JOURNAL OF THE SENATE

SENATE CHAMBER,
DES MOINES, IOWA, DECEMBER 21, 1936.

Pursuant to the proclamation of the Governor, the Honorable Clyde L. Herring, the Forty-sixth General Assembly convened in Extraordinary Session at 10:00 a. m. The Senate was called to order by Lieutenant-Governor N. G. Kraschel.

Prayer was offered by Rabbi Eugene Mannheimer of Des Moines.

PROCLAMATION

TO THE SENATE AND HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE FORTY-SIXTH
GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF IOWA:

The Congress of the United States of America having passed since adjournment of the last regular session of the Iowa General Assembly, an act providing for certain benefits to citizens of the State of Iowa, conditioned upon legislation by the State of Iowa, and further providing that such legislation must be enacted into law and approved prior to January first, 1937, by the Federal Social Security Board, and

It appearing to be wise and necessary that the Forty-sixth General Assembly of the State of Iowa be called into extraordinary session to enact a law to comply with the provisions of the federal act and thereby insure to the citizens of Iowa benefits of the federal act, and

Whereas, Because of and by virtue of the urgent and imminent necessity above referred to, an extraordinary situation exists within the contemplation of Section Eleven (11), Article Four (IV), of the Constitution of the State of Iowa.

Now, Therefore, I, Clyde L. Herring, Governor of Iowa, under and by virtue of the powers conferred upon me as Governor of Iowa, in accordance with Section Eleven (11), Article Four (IV) of the Constitution of the State of Iowa to hereby convene the Forty-Sixth General Assembly in extraordinary session, commencing on Monday, the twenty-first day of December, 1936, at ten o'clock in the morning, for the purpose of enacting unemployment insurance legislation necessary to comply with the Federal Social Security Law, and for no other purpose whatsoever.

In Testimony Whereof, I have hereunto affixed my signature and the impression of the Great Seal of the State of Iowa.

The President declared a majority of the members present and the joint session was duly organized.

Senator Stevens moved that a committee of three, consisting of one member from the Senate and two members from the House, be appointed to notify the Governor that the joint session was ready to receive him.

Motion prevailed and the President appointed Stevens on the part of the Senate and Bonnstetter and Thompson of Pocahontas on the part of the House.

The committee waited upon the Governor and escorted him to the Speaker's station.

President Kraschel then presented Governor Clyde L. Herring, who delivered the following message:

GOVERNOR HERRING'S MESSAGE

MR. PRESIDENT, MR. SPEAKER, MEMBERS OF THE FORTY-SIXTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY AND FELLOW CITIZENS:

The Constitution of the State of Iowa, Section Eleven (11), of Article Four (IV), prescribing the powers and duties of the Governor, provides as follows:

"Convening General Assembly. Sec. 11. He may, on extraordinary occasions convene the General Assembly by proclamation, and shall state to both Houses, when assembled, the purpose for which they shall have been convened."

Pursuant to authority conferred upon me thereby, and because it appears advisable and necessary that certain matters of an emergency nature immediately considered, you have been convened in extraordinary session.

The Congress of the United States of America passed an act approved June 6, 1933, entitled "An Act to provide for the establishment of a national employment system and for cooperation with the states in the promotion of such system, and for other purposes."

It also passed an act, approved on August 14, 1935, known as the "Federal Social Security Act," the latter measure having been enacted and approved subsequent to adjournment of the last regular session of the Iowa General Assembly.

Under these acts definite benefits to the citizens of the State of Iowa are provided conditioned upon certain legislation by the General Assembly prior to January first, 1937.

Therefore, this session has been called for the purpose, only, of consideration and enactment of unemployment compensation legislation in compliance and cooperation with the federal acts above mentioned.

While reluctant to subject the state to the cost of an extra session just a few weeks before the convening of a regular session, I am impelled to take this action because of a possible loss to the citizens of Iowa of future benefits estimated at three millions of dollars, being ninety per cent of the amount of contributions to the federal government by employers of this state during the year 1936.

This estimated three million dollars will be unavailable to citizens of Iowa unless the Legislature, before December thirty-first, passes necessary coordinating legislation.

Recognizing the need for consideration of the rights, and privileges of the people of this State, and the duties and responsibilities of the State in connection with the Social Security Act passed by the Congress, I, as Governor, caused to be assembled at the Capitol on May 15, 1936, some five hundred citizens from each and all of the counties of the State of Iowa, representative of all the varied interests of the State.

This conference, after full and complete debate, designated a Committee of Five, and directed this committee to designate a general committee of thirty-five members, for the purpose of completely surveying benefits and requirements of the federal acts applicable to the State of Iowa.

