Hepatitis C elimination planning: Regional meetings

lowa HHS is hosting nine regional meetings across lowa during October and November where attendees can help craft the strategies that will make elimination of hepatitis C in Iowa a reality. The goal is to have a variety of partners, stakeholders, and community members in attendance to ensure that a wide range of unique perspectives and experiences are represented. School illness, absenteeism reporting information updated for 2023-24 respiratory season

lowa HHS has released new online surveys for school illness and absenteeism reporting for the 2023-24 respiratory surveillance season, which begins October I. There are two main systems lowa HHS uses for school illness surveillance: one for daily illness absenteeism at or above 10% of total attendees, and one for weekly illness regardless of the percent of absenteeism. Data is reported in the weekly *lowa Respiratory Virus Surveillance Report*.

lowa HHS needs your help to make sure school illness data represents all of lowa. Currently, the east and east central parts of the state are well represented, but reporting from more schools in other areas of the state is needed to better track illness throughout lowa.

All Iowa K-12 schools (and attached preschools) are asked to report when 10% or more of total enrollment is absent on any given day due to illness. Although the survey is administered by the Iowa Influenza Surveillance Program, school illness data is used to monitor increases in illness of any kind and detect possible outbreaks.

lowa HHS also asks schools to voluntarily report the number of student absences each week, regardless of the amount or type of illness. Iowa uses this data track weekly and yearly trends in school illness.

Both systems use an online survey to submit data.
