Ron Corbett has been the Speaker of the Iowa House for the last four years. During that time the Iowa House has been held in high esteem for the efforts to make Iowa a great place to live. Ron has led those efforts. Ron is a leader. He is a leader who is approachable, who attempts to bring reason to a sometimes unreasonable process. Ron is a leader who works to build consensus yet leaders need to lead, and Ron does that leading. Ron is a leader with vision. The vision of a better Iowa for us, for our parents and for our children. The Iowa House will continue to be the voice for a better Iowa. Ron Corbett as a Speaker of the Iowa House will lead us toward this better Iowa. It is an honor to nominate Ron Corbett as a Speaker of the Seventy-eighth General Assembly.

Carroll of Poweshiek seconded the nomination of Ron J. Corbett for Speaker of the House, preceded by the following remarks:

Mr. Speaker, fellow House Members:

I wish to second the nomination of Ron Corbett for Speaker of the Iowa House. I do so because Ron is qualified. First of all and most important to me, Ron is a husband and a father. I remember before I was a member of this House when I first heard about Ron Corbett. It might surprise you to know it was in a David Yepsen column. During previous sessions, Ron serving as Speaker of the House has demonstrated a deep commitment to the House, its members and to the history and traditions of this great institution. During difficult times when we are most tested, Ron has recognized the intense feelings on the issue of the day to not be allowed to override the legislative process which has developed through time and tradition and has served this House well. Ron's judgement as a leader has been good. It's my pleasure to second the nomination of Ron Corbett of Linn County as Speaker of the House.

In accordance with the foregoing motion, the Acting Chief Clerk cast the votes of all the members of the House of Representatives for the Honorable Ron J. Corbett as Speaker of the House of Representatives of the Seventy-eighth General Assembly. The Honorable Ron J. Corbett of Linn County, having received all of the votes cast for the office of Speaker of the House of Representatives of the Seventy-eighth General Assembly, was declared duly elected to that office.

Grundberg of Polk moved that a committee of two be appointed to escort the Speaker to the chair.

PRESENTATION OF SPEAKER

The Honorable Ron J. Corbett was escorted to the Speaker's station and, having been sworn, assumed the chair. Temporary Speaker Gipp of Winneshiek presented Speaker Corbett with the gavel and congratulated him on his unanimous election.

Speaker Corbett thanked the House for the honor bestowed upon him and offered the following remarks:

Thank you so much for the honor and responsibility to be your Speaker for the next two years. Even though this is my third term as your Speaker, I still get awe struck

seeing the Capitol as I turn onto I-235. And, as I walk up these steps and into this chamber, I still need to pinch myself. What a wonderful opportunity we have to mold, shape, and set public policy.

There was a guest speaker that came to Cedar Rapids to give a talk on how business will be successful in the future. He said it's not the big versus the small, or the strong versus the weak, but rather the fast versus the slow. Those quick to change will have the advantage. Government has never been known for being very swift. But, as I look out into this chamber, I don't see any timid souls. I see people who are here to make a difference. In my 12 years here, this chamber has never been known as a "do nothing" chamber, and from the looks on your faces, this year won't be an exception.

So, what's ahead? We have some opportunities, some challenges, and some problems to address.

Opportunities...We have many. I would like to highlight one. We have a 900 million dollar surplus and revenues are running ahead of projections. The taxpayers deserve a raise. There are three ways we can increase the take-home pay of Iowans: We can mandate what employers have to pay, but that's not very practical. We can increase educational and job training opportunities so people can get a better job, which we will do this year. The third way is to cut the taxes on Iowa families. We have an opportunity to eliminate some inequities in our tax system and increase people's take-home pay.

On December 23rd, I was riding around Cedar Rapids with one of our city planners. He was showing me some of the Tax Increment Financing projects in Cedar Rapids. We drove by three men who were out laying pipe in the bitter cold, making sure someone would be able to get water out of their faucet when it was turned on. Last Thursday, I dropped Nicolas and Anna, my two youngest, off at their pre-school program. Two ladies were there working, taking care of the seven or eight babies in the nursery. These people could have been from any town in Iowa. They're working and contributing to the economy. It's their 900 million dollar surplus.

I know that over the next few months, you'll be told to "go slow," and be given all kinds of reasons why Iowans don't deserve an increase in their take-home pay. I want you to think of those pipe fitters working in the sub-zero weather and those day-care providers changing the kids' diapers. We have an opportunity to give them a raise. You and I both know they deserve it.

Challenges... We have many of these too. Let me talk about the most important one, improving education. I think it's great that we are not satisfied being one of the best in the country. We want to be better. I made the statement a month or so ago that I want Governor Vilsack to be successful in his efforts to improve education. The reporter looked at me with a skeptical eye. Why do I want Governor Vilsack to be successful? I have four children. One is in the first grade and another is in kindergarten. If we improve education, my kids will benefit. Your kids and grandkids will too. If we don't improve, our kids suffer.

Jeremy's in first grade in a class of 27. Matthieu is in a kindergarten class with 22 children. Mrs. Frischcorn and Mrs. Kollander, I don't know how you do it. All I can do is say thank you. There are thousands of Mrs. Frischcorns and Mrs. Kollanders all over our state. I want to congratulate you, Majority Leader Siegrist, for initiating a recognition program honoring teachers here in the House.

We have this challenge of improving education, reading scores, and class sizes. As we do, keep in mind this quote from Albert Einstein. He said "imagination is more important than knowledge." Learning is changing. Just as here in the House, laws are not just developed within these walls. They come from forums, town meetings, and coffee shops. That holds true for education as well. Not all education takes place in the classroom. We need to be imaginative and have new ideas. Maybe one of those ideas is a "virtual schoolhouse" out on the internet that our children and teachers can access anytime to discuss any subject. We can't be afraid of new ideas. Will improving education be challenging? Yes! But not overwhelming.

Problems... We can be thankful we don't have so many problems, but unfortunately, there are some. We must deal with this methamphetamine epidemic. I want to say to Governor Vilsack, I'm proud of your stance on putting the meth dealers that sell to minors in prison for the rest of their lives. I know you're taking some heat. Hang in there.

It says something about the values of a society when it is willing to protect the most vulnerable and innocent among them. What is more precious than our children and grandchildren? Nothing. This past September, a 14 year-old Burlington girl died from meth. Her name is Jessica Smith. She isn't going to get a second chance.

A society that is willing to take a stand for children and the family is a society that is working together to be successful. I believe we can beat this problem. Not so much because of what we are going to do, but because of the people that live in this state. How many of you saw the article last week in the *Des Moines Register* about Dale and Doreen Terrell and how they're giving a two year-old meth baby a second chance. Do you know where she works? Right here in the House of Representatives. She works in the legal counsel's office by day and takes care of meth babies by night. That's what makes Iowa great! It's not the government, it's all the unsung heroes - the people of Iowa.

I'm so proud to call Iowa home. I'm proud of the people. That's why I have hope. That's why I am an optimist. We need to do a better job of telling people how fortunate we are to live here. We need to let our young people know this is a great state. I'm tired of so many of our own people talking negatively. It boils down to this. All too soon, my four children will graduate from high school, college, and then settle down. When I go to pick up the phone to call them, I want it to be a local call, not a long distance call. Unfortunately, too many Iowans are making long distance calls to their kids and grandkids. You have a chance to change that this year if you choose to.

I have one last story and a quote to close with...

Yesterday, I turned on the television to watch Iowa Press. My five year-old son Matthieu was working by the t.v. making a space shuttle with his K-Nex he got for Christmas. It was about a quarter 'till 12, so the tail end of the McLaughlin Group was on. My son - busy working, t.v. on in the background - looked up at me and said "Papa, those people aren't being very nice." And I said, "What do you mean?" He said, "Well, first they are all yelling, and when one person is talking, the others interrupt." Five years old, and he notices the lack of civility in today's political discourse. My friends, if a five year-old can figure out that it's wrong, it's time to change.

Which leads me to this quote from Henry Ford: "Coming together is a beginning. Keeping together is progress. Working together is success."

Mr. Majority Leader...Mr. Minority Leader... Members of the House... Can I tell Governor Vilsack and the Senate the House is ready to work together? To address the people's business so not just a five year-old can be proud of our actions, but all Iowans can be proud!?!

George Washington wrote. "Be not tedious in discourse, make not many digressions, nor repeat often the same matter of discourse." With that in mind, I won't retread the ground covered by Speaker Corbett. There will be plenty of opportunity for that over the next one hundred days.

Instead, I'd like to take just a moment of your time to share a few thoughts with our new colleagues. Let me be among the many to offer congratulations on your election, and let me be among the first to welcome you to the Iowa House. And welcome you to your new extended family. Because, you will find over the next two years, that is what we are. Like many Iowa families, we can be a little dysfunctional at times, but all the same, we care for one another, we will laugh together, at times even cry together, but all the while, we will be working together to make Iowa a better place for all of our families back home. And in that vein, there are just a few words of advice I would like to offer you.

Always honor your word. Now, I do not enjoy the reputation of being overly bipartisan. This is all right. The framers of our constitution wanted spirited, and partisan debates. I hope, however, that even my most ardent critic would grant that I am honest, even in the most heated of debates. Because the integrity, my new fellow legislators, of giving your word, and then living up to it is the bond that holds this place together. That makes compromise between disparate parties possible. If you cannot honor a commitment, do not make it. Because once your word has been broken, that kind of trust is very difficult to rebuild.

Always honor the process and the institution. Perhaps the most daunting task before us over the next two years in ensuring, if not rebuilding, the publics trust of government. More often than not, the general public does not make distinctions when they form their opinion about the Iowa legislature. They do not differ between rural or urban representatives, they aren't concerned over our partisan differences, they do not care whether we are from eastern or western Iowa. No, they paint us with a very broad brush. We are all representatives of the people. And as such, we share the same institution, follow the same process, and should treat them both with respect.

Always honor your colleagues. No matter how strong the disagreement, remember we were all elected because the public believed the same thing about each one of us. That we each would work to make Iowa a better place. Some members of the chamber across the rotunda have referred to the intentions of some House members as being evil. I have every faith that none in this house would stoop so low as to question a member's integrity over a difference in partisan philosophy. The intention of every member of this body is good and honorable.

Lastly, I would like to thank all the members of this body, Mr. Speaker, for the honor you have bestowed upon me by electing me your Speaker Pro Tempore. I look forward to working with each and every one of you, and if I can ever be of assistance, or help you with a matter of procedure, or piece of House business, please call on me, my door is always open.

REMARKS BY MINORITY LEADER

Schrader of Marion offered the following remarks:

To all of my colleagues returning as veteran legislators, welcome back. To the freshman class of 1998, congratulations on being chosen by your neighbors to represent them. I predict that we have an exciting year ahead of us. For the first time in sixteen years we have a new governor. For the first time in thirty years, the governor is a Democrat. We live in a time of perhaps the greatest economic prosperity in history.

We all know, though, that even in the best of times things can be better. In some areas in Iowa things must be better. Our system of public education must produce test scores trending up instead of down. Methamphetamine, scarcely heard of five years ago, has become a major threat to people all across the state. Iowa's chart showing test scores dropping and meth use rising is unacceptable. We have the resources and I believe we have the will and ability to yet turn these trends around.

We face these tasks while assuming new roles. We have all worked with and repect Senator Vilsack. Democrats wish Governor Vilsack good luck and are excited as he takes the reins of our state. We have enjoyed helping Governor Vilsack put together his program. We will be working hard to help him enact it into law. The majority party has to work with a Democratic Governor and provide their alternative to his agenda. These new roles will require hard work and responsible decisions from all of us. I hope we can work together better in the next two years than we have in the past. I've already seen what I think are signs of cooperation. Representative Siegrist, for example, wants to eliminate straight ticket voting, a sure sign that he wants to vote for more Democrats.

In recent weeks I've heard a lot about taking bold steps and about going fast versus going slow. I hope that's the case. Last year Democrats proposed a bold plan to fight meth. Republicans opted to go slow. Last year Democrats offered aggressive plans on school reform, Republicans offered a plan which Governor Branstad called a halting, half-step before he vetoed it. Democrats also offered a plan to eliminate the middle-class tax penalty, but that too, was rejected for a more slow-going approach.

This year we do need to go faster. Governor Vilsack has some great ideas for making our schools number one again – reducing class size, restoring discipline, improving infrastructure. We should embrace them. We should make insurance companies more accountable to the people they insure. We should make property tax cuts. We should invest in our independent family farmers. We should return local control to neighbors and communities threatened by large hog operations. We should reform our sentencing laws so that a kid doesn't spend seven years in prison for hitting another kid

I like to go fast. But I know that there is a fine line between going fast and being reckless. When moving fast becomes reckless Democrats will put on the brakes.

