

2nd Quarter 1978 Insured Wages Up \$194 Million Over Previous Quarter

lowa workers covered by the state's Job Insurance program and federal government employees in Iowa whose unemployment insurance programs are handled by Job Service of Iowa received a total of \$2,958,012,000 in wages during the second quarter of 1978, according to a survey recently completed by Job Service's research and analysis department. The insured wage total represents an increase of \$194,683,000 over the first quarter 1978 tally of \$2,763,329,000.

Due to the extension of Job Insurance protection in 1978 to approximately 129,500 local government and parochial school employees and selected agricultural and private household employees, an over-the-year growth pattern from second quarter 1977 to second quarter 1978 could not be identified. The major industry groups affected by the new Job Insurance protection inclusion were agriculture, services, and local government. All other major industry groups reflect a true comparison from second quarter 1977 to second quarter 1978.

Private Sector Wages Totaled 81.8 Per Cent

Wages paid to workers in the private sector totaled \$2,421,118,000 or 81.8 per cent of the total wages paid in second quarter 1978. The largest total wage group was manufacturing with \$936,154,000 followed by trade with \$587,271,000.

In the nonprivate sector, local government wages tallied \$319,935,000 or 10.8 per cent of the total wages paid in second quarter 1978; state government was \$135,565,000 or 4.6 per cent; and federal government was \$81,394,000 or 2.8 per cent.

From first quarter 1978, total wages paid in mining rose by 34.8 per cent and construction wages were up by 33.7 per cent. Total wages paid in agriculture rose by 27.1 per cent. However, the average weekly wages in the three major industry groups dropped in second quarter 1978 due to the

addition of large numbers of employees at beginning level salaries.

Added Pay Period in Quarter Report

Second quarter 1978 wages to state employees paid through the central payroll system resulted in one more pay period as compared with first quarter 1978 and second quarter 1977 wages. In quarterly reporting, the additional pay period computes to 16.67 per cent more for each worker involved.

Nearly all increased employment in state government in first and second quarter 1978 occurred in Department of Social Services, Conservation Commission, Board of Regents institutions, Veterans Home and Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) positions. Increased employment in state government between 1977 and 1978, second quarter, was concentrated in Department of Social Services, Conservation Commission, Board of Regents institutions, Veterans Home, CETA positions, Judicial Department and Department of Transportation. Job Service Ranks No. 1 for Private Business Placements

Job Service of Iowa was No. 1 in the nation in fiscal year 1978 for the number of workers per staff year worked placed in unsubsidized jobs—jobs in private sector businesses. When including subsidized jobs that are funded through government programs, Job Service ranked No. 2 in the nation. Job Service of Iowa placed 101,049 individuals in jobs in FY 1978.

LABOR MARKET BRIEFS

The National Scene

According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the U.S. Department of Labor, the nation's overall unemployment rate was 6.0 per cent, up slightly from the 5.9 per cent rate in August.

The total number of unemployed persons was 6 million, virtually unchanged from the previous month's total. However, a fairly substantial drop in unemployment has occurred over the year.

...and in lowa

While the nation's nonagricultural employment figure remained unchanged, the state recorded strong advances in seasonal industries such as services, trade and government.

Employees returning from inventory shutdowns in manufacturing industries caused the employment level to rise. In nonmanufacturing, contract construction experienced numerous layoffs while retail trade increased employment in grocery stores and restaurants.

Private education picked up with the beginning of the fall semester and government increased employees in state universities and public schools.

Earnings in the private sector increased \$4.47 over the month. Increased overtime in the durable goods sector plus seasonal shifts in various industries were responsible for most of the change from August.

Turnover in the state slowed from the previous month.
