


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
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
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
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ON THE COVER Rail Explorers offers pedal-assisted bike trips through the Des Moines River Valley in Boone.

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





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NEW YEAR = NEW OPPORTUNITIES


IRON TEE GOLF, BETTENDORF

Indian Creek Nature Center promotes sustainability for the future by nurturing individuals through environmental education. Visitors explore miles of trails through 200 acres of wetlands, riparian forests, maple sugarbush, tallgrass prairies and oak savannas. Across the different habitats, guests enjoy hiking, trail running, bird watching, cross-country skiing, snowshoeing, fishing and more. As part of the 50th anniversary, Indian Creek will host a Bio Blitz — a week-long deep dive by dozens of volunteers to discover and catalog the complete biodiversity of the grounds. Fully understanding which plants and animals share the ecosystem will better inform plans to responsibly manage the land. 



To celebrate the 20th anniversary, the museum and aquarium will have even more exciting surprises and experiences in store for guests. A reimagination of the Rivers to the Sea Gallery will open in time for spring break in 2023, highlighting 100 new animal species and the global connections between the rivers of America and the one big ocean. In summer 2023, the museum welcomes "POPnology," a fantastic blend of science fiction and science fact from pop culture — featuring icons like R2D2, the DeLorean and more. This interactive experience encourages visitors to explore how innovative thinking, inspired by popular stories and movies, has led to technological advances that revolutionize the way we live and work. *rivermuseum.com*

BIKE NORTH IOWA, MASON CITY



Projects include new single track trail areas that will add many miles of new riding to existing mountain bike trails, a new large bike park and pump track, plus multiple connector sections and a pedestrian bridge. Trail projects will open on a rolling basis starting in Spring 2023.



The Alsop House, a Frank Lloyd Wright property designed for the Alsop family in 1947, was recently purchased by Mia Reed, founder of The Art Deck LLC. With the mission of returning the house to its former glory, Reed has restored the original flooring, windows, doors and more. Even the unique and rare original furniture designed specifically for the house by Wright is being cleaned and returned to the home. In fall 2023, the house will open to the public for the first time, serving as The Alsop Art Gallery, with Usonian recognition, featuring architectural archives of Frank Lloyd Wright, and Charles C. Reed, Jr., Mia's father and a contemporary of Wright. The Alsop Art Gallery will also highlight well-known one-person art exhibits.



A joint venture between the City of Sioux Center and Dordt University, the American State Bank (ASB) Sports Complex debuted January 2, 2023. The 75-foot-high dome includes a 118,000-square-foot indoor turf facility and is the second largest facility of its kind in Iowa. The ASB Sports Complex is the perfect anchor to Sioux Center, which offers a great variety of local eateries, retail and lodging. The facility serves as a place for the community to come together and enjoy various sports and recreation activities. 


The Register's Annual Great Bicycle Ride Across Iowa (RAGBRAI) will celebrate the 50th anniversary of bringing people from all over the world together for an epic annual eight-day rolling festival of bicycles, music, food, camaraderie and community. Founded by Des Moines Register reporters who decided to go on a bicycle ride across Iowa and write about their experience, the event has turned into the oldest, largest and longest recreation bicycle touring event in the world. The ride always starts in Western Iowa, with eight communities hosting the riders on their journey to Eastern Iowa. The event runs July 22-29 with exciting surprises in store for this anniversary year – like pop-up concerts at each stop, special anniversary memorabilia and much more to be announced leading up to the event. *ragbrai.com*

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
Iowa's Ultimate BIKING ADVENTURE

The Register's Annual Great Bike Ride Across Iowa (RAGBRAI) started in 1973.

The summer staple crosses the state from west to east every July along a new route. Learn more about the legendary ride with these 50 fun facts.



- 1. RAGBRAI started in 1973. John Karras, copy writer/ feature writer, challenged Don Kaul, columnist, to ride his bicycle across the state and write columns about what he saw from that perspective. Don agreed but only if John joined him. They received approval from their editors and the rest, as they say, is history.
- 2. Karras and Kaul invited readers to join them on their bicycle ride across the state six weeks before the start of the first ride. It is estimated that 300 showed up at the start and 114 rode the whole distance the first year.
- 3. The name RAGBRAI wasn't conceived until the third year of the ride. It was initially called the Great Six-Day Bicycle Ride followed by SAGBRAI, Second Annual Great Bicycle Ride Across Iowa, before it was officially named RAGBRAI, Register's Annual Great Bicycle Ride Across Iowa in 1975.
- 4. In 1981, on the second day of riding, riders faced 40-degree temperatures (in July!), headwinds and pouring rain. Most riders didn't make it far and were bused into the overnight town where the campgrounds were under water. Residents opened their homes, garages and high schools to keep the riders dry. The day was later named, "Soggy Monday" and the Register made a patch to commemorate the day.
- 5. The ride always goes west to east, starting at the Missouri River and ending at the Mississippi with celebratory tire dips to mark rider's accomplishments at each end.
- 6. RAGBRAI is the oldest, largest and longest recreational multi-day bicycle ride in the WORLD!
- 7. More than 200 bicycle rides have been established over the years taking their inspiration from RAGBRAI.




- 8. A bronze statue was commissioned and installed in 2020 to honor the legacy and vision of John Karras and Don Kaul. The interactive RAGBRAI Founder's Statue can be seen at Water Works Park near downtown Des Moines.
- 9. RAGBRAI was originally held in August but by RAGBRAI V it was moved to the last full week in July to accommodate school schedules and the Iowa State Fair. This is also when the prevailing winds in Iowa go from west to east providing the most likely chance for tailwinds.
- 10. The first RAGBRAI began in Sioux City and ended in Davenport, with overnight stops in Storm Lake, Fort Dodge, Ames, Des Moines and Williamsburg. Year One's overnight towns had the largest average population of any RAGBRAI through RAGBRAI XXIV.
- 11. Among the many interesting people the first ride attracted was Clarence Pickard of Indianola. This 83-year-old gentleman, who hadn't ridden a bicycle much in recent years, showed up for that first ride with a used ladies Schwinn and rode all the way to Davenport, including the 100-degree plus day from Des Moines to Williamsburg, a 110-mile trek. Pickard's attire for the ride was a long-sleeved shirt, trousers, woolen long underwear and a silver pith helmet.
- 12. The SAGBRAI route went from Council Bluffs to Dubuque with stops in Atlantic, Guthrie Center, Camp Dodge (north of Des Moines), Marshalltown, Waterloo and Monticello. Approximately 2,700 riders showed up that Sunday morning in early August. The Howard Johnson motel in Council Bluffs was packed and an adjacent golf course was filled with campers.

