### Storm Lake Teaching Apprenticeships Open Door to New Education Careers





Teresa Torres always wanted to be a teacher, but she wasn't sure how she would get there.

"Having two kids and trying to work, trying to provide for them while getting my own education, that wouldn't have been possible for me," Torres said.

But then she learned of the new Teacher / Paraeducator Registered Apprenticeships being offered at Storm Lake Community School District. Storm Lake was one of 134 districts to receive \$45.6 million in state grants to cover educational costs and part of the salaries for new apprentice teachers and paraeducators. The program is expected to eventually add more than 500 teachers and 500 paraeducators across lowa – including Torres, whose lifelong ambition has been to make the same impact on a young life that a long-ago 4th-grade reading teacher made on hers.

"This is realistic," she said. "I'm able to get my education, be on the same schedule as my children, be off on time to pick them up, and still be able to do my own school work."

lowa kicked off its celebration of National Apprenticeship Week this week while also celebrating news that the number of lowans taking part in apprenticeships has never been higher. New data from the U.S. Department of Labor/Office of Apprenticeship

classrooms and the rest learning on the job.
When training ends, apprentices end up with a nationally recognized credential and zero student loan debt.
Roughly 93 percent, according to federal statistics, stay in their jobs post apprenticeship, providing their bosses with highly loyal, superbly trained employees.

lowa needs these skilled workers. While our urban and suburban areas are growing, 68 counties lost population between 2000 and 2020, partially due to young people chasing opportunities beyond their home towns. Apprenticeships, even starting in high school, are one way communities can turn that tide and help themselves in the process.

Employers don't have to go it alone. Iowa is leading the country in its aid for innovative apprenticeships, with more than \$50 million in grants this year to support new apprenticeship programs that will help develop new health care workers, teachers, and paraeducators. We are opening up new paths to high-demand careers

recently revealed that in federal fiscal year 2022, Iowa reached a record level of 9,731 active apprentices and created the highest number of new programs in the country.

More and more lowa businesses are finding their way into Registered Apprenticeships, helped by lowa's leadership and more than \$50 million in grant incentives for innovative new apprenticeships in health care and education, among others. In FY2022, lowa registered 5,402 new apprentices and 163 new programs, including 25 non-traditional occupations.

National Apprenticeship Week (NAW), taking place from November 14-20, is a nationwide celebration of the success and value of Registered Apprenticeship programs. To commemorate Iowa's success, Gov. Kim Reynolds has released a <u>statewide proclamation</u> and <u>video</u> <u>message</u>. "Our efforts to expand Registered Apprenticeships in our K-12 system are paying big dividends, including the Teacher and Paraeducator Registered Apprenticeship program which will help to grow our teacher pipeline from within for years to come," said Reynolds. "I appreciate all of the efforts this year by employers, educators, training programs and apprentices across the state who are increasingly investing in this proven model."

"While Iowa has always been a leader for creating Registered Apprenticeship programs, the increase in participants this year demonstrates the need for new and innovative training programs coming out of the pandemic," said Beth Townsend, Director of Iowa Workforce Development. "Registered Apprenticeships provide Iowans with a good living while they increase their skillset, and they often promote retention as newly skilled workers predominately stay with the employer that trained them."

### Reminder: Deadline Approaching to Apply for Language Learners Grant



lowa employers have until December 2 to apply for a state grant program designed to help companies reduce language barriers in the work force.

lowa Governor Kim Reynolds earlier this month announced plans to award up to \$5 million through the lowa Language Learners Job Training program. They money is earmarked to help employers provide sustained programs for dual language instruction to increase proficiencies, and improve communication between staff, and boost overall recruitment and retention.

Employers will be able to get help with any programs that increase English language proficiencies for work-related duties, policies, or procedures, as well as programs that support English speakers learning a second language.

Applications for the Iowa Language Learners Job Training Program are now being accepted on <u>IowaGrants.gov</u>. They must be turned in by 11:59 a.m. on December 2.
