

Start with displays of romance books, rom-com movies, and your patrons' favorite picks. The <u>ALA</u> <u>Store</u> has promos, posters, and gifts galore. Use newsletters, social media, and newspapers to highlight statistics like Sheldon Public Library is doing all month.

2024 Award Winners Announced

Last month, the American Library Association announced the most prestigious literary awards of the year: the 2024 Newbery and Caldecott winners, along with many others. These literary award winners in youth and children's literature include books, digital media, eBooks, and audiobooks.

Any of these titles lead to ideal purchases for library collections, promotions, and programming. Here are just a few of the 2024 winners:

The John Newbery Medal, given for the most outstanding contribution to children's literature = <u>The Eyes and the</u> <u>Impossible</u> by Dave Eggers

The Randolph Caldecott Medal, given for the most distinguished American picture book for children = <u>Big</u>,

written and illustrated by Vashti Harrison

The Coretta Scott King Book Award, recognizing an African American author and illustrator of outstanding books for children and young adults = <u>Nigeria Jones</u> by Ibi Zoboi

The William C. Morris Award, given for a debut book published by a first-time author writing for teens = <u>Rez Ball</u> by Byron Graves

Michael L. Printz Award for excellence in literature written for young adults = <u>The</u> <u>Collectors Stories</u> edited by A.S. King, written by M.T. Anderson et.al.

The Theodore Seuss Geisel Award for the most distinguished beginning reader book = Fox Has A Problem written and illustrated by Corey R. Tabor

Annual Bridges Enrollment In March

For current **Bridges** member libraries and those not yet members, next month marks the annual enrollment period. Current members will need to complete a **Bridges Letter of Agreement**; libraries wishing to join **Bridges** for the first time this year will need to sign a **Bridges Letter of Agreement For First-Time Participants**. Both forms are now accessible on our website, both are **due on March 29, 2024**, found at the button below.

Note: In the first year of membership, there is a **\$400.00 start-up fee** for first-time libraries, in addition to the annual subscription. Service will be activated for first-time libraries on July 1, 2024. Whether a current member or a soon-to-be member of the **Bridges** group, find your **Bridges** annual fees for FY2025 and FY2026 linked at the button below.

There are currently **492 Bridges** member libraries, with 87,900 unique users. At the end of FY2023, the **Bridges** collection held 101,997 eBook copies, 45,606 e-audiobooks. In FY2023, circulation numbers showed over 1,200,000 eBook downloads, over 1,200,000 e-audiobook downloads, and 103,645 magazines checkouts.

About Bridges

This is an eBook and audiobook buying consortium for Iowa public libraries. The State Library facilitates this program and manages the contract on behalf of all participating libraries. OverDrive is a leading digital distributor of eBooks, e-audiobooks, and emagazines. Libraries that participate in **Bridges** pay an annual formula-based fee to the State Library that covers the materials budget, the purchase of MARC records, and a small packet of promotional materials for new members.
