FOREWORD

This is the Institute's second biennial survey of salaries and wages and work policies for county office and road employees in Iowa. The survey was initiated in 1954 at the request of Mr. George D. Woods, chairman of the Howard County board of supervisors, who asked the Institute for comparative information regarding work policies and wages paid to county road employees in the 99 counties. When the Institute agreed to undertake such a survey, it seemed desirable to obtain the same kind of information regarding county office employees as well. Because the salaries of elected officials and their deputies in Iowa counties are set by state law, this survey does not include salary data for them.

Questionnaires were sent to each county auditor and each county engineer in the state requesting information on salaries and wages and work policies in effect on August 1, 1956. The response was excellent: 98 county engineers and 91 county auditors supplied the information requested. This kind of response undoubtedly indicates a widespread interest among county governments to have this kind of comparable information available. The Institute's thanks go to each auditor and engineer who returned the questionnaire. Without their cooperation this survey could not have been possible.

In the tabular information of this survey, the use of dashes is frequent. A dash indicates that the space in the questionnaire where the particular information was asked for was left blank or that the county does not have the position or the type of employees for which the information was requested.

Median salaries are given at the end of most columns of tabular material. The median salary for a position is the middle salary, that is, half the counties pay more than this amount and half of them pay less.

The Institute will welcome any inquiries regarding the information presented here and any suggestions for the improvement of this type of survey.

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SUMMARY OF POLICIES REGARDING HOURS OF WORK, OVERTIME PAY, VACATIONS, HOLIDAYS AND SICK LEAVE FOR COUNTY OFFICE EMPLOYEES

Hours of work. In 47 of the 91 counties that returned the questionnaire, county office employees work 44 hours per week. The other 44 counties reported work weeks ranging from 38 hours to 49 hours as follows:

Saturday office hours. County offices close at noon on Saturday in 85 of the counties that returned the questionnaire. In two counties the offices are closed all day except that in one of these two the sheriff's and clerk of court's offices are open until noon. Four counties reported that their offices are open all day or nearly all day; in one of the four, offices close at noon during the months of July and August, in another county the offices close on Thursday afternoon, and in a third county the offices close at four p.m. on Saturdays.

Staying open during the noon hour. County offices are closed during the noon hour in 48 of the counties that returned the questionnaire; in 35 counties they are kept open. Eight of the counties reported that some offices are kept open during the noon hour while other offices are closed at that time.

Overtime pay. Regular salaried employees are not paid for overtime work in 77 of the 89 counties that responded to the question concerning overtime pay. Four counties reported that such employees are paid straight time for overtime work; five stated that compensatory time off is granted and one county reported that compensatory time off is allowed occasionally, and two counties indicated that they have no definite policy concerning overtime pay.

Regular hourly and daily employees receive straight time pay for overtime work in 30 counties; in one county they receive time and one-half pay, and in one county compensatory time off is granted. Twenty-six of the counties reported that overtime pay is not allowed, and one county indicated that it has no definite policy. Thirty-two of the counties that returned questionnaires did not answer this particular question.

Holidays with pay. Ninety counties reported their policies concerning holidays with pay for regular

salaried employees as follows:

Vacations with pay. Vacation policies for county office employees show wide variations. Eleven counties reported that regular salaried employees are allowed one week of vacation the first year of employment, and ten of these extend the vacation period to two weeks in the second year of employment. Two counties allow one week after the first year of employment, and one county allows a week after six months' employment. Two weeks of vacation with pay are allowed office employees in 66 counties -- apparently without regard for any time factor -- and in two of these counties the vacation period is extended to $16\frac{1}{2}$ days after 15 years' employment. One county reported that 15 working days are allowed; another reported that it has no definite policy, and two indicated that the question of vacations is decided by the elective officials in charge of the various county offices. For employees who have worked less that one year, two counties reported special arrangements: one county allows onehalf day vacation per month worked, and the other county permits one day vacation per month worked. Only one county reported that it does not grant vacations to any employees.

