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
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

WILL WINTER COME THIS YEAR?

How are you at predicting weather? Our typing teacher, Mrs. Gripp, has an interest in predicting weather. Here are some superstitions she uses to help her with her forecasts:

Did you know crickets chirp faster when it's warm and slower when it's cold? Beware when corn husks are thick and cling together to the ear, you can expect a rough, bad winter. When you see squirrels burying nuts, expect nothing more than a hard winter. Have you ever noticed animals furs growing heavier? This is a sign of a hard winter, also.

Mr. "Wooley Worm" has a warning for us too! When he becomes dark all over, there will be a hard winter, beginning with early fall and extending into late spring. But that's not all about Mr. Wooley. If he is dark at both ends and light in the middle, this means a bad fall and spring with a mild winter.

Also, other kinds of things can be predicted about the weather. When ants travel in a straight line, expect rain. When they scatter, expect fair weather. Have you ever noticed cattle, sheep, or horses collecting in a huddle? Look for a storm coming in the direction in which they turn their backs. How about trying to hang a bucket on the moon? It surely will bring dry weather. A frost in the light of the moon will not harm vegetation.

Here are some interesting facts about December. The first three days of December will determine the weather for the next three months. For example, the weather on December 1 will rule the weather for December. December 2's weather will rule the weather in January and so on.

Here are some ways to predict rainy weather: If it rains on Monday it will rain for the next three days during that week. If it rains on Easter Sunday, there will be rain sometime during the twenty-four hours on the next seven Sundays. If rain begins to fall before 7:00 A. M., it should stop before 11:00 A. M. Just remember, "Rain before seven quits before eleven".

The day of the month on which the first tracking snow occurs determines the number of snows we are to have during the winter. Since our first tracking snow came on November 13, this means we are supposed to have thirteen tracking snows this winter. I think it would be sort of interesting for us to keep track of the snows and see if the prediction is right.

Mrs. Gripp was asked how she would predict the weather for the winter. She said "The "oldsters" predict a long, hard winter ahead of us, but so far the "wooley worm" has had a very light colored coat, which should predict a light winter. Then too, the animals have not grown an unusually heavy fur this fall. This too points to a rather mild winter."

What are your predictions for this winter? Let's hope Mrs. Gripp's prediction for a mild winter is more correct than the "oldsters" prediction of a long, hard winter!



During this training course you will acquire a thorough knowledge of hair styling, hair designing, hair cutting, and shaping, permanent waving, shampooing, hair coloring, manicuring, facial treatment, shop management, personal grooming, wiggery, and advanced hair styling. Actual shop experience is gained by the work you will do on the many patrons.

The total cost of the cosmetology course is approximately \$450.00. This includes textbooks, supplies, and equipment. Tuition is approximately \$385.00, the total fee may be paid at one time or on a time program.

Some schools offer a special program for students to attend classes during the summer months between their junior and senior years in high school. These students will return to high school in September for their senior year and after high school graduation, go back to continue their training in cosmetology. By using this method, the student may receive her hairstyling college diploma nearly three months sooner.




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

A TOUCH OF EXCITEMENT





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
