



Dear Iowans:

Early Childhood Iowa is pleased to share the 2014 annual report. As a volunteer to this effort, I'm proud to play a small part in the programs, services and activities that support our youngest children and their families. As this initiative grows and matures, this report shares information about the results from the cadre of services and system improvements being supported with ECI funding.

Early Childhood Iowa (ECI) is founded on the premise that government and communities can work together so that 'every child, beginning at birth, will be healthy and successful'. Recognizing the importance of the first 2000 days of a young child's development (ages 0- until kindergarten entry), the Early Childhood Iowa Board engages in efforts to unite agencies, organizations, and community partners to speak with a shared voice and meet a set of legislated results on behalf of all young children and families.

In our work over the last year, we have been reminded about the importance of investing early. A child's brain develops so rapidly in their first years, it is almost impossible for us to imagine. By age five, about 90% of our brains are developed. The circuits for key functions such as vision/hearing, language, and higher cognitive function develop most in the first five years of life. The creation of these circuits is affected by a child's early learning experiences.

There are currently 39 ECI Areas that cover the entire state, each area with its own leadership and locally-developed community plan. In those areas, local board members and community partners come together to build stronger local services as described in their community plans. In this report, you will see a highlight of the results of their efforts through program performance measures. The compilation of data was submitted by each board in an electronic data gathering system this year.

Within this report, the Early Childhood Iowa State Board, the ECI Stakeholders Alliance, area boards, and programs and service providers reflect constant change, adaption and leadership to support partnerships that strengthen our early care, health, and education system. Their work keeps the greatest needs of our youngest Iowans at the forefront. Their voices can't be ignored if our state is to be a leader in the education, economic and global sectors.

Early Childhood Iowa is ready, able and positioned to help bridge those platforms and build a future generation of Iowans who will stay, work and prosper in this great state. Thanks to everyone who contributed to this worthy effort.

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ECI Overview

The vision for Early Childhood Iowa is, "Every child, beginning at birth, will be healthy and successful." There is no single strategy to make this happen. It takes a system of systems for a child to reach their potential. These individual systems include early care, health and education. The ECI State Board, the ECI Stakeholder Alliance and local ECI Area Boards are charged with developing, supporting and maintaining effective, efficient and integrated systems.

ECI was first approved in legislation in 1998 but was known then as Iowa Community Empowerment. In 2008, state policy makers enacted Early Childhood Iowa for state system development. In 2010, the two initiatives were brought together under the banner of Early Childhood Iowa. The founding legislation for ECI established results to be achieved at both the state and local level.

The current reality in Iowa is that programs, policies, and systems are inadequate to do all the work necessary. In order to achieve the results, ECI has adopted a system-wide strategic plan and the goals below to focus and guide their work with limited resources in developing an integrated and quality early childhood system of systems for young children and their families:

- Support a collaborative and effective early childhood system;
- Provide support and leadership for quality early childhood programs and services;
- Provide intentional leadership and support to ensure at-risk and high needs children have access to quality services.

ECI System Activities and Accomplishments to support these goals in FY14 include:

- 10 local ECI Boards have achieved Quality or Model designations; the two top levels of the Levels of Excellence Rating System.
- The State Board approved a revised Levels of Excellence process and tools.

- The State Board conducted a site visit to the Clinton/Jackson ECI area, meeting with local board members, program providers.
- The State Board adopted the state performance measures and updated the parameters for the Early Childhood funding as it was changed from federal sources to state general funding.
- The Stakeholder Alliance supported a higher education summit to address the preparation of early childhood personnel, including more streamlined teacher preparation and field experiences.
- The Stakeholder Alliance, through its Professional Development Component Group, developed a recommended framework for approving early childhood trainings across the health, early learning, and family support sectors.
- The Stakeholder Alliance, through its Equity Advisory Committee, created and delivered cultural competence training across the ECI system
- With the support of ECI, the Iowa Association of Infant and Early Childhood Mental Health was established to support and provide professional development to mental health professionals and family support workers.
- In collaboration with United Way of East Central Iowa developed and is in the process of piloting tools and processes for analyzing data and developing strategies for serving and supporting at-risk and high needs young children and their families.

Accountability for results continues to be the hallmark of ECI. The following pages showcase the data collected by ECI.

When looking at this information, it is important to realize that the Early Childhood Iowa initiative is not a program in and of itself. Instead, ECI funds are legislated to support existing local programs and services or funding a new program that does not exist by filling gaps – most often by allowing additional families/children to be served, or by improving the quality of the services provided. As the coordinating body within their ECI area, it is the ECI Area Board's responsibility to pull the community together to collectively determine thestrengths, gaps and weaknesses of the community to serve families and young children. Ultimately, the board makes funding decisions that will impact the priorities determined through the strategic planning process.

Presentation of the Report Data:

The data within this report is organized by Result area and showcases information at the state level (indicators), as well as local program data. The presentation of the data utilizes the following sequence:

Results

At its inception in 1998, legislation established five results to be achieved, both statewide and at the local level. ECI (then Community Empowerment) utilized the Accountable Government Act as the standard for measuring progress toward accountability. A result is defined as "the effect desired for all Iowans". The legislated results are:

- Healthy Children
- Children Ready to Succeed in School
- Safe and Supportive Communities
- Secure and Nurturing Families
- Secure and Nurturing Child Care Environments

Results Accountability

The Early Childhood Iowa State Board collects and reports statewide indicator data to quantify and track progress toward the statewide results. An indicator is "a measure that directly or indirectly quantifies the achievement of a result. It measures the whole population, rather then those served by a specific program. More than one resource, program or service is necessary to improve an indicator and it often requires collaboration to reach the goal."


Program Performance Measures

A performance measure "measures the success of a service, product, or activity for the population served". In FY'11, the ECI State Board adopted consistent program measures which are required to be reported by all programs funded with both Early Childhood and School Ready dollars. This information is submitted in the local annual reports submitted to the ECI Office. The data is then compiled and shared from a state perspective in the ECI state annual report.









Number of licensed and registered child care slots












INCIDENCE OF CHILD **ABUSE**




TEEN BIRTHS

ACCREDITED FAMILY SUPPORT PROGRAMS IN IOWA



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
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

Percent of children under six years of age living in poverty