Democrats look forward to a productive session under the leadership of our new governor, Tom Vilsack. Together we can get a lot of good things done.

REMARKS BY MAJORITY LEADER

Siegrist of Pottawattamie offered the following remarks:

Good morning and welcome to the opening day of the 1999 Legislative Session. We stand here today as the legislators who will be setting the course for Iowa as we enter the 21st Century. It is always an awesome responsibility to serve in this grand chamber, but even more so to know that we will make up the Iowa House of Representatives as we enter the next millenium. What an unique opportunity!

It is always like the first day of school when we start a new year. It is great to see old friends and catch up on what has been happening in their lives back in the real world. For my part, it was a great interim, made more special by the fact that my wife, Valerie, gave birth to a baby daughter in September. Harriet Addison joins her 3 ½ year-old brother, Evan, in making our lives very special and very hectic. It will also make it very difficult for me to be here for the next four months. I'm not sure that the citizens of Iowa truly understand the sacrifice we make in order to serve in this place. Leaving behind families, friends, and careers is not easy. I would just like to thank all of you for having the guts and commitment to public service to put your name on the ballot. And now that you have been elected, thank you for the sacrifices you are making to be here.

The tough part is over. You got elected! As David Wilcox sings in his song, *Top of the Roller Coaster*, "It's all downhill from here". Today, we begin the fun part. Today we start to govern; to set public policy. To be sure, there will be days that it feels like a roller coaster. However, we must be successful.

To the 15 new members – welcome! You are about to embark on the best ride of your life. This is a great bunch of people who will become like a second family to you. Occasionally, it will be a dysfunctional family, but you couldn't ask for a better group of individuals.

We arrive here today to a landscape that has changed. While both the House and Senate have increased Republican majorities, in a couple of days, Tom Vilsack will be sworn in as our first new governor in sixteen years, and the first Democratic Governor in thirty years. Many of us know and respect Tom Vilsack. With a new administration comes new challenges and exciting possibilities. We cannot afford to let these opportunities pass us by. Since the election, House Republicans have made it clear that we want to work in a bipartisan manner to move Iowa forward. That was not empty rhetoric. We are sincere in our desire to find common ground on the many issues facing our great state. Governor Vilsack, Minority Leader Schrader, and the rest of the Democratic Caucus, my pledge to you is that I will work as hard as I can to forge bipartisan solutions to the issues before us. I realize that we will have disagreements and occasional controversy, but we must strive to work together. The election is over. It is time to make a difference.

Many issues will be addressed by this House during the next 100 days. All of them are important, but our ultimate goal must be to make Iowa a place where our citizens, both young and old, want to live. There is a song by John Mellencamp called Jack and Diane that has a line "Well, you know Diane, we oughtta run off to the city. Diane says 'Baby, you ain't missin' a thing". It is our job to make sure that our citizens don't leave for Houston, Phoenix, Denver, or even Minneapolis. It is our job to work to improve the overall quality of life in Iowa so that our citizens aren't missing a thing and want to stay here, and other people want to come here.

In an effort to accomplish that, the Majority Party will specifically focus on five goals for the upcoming session:

Education Tax Cuts Methamphetamine Recreation and Tourism Workforce Development

Iowa has a great education system and great teachers. We are still leading the nation in educational excellence, but some disturbing trends require action. It is our intent to work closely with the Minority Party and Governor Vilsack to focus on several areas in education.

It is the intention of the Majority Party to test our children's reading skills in the first and second grade and provide resources for after-school reading programs and summer reading academies for those children who need additional help learning to read.

Reducing class size is also an important goal, and while we all agree on the goal, implementation will require some consensus. It is very easy to campaign on reducing class size. Even Jesse Ventura had a commercial about it. But different districts have different problems. We intend to approach this problem with open minds and we will work with Governor Vilsack, but we still believe, as we did last year, that block grants of \$10 million to local school districts would be the most flexible way to make sure that the class-size problem is addressed.

Secondly, I think everyone ran on cutting taxes. It is the intention of the Majority Party to fashion a package of property and income tax cuts to send to the Governor. We have cut taxes four years in a row and in each of those years, some group of people always cried out "No. We can't do that. That is too much. We don't know what the future holds." Yet for four years in a row, we have aggressively cut taxes. And for four years in a row, the economy has grown and today, we have a record budget surplus. I think most incumbents in here bragged about tax cuts in their brochures last campaign. While the details need to be worked out, we feel that taxes need to be cut between \$100 - \$200 million. I am sure voices will be raised to say we can't do that. But we can.

We need to have the state reduce property taxes by picking up a greater share of the funding for education in Iowa. We need to target income tax relief to the elderly and the middle-class in our state. Among other things, we need to remove the tax on social security, increase the exemption on pension income, and look at doubling the dependent child tax credit.

We can. We must. And we will cut taxes.

Third is methamphetamine. Methamphetamine use is a growing scourge on Iowa. In a bipartisan manner, we intend to work with Democrats in the House, the Senate, and Governor Vilsack to fashion a package that will make a difference in putting a stop to this horrible drug. Included in the package, there needs to be a methamphetamine strike task force made up of state troopers and drug enforcement agents, and a Prosecutor Posse, which will be made up of prosecutors who will go where they are needed across the state to try drug cases. It is also imperative that we find resources for treatment and education to solve this problem.

And, yes, we will send Governor Vilsack his top priority in this area - life imprisonment for dealing meth to minors.

As we attempt to keep our young people in the state and entice people to move to our state, recreation, tourism, and quality-of-life issues must come to the forefront. Programs we passed last year to help with historical sites in Iowa, biking and hiking trails, the recreational grant program, and the Restore the Outdoor Plan have all been successful in enhancing our quality of life.

This year, we need to fund the Community Attractions and Tourism Fund to encourage Iowans to dream of projects and make them become a reality. If it is a new arena or a race track, a rain forest, or a world-class zoo, the State of Iowa must help communities all across the state – urban and rural – make this a better place to live.

At the same time, we must enhance the environmental quality of our state by providing funding to cap ag drainage wells to protect our ground water, to continue to fund the R.E.A.P. program and soil conservation programs, and it is time for Iowa to take a big step in protecting an unique geological treasure that in the United States is only found in Iowa – the Loess Hills. It is imperative that the state help protect the Loess Hills for future generations.

Lastly, workforce development and the shortage of skilled workers is a critical issue facing our state. This chamber has already taken steps to address this problem with the passage of the apprenticeship program last year and various other workforce development programs. But more needs to be done. I applaud Governor Vilsack for putting Lieutenant Governor Sally Pederson in charge of this very important area. House Republicans look forward to working with the administration to make significant progress in attracting and retaining skilled workers in Iowa.

The other day when I went to pick up my kids at the sitter's house, I saw the local paper on the table with my picture on the front page. It's a picture that is five years old that they continue to use even though I sent them a new one last year. I said to my son, Evan, "Who's this a picture of, Evan?" And he said, "That's you Daddy, but it's a bad picture. You're older than that."

That comment made me reflect on the fact that I am humbled today to be starting my 7th year as Majority Leader and 15th year in the Iowa House. I think back to the '80's when the General Assembly was making promises that they didn't keep, like funding R.E.A.P. at \$30 million a year. Or the early '90's when we had across-the-board budget cuts for schools because we were in debt. Then, I thought proudly about how, in a bipartisan manner, we worked to eliminate the debt, reduce taxes, and build up the largest budget surplus in the history of our state. That's a pretty good record of accomplishment. But, the best is yet to come. Working together, we can make Iowa a place where our kids and grandkids will be proud to call home.

As we enter the last year of this century, there is much to be done. But, we can do it. Let's get to work.

In accordance with law and House Concurrent Resolution 1, duly adopted, the joint convention was called to order, President Kramer presiding.

Senator Iverson of Wright moved that the roll call be dispensed with and that the President of the joint convention be authorized to declare a quorum present.

The motion prevailed.

President Kramer announced a quorum present and the joint convention duly organized.

Senator Iverson of Wright moved that a committee of six, consisting of three members from the Senate and three members from the House of Representatives, be appointed to notify Governor Terry E. Branstad that the joint convention was ready to receive him.

Secretary of State, Chester J. Culver; Treasurer of State, Michael Fitzgerald; Secretary of Agriculture and Land Stewardship, Patty Judge; and State Auditor Dick Johnson, were escorted into the House chamber.

Mrs. Chris Branstad, wife of the Governor, and their sons Marcus and Eric were escorted into the House chamber.

Lieutenant Governor Joy Corning was escorted into the House chamber.

Governor-elect Tom Vilsack and Lieutenant Governor-elect Sally Pederson were escorted into the House chamber.

The committee waited upon Governor Terry E. Branstad and escorted him to the Speaker's station.

President Kramer then presented Governor Terry E. Branstad who delivered the following condition of the state address:

President Kramer, Speaker Corbett, Lieutenant Governor Corning, Governor-Elect Vilsack, Lieutenant Governor-Elect Pederson, Chief Justice McGiverin, Justices and Judges, State Officials, Senators and Representatives, Distinguished Guests, and Friends.

On this, my last State of the State Address, pardon me if I get just a little bit nostalgic. I vividly recall, back in 1982, when then Governor Ray was being touted for his 14 years of outstanding service. My friend Senator Chuck Grassley, in his own unique style, rose before the assembled throng and pronounced that Governor Ray was "the longest Governor in the history of Iowa." Well, I've never been accused of being the "longest" Governor in Iowa; the shortest, maybe; but never the longest.

These past 16 years have been the best years of my life. Challenging, yes; stressful, at times; demanding, always. But I was and remain invigorated each and every day by my love for this state and its people. To all of you who have put up with my mustache, my less than silver tongue, and my Iowa earnestness over all these years, I say thank you.

Thank you for giving this farm boy from Winnebago County a chance to be your Governor. I will never forget the honor you gave me when I led you well, nor the tender mercies you showed when I struggled with you to find a better way.

To the members of the General Assembly past and present, to Lieutenant Governor Corning, my partner of the last eight years, and our State officials, and all those Iowans who dared to dream with me of better things to come, I say thank you. You've built a better Iowa for all of us.

It's been a great run.

- In January 1983, the unemployment rate was 8.9 percent and 126,000 lowans were out of work. Today, our unemployment rate is 2.5 percent and more Iowans are working than ever before.
- Sixteen years ago, our budget was not balanced and taxes had to be raised. In 1999, we have a record budget surplus, and taxes have been cut four years in a row, and should be cut again this year.
- In 1983, we were in the midst of a farm crisis where we literally lost a
 generation of Iowans. As we approach the 21st century, we can be proud
 that Iowa is growing again, and a majority of our counties are gaining
 population.

I can go on:

- The unemployment trust fund from a \$63 million deficit to a surplus of over \$750 million;
- Manufacturing jobs, up almost 24 percent, despite a decline nationally, with payroll jobs up 40 percent;
- Per capita income, up 115 percent;
- Housing values, 147 percent higher in the last ten years;
- Factory exports, up 234 percent and business failures, down 80 percent in the last decade.

We now manage under generally accepted accounting principles, with adequate reserve accounts, and with spending under control. State government now operates as a single enterprise with a common goal, not as a multitude of independent agencies.

I could go on and on. Indeed, 1998 proved that our economic diversification strategy worked. Despite record low pork prices and other farm commodity prices in the pits, our economy continued to grow.

How did we do this? We focused on the fundamentals. We made the state more competitive by cutting taxes and regulations. We put training and incentive packages together for quality jobs. We invested in education at all levels to build a strong work force. We trained and energized a new generation of community leaders committed to economic development. We built commercial highway and telecommunications networks to link and to provide better access to all parts of our state. And we marketed and promoted Iowa like never before.

As we close the books on 1998, I am pleased to report that the state of our state is strong and sound. Iowa was recently recognized as the best state in America to raise a child. Iowa is, indeed, in good shape.

But enough of the past. What about the future? What's in store for Iowa as we embark on a new century and a new millenium?

Someone once said that the definition of a statesman is a former politician. Well, as a soon to be statesman, let me visit with you for a minute with some straight talk about change and the future of Iowa.

You see, Iowa needs to change – in three major ways – if we are to reach our potential as a people. Now, I know that we Iowans don't like change. I'm living testimony to that. If things work, we generally don't tinker with them. Lord knows, with all the change in the weather, we don't need more change to deal with in our lives.

That attitude has a certain appeal to it. We continue to be a place where you know your neighbor, where they know when you're sick, and they care when you die. Family, friends, community – those constants of Iowa life give us a grounding that is unique in America today.

