LINK CRIME TO FOOD OR IS IT? FOOD TO CRIME? San Diego (UPI) -- Drinking too much milk while consuming too few fruits and vegetables, may drive some youths to crime, a behavioral researcher says.

Alexander G. Schauss, director of the Institute for Biosocial Research at City College in Tacoma, Wash., said studies of juvenile delinquents and other youths have shown an apparent relationship between heavy milk drinking and anti-social behavior.

"I am not saying milk is bad," Schauss told a convention of the Society of Clinical Ecology in San Diego Sunday. "But like everything else it should be consumed in moderation." Comparing the diets of young criminals with those of adolescents from similar backgrounds, he said, he discovered the deliquents drank up to 10 times the normal amount of milk, while shunning fruits, nuts, and vegetables.

"It's important to note that along with this compulsive intake of milk, there is a compulsive behavior, too," Schauss said.

(Comment: We always learn of these important findings too late in life. My mother began "pushing" milk to us youngsters at an early age. How were we to know the dangers? Even in school they used to make us "up the milk money" so we could partake of the milk that tasted as if it had been kept on the radiator until "milk break." Yet, when I first became involved with crime they blamed my poor environment, the young gang I hung around with, and our drinking booze and skipping school. All the time it was the milk! Hell, I lived in Wisconsin which now has the cloud hanging over it as being the Dairy State. I sonder if I can now explain all of this "new understanding of my. behavioral problems" to the parole board and if they would then understand also and release me if I promised not to drink too much milk and eat my share of fruits and vegetables? It's worth a try. Nothing else seems to work with them.

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HUNDREDS CONDEMN MARION CONTROL UNIT. An estimated 400 people marched in Chicago this November to protest both the Prison Control Unit at the Marion federal penitentiary and the upcoming trials of 17 inmates facing the death penalty as a result of the 1978 rebellion at the state prison in Pontiac.

Some nine men have committed suicide in the Prison Control Unit since it was set up in 1972 to break an inmate work stoppage. It is the highest suicide rate in the federal prison system.

Marion Federal Prison was built in 1962 to replace Alcatraz as the maximum-security prison in the U.S. Men are held in indefinite solitary confinement in the control unit. They are housed in 9 x 12' cells, $23\frac{1}{2}$ hours a day for as long as four years.

The Prison Control Unit is currently being used as a model for other prisons.

POLICY AND PROCEDURES GUIDELINES: Christmas Packages for Adult Institutions

The following are articles which may be sent in Christmas packages. However, it should be kept in mind that a canteen is available to all residents and is well stocked with reasonably priced articles which are allowed on the Christmas list.

We suggest a Christmas gift of money. This would save postage, and yet give the resident an opportunity to purchase the article of his choice. In sending money to residents, use draft or money orders made payable to the Warden. DO NOT SEND CASH OR PERSONAL CHECKS. DO NOT SEND DRAFTS IN THE CHRISTMAS BOXES, USE A SEPERATE LETTER.

Vacuum canned candy Vacuum canned meats Vacuum canned nut meats T-shirts (no lettering or symbols) Sweat shirts (no lettering, symbols or hoods) Knit undershorts Socks Blue Jeans Pajamas Handkerchiefs Shoes (New - conventional) Belts (buckle not to exceed 9 sq. in.) Newspapers & magazine subscriptions (Direct from Publisher) Gloves and mittens Ball point pens

Pencils Cigarettes (5 carton limit) Tobacco pouches Cigarette cases Cigarette lighters (gas lighters not allowed) Pipes Combs Hair brushes (without handles) Tooth brushes Shoe shine kits (without polish) Sewing kits Razors (electric or safety) Photographs without frames or glass

The packages should not be wrapped in fancy wrappings as all packages are opened for inspection. DO NOT SEND EDIBLES IN GLASS CONTAINERS. The packages must be sent from December 1st through December 15th. The package cannot exceed 20 pounds. It is suggested that friends and relatives combine their gifts in one or two packages, taking the amount of poundage into consideration. Up to five cartons of cigarettes can be sent. DO NOT SEND ANY ITEM WHICH IS NOT SHOWN ON THE ABOVE LIST.

So as to avoid confusion, the following restrictions will apply to the Christmas list.

- 1. Jeans Solid blue denim or denim in appearance, with moderate flare and machine washable, flare not to exceed 12 inches.
- Underwear/socks Limit of (5) undershorts, socks, and t-shirts, excluding state issue. Underwear will also include "long johns" and thermals.
- 3. Shirts/sweat shirts Multi-colored (non-tie dyed) machine washable casual and dress shirts, including tank tops, muscle shirts, etc., without beading, lettering, symbols or pictures are permitted. A limit of five (5) shirts, including state issue, will be permitted. A maximum of two non-hooded solid color sweat shirts, machine washable, without symbols, pictures, beading, or lettering will be allowed.
- 4. Shoes New shoes without exaggerated heels or soles, maximum height of heel to be l¹₂", maximum of sole ¹₂". New shoes are not to exceed 7¹₂" from bottom of heel to top of the shoe. Shoes will not be permitted which have hollow heels and/or soles. Hiking, mountain, steel toes, or other type of specialty shoes will not be permitted.
- Books/Magazines Only new books, magazines and newspapers are to be sent directly from the publisher. All printed materials are subject to divisional policy and limitations.

THIS STRANCE LETTER APPEARED IN THE CEDAR RAPIDS GAZETTE....."In response to the letter, "Rehabilitate?" Nov. 16, I, too, was at Fort Madison. I feel the officials could do more, but it is truly up to the individual to rehabilitate himself.

A prison inmate has the opportunity to work, and while confined for five or 10 years one can accumulate a sizable sum in savings from work done. Though pay is only \$20-40 per month, even saving half of that in a 12-month period would net \$120-240 per year over 10 years. That's over a thousand dollars.

Some men, though, choose to spend most of their time in "the hole" or in lockup because of attacks on other residents or staff. The choice is up to the ex-offender, not the state. People put themselves in prison, not the state."

Let's face it, there isn't much happening in here of which we can write about. A ham or steak sandwich can mean the only difference in one day from endless others. If other departments are doing something newsworthy they can let us know and we will write about it.

THE CYCLE OF FAILURE: It is not surprising that "progress" seems so slow in a prison setting. Maybe it is that way in all institutions. "hen the staff or the staff and prisoners finally work out a solution to a particular problem and a memo or policy is issued to make the needed change, you would think that would be all that is needed and the staff and prisoners could then go on to other problems or go happily on their way. Not so!

Within weeks the same problem will resurface again and again and the process of solving it will take additional time and energy. Some department personnel will always find a way around any policy if their attitudes are the same as they were before. This not only burdens us with the same problem again and again but affectively keeps staff and prisoners from going on toward further progress, whatever that progress is viewed as.

My favorite humorous newspaper column is "The Iron Duke" written by Bill Severin in the Waterloo Courier. Bill Severin pretends to be politically on the right of Regan and William Buckley and can double you up with laughter at his tongue-in-cheek, pseudo-solutions to the nation's problems. I hope his liver holds out so he can write for many more years.
