

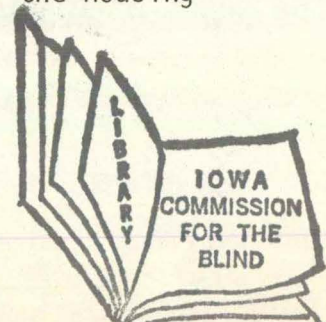

PURPOSE

The purpose of this publication is to bring together in one book information on educationally related organizations in Iowa. The number and scope of these organizations, which are not charged with the formal education of Iowans, is amazing and difficult to trace. This book is intended to be available as a reference source for the Governor, legislators, professional educators, state and community planners, and other citizens who are interested in education and allied educational organizations in the state of Iowa.

It includes general information about the purposes, structure, history, and publications of educationally related organizations in the state. More importantly it gives the name of an official who can be contacted to obtain more information about the aims or services provided by any one of these special interest organizations.

We have tried to include all organizations whose main purpose is related to specialized educational interest areas. Such groups may provide innovative approaches to educational problems or supplement the efforts of the formally organized and recognized educational units. The organizations cover a broad scope of educational levels and interests. They range from areas in elementary to post-secondary education, from school administration to groups interested in the teaching function, and from advisory committees for policymakers and including legislative study committees.

Like all new things there are some bugs still left to be worked out but we are counting on you, the user, to be of help in indicating how a publication of this nature could better fill your needs. If you have suggestions we would be glad to hear from you and plan to incorporate useful and positive ideas in our next year's plans. To be sure, we have missed some educationally related organizations which should have been included. CRITERIA FOR SELECTION

I. Statutory Organizations

- A. Educational Organizations provided for by State Law but not charged with the formal education program for Iowans. These organizations may provide educational services and/or furnish timely, pertinent and innovative information.
 - 1. These services may include:
 - advisory assistance in developing administrative guidelines, school standards, etc.,
 - planning and coordinating educational efforts, within one group or among several groups.
 - 2. Information usable in the planning and/or administration of educationally related interests may be generated or disseminated by these groups.
- B. Committees or organizations set up by the Legislative Council to study and propose legislation relating to the state's formal educational functions and responsibilities.

II. Private Organizations

- A. Organizations which provide services for and information to their specialized educationally related memberships.
 - 1. These services may include:
 - the development of administrative guidelines,
 - planning for the professional growth and welfare of its members,
 - planning and coordination of educational efforts and innovative ideas within one, or among several groups.
 - 2. Generate and/or disseminate information usable in the planning for, coordination of, or administration of educationally related interests.
- B. These groups may provide a forum for formal and informal discussion of timely educational and social problems relative to specialized interests in educational policy, planning and administration.

- C. These committees or organizations may provide an instrument for promoting the specific goals and /or purposes of the private group.

III. Auxiliary Organizations

- A. These groups are created by a state statute or the sponsoring group's administrative order to assist the primary educational group to carry out its function.

Purpose

The purpose of the Association shall be to consider questions and problems pertaining to the supervision and administration of the public schools of the state of Iowa.

Authorization

This association is a private specialized educational group whose members come from the administrative personnel of Iowa Public Schools.

Structure

The only general membership requirement of the approximately 500 members is that they are required to have an Iowa Superintendent's Certificate. Board members are elected for the three year staggered term which become effective October 15.

Meetings

Meetings are held the third Tuesday of each month. Special meetings may be called at the request of the President or a member of the Executive Board.

History

The Iowa Association of School Administrators, formed in September, 1949, was a department of the Iowa State Education Association until July 1, 1971 when it became an independent organization.

Purpose

The object of the IASB is the general and continuing betterment of public schools in Iowa. Its purpose is to accomplish this object by, among other things:

- a. keeping its membership abreast of the time by cooperative study of current trends, practices and problems in public school education;
- b. collecting and giving to school board members information to assist them in better performing their duties;
- c. giving cooperative consideration and constructive effort to matters of proposed or needed legislation affecting public schools; and
- d. cooperating with the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, the General Assembly, public officials, school administrators and teachers, and other interested organizations and agencies in advancing the cause of public school education in Iowa.