Meetings of the Committee of Thirty-five were thereafter held, and this committee was later divided into several sub-committees.

One of them devoted itself to the study and preparation of recommendations to the General Assembly, for its consideration.

It has been in constant session for many days and nights.

It has held public hearings, and has made a most intensive study of legislation adopted by other states, and by the federal government, relative to unemployment compensation.

Representatives of the varied interests of the State have appeared before it, and it has had the benefit of their views, facts and suggestions.

In justice to the citizens who have, without compensation, given intensive study and consideration to this proposed legislation, I feel I should say that the recommendations which will be made by the committee to this body embrace, in my opinion, more comprehensive and sound provisions than have been enacted into law in any other state.

It should not be understood that the suggestions to be made to the Legislature were hastily conceived or ill considered.

The are based upon a most complete and far-reaching survey.

I fully recognize that the passage of this legislation is a matter for your determination.

In its consideration I pledge you my full cooperation.

Senator Pendray of Jackson moved that the Joint session be dissolved.

Motion prevailed.

RETURN TO SENATE CHAMBER

The Senate returned to the Senate Chamber and resumed regular session.

Senator Stevens moved that the Senate resolve itself into a committee of the whole for the purpose of studying the proposed bill providing Iowa compliance with the Federal Social Securities Act with regard to unemployment insurance, with a view to introducing this bill as a joint committee bill.

The motion prevailed and the Senate resolved itself into a committee of the whole.

COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

Senator Hush moved that Lieutenant-Governor N. G. Kraschel preside as chairman of the committee of the whole.

The motion prevailed.

Senator Mullaney moved that the bill, after reading by the Secretary, be discussed section by section.

As a substitute motion, Senator Beardsley moved that the Senate have a review of the bill by the Governor's committee and its aids.

The motion by Senator Beardsley prevailed. The substitute motion prevailed, and the Senate was addressed by Mr. H. L. McCarthy of Washington, D. C., and discussion was had.

Senator Roelofs moved that the proposed bill be introduced in the Senate by the committee of the whole, which motion prevailed.

DISSOLUTION OF COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

Senator Irwin moved that the committee of the whole be dissolved.

The motion prevailed.

Unanimous consent was granted to return to the introduction of bills.

INTRODUCTION OF BILLS

A representative designated by the commission, and hereinafter referred to as a deputy, shall promptly examine the claim and, on the basis of the facts found by him shall determine whether or not the claim is valid, and if valid, the week with

respect to which benefits shall commence, the weekly benefit amount payable and the maximum duration thereof. The deputy shall promptly transmit his full finding of fact with respect to that subsection to the commission, which, on the basis of the evidence submitted shall affirm, modify, or set aside such finding of fact and transmit to the deputy a decision upon the issues involved in that subsection. The deputy shall promptly notify the claimant, and any other interested persons, of the decision, and reasons therefor."

2. Further amend said bill by striking Secs. 6 (c), 6 (d), 6 (e), 6 (h), and 6 (i), and inserting as Sec. 6 (c) the following:

"Sec. 6 (c). Court Review. Within ten days after the decision of the commission has become final, and the claimant has been notified of said decision, any party aggrieved thereby may secure a judicial review thereof by commencing an action in the district court of the county in which the aggrieved party was last employed or resides against the commission for the review of its decision, in which action any other party to the proceeding before the commission shall be made defendant. In such action the Petition need not be verified but shall state the grounds upon which a review is sought and shall be served on one member of the commission or upon such person as the commission may designate for service to be made upon the commission and on other defendants, and such service shall be deemed completed service on all parties. With its Answer the commission shall certify and file with the court all documents and papers and a transcript of all testimony taken in the matter, together with its findings of fact and decision therein. The case shall be tried de novo and shall be given precedence over all other civil cases except the cases arising under the Workmen's Compensation Law of this State."

3. Strike Sec. 6 (j) and insert in lieu thereof the following:

"Sec. 6 (d). Decision on Appeal. Any order or decision of the commission may be modified, reversed, or set aside."

4. Amend Sec. 6 (k) by striking from line 3 of said Sec. 6 (k) the words "Board of Review" where it appears twice in said line, and inserting in lieu thereof the word "commission", and by renumbering said Sec. 6 (k) as "Sec. 6 (e)".

5. Amend Sec. 6 (l) by striking from line 6 and from line 8 the words "Board of Review" and inserting in lieu thereof the word "commission", and by renumbering said Sec. 6 (l) as "Sec. 6 (f)".

6. Amend said bill by striking from line 7 in Sec. 8 (b) the word "four" and insert in lieu thereof the word "eight".

7. Amend said bill by striking from line 6 of Sec. 19 (f) sub-section (1) the word "four" and inserting in lieu thereof the word "eight".

