4-H in Iowa

4-H involves youth and adults. Some 75,000 boys and girls participated in Iowa 4-H and youth programs last year. They learned by doing under the guidance of 11,000 adult volunteer leaders and 2,600 teen leaders.

4-H offers a broad choice of opportunities. 4-H youth could select from 118 different projects to meet their individual needs and interests.

4-H'ers come from farms -45 percent; town and rural non-farm -14 percent; towns and cities of 10,000 to 50,000-5 percent; suburbs of cities over 50,000-2 percent; and central cities over 50,000-24 percent.

In energy conservation, 4-H members have assisted families in home energy audits, included energy-saving ideas in exhibits and educational presentations, and built and installed a solar water heater as part of the hot water system in Linden Lodge at the 4-H Camping Center.

4-H'ers plan and conduct state 4-H conference. Thirteen hundred youth and 250 adults from across the state

participated in the 1980 state 4-H conference on the campus of Iowa State University. 4-H conference is a learning experience in a university setting that helps many youth set higher educational goals.

4-H alumni and current 4-H'ers include one of every four Iowa citizens. Many former 4-H members credit their 4-H experiences for their career choices and their achievements in life. Many alumni describe the program as an exciting, dynamic, educational program, helping young people grow into responsible, productive, and self-guided citizens.

A 1980 4-H alumni honoree, Mrs. Korliss Angus of Malvern, said, "4-H gave me the opportunity to explore and grow in knowledge along with meeting new people as a young person. I will always be very grateful to the people who have and are supporting the program. Now I'm a volunteer leader and am learning along with our young people in all the 4-H fields of education. America's future is being shaped by our 4-H teachings of today."

Leadership training

The first two-day State Volunteer 4-H Leader's Forum was held with financial support from the Iowa 4-H Foundation. In addition, it funded partial support for a delegation of adults to participate in a U.S. Regional Volunteer Leader's Forum, county and multicounty volunteer leader training, junior leadership training, teaching aids, and camp counselor training.

Mrs. Wilma Memmelaar, Oskaloosa, attended the first Iowa volunteer leader forum. She wrote, "I wish to express my appreciation and sincere thanks to the Iowa 4-H Foundation for providing a grant to enable us leaders to attend the State Leader's Forum at a lower cost, and also for providing funds so we could have an outside speaker on our

conference program. I enjoyed the conference very much and thank you again for sharing the cost of the conference. I felt the 4-H Camping Center was an ideal place for such a conference, and I'm glad I had the opportunity to attend."

Leader recognition

Financial support provides length-of-service pins to recognize adult volunteer leaders.

Benefits to 4-H Members

Financial support to conduct educational programs in the many project areas for 4-H'ers. It also made possible such events and activities as State 4-H Conference, State Leadership Conference, Conservation Workshop,

day camping, International Four-H Youth Exchange (I.F.Y.E.), Camp I Can, Safety Camp, National 4-H Conference, National 4-H Congress, and Camp Miniwanca. Donor contributions also provide achievement award recognition to 4-H members at the county and state level.

Marlene E. Bartlett, Rockwell, represented Iowa as an adult delegate to the National 4-H Conference in Washington, D.C. She said, "I want to thank you and all those involved with the Iowa 4-H Foundation for your part in sponsoring the adult delegates to the 4-H National Conference. It was truly an outstanding experience. I don't know when I have seen such a great group of young people as well as adults work together. I am 'all fired up' about 4-H

and our role in it, and I want to spread the news fast. Thank you again. It truly is greatly appreciated."

Scholarships

Financial aid is provided to help youth from financially disadvantaged families to participate in 4-H events and programs at the county, area, and national level. College scholarships are also provided to 4-H members in recognition of project achievements. This year 45 youth received scholarships from the Iowa 4-H Foundation.

A 4-H'er, Sherri Borchardt, wrote, "I would like to take this opportunity to thank you for your assistance in obtaining fifty dollars for my trip to Washington, D.C. This money will help a great deal. Going to Washington on this citizenship shortcourse is a goal I've had ever since I started 4-H eight years ago. Thanks again for all you've done."

Another 4-Her, Lisa Brake expressed her appreciation to the Iowa 4-H Foundation. She said, "Just a note of thanks for the scholarship for Camp'I Can.' I am looking forward to a good time at camp. I hope to make a lot of new friends and learn how to lose weight. My mother attended camp at Madrid when she was in 4-H."

Langwood 4-H Reserve

Construction of an A-frame cabin designed to house up to 30 campers is near completion; construction of a much-needed bath house is under way. This facility in Louisa County is experiencing increased usage as the camp site develops and as more people learn of the possibilities to hold group programs there.

4-H Camping Center, Madrid

This camping complex continues to serve a large number of youth and adults year-round. Summertime, of course, finds it filled with youth and adults learning and playing in a most delightful outdoor environment. Our greatest need at this Camping Center is to maintain and, in some cases, replace buildings and utilities. That happened as two new cabins were built in Maple Village and as worn out plumbing was replaced for the swimming pool water system. The Foundation Board of Trustees is also concerned and giving

attention to energy conservation in the Camping Center facilities.

Collegiate 4-H Clubs

Assistance was given to the Iowa State University Campus 4-H group to host the National Collegiate 4-H Conference at Iowa State University.

