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TO THE MEMBERS OF THE IOWA LEGISLATIVE BUDGET AND FINANCIAL CONTROL COMMITTEE

Gentlemen:

At the invitation of your chairman, I appeared before your Committee on September 30, 1953, to discuss generally the contents of my letter of September 2, 1953, which suggested that a survey be made of facilities operated by our institutions of higher learning in Iowa. This recommendation is the same as made by Governor Beardsley in his inaugural address on January 11, 1951, and in his speech before the Governors' Conference in Seattle, Washington, in 1953.

Your secretary, in a letter of October 5, 1953, advised me that the Committee had taken the following action:

"Moved by Prentis, seconded by Kuester, that former Senator Alden L. Doud of Douds, Iowa, be employed by the Committee on a per diem basis, plus personal expenses, including stenographic hire, to make a factual survey of the privately endowed or supported college, junior colleges, and state owned schools, to present to the Committee for the purpose of deciding what position the State may adopt relative to further development and progress of education for the youth of our State."

In accordance with that directive and in consultation with a committee of the Iowa College Presidents' Association which included the president of Iowa State Teachers College, and the president of the State University of Iowa, I proceeded to request the institutions of higher learning to participate in the survey by forwarding a copy of their latest catalog, corrected to make it current with the 1953-54 school year and to indicate willingness to answer a questionnaire to assist in determining the facts desired by your Committee. Without exception every college indicated its willingness to participate by forwarding its catalog and expressing a willingness to answer the questionnaire.

After the questionnaire was prepared, on December 30, 1953, I sent two copies of the questionnaire to each of the institutions, one to be filled out and returned to me and the other for the files of the institution. Copies of this questionnaire were supplied to the members of this Committee.

The Iowa Junior College Association appointed its own committee to work out a clarification so that the answers would be uniform. I met with Dean James P. Loper of Muscatine Junior College and members of his committee in the offices of the Dean of the Burlington Junior College for the purposes of cooperating with them in relation to the questionnaire and I take this opportunity to express my deepest appreciation for their fine assistance and cooperation. I later met with a committee of the Iowa College Presidents in the

offices of President Stevens of Grinnell where suggestions for clarifying the questionnaire as it related to four year liberal arts colleges were worked out. I also take this opportunity to express my sincere thanks to President Tom E. Shearer of Parsons and President C. H. Becker of Wartburg (the past president and present president, respectively, of the Iowa College Presidents' Association) for their assistance and cooperation.

A suggested deadline for returning the questionnaires was September 1, 1954, but the great majority of the institutions filed their completed questionnaires before that time. Only one four year liberal arts college did not return its completed questionnaire—Briar Cliff College, a four year college for women, located at Sioux City, Iowa, and conducted by the Sisters of St. Francis of the Holy Family of Dubuque, Iowa. Information concerning this college is taken from the catalog which it forwarded. The only junior college which did not file a completed questionnaire was Centerville Junior College. Its Dean, during the school year 1953-54, resigned to enter other business. Until a short time prior to September 1954, it was the announced intention to close this college and it was not until the public announcement that it would reopen under a new Dean that I contacted the college for information. Understandably, the new Dean has been so busily engaged in the necessary work attendant upon reopening of the college that he is unable to complete the questionnaire at the time of this writing.

The following information is factual only and contains no recommendations on my part. I have commented briefly in the "Foreword" on the questionnaire. It is my hope that the information contained in this report will help the Committee and the General Assembly in making the important decisions which face it in the field of education at the college level. I am aware of the keen interest of the people of Iowa and their elected representatives in the General Assembly in creating the best possible opportunities for Iowa's young men and women.

of the school district operating the junior college. Where the institution did not divide the number of Iowa residents between male and female, the letter "T" indicates that fact.

Originally, the source of scholarships and other aids given enrolled students was requested in the questionnaire but the variety of sources and specified purposes for their use made it impractical for the purposes of this survey.

Your attention is called to the number employed by the institutions as compared with those employed by "outside" employers. It is interesting to compare percentages of those employed with the total enrollment and with the tuition charges of the various institutions.

Of course, there is no formal limitation on the number of students to be enrolled in any public operated institution, at any rate, there is none affecting Iowa residents who can meet the entrance requirements. No information was sought from public operated colleges regarding any limitation on non-residents of Iowa. In this connection a table has been prepared from the latest edition of Residence and Migration of College Students by the Federal Security Agency, Office of Education (see Charts No. A to E, inclusive). Among the private operated four year colleges, you will note a few which plan to limit enrollment, some of which now closely approach the limit fixed. Your attention is called to the fact that those enrolled under G.I. Bills now are composed almost entirely of students who served during the Korean war.

