., a past patron of the Eastern Star, El Kahis Temple in Cedar Rapids, the Sunny Side Country Club, B.P.O. Elks 290, the Knights of Pythias, Loyal Order of Moose, United Commercial Travelers for 53 years, and was Supreme (international) Counselor in 1931. In 1958 he was presented with U.C.T.'s first "Most Valuable Member" plaque.

He was the first member of the Pioneer Lawmakers invited to join while still a member of the legislature. He was past president of this organization, which presented his portrait to the Iowa Historical Society in 1956. This portrait still hangs in the gallery of distinguished Iowans in the Historical Building.

In 1919, while Mr. McFarlane was Speaker of the House, the first memorial service for deceased legislators was held, under his direction.

He received many other honors. The Arch McFarlane State Park, located east of LaPorte City, was dedicated in 1959. In recognition of his service to conservation, the Black Hawk County Sportsmen's Council in 1958 presented him with an award for outstanding contributions to conservation. In 1957, capitol newsmen presented him with the Distinguished Service Award. He was Speaker pro tempore for the Thirty-seventh General Assembly and Speaker of the House for the Thirty-eighth, Thirty-eighth Extra and Thirty-ninth sessions.

He had been chairman of the advisory investment board of the Iowa Public Employees Retirement System, and a member of the "Little Hoover"

commission which studied problems in government reorganization and consolidation in 1956.

Mr. McFarlane was the Republican candidate to the House of Representatives at the time of his death. His survivors are his wife, and a brother, Edward.

The State of Iowa and the nation, upon the untimely death of Clark McNeal, suffered the loss of a great leader.