Sick leave with pay. Sixty-two of the counties that responded to the questionnaire reported they have no set sick leave policy, but in these counties office employees may receive time off with pay for sickness at the discretion of the supervisors and/or the principals. Eight counties indicated that a maximum of 30 days or the equivalent of four work weeks is allowed, although one county indicated that it is discretionary with the principal officer. One county allows three work weeks, and 11 allow the equivalent of two weeks, with one county reporting that it is a matter of discretion with the principal officer. Five counties grant one week for sick leave, and one county authorizes sick leave on a sliding scale based on years of service.

SALARY SCALES FOR COUNTY OFFICE EMPLOYEES

- A. The question, "Are employees (under the rank of deputy) who do about the same kind of work paid on approximately the same salary basis regardless of the office in which they work?" was answered "yes" by 71 of the 91 counties that returned the questionnaire.
- B. Twenty six of the 91 counties that returned the questionnaire reported that office employees are paid according to a set salary scale which provides for automatic increases upon the completion of certain periods of service. The following is a listing of the salary scales as reported by 16 of the counties.

Allamakee. All clerks begin at \$180 per month; after six months, the pay is increased to \$200 per month. Appanoose. All clerks begin at \$150 per month, and are advanced to \$170 per month after six months. Audubon. All clerks begin at \$175 per month, are advanced to \$200 per month after six months, and to \$215 per month after a second six month's period. Benton. The salaries of employees are increased from the beginning salary of \$170 per month to a maximum of \$200. The increases are granted every six months on the recommendation of the office head. Cerro Gordo. Clerks begin at \$165 per month and receive automatic pay raises of \$25 per month after each six months up to a maximum of \$300 per month. Clayton. Clerks begin at \$150 per month, and increases are granted at the end of six months, one year, two years, etc.

Des Moines. There are three classes of clerical employees: Senior Clerk, \$175 to \$210 per month; Intermediate Clerk, \$165 to \$200 per month; and Junior Clerk, \$155 to \$190 per month. Increases of \$5 per month are granted in each class after six months, after 12 months, after 18 months, after 24 months, after five years and after 10 years.

Grundy. Increases are granted every six months until the maximum is reached in two years.

Guthrie. Clerks begin at \$160 per month and are advanced to \$180 per month after three month's employment. The monthly rate for employees with 19 to 36 month's service is \$200, and for 37 months and over the rate is \$220 per month.

Howard. Increases are granted every six months until the maximum salary is reached.

Humboldt. Clerks begin at \$180 per month and are advanced to \$185 per month after six months. The second year of employment they are paid \$190 per month and beginning with the third year of employment they receive the maximum of \$200 per month.

Johnson. Clerks are paid on a graduated scale. The maximum salary for women is \$230 per month; the maximum salary for men is \$300 per month.

Mills. Employee salaries are based on a percentage of the elected officials' salaries. Present employees are paid 75% of their principal's salary; future employees will be paid 70% of their principal's salary during the first year of employment, and 75% there-

Scott. For most employees the salary range is \$195-\$240. Clerks begin at \$195 per month and are advanced to \$200 at the end of six months. Beginning with the second year of employment they receive \$220 per month; this is increased \$10 per month during the third year of employment and again during the fourth year of employment.

Warren. The salary range for clerks is \$175-\$210 per month. The first year's salary is at the rate of \$175 per month; this is increased to \$190 per month the second year, to \$200 per month the third year, and the maximum of \$210 per month is paid thereafter. Washington. Clerks begin at \$200 per month and are advanced to \$210 at the end of six months. After one year, the maximum salary of \$225 per month is paid.

Hours of work (engineering and administrative). In 61 of the 98 counties that returned the road questionnaire, engineering and administrative employees work a 44 hour week. In four counties the standard work week is 50 hours; in four others the work week is 48 hours. Three counties reported that this group of employees works 54 hours a week; two reported a 45 hour week, and three indicated a work week of 39 hours. The remaining 21 counties reported a wide variation in hours of work for engineering and administrative employees, ranging from $39\frac{1}{2}$ hours to 60 hours. Several indicated that the work week varies in length with the season of the year. Nearly every county reported that although they have a standard work week, engineering personnel are expected to work as many hours as are necessary. Several counties indicated that office personnel reported under this category are under the regular courthouse schedule.

