Inaugural '87

On election night in November, Governor Terry Branstad told Iowans, "We must work in harmony to make Iowa the best it can be." That is the challenge the Governor demands of himself and asks of all Iowans as we set a course for Iowa for the 1990s and the 21st century.

Inaugural Day 1987 will begin a new four-year term for Governor Terry E. Branstad, but it also marks the start of the Governor's fifteenth year in service to the people of Iowa. During his first term as Governor, Terry Branstad earned respect as a leader who brought Iowans together behind the state's top priority, economic development. Today, the State of Iowa works hand in hand with local communities and their leaders to create jobs for Iowans, and Governor Branstad has laid a strong foundation to make Iowa a tough competitor in the quest for business development. The Governor's aggressive leadership is restoring pride in Iowa, in ourselves and in our future.

The Governor's strategy is a three-part plan for economic development that is successful in creating new jobs. The plan calls for improving the business climate. In four years, Iowa has gone from 35th in the nation to 22nd.

The Governor's goal is to make Iowa one of the top ten states in the nation. The plan calls for assistance to small and existing businesses. The Governor established an effective array of local economic development incentives and tools to help small business prosper. And finally, the plan calls for promoting and marketing Iowa and quality Iowa products. Governor Branstad is known as the state's top salesman, leading economic development missions across the country and around the world. When he proposed Iowa Homecoming '86, not even Governor Branstad imagined how successful the project would be, bringing former Iowans home and bringing recognition and pride to every community in the state.

The Governor tied excellence in education to our economic development efforts. He increased the state's commitment to education. Today our universities and colleges play important roles in research and development that can lead to increased jobs and a revitalized economy.

Iowa students today lead the nation in college entrance examinations, but Governor Branstad knows that today's students will compete in a world economy tomorrow. Best in the nation

today must become best in the world tomorrow. That is why Governor Branstad has a major commitment to excellence in education for the next four years. He has pledged new funds for higher teachers' salaries and quality education to keep Iowa's education system the best it can be.

At the Governor's request, proceeds from the Inaugural Ball will be donated to the First in the Nation in Education (FINE) Foundation. FINE funds research in pursuit of excellence at all levels of education.

Governor Branstad demands results from the state's investments in economic development and education. He also demands efficiency and effectiveness in the administration of state government.

Faced with the choice of raising taxes or making across-the-board cuts in government services, Governor Branstad sought another solution to keep the state's budget in balance and live within the state's means. Governor Branstad's solution is streamlined state government.

During his first term, the Governor proposed and achieved an historic, comprehensive reorganization of state government. The number of state agencies was cut from 68 to 24 and

over 1,100 positions were eliminated through careful management and attrition, without painful layoffs.

Nebraska is one of several states using Iowa's reorganization as a model of an efficient and effective way to perform the services people need without giving in to continual growth in government. Governor Branstad plans to continue to look at new ways to cut costs and direct resources to the priorities for Iowa's future.

As a chief executive, Governor Branstad has earned the respect of his peers in other states across the nation. He is the Chairman of the Midwest Governors' Association and the Chairman of the Committee on Agriculture for the National Governors' Association.

Today, Iowa's family farmers are facing the worst agricultural crisis since the Great Depression. Governor Branstad knows the situation firsthand. He is a farmer and his family's farm is over 100 years old. He is working hard to make sure the Iowa family farmer survives the transition which agriculture is going through. He is recognized nationally as an advocate for America's farmers.

The Governor has made rural eco-

conomic development the top priority of midwestern governors and has worked with farmers, other government leaders and experts in farm credit to help individual farmers and to restructure farm debt.

During the Governor's first term, a Farmer Creditor Mediation Service and Rural Concern Hotline helped farmers find answers to their problems, and a state interest rate buy-down on operating loans helped keep over one thousand farmers at work on their land.

Governor Branstad invoked a limited moratorium against farm foreclosures and took on the Farm Credit System in court and bureaucrats in the halls of Congress and the White House when their policies threatened the future of the family farm.