- 13. In 2013 RAGBRAI passed by a large sinkhole at least 20' wide by 5' deep in Springbrook State Park near the infamous Mockingbird Hill. The sinkhole occurred due to what at the time was lowa's wettest spring on record. Mockingbird Hill is one of the steepest hills RAGBRAI has ridden.
- 14. Of course, some hills stand out more than others in RAGBRAI history. Possibly the most notorious is Potter Hill near Dubuque it's a 6% grade, more than a mile and about 1,400 feet of climb. That may not seem so bad until you try it yourself! Other infamous hills include Boone Hill and Twister Hill.
- 15. Twister Hill, located near Pilot Mound, is both difficult to cycle and apparently difficult to handle in a tornado. The hill was featured in the 1996 movie "Twister" (featuring Helen Hunt and Bill Paxton) as the characters attempt to get the DOROTHY sensors into the eye of the tornado. The hill is only 300' of riding but the twists, turns and elevation change are an F5!
- **16.** 872. Number of towns that have hosted riders since 1973.
- 17. 90%. The percentage of incorporated towns that RAGBRAI has passed thru since 1973.
- 18. 22,313. Number of miles ridden since 1973.
- 19. 445,899. Number of riders who have ridden since 1973.
- **20.** 45,000. Largest daily rider count was in 2019 when riders went from Winterset to Indianola.









21. In 2022, RAGBRAI had eight riders over the age of 90!

- **22.** RAGBRAI has visited each of Iowa's 99 counties. There are still a few towns the ride hasn't visited yet, but it will get to those in the next 50 years!
- 23. Fourteen communities have served as RAGBRAI starting points, 12 have hosted the finish, and 108 communities have been overnight hosts.
- 24. Under ideal conditions RAGBRAI bikers average about 10 miles an hour, including stops. Many bikers can ride faster but RAGBRAI is for fun and is not a race!
- 25. In 1985, RAGBRAI XIII hit 10,000 riders and have registered at least that many ever since.
- 26. After the 1982 ride, co-founder and co-host Donald Kaul decided he had ridden across Iowa plenty of times and quit the ride. He later also left The Register. "Iowa Boy" columnist Chuck Offenburger joined John Karras as co-host in 1983.

- 27. In the winter of 1982, Clarence Pickard was struck and killed by a car while walking across a street in Indianola, his hometown. Although he had only ridden a complete RAGBRAI the first year of the ride and on just one day the following year, he had become a legend. The 1983 event, RAGBRAI XI, was named the "Clarence Pickard Memorial Ride" in his memory, and the commemorative patch The Register designed that year was similar to the shape of the helmet he wore.
- 28. The first RAGBRAIs included mandatory century (100 mile) days. RAGBRAI XIV in 1986 introduced a Century Loop, making the full 100-mile distance optional.
- 29. Many of the early RAGBRAIs had mandatory sections of gravel. In fact, both John Karras and Jim Green were notorious for this. The first optional Gravel Loop was in 2015. Steve Hed pitched the idea to RAGBRAI officials at the 2014 Interbike conference. One month later he tragically passed away. So when the first Gravel Loop was held in 2015 it was in Hed's honor, with his family members handing out stickers and patches.



- 30. Jim Green was the RAGBRAI Director from 1992 through 2003. He is known for steering RAGBRAI to become a more family-friendly ride that anyone could feel comfortable joining.
- 31. Jim Green is the co-founder of the Dream Team, a RAGBRAI team that pairs youth with mentors. Youth who complete the program can earn a new bicycle by keeping good grades, training regularly and riding the entire RAGBRAI route.
- 32. RAGBRAI has been featured in Sports
 Illustrated magazine, The Saturday Evening
 Post, CBS This Morning, NPR, The Wall Street Journal,
 CNN, The New York Times, Bicycling Magazine,
 TIME Magazine, Reader's Digest, Ford Times,
 Smithsonian, National Geographic's Traveler, SHAPE,
 VELO Tonic (France), Sportrad (Germany), ESPN's
 "Sports Center," NBC's "Tonight Show," "The Tonight
 Show with Jay Leno," "Jeopardy," and of course the
 ride's namesake, The Des Moines Register.
- 33. Mr. Pork Chop (Paul Bernhard) is probably RAGBRAI's most famous food vendor. He is known for his pink bus painted to look like a pig, and his "PORK CHOOOOOOOOOP" call to riders. These days the pork chop stand is run by his son, Pork Chop Jr. Mr. Pork Chop began in 1985 and is still on the route today.
- 34. Another long-time favorite RAGBRAI food vendor is Beekman's Homemade Ice Cream. Based out of Cherokee, Iowa, they have been with the ride since 1986. You'll know you're riding up to their stand because you'll hear the CHUG CHUG of their ice cream makers, driven by an IHC Famous Titan engine (built in 1913).
- **35.** Other famous food vendors along the RAGBRAI route have included Root Beer Man, the Dove Barn, Pastafari and so many more.

- 36. Of course, the most famous RAGBRAI vendors are those from the communities of lowa. 4-H clubs, scout troops and the famous "church ladies" come out to serve riders as they bike and eat their way across the state. Favorite foods include scotcheroos, pork tenderloins, pie, walking tacos and cinnamon rolls.
- 37. Since the 1980s, every year's RAGBRAI has had cyclists from each of the 50 states, and US territories like Puerto Rico, Guam, the Virgin Islands and more.
- 38. In 2022, RAGBRAI had riders from Australia, Canada, Germany, Ireland, Italy, Japan, Mexico, Netherlands, Norway, Sweden, Switzerland, Thailand and England.
- 39. In 2016, The Register received a photo of a rider wearing a RAGBRAI hat in Antarctica. With that, RAGBRAI riders have visited all seven continents!
- 40. Lance Armstrong has occasionally brought his famous friends to RAGBRAI including Matthew McConaughey, Jimmy Johnson and Jake Gyllenhaal.
- 41. Other famous riders on RAGBRAI include Tour de France winner Greg LeMond, former pro football player and actor Ben Davidson, columnist Dave Barry, actor Tom Arnold, 2004 Democratic presidential candidate Howard Dean and Iowa Governor Terry Branstad.
- **42.** It has been rumored that actors Ashton Kutcher, Brandon Routh and Jason Momoa have ridden RAGBRAI but they are unsubstantiated. Everyone looks a little different in lycra and a helmet!
- 43. Nelson "The Cheetah" Vails rides RAGBRAI nearly every year. Nelly is the first African American to win a medal in cycling during the 1984 Summer Olympics. He's also in the US Bicycle Hall of Fame and in the film "Quicksilver".





