What Is Community Education?

Community Education is a concept which . . .

- • emphasizes education as a lifelong learning process
- • promotes a greater sense of community and improves the quality of community living
- • joins the school and community in closer partnership
- . . . makes maximum use of community resources
- identifies community needs and links resources to help solve community problems
- promotes communication, coordination and cooperation among community groups, agencies and organizations
- involves people in decision making through advisory councils

It seems to me that every person, always, is in a kind of informal partnership with his community. His own success is dependent to a large degree on that community, and the community, after all, is the sum total of the individuals who make it up. The institutions of a community, in turn, are the means by which those individuals express their faith, their ideals, and their concern for fellow men.

The partnership between a man and his community is often an unconscious relationship, but this fact does not make it any less real. For me, this sense of partnership has become a growing reality over the years, thanks in part to Community Education.

What Is the Iowa Center for Community Education?

The Iowa Center for Community Education (ICCE) joins in partnership a state agency and two local school districts in Iowa. Together the Iowa Department of Public Instruction (DPI) and the West Des Moines and Delwood Community School Districts will provide the necessary leadership for developing the Community Education concept.

The Center provides awareness, developmental assistance, and consultative services to communities and school districts throughout Iowa. The Center has several purposes,

namely:

- to develop a greater awareness and understanding about Community Education
- to sponsor local, regional and statewide training opportunities in Community Education
- to increase the number of Community Education programs across Iowa
- to respond to requests from local communities for assistance in Community Education

What Services Are Available from the Center?

The primary services the Iowa Center for Community Education has to offer to communities throughout Iowa are twofold:

- 1. to provide four general awareness workshops about the total scope of the Community Education concept
- 2. to provide individualized inservice training opportunities to those communities participating in one of the four workshops

We suggest that community teams, comprised of four or five prominent persons from a local community, attend one of these workshops together. Representatives on a community team might include: a school board member, a superintendent of schools, a parks and recreation director, a community college representative, a business leader, a civic leader, a community leader, or any combination of community representatives which best reflects the community.

The Center workshop will focus on the following content areas:

- 1. introduction of basic concepts and philosophy of Community Education
- 2. identification and explanation of the basic components of Community Education, namely: needs assessment, advisory councils, inter-agency cooperation, program development, financing and community awareness
- 3. discussion of strategies on how to establish a Community Education model within your community or school district
- 4. use of community resources to describe in detail one rural model (Delwood) and one suburban model (West Des Moines) of Community Education

Persons knowledgeable of Community Education who hold positions similar to those of persons on the community teams will be at the workshops to answer questions and offer comments.