During his next term, the Governor plans to work with other leaders to recommend changes in farm policies to improve prices, expand markets and revitalize the economy in rural America. He plans to host a World Food Conference and to expand markets through a program already started which will market Iowa certified quality grain. The Governor supports efforts to help farmers find profitable ways to diversify operations and

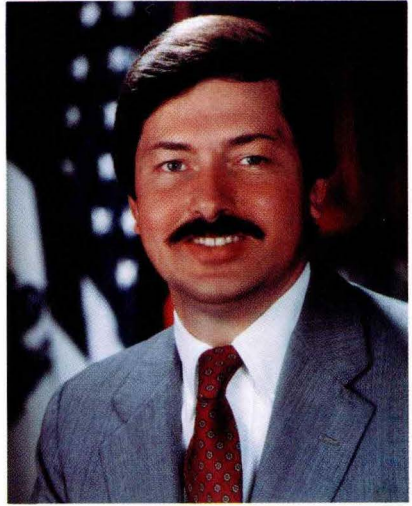
supports research into new areas of biotechnology, which can create new markets.

Governor Branstad looks beyond our borders in his efforts to revitalize agriculture. An articulate spokesman and statesman, he has led trade and marketing missions to the Soviet Union, Japan, China and Israel.

The Governor and his wife, Chris, provide a stable home at Terrace Hill for their three children, Eric, age 11, Allison, 9 and Marcus, 3. The Branstad family maintains an active schedule filled with official events, piano recitals, baseball games and family activities.

Chris Branstad became an active spokeswoman during the Governor's first term, promoting the arts and culture in Iowa. She established a First Lady's Piano Scholarship. Mrs. Branstad focused her energies in health, public safety and family issues. She has served as honorary chair of the Juvenile Diabetes Foundation, the Iowa Head Injury Association, the Iowa Safety Council, the American Lung Association of Iowa and the Salvation Army's Tree of Lights. She is a director of the Convalescent Home for Children and of Project HOPE.

Governor Terry E. Branstad

Re-elected as Iowa's 39th Governor, Terry Branstad is bringing leadership, experience and vision to the State House. He served in the Iowa House of Representatives from 1973 to 1978 and as Lieutenant Governor from 1979 through 1983.

Born to Rita and Edward Branstad in 1946 on a small farm near Leland, Iowa, Terry Branstad was raised on the land he loves. He graduated from the University of Iowa in 1969 and went on to receive his law degree at Drake University Law School in 1974. Governor Branstad served in the Army for two years during the Vietnam Conflict and received the Army Commendation Medal.

Jo Ann Zimmerman was born on December 24, 1936 in Van Buren County to Russell and Hazel McIntosh. She graduated in 1954 from Keosauqua High School and from Broadlawns School of Nursing in 1958. She received her B.A. from Drake University in 1973 and has done graduate work at Iowa State University. In 1956 she married Tom Zimmerman. Jo Ann and Tom have three sons and two daughters.

She is a health planner and a registered nurse and has served on the Iowa PTA Board, the

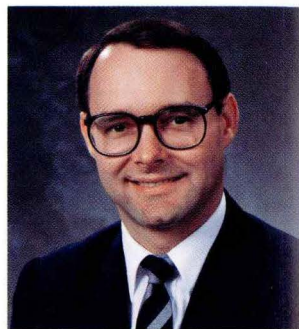


Elaine Baxter

Elaine Baxter, 53, of Burlington received her Bachelor's degree in International Affairs at the University of Illinois and earned a Master of Science degree in Urban Planning from the University of Iowa.

She was elected to the Burlington City Council in 1973 and served on the board of directors of the League of Iowa Municipalities. In 1979 she was appointed to the Office of Legislation and Congressional Relations at the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development in Washington, D.C. She was elected to the Iowa House of Representatives in a special election in 1982 and represented the 60th Legislative District for three terms.

State Treasurer

Michael L. Fitzgerald, 35, is beginning his second term as Treasurer of State. When first elected in 1982, he was the youngest Treasurer in the state's history. He is a graduate of Colo Community High School and received a B.A. degree from the University of Iowa in Business Administration in 1974. He worked as a marketing analyst for Massey Ferguson for eight years. Mr. Fitzgerald and his wife Shari (Wildman) Fitzgerald have a son, Ryan, and a daughter, Erin.

In October 1985, he began an appointment to the Auditing Standards Board of the American Institute of CPAs, becoming the first Iowan to serve on the Board. Mr. Johnson is married with four children.

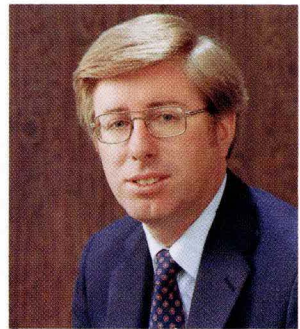


Dale M. Cochran
