To report and make recommendations to the general assembly of the activities of the Commission and improvements and additional resources needed to promote the general welfare of the aging in Iowa.

HELPFUL ORGANIZATIONS AND AGENCIES

You or your group may be just the sparkplug needed to get the people of your community moving toward developing, improving or expanding programs and services for the older citizens among you.

The strongest programs and services, those in which there is the most pride and the most likelihood of permanence, are those which originate at home and are supported at home. Success is usually in direct ratio to the extent that <u>local</u> people, groups, institutions, and government are involved.

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First of all, remember that established senior citizen clubs are most helpful of all. Obviously these groups should be utilized.

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A wise step at the beginning is to consult with appropriate local or county governmental offices and private agencies. Stress local support from the outset.

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In smaller communities, the church (or churches) is often the key organization to approach to get activity going. Many churches, of course, have their own senior citizen clubs within the church. Other churches reach outside their own congregations into the entire community with senior programs. Either way, churches have much to offer in the aging field and should be sought out.