Some interest was expressed in the percentage of survivals from one college class to another. Perhaps this information can indicate whether the institution is strict or not in requiring students to meet its educational standards. This is particularly true in the percentage of first year students who successfully pass their work at the end of that year. Of course, other factors are involved.

Per student cost is one of the criteria used in some circles to determine the efficiency of administration. Of course, it does not take into consideration that point where faculty cost is not increased even though enrollment does increase. The table shows the per student cost for the year 1953-54 as directly reported by the institution.

The number of students transferring (Chart No. 26) from one Iowa institution to another or from non-Iowa institutions to Iowa institutions is presented to show whether any appreciable number may transfer from one college to another for any number of reasons. The table shows the number transferring at the end of the year indicated. In this connection, it should be remembered that the transfers noted to the four year colleges may be from the two year junior colleges and comment from the junior colleges so indicates.

The physical facilities of these institutions are important for your study although there may be some disagreement as to its importance compared with the training, experience and quality of the teaching staff. In our public operated institutions only two (junior colleges) have facilities used by college students only. The reverse is true of the private operated institutions among which three use the same facilities for high school courses taught by a separate division. Each institution was asked to state whether present classroom space was adequate for its present enrollment, its full capacity enrollment, and its planned enrollment. Each institution was asked if it could accommodate additional students with its present facilities or if day and night classes were held. Public operated institutions reported they could handle between 700 and 900 additional students with present facilities, private operated institutions could handle approximately 4000 additional students, public operated junior colleges 525 additional students. If night classes were added these figures could be more than doubled. The addition of night classes presents many problems other than the mere use of classroom space and equipment. The question of additional staff members is at once presented although it is understood that existing faculties of junior colleges and high schools undertake teaching of adult education and similar courses at night in addition to teaching high school and junior college courses during the day.

Plans for increased classroom space and replacement are shown in Chart No. 31. Generally the reports show adequate plans for existing and future programs.

Library facilities are always important in surveying an educational institution. The accrediting agencies often fixed a minimum number of volumes. This minimum number in turn was evaluated by the age of the books. Some institutions did not report the number of volumes but a sufficient number reported to indicate all institutions have adequate library facilities. Libraries at one time were rated on the basis of its specially trained staff. This is indicated in Charts No. 38 and No. 39.

Each institution was asked to report on other facilities or unusual features in the liberal arts curriculum. This information is in Chart No. 46.

One of the most important questions was the request for the population trend in the area served by the reporting institution. This was preceded by a prediction taken from College Age Population Trends published by the American Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admission Officers. Except for the public operated four year institutions, very few of the others reported and most of the figures shown are taken not from the experience of the institution in the area

which it serves but from the report of some outside agency. I do not regard the information furnished by Charts No. 40 and No. 41 of much help in determining what the college population may actually be in the State of Iowa. The regular school census may give a fairly accurate trend. The State Department of Public Instruction made a study of the future public school enrollment which may be helpful in your consideration of this most important factor.

One element of any survey is the quality of college courses and teaching. Public operated junior colleges, and private operated junior colleges, are actually accredited by the State Department of Public Instruction (Sec. 280.18). The State Board of Educational Examiners (now the State Board of Public Instruction) has certain authority relative to accepting credits for teacher certification. There are numerous groups representing professional divisions such as Chemistry, Biology, Music, etc., which "accredits" certain institutions in those particular courses. The generally recognized accrediting agency affecting Iowa, however, is the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools regarding which the comment of institutions and other information follows Tables No. 42 and No. 43.

Your attention is called to institutions' policies regarding acceptance of credits from schools not accredited by N.C.A. Also your attention is directed to the comment or lack of comment on the supervision of accrediting groups.

Each institution was asked to point out any division or course of its curriculum which had received any special or particular recognition and your attention is directed to those tables.

Chart No. 11 FOUR YEAR LIBERAL ARTS SALARY SCALE — 1953-54




Chart No. 12 FOUR YEAR LIBERAL ARTS SALARY SCALE — 1954-55

EXPLANATION OF CHARTS NOS. 11, 12 AND 13

The public operated junior colleges, except those noted in the chart, submitted a salary schedule. Some of them provided for an automatic increase based on different factors such as, cost of living index, added experience in the system, and completion of work for degrees. A few of these colleges failed to attach their schedule although it was intended.

