LABOR MARKET DATA AVAILABLE

Job Service of Iowa offers many services to the state's varied publics. One of these is labor market information factual data concerning the world of work and the conditions that influence it. Such data are available to employers, civic and community leaders, trade and union organizations, the news media, colleges and universities and the general public.

The Job Service research and statistics unit collects, compiles, analyzes and reports data on the labor market and related subjects: Employment, unemployment and labor force estimates, current economic conditions, commuting patterns, apprenticeship, wages and unemployment insurance claims and benefits. Research also covers such areas as future manpower needs, Job Insurance benefit financing, job guidelines, job training and minority groups. Still more data are produced from examination of population characteristics through labor force breakdowns, occupational distribution and related investigation.

Besides providing statewide data, a sizeable portion of the statistics collected concerns individual counties and major market areas in Iowa.

Iowa Data

Annual Planning Report—An aid to future needs planning for the state and major market areas. 1976 reports issued for the State of Iowa and for Burlington, Cedar Rapids, Council Bluffs, Davenport, Des Moines, Dubuque, Fort Dodge, Ottumwa, Sioux City, Waterloo.

Labor Turnover Estimates—A monthly table available for the state and for Cedar Rapids and Des Moines areas.

Spendable Earnings Series—Monthly table: estimates lowans' take home pay on a statewide basis.

Hours and Earnings Estimates—An aid for state and community planning issued monthly in table form, available for most areas. Area statistics for manufacturing industries, state statistics for all industries.

Area Wage Surveys—Prevailing wage standards for selected Iowa areas.

Affirmative Action Information—Population and labor force data on women and minority groups to aid employers in developing plans for hiring members of these groups. Brochures available for the state, all 99 counties, seven major cities and two multi-county standard metropolitan statistical areas (SMSA). Supplemental occupational tables for the state and for seven major market areas are also available.

Agricultural Employment—Farm employment by state and county, 1970-'75.

Commuting Patterns in Iowa—Comprehensive statistical study of commuting patterns of the Iowa labor force, based on 1970 census data.

Occupational Outlook—Projections of occupational needs for the state and for seven areas, 1975-'85. Areas include Cedar Rapids, Des Moines, Dubuque, Sioux City, Waterloo and two partial SMSAs, Council Bluffs and Davenport.

Vocational Education Annual Report—Labor supply and demand by occupation, for use in planned vocational educa-

tion for the state and for Burlington, Cedar Rapids, Council Bluffs, Davenport, Des Moines, Dubuque, Fort Dodge, Sioux City, Waterloo.

Covered Employment and Wages by Industry and County and Job Insurance Benefits by County-Information available on state and federal unemployment insurance programs.

Career Guides—Current qualifications, requirements and opportunities for jobs in Iowa in the following occupational fields: building trades, clerical, food service, health and licensed occupations.

Opportunities for Apprenticeship—Description of apprentice occupations and process of applying for an apprenticeship in Iowa.

LABOR MARKET BRIEFS

The **EMPLOYMENT** surge in the state over the month was greater than expected, aided by fewer layoffs in April. Significant gains were reported in the nonmanufacturing sector . . . 5,000 in contract construction . . . 4,400 in the trade industries . . . 3,300 in services. Total statewide employment climbed from 1,210,200 in March to 1,247,500 . . . an April gain of 37,300. Compared to last April, the current figure shows an increase of 20,800 over the year ago count of 1,226,700.

UNEMPLOYMENT in April totaled 65, 100... a drop of 14,400 from the March jobless total of 79,500... and 10,000 under the April 1975 level of 75,100. The current seasonally adjusted **UNEMPLOYMENT RATE** was estimated at 4.7% of the labor force ... a decline of fourtenths of a percentage point from the March level of 5.1%. Iowa's adjusted rate for April a year ago was 5.5%. The state's unadjusted rate stood at 5.0% ... a significant downswing of one and two-tenths percentage points from the March level of 6.2%. In April 1975, the unadjusted rate was 5.8%.

Iowa's civilian **LABOR FORCE**—the combined totals of employed and unemployed workers—tallied 1,312,600 in April . . . 1,289,700 in March . . . and 1,301,800 in April 1975.

Eligible unemployed workers received a total of \$8,820,208 in April **JOB INSURANCE** payments . . . down \$4,899,635 from the total paid in March . . . and \$2,343,081 under the last April payments of \$11,163,289. The average April weekly payment was \$84.77 . . . last month's average payment, \$86.19 . . . the year ago average payment, \$69.60. During the April survey week, 27,155 Job Insurance claims were filed . . . 9,332 fewer than in March . . . 9,483 less than in last April. Total private **HOURS and EARNINGS** rose six minutes a week and 5¢ an hour over the month . . . most of the increase in nonmanufacturing. Overtime in durable goods was up considerably in primary metals . . . and to a lesser extent in lumber and furniture and transportation equipment . . . but was down in most other areas of the sector . . . bringing an average durable goods workweek drop of 18 minutes. The durables' hourly earnings, however, were up 1¢ due to stone, clay and glass wage increases. Nondurables overtime declined in all industries except printing and publishing . . . where several wage hikes were noted. Seasonal employment gains boosted retail trade average hourly earnings in the nonmanufacturing area . . . and good weather hoisted weekly hours in mining and construction.

LABOR TURNOVER: The accession rate among manufacturing industries was unchanged from March... a slight dip in new hires offsetting an increase in recalls. Total separations increased slightly from a month ago... but were considerably under the year ago count.

WHAT'S UP AHEAD?... Iowa's economic climate is improving...spurred by upswings in two sectors... manufacturing and construction. This activity is statewide, not confined to scattered locations...sparking widespread notes of optimism. Manufacturers are recalling laid-off workers throughout the state...many have completed all recalls and are hiring new workers. Construction, long dormant, is stirring into action... employers anticipating a good year ... a longer working season than usual. A green light for lowa's economy? The experts seem to think so. Suggest "cautious optimism."