But that doesn't mean we can escape change. Too often, we Iowans idolize the past – reflecting on the loamy smell of newly tilled ground in the spring; the ringing of the dinner bell calling us from the hay barn; or a full harvest moon over a soon-to-be picked field of corn – and we wonder why life can't always be filled with the sights, sounds, and smells of the way life used to be.

But, in reality, our state almost from its inception, has been trying to resist the inexorable march of economic change. A change that has displaced people with machines on our farms and sent some of our best and brightest packing for the bright lights of the cities.

Now that we have stabilized this state, now that we are in good shape again, it is time to stop resisting change once and for all.

It is time for Iowa to truly grow once again. That is the first and most important challenge facing us. How do we do that? Historically, we have acceded to change only

during times of catharsis – our economic diversification program became a reality only once we hit a wall called the farm crisis.

Our challenge today is to make changes in the good times so that Iowa can grow into even better times. We need to open our arms and communities to 21st century immigrants who will make our state economically stronger and more culturally diverse.

We must convince our own children and those from other states that they can make a great living and live a great life in Iowa. We will not convince them with memories of a pastoral past. You can't feed your family on memories. We will convince them only by creating a climate of growth and unlimited opportunity for all.

Therefore, I suggest that Iowans engage in a great conversation; a great conversation on growth over the next few years. In every community, barriers to growth, whether they be statutory, regulatory, cultural, or economic, should be identified and broken down. An era of responsible risk taking must be ushered in. A new era of entrepreneurship must be fostered. Successful risk-takers should be touted, not flouted. We must make it OK to stand out above the crowd in Iowa.

We need to nurture the next generation of Ruans and McLeods, John K. Hansons and Dwight Vredenburgs. And then double and triple their number.

That does not mean we have to depopulate rural Iowa while we build up only our cities, as some would say. Our capacity for growth is not based on location – technology shortens all distances. We don't need to create a greater disparity of wealth to create a better climate for wealth-creation. We can have growth everywhere in this state.

But it also means we must find ways to further process our own goods here in Iowa. We must give our producers and workers greater access to sources of capital and more options in the marketplace so they, too, can help Iowa grow. We must encourage and help our cities to grow, too, so that they reach a critical mass of economic and cultural opportunities.

We will have to think outside the box to do this. It won't be easy. We won't be able to do things the way they have always been done. But like it or not, the only thing certain about the future is the certainty of change. We must either embrace it and make this good state a growth state, or face a future that is but a mere reflection of the past. Let the great conversation on growth begin.

Our second challenge for change is in education. No state has a deeper education heritage; no state has shown a more sustained commitment to its young. But there is too much complacency. We are among the best, but not as good as we could be, and our educational establishment is too resistant to change.

The problems our schools face have never been greater. New stresses on families, the drug culture, new immigrants, and rapidly changing technologies and workplace skills all weigh heavily on our schools. But no challenge is greater than the imminent loss of a whole generation of our best teachers.

We all know you can have a class size of one, have a bad teacher, and get a horrible education. We all know that one outstanding teacher can make a difference in our life for the rest of our lives

Then why don't we pay the good teachers what they are worth – every bit as much as a good doctor or lawyer or successful business person? Iowa should lead the nation in rejecting the seniority mentality in education and pay good teachers more, and pay great teachers more yet.

We also must recreate our schools. Why do we have only 180 days of school, when our international competitors have as many as 240? Why do we halt the education of our youngsters for three months every year, when they need it the most?

Iowa will never have mountains or oceans; our weather will always be fickle. But our schools are our creatures, subject to our control. Our constitution recognizes our unique commitment to the common school as the ticket to opportunity for our citizens.

Finally, our challenge to change must address our tax structure. Our current system is as archaic as it is complicated. Our property and income taxes are too high and almost indecipherable. Our income tax structure tells prospective business executives that their taxes will be about double what they really are.

Yet, even after two income tax cuts, our rates still place us among the top 10 in the country. Our property tax system looks like something devised by Rube Goldberg, layered with bygone eras of property tax fixes and hidden opportunities for tax increases.

Taxes can and should be cut. You can and should do that, and invest in education, too. But taxes must also be reformed. Reformed by making it harder to raise taxes and easier to understand for our citizens. Your challenge for the future is to reform the system, reduce the burden, and make it a tool of growth.

Americans are unique. We are the only people on this earth who always focus on the future and expect better things. Others yearn for the past. Our immigrant ancestors taught us that the past is but history and better days are ours for the making.

There are better days ahead for Iowa. They are ours for the making. We are poised as never before for an era of growth and opportunity. We can be a place that more and more people want to call home. But it won't happen without change. A new commitment to growth, a renewed commitment to education and a reformed tax structure are all within your grasp. Seize them and make Iowa a better place for generations to come.

With that it is time for me to move on. I've had my time. I've done what I could. It is your turn now.

Before I go, I'd like to thank my wife and my family. They know, all too well, the sacrifices involved in public service. It is time for me to serve them now.

We Iowans are a fortunate people. We have good, clean, honest, open government. We are still a place where you can respect your government and its leaders. It is that abiding trust that will allow you, the assembled members of this Legislature, to do great things.

I have tried to conduct myself with similar openness and honesty. I have truly worked to earn your trust.

When it is all said and done, I hope people will say this about my governorship:

He worked hard;

He did his best:

And he prepared us for even better days ahead.

Fellow Iowans, thank you, and God bless you all.

- Whereas, Terry E. Branstad today addressed the Seventy-eighth General Assembly of the State of Iowa and in so doing, delivered, in addition to his Inaugural Address in 1983, his sixteenth and last Condition of the State message to the Iowa General Assembly as Governor of the State of Iowa, and
- Whereas, This Joint Convention of 50 Senators and 100 Representatives therefore is honored to represent the hundreds of men and women who served in the eight General Assemblies during Terry E. Branstad's sixteen-year tenure as Governor, and
- Whereas, Beginning today the state's historians and others will record and evaluate the ways in which Terry E. Branstad's dedicated public service has enriched the history of Iowa state government, and the ways in which his service has touched the lives of all Iowans; Now Therefore,

Be It Resolved by the Seventy-Eighth General Assembly in Joint Convention, That the Joint Convention remark for posterity upon Governor Terry E. Branstad's relationship, as head of the executive branch of state government, to the legislative branch of state government, to wit:

- Terry E. Branstad's four-term tenure as Governor has been marked by a constructive separation of powers during which the Governor's policy objectives have been effectively communicated to the General Assembly, and the General Assembly has freely exercised its constitutionally mandated independence in making public policy through its lawmaking function. The results of this relationship will be recalled by others in more detail than can be expressed in this resolution, but for members of the General Assembly whose service parallels Governor Branstad's service, the following general contributions will serve as reminders of hundreds of policy changes fashioned during Governor Branstad's tenure in office from 1983 until today:

- 2. EDUCATION. Far-reaching early education, kindergarten through grade 12, and higher education funding initiatives and innovations, including teacher and higher education pay and tuition tax credits.

JOINT CONVENTION

In accordance with House Concurrent Resolution 2, duly adopted, the joint convention was called to order at 9:48 a.m., President Kramer presiding.

Senator Iverson of Wright moved that the roll call be dispensed with and the President of the joint convention be authorized to declare a quorum present, which motion prevailed.

President Kramer announced a quorum was present and the joint convention duly organized.

Senator Iverson of Wright moved that a committee of four, consisting of two members of the Senate and two members of the House, be appointed to escort Governor Terry E. Branstad to the House chamber for the Condition of the Judicial Branch Message.

The motion prevailed and the President appointed as such committee: Senators Gaskill of Hancock and Shearer of Washington on the part of the Senate; and Representatives Sunderbruch of Scott and Kuhn of Floyd on the part of the House.

Senator Iverson of Wright moved that a committee of six, consisting of three members of the Senate and three members of the House, be appointed to notify Chief Justice Arthur A. McGiverin that the joint convention was ready to receive him.

The motion prevailed and the President appointed as such committee: Senators Maddox of Polk, Freeman of Buena Vista and Fraise of Lee on the part of the Senate; and Representatives Baudler of Adair, Garman of Story and Parmenter of Story on the part of the House.

Secretary of State, Chester J. Culver; Treasurer of the State, Michael Fitzgerald; Secretary of Agriculture and Land Stewardship, Patty Judge; State Auditor, Dick Johnson, and Attorney General Tom Miller were escorted into the House chamber.

The Justices of the Supreme Court, the Chief Judge and Chief Judges of the Court of Appeals and the Chief Judges of the state's judicial districts were escorted into the House chamber.

Lieutenant Governor Joy Corning was escorted into the House chamber.

Mrs. Jo Ann McGiverin, wife of the Chief Justice and Ed and Mrs. Jo McGiverin, cousins of the Chief Justice were escorted into the House chamber.

Governor-elect Tom Vilsack and Lieutenant Governor-elect Sally Pederson were escorted into the House chamber.

The committee waited upon Governor Terry E. Branstad and escorted him into the House chamber.

The committee waited upon Chief Justice Arthur A. McGiverin and escorted him to the Speaker's station.

President Kramer presented Chief Justice Arthur A. McGiverin who delivered the following Condition of the Judicial Branch Message:

Madam President, Mr. Speaker, Governor Branstad and Lieutenant Governor Corning, Governor-Elect Vilsack and Lieutenant Governor-Elect Pederson, members of the General Assembly, state officials, judges, and friends:

We are honored and pleased by the opportunity each year to review the significant activities of the court system and make recommendations aimed at providing the highest quality of justice to the people of Iowa. We sincerely thank the General Assembly for the kind invitation to speak here today.

Let me begin by extending a warm welcome to the new legislators and state officials. I also want to welcome Governor-Elect Vilsack and Lieutenant Governor-Elect Pederson. We look forward to working with all of you on issues involving the administration of justice.

I would like to acknowledge Justice Mark Cady, the newest member of the supreme court, and Judge Van Zimmer who joined the court of appeals last week.

Before I begin my main remarks, I would like to recognize and thank Governor Branstad for his strong support of the judicial branch over the years. His leadership was crucial in bringing about the landmark Court Reorganization Act in the 1980s, which secured state funding for the court system. As a result of this far-sighted reform, our courts operate more efficiently and resources flow where they are most needed. Today, Iowans in all counties enjoy more equal access to court services than was possible under the previous county funding structure.

Governor Branstad has always said that appointing judges is a governor's most important job. He has appointed nearly eighty percent of Iowa's judges. However, it is the quality of the appointments he has made rather than the quantity for which he will be remembered. He took great care to appoint hardworking, fair minded and highly

principled judges, without regard to partisan political pressures. Because I am among the twenty percent he did not appoint, it is appropriate for me to say this.

Governor Branstad, we thank you and wish you well.

After my address, we hope all of you will join us for coffee and conversation downstairs in the courtroom. During the reception, I will present our Child Advocate of the Year Award. This award is given to recognize an individual who has made an extraordinary personal commitment to helping Iowa's troubled children.

The focus of my address will be about the primary work of the courts deciding cases. However, I would be remiss if I did not mention a few of the many activities we have underway to help shape the future of the court system.

Last session, we agreed to move judicial branch operations into a new building which will house both appellate courts and our administrative offices. If everything goes as planned, we will move into the new judicial building in the summer of 2002.

We look forward to the challenge of creating a building that will serve as a monument to justice. We envision a building which conveys a sense of timelessness and dignity; a building equipped with state-of-the-art communications technology; and a building which reflects Iowans' respect for the rule of law. Though no building could ever rival the splendor of our majestic Capitol, we hope that the new judicial branch building will, like the Capitol, be a source of lasting pride for all Iowans.

Shaping the ideal judicial branch for the year 2020 was the basic premise of our Commission on Planning for the 21st Century. You will remember that the commission, which was composed of over seventy Iowans from diverse backgrounds, conducted the first comprehensive, long-range study of the Iowa court system. Much has been said about the careful report of the commission since it was submitted to our court. Rather than attempt to summarize the report, I will briefly discuss some of the steps we are taking to achieve the commission's vision of the ideal court system for the 21st Century and beyond.

Recognizing that we could not simultaneously respond to all 89 of the commission's recommendations, we selected twelve priorities to address during the next two years. You will find a summary of those twelve priorities attached to my remarks. I want to briefly mention five of them.

The first priority concerns safety. Of all public institutions, the courthouse should be a safe haven. We are taking steps to ensure the safety of all court participants — not just court personnel but all people who come to court.

Another priority involves public service. The courts are here to serve the people – not the system. With that in mind, we are placing more emphasis on customer service to make our courts more user-friendly.

A third priority is information. Information is the key to effective decision-making. It is key, not only for deciding cases, but also for management and public policy decisions. We are expanding our statistical reports to cover a broad spectrum of detailed information about cases – for your benefit as well as for our own.

