New for Us - New for You

In its closing hours, the 1976 General Assembly of Iowa enacted significant legislation affecting the Iowa Employment Security Commission, Iowa employers, and Iowa workers. Here is a brief summary of the legislative changes, all effective July 1, 1976:

Agency Name Change

The name of Iowa Employment Security Commission was changed to Iowa Department of Job Service, and the three-member commission system was abolished. A single director will be named by the governor to head the agency. In addition, a three-member appeal board will be appointed by the governor to decide unemployment insurance appeals. The appointment is subject to approval by a two-thirds vote of the Senate.

Tax Addition

The temporary emergency tax of 7/10 of 1%, enacted by the 1975 General Assembly, was increased to 9/10 of 1%. (This tax is added to the contribution rate assigned each employer.) The \$6,000 wage base was also extended to the same date. The action delayed until January 1, 1978 the "trigger" contained in the law which calls for emergency tax of 2.7% in the event the Unemployment Insurance Trust Fund reaches a dangerously low level as determined by formula.

The new law also provided for a contingent emergency 25/100 of 1% add-on tax to be applied for 1977, in the event the first emergency tax was insufficient. The necessity for the add-on tax will be determined according to the formula set out in the law. (The tax would be in addition to both the contribution rate and the emergency tax.)

Eligibility and Benefits

The new law increased the benefit eligibility requirement on wages for insured work to \$400—double the previous

amount—for the base period quarter in which the claimant's wages were the highest. The law also upped to \$200 the previous requirement for wages paid in a calendar quarter other than the highest-wage calendar quarter, again double the previous amount, and increased from \$100 to \$200, the wage requirement for claimants who have drawn benefits during the previous benefit year.

A change was made in income deducted from unemployment insurance benefits. Although still fully deductible usually, a vacation pay exception is now allowable: In the case of a worker not scheduled to return to work within four weeks, only the first week of vacation pay is deducted.

An amendment to the law, effective March 1, 1977, eliminated from eligibility all public school employees who are under contract for the following year.

Eligibility for workers who voluntarily quit their jobs without good cause attributable to the employer now requires that the worker must subsequently be employed in insured employment for at least 6 consecutive weeks and be otherwise eligible.

At this issue of the Iowa Labor Market goes to press, Iowa Governor Robert Ray has not yet announced his selections for Job Service director and appeal board members. However, all other changes made by the legislature will be implemented on the effective date.

In a second bill passed during the 1976 legislative session, changes were made in the lowa Public Employees Retirement System (IPERS), a division of the lowa Department of Job Service. The contribution rates for employers will increase to 5.25% (from 4.75%) of the employee's covered wages, and for employees to 3.6% (from 3.5%) of wages up to \$20,000. The effective date for contribution increases is July 1, 1977. The legislature also voted to review the actuarial evaluation of IPERS to determine whether the percent used in computing monthly benefits can be increased.

Labor Market Briefs

Total EMPLOYMENT in Iowa climbed to 1,284,100 in May . . . up 36,500 from the April level of 1,247,600 . . . and 32,000 above the May 1975 tally of 1,252,100. Nonagricultural wage and salary workers showed a 7,100 gain between April and May . . . one of the largest nonag increases for that period in the past decade. Manufacturing industries remained mostly unchanged, noting an overall hike of only 100 workers. A combination of recalls and new hires brought boosts to the sector . . . the largest upturn of 900 appearing in electrical equipment . . . but these were offset by a substantial rubber and plastics labor-management dispute. In nonmanufacturing, seasonal industries continued an upward trend . . . services (amusement and recreation) and trade (eating and drinking) as leaders . . . closely trailed by contract construction. Minor losses were reported by government and transportation. Over the year, manufacturing and nonmanufacturing industries both occupy stronger employment positions.

UNEMPLOYMENT declined in May to 60,600 . . . a drop of 4,500 over the month . . . not as much as had been expected. At this season of the year, an unemployment dip of 13% was anticipated . . . but the actual decrease was only 6.9%. As a result, lowa's seasonally adjusted UNEMPLOYMENT RATE of 5.2% was slightly higher than the April adjusted rate of 4.7%. In contrast, the national adjusted rate for May was 7.3%. The state's unadjusted rate for May was 4.5% compared to 5.0% computed for April.

The civilian LABOR FORCE count was 1,344,700 for the current month . . . 1,312,600 for April . . . 1,318,700 for May of last year.

JOB INSURANCE payments to the unemployed fell to \$6,709,123... down \$2,111,085 from April's payments ...\$1,084,984 less than the year ago mark. The average payment in May was \$83.01... in April, \$84.77... in May 1975, \$68.97. During the May survey week, 22,592 Job Insurance claims were filed ... 4,563 fewer than in the preceding month ... 7,266 under last May's count.

Employment changes of varying kinds acted to counterbalance actions in the **HOURS and EARNINGS** series. In manufacturing the rubber and plastics labor-management dispute lowered hourly earnings by $12\rlap/e\ldots$ stone, clay and glass used increased overtime to raise earnings by $19\rlap/e\ldots$ while primary metals dropped 2 hours a week. In nonmanufacturing, seasonal employment gains in construction pushed hours and earnings down, as expected.

LABOR TURNOVER: The demand for Iowa manufacturing labor was up from April . . . much improved from a year ago. Total separations were increased slightly from last month—and the important thing here is that the increase came from a higher rate of quits—an indicator of the availability of job openings—instead of layoffs. New hires showed gains and total accessions easily topped year ago rates.

WHAT'S UP AHEAD? . . . Normal is the watchword—the economy pretty much on even keel across the state . . . with three exceptions. Slight diviations in expected hiring patterns are noted in agriculture, manufacturing and construction. Cooperating weather has enabled farmers to work straight through the spring months . . . most crops are planted and cultivation has started on schedule. Manufacturers are still hiring in small numbers—both new hires and recalls. Construction is lagging, behind expectations . . . with an upswing looked for soon. Optimism continues to grow . . . cautiously.
