Suspect a patient has measles? Contact CADE immediately, 24/7

Measles is characterized by a prodrome of fever (may spike to more than 104°F), cough, coryza, and conjunctivitis (the three "C"s), followed by a maculopapular rash that spreads from the head to the trunk to the lower extremities. Health care providers should consider measles in patients presenting with febrile rash illness and clinically compatible measles symptoms, especially if the person recently traveled internationally, or was exposed to a person with febrile rash illness.

Health care providers who suspect a patient may have measles should immediately contact CADE while the patient is still at the health care facility. Public health can help coordinate specimen collection, transport, and testing at lowa's State Hygienic Laboratory (SHL) with a faster turnaround time than reference laboratories. This aids in prompt diagnosis of the patient and allows for a timely public health response, if necessary.

Health care providers who suspect a patient may have measles should immediately contact CADE at 515-242-5935 during business hours or 515-323-4360 after hours.

Antibiotic Awareness Week (November 18 - 24)

Antibiotics save lives but are becoming less effective. CDC urges health care professionals to prescribe antibiotics only when necessary to help fight antimicrobial resistance, curb the spread of superbugs, and protect patients from antibiotic-related adverse drug events.

CDC coordinates U.S. Antibiotic Awareness Week (USAAW) every November. For the 2023 USAAW, CDC and lowa HHS are increasing messaging and education efforts to improve antibiotic stewardship in Iowa.

As part of this outreach, and to promote judicious use of antibiotics in the long-term care setting, Iowa HHS is hosting two FREE webinars in November. Registration is open for both webinars.