Another priority involves education. The vitality of the judicial branch depends upon the confidence and understanding of the public. We are establishing a

comprehensive public education program which will include developing law-related education programs for schools and promoting public understanding of the courts.

The last priority concerns technology. Information technology is rapidly changing the way people communicate and conduct business, including that of the courts. We are exploring technological advances such as electronic filing of court papers and electronic data management for storage and retrieval of court records.

As with most plans to enhance the effective administration of justice, successful implementation of our priorities will require broad public support. We ask for yours.

Much of the court system's ability to remain effective in the 21st Century hinges on the use of technology. Someone once said: technology is like a steamroller. If you are not the steamroller, then you are destined to become part of the road. I am pleased to report that we are not part of the road. In fact, Iowa has one of, the most technologically advanced state court systems in the nation.

Although computer technology offers the promise of a bright future, it is not problem free. Predictions of global disaster abound because of the infamous Y2K bug. Those of you who know of my love affair with computers will understand my assessment of the situation when I say, I have seen the future and it does not compute. But I assure you that we are prepared. Our critical software applications have been upgraded to understand the year 2000. And if that does not work, I have a large stockpile of sharpened pencils!

We are preparing our courts to meet the challenges of the future. But we must not overlook the challenges of today, for they will not simply disappear come January 1, 2000. Only with your assistance can we overcome our most immediate challenge – coping with high caseloads.

This is not a new development. Indeed, a few years ago, I reported to you about the court system's struggle with rising caseloads. You helped ease the situation temporarily by providing some new judgeships throughout the state over a period of three years and we greatly appreciate that assistance. Nonetheless, as the tide of cases rises, the demand for judges continues to exceed our supply.

As in the past, our criminal and juvenile caseloads are the most demanding. Caseload statistics, however, do not illustrate the problems as well as personal accounts from our trial judges who are on the front lines. So rather than recite statistics, I ask that you carefully study the information provided with these remarks.

Swift court action is one of the most effective deterrents to crime. Long time lags between conviction or plea of guilty and sentencing undermine the effectiveness of the punishment and ultimately the effectiveness of the criminal justice system. Here are some examples of sentencing delays around the state.

In the district associate court in Black Hawk County, criminal cases are so backed up at times that it takes three months after conviction or entry of a guilty plea before a defendant can be sentenced.

A similar situation exists in Johnson County district associate court where there is a six to eight week delay from entry of a guilty plea until sentencing.

In Polk County district court, the state's busiest courthouse, the number of felony drug cases and class A felony cases have quadrupled since 1990. Because of the high felony caseload, there is an eight to nine week delay from entry of a guilty verdict until sentence in these most serious cases.

This session as you consider tougher penalties or sentencing options, please understand that due, in part, to a shortage of judges we cannot carry out sentencing in as timely a manner as basic justice clearly demands.

Like the criminal caseload, our trial courts are also struggling with a burdensome juvenile caseload. And we anticipate more pressure on the juvenile docket in the near future as we implement new state and federal time lines to move children out of foster care faster and into permanent homes.

There are special problems in the juvenile court.

In Benton County, for example, where a judge is available for juvenile cases a little more than two days per month, juvenile hearings are scheduled every fifteen minutes. According to Judge Susan Flaherty who hears cases in Benton County and surrounding counties, "We have attempted to deal with the increase by improving efficiency in scheduling and reducing hearing time allotted to each case and doing more reviews on paper. I am always concerned that by spending less time on individual cases, we are shortchanging the kids and families."

Judge Flaherty's concern is well taken. Imagine how the families must feel, when, because of inadequate resources, their day in court is reduced to minutes. We simply must provide a climate in which justice is not rationed by use of a stopwatch.

Although present difficulties in the criminal and juvenile dockets take priority, we certainly cannot ignore civil cases. Nearly one-half of the trial courts' civil docket is composed of domestic relations cases, which include dissolution of marriage, contempt, modification of dissolution, and uniform child support cases. These are important cases. But because criminal and juvenile cases must be given highest priority, domestic relations cases must wait in line. Other segments of the civil docket such as property disputes, personal injury suits, and business litigation, must wait longer.

To keep criminal and juvenile cases moving in Polk County, two district court judges are being moved from the general trial assignment. One judge is being assigned to juvenile cases and the other is being assigned to criminal cases. This shift will have a ripple effect on the civil docket. Previously, parties in dissolution of marriage cases had to wait about nine months for a trial. Now, they will have to wait even longer.

We have no control over the number of cases presented. Nor should we. To limit the number of cases would be to limit the ability of Iowans to have meaningful access to justice.

Some might suggest we can temporarily relieve the pressure in the criminal and juvenile dockets by shifting judges here and there. But this is simply reorganizing the deck chairs. It is not even an effective temporary solution, much less a long term solution. Efficiency measures and aggressive case management have been implemented, but can only do so much, because even the most productive judges can carefully decide only a certain number of cases each day. There is no escape from simple arithmetic: As long as the demand for justice grows, we will need more judges

The details of our specific recommendations are contained in our budget request which we have submitted to you.

Alexis de Toqueville observed more than 160 years ago that in America, all public issues are eventually resolved in the courts. That observation is as true today as it was in the early 19th Century. And surely one of the most challenging issues permeating our courts in the late 20th Century is drug abuse.

Many of the cases pouring into the court system today involve drug abuse in one way or another. Its impact is not confined to prosecutions for possession or distribution of illicit drugs. Our judges see drug abuse as a major contributing cause in many child in need of assistance cases, juvenile delinquency cases, dissolution of marriage cases, termination of parental rights cases and domestic violence cases. The implications are profound. The following information was provided to me by judges from around the state who have witnessed the destruction caused by drug abuse.

Drug addiction is not isolated to one area of the state, one race or one age group. Our judges see addicts, who are, or were, professional people, homeless people, single parents and married couples, college students, factory workers, homemakers and teenagers. Drug addiction exists in rural Iowa as well as urban Iowa.

Drug addiction overlaps with child abuse and neglect. Children often end up in foster care or with relatives because they have been abused by their drug addicted parents or by others in the household while the parents are in a drug induced haze. Nor is it unusual for children to be neglected while their parents feed their drug addiction. In many cases, parental rights are eventually terminated.

Drug addiction is the root of many violent crimes. One of our judges told me of a sixteen-year-old boy who was a normal, good natured child until he became hooked on meth. When his mother confronted him about the drug, he threatened to douse her with lighter fluid and set her on fire. Later, he did.

Drug addiction is linked to domestic violence. A judge in eastern Iowa told me of four children whose meth addicted father rammed his vehicle into a car carrying them, their mother and a domestic abuse advocate. The children were traumatized. Despite the dangerous situation, the mother later reunited with her husband and the children eventually had to be placed in foster care.

When dealing with drug addicts, our traditional punitive measures tend to be ineffective. A judge in southern Iowa told me that meth is so addictive that probationers routinely fail drug testing even when they are given ten days advance notice of the test. Many addicts return to their addiction as soon as they are released from jail or prison. Many addicts commit more crimes to support their habits. And many addicts end up back in court again and again.

There is obviously no single solution to the problem. Some judges are exploring innovative approaches which strike at the heart of the problem – the addiction. For instance, Judge Linda Reade in Polk County emphasizes treatment of drug-addicted defendants in addition to punitive measures. Judge Reade says that this therapeutic approach is a better way to deal with drug-addicted defendants because it focuses on ending the addiction.

The criminal justice system cannot be the exclusive vehicle for ending drug addiction. The entire community must join forces to end this scourge.

As you search for solutions to the drug problem and other problems, please bear in mind that new laws, tougher criminal penalties, and more resources for law enforcement will add to the existing bottleneck in the courts through which all cases must flow. We will do our part to deliver justice as effectively as we can under the circumstances. But without sufficient resources to match the high demand for court services, justice will continue to lag behind the public's rightful expectations.

Our system of government calls on all three branches, in differing roles but working together, to contribute to the administration of justice. Our role is to decide cases according to the law, promptly and equally to all people. But we must rely on the other branches for the resources required to carry out this enormously important responsibility. I am confident that by working in unison, we can overcome the grave problems that threaten to impede the delivery of justice — today and in the future.

The Joint Convention stood at ease and proceeded to the floor of the auditorium for the inauguration of Governor-elect Thomas J. Vilsack and Lieutenant Governor-elect Sally Pederson.

The Joint Convention reconvened at 10:00 a.m., President Kramer presiding.

Thank you. It's wonderful to be here.

Beyond the pride I have taken in my family, this is the proudest and at the same time most humbling moment of my life.

I'm proud to have been selected by Tom Vilsack and the citizens of this state to help lead Iowa into the $21^{\rm st}$ century. And I am humbled by the trust and faith all of you have placed in me.

And I want to tell you something. As unbelievable as it may seem, I never doubted for a minute – from the moment I was nominated – that Tom and I would be standing here today.

I never doubted it because I'm an optimist. You see, my parents are optimists and they raised all five of their children to be optimists.

The reason my parents are optimists is that they – like you and many of your parents – learned from watching their ancestors that nothing was impossible.

This state was settled by people who brought with them little more than ingenuity and determination. No problems were unsolvable. Nothing dulled their spirit for this beautiful, fertile land.

What would they say to Iowans today? What would they say to us? We tell pollsters we are generally satisfied with our lives, but are watching in dismay as we:

- see our students' test scores slip
- see many schools in need of repair
- see streams and rivers fouled by pollution
- and see methamphetamine tearing at families and communities.

These problems strike at our soul. For Iowans have always known that while we couldn't provide ocean views, mountain ranges, and the bright lights of the biggest cities, we could provide the things that really mattered: the highest standards in education, a clean environment, and wonderful communities to raise our families. When these are threatened, Iowa's very sense of self is threatened.

Our ancestors, those sturdy pioneers, would tell us to roll up our sleeves and get to work as a community.

"Every member of the community is important," they would tell us. "Civic responsibility is important," they would tell us. And they would tell us something else: "Don't leave anybody out. Cast a big net and draw in everyone, those new to politics, those who've just arrived in our state, those who have not traditionally had a voice in government."

Here's an amazing fact: Iowa has more small communities than any other state in the nation. This means that more of our people have the opportunity to serve, and be involved in the running of this state.

Iowa must make use of all its people. Civic responsibility cannot be left to a few. For civic responsibility isn't reserved for those of one background, or one gender, or one age.

Tom Vilsack gave me, an outsider to politics, an extraordinary opportunity to run for office, and you the citizens have given me an extraordinary opportunity to serve. I'd like this spirit of inclusion to spread to make this a better state for all of our citizens.

This shouldn't be hard, because Iowa has a proud history of reaching out to others. Whether it was welcoming Vietnamese refugees in the 1970s or piling sandbags during the flood of 1993, neighbor helping neighbor has been the very soul of our state. One writer called it "the casserole reflex" — Iowans automatically give to others in need.

The Vilsack-Pederson administration wants to build on this generous spirit to create opportunities for all Iowans.

It is my deepest hope that our administration will, more than anything else, stand for opportunity.

Opportunity for Iowa - all Iowa - to prosper.

Opportunity for Iowans - all Iowans, no matter what their background, their economic status, or their special circumstances - to thrive.

I am confident this is what the Vilsack-Pederson administration will bring to Iowa: A government of optimism in a land of opportunity. And add one other thing: Commitment, because optimism without commitment won't get the job done.

It is my most fervent hope that in this state of opportunity, the government of optimism will rebuild our hopes, rekindle our dreams, reinvigorate our lives. But you can't solve problems if you can't see them. You can't help people if you don't know them.

So I am pledging today to do volunteer service somewhere in our state each week, and I challenge others to do the same. I plan to help school children with their reading, to serve meals at a homeless shelter, to help a neighborhood clean-up project, or any other task that will help me learn about the problems and the people working to solve them throughout this great state. I know there are many needs, but I know also that Iowa has many willing hands.

I come here this morning, a small-town Iowan who has always loved Iowa, a businesswoman who chose to stay in Iowa, a mother, grandmother, and aunt who wants her children, grandchildren, nieces and nephews to have opportunities in Iowa – I come here this morning to ask just one thing of you.

Please join us.

Please join us in this government of optimism in this lovely, rich land blessed by God and nurtured by our ancestors. Please join us in this government of optimism in this great state of opportunity. Together, we can create the Iowa of our dreams.

President Kramer presented Governor Thomas J. Vilsack, who delivered the following inaugural address:

Governors Fulton, Ray and Branstad, Lieutenant Governors Pederson, Corning and Zimmerman, Chief Justice McGiverin and distinguished members of the court and judiciary, honorable members of the General Assembly – past and present, executive counsel members and ladies and gentlemen:

Today is a day of passages in the State of Iowa, as we inaugurate a new administration and look forward to the dawning of a new millennium.

