PROGRESS REPORT OF IOWA STATE PLANNING BOARD PROJECTS

MARCH 16-31, 1936

In this report the progress of the Planning Board projects during the latter half of March is described, with figures on the numbers of workers employed, brief statements as to the nature and location of the work, the status of projects which are not yet in operation, and other pertinent information.

A brief summary is given at the end of the report.

Business and Industry, Project No. 00-85-477

<u>Nature of project:</u> State-wide tax survey to determine effects of proposed homestead tax exemptions.


During the latter half of March this survey continued to operate in nearly all counties of the state. In four of the 87 counties included in the preceding report (Cherokee, Plymouth, Madison and Marion), work was temporarily suspended during part of the period. One new county, Lyon, was added to the list. In 10 counties in the upper half of the state the survey has not yet been started.

Progress of the field work (copying tax data and obtaining information on occupancy) and of the tabulation and analysis are shown in the following table:

The last row of figures, representing the progress as of March 31, are broken down by counties on the map on page 2. In each county, the figures show per cents completion; upper figure, field work; middle figure, tabulation and analysis; lower figure, entire project. For purposes of calculation, the field



work is taken to represent 50 per cent of the total project, tabulation and analysis 50. Therefore the lower figure is equal to half the sum of the upper and middle figures. In previous reports, only the upper figure (field work) was reported.

The average numbers of workers during the period were: relief, 190; non-relief, 16; total, 206.

Urban Zoning and Planning Studies, Project No. 00-85-3011

Nature of Project: City traffic surveys in 9 cities; land use surveys in 7 cities. (Complete description given in report for Mar. 1-15.)

During the last half of March, the traffic surveys were continued in all the cities (9) previously reported. As a whole, these surveys were about 32 per cent complete on Mar. 31. The land use surveys were continued in Muscatine and Webster City and were brought to approximately 90 and 45 per cent completion, respectively. These figures represent 15 per cent of the total work in land use surveys planned for 7 cities. The entire project is 24 per cent complete.

More detailed data on the surveys are shown in the table on p. 4.

The average number of relief workers employed was 314, non-relief workers 25, total 339. The total for the preceding half month was 330. The N.Y.A. Workers who assisted in the surveys at Ottumwa, Marshalltown, Davenport, and Sioux City are not included in these figures.

N. Y. A. Projects Supplementary to Urban Zoning and Planning Studies

Nature of Projects: Assisting in W. P. A. traffic surveys carried on by Planning Board at Ottumwa and Marshalltown and in similar city-sponsored W.P.A. surveys at Davenport and Sioux City.

The four N. Y. A. projects here represented are sponsored by the Planning Board. The workers at Davenport and Sioux City are used on the city-sponsored zoning and planning studies (traffic surveys, to date) which are being given technical supervision by the Planning Board.

The number of workers in each city is shown in the following table:

Biological Survey Project No. 00-85-475

Nature of project: Conservation of wild life by improving lakes and streams, making game cover plantings, establishing management and nesting areas, etc.

As stated in previous reports, this project carried on, until in the first half of March, the work of cutting holes through the ice on our northern lakes and aerating the water to save the fish population. Without doubt, tens of thousands of fish desirable for game and food were kept from suffocation. Yet many fish died, especially in some of the shallower lakes which, unusually low because of the drought, were frozen nearly or quite to the bottom. These dead fish pollute the water and are otherwise offensive. During the last half of March some work was done in Cerro Gordo, Buena Vista and Dickinson Counties, in helping collect and bury these fish; particularly on Clear Lake, in Cerro Gordo County, where the work was urgent.

In District 3, where operations were most extensive, relief workers were engaged in filling and riprapping lake banks, in sign painting, in disposing of dead fish, and in securing willow cuttings for planting. Approximately 29 men did bank filling and riprapping on the south shore of Silver Lake, near Ayrshire. The county (Dickinson) furnished trucks for transportation and materials for riprapping. In Clay County, 7 men were employed in sign painting. About 16,000 willow cuttings, to be used in planting game areas and dry lake beds, were collected and stored at Ruthven and Graettinger, in Palo Alto County. In Emmet County work will be started soon after April 1 on East Swan, Birge, Grass and Ryan Lakes, developing them for upland game.

In District 1, the work consisted of lake bank improvements and collecting aquatic plants, besides the disposing of dead fish at Clear Lake, already mentioned. The bank improvements were at Crystal Lake in Hancock County, where sloping, planting and riprapping were done. In Wright County 10 men worked on Big Wall Lake, collecting aquatic plants such as giant bulrushes, round bulrushes and cattails. These are transported to Iowa's new artificial lakes by the C.C.C. Camp workers, where they are used to hasten plant growths which would require many years if left to unaided natural development.