Hours of work (other monthly employees). Eighty-four counties reported the hours of work for their monthly employees—of the 98 counties that returned the road questionnaire, six reported they have no monthly employees and eight did not answer this particular question. Overtime pay. Fifty-one counties do not allow overtime pay for monthly employees; 22 counties permit compensatory time off for overtime work; 13 counties give straight time pay; 3 counties grant either straight time pay or compensatory time off; and one county pays time and one-half for overtime work.

Overtime pay is not allowed hourly employees in 11 counties. Sixty-five of the counties that reported indicated that straight time is paid for overtime work; 11 counties allow compensatory time off; three counties pay time and one-half for such work; one county allows straight time or compensatory time off; and one county grants time and one-half pay or compensatory time off.

In the one to two week's category, one county indicated that two

The county that reported from one to three week's vacation time allows three weeks after 10 years of service. Both counties that allow two to three weeks have regulations covering the maximum amount: one county grants the maximum after 15 years, the other after 30 years (the maximum amount in working days for this county is 16; vacation time may accumulate for two years if prior arrangements are made).

The "other" group includes one county in which one day's vacation is allowed for each 24 days worked; two counties in which either one week or two weeks may be used for vacation or sick leave; one county in which the vacation period is seven days if taken between November and March and six days if taken any other time; one county in which the vacation period is two weeks if taken in January, February, March, November or December, and one week if taken any other time; one county in which six days are allowed between May and October and nine days throughout the remainder of the year; one county reported that hourly employees receive three days after one year's employment and after three years of service one day is added each year up to a maximum of 15 days; one county reported that it grants from six to 16 days, with the maximum possible after 30 years of service, and vacation cumulative for two years if prior arrangements are made. In the one week group, one county indicated that hourly employees may accumulate vacation time up to a maximum of two weeks. Other variations include one county which normally allows two weeks for vacation but extends this to three weeks after 10 years of service; one county which allows $16\frac{1}{2}$ days after 15 years of service, and one county which grants 12 days to administrative employees, six days after one year and 12 days after two years to monthly (28 day) employees, and six days to drainage crews after one year.

Three of the counties reported that the time allowed is the same as vacation time--employees may use it for either sick leave or vacation. At least three counties do not allow pay for the first day of sickness, and in one of these counties in which 30 days of sick leave is allowed, the pay during sick leave is 75 percent of the regular rate.

Of the policies tabulated as "other," two counties allow the actual time off for sickness, one allows ten days at home and 18 days in a hospital, one grants 120 hours, one permits one-half day for each 24 worked, one allows leave on half pay up to a maximum of \$300 a year, and one county reported that it is "possible" to receive up to 90 days of sick leave.

In the "other" group, one county reported that it allows 10 days at home and 18 in a hospital, one county permits one-half day of sick leave for each 24 days worked, one allows one-half pay for sick leave to a maximum of \$300 a year, and one county reported that sick leave varies according to the circumstances. In at least two counties the first day of sick leave is without pay, and one county deducts the first three days. Sick leave and vacation time are the same in two counties, and two counties grant sick leave at reduced pay--one at three-fourths pay and the other at 75 percent of the regular pay less deduction for the first day of sickness. The county that reported eight days for sick leave allows that number for drainage employees, and one of the counties that reported 10 days indicated that this number may be extended by action of the board of supervisors.

Injury leave (monthly employees). Eighty-four counties reported policies concerning injury leave for monthly employees. Of this number, five indicated that their employees are covered by workmen's compensation insurance. The amount of time allowed for injury leave is as follows:

The two counties included in the "other group reported these policies: one allows full time for injuries, the other indicated all employees are covered by workmen's compensation, but did not indicate any limit to the amount of injury leave. Of the counties that grant seven days, one county allows this amount for each injury. One of the counties that permits 90 days indicated that the employees are covered by workmen's compensation insurance.

Time off during slack periods. In answer to the question, "Does your county allow road employees to take time off with pay during slack times such as rainy days or winter days when work is impossible?" 14 counties answered yes and 84 responded in the negative.

PROFESSIONAL STATUS AND EXPERIENCE OF ENGINEERS AND ASSISTANT ENGINEERS

Engineers: County engineers in 74 of the 98 counties that returned the questionnaire are graduate engineers, and all 98 are registered engineers. The engineering experience of these county engineers ranges from 3 to 47 years; the median years of experience is 28. Years of experience in the county range from less than one year to 43 years; the median number of years in the county is seven.