It is a day to look forward to the challenges and opportunities before us, to take stock of who we are and where we are, and to take aim at where we want to go.

Before I speak of the future let me say a word about Governor Branstad and Lieutenant Governor Corning and their families. Governor and Lieutenant Governor – you have led us during the best of times and through some of the worst of times. You have worked tirelessly to improve the management of state government and to diversify and strengthen the state's economy. You have worked for over two decades for the state and the people that you love – to make Iowa a better place to live – and you leave office having done so. On behalf of a grateful people I extend our deepest appreciation to you and to your families for the sacrifices you have made on our behalf.

Twenty-three years ago I followed my heart to Iowa. My wife, Christie, and I settled in her hometown of Mt. Pleasant. We wanted to be close to family. Our hopes and dreams were simple. We wished to raise our own family in a caring, warm, and nurturing community. Our two sons, Jess and Doug benefited by that decision. Each day they give us reason to be proud.

During those twenty-three years I've learned of Iowa's greatness. It starts with its bountiful natural resources, acres of rich black soil and miles of meandering streams and rivers. But its real greatness lies in its most enduring quality – its goodness. <u>Iowa is great because Iowa is good.</u> Let me repeat that Iowa is great because Iowa is good. Our goodness arises from the fundamental goodness of our people – caring, hard working, well educated, and decent. From child care providers to direct care staff at nursing homes, from teachers to social workers, from farmers to factory workers, from veterans to volunteers – caring, hard-working, well educated and decent. No where is our goodness, and therefore our greatness, better displayed than in our dedication to family and community.

Family and community is how and where we raise our children and care for each other. Family and community is how and where we teach our values, how and where we mold our ambitions and our aspirations, and how and where today's dreams become tomorrow's Iowa.

Family and community – more than genetics and geography – they are our collective frame of mind, our way of living, and our shared vision of how we want to be.

At the outset I spoke of the dawning of the new millennium and of challenge and opportunity. Stated simply our challenge at the close of this century and at the beginning of a new century is to preserve what is best about Iowa and to make it better. We must dedicate ourselves to preserving our natural resources — our land, water and air and to preserving the best of family and community while adapting each to the changing world that surrounds us.

Making our best – better will not be easy. We will be challenged to change.

To preserve and to enhance our natural resources, we must rethink what we do with our land, our water, and our air. We must be good stewards and rededicate ourselves to restoring and conserving the land, to cleaning up the water, and to protecting the air. It is our natural resources that hold the key to a stronger, more prosperous Iowa. If we are able to mix good old — Iowa common sense with changing science we can enrich our natural resources and secure a better today and decades of better tomorrows

Constant and unrelenting change challenges our notion of family. For many of us family is not simply defined. Step families, foster families, adopted families, single parent families and other arrangements today redefine family. We live life at an ever accelerating pace as we incorporate technology into every day life. Adapting to changing lifestyles and managing the hectic pace of life while preserving what is best about family will require information, knowledge and wisdom. One of the keys to successful family life is a good education.

Iowa has had a long-standing tradition of excellence in education. To maintain that tradition and to build upon it for stronger Iowa families will require us to think differently about education and to be prepared to invest in it.

In the face of growing research, we can no longer accept that an education starts with kindergarten. An education begins at birth. With new jobs being created every day, and new skills being required every day we can no longer afford to allow graduation to signal the end of an Iowan's education. In Iowa an education never ends – it is lifelong.

We must create a lifelong learning system. We must be willing to help equip parents to be their child's first and best teachers. We must invest in early childhood education so all of our children start school ready to learn. We must reduce class sizes in the early grades and improve teacher training to ensure that the basics are taught well – to lay a strong foundation for future learning. We must instill in each student the knowledge they will individually need to become productive citizens. Our children must have access to technology and master its use. We must always be sure that what we teach is what we need to learn. In short we must create an educational system that embodies excellence and that enables everyone to learn well. Let us strive for a world class education system from pre-school to graduate school that is the envy of the nation and the world. Nothing short of that commitment will enable us to hold true to the traditions of our past and ensure the security of our future.

With a real commitment from all of us today's dream of a quality education, we will build stronger families for Iowa's tomorrow.

At the heart of our sense of community is a shared concern for each other. Today we face stern challenges to that sense of community.

Every day dangerous drugs are shipped into our state, grown in our fields, or made in our neighborhoods. Each decade the drugs become more dangerous, more addicting and more devastating.

The time has come for each of us to recognize a personal duty. The time has come for each of us to send a strong and clear signal that we have had enough.

While we will and we must do all we can do to stop the supply of these drugs – we will never succeed until we stop the demand for these drugs. Every adult in this state that works with or cares for the children of this state should accept personal responsibility to educate our children about the dangers of drugs of all kinds – cigarettes, alcohol, marijuana, and the most dangerous of all meth. To help those young people that make the mistake of taking drugs and become addicted to them we must dedicate adequate resources to their successful treatment. And for those who fail to heed our community's warning about dealing in drugs, we should be prepared to respond with swift, sure, and appropriate punishment.

Whether we provide quality health care for our most vulnerable populations – our young children, our frail elderly, and those with disabilities will determine the level of our dedication to community. Every day tens of thousands of our children go without basic health care because their working parents can not afford the cost of health insurance. Countless times I have seen communities respond when a child was in need. Why – because we are a people – a community with a tradition of helping those in need. Let us strengthen our community by extending access to quality health care to all of our children. At the same time let us recognize the same responsibility to reach out to protect our frail elderly and to assist those with disabilities.

With a real commitment from all of us today's dream of a drug free Iowa where our most vulnerable have access to basic and quality health care will build stronger communities for tomorrow's Iowa.

Today in Iowa, hundreds of Iowa's best farmers and Iowa's best workers face a tomorrow of real uncertainty. Let us promise today that we will not forget their struggle. Let us pledge today that we will act swiftly and decisively to help when and where help is needed most.

Changes in agriculture and expanding opportunities in our commercial centers creates an economic development challenge and opportunity.

We often speak as if there were two Iowans – one rural and one urban. If we are to thrive we must do so as one and we will do so as one. Combining our rich soil, our strong work ethic, and quality education system we can unleash the economic power of every kernel of corn and every soybean grown in our fields.

As the food capital of the world we can add real value to our crops and open up new markets in the state giving hope to our farmers. At the same time with each new product comes the need for research and development, for processing and manufacturing, and for marketing that creates the opportunity for high tech — high paying jobs in commercial centers and surrounding communities.

With a real commitment from all of us today's dream of Iowa as the food capital will build a brighter economic future in tomorrow's Iowa.

With a sense of hope and excitement we enter a new century with the development of a new economy not built solely on the strength of our bodies but more on the power of our intellect. Iowa is poised to take real advantage of that new economy and to offer businesses and industries that locate here the promise of long-term profitability built on the quality of our workers and our long term investment in their continued education.

Our population is stable but to realize the promise of the future we must be able to retain and to attract young people to our state. Let me start by inviting my own sons to make Iowa their lifetime home and to encourage you to invite the children of our state to be a part of its future. To Jess and Doug and to all the young people of this state, I say we need you. Our state's future depends upon your intellect, your creativity, your energy.

I realize that if young people are to stay or come back home, we must do our part before we ask them to do their part. We must invest in schools. We must support the

arts. We must expand cultural diversity and opportunity. We must recognize the importance of recreation. Let us seal that bargain today for a better Iowa tomorrow.

To the members of the General Assembly, let me repeat what Governor Harold Hughes said in his first inaugural address and I quote:

"As we meet, the question uppermost in the minds of the citizens we represent is whether or not you of the legislature with a substantial majority and I the democratic governor can work together to develop a constructive legislative program for the good of the state. As I see it we have no choice – if we are to keep faith with our oaths of office."

He went on to say on that day: "Our constitution states that all political power is inherent in the people. The people of Iowa elected a democratic governor. They elected a large republican majority in both houses of the assembly. They expect us to do our jobs regardless of party labels yet now the campaign is over and we proceed to the constructive tasks of legislation and administration, it is worth noting that the differences that divide us as partisans are small by comparison with the common ground that unites us as fellow Iowans. We want a better, more progressive, more prosperous Iowa. To attain it we must seek both unity and continuity in government."

I believe Governor Hughes said it as well as it could be said.

A better – more progressive – more prosperous Iowa will not evolve by and through government alone. We must have a clear vision of the Iowa of the future. How would each of us answer the question – what should Iowa be in the year 2020? What kind of state do we want and need? We must ask those questions now – and, we answer them thoughtfully now – for a better Iowa. We must strategically plan our future.

Future success will require a partnership with the private sector and the non-profit sector to achieve our common goal. Building and creating these relationships and partnerships can make all the difference. Lieutenant Governor Pederson knows how to build such partnerships. We will work together – drawing on our collective experiences to move Jowa forward.

Twenty-three years ago I followed my heart to Iowa – now my heart and my soul belong to our state. As someone for whom life started in an orphanage in Pennsylvania I have been privileged to be a husband, a father, a lawyer, a mayor, and a state senator. It is an extraordinary honor to stand here as your governor – embraced by the family and the community we call Iowa.

Let us work together for a better Iowa. Let us not forget that Iowa is great because Iowa is good. Let us make today's dreams tomorrow's Iowa. If we do, we say again what was said by Samuel Kirkwood more than 100 years ago — "Iowa — our eyes have been permitted to behold only the beginnings of her glory."

Thank you and may God bless you.

The House resumed session at 9:35 a.m., Speaker Corbett in the chair.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE TO NOTIFY THE SENATE

Greiner of Washington, chair of the committee appointed to notify the Senate that the House was ready to receive it in joint convention, reported that it had performed its duty. The report was accepted and the committee discharged.

The Sergeant-at-Arms announced the arrival of the President of the Senate, the Secretary of the Senate and the honorable body of the Senate.

The President was escorted to the Speaker's station, the Secretary of the Senate to the Chief Clerk's desk and the members of the Senate were seated in the House chamber.

In accordance with law and House Concurrent Resolution 6, duly adopted, the joint convention was called to order, President Kramer presiding.

Senator Iverson of Wright moved that the roll call be dispensed with and that the President of the joint convention be authorized to declare a quorum present.

The motion prevailed.

President Kramer announced a quorum present and the joint convention duly organized.

The Legislative Inaugural Committee, consisting of Senators Hedge of Mahaska, Boettger of Shelby, Rife of Cedar, Dearden of Polk, Dvorsky of Johnson and Fraise of Lee, on the part of the Senate and Representatives Lord of Dallas, Larson of Linn, Heaton of Henry, Foege of Linn, Ford of Polk and Mascher of Johnson, on the part of the House were appointed to notify Governor Thomas J. Vilsack that the joint convention was ready to receive him.

Secretary of State, Chester J. Culver; Treasurer of State, Michael Fitzgerald; Secretary of Agriculture and Land Stewardship, Patty Judge; State Auditor Dick Johnson and Attorney General Tom Miller were escorted into the House chamber.

The Supreme Court Justice, the Justices of the Supreme Court, the Chief Judge and Judges of the Appellate court were escorted into the House chamber.

Lieutenant Governor Sally Pederson was escorted into the House chamber.

The inaugural committee waited upon Governor Thomas J. Vilsack and escorted him to the Speaker's station.

President Kramer then presented Governor Thomas J. Vilsack who delivered the following address:

Madam President, Mr. Speaker, Honorable Members of the General Assembly, Chief Justice McGiverin and Distinguished Members of the Judiciary, Lieutenant Governor Pederson, Esteemed Statewide Elected Officials, Special Guests, My Fellow Citizens of Iowa.

Let me begin by reading a letter from a very important person in Iowa. She wrote to me:

"Dear Governor Vilsack,

What are you going to do about pollution? I would tell the people not to! I don't like pollution. Do you? So what are you going to do about schools? I really like my school. Can we have more time to read? So what are you going to do?"

No-one is more important to me than Iowa's children. So when Alexandra Swanson, a third-grader from Beaver Creek Elementary School in Johnston wrote to me I paid attention, and so should we all.

Let me rephrase her question for the benefit of the assembled body, "What are we going to do?"

I come here to the General Assembly for the first time. It is a time filled with excitement and a little concern. Concern that I do the right thing. I've never done this before. When you do something for the first time, you prepare as best you can to get the best information and advice that you can, you make our best judgments, then the moment comes. You do something for the first time.