Authorization

The Iowa Association of School Boards is a non-profit corporation under the laws of Iowa.

Structure

Any duly organized and legally constituted public school board may become a member. Currently, there are 548 member boards in the IASB. New members to the Board of Directors are elected to three year staggered terms effective January 1st. Vacancies are filled by appointment. Board of Directors members shall be members of a board in good membership standing of the IASB.

Meetings

The bi-monthly meetings are usually held during the third week of January, March, May, July, September, and November. Special meetings are held as needed.

History

The IASB was established in 1946.

Purpose

The purpose of this association is to promote the betterment of secondary education in Iowa.

This group is a non-profit corporation serving secondary school administrators and other persons interested in secondary education.

Structure

There are no general membership requirements but all members are practicing secondary school administrators. The 1973 membership is 573. The Executive Committee is composed of nine members who serve staggered two year terms effective June 1st. They are elected at the annual meeting.

Purpose

The Iowa State Board of Public Instruction is given, by statute, both general and specific powers and responsibilities. A brief summary includes:

- A. General Powers and Duties
 1. Determine and adopt policies necessary for efficient operation of any phase of public education.
 2. Adopt necessary rules for the proper enforcement of the provisions of the school laws.
 3. Adopt the standards necessary for carrying out the provisions of the school laws.
 4. Perform duties necessary to attempt to update and continually improve the state system of Public education.
- B. Specific Powers and Duties Include:
 1. Cooperation with the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, State Comptroller, Legislature, and Federal Representatives in preparing, accepting, and interpreting the Annual Budget.
 2. Acts as the State Board for Vocational Education
 3. Acts as the Board for the Certification of Administrative, Supervisory and Instructional Personnel for the Public School System.
 4. Authorized to enter into agreements providing for employee health and retirement plans on behalf of personnel involved in or connected with the Iowa Public Education System.

IOWA STATE BOARD OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION

(Con't)

Structure

The State Board of Public Instruction shall consist of nine members appointed to six year terms by the Governor with two-thirds majority approval of the Senate. The members of the Board may not be directly engaged in professional education or have a major portion of their income derived from or income spent in educational business or activity. Two board members are required to have special knowledge: one in the area of vocational and technical training and another having special knowledge of area community colleges.

Meetings

The Board is required by law to hold six regular meetings per year although monthly meetings are normally held. Special meetings may be called by the President or five members of the Board on a five-day notice to each member.

History

After being established by the 55th General Assembly the Iowa State Board of Public Instruction held its first meeting in January of 1954. The State Board has had two structure changes one by the 61st General Assembly and the other by the 62nd General Assembly.

Purpose

It is the purpose of this committee is to work with people throughout the state to develop and recommend to the State Board of Public Instruction, improvement in standards for schools. The personnel of this committee represents lay as well as professional people, and public and nonpublic school administrators who put in time and effort for the improvement of education for boys and girls of the state.

Authorization

The State Advisory Committee on Standards for Approval of Schools is a creation of the State Board of Public Instruction. See Code of Iowa Chapter 257.25

Structure

The thirty members of this committee are representatives of various lay and professional groups including: State Sentators, school principals, superintendents, teachers, private schools and parents organizations, Department of Public Instruction, and Institutions of Higher Education. The members are appointed by the Associate Superintendent of the Supervision Division of the Department of Public Instruction. Members are apponted for specific assignments and may be reappointed for subsequent assignments.

Meetings

Meetings are held on call of the Chairman or State Board of Public Instruction.

History

The committee was established in 1965 in an effort to obtain input from people throughout the state so the State Board could fulfill the State Legislative mandate of drawing up approval standards for schools.