Assistant Engineers: The 98 counties reported a total of 107 assistant engineers. Fifteen of the assistant engineers are graduate engineers; 16 are registered engineers. The engineering experience of the assistant engineers ranges from less than one year to 45 years; the median years of experience is 18. Years of experience in the county were reported for 105 assistant engineers. The median is nine years; the years range from less than one to 42.

Clarke. Motor grader operators are paid \$1.65 per hour during the construction season; the remainder of the time they are paid \$1.35 per hour.

Clinton. Two employees are truck drivers for six months at \$1.30 per hour; for six months these truck drivers work as dozer operator and scoop operator at \$1.40 per hour. One employee operates an auto patrol for six months at \$1.40 per hour and a motor grader for six months at \$1.50 per hour.

Dallas. Crawler tractor operators receive \$1.42 per hour during construction season. In off months from December 1 to April 1 they receive \$1.05 per hour for common work and \$1.27 per hour for operation of trucks or motor graders.

Emmet. One laborer is paid \$292.50 per month for eight months; he works as a scoop operator for four months at the rate of \$1.45 per hour.

Floyd. The bridge foreman, inspector, general foreman and grade foreman work as skilled laborers from December 1 to April 30. Their salaries in each of their jobs are: bridge foreman, \$2504.60, skilled laborer, \$1350.60; inspector, \$2375.95, skilled laborer, \$1294.80; general foreman, \$2594.55, skilled laborer, \$1388.80; grade foreman, \$2627.38, skilled laborer, \$1395.80.

Franklin. Two truck drivers are paid \$1.31 per hour while driving trucks; when needed, one serves as bridge foreman at \$1.57 per hour, and the other serves as dynamiter at \$1.47 per hour.

Fremont. One employee is the oil crew foreman for five or six summer months at \$1.35 per hour; in the six or seven winter months he is a rock truck driver at \$1.10 per hour.

Greene. The grade foreman is paid \$304 a month for four months and \$1.86 per hour for eight months.

Howard. From December 16 to April 1, auto patrol operators are paid \$285 a month; the pay the rest of the year is \$295 a month. During the summer months the dozer-tractor-scoop and dragline operators are paid \$305 and \$315 a month respectively; the rest of

the year they drive trucks and are paid \$285 a month.

Johnson. One employee works nine months as a dynamiter at \$1.60 per hour and three months on the bridge crew at \$1.50 per hour.

Kossuth. A truck driver is paid \$1.10 per hour for seven months and \$1.35 per hour for five months when he works as a dragline operator.

Lyon. As weed sprayer operator, one employee is paid \$1070.30 for the summer months; he is paid \$2144 for services as a laborer during the winter months.

Monroe. For seven months the grade foreman is paid \$1.50 per hour; the rest of the year he is a motor patrol operator at \$1.30 per hour. Another motor patrol operator is paid \$1.30 per hour for eight months and \$1.45 per hour for four months while working as a tractor operator.

O'Brien. One employee works as a truck driver at \$1.10 per hour and as a common laborer at \$1.05 per hour.

Osceola. One employee works part of the year as a payloader operator at \$1000 and for the rest of the year he is paid \$1200 for working as a truck operator.

Sac. A motor grader operator is paid \$272.50 a month for seven months and \$1.26 per hour for five months as a gravel checker. One employee works as a draftsman for seven months and is paid \$275 a month; the rest of the year he works as an inspector at the rate of \$1.44 per hour.

<u>Van Buren.</u> During the summer months a machine operator is paid \$2557.50; in the winter months he is paid \$852.50 for work as a quarry employee.

Washington. As construction foreman, one employee is paid \$350 a month for eight months and \$280 a month for four months while he works as a motor grader operator. As scoop operator, an employee is paid \$320 a month for eight months; the rest of the year he is paid \$280 a month as a truck operator.

<u>Wayne.</u> A machine operator is paid \$1.40 per hour during the construction season and \$1.10 per hour the rest of the year.

Wright. For five months a grade foreman is paid \$2310; the other seven months he is paid \$2100 for work as a mechanic's helper. A tractor driver is paid \$2142 for five months' work; during the remainder of the year he is paid \$2040 for working as a light truck driver.