I can't help but reflect today on the significance and importance of "firsts" in our lives. First steps. Our first day of school. Our first experience with faith. That first job. Our first love. The first time that we look into the eyes of a newborn child. They are memorable experiences. They open doorways to new worlds that we have never even dreamed of. And they all mark new beginnings.

Here in America and here in Iowa, first has another meaning to us as well. We have an innate drive to be the best we can be – to finish first in everything we attempt. We see it as a duty; as a responsibility. Finishing first marks the culmination of our

best efforts and of our dreams. In a sense it marks both an ending and at the same time a new beginning.

As I present my budget to you for the first time, I urge you to join me in a pursuit of a prairie full of firsts. What must we do together to ensure that Iowa will be first in education for our children; first in environmental quality; first in health care for our citizens; first in the fight against methamphetamine; first in workforce development and economic development, and first in the future?

The answer, it seems to me, is to begin by taking bold first steps into the future. We have a strong and proud educational heritage in Iowa, and we have identified ourselves, rightfully so, as the Education State. So I ask you, members of the General Assembly, isn't it time that we again assume our rightful position in this nation as first in education?

We are blessed with a core of committed educators, some of who are with us today. Let me introduce you to four of them. On sabbatical from her position as a teacher of Theatre at East High School, currently performing in the Des Moines Playhouse production of Having Our Say, we welcome and salute the 1998 Iowa Teacher of the Year, Ruth Ann Gaines. We are also proud to have the dedicated Moulton School mentor of inner city students who was chosen to represent our state at the 1997 President's Summit for America's Future, Aaron Smith. We welcome today to the Capitol the southern Iowa native who refused to allow his cerebral palsy to prevent him from doing hundreds of classroom presentations as the Energy Wizard, winning the Governor's Very Special Arts Service Award and the Iowa Energy Educator of the Year Award, Erik Anderson. And finally, we introduce the classroom teacher of Alexandra Swanson and her classmates from the Beaver Creek Elementary School, Ms. Shannon Smith. Join me in greeting these four uniquely excellent Iowa educators and in welcoming Alexandra and her classmates.

In the first years of life the responsibility for teaching properly belongs to the parents of each child. All parents must be their child's first and best teacher. But few of us know where to begin or how to start. We can help. By doubling our investment in newly-created empowerment communities, we can give these parents looking for help the information, the tools, and the assistance they need to prepare their children for school. By taking this first step today we will make sure that when our children take their first steps to school, they will be ready to learn.

When they start their first years in school, they must learn the basics well. That's why, ladies and gentlemen of the General Assembly... That's why teachers must be better prepared. Schools must monitor student achievement and be held accountable for results. So let us begin today by committing 10 million dollars in the first year and increasing that amount by 10 million dollars for each year in the next four years, so we can provide our schools with the resources necessary to reduce class sizes, to improve teacher skills, and to hold schools accountable. Our goal is simply stated – we must guarantee that every child in this state is reading well by the time he or she enters fourth grade.

But if we are to do our first job well... more is needed. For the first time, we should commit state aid to make sure our schools are safe and free from fire and safety hazards and to provide more classroom space. Over the next five years we propose building a fund of 50 million dollars to help local school districts meet their building needs, while at the same time providing relief for property taxpayers. Our goal, again simply stated... is adequate class space for each child and each educator in this state.

As we attempt to make our students first in the nation in education, we must continue our commitment to technology by making permanent our current investment of 30 million dollars per year, and enable its use not only for hardware and software purchases, but also staff development. Our goal is to keep Iowa students on the cutting edge of technology.

I applaud the members of the General Assembly in addressing the critical issue of school funding early in the session. Together we will improve our commitment to local schools by increasing allowable growth, by providing state-funded budget guarantees for those schools struggling with declining enrollments and by providing accelerated funding for schools that have to cope with rapidly rising student numbers. Our goal should always be to adequately fund schools with each student being treated fairly and equitably.

At the same time, we must support our educators in their fight to make Iowa schools drug and violence free. We will take the first steps of intervention at the first signs of trouble in junior high and middle schools. So we need to expand the successful program of juvenile court liaisons by adding 76 new schools to the 107 schools that currently exist to aid our at-risk student population and to return discipline to the classroom and to the hallways of each and every school in this state. Our goal is to provide a safer, better learning environment in which all of our students can learn well without fear or intimidation.

Lorenzo Luis Sandoval left college early in the 1970's. He served the Hispanic migrant workers of Iowa for over 20 years and earned the League of United Latin American Citizens Iowa Man of the Year award. With the aid of an Iowa Tuition Grant, he fulfilled his lifetime dream of graduating from Grand View College in 1992. He later received his Master of Fine Arts from the prestigious University of Iowa Playwrights Workshop last year. Dramatic Publishing calls Lorenzo "the exciting new Latino voice in America today." Ladies and gentlemen of the assembly, please say hello to another Iowan – Lorenzo Luis Sandoval.

I understand what it means to be close to your dream but to have concerns about whether there will be finances to make it become a reality. Twenty-five years ago this year, I spoke with my father for the last time on the phone. I called him to tell him that I had been admitted to law school. In a tired and weary voice he said to me, "That's great. I don't know where the money will come from but we'll find it some place." Several days after that call he passed away. The money came from a variety of government loans, programs, and my own work. I understand the struggle of many in this state today are going through to try to realize their educational dreams.

We need to make higher education more affordable and accessible. To do so, we need to look at a package of increased funding measures. We need to increase funding for the State of Iowa Scholarship program; we need to continue to increase funding for the Iowa Tuition Grant program; we need to support vocational and technical tuition grants; we need to send a message to those who serve in the National Guard that we care about them by extending educational opportunities to them as well. For those community college students who are here today, we need to keep the faith with their dream by fully funding the community college formula and continue our strong and traditional support for the Regents Universities. Our collective goal should be that no one wishing a higher education will ever be denied that opportunity in our state simply for lack of money.

Finally, as we approach a comprehensive look at education we should not and must not neglect the important role of libraries. Iowa is one of the few states that provides no direct assistance to libraries. Let us join the rest of the nation in improving the communication centers of many of our communities. Let us enrich ourselves by enriching Iowa. We should begin funding the Enrich Iowa initiative now.

Our goal is to be first in the nation in education. Let it be said that here in Iowa we put our money where our children are.

We have in Iowa a truly amazing array of natural grace. When Albert Lea first explored Iowa in 1835 he wrote: "The general appearance of the country is one of great beauty... one grand rolling prairie, along one side of which flows the mightiest river in the world... (For) water, fuel and timber; for richness of soil; for beauty of appearance ... it surpasses any portion of the United States."

Too often today, there is a difficult playing field for Iowa farmers who want to protect our land and water. But it is our farmers who have the greatest immediate stake in the environment. It is their families who are first to drink the water, breathe the air, and eat the food raised in the soil. So David and Corrine Williams and their children Steve and Wendy operate a fifth-generation farm near the Montgomery and Page County line. They do so with respect and diligence. By using minimum and notill technology, rotational grazing, alternative watering for their cattle, they were recently honored with the National Cattlemen's Association Environmental Stewardship Award for "protecting the environment while making their business more profitable." Join me in congratulating the Williams family for showing us that we can make sound environmental decisions that are also sound economic decisions.

It is our natural resources that hold the key to a stronger, more prosperous Iowa. But to be first in the nation in Environmental Quality and especially to have the cleanest water in America, we must take difficult first steps.

When a body of water with the name of Clear Lake had levels of E. coli which spiked over safe limits, when its beaches were closed, when its community lost thousands of dollars of much-needed tourist revenue, isn't it a signal that we need to be better stewards?

But it is not just our lakes that need care. Our Department of Natural Resources has not had the resources to conduct even baseline water quality analyses. As Dave Moeller, the DNR's Fisheries Supervisor for the Northeast District, said, "...We can't do anything about it until we see dead fish."

Members of the General Assembly, we <u>can</u> and we <u>must</u> do something about it! We must carefully assess the condition of our groundwater and surface water, and then we must create a comprehensive groundwater and surface water monitoring program.

The budget I propose provides resources to do just that and more. It provides funds to establish an Iowa watershed protection program, attend to our wetlands and enforce the Federal Safe Drinking Water Act.

Our environmental proposals, however, do not start or stop at the water's edge. We are committed to enhancing our soil and to protecting our air.

That's why we advocate a Fuel Quality Standard for Iowa supported by the Iowa Corn Growers Association which includes ethanol and which will provide both environmental and value-added economic benefits.

We propose more resources to better implement our current manure management program. And as we consider the interdependence of agriculture and the environment, we are asking the legislature to consider empowering the people of Iowa with some degree of local control operated within a statewide framework for livestock production.

We will protect our natural heritage for the present and future citizens of our state. We will be good stewards and rededicate ourselves to restoring and conserving the land, protecting our water and cleaning up the air. Let it be said that here in Iowa, we put our money where the environment is.

• To be first in the nation in health care, we have specific goals. We propose to expand HAWK-I, Iowa's child health care initiative, to cover all children in families with incomes of up to 200% of the poverty level. Imagine the frustration of parents working hard to support a family, struggling to lift themselves out of poverty, and beginning to succeed, only to discover that their efforts disqualify their children from access to basic health care. Is this a small problem? Hardly. Our initiative will offer basic health care for the first time to an additional 12,000 of Iowa's children!

Next, we cannot be first in health care and sit idly by and watch people hurt and neglected by the excesses of managed care. We've all seen and read about those excesses in the news. But in Iowa we believe that people are more important than the process! Let us working together ensure fairer access to medical services for all of Iowa's people. Let us guarantee that Iowans will receive coverage for pre-existing conditions by reducing the waiting period to six months. Let us stop insurance companies from "gagging" doctors so that they are prevented from telling us the information we need to know. Let us make sure that the information we receive about a health plan's record is accurate; that it promotes good medical practices and let us above all else require a fair and legitimate appeal process to resolve managed care disputes. Children in this state specifically are at risk and for that reason we will propose a specific and targeted set of proposals and protections designed to provide these opportunities for Iowa's children as well.

But we acknowledge the best way to be first in health is through good preventive care. We have therefore proposed initiatives for women over 50, addressing the increased risks of breast cancer, osteoporosis and heart disease; we will launch a public awareness campaign; strengthen local health systems and promote community health and public education.

Beyond that initiative it is our commitment to enhance child dental care and child nutrition programs and perhaps the boldest stroke of all — we are recommending over one million dollars of support to establish a new School of Public Health at the University of Iowa. We take these steps because we know prevention works. We know prevention saves money. And most important of all, we know prevention saves lives!

Finally, our health care program includes protection for Iowa's seniors. They are those who farmed our land, who taught our children, who worked in our factories and businesses – and as such they deserve to live their last years in quiet dignity. If we restructure Medicaid funding, we can increase direct care staff salaries and improve the quality of care in nursing homes. If we establish an annual "Governor's Award for Quality Care" we can recognize outstanding nursing facilities. If we create additional

long-term care ombudsman positions we can work together to correct nursing home deficiencies. And, if we stiffen fines for repeat violators and focus health facility inspections on those chronic violators we will enhance the good reputation of the vast majority of nursing homes and facilities in our state today.

Our goal is improved and fairer health care for all. Let it be said that here in Iowa, we put our money where our most vulnerable populations are.

The safety, security and well-being of Iowans is the responsibility of each of us. But nowhere, perhaps, is that responsibility accepted with more courage and more dedication than in the selfless service provided by our peace officers. Today, we, as a grateful people, salute and thank every peace officer who puts his or her life on the line every day for our families and ourselves. With us this morning are two men who are living proof of that dedication and courage.

When the time finally came, after four intense days in the middle of a hostage crisis, a distraught and dangerous father, charged with numerous crimes including attempted murder and kidnapping brought his two sons out into the Indianola sunlight. As he began to pull a loaded hand-gun from his pocket, Ken Haut rushed in and flung his body in harm's way, tackling and subduing the prisoner. Serving with him were his fellow troopers and other peace officers.

Without thinking of his personal safety, this humble Lamoni Chief of Police pursued two suspected murderers and bank robbers. In an instant his life changed forever. His sacrifice was great. He lost an eye and might have lost his life. But Dale Killpack acted without hesitation on our behalf, and today he and Ken are with us. These two gentlemen represent the daily Iowa heroes who are our peace officers.

There is a specific crossroads where public health, public education and public safety meet. And it is at that crossroads that we stand today. We will NOT, simply because we happen to be in a convenient location in the heartland of America, be first in the nation in the creation and delivery of methamphetamine. We WILL, however, make it one of our first priorities to eradicate this deadly threat.