Purpose

This Council:

1. advises the State Board of Public Instruction on policy matters relating to the administration of the State Plan For Vocational Education.
2. conducts an annual evaluation of the vocational effort in the state,
3. consults on the development of, or amendment to the State Plan For Vocational Education.

This Council is also charged with:

1. responsibility to conduct at least one public hearing annually to air concerns to the council about vocational education.
2. to perform other duties as required for the state to qualify for federal aid and grants for vocational education.

Structure

The Advisory Council consists of 13 members appointed by the Governor to three year staggered terms. The advisory council shall consist of members who are:

1. familiar with the vocational needs and the problems of management and labor in the state.
2. representative of state industrial and economic development agencies.

3. representative of community and junior colleges and other institutions of higher education, area vocational schools, technical institutions, which provide programs of vocational or technical education and training.
4. familiar with the administration of state and local vocational education programs.
5. persons having special knowledge, experience, or qualifications with respect to vocational education and who are not involved in the administration of state or local vocational education programs.
6. familiar with programs of technical and vocational education, including programs in comprehensive secondary schools.
7. representative of local educational agencies.
8. representative of school boards.
9. representative of manpower and vocational education agencies in the state, including the comprehensive manpower planning system of the state.
10. representative of school systems with large concentrations of academically, socially, economically, and culturally disadvantaged students.
11. persons having special knowledge, experience or qualifications, with respect to the special educational needs of physically or mentally handicapped persons.

The commission members are appointed to four year staggered terms. The members shall be appointed according to the following criteria as set out in the Code of Iowa Chapter 261.1.

1. "A member of the state board of regents to be named by the board, the secretary thereof if so appointed by the board, who shall serve for a four year term or until the expiration of his term of office. Such member shall convene the organizational meeting of the commission.
2. The superintendent of public instruction.
3. A member of the state advisory committee for vocational education to be named by the said committee who shall serve for a four year term or until the expiration of his term of office.
4. A member of the senate to be appointed by the president of the senate for a term of four years beginning on July 1 of the year of appointment.
5. A member of the house of representatives to be appointed by the speaker of the house for a term of four years beginning on July 1 of the year of appointment.
6. Four additional members to be appointed by the governor. One of such members shall be selected to represent private colleges, private universities and private junior colleges located in the state of Iowa. The other three such members, none of whom shall be official board members or trustees of an institution of higher learning or of an association of such institutions, shall be selected to represent the general public."

Meetings are held on the second Tuesday of each even numbered month. Special meetings may be called by the Director as deemed necessary.

History

The Higher Education Facilities Commission was established in April of 1964 by the Sixtieth General Assembly in Extraordinary Session, Section 261.1, Code of Iowa. Its initial purpose was to prepare and administer a State Plan as provided in the provisions of Title 1, Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963.

The responsibilities of the Commission have been extended beyond its initial purpose to include the following major programs which are listed in order of their assignment to the Commission.

1. Construction Grants Program. Public Law 88-204, Title 1, Higher Education Facilities Act of 1963, as amended.
2. State of Iowa Scholarship Program. 61st General Assembly.
3. Instructional Equipment Grants Program. Public Law 89-329, Title VI-A, Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended.
4. Iowa Guaranteed Student Loan Program. 62nd General Assembly (The Iowa Guaranteed Student Loan Program was discontinued in the Spring of 1871 because of the availability of loans under the Federally Insured Student Plan).
5. Iowa Medical Tuition Loan Program. 62nd General Assembly (Under the Iowa Medical Tuition Loan Plan, loans for the 1973-74 are available only to students who previously received aid under this program. The program is expected to be terminated following the 1973-74 school year.)
6. Comprehensive Planning Grants Program. Public Law 89-752, Higher Education Amendments Act of 1966.
7. Iowa Tuition Grant Program. 63rd General Assembly.
8. Iowa Vocational-technical Tuition Grant Program. 65th General Assembly (This program is expected to begin during the 1974-75 school year.)
