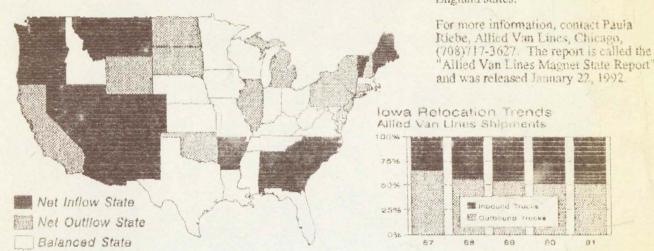

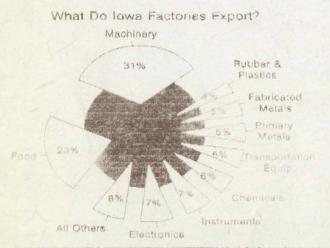
### Iowa's In-Migration Equals Out-Migration, Again in 1991

According to a survey of Allied Van Lines, trucks with inbound families matched those moving families out of Iowa again in 1991. But as recently as 1987, 65% of the trucks were outbound. Even in 1988, with a strengthening economy in Iowa, 56% of the trucks were outbound. The in-migration lag during a recovery is apparently much longer than the out-migration lag during a recession. Current net outbound states include California, Illinois, Michigan and the New England states.



# Iowa Factory Exports Down Slightly from 1990 Peak

Iowa's factory exports for the first three quarters of 1991 were down by a projected annual rate of 5.7%. A combination of factors were at play. The Gulf War during the first quarter disrupted export shipping. The economic revolution in Eastern Europe substantially reduced their purchases. And the depressed Canadian and British economies, generally among the major purchasers of Iowa's factory goods, contributed to the decline Declines were greatest for machinery (-16%) and food products (-11%). The biggest gains were in electronics (+6%) and instruments (+22%) exports.

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# January Housing Permits Jump to All-Time High

In January, Iowa builders and developers were issued permits for future construction valued at more than \$26.4 million. The combination of mild weather and moderate interest rates combined to create a record level of permits issued by Iowa's 46 largest communities. Last January was characterized by war-fears and the general loss of consumer confidence in the economy. The January, 1991

numbers reflected the depressed market by falling 75% below year-earlier levels. In January 1992, Iowa housing activity was a whole 'nother ball game.

Each month the Iowa Department of Economic Develop-ment surveys the city building departments of Iowa's 48 largest communities.

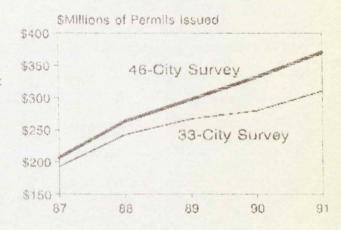
# Housing Permit Survey - Now Bigger and Better

Since 1984, IDED has surveyed the building departments of Iowa's 33 largest communities each month. While many would be satisfied with this effort, we were not. So, beginning this month we offer the new and improved version. Our survey includes 46 communities this month with two more to be added next month (actually Clear Lake and Grinnell just missed this month's publication deadline).

The survey includes every community in the state with at least a population of 7,000. In order to compare apples to-apples for past performance, we asked each city building department to provide us with monthly historical data back to 1987. The table on page 2 and continued above shows the annual totals for those years.

When the 1991 numbers were published for the 33 communities, we were delighted to report that in Iowa housing activity was up 10.8% during a year when the national housing market, down 14.3%, was truly in the pits.

By expanding the survey to include the next 13 communities ranked by size, we expected to see a lower rate of growth. Such was not the case, thanks to the very strong markets in Clive and Coralville and the substantial growth in Pella. In 1991, the value of housing permits issued by Iowa's 46 largest communities was up 11.4%.

#### Blue Chip Consensus: 'Subdued Recovery and Low Inflation'

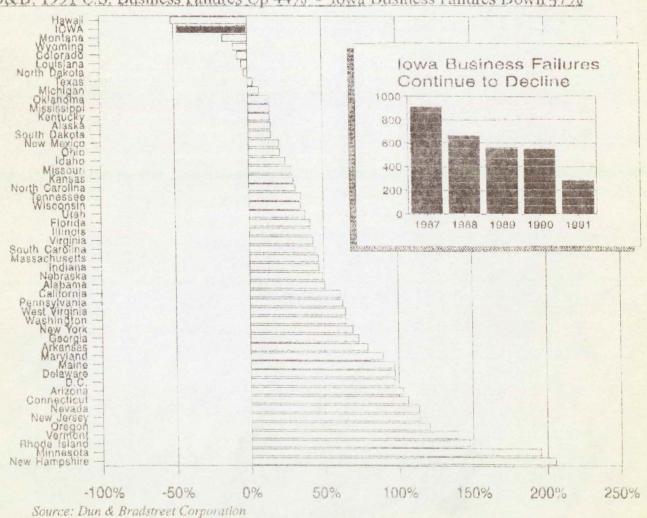
The consensus of 50 business economists surveyed in the February Blue Chip Economic Indicators was for slow growth ahead in 1992. The outlook for 1992 real GDP growth was 1.6%, following a 0.7% decline in 1991. The 1993 outlook, at 3.2%, is well below the 6% annual levels experienced during previous post-WWII recoveries.

The good news. inflation is expected to stay in the mid-3% range at least through 1993. The above-6% jobless rate is one of the reasons. With little or no wage pressure and with a Fed committed to monetary restraint, inflation may no longer be a factor in long-term business planning.

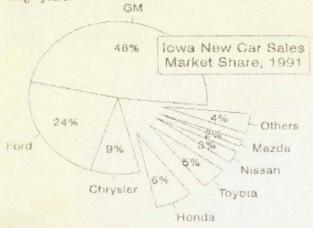

## December New Car Sales Reduce 1991 Losses - Slightly

U.S. car-maker's Iowa sales were down 19.2% for the year in November. With December sales increases, they ended 1991 down 17.9%. Import sales also showed some slight improvement in December. New car sales in Iowa were down 15.1% or 11,156 units in 1991. For the nation, new car sales in 1991 were down 11.7%.

DRI/Mc-Graw-Hill forecasts U.S. new car sales to return to 1987 levels (10.2 million units) by about the end of 1994. It appears that the car industry is in for a few more tough years.