The commission shall consist of three members, who shall be appointed by the Governor within sixty days after the passage of this Act or after any vacancy occurs in its membership. Such appointments shall be sub-

ject to the approval of a two-thirds vote of the Senate in Executive Session at any regular session of the Senate. During his term of membership on the commission no member shall engage in any other business, vocation, or employment or serve as an officer or committee member of any political party organization, and not more than two members of the commission shall be members of the same political party. Each member shall hold office for a term of six years, except that (1) any member appointed to fill a vacancy occurring prior to the expiration of the term for which his predecessor was appointed shall be appointed for the remainder of such term; and (2) the terms of office of the members first taking office after the date of enactment of this Act shall expire, as designated by the Governor at the time of appointment one at the end of two years, one at the end of four years, and one at the end of six years after the date of enactment of this Act. The Governor may at any time, after notice and hearing, remove any commissioner for gross inefficiency, neglect of duty, malfeasance, misfeasance, or nonfeasance in office. Each commissioner shall be paid from the Unemployment Compensation Administration a fixed monthly salary at the rate of \$3600.00 per year. At its first meeting and at each annual meeting held thereafter, the commission shall organize by the election of a chairman from its own number, who shall serve for a term of one year, and until his successor is elected. Any two commissioners shall constitute a quorum. No vacancy shall impair the right of the remaining commissioners to exercise all of the acts of the commission. The commission shall adopt and use an official seal, authentication of its orders and records. The commission shall establish and maintain its principal place of business in the city of Des Moines, Iowa.

Senators Calhoun and Dewey offered the following Senate Concurrent Resolution:

SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION 2

Whereas, The State of Iowa has lost the services of a valued public servant through the death of A. L. Urick, a member of the Old Age Assistance Commission; and

Whereas, Mr. Urick devoted a major part of his seventy-four years to public service as president of the Iowa State Federation of Labor, State Labor Commissioner, and as a member of the State Old Age Assistance Commission, during which time he gave particular attention to vocational training and education, the advancement and well-being of the laboring man, and such programs as in his opinion would advance the economic and social security of his fellowman; and

Whereas, This Extraordinary Session of the Forty-sixth General Assembly was called to consider a phase of legislation in which he was interested and upon which he had expended so much of his effort, it seems fitting and proper for this General Assembly to pause in its deliberations to pay him homage; Now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the Senate, the House Concurring, That the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the House be authorized and ordered to send an engrossed copy of this concurrent resolution to the widow and son of Mr. Urick as an expression of the respect and honor in which his memory is held by the people of the State of Iowa.

The following remarks were made by Senator Calhoun:

A. L. Urick has passed on and the State of Iowa has lost by his death a valuable public servant and an esteemed citizen.

Mr. Urick was born in Eastern Pennsylvania on Feb. 6, 1862, and moved to Iowa in 1880 when 18 years of age. He became affiliated with

the labor movement and labor problems in 1891 and has given practically all of his time and efforts toward such problems and work since that time.

In 1903 he was recognized by union labor by election to the office of President of the Iowa State Federation of Labor and served with honor and success in that position until in 1913. In 1913 he was appointed to the office of State Labor Commissioner, which office he filled under Governors Clarke, Harding, Kendall, Hammill and Turner, building the Labor Department up to the efficient and responsible position which it now holds in the affairs of our state, and covering a total period of 18 years and 3 months.

In 1934, upon the creation of the Old Age Assistance Commission in the State of Iowa, he was recognized as an outstanding student and exponent of the humanitarian principles of old age security and was appointed by Governor Herring to the office of Old Age Assistance Commissioner and confirmed by the Senate.

During the time that he was a member of the Old Age Assistance Commission, Mr. Urick has done fine and outstanding work as a member of that commission and has helped to guide the State Old Age Assistance Law through its initial and organization period.

Mr. Urick was interested in and working with the committee studying the proposed State Social Security bill and gave largely of his valuable time and energy to help bring the proposed bill to its improved condition.

Mr. Urick was a republican in politics and was ever a humanitarian and statesman. His loss is a great one to the State, to his family and to his fellowmen.

Senator Dewey made the following remarks with regard to Mr. A. L. Urick, deceased Old Age Assistance Commissioner.

It has been my privilege and pleasure to have known the Honorable Mr. A. L. Urick, Old Age Assistance Commissioner who has passed to his reward, for many years. This genial gentleman was outstanding in efficiency and in his courteous and understanding feeling toward those who were in want and trouble.

I feel that he contributed with his kind philosophy of life to the betterment of social conditions in the State of Iowa.

I wish to concur in the remarks made by the Senator John N. Calhoun.
