Personal Income

Personal Income consists of private and government wage and salary payments in cash and in kind, other labor income, farm and non-farm proprietors' income, interest, net rents, dividends and transfer payments. From this total is deducted personal contributions for Social Security. It is measured before the deduction of personal income and other personal taxes and is reported in current dollars.

Taxable Retail Sales

Taxable retail sales are all sales subject to the retail sales tax as established under Chapter 422.42 Code of Iowa, 1975.

Consumer Price Index

The Consumer Price Index is a monthly (for U.S. quarterly for Cedar Rapids) statistical measure of the average change in prices of goods and services purchased by urban wage earners and clerical workers. It is based on the prices of approximately 400 items. Cedar Rapids is the only reporting point in the state.

Producer Price Index

The Producer Price Index measures average changes in prices

received in primary markets by producers in all stages of processing. This index was formerly known as the Wholesale Price Index.

Cash Receipts from Farm Marketings

Cash receipts from farm marketings represent agricultural products sold by farmers multiplied by prices received per unit of production at the local market.

Prices Paid by Farmers

Prices paid by farmers is an index of expenditures made by farmers for commodities, service, interest, taxes, and wages. This service is used to compile the parity index.

Residential Building

Residential building includes both housekeeping and nonhousekeeping units such as hotels, motels, dormitories, and other shelter.

Non-Residential Building

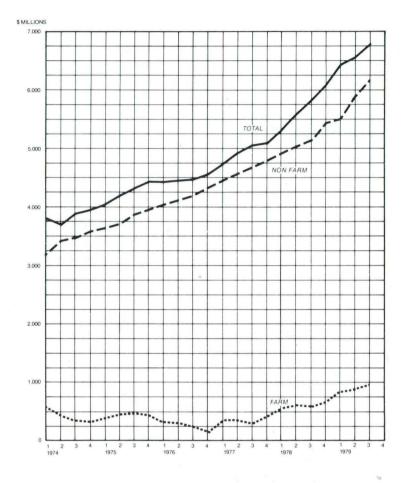
Non-residential building includes commercial, manufacturing, educational and science buildings, hospitals, public buildings, religious, and amusement buildings.

Preliminary estimates of personal income for the third quarter indicate a substantial gain of 15.8 percent over the third quarter of 1978. Nonfarm income increased by 12.6 percent due to high levels of employment in durable goods industries. Farm income was up considerably but caution should be used in reviewing farm income as the data are subject to substantial revision.

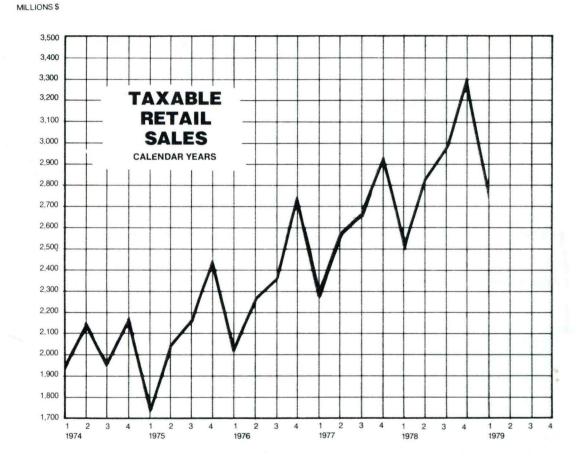

Taxable Retail Sales

2

Taxable retail sales for the first quarter were up by 11.9 percent over last year to a total of \$2.8 billion. This was a record for a first quarter, which is historically the lowest quarter for retail sales due to post holiday consumer slug-

gishness. Retail sales in real terms, after adjusting for inflation, were higher as consumer prices increased by 9.9 percent compared to the 11.9 percent growth of sales.

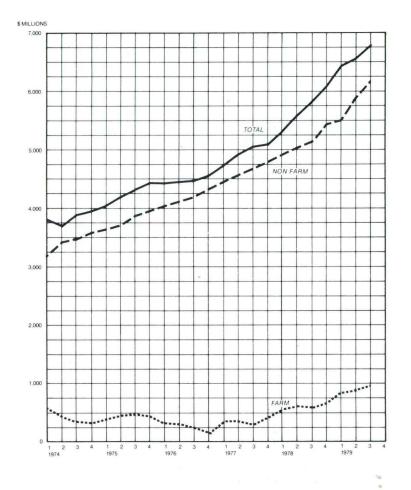

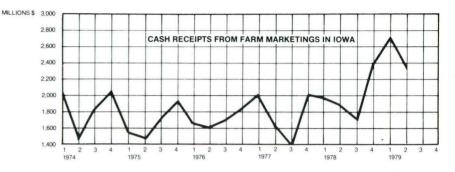

Prices of agricultural products weakened in the third quarter as the index of prices received declined by 7.2 percent from the near record second quarter. On a year to year basis, prices received were 7.9 percent above last year. Prices of corn and soybeans were above last year, but cattle prices were down slightly and hog prices were considerably lower.

Prices paid for farm inputs increased by 14.0 percent for the third quarter which was almost twice the rate of increase in prices received.

Cash receipts from farm marketings were down 15.6 percent for the third quarter from the second quarter but were up 11.3 percent from last year .