- **44.** Another frequent RAGBRAI rider is the Fastest Cyclist on Earth, Denise Mueller-Korenek. She rode her bicycle 183 mph on the Bonneville Salt Flats in Utah in 2018 on RAGBRAI she rides a little slower than that!
- **45.** In 2013, 2,300 of the riders visiting Fairfield set the Guinness World Record for Largest Gathering of People Wearing Fake Moustaches.
- 46. The ride couldn't happen without the hard work of over 3,500 volunteers from the communities across the state. Some of the things they do range from helping at the beer garden, to setting campers in their sites to planning the layout of the festivities.
- 47. RAGBRAI donates \$15,000 to each overnight host town along the route.

Each Meeting Town, where support vehicles can meet up with riders, receives \$10,000 apiece.


- **48.** In 2012, Counting Crows headlined RAGBRAI Cedar Rapids for a 40th Anniversary Bash.
- 49. Some towns really go all out for RAGBRAI. Mason City hosted Poison front man Bret Michaels in 2014; the opening act was Warrant of "Cherry Pie" fame. When RAGBRAI returned to Mason City again in 2022, they hosted Don Felder of the Eagles and Sugar Ray.
- 50. RAGBRAI must-have bands include Hairball, Johnny Holm Band, The Pork Tornadoes, Spazmatics, Pop Rocks, the Nadas and David Zollo. It wouldn't be RAGBRAI without rocking to a handful of these favorites.









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TOP TIPS TO KNOW BEFORE YOU GO

- 1. **Go on a weekday:** If you can make it to the Fair on a weekday, I highly recommend it over the extra-busy weekends. Going earlier in the morning is also a good way to beat the crowds.
- 2. Make a plan: It's impossible to see everything in one day, so I recommend going in with a plan. Having a list of your group's must-sees, must-dos and must-eats will be useful. Study the map and plan a general route so you can get to the things you're interested in without having to backtrack.
- 3. Wear walking shoes: The Fair requires a lot of walking, so wear your best walking shoes. You will be on your feet the majority of your time so plan accordingly. I also recommend closed-toe shoes or your feet will be filthy by the end of the day!
- 4. Wear comfortable clothes: Check the weather forecast and dress accordingly. We normally have some of our hottest weather during the Fair, so wear short sleeves and shorts and be prepared for a sweaty day. But if you go earlier in the morning or on an unusually cool day, you may find yourself wanting a light jacket. Ponchos are also a smart idea if rain is in the forecast.
- 5. Bring cash: Debit/credit cards are accepted at most places, but it tends to be easier and faster to pay with cash. Especially if your family is splitting up into lines at different food stands, having smaller bills to give to each family member for food can be helpful. There are ATMs available.
- 6. Bring the stroller: Definitely bring the stroller or a wagon for younger kids because it will be a long day of walking. Strollers are also nice to have for stashing diaper bags, sunscreen, water bottles, etc. Strollers and wagons are also available to rent inside Gate #11 and Gate #15.
- 7. Bring a water bottle & snacks: Outside food and water bottles are allowed, so definitely bring water. You may also want to pack a few snacks, especially for little kids. Many of the buildings around the Fairgrounds have water fountains where you can refill your water. They can be a little tough to find sometimes so keep an eye out and ask Fair workers or volunteers if they know where you could refill your water.
- **8. Don't forget sun protection:** You'll be spending a lot of time outdoors, so don't forget to apply sunscreen! Hats, sunglasses and covered wagons/strollers are helpful to have for the kids.
- 9. Pack the essentials: You will not want to walk back to your car during the day, so bring all the essentials with you. A backpack/diaper bag is a great idea for keeping water bottles, sunscreen, etc. handy.

GETTING THERE

Location: For GPS and online mapping services, use the address 3000 East Grand Avenue, Des Moines, IA 50317

Hours: The grounds are open 8 a.m. to midnight, and the buildings are open 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. Most of the rides open at either 9 or 10 a.m.

Admission costs: At the gate, adults (12 and up): \$16 and children (6-11): \$10. Advance admission tickets are available prior to the Fair for \$11 and \$7, respectively. Check the Fair's website, iowastatefair.org, for locations to purchase.

Parking: Parking is available on the Fairgrounds for \$10. Many residents in the area offer parking on their lawns as well. In my experience, traffic can get very heavy and slow, and parking lots tend to fill up, so I like to save myself some headaches and utilize the DART Park & Ride. With this option, you park at one of three locations and ride the DART bus to the Fairgrounds. This is very economical, helps you avoid traffic, and often saves you some walking since the bus drops you off right at the gate. Find details on the Fair's website.

Fairgrounds Map: It's helpful to familiarize yourself with the Fairgrounds map before your visit so you have an idea of where the parking lots are located. And I keep this pulled up on my phone to reference during the Fair.

- 10. Bring extra clothes: This is one more thing to carry with you, but you'll probably be glad you brought them. There's a chance your kids will be running through sprinklers in the splash pad or spilling their ice cream down their shirts.
- **11. Restrooms:** The largest, nicest restrooms are in the newer air-conditioned buildings.
- 12. Diaper changing/nursing stations: There are stations in the Animal Learning Center and Walnut Center. If you'll need to use these, locate them on the Fair map in advance so you know where they are.
- 13. Make safety plans: Kids wander off or get separated from their group every Fair so it's smart to be prepared. Kid Find bracelets are typically handed out at the information booths. You can tuck a piece of paper in their pocket with their name, your name and your phone number. It's also a good idea to take a current photo of your child(ren) right before you go to the Fair and teach them to look for a police officer or Fair staff if they get lost.

