

Latinos in Iowa: 2023

Latino Heritage Month: September 15 – October 15

During this month, Iowa and the United States celebrate the cultures and traditions of U.S. residents who trace their roots to the Caribbean Islands, Central America, Mexico, and South America. What started in 1968, when Congress authorized President Lyndon B. Johnson to proclaim a week in September as National Hispanic Heritage Week, expanded in 1988 to a month-long celebration of people living in the U.S. with heritage from Spanish-speaking nations in Latin America and Spain. September 15th was chosen as the starting point for the celebration because it is the anniversary of independence from Spanish colonization in five Latin American countries: Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Nicaragua. In addition, Mexico and Chile celebrate their independence days on September 16th.

Percentage of Latino population under age 5 as of July 1, 2022. Latinos have one of the highest concentration of preschoolers among the other race or ethnic groups.

The population in Iowa who self-identify themselves as Hispanic or Latino origin according to the 2022 Annual Population Estimates. This group comprises 6.9% of Iowa's total population.

The projected Latino population of Iowa as of July 1, 2060. According to the 2023 Woods & Poole Economics Inc., Latinos will constitute 14.8 percent of the state's total population on that date.

The number of Latino families in 2022 who resided in Iowa. Of these families, 64.7 percent include related children under 18 years of age.

1,971

The number of Latino grandparents in 2022 living with their own grandchildren. 38.9% of those are responsible for the own grandchildren under 18 years of age.

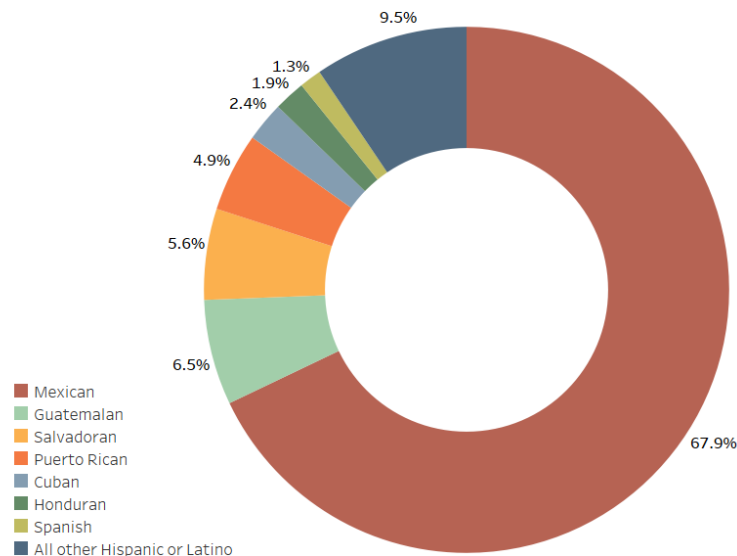

The unemployment rate of Iowa Latinos in 2022. In comparison the state of Iowa's unemployment rate was **2.0%**.

The 2022 median earnings for Latinos in Iowa. The median earnings for the state of Iowa was **\$41,625**.

The median earnings for Latino males in 2022 who worked full-time, year-round.

\$37,917

The median earnings for Latina women in Iowa. In comparison the median earning for men and women in the state of Iowa were **\$59,736** and **\$48,239** respectively.

Latinos: Individuals living in the U.S. whose ancestors originate from the Caribbean Islands, Central America, Mexico, and South America, all countries that were colonized by Spaniards other European countries. Latinos speak French, Italian, Spanish, Portuguese and many indigenous languages.

Latinx is a gender-neutral term that is used as an alternative to Latino/Latina/Latin@.

The term **Hispanic** refers to people whose heritage is derived from Spanish speaking countries - the term is about language and doesn't include people from Brazil who speak Portuguese, French Guiana, Guadeloupe, Haiti, Martinique, Saint Barthélemy and Saint Martin who speak French.

The percent of Iowa Latinos in 2022 who are foreign-born.

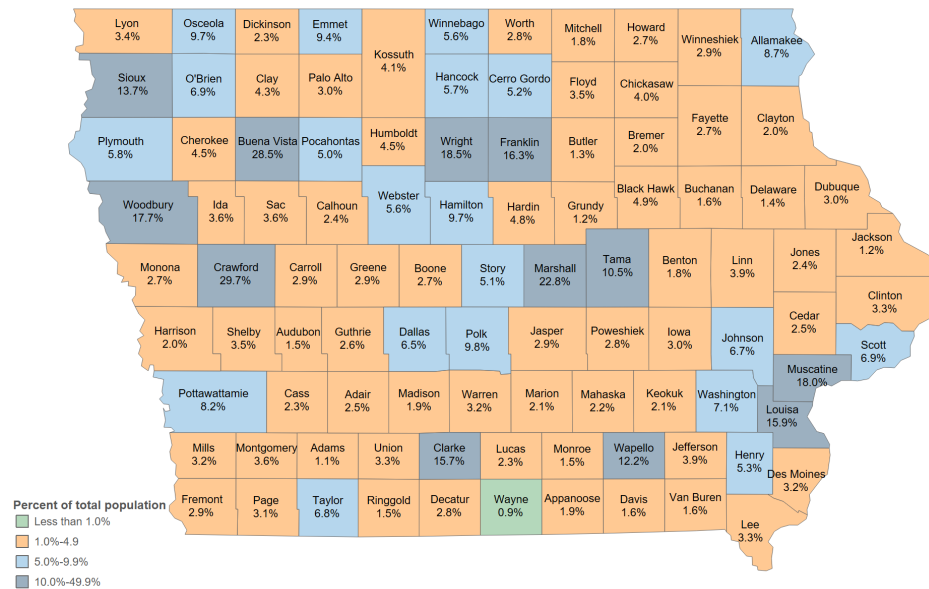

The number of foreign-born Iowans in 2022 who were born in Mexico, by far more than any other Latin American country or any other country in the world. Other Latin American countries of origin with a large foreign-born population are El Salvador (**5,914**), Cuba (**2,741**), Colombia (**1,844**) and Brazil (**1,472**).

Latinos in Iowa Counties

The number of Latinos in Polk County in 2022, making it the largest population of Latinos in any county at **21.2%** of the state-wide population.

56.6%
Over half of the total 2022 Latino population live in eight counties Polk, Woodbury, Scott, Marshall, Johnson, Linn, Pottawattamie, and Muscatine.

30.6%
The percent of total population in Crawford County who are Latino in 2022. Other Iowa counties with a high percentage of Latinos are Buena Vista (**27.9%**), Marshall (**25.7%**), Woodbury (**19.2%**) and Muscatine (**19.1%**).

53.1%
Over half of the growth in Iowa's Latino population from 2010-2022 occurred in seven counties: Polk, Woodbury, Scott, Johnson, Marshall, Linn, and Dallas. The Latino population in Audubon increased by **343.2%** and by **198.0%** in Ida county between 2010 and 2022.