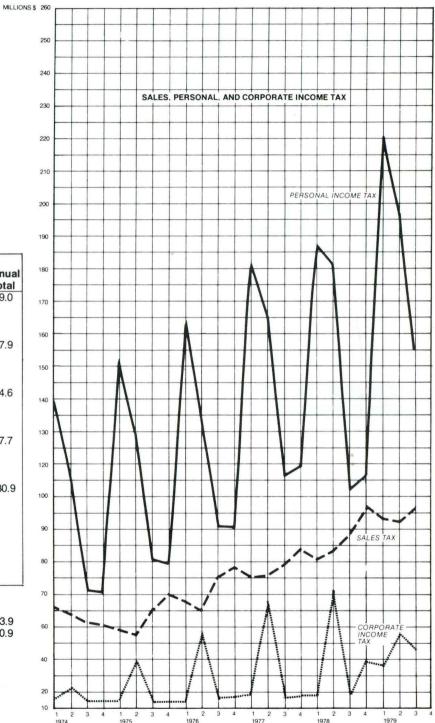
Personal income tax receipts increased by 26.1 percent over the third quarter of 1978 due to inflation and higher personal income.

Growth in sales tax revenue of 9.7 percent was slower due to consumer resistance to higher prices and greater relative consumption in dollar terms of nontaxable items such as food and gasoline.

Corporate income tax receipts were higher but due to changes in reporting procedures no valid year to year comparison can be made.

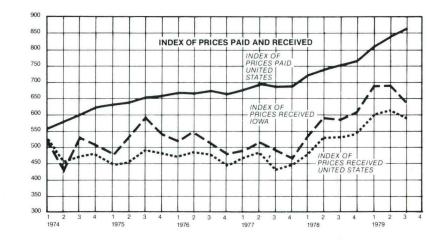

Total employment declined slightly from the seasonal second quarter peak but still set a third quarter record of 1,394,800 which was 0.6 percent above last year.

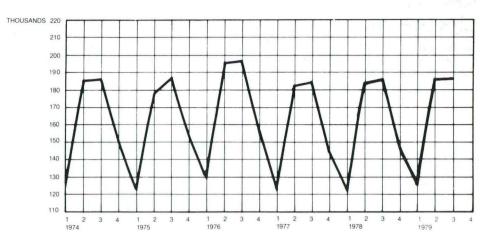
Durable goods manufacturing employment was 9.8 percent greater. Trade, services, and agriculture also had significant gains in employment. Government employment dropped by 2.2 percent from the record third guarter of 1978.

The unemployment rate remained at 3.3 percent which was slightly higher than last year's post recession record low.

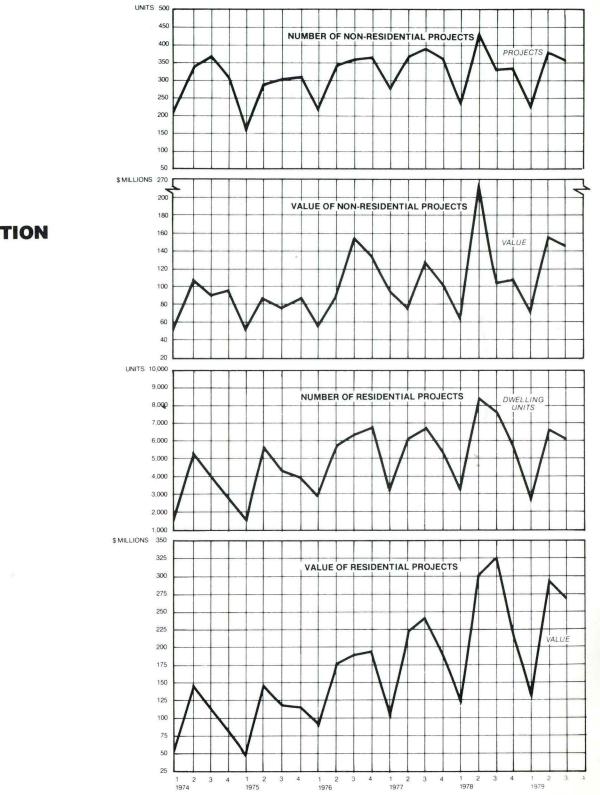

Residential construction in terms of units declined by 22.1 percent in the third quarter from the record level set in the third quarter of 1978. The 6,107 units was the lowest third quarter total since 1975. Higher interest rates, higher purchase prices, and an outflow of funds from savings and loans contributed to the downturn.

Nonresidential construction projects were 7.7 percent higher and up 43.3 percent in terms of value. Financing of nonresidential construction is not as difficult as corporations can borrow at prevailing market rates and have alternative sources of funding which are not available to home buyers.

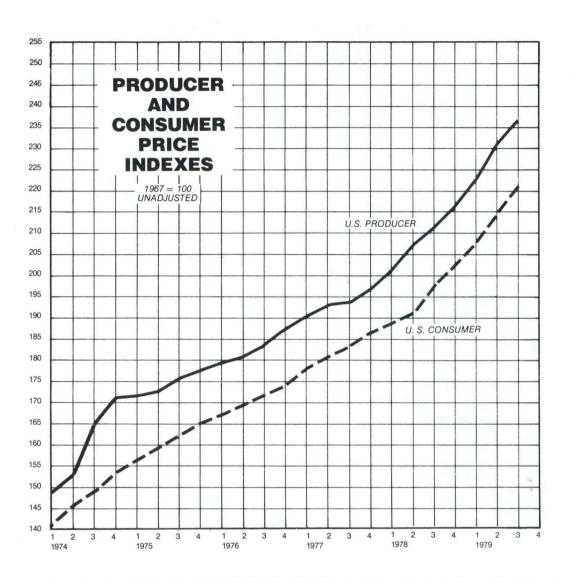

Producer and Consumer Price Indexes

Consumer prices rose 3.2 percent from the second to the third quarter and 11.8 percent from last year due to higher prices for energy, food, housing, and medical care. Wholesale prices increased by 3.1 percent for the quarter

and 13.1 percent for the year as the rate of increase picked up substantially from the second quarter due to food and capital equipment prices.