THINGS TO DO

FAIR FOOD

Food is one of the main attractions of the Fair, so let's talk about all the good food first! There are so many food vendors around the Fairgrounds ranging from your classic corndogs and fried Oreos to more interesting items like the chicken bacon ranch waffle on-a-stick and deep-fried meatballs on-a-stick.

Some of my must-have foods are the hot beef sundae, fried cheese curds, and Barksdale's warm chocolate chip cookies (I usually buy a bucket when I'm leaving to take home). I also like the tater ribbon fries, fresh-squeezed lemonade, caprese salad on-a-stick and the peppermint bar from Bauder's Ice Cream.

It's always fun to look at the list of new Fair foods in advance and pick out a couple of things you'd like to try. They give awards to the top new foods each year so those are good ones to seek out, too. Everything you need to know about Fair food is on their website. There are also details about healthy choices and gluten-free options.

LITTLE HANDS ON THE FARM

This is a must-do activity with your kids! Children ages 2 to 10 get to pretend they're farmers in this interactive exhibit. Kids are given a basket to collect various foods along the path, like harvesting vegetables from the garden, picking apples from the orchard, gathering eggs in the chicken coop, etc. Then at the end, they get to sell their items at the market for play money that can be redeemed for a small treat in the grocery store. It's so fun and totally free!

GIANT SLIDE

The Giant Slide has been a State Fair staple since 1971 and a favorite for Fairgoers of all ages. You grab a mat, climb up the steps of the 45-foot-high slide and slide down the iconic yellow and green slide. The cost is \$3. Very young kids can ride with their parents.

PAUL R. KNAPP ANIMAL LEARNING CENTER

Stop here to see adorable baby animals like newborn piglets and tiny chicks. There are also usually a few baby calves born during the fair so you might get lucky and see a cow and



her new baby. Quick tip: This is a nice building with air conditioning, water fountains and good restrooms.

FREE ENTERTAINMENT

There's free entertainment, shows and demonstrations sprinkled throughout the Fairgrounds. Look at the daily schedule for free shows on the various stages and free activities taking place that day. For example, the 4-H

Exhibits Building often has make-and-take craft activities and the Anne & Bill Riley stage hosts all sorts of free shows. The Fun Forest Stage has live kid-friendly entertainment throughout the day and a playground area nearby.



ANIMALS

Your kids will have fun seeing all the livestock around the Fairgrounds. There are opportunities to see cute baby animals and even pet some of them:

- Avenue of Breeds Boulevard of Dairy Breeds
- Cattle Corner
- Horse Haven
- I Milked A Cow
- Milking Parlor/Milking Experience
- Paul R. Knapp Animal Pig Place
- Learning Center
- Sheep Stop

You can walk around the livestock barns and see lots of animals, and I also recommend walking through the Richard O. Jacobson Exhibition Center to see if there are any horse shows to watch. Some shows require paid admission, but earlier in the day there's often something that's free to watch. The building has great seats and air conditioning, so it's a nice spot to take a break!

CARNIVAL RIDES

There are three thrill parks at the Iowa State Fair. If you plan to ride a lot of rides, consider getting a wristband. Discounted wristbands can be purchased online in advance.



BUTTER COW

The Butter Cow is one of those Iowa State Fair traditions that you have to stop and see. It's exactly what it sounds like, a cow carved out of butter.

The Butter Cow is located in the Agriculture Building where you can usually find free hard-boiled eggs on-a-stick and buy a cup of honey lemonade from the lowa Honey Producers upstairs. There are also giant pumpkins on the lawn in front of the building.



SKYGLIDER

The Skyglider is a ski lift that gives you a bird's-eye view of the Fairgrounds. It's a fun way to see the Fair and give your feet a break. The \$4 one-way ticket is a nice shortcut to get to the other side of the Fairgrounds or do the \$7 round-trip for a relaxing ride.



MORE FUN FOR FAMILIES

COUNTRY SCHOOL

Learn what it was like to go to school in a one-room schoolhouse. Throughout the Fair there are various activities where children can pretend to be a student in an old school. This is a fun and interactive way to learn about history at the Fair.

AWARD-WINNING LARGEST ANIMALS AND PLANTS

See the biggest of the big award-winning competition entries. Travel to various locations around the Fairgrounds to see the biggest boar, largest pumpkin and more. There is truly nothing bigger and better than these large animals and plants.

LIVESTOCK AND HORSE SHOWS

From cattle and pigs to pigeons and rabbits, see and enjoy lowa's livestock industry! Showtimes and locations can be found in the daily schedule on the lowa State Fair app and website.

BLUE RIBBON KIDS CLUB

Join the Blue Ribbon Kids' Club Monday through Saturday for a variety of activities such as meet and greets, crafts, Q & A sessions and more.

CRAFTS IN THE CULTURAL CENTER

The Patty and Jim Cownie Cultural Center has makeand-take crafts for people of all ages. You can make things like personalized name bracelets, candles and even get your face painted.

CONTESTS

Every year, thousands of Fairgoers and exhibitors compete to get first place. Contests range from the Ugliest Cake in the Elwell Family Food Center to the bubble gum blowing contest on the Anne and Bill Riley stage.

FAIR SIGHTS

Need a relaxing break? Look over the vast expanse of land from Expo Hill or enjoy water features in the Pella or Ruan Plazas. The Polk County Master Gardener's Discovery Garden is also a beautiful setting to see outdoor flower displays.





MINIATURE GOLF



Designed to harmonize with the tropical flavor of Waterloo's Lost Island Waterpark and Theme Park, Monaleo Adventure Golf features two challenging 18-hole courses lined with native vegetation, volcanoes, rapids, dinosaur fossils and a skull pit. For a full day of adventures, pair your mini golf endeavors with a race around the go-kart track, some exhilarating water slides or thrilling roller coasters. thelostisland.com; **Driftless Area**

For another water-themed course, head over to Pirate's Pointe, located within Storm Lake's King's Pointe Waterpark Resort. The course offers an intimidating shipwreck with towering masts and billowing sails that would make Blackbeard quake in his boots. Do you dare to accept the challenge and walk the plank? kingspointeresort.com; Lakes & Land

Enjoy a game of classic mini golf featuring obstacles, full loops and plenty of angles alongside lights to allow evening rounds at Pla-Mor Mini Golf in Clear Lake. Open seasonally with no set hours, it's a good idea to call before you play, but the course will stay open for you as long as you need. Lakes & Land