To protect our people we must strangle the meth lifeline by controlling both supply and demand. To protect our people we will seek life sentences for the manufacture or sale of meth to minors. To protect our people we will hire more narcotics agents to increase interdiction efforts. To protect our people we will hire additional lab technicians to help in the timely prosecution of cases, and to protect our people we will hire more state troopers, DCI agents and fire marshals to aid in safely closing down these meth labs. At the same time, to help our people we will expand the number of drug courts. To help our people we will provide additional resources for treatment to lengthen the time that Iowans addicted to this powerful drug can receive treatment and also expand treatment opportunities at Eldora. And to educate our people we will support and create educational programs to prevent the use of meth before it starts.

Now I do not want to leave this subject without speaking directly to those who manufacture and sell this drug. Here is my message: Do not come here. Do not hurt our children. We will find you. We will prosecute you. We will imprison you. Our goal is to win this war against meth. Let it be said in Iowa, we put our money where the safety of each of our citizens is.

Let us today also invite the whole world to help make our state the Food Capital of the World. Not just first in the nation, but first in the world. It is part of our larger commitment to workforce development and economic development.

This administration intends to make Iowa-grown, Iowa-raised and Iowa-made a brand name known throughout the world for quality. We need to promote high tech agricultural research which is why we support funding the Center of Excellence in Plant Science at Iowa State University. We need to combine Iowa's strengths in agriculture and insurance and provide innovative products to protect Iowa's farmers that use advances in biotechnology. We need to encourage the expansion of value-added opportunities in every region of this state.

And at the same time, we will not abandon those Iowans whose economic fortunes have turned. We have and will continue to strongly advocate at the federal level and state level to take immediate proactive steps to help livestock and grain producers in economic crisis. We intend to stand together with those who farm the land, and together we will make Iowa the world's food capital.

Further, we will expand the skilled workforce to help us face the needs of a new and dawning technology and millenium. We need to make Iowa more attractive to business and industry. We need to strengthen our commitment to vocational and technical programs and school-to-career opportunities. That is why we are establishing the Governor's 21st Century Workforce Council which will be chaired by Lieutenant Governor, Sally Pederson. We need to identify work skill shortage areas. To start the process of increasing the skill levels of our people and to reduce shortages, we will create forgivable loan programs; we will offer incentives to promote skills enhancement; we will coordinate governmental efforts for skills enhancement; and we intend to increase worker safety by providing more resources for workplace inspections.

We will actively and forcefully work to attract and retain the quality of workers necessary for our mutual future. We must send a strong and unmistakable message to the children of this state, some of whom are here today — and let us start with those here today. We need you! We need your creativity, your energy and your intellect. But we must do our job if we are asking them to do their job. We must create and enhance the quality of life in this state so that it is second to none. That is why we are suggesting the creation of REACH initiative, which would provide additional resources for recreation, environment, culture and heritage — to send a strong and powerful message that something's going on in this state, and that we are responding to the needs and concerns of our young people.

Our goal is to develop our workforce, strengthen our economic growth, and keep our young people in our state. Let it be said that here in Iowa, we put our money where our tomorrow is.

And finally, we propose to be known as the first in the nation as we lead the way to the future. We will do this in two ways – through government efficiency, and by the foresight and power of a strategic plan for the next century.

We will make good on our promise of providing property tax relief by virtually eliminating property tax funding of mental health. Let us begin that process now.

We will build a more efficient administration, reduce our dependency on gaming revenues in the general fund and institute efficiency measures like offering early retirement programs and spending reforms. We're listening to the people, and we're acting on what we hear.

We face a strong set of challenges and unbridled opportunities. We will not be daunted.

Let me read from one of my very first Executive Orders which will be issued in the near future: "Now, therefore, I, Thomas J. Vilsack, Governor of Iowa, do hereby order and proclaim that there shall be an organized commitment to develop a strategic plan outlining our goal to maximize the development of human and natural resources within the state, and this commitment shall be called THE GOVERNOR'S STRATEGIC PLANNING COUNCIL."

Together, in a bi-partisan effort that includes full participation of private citizens, all levels of governmental employees, all communities, with specific emphasis on people with disabilities – we will identify the way Iowans want their state to be in the year 2020. And from that we will develop policies, programs, and procedures to carry out their vision.

We are excited by the challenge of tomorrow, and we are ready to meet it face-to-face.

Our goal is an efficient government and a powerful plan for the new millennium. Let it be said that here in Iowa, we put our money where our future is.

There is no question that it is reasonable for us to aspire to be first. And so again I ask the question posed by an Iowa child. What are we going to do together to ensure that Iowa will be first in education; first in the environment; first in health care; first in the fight against methamphetamine; first in workforce development and economic growth; and first in the future?

The answer resounds across this beautiful public room, owned by the people of our great state, and we all hear it. We must work together. We must put Iowa first, before any personal or partisan agenda, before anything that might divide us. We must make every effort to make Iowa first, working as if it were our last chance to do so.

And so, I propose yet another first for us today – the one which can make all of the others possible. Let us strive to be first in the nation in the true spirit of bipartisanship!

At a time when America is burdened by the ugliness of the Washington political scene — a scene divided by intense and sometimes angry partisanship which diverts our time, our resources, our good will, and especially the valuable work of our nation, let us learn a hard lesson: — the people must come first. How do we guarantee that when we leave here today we will walk away with a real commitment to work together?

I don't have the whole answer, but I can propose a healthy way for us to start - if you will, a healthy first step.

Soon after the end of this address today, Lieutenant Governor Sally Pederson and I will be embarking on separate visits across the state to meet with the people of this state face-to-face to talk to them about these important budget decisions. It would be easy for us to use this opportunity and the power and means of the Governor's office to

proclaim a partisan agenda from east to west and north to south. But that would be politics as usual. And it's time for a change.

Instead, I spoke yesterday with the leadership of both the House and the Senate – from both sides of the aisle – and I invited leaders from both parties and from both chambers to accompany me around Iowa. We are all Iowans. We all have the best interests of the people at heart. We can begin this process by working together in the bright light of a new day.

This is not our first day of school, but it may be our first step to tomorrow. It's not our first job, and although I hold you folks in high esteem, I can assure you that you are not my first love. But this is the first day of the remainder of our time together working for the people of Iowa. It is a memorable day, and the tasks are daunting. But the doorways can be opened to new worlds that none of us have ever dreamed of.

We all share that sense of anticipation, that sense of concern about the responsibilities we face together. But we are well-prepared. We are well committed. We love this great land and the people we represent.

"So what are we going to do?"

Let us mark a new beginning. Let us take these bold first steps into the future together. Let us lead Iowa to be first in everything we attempt as we reach the culmination of Today's Dreams and Tomorrow's Iowa.

Thank you, God bless you and God bless our Great State.

Senate Joint Resolution 1, a joint resolution proposing amendments to the Constitution of the State of Iowa relating to the state budget by limiting state general fund expenditures and restricting certain state tax revenue changes.

Be It Resolved By The General Assembly Of The State Of Iowa:

Section 1. The following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Iowa is proposed:

The Constitution of the State of Iowa is amended by adding the following new section to new Article XIII:

ARTICLE XIII. EXPENDITURE LIMITATION.

GENERAL FUND EXPENDITURE LIMITATION. Section 1.

- 1. For the purposes of this section:
- a. "Adjusted revenue estimate" means the most recent revenue estimate determined before January 1, or a later and lesser revenue estimate determined before adjournment of the regular session of the General Assembly, for the general fund for the following fiscal year as determined by a revenue estimating conference which shall be established by the General Assembly by law, adjusted by subtracting estimated refunds payable from that estimated revenue and adding any available surplus in accordance with subsection 5.
- b. "General fund" means the principal operating fund of the state which shall be established by the General Assembly by law.
- c. "New revenues" means moneys which are received by the state due to increased tax rates of fees or newly created taxes or fees over and above those moneys which are received due to state taxes or fees which are in effect as of January 1 following the most recent state revenue estimating conference. "New revenues" also includes moneys received by the general fund due to new transfers over and above those moneys received by the general fund due to transfers which are in effect as of January 1 following the most recent state revenue estimating conference. The state revenue estimating conference shall determine the eligibility of transfers to the general fund which are to be considered as new revenue in determining the state general fund expenditure limitation.
- 2. A state general fund expenditure limitation is created and calculated in subsection 3, for each fiscal year beginning on or after July 1 following the effective date of this section.

- 3. Except as otherwise provided in this section, the state general fund expenditure limitation for a fiscal year shall be ninety-nine percent of the adjusted revenue estimate.
- 4. The state general fund expenditure limitation shall be used by the Governor in the preparation of the budget and by the General Assembly in the budget process. If a new revenue source is proposed, the budget revenue projection used for that new revenue source for the period beginning on the effective date of the new revenue source and ending in the fiscal year in which the source is included in the adjusted revenue estimate shall be ninety-five percent of the amount remaining after subtracting estimated refunds payable from the projected revenue from that source. If a new revenue source is established and implemented, the original state general fund expenditure limitation amount provided for in subsection 3 shall be readjusted to include ninety-five percent of the estimated revenue from that source.
- 5. Any surplus existing at the end of a fiscal year which exceeds ten percent of the adjusted revenue estimate of that fiscal year shall be included in the adjusted revenue estimate for the following fiscal year. Any surplus equal to ten percent or less of the adjusted revenue estimate of the fiscal year may be included in the adjusted revenue estimate for the following fiscal year if approved in a bill receiving the affirmative votes of at least three-fifths of the whole membership of each house of the General Assembly. For purposes of this section, "surplus" means the cumulative excess of revenues and other financing sources over expenditures and other financing uses for the general fund at the end of a fiscal year.
- 6. The scope of the expenditure limitation under subsection 3 shall not include federal funds, donations, constitutionally dedicated moneys, and moneys in expenditures from a state retirement system.
- 7. The Governor shall submit and the General Assembly shall pass a budget which does not exceed the state general fund expenditure limitation.
- 8. The Governor shall not submit and the General Assembly shall not pass a budget which in order to balance assumes reversion of any part of the total of the appropriations included in the budget.

- 9. The state shall use consistent standards, in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, for all state budgeting and accounting purposes.
- 10. The General Assembly shall enact laws to implement this section.
- Sec. 2. The following amendment to the Constitution of the State of Iowa is proposed:

The Constitution of the State of Iowa is amended by adding the following new sections to new Article XIII:

ARTICLE XIII. THREE-FIFTHS MAJORITY FOR TAX LAW CHANGES.

THREE-FIFTHS MAJORITY TO INCREASE TAXES. Section 1. A bill containing provisions enacting, amending, or repealing the state income tax or enacting, amending, or repealing the state sales and use taxes, in which the aggregate fiscal impact of those provisions relating to those taxes results in a net increase in state tax revenues, as determined by the General Assembly, shall require the affirmative votes of at least three-fifths of the whole membership of each house of the General Assembly for passage. This section does not apply to income tax or sales and use taxes imposed at the option of a local government.

THREE-FIFTHS MAJORITY TO ENACT NEW STATE TAX. Sec. 2. A bill that establishes a new state tax to be imposed by the state shall require the affirmative votes of at least three-fifths of the whole membership of each house of the General Assembly for passage.

ENFORCEMENT OF THREE-FIFTHS MAJORITY REQUIRE-MENT. Sec. 3. A lawsuit challenging the proper enactment of a bill pursuant to section 1 or 2 shall be filed no later than one year following the enactment. Failure to file such a lawsuit within the one-year time limit shall negate the three-fifths majority requirement as it applies to the bill. Each bill to which section 1 or 2 applies shall include a separate provision describing the requirements for enactment prescribed by section 1 or 2.

IMPLEMENTATION. Sec. 4. The General Assembly shall enact laws to implement sections 1 through 3.

Sec. 3. The foregoing proposed amendments to the Constitution of the State of Iowa, having been adopted and agreed to by the Seventy-seventh General Assembly, 1998 Session, thereafter duly published, and now adopted and agreed to by the Seventy-eighth General Assembly in this joint resolution, shall be submitted to the people of the State of Iowa at a special election called for that purpose to be held on Tuesday, the 29th of June of the year 1999, in the manner required by the Constitution of the State of Iowa and the laws of the State of Iowa.