Among the private operated junior colleges are those conducted by religious orders and the faculty members usually contribute their services and for that reason no report was made or an incomplete one which applied only to faculty members not associated with the particular religious order.

No attempt has been made to divide the salaries paid to faculty members who give full time to junior college teaching and those giving only part time.

The dotted line represents the average between the maximum and minimum figure on the salary scale.

There were no salary schedules submitted by the junior colleges for the school year 1954-55 as was done by the four year colleges.

In the case of the four year colleges, the dotted lines indicate the maximum and minimum median or medium, if reported.

RESIDENCE OF COLLEGE STUDENTS IN IOWA AND MIGRATION OF IOWA STUDENTS

Taken from Residence and Migration of College Students by the U. S. Office of Education, 1949-50. (Latest report available.)

In 1949-50, there were 44,533 students attending institutions in Iowa. Of this number, 31,879 (71.6%) were residents of Iowa and 12,654 (28.4%) were non-residents.

During the same academic year, 41,450 Iowa residents were attending institutions of higher learning, of which 31,879 (76.9%) were enrolled in Iowa institutions and 9,571 (23.1%) attended in other states.

Of the 31,879 Iowa residents attending Iowa schools, 1,708 were graduate students, 30,171 were undergraduate.

There were 10,906 non-resident undergraduates attending Iowa schools and 8,429 Iowa undergraduates attending schools outside Iowa.

In Iowa (1949-50) 74% in public controlled universities were Iowa residents, 77.1% in private controlled universities were Iowa residents, 60.3% in private controlled liberal arts colleges, 95.2% in public controlled teachers colleges and 98.4% in public junior colleges and 57.5% in private junior colleges were Iowa residents.

FOUR YEAR LIBERAL ARTS Other Facilities

Iowa State College: Other facilities reported as used in Liberal Arts curriculum are Classrooms, Laboratories, Lecture Rooms, Gymnasium, Ar-

mories, and Library.

Public-Operated

Iowa State Teachers College: Mentions the Curriculum Laboratory. This Laboratory has a Curriculum Materials Center which makes available courses of study, educational bulletins, text-books, workbooks, tests and a variety of other materials. There is also the Audio-Visual Center which contains films, film strips, recordings and much audio-visual equipment of use in instruction. Three professional staff members are employed for this laboratory. The college also maintains an Educational Clinic, a Speech Clinic and a Writing Clinic, proving instructional laboratories and remedial services for a public school (and some college) students who have special learning or adjustment problems.

State University of Iowa: Reports "Several volumes would be required" to go through the list of 50-odd departments offering work in Liberal Arts to indicate unusual features. Undergraduate majors in Geology must spend at least one summer in supervised actual field work, majors in Zoology have field work at lakeside laboratory. Iowa has a national reputation for training of Speech Pathologists. Liberal Arts College has combined with the professional schools to provide broad general liberal education to students

entering the professions.

Private-Operated

Buena Vista: Reports its teacher training course receives favorable comment from the State Department of Public Instruction. Its faculty is rated favorably by the North Central Association and its general education program approved.

Central: Announces the purchase of an unusually fine recording machine to be used in Music, Speech, Languages and other courses, the quality being

such that recordings from it are used by leading radio stations.

Clarke College: Features an honor system of student government which has received favorable mention. Its publications and students engaged in literary writing have received national recognition. Faculty members in Home Economics and Art have received special awards and been invited to participate in North Central Workshop.

Drake University: Mentions the Audio-Visual and Reading skills labora-

tories and ROTC training.
University of Dubuque: Operates a campus radio station, KUDD, serving as a laboratory for Speech and Radio classes. It has an excellent curriculum in Christian education to prepare Pastor's assistants. The public school system cooperates in furnishing classroom observation, student teaching and other teacher education facilities.

Grinnell College: Has better than 90% of its students living in campus dormitories and using college dining rooms, cost of which is included in the

"Package" fee of \$1400. Each of the 17 dormitories has a resident house mother. There are no Fraternities or Sororities and no student automobiles. Iowa Wesleyan College: Is proud of three departments in particular. Its Science department ranked 10th among 525 colleges surveyed and 4th in Chemistry and was placed as the top Iowa college with students gaining distinction in the field of Science. The Art and Drama departments are deserving of special mention.

Morningside College: Has a prominent course in Astronomy with the largest telescope on any campus in the State. New buildings include Science hall, men and women's dormitories and new gymnasium with olympic-size swimming pool. Morningside is known for its willingness to attempt experiments such as study of general education, music students participating in civic orchestra, practice teaching in city schools, training in livestock market.