Toad Valley's Field of Green Mini Links in Pleasant Hill provides the most real-world application of putting techniques than any other mini golf course in Iowa. The challenging course follows the contour of the land and features long-distance putts, real sand traps and water hazards. The beautiful greenery and babbling waterfalls and streams make this a worthy visit. toadvalleygolfcourse.com; Capital Country

Paying homage to its name, Li'l Mississippi in Davenport offers players unique course features such as a winding stream that rushes throughout the course, a large waterfall and several splash ponds. For more summer fun, join in on the course's Water Wars, a water balloon game that leaves both sides laughing. lilmississippigolf.com; Storied & Scenic

Council Bluffs' Pirate Putt indoor golf course (perfect for a rainy day!) offers two 18-hole courses with warped walls, ramps and a spring-loaded cannon that will shoot your ball onto the course. PUBLIC GOLF COURSES



Known as the oldest municipal golf course west of the Mississippi River, **Waveland Golf Course** is a parkland-style course built in the heart of Des Moines. Accuracy is a necessity because of the mature, tree-lined fairways. *golfwaveland.com; Capital Country*

The Audubon-certified **The Preserve** on Rathbun Lake at Honey Creek Resort in Moravia features a perfect blend of great golf and natural landscapes, meandering more than 7,000 yards through prairies and oak savannas. The course is designed to suit golfers of every age and skill level, and also offers PGA golf lessons and club fittings. *honeycreekresort.com; Storied & Scenic*

Named the state's best public course for 2022 by Golfweek magazine, **Spirit Hollow** in Burlington requires a tremendous test of skills set in the rolling hills and meandering streams of Southeast Iowa. spirithollowgolfcourse.com; Storied & Scenic

Sprawling more than 7,100 yards, **The Falls** at Grand Falls Casino & Golf Resort in Larchwood boasts views of country landscapes and a 30-foot-tall waterfall flowing into a 12-acre lake. (Check their website for details on dress code.) *thefallsgolfcourse.com; Lakes & Land*

Lake Panorama National Resort in Panora offers two courses – an 18-hole championship course and a par-3 course. Other amenities at the resort include an outdoor swimming pool, pickle ball and basketball courts and access to private beaches and boating on the namesake lake. *lakepanoramanational.com; Loess Hills & Beyond*

Since opening in 1976, **Bellevue Golf Club** has developed a reputation as a challenging, but fun, ninehole course. Set on hilly terrain north of Bellevue, the course offers scenic views of the Mississippi River. facebook.com/bellevueiagolfcourse; Storied & Scenic





DISC GOLF



Recognized as one of the top 50 courses in the world, **Wildcat Bluff** in Urbana is a tough 21-hole disc golf course that challenges players with a variety of obstacles. With tightly wooded fairways, a variety of elevation and long layouts, the course is a challenge for even advanced players. *mycountyparks.com; Storied & Scenic*


Sunnyside Disc Golf Course in Atlantic offers some of the best "empty your bag" disc golfing in the state. The 18-hole course features a variety of wide-open fairways and holes closely wooded by mature trees, moderate distances, lots of elevation and a creek that comes into play. *atlanticiowa.com; Loess Hills & Beyond*

Home to a variety of disc golf tournaments each year, **Pickard Park** in Indianola provides a challenging but scenic course for amateur players featuring rolling hills, ponds, creeks and a long hike around a beautiful property. Each hole includes a pro and amateur tee pad for all skill levels to enjoy. *indianolaiowa.gov; Capital Country*

With 21 holes spread throughout two city parks divided by the Winnebago River, the **Forest City Disc Golf Course** offers a variety of terrain. Along with the river and ponds, the course in Forest City also features a swinging bridge with scenic views of the water. Most holes include two tee pads, elevation and trees. *Lakes & Land*

Located next to the Cedar River near downtown Waterloo, the long and scenic course at **Waterloo Exchange Park** features a variety of technical forest and water shots, offering the ultimate challenge for skilled players. Players will find themselves throwing for 27 holes over creeks, ponds and next to the river as well as down narrow and heavily wooded fairways. waterlooleisureservices.org; Driftless Area

Located in beautiful **Maytag Park**, Newton's 18-hole course winds around an amphitheater, bike trails and swimming pool. Players can expect mostly long and open, hilly shots with some trees and brush. A local disc golf league takes this course over on Thursday nights, so plan accordingly. *newtongov.org; Capital Country*




BIKING ©

Head to Decorah and spend a relaxing afternoon exploring the community from the **Trout Run Trail** (mycountyparks.com). This 11-mile+ route follows the Upper Iowa River, several beautiful trout streams and passes by some of the community's best staples.

Driftless Area

- Start at the trailhead by Bowstring Bridge, just northeast of Trout Run Park, and head south along Trout Run, which is the most handicapped accessible coldwater trout stream in the Midwest.
- Stop by the Decorah Fish Hatchery
 (decorahfishhatchery.org) to learn about the rearing
 process. You can feed fish of all sizes for just a quarter.
- Hop back on your bike and prepare for the most challenging trail section filled with switchbacks, underpasses, a unique bridge, a dramatic limestone cut and the oldest part of the trail, a beautiful stretch called "Doug Road" that overlooks the Upper Iowa River.
- At the end of Doug Road, exit the trail and bike a few blocks through city streets to Decorah's historic downtown. Refuel at places like Mabe's Pizza (mabespizza.com) with a classic pie, Rubaiyat's (rubaiyatrestaurant.com) refined seasonal American dishes, or a little further out, but still bikable, steak or seafood along a trout stream at Twin Springs Supper Club (twinspringssupperclub.com; reservations recommended).
- Take a break from biking and stroll through
 Vesterheim, The National Norwegian-American
 Museum and Folk Art School (vesterheim.org). Learn
 about the lives of the people who settled our nation
 through artifacts like elaborate costumes, a historic
 cabin and even a boat that sailed the Atlantic Ocean.



- Power up for the remainder of the trail by stopping for a treat. According to locals, Whippy Dip serves up some of the best ice cream around. Or choose a delicious brew from Pulpit Rock Brewing Company's (pulpitrockbrewing.net) rotating tap list featuring a wide range of beer styles.
- When you're ready to complete your adventure, hop on your bike and ride to see the waterfall at **Dunning's Spring Park** (parks.decorahia.org) before you get back on the Trout Run Trail loop to return to your

The Loess Hils

LEARN MORE ABOUT IOWA'S FAMOUS GEOLOGICAL GEM

What are the Loess Hills?

