


Iowa's 2003
Mean Hourly Wages by Education Levels



Iowa Job Outlook 2010: Statewide

The top 15 industries expected to create the most jobs during the 2000-2010 time period are primarily in the services and trade industries. The 15 industries shown on the right will create 148,500 of the 192,100 jobs Iowa's economy is expected to generate over the period.





Between 2000 and 2010, Iowa's economy is expected to generate 58,500 job openings annually. Thirty- three percent of the openings will be new jobs, which represent an 11 percent growth rate as compared to a 15 percent growth rate nationally. Thirteen percent of Iowa's new jobs will be in the sales and related occupations.

A larger percentage of job openings will occur to replace workers who leave existing jobs due to retirement, death or similar reasons that cause workers to leave the labor force on a more permanent basis. Fifteen occupations will comprise 31 percent of the total job openings annually for Iowa. One-fourth of the occupations are concentrated in the office and administrative support and sales occupations; the remaining are spread across most major occupational groups.

The following pages detail by level of education the occupations with the most annual job openings. Skills listed are shown in order of frequency for each level, with the most frequently needed skills in the left column.

Key Points of the 2000-2010 Job Outlook

The **Job Outlook** is one resource for highlighting the growth of lowa's occupations and industries. It shows which occupations exhibit growth potential and areas where trained individuals may be needed. In addition, information is provided on occupations that may be declining. It would be unwise to devote training time and dollars to occupations in this situation.

This publication provides the most significant source of education or training needed by workers to become fully qualified for an occupation based on information furnished by the Bureau of Labor Statistics. However, individual company requirements may vary.

The **Job Outlook** can assist career planners by providing information on the future occupational potential for both the state and Workforce Development regions. This information can be used to assess the possibility of employment in specific occupations upon completion of the appropriate education and training. In addition, the information can help substantiate the need for career-based training and education programs by review of projected openings and growth.

Occupations requiring less education can provide fundamental basic work skills required by employers.

For the time period 2000-2010, 58 percent of all jobs in Iowa will require postsecondary education or above.

The more education and skills obtained the wider the range of career options and the greater the earning potential. When comparing lowa's average mean hourly wages, individuals with less than a high school education will earn \$9.81 per hour, which is 72 percent of the \$13.66 per hour earned by individuals who complete high school or its equivalent. The same group will earn 61 percent of the \$16.30 per hour earned by those who complete postsecondary education, and will earn a meager 38 percent of the \$25.97 per hour wage of baccalaureate and graduate degreed people.