Parsons College received Freedom's Foundation Award for its Work-Study-Travel plan to help students make better job choices, to help learn how to work and live with other people. Seniors spent 8 weeks off campus working in his area of interest. Others have summer work in their chosen fields and freshmen participate in field trips to schools, churches, stores,

factories and government offices.

Wartburg College: Has received special recognition by and is an associate member of the National Association of Schools of Music. Its Department of Social Work was invited to membership in the Council on Social Work

Westmar College: Features special departments in Home Economics and

Industrial Arts.

Public-Operated

Boone: Mentions its physical education program which permits an election of Gym or Swimming. The college is equipped with an indoor pool

60 ft. long by 20 ft. wide.

Burlington Junior College: Reports joint facilities with the high school including auditorium, cafeteria, boys and girls gymnasia, field house and stadium, observatory with 113/4 inch refractor telescope, special instru-

mental and vocal music rooms,

Clinton Junior College: Uses high school auditorium, swimming pool, athletic field, audio-visual aids, remedial reading services and the testing

and counciling services.

Eagle Grove College: Reports special audio-visual education room, adequate physical education equipment, testing program contract with Iowa State College, two part-time counsellors, field trip facilities and elementary schools for practice teaching.

Ellsworth College: Especially mentions its Chemistry and Physics labora-

tories.

Keokuk Community College: Has just been completed and is unique in functional design. Its classrooms and equipment incorporate the best experience available. Examples are acoustically treated ceilings, indirect artificial light, latest type kitchen, modern office equipment for commercial department, elevated seating for class demonstration in Science, field house with indoor track, music room for instrumental and vocal instruction, lounge for college students.

Mason City Junior College: Gives a series of tests for each incoming student. A portion of audio-visual equipment is shared with the high school and for teacher education curriculum, student teachers used equipment of

Mason City elementary schols.

Muscatine Junior College: YMCA and YWCA pools are used by the college for swimming classes. Seven elementary school buildings are used for observation and practice teaching. Classes in Art, Physical Education, Health, Engineering Drawing, Accounting, Music methods and fundamentals of Music are held in high school building where the instructors mostly hold high school classes.

Webster City Junior College: Has a wide range of courses in its curriculum. Students are given several basic tests. Science laboratories are well

equipped and buildings and equipment in good condition.

Private-Operated

Mt. St. Clare Junior College: Makes special mention of its course in Ceramics. In addition to the Library mentioned previously it has an out-

standing Music Record library.

Ottumwa Heights College: Has Voice, Piano and Violin studios with 10 practice rooms, Home Economics and Science laboratories, an Auditorium, gymnasium and facilities for physical education and outdoor sports, classrooms with audio-visual aid equipment and a modern, well-equipped demonstration school.

Waldorf College: Has audio-visual aid equipment, Science laboratories and Industrial Arts shops. Also auditorium facilities for Dramatics and

GENERAL COMMENT ON ACCREDITING

Accrediting organizations usually come into existence by the voluntary association of its members who agree to maintain a minimum standard of quality in its educational program. The North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools is regional and includes the state of Iowa.

This Association is now in the process of revising its criteria for evaluating the attainment of its educational purposes and objectives by the institutions seeking membership. The first step in the accrediting procedure is the submission of a report of a self-survey. If, in the judgment of a board of review, this report is satisfactory, the petitioning institution is notified and arrangements made for a survey by a committee of examiners representing the North Central Association. The survey fee is \$300 per examiner (2 or 3 persons) for each degree granting institution and \$250 per examiner for a Junior College. The fee is payable when the institution is notified that the survey is to be made. If the self survey report is judged to be unsatisfactory, the institution is supposed to withdraw from further consideration.

This information was furnished by Manning M. Patillo, Jr., Associate Secretary of N.C.A. with offices at 5835 Kimbark Avenue, Chicago, Illinois.

Mr. Patillo furnished a revised manual of accrediting in which he has marked certain items deemed important. The manual covers a statement of policy, and operation of the accrediting procedure for both senior and junior institutions applying for accreditation. Criteria studied include the purposes of the applying institution, its faculty, curriculum, instructional practices, library, student personnel service, administration, financial support, physical plant, self study, and athletics.

Under each of these criteria, there are various sub-divisions; for example, faculty competence which includes degrees held, educational experience, membership in learned societies, is one of the divisions when considering the quality of the faculty. There are two other parts, faculty organization and conditions of faculty service. These three sub-divisions are inclusive of 24 criteria for the evaluation of the institution's faculty.