Analysis of Farm Statistics, Project No. 00-77-2875

Nature of Project: Studies based on available farm statistics, involving the distribution of percentages of farm land in various uses, trends in acreage and yields of the major crops, and the effects of various leasing systems on farm practices and on the distribution of income and expense. (These studies are fully described in the progress report for Feb. 16-29.)

Little headway has been made in this project to Mar. 31, due principally to the temporary necessity of limiting the work to Story County. Some further work in tabulating of data on the uses of farm land, from township assessors' reports, was done, partly for the purpose of testing the tabulation methods. The analysis of tenant farm records is well under way. The work has been carried on by 3 relief workers.

When the principal tabulating office can be established in Des Moines, the progress of the studies will be much more rapid.

Lake and Stream Improvement, Project No. 00-85-484

Nature of project: Surveying state-owned dry lake beds, establishing boundaries, and developing the beds as game refuge and nesting areas. The project as originally planned also included lake soundings and borings and the planning and supervising of improvements on lakes and streams. (For a fuller description, see the report for Mar. 1-15.)

This project was begun in Clay County the early part of the month, with surveys on Mud Lake and Pickerel Lake. The shore line of Pickerel Lake was surveyed and staked out. Mud Lake is a state-owned dry lake bed that is to be developed this spring by the State Conservation Commission and the Works Progress Administration as a nesting and producing area for upland game. As a preliminary to this work, it was necessary to survey the area and establish boundary lines, since all the surrounding land is privately owned. The work, during Mar. 16-31, employed 7 relief laborers and 1 non-relief worker, with 1 non-relief man connected with the project "Biological Survey". When the survey of Mud Lake is complete, the party will move to Dickinson County to survey and establish the boundary lines on Jefferson Slough and to finish some incomplete surveys on Hottes and Marble Lakes.

Approved Projects, Not Yet Operative

Five projects approved by W.P.A. are not yet in operation. The status of each is as follows:

Transportation, Project No. 00-00-2967

Initiation of the surveys and studies included in this project again has been unavoidably delayed. Work is not expected to begin before May 1.

Recreation and Historic, Project No. 00-85-483

It was expected that a wood-working shop would be established in Dubuque during the last half of March, to construct markers for recreational and historic sites. It was necessary to delay this until a little later.

This work is a minor part of the project, which includes the preparation of topographic survey maps, plans and details for recreational areas; a survey of factors influencing the location of such areas; the layout, design and marking of historic and archaeological sites; supervision of construction of parks; excavation and study of archaeological sites; and the establishment of county historical societies and promotion of historical educational programs.

Project No. 00-85-482

Nature of project: State-wide survey to obtain data to be used in revising or checking township base maps showing roads, electric lines, farmsteads, etc.; completion of tabulation and analysis of data previously obtained on gas, water and electric service.

Allotments from the state W.P.A. were received for Districts 4 and 5, on March 25 and 30, respectively. Work will begin the first week in April in 8 counties in District 4 and 5 counties in District 5.

This project has had to wait for good weather and good roads, since it involves open-country enumeration and since Iowans, in common with citizens of other states, travel both paved and unpaved roads.

The surveys and studies which make up this project will be described in the progress report for April 1-15.

Highway Traffic Accident Survey, Project No. 00-00-3117

This survey is sponsored jointly by the Iowa Motor Vehicle Department and the Planning Board. It is expected that work will begin in April.

Project No. 00-85-478

It is hoped that authorization to begin this project will be received about April 1, so that work can be started soon after that date.

Projects on Which Approval is Pending

Washington approval of the projects "Public Education" and "Survey of Public Health Resources" had not been received up to March 31.

Projects Under Technical Guidance of Planning Board

The traffic surveys being carried on under the W.P.A. urban planning projects sponsored by Sioux City and Davenport continued throughout the latter half

of March, under guidance of the supervisors of the Planning Board survey, "Urban Zoning and Planning Studies". Per cents completion and numbers of employees were as follows:

While the Planning Board is cooperating in this work, it was comparatively inactive during the half-month period ending Mar. 31.

In the next report a definite account of the progress of this work will be given.

Summary

During the latter half of March, the Iowa State Planning Board conducted five projects under the Works Progress Administration and four under the National Youth Administration. Of the five W.P.A. projects, three are statistical surveys and studies, two are designed essentially to aid in wild life conservation. The N.Y.A. projects are much smaller and are set up to furnish additional workers on the other surveys.
