

Interesting Facts About the City of Certainties

Des Moines has a population of about 90,000.

Every railroad with over 100 miles of trackage operating in Iowa except one, reaches

Des Moines over its own rails.

Over 1,500,000 persons live within eighty miles of Des Moines.

Des Moines banks have combined deposits of over \$40,000,000.

Des Moines insurance companies last year had a combined premium income of over \$12,000,000.

Des Moines has fourteen universities, colleges and special schools. The student enrollment averages over 6,200 for nine months in the year.

Over 3000 operatives are employed in the mines.

Des Moines has 412 factories employing ten or more hands

Des Moines jobbing in 1909 reached \$103,000,000, an increase of \$55,000,000 in nine years.

Des Moines is the second largest machinery and vehicle distributing point in the United States.

Des Moines has the largest cement manufacturing plant in the West; capacity 5,500 barrels daily.

Five lines of interurban track embracing 180 miles of track and reaching 60,000 urban and 200,000 rural population, center in Des Moines.

Des Moines has an acre of improved park lands for every 1,100 of population.

Des Moines is developing the finest system of boulevards in the middle west.

Des Moines has the only regimental cavalry post in the United States.

With 140 miles of paving, 120 miles of water mains, 160 miles of sewers, 145 miles of gas mains, 85 miles of street car tracks, an area for residence building has been made available in Des Moines that makes this the cheapest city of 100,000 population in the country in which to own a home. Residence lots as cheap as in cities of 20,000 or less population.

We have adopted the Des Moines Plan of City Government.

Built the Coliseum at a cost of \$150,000. Funds raised by popular subscription. Raised in the last eighteen months \$1,500,000 by popular subscription for Drake,

Des Moines College and other public institutions, including a new Y.M. C. A.

and a new Y. W. C. A.

Employed an expert of national reputation to make comprehensive plans for the beautification of Des Moines and hired an expert landscape artist who is now carrying these plans out.

Installed the finest electrolier street lighting system in the U. S. the entire cost be-

ing paid by the business men of Des Moines.

Built a \$1,000,000 courthouse, a beautiful city library, inaugurated one of the finest school systems in the country, bought over 700 acres of parks at a cost of over \$600,000, etc.

Inaugurated an extensive and successful public market.

We are changing an old, antiquated river front into the most beautiful civic center in the United States.

Planning for the construction of a boulevard system at a cost of a half million dollars, along the banks of the river and throughout the entire city.

Uniting with the county and state in the construction of good roads. Putting up new buildings at the rate of over \$2,000,000 annually.

Increasing in population at the rate of 6,000 to 10,000 per annum.

Gaining in wealth, according to the official valuation at the rate of a million dollars per year.

Entertaining over 100,000 convention delegates per annum. Showing yearly increase in bank clearings over \$41,000,000.

Gaining in building permits of over \$1,500,000 per annum.

Gaining in post office receipts of over \$100,000.

Making an annual gain in bank deposits of over \$1,000,000. Mining over one million tons of coal inside the city limits.

Planning for the extension of the best interurban electric system in the middle west. Manufacturing \$40,000,000 worth of goods consumed in Iowa and adjacent states and adding yearly to the factories and number of people employed.

The freight charges collected on shipments into Des Moines amount to \$10,000,000 annually.

Tonnage of outbound freight is 2,500,000 tons.

The inbound freight annually amounts to 3,000,000 tons.

Des Moines ships to surrounding points 9,500 cars of tile each year.

All building brick made in the city is consumed by local construction work, and on an average of 2,000 cars in addition.

A million and a half tons of steam and lump coal were shipped out of the city last year.

Four thousand cars of grain are shipped out of the city annually.

Nine thousand cars of cattle are shipped to the city, most of which are shipped out in dressed beef.

Wholesale groceries ship in and out 6,000 cars of merchandise.

Hardware dealers use 6.000 cars yearly for their business.

Des Moines being the third largest shipping point in the world for machinery and farm implements, uses 3,600 cars per year.

Six thousand cars of sand are shipped out each year.

An average of 9,000 cars of merchandise are received by retail merchants each year. Five million dollars' worth of sugar is shipped in and out of Des Moines yearly.

Fifty-four thousand four hundred cars of way freight are shipped out of Des Moines each year.

Spending a half million dollars annually in the construction of new pavements and street betterments.

Des Moines has ninety-four churches representing all of the denominations.

Des Moines has thirty-four hotels. In the first ten are 1,940 guest rooms.

Over 20,000 telephones in use in Des Moines.

Des Moines manufacturers earned an average of 20% on their investment last year. Des Moines Farm and agricultural papers have a combined circulation of over 700,000 copies.

Des Moines daily newspapers have a combined circulation of over 130,000 copies. The Des Moines Plan has converted the city's government from a liability to an asset. Free text books, uniform throughout the city, are furnished for the pupils in the Des Moines public schools.

School buildings in Des Moines have every modern, sanitary device for the health and comfort of the pupils.

Des Moines is constructing a new \$400,000 high school building for the East City. Three trained nurses are constantly looking after the 17,000 pupils of the schools. The school district owns 63 school buildings valued at the sum of \$1,943,434.09.


The total property of the district is valued at the sum of \$2,827,751.49.

Manual training is open to every seventh or eighth grade boy and to the high schools. Domestic Science, including courses in cooking and sewing, are offered to the sixth, seventh and eighth grade girls and to the high schools.

Outdoor lessons in agriculture with real garden plots as study aids are offered in the high schools.

Four years ago a piece of property on Walnut street 22x100 feet was offered for \$4,500. The owner recently sold it for \$22,500 and the present owner wants \$35,000

Three years ago a piece of property on High street was offered for \$5,000, it sold a year ago for \$15,000 and two months ago for \$22,500.
