renewed commitment to our customers has resulted in initiatives designed to make services needed by state agencies a little easier to use. The Department of General Services pledged in its 1999 Strategic Plan to enhance customer services and communications. Strategies such as "Customer Friendly Procedures", "Customer Input and Feedback" and "Excellence in Customer Service" challenge us to change things that are not working and sharpen performance in areas that are working. ## **Roommate Wanted**

Over 200 employees from 8 state agencies are moving to a newly constructed office building leased by the Department of General Services under an effort to jointly locate state agencies.

Four bureaus of the Department of Human Services and four licensing boards -dental, medical, nursing, and pharmacy -are moving to the River Point Business Park, 400 SW 8th Street, beginning in mid-September. The 40,000 square foot collocation is the largest effort ever undertaken by the state in the Des Moines area.

According to Barbara Bendon, DGS Leasing Manager, benefits of collocating agencies in leased space includes public convenience, coordination between agencies, and reduced costs from sharing entrances, receiving areas, conference rooms, rest rooms, break rooms, and parking.

# capitol Rooms de-Open For Business

teady progress on construction means Orooms closed for construction this summer are again open. The Department of Management moved back to their offices in the southeast corner of the Capitol in early September.

Rooms 19 and 118 will be available for use in October. The ground floor men's restroom reopened, and the second floor northeast restroom is again open for women.

Some follow-up work in the remodeled areas will be required to install new air handling systems and other equipment.

Work to finish the elevator in the southeast corner of the Capitol will not be complete until later this fall. The elevator and changes to the areas near the Senate committee rooms mean these rooms will soon be accessible to people with disabilities.

# **\$avings Up In the A**i

wo air travel options, City Pairs and Access Air, are turning into big savings for the state of Iowa.

The City Pairs air travel program, started in January, saved \$320,000 in seven months. It is aimed at the 42% of state travel by air that previously was not at the lowest available fare because travelers could not meet restrictions,

y mid-September, employees in a pilot Dproject can say "charge it" to buy needed goods and supplies.

For small transactions, a procurement card will replace the current purchasing system. The card will be tested by the Department of General Services' Capitol Complex Maintenance Division, the Departments of Natural Resources and Transportation, and the Iowa Veterans Home. Plans are to expand the program to other agencies after the pilot.

## rivers Hold Winning Cards

Imployees who drive a state vehicle can use a new credit card to pay for fuel, parts, and repairs starting in October.

Magnetic-strip cards are replacing cards that had to be manually processed, causing many businesses to refuse them. Employees will have more options as an increased number of businesses accept the new cards.

The new cards are also better for businesses that provide goods and services. Processing magnetic strip cards is more efficient and businesses will get paid more quickly. The

automated system will also provide accurate and timely data for managing the fleet.

The card can be used for individual transactions up to 200 dollars. Drivers of agency-assigned vehicles are issued pin numbers. Drivers of pool cars get a card and instructions on how to use the card when they pick up a car. The old cards will be phased out and should be returned to DGS Fleet and Mail Division, Vehicle Motor Pool. For more information call Eddie Sauls at 242-0035.

### ar Gets Easier

You get more options for reserving I a car when you use the improved online motor pool reservation system.

The system now searches for alternatives within a two-hour time period on both ends of your proposed reservation. So if you want a car

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from 7:00 a.m. Monday morning through 5:00 p.m. Wednesday, and nothing is available for exactly those hours, you may find a car is available if you wait until 8:00 a.m.

When fully implemented the new system will track denied reservations by type of vehicle requested. The data on vehicle demand will be used to make future purchasing decisions. The new system is also capable of automatically scheduling vehicles for maintenance.

The five-year-old on-line reservation system is accessed through CICS by typing RESV on a blank screen. For help in using the on-line system, call the Motor Pool at 281-5123.

# n Parking Space...the final tking. parking frontier. ogress o

The signs say... no more all-day street parking.

he restriction prohibiting early morning 1 street parking will be reinstituted when the signs are again uncovered September 7. To better accommodate public meetings, parking will be restricted between 7-8:30 a.m., a change from the previous 9:00 a.m. ending time.

The morning parking restriction is aimed at keeping street parking open to visitors by encouraging employees to use gated lots. Studies show visitor parking is the biggest unmet need.

The morning restriction was lifted when the parking lot south of Executive Hills was closed for paving. That lot is now open. Also since that time, the lot north of the Grimes building expanded parking for employees and visitors.

n effort to better direct those unfamiliar Awith the complex is underway. Over the next few months you will begin seeing standardized, easier-to-read signs. Some signs are new – such as the signs along Court Avenue pointing out the native Iowa prairie grasses and wildflowers and signs

#### It's beginning to look a lot like...winter?

My would anyone want to think about snow and ice while air conditioners are still running? Because Department of General Services' Capitol Complex Maintenance crews have already begun the process of preparing the Capitol Complex for winter.

The 187 acre complex includes 20 parking lots, 70 acres of grass, and 6 miles of sidewalks. Before winter crews will paint all parking lot gates, repaint 26 miles of parking stripes, take steps to ensure weeds do not overtake the grass next year, and complete routine maintenance on monuaround the Capitol helping visitors maneuver around construction. Others replace signs that are worn or no longer accurate.

#### DID YOU KNOW?

Huge boilers in the Central Energy Plant south of Court Avenue heat buildings as far away as the Wallace Building. After turning on a boiler, it takes about four hours to be felt at Wallace. It is hard to keep buildings comfortable in spring and fall when temperatures fluctuate unexpectedly because adjustments must be made during the night to have an effect the next day.

Engineers also drain air conditioning systems before it freezes to avoid damage to the pipes and prepare the boilers for heating. During winter, crews have 56 acres to plow each time it snows.

Tew and improved parking space on the Capitol Complex is ready for use. The lot south of Executive Hills reopened with new lights and paving. Lot 16, north of the Grimes Building, expanded to the south and east for employees and visitors. This gravel expansion is meant to be temporary. Visitors enter from East 13th and employees enter from Des Moines Street.

(Be sure to cross Grand Avenue at the corner. Grand is a major traffic thoroughfare and the city of Des Moines will not allow a crosswalk in the middle of the block.)

A search is underway for another spot on the complex for state cars parked overnight. This will free up more space for employee parking in the lot north of the Grimes Building.

Work started on the site that by 2001 will house a 900-stall parking garage north of the Historical Building. A parking lot south of the Wallace Building was redesigned to make space for displaced volunteers and visitors who were parking at the construction site.

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