Though the Loess (rhymes with "bus") Hills are one of Iowa's most famous landscapes, many natives and visitors alike are unaware of what makes this area in Western Iowa so special. In fact, this is one of the only places in the world with such deep deposits of loess soil, a silt-like sediment formed by the accumulation of wind-blown dust. The only place with deeper and more expansive deposits is China's Loess Plateau. Along with its unique compilation, the region also includes some of the largest public conservation and recreation areas in the state, preserving an important ecosystem of plant and animal species that can't thrive anywhere else. Finally, the Loess Hills are home to some of the longest and most rugged trails in the Midwest, along with views that maintain the legacy of the land.

One Woman's Journey Through the Hills

Though the Loess Hills do have some longer isolated hiking trails, there has been talk of creating a continuous route that spans their entire length, from Plymouth County all the way down to the Missouri border. So, local hiker and nature enthusiast Kelly Madigan set out to try it herself. It was something she'd been thinking about doing for nearly 20 years as she explored the area and learned more about the Loess Hills. Then, when COVID-19 hit, she figured it was time to bring her plans to life.

"I wanted to understand the landscape that I was connected to and understand things at a human pace. I had driven I-29 and taken some of the scenic byway routes, but still didn't really understand the landform until I walked it," Madigan said.

In the fall of 2020, she set off on her adventure. After initially planning her route, along with scouting on the spot, she walked about 270 miles through stretches of public conservation and recreation areas, as well as along gravel, dirt and paved roads in between. Family and friends helped along the way, bringing her food and supplies. Every day looked different – sometimes she'd camp on the trail; sometimes she'd have loved ones shuttle her to and from routes; sometimes she'd even have friends and family join her as she continued walking south.

Kelly quickly coined the term LoHi Trail to describe the path, combining the name of the hills with its elevation changes and steep slopes. As the hills, their scenery and small towns continued to amaze her, she created a Facebook page to document her journey, starting it by saying, "Many have dreamed of a continuous walking trail through the Iowa Loess Hills. I'm trying to move that forward by walking it."

Before she knew it, hundreds of people were following the page, providing ideas for navigation or areas of interest and asking questions about her route as they brainstormed their own undertaking.

Six weeks later, Kelly finally reached the Missouri border. While her journey could have ended there, it was only the beginning.

"I've always been drawn to wilderness and how it corresponds to the wildness in us," Kelly said. "When I discovered the Loess Hills and all these pockets of remote valleys

the Loess Hills and all these pockets of remote valleys and ridges where you can be away from big cities, it spoke to me like it does to a lot of people."

As her Facebook group's following continued to grow, Kelly realized there were more people like her who wanted to connect with Iowa's natural beauty in the most intimate way – on foot. She partnered with Golden Hills RC&D, and together they arranged a summer hiking event in June 2021 called the LoHi Trek. They soon learned there was ample demand for the four-day, 40-mile hike of the Loess Hills – the 30 registration slots were quickly filled while additional names were placed on a waiting list. Hikers were responsible for bringing their own camping gear but, thanks to a shuttle system, they didn't have to carry it and food was provided.

The next spring, they held another LoHi Trek where they camped at Little Sioux Scout Ranch and had shuttle drivers take them out for a hike back. They completed 25 miles in three days. A hike in the fall of 2022 also utilized a shuttle out and hike back system, this time with camping at Kelly's home.

Throughout these guided hikes, Kelly also invited local experts to incorporate educational presentations about conservation efforts, the landscape's importance and protecting its wildlife and prairie. The most recent hike even included a visit to **Tuuli Farm**, (tuulifarm.com) where they learned about the sheep's rotational grazing process and its benefit for the livestock and conservation efforts.

As the LoHi Trek continues to evolve and more people are introduced to lowa's Loess Hills, interest continues to grow inside and outside lowa's borders. For the 2022 hikes, people came from 53 zip codes and 10 states, including New York, California, Texas and Colorado. Today, there are endless ways to experience the Loess Hills by car, foot or bike, inviting nature enthusiasts, outdoor recreation enthusiasts and sightseers alike to appreciate lowa's natural landscape.

How to Experience the Loess Hills

EVENTS / GUIDED HIKES

The LoHi Trek 2023 (visitloesshills.org/lohi.html)

Join Kelly Madigan and Golden Hills RC&D over Memorial Day weekend for the third annual LoHi Trek. This hiking event will explore wild areas in Plymouth and Woodbury Counties, including portions of Broken Kettle Grassland, Five Ridge Prairie State Preserve, Heendah Hills State Preserve, Stone State Park and more. Each day's hike will average six to 10 miles, with options for shortening the distance each day. Participants are responsible for bringing their own tent and sleeping gear but will not need to carry them as the hike returns to the campsite every evening. Meals, water stations, charging stations, morning coffee, camaraderie, support and educational components are all included.

GRASS (Great Race Against Shrubs and Shade)

Held the morning before the Loess Hills Prairie Seminar, this volunteer-dependent event welcomes people of all ages to help local organizations cut and clear invasive brush to help the hillside prairies thrive. Volunteers are encouraged to bring loppers, work/leather gloves, sturdy boots or shoes, safety glasses, a water bottle and sunscreen.


Loess Hills Prairie Seminar

(loesshillsprairieseminar.com)

Save the date for this annual educational event, featuring the 2023 theme of "Head for the Hills." Held June 2-4, join conservationists, nature enthusiasts and curious explorers as they hike and camp in the heart of the Loess Hills and enjoy presentations on everything from local history and archaeological discoveries to plant identification and wildlife explanations. Primitive

and car camping are available, though there are no electrical hookups or running water. A solar-powered phone charging station and food are provided. Come for a day with the family or camp to enjoy the full experience.





PUBLIC HIKING TRAILS

Loess Hills State Forest Trails

Scan the QR code to discover trails through the Loess Hills as well as primitive camping areas. One of the most popular routes in this system is



Brent's Trail, a 13-mile stretch of dirt trail featuring unique topography. It's deemed one of the most challenging and scenic backpacking trails in the Midwest.

DRIVING / BIKING TRAILS

Loess Hills National Scenic Byway

With 220 miles for the main route and 185 extra miles of excursion loops, this scenic byway provides one of the easiest ways to enjoy lowa's Loess Hills. The route passes through dozens of charming small towns and past even more unique lowa attractions.

