Gathering Oral Histories

This spring, the State Library launched a new oral history project titled "**Earth's Bounty in Iowa: Then and Now.**" This project enables lowans to tell their own stories about growing up on an Iowa farm. Their recorded narratives will focus on the firsthand experiences of Iowa farm families. The interviews will

be posted on The Iowa Heritage Digital Collection website, along with verbatim transcripts of the interviews.

Coordinated by Helen Dagley, Reference Librarian with the State Library, here are some considerations to share with your patrons in promoting this oral history opportunity:

Commonalities For "Earth's Bounty" Interviews


- Library staff at participating libraries will schedule the interviews and provide a staff member to ask the questions and record the interview
- Participants will be asked to sign a written release, allowing the State Library to record and put their recorded words on the IHDC web site, and to allow researchers and the public to use the content of their interviews
- Interviews will also be transcribed through a commercial service (Rev.com) and posted on the IHDC web site
- Each interview will be recorded on the same kind of portable recording device (Zoom H5) Devices will be sent from the State Library and returned to the State Library via IA Shares
- Each mailing will include a packet of information, instructions, and forms

- State Library staff will transfer each interview to the IHDC web site
- Interviewees will be asked the same set of eight questions (whether currently farming or no longer living on a farm)
- Each interview should last up to 45 minutes
- We encourage interviewees to send us their photographs so that we can include them on the IHDC website alongside their interviews
- Library staff and the public will be invited to fill out a short, written evaluation of the process

This book is the winner of the 2022 Asian / Pacific American Award in Literature and the finalist for the 2021 National Book Award for Nonfiction

About The Book

From GoodReads: "Grace M. Cho grew up as the daughter of a white American merchant marine and the Korean bar hostess he met abroad. They were one of few immigrants in a xenophobic small town during the Cold War, where identity was politicized by everyday details—language, cultural references, memories, and food. When Grace was fifteen, her dynamic mother experienced the onset of schizophrenia, a condition that would continue and evolve for the rest of her life.

In her mother's final years, Grace learned to cook dishes from her parent's childhood in order to invite the past into the present, and to hold space for her mother's multiple voices at the table. And through careful listening over these shared meals, Grace discovered not

only the things that broke the brilliant, complicated woman who raised her—but also the things that kept her alive."

Get That Grant: Best Practices to Wow Funders and Bring Money to Your Library. May 2 @ 1:00PM

Step 1: Find the grant. Step 2: Get the grant. If only it were that simple! Well, maybe it is. The State Library has a couple webinars aiming to help demystify the process.

First, check out our webinar with **Foundation Directory** on how to use that resource to find potential grant funders. Next up in this webinar on the tips and tricks to write great grant proposals to increase your likelihood of getting funding.

We'll explore what makes an effective grant and focus on the four main rules for writing a great grant proposal: Know Your Funder, Follow the Rules, Do Your Homework, and Focus on People's Needs.

Beyond "UNPLUG IT, STAT": Cybersecurity Incident Response Plan Workshop. May 3 @ 10:00AM.

When faced with a cybersecurity incident, our first response is probably to unplug the computer and never plug it back in, but there's so much more to it than that. In this session presented by Ryan Mulhall, Chief Information Officer of the Iowa Communications Network (ICN) learn about cybersecurity, the risks, and some common attacks. Walk through the steps needed to prepare a cybersecurity incident response plan. In that planning process, learn how to

- · Develop procedures for incident handling and reporting
- · Set guidelines for communications with outside parties
- Establish relationships between internal and external groups

Understand what rules to follow, how to respond, and who to call for assistance. After the session, you'll have a working document to present to your team or administration. Plus time at the end for Q&A.