- 3 A Resolution relating to the House code of ethics.
- 4 Be It Resolved By The House Of Representatives,
- 5 That the House code of ethics be amended to read as
- 6 follows:
- 7 HOUSE CODE OF ETHICS
- 8 PREAMBLE. Every legislator and legislative
- 9 employee has a duty to uphold the integrity and honor
- 10 of the general assembly, to encourage respect for the 11 law and for the general assembly, and to observe the
- 11 law and for the general assembly, and to observe the 12 house code of ethics. The members and employees of
- 13 the house have a responsibility to conduct themselves
- 14 so as to reflect credit on the general assembly, and
- 15 to inspire the confidence, respect, and trust of the
- 16 public. The following rules are adopted pursuant to
- 17 chapter 68B of the Code, to assist the members and
- 18 employees in the conduct of their activities:
- 19 1. DEFINITIONS. The definitions of terms provided
- 20 in chapter 68B of the Code apply to the use of those 21 terms in these rules.
- 22 2. ECONOMIC INTEREST OF MEMBER OR EMPLOYEE OF
- 23 HOUSE.
- 24 a. Economic or investment opportunity. A member
- 25 or employee of the house shall not solicit or accept
- 26 economic or investment opportunity under circumstances

- 27 where the member or employee knows, or should know,
- 28 that the opportunity is being afforded with the intent
- 29 to influence the member's or employee's conduct in the
- 30 performance of official duties. If a member or

- 1 employee of the house learns that an economic or
- 2 investment opportunity previously accepted was offered
- 3 with the intent of influencing the member's or
- 4 employee's conduct in the performance of the official
- 5 duties, the member or employee shall take steps to
- 6 divest that member or employee of that investment or
- 7 economic opportunity, and shall report the matter in
- 8 writing to the chairperson of the house ethics
- 9 committee.
- 10 b. Excessive charges for services, goods, or
- 11 property interests. A member or employee of the house
- 12 shall not charge to or accept from a person known to
- 13 have a legislative interest, a price, fee,
- 14 compensation, or other consideration for the sale or
- 15 lease of any property or the furnishing of services
- 16 which is in excess of that which the member or
- 17 employee would ordinarily charge another person.
- 18 c. Use of confidential information. A member or
- 19 employee of the house, in order to further the
- 20 member's or employee's own economic interests, or
- 21 those of any other person, shall not disclose or use
- 22 confidential information acquired in the course of the
- 23 member's or employee's official duties. For the
- 24 purpose of this rule, information disclosed in open
- 25 session at a public meeting under chapter 21 of the
- 26 Code and information that is a public record under
- 27 chapter 22 of the Code is not confidential
- 28 information.
- 29 d. Employment. A member or employee of the house
- 30 shall not accept employment, either directly or

- 1 indirectly, from a political action committee. A
- 2 member of the house shall not act as a paid lobbyist
- 3 for any organization. However, this paragraph shall
- 4 not prohibit a member or employee of the house from
- 5 working for a candidate's committee, a political
- 6 party's action committee, or a political action
- 7 committee which does not support or oppose a candidate
- 8 for public office in this state or a ballot issue in
- 9 this state and which is not interested in issues

- 1 official duties. If a member or employee of the house

- 8 knows or should know that the other person intends to

- 12 3. APPEARANCE BEFORE STATE AGENCY. A member or
- 13 employee of the house may appear before a state agency

- 16 approval, veto, or modification of any legislation.
- 17 rule, or executive order. Whenever a member or
- 18 employee of the house appears before a state agency,
- 19 the member or employee shall carefully avoid all
- 20 conduct which might in any way lead members of the
- 21 general public to conclude that the member or employee

- 24 success or personal financial interest.

- 3 information contained in, the complaint public.

JOINT CONVENTION PIONEER LAWMAKERS FIFTY-FIFTH BIENNIAL SESSION

In accordance with Senate Concurrent Resolution 6 duly adopted, the joint convention was called to order, President Kramer presiding.

President Kramer announced a quorum present and the joint convention duly organized.

Senator Hedge of Mahaska moved that a committee of four be appointed to escort the Pioneer Lawmakers into the House chamber.

The motion prevailed and the President appointed as such committee Senator Lamberti of Polk and Senator Flynn of Dubuque on the part of the Senate, and Representative Weidman of Cass and Representative Reynolds of Van Buren, on the part of the House.

The committee escorted the Pioneer Lawmakers into the House chamber.

President Kramer presented Senator Donald Redfern, President pro tempore of the Senate, who welcomed the Pioneer Lawmakers on behalf of the Senate.

President Kramer presented Representative Christopher Rants, Speaker pro tempore of the House, who welcomed the Pioneer Lawmakers on behalf of the House of Representatives.

President Kramer presented the Honorable Richard Drake, member of the Senate who responded to the welcome.

The Honorable Richard Drake announced the 1979 class of legislators who were eligible to become members of the Pioneer Lawmakers.

Honorary members of the 1999 class were the following: Virgil Deering, Edward Failor, James Flansburg and Serge Garrison.

The Honorable Richard Drake presented Dave Yepsen, Chief Political Writer for the Des Moines Register, who addressed the joint convention as follows:

Madame President, Mr. Speaker, Pioneer Lawmakers, Ladies and Gentlemen of the lowa General Assembly:

Thank you for inviting me to address the Pioneer Lawmakers session of the Legislature.

When Senator Drake asked me if I would make a few remarks to the Pioneer Lawmakers session, I said I surely would and was honored that he asked. But I also asked if he had the votes to get that motion approved. After all, many of you hear more from me on Monday morning than you really care to.

Senator Drake replied, "Haven't you ever been to a transportation committee meeting?" Well, yes, I replied. They're fun to cover if you're up at that hour or don't blink. "Then you know I've got the votes," he said. "Just keep it short."

So thank you Senator for the invitation. In that spirit, I'll proceed. Far be it from me to do anything to impede the adjournment of this session. What was it you promised, Representative Siegrist – April 23?

This is actually the second time I have addressed the Iowa General Assembly. The first time, in June, 1967, I was the 17-year old governor of the American Legion Boys State program. They weren't in too good of a mood, mired in a June session as they were. I told them they should lower the voting age. They didn't.

And legislators haven't taken my suggestions since, so I'll not preach any here today. However, my work has been acknowledged frequently from the floor of each chamber although not always in flattering terms.

I was recognized once by Representative Doderer. Fourteen years ago this month she rose on a point of personal privilege to say this was an important day for Iowa women. Everyone looked around the chamber to ask what was going on. She said, "David Yepsen's wife just had a baby girl and that's going to make him a whole lot more sensitive to the needs of Iowa women than he's been."

Well, I want to report, Representative Doderer, that Elizabeth's teachers have given her the tests and find she has a "slightly liberal" political philosophy. I told Governor Vilsack that, and he said tell your wife she's doing a good job raising your daughter.

To the point here today, my friend John Flannery out in the lobby is fond of telling me that this place is really just one big family. We've all got our roles to play as members, as staff, as reporters, doorkeepers, clerks, secretaries or lobbyists or pages. We work, fight, celebrate and commiserate together. Like it or not, for several months

out of the year we're all thrown together into this hothouse atmosphere where we all play that part and try to do the right things for the people of Iowa.

I tell John I think he's right because you don't get to choose all the members of your real family either. Sometimes our family roles conflict. Most of you understand the press has a watchdog role to play in our society. But you still don't like it when we write those stories about campaign finance, ethics or secrecy in government. But that's our job.

But John's on to something. Regardless of the role we play in this statehouse family, we all come here with a fierce love of Iowa and a desire to make it better. It's a trait that has gone on in these halls for over 100 years and if Senator Jensen has his way, it'll go on here in a newly restored capitol for another 100 years. In fact, it may take 100 years to complete the restoration.

For decades, men and women from all walks of life have come to this building to serve Iowa. Most of us could be making more money doing something else. Most make personal, financial and family sacrifices to be here. All of us have had the unpleasant experience of calling a spouse or loved one to tell them we won't be home for dinner that night or have to work this weekend. If it weren't for their understanding many couldn't work here. So on this day of remembrances, I'd like to acknowledge your families at home who put up with so much to enable you to be here. We overlook them too often.

There are also lots of hidden stories in this statehouse family that really never get told. Like the members who helped one another through tough financial times, or help a colleague fight an alcohol problem or console one another in time of trouble. Some great battles have been fought on this floor. But some lifelong friendships have been formed here too and today's the day we renew those friendships and forget the fights.

It's a story we don't often write because they're private matters. But they're no less real and it's why all of us are saving our prayers for Stew and Jean Iverson right now

I have noticed over the years there are family rituals to this place and Pioneer Lawmakers is one of them. Every two years we get together to honor the family elders—those members who came here twenty years ago and to remember those members who have passed away.

This year, we honor the Class of 1979 – those lawmakers who were first elected in 1978. That was just a year after I was assigned to cover the statehouse. It seems like yesterday I was walking into the building and thinking what a beautiful but intimidating place this was.

I think most of us can recall a similar memory of our first day walking into this capitol to go to work, whatever our job. We were all newcomers to the family and, truth be told, we are all honored to come to work each day. I succeeded Jim Flansburg who had succeeded George Mills.

They passed on a lot of advice - like:

- "Watch the code editor's bill. Laverne Schroeder repealed the whole state housing code one year in that bill."

- And "it isn't really tea that Jimmy Briles has in his cup on the last night of the session."
- "Watch the IPERS bill to see if there's still someone in Boone County who Jack Nystrom hasn't got covered."
- "In 20 years, you'll figure out what really went on." Which is why I'm looking forward today to finding out what deals really were cut in that usury debate of twenty years ago.
- Or, debate will always be long-winded when it's a bill everyone understands and short when they don't understand it. So we all know we're in for a long afternoon when there's a bill about dove hunting, fences or farm pickup trucks.
 - Or don't go out with Ed Jones at night if you have to be functional the next day.

1978 was an important election in the country and in Iowa. It was a harbinger election that foretold the sweeping change coming in the 1980 election. In Iowa, Democratic U.S. Senator Dick Clark was upset by Roger Jepsen. It was a stunning upset, caused as many Catholic and evangelical voters left the Democratic party over the abortion issue. For the most part, they have not returned and the shape of politics has been different ever since. The change in politics was affirmed in 1980 by the Reagan landslide, an election that fundamentally changed the nation's philosophy toward government.

The change rippled through legislative politics, too. Democrats who had won the Legislature during the Watergate era lost it to the Republicans in 1978. The GOP control would be short-lived, thanks to the farm crisis of the 1980s that made Democrats out of many rural voters.

The only good news for Democrats that year was the election of Tom Miller as lowa's new attorney general. He defeated the eminently quotable Richard Turner, who was always a reporter's best friend on a slow news day.

Bob Ray won yet another term as governor, defeating Jerry Fitzgerald. Lieutenant Governor Art Neu retired from that job, having grown tired of waiting around for Ray to leave his job. That enabled an unknown state representative named Terry Branstad to win the Lieutenant Governorship and we just all knew that little guy was going nowhere in Iowa politics.

A new generation of leaders emerged that year. Lowell Junkins became minority leader in the Iowa Senate. Cal Hultman became majority leader. Those two have proven that there really is life after the Legislature and it's often quite profitable, too.

What the election of 1978 illustrated was something that is still true today. Iowa has a healthy, vigorous two-party system. The two parties in Iowa compete hard with one another for the support of Iowans. When that competition turns nasty we're all losers. But when that competition turns positive as each side tries to outdo the other by offering the best candidates and best ideas they can find, then all of us in Iowa are the winners

That's the kind of session you are having this year and it's commendable. A healthy two-party system is alive and well in Iowa today.

The 1979 session of the Legislature was memorable for a couple reasons. They had a \$150 million surplus that year and gave a third of it back to the taxpayers in a rebate. That's not been repeated since but just imagine what these boys could do today with a \$900 million surplus!

They also started income tax indexing. Inflation was 9.4 percent that year so that meant something to taxpayers. Unlike the rebate, indexing's an idea that successors have kept around.

They legalized graduated payment mortgages and variable rate mortgages. They cut unemployment benefits and allowed credit unions to run checking accounts.

Much has changed since 1978 and not all of it for the better. Budgets are larger. Staffs bigger. The costs of campaigns have exploded and they're about to become more expensive now that corporate contributions are legal. Why, in 1978, you could win an open seat in the Iowa Legislature for less than \$5,000!

Some things never change, though. If you aren't a member, it's still hard to find a place to park around here. There are about thirty lobbyists here who are former members and they'll all tell you the greatest mistake they made while serving was in not providing more places for people to park.

But a lot of good things have happened, too. It's more business-like. The work week is more family friendly. Marathon late night sessions are rare. More women serve in the Legislature today. Some day when half the membership is female, we'll be able to say we have a Legislature that truly reflects the population of this state.

But there I've started to preach and I promised not to do that. So to Senator Drake, thank you again for the invitation to address this joint session. To the Pioneer Lawmakers, welcome home. To the members, good luck in making that April 23rd adjournment.

And to both present and former members in this chamber, I want to say something those of us in the media rarely say — and that is thank you. Thank you for your personal sacrifice. Thank you for your public service. Thank you for trying to make Iowa better and for your willingness to be in what Theodore Roosevelt once called "The Arena."