Wabash Trace Nature Trail

Spanning 60+ miles and crossing over 70 bridges, this scenic trail is relatively flat, making it a relaxing way to experience the Loess Hills. The trail runs from Council Bluffs to Blanchard, featuring various trailheads in between.

SCENIC OVERLOOKS / POINTS OF INTEREST

Hitchcock Nature Center, Honey Creek

Climb to the top of the observation tower for a bird's eye view of the breath-taking scenery or hike the nature trails to experience the views on foot. Then, head inside to enjoy a series of interpretive displays, exhibits and programs. mycountyparks.com; Loess Hills & Beyond

Waubonsie State Park, Hamburg

In addition to fantastic views, the park also features rustic camping cabins, hiking and multi-use trails. *iowadnr.gov; Loess Hills & Beyond*

Stone State Park, Sioux City

With several scenic overlooks, Sioux City's portion of the Loess Hills proves just as stunning. Visitors can also relax with a picnic at one of the shelters, explore the **Dorothy Pecaut Nature Center** (mycountyparks.com) and book a stay at one of three camping cabins. iowadnr.gov; Lakes & Land

Southwood Conservation Area, Smithland

Along with great views of the hills, Southwood's overlook features a selfie stand to create the perfect photo opp. The area also includes two stocked ponds, hiking and equestrian trails, picnic areas and a playground along with two one-bedroom cabins. *mycountyparks.com; Lakes & Land*

Vincent Bluff Nature Preserve, Council Bluffs

Experience a quiet and primitive spot among the rolling hills. This designated preserve features expansive views of the city along with picnic shelters and several nature trails. *councilbluffs-ia.gov; Loess Hills & Beyond*

Lewis & Clark Monument and Scenic Overlook, Council Bluffs

This spot honors the famous expedition and its meeting with the Otoe and Missouri Indians. The overlook features an expansive westward view and includes restrooms and a picnic area. Loess Hills & Beyond

Mile Hill Lake, Glenwood

Located right off Hwy 34, this 39-acre park includes an accessible scenic overlook, hardwood forest and a 10-acre fishing lake. Drive through the park and discover a series of interpretive panels, restored prairies, flowerbeds and various hiking trails. *mycountyparks.com;* Loess Hills & Beyond

Broken Kettle Grasslands Preserve, Westfield

Offering a sweeping reminder of nature's beauty, this preserve features some of the best views of the Loess Hills, including a herd of bison roaming the grounds. Though there are no hiking trails, visitors are allowed to wander or check their calendar for upcoming events. nature.org; Lakes & Land

LOESS HILLS LODGING

Kelly Madigan's Tent Airbnbs, Onawa

Grain Bin Getaway, Missouri Valley

16 STOPS ALONG THE LINCOLN HIGHWAY

ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO, the fastest way across the country was by train, and roads were only a way of traveling locally. The Lincoln Highway changed that when it was announced in 1913, eventually becoming the first transcontinental road stretching from Times Square in New York City to San Francisco, California. Today, the route is celebrating its 110th anniversary of leading travelers to the nation's charming small towns and stunning rural landscapes. Take a tour of lowa's portion of the Lincoln Highway with these 16 must-stop attractions.



1. THE LYONS-FULTON BRIDGE, CLINTON

Start your journey by crossing into lowa on the Lyons-Fulton Bridge, which was once one of the highway's most stunning bridges. Opened in July of 1891, the original bridge connected the cities of Lyons, Iowa (which merged with Clinton) and Fulton, Illinois. Back then, it was the only way to cross that section of the Mississippi and therefore the main reason the Lincoln Highway was routed there.



This park marks the historic crossing of two original transnational highways, the Lincoln Highway and the Blues Highway (Hwy 61). The notable crossing is marked at an intersection next to Lincoln Park, which features a crossroads emblem on the road and placard in the park. Today, the park includes modern amenities such as picnic shelters, playground equipment and public restrooms, making for a perfect stopping point on your journey west. parks.cityofdewittiowa.org; Storied & Scenic

3. ABANDONED SECTION OF HIGHWAY, CALAMUS

Between Calamus and Clarence, you can quite literally get off the beaten path and experience an abandoned section of the Lincoln Highway. This specific stretch was removed from the route in 1956 when a new two-lane road was built. Though the original road is not drive-able, it makes for a peaceful place to take a stroll. *Storied & Scenic*

4. HISTORIC LINCOLN HOTEL B&B, LOWDEN

Take a break from your travels with an overnight stay at the Historic Lincoln Hotel B&B, which marks the crossroads of the Lincoln Highway with the Hoover Highway. Built in 1915 then renovated in 1996, the hotel has since been placed on the National Register of Historic Places and won the residential Preservation at Its Best Award from the Iowa Historic Preservation Alliance. Today, the hotel offers four modern suites along with a small-town setting and beautiful rural scenery. *lincolnhoteliowa.com; Storied & Scenic*



5. UNION PACIFIC BRIDGE, MOUNT VERNON

Built in 1910, this historic bridge has since been restored to its original pony truss structure. Located on 10th Avenue NW between Prairie Park and Van Metre Field, you can drive a short stretch of the road's original brick path up to the bridge, then walk across it to enjoy the views and historic structure. Storied & Scenic

6. FIRST PAVED SECTION OF THE LINCOLN HIGHWAY, LINN COUNTY


The first major metropolitan area on the route features lowa's first paved mile of the Lincoln Highway called the "Seedling Mile." Located halfway between Marion and Mount Vernon on what is now Mount Vernon Road, a mile-long stretch was paved in 1918-19 as a demonstration for the benefits of concrete roadways and road travel before the entire highway was paved by 1931. Though the original concrete Seedling Mile was paved over in 2002 as part of a reconstruction project, a memorial plaque maintains the Seedling Mile's legacy. The original Lincoln Highway used to route through Marion, which was then the Linn County seat, but the current route takes travelers directly from Mount Vernon to Cedar Rapids. *Storied & Scenic*

