

Commission Hosts Community Forum in Fort Madison

Fort Madison community leaders had the opportunity to discuss English Only legislation and other concerns at the Commission on Latino Affairs' meeting and open forum on April 3rd. Fort Madison, the site of Iowa's first Latinos who arrived 100 years ago to work on the railroad, hosts an annual Mexican Independence Day Celebration each September and is a model for building inclusive communities in Iowa. The Commission on Latino Affairs holds forums across the state to hear concerns and successes of the Latino community, no less than six times per year. The Commission, made up of commissioners appointed by the Governor, is bi-partisan, gender balanced, and serves various regions of the state. 
Great Things are Happening in Iowa!
