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

Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed

This quarterly publication is designed to disseminate information on the characteristics of the insured unemployed to manpower planners, officials and other users of labor market information concerned with the problems of the unemployed. An unemployment insurance (U. I.) claimant is an individual who has been determined monetarily eligible for benefit payments under one or more of the Federal or State U.I. programs and whose benefit year or compensation, by reason of an extended duration period, has not ended and who has not exhausted his benefit right. Additional claimant groups include those receiving benefit payments under Federal U.I. programs. The publication is concerned primarily with those under the state U.I. programs.

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CHARACTERISTICS OF THE INSURED UNEMPLOYED

General Economic Conditions

Second quarter employment in the Des Moines Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area (Polk and Warren Counties) was characterized by the usual seasonal increases in the outdoor related industries, and offsetting labor-management disputes in contract construction, printing and publishing, and primary and fabricated metal products.

Hiring was spotty in manufacturing during this period but employment held fairly even except for those industries affected by strike activity. Greatest employment gains have been in the retail sales and service industries (especially amusement related) and agriculture.


The number of unemployed totalling 6,400 in March dropped 21.9 percent in April, held even through May, and is expected to rise again during June and July. This normal seasonal increase results from the influx of students and graduates into the labor market, and factory shut-downs for vacations and retooling. This year, the economic impact of the May/June construction strike is also a factor. The jobless rate in the Des Moines SMSA continues to follow the statewide trend but is slightly higher. The Des Moines rate has fallen from 4.9% in January to 3.1% in April and May, but is expected to rise moderately during June and July.

The number of insured unemployed is not expected to rise to the same extent as total unemployed, and may decline some.

Characteristics of the Insured Unemployed

During this quarter, the number of insured unemployed was highest in April at 2,431, dropped 36.5 percent in May and then increased 8.0 percent in June to a total of 2,048. Between May and June the number of male claimants increased 9.1 percent compared to a 5.6 percent increase in the number of female claimants. The difference was more pronounced between April and June with male claimants decreasing 23.0 percent and female claimants increasing 7.4 percent. Much of this difference can be attributed to the reduction in the number of claimants (mostly male) with attachment to the construction industry. Male claimants made up from 69 to 76 percent of the total during the quarter. About 97 percent of claimants were white, and most (60%) were under 35 years of age.

During June, manufacturing as the industry of last attachment accounted for the largest group of claimants and wholesale and retail attachment accounted for the second largest group. The contract construction industry has shifted to third place from first place during the first quarter.



Occupational information is available only for those claimants who have registered with the local Job Service office. Structural work, which was most often listed as the occupation of last attachment during the previous quarter and into April, dropped to second place in June. Clerical and sales occupations now account for the largest group of claimants.

The majority of claimants in the industrial occupations and in the professional-technical-managerial occupations were male, but in the clerical/sales and service occupational groups, women were in the majority. Claims for job insurance were of longest duration in contract construction by industrial attachment and the clerical/sales occupational attachment.

Nonwhite claimants were 3.8 percent of the total in June compared to 1.6 percent in March. Most were last attached to the manufacturing industry and most were under 35 years of age.

Outlook

The outlook for the next quarter is for a generally declining number of insured unemployed with some fluctuation as factories shut down for vacations and retooling. The number of total unemployed is expected to increase in June and July with the influx of students into the labor market and taper off in August and September as they either find jobs or withdraw from the labor force to return to school. Insured unemployment is not expected to increase significantly until late fall when unfavorable weather halts most construction projects.

TECHNICAL NOTES

The data presented in this report represents characteristics of unemployment insurance (U.I.) claimants who filed U.I. claims for benefits covering the survey week containing the 12th of the month. An unemployment insurance (U.I.) claimant is an individual who has been determined monetarily eligible for benefit payments under the Iowa unemployment insurance program and whose benefit year or compensation, by reason of an extended duration period, has not ended and who has not exhausted his benefit right.

SUPPORTING STATISTICAL TABLES

Tables 1-7 contain data on the insured unemployed who are residents of the Des Moines, Iowa Standard Metropolitan Statistical Area (Polk and Warren Counties) for the Third Quarter (April, May, and June) for Fiscal Year 1977. Data were compiled as part of a cooperative program with the Employment and Training Administration, U. S. Department of Labor.