7. THE YOUNGVILLE CAFÉ, WATKINS

Built in the 1930s as a one-stop filling station/eatery, Youngville was started by a father and his widowed daughter in response to the heavily traveled highway and operated until 1967. Located on the corner of Hwys 30 and 218, the café once served all traveler needs from providing hearty meals, stocking general grocery items, housing slot machines and offering cabins for overnight stays. Though the cabins and other items are long gone, Youngville's family-friendly atmosphere and meals remain. After going through a restoration project, it was added to the National Register of Historic Places. Today, the café offers a unique seasonal attraction from June - September, during which they serve lunch on Tuesdays and Thursdays and host weekly farmers' markets. Storied & Scenic

8. LINCOLN CAFÉ, BELLE PLAINE

If you love soup or chili, then the Lincoln Café is a must stop along old Lincoln Highway. Opened in 1928, the café has since gone through several owners and renovations to today offer a small-town dining experience paired with modern seating and great service. They serve breakfast all day along with an impressive lunch and dinner menu, though their homemade soups continue to be the most popular. Belle Plaine is also home to more historic sites, including the Belle Plaine Museum, the Herring Hotel and King Theatre. *Storied & Scenic*



9. WATSON'S GROCERY STORE MUSEUM, STATE CENTER

Built in 1895 and in business until 1989, Watson's Grocery Store has remained virtually unchanged and has since become a recognized landmark and museum. Step inside to see stocked oak shelves, roll-top bins and ice boxes. Sturdy benches and chairs still await farmers who once stopped there to trade fresh produce for grocery items. The museum is open Memorial Day – Labor Day on weekends from 1–4 p.m. *Capital Country*

10. REED/NILAND CORNER, COLO

Another one-stop shop along the Lincoln Highway, the Reed/Niland Corner was run by two local families to provide gas, food and lodging to travelers on the Lincoln and Jefferson Highways. Today, visitors can still enjoy a hearty meal from Niland's Café or enjoy a night in a room at the Colo Hotel, both owned by a local family who are passionate about preserving the community's history. The café and surrounding areas also include original Lincoln and Jefferson Highway markers. *Capital Country*

11. AMES HISTORY MUSEUM, AMES

As you wander through Ames, be sure to stop by the Ames History Museum, which shares area history including historic photos of the Lincoln Highway and important figures from the community. You can also stretch your legs with a visit to Reiman Gardens and the Brunnier Art Museum. Or stroll through lowa State's campus and visit the Durham Center to learn about the creation, history and development of the first electronic digital computer. *ameshistory.org; Capital Country*

12. BOONE & SCENIC VALLEY RAILROAD, BOONE

Get off the roads and enjoy the sights from the Lincoln Highway's predecessor - railroads! This railway started in 1893 and has since been reclaimed as The Boone and Scenic Valley Railroad to offer visitors a variety of rail adventures. Hop aboard the train for a 15-mile trip through the Des Moines River Valley and over the stunning Bass Point Creek High Trestle Bridge. Or pay a visit to the site's new addition, the Rail Explorers, which takes you along the same route, but on a rail bike. bsvrr.com; Capital Country



13. MAHANAY BELL TOWER, JEFFERSON

After enjoying views from bridges and railroads, it only makes sense to add a bird's eye option to the list. Stop by the Mahanay Bell Tower in Jefferson to take in the sights and unique sounds. Located on the town square, the 14-story carillon features an enclosed observation deck where visitors can admire the community and its collection of rooftop murals. The tower's 47 bells chime throughout the year and carillon concerts are performed by local musicians, so you're likely to catch some tunes on your visit. The tower is open daily from Memorial Day – September and weekends in May and October. mahanaybelltower.org; Loess Hills & Beyond

14. CHICAGO AT NORTHWESTERN RAILROAD DEPOT & PARK, CARROLL

Dive into railroad history at Carroll's historic train depot. Built in 1896 and used for passenger service until 1959, the depot has since been placed on the National Register of Historic Places. Today, the building and its exterior grounds are open for self-guided tours to learn more about railroad and community history. carrolliowa.com; Loess Hills & Beyond

15. LONGEST INTACT BRICK PORTION OF THE LINCOLN HIGHWAY, WOODBINE

Experience true 1900s views along Woodbine's portion of the Lincoln Highway. Recognized as the longest intact portion of the route left, the tree-lined route features picturesque homes and restored canopy gas stations. Choose one to stop at for lunch or a snack along with local history and Lincoln Highway memorabilia. Other area historic sites include the Woodbine Carnegie Public Library, Merry Brook Rural School Museum and the Harrison County Genealogy Office. Loess Hills & Beyond

16. HARRISON COUNTY HISTORICAL VILLAGE AND WELCOME CENTER, MISSOURI VALLEY




DAY ONE


Spend the afternoon exploring the **Palmer Museum of Chiropractic History** (palmer.edu), where

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

Flavors of the Farm

CHEF TURNS IOWA PRODUCE INTO PLATED ART

Des Moines-based chef Aaron Holt, a culinary consultant for Sysco and the chef of farm-to-table meals across the state, knows just where to find all the best ingredients: lowa's small farms.

Aaron learned the value of fresh ingredients from a young age after a childhood of cooking made-from-scratch meals with ingredients from his mom's garden. His love for food drew him into the restaurant industry at age 15, when he started as a dishwasher and worked his way up over the years to server, line cook and general manager.

After working at various restaurants in the Des Moines area and being named the Iowa Restaurant
Association Chef of the Year in
2018, Aaron finally started making a name for himself as a self-taught chef. While he was excited to land the corporate job with Sysco, he was still searching for a more creative outlet.

Now, Aaron is working toward creating his own scenic venue at his mom's family farm, Doolittle Farm in Story City, which was built by his great grandfather in 1905 and includes a historic farmhouse and barn, nine acres of timber and, of course, a vegetable and herb garden. As the land's fourthgeneration owner, he strives to invite guests to admire his family's land and run the venue full-time hosting rustic dinners in the house and barn, eventually offering a farm Airbnb experience and cooking demonstrations.


Until then, he continues delighting lowans and visitors alike with his delightful creations, from seared duck with fall risotto to spring toast with beet-cured deviled egg. As his farm-to-table meals branch into Minnesota and other neighboring states, his support will always lie with small lowa farms.



"Bringing this kind of good food and local produce to small lowa towns that may not have a lot of healthy options, and putting it in a beautiful setting, just adds to the value and appeal," Aaron said. "And I want to bring that value to our family farm. My mom was floored by the fact that I wanted to keep the land, but I decided that's where I want to set my roots."