Innovative Programs

The Iowa 4-H Foundation funded a program to develop manual skills, an understanding of blueprint reading and design, eventual water safety skills for a group of school drop-out youth, partial funding for display cases for a historical exhibit of early 4-H articles in Wright county, and the following canoe plan. With brainstorming about outdoor projects, we have come up with a plan to include the assembly of canoes as a part of a larger outdoors project, John Wanfalt, Muscatine county 4-H and youth leader said. It will involve junior high and high school youth. Ten youth have indicated interest. Four volunteers have been secured. One workshop was held and two canoes have been assembled. Wanfalt said, "We'll keep you posted on what is happening!"

Details about another innovative program follow.

Foundation Funding Central to Successful Soccer Program

Extension efforts began in 1976 to involve Hispanics in Muscatine county 4-H and youth programs. By 1979 older Hispanic youth were organized and playing soccer as part of the Extension youth program.

In 1979 the Hispanic youth helped establish program goals and write a proposal for funding to the Iowa 4-H Foundation. The proposal was funded; this endorsement was particularly important because it established credibility of 4-H and Extension Service within the Muscatine Hispanic community.

That same year Hispanic youth became involved with 17-year-and-under and 14-year-and-under teams in play with area soccer teams.

To bring the soccer program to this point, the Muscatine Cooperative

Extension Service, helped develop an integrated community youth soccer program that also involved the Muscatine Parks and Recreation Department and Muscatine County Migrant Committee. In 1980 the YMCA joined the alliance. The Muscatine school system, supportive of this effort, provided facilities on which to play soccer.

Long range planning led Muscatine 4-H and youth leader John Wanfalt to think about where the feeder source would be to insure future involvement of Hispanic youth. They broadened their goals to include first through sixth grade youth in a developing soccer program. They joined in developing a bi-state soccer association, and the Extension Service organized a soccer clinic that involved about 100 Muscatine youth and parents and utilized 16- to 18-year-old "Pumas" soccer team to conduct the clinic.

A 1980 spring round robin was played that involved 123 youth representing all the cultures found in Muscatine. The older Hispanic youth served in a volunteer leader capacity in officiating at the first through sixth grade games.

Following the spring round robin an "All-Star" team of fifth and sixth graders was developed to continue playing through the summer in preparation for a fall International Tournament, held in Moline, Illinois. The "All Star" team consisted of six Anglos, five Hispanics, three Romanians (two who don't speak English), two Vietnamese, and one Laotian.

Seven older Hispanic youth were provided scholarships to transfer to the adult soccer team, "The Cruz Azul" of Muscatine. Resources for this transfer came from the 4-H Foundation grant. The end result of this action was the support of youth soccer by the adult team. The older boys displaced seven adults because of their soccer skills and so another adult team was organized, "The Cruz Azul-B".

In the process of working with teenage boys we attracted teenage girls and held a special interest group in recreation on Saturday mornings at a local school gym for Hispanic youth. The youth want to continue this activity in 1981. Wanfalt stated these educational objectives for soccer:

- 1. To blend cultures in Muscatine.
- To involve youth not currently involved in developmental experiences inside or outside of the school and social systems in Muscatine.
- That soccer was the vehicle to implement these objectives because it had worked before; but that the vehicle was not the important aspect of the program. Any vehicle might be used.

As a result of the soccer program certain behavioral changes can be seen. This is the first time Hispanics, adults and youth, have given leadership to a program that is having a large impact on the community. That leadership is well accepted by all cultures in the community.

Wanfalt said, "We're reaching youth in the community who have not been involved before."

The school system has set 1985 as the date for competitive soccer at the high school level. This might insure future participation and involvement by Hispanic youth.

Adult soccer players changed their vocabulary in working with youth, by concensus. Adult teams work jointly with the youth soccer teams on field improvements and other program aspects.

Wanfalt said, "A special thank you to the Iowa 4-H Foundation for funding that helped start this successful soccer program."

Area Bank Programs

National 4-H Council and the National Bankers Association conduct an annual 4-H fund drive through state banking associations. One third of the state contribution is forwarded to National 4-H Council; one-third goes to the state 4-H foundation and one-third is available for Extension areas. To request these funds for area programs, areas write proposals that are reviewed by the state leader; areas receive checks if the proposal is accepted.

"According to my records this past year the Council Bluffs Extension area used \$80.00 for an expanded effort with beginning 4-H'ers in the foods project; \$153.20 for a single county CRD day camp; and \$100.00 for 4-H promotion using "Chris Clover" materials.

"With over 50 percent of our members enrolled in the foods project, the financial support for the Tricks for Treats beginners program allowed us to reach a large number of our 4-H'ers. This effort will have carryover because an indepth educational program was conducted with leaders. The day camp in Fremont County should provide impetus for future such camps. We are currently utilizing the Chris Clover promotional program and will evaluate it in the future. In all cases, as in the past, these funds have allowed us to conduct programs that might have been skipped or abbreviated had area bank money not been available.

"We certainly appreciate your cooperation with this program and do find the funds a definite asset," reported Raymond L. Studer, Council Bluffs area Extension 4-H and Youth Leader.

"We find the money coming to the Des Moines Extension area 4-H account from bank contributions to be very helpful. Our county Extension district budgets are very tight and, in addition, we can use the bank funds for some things where we would hesitate to use tax funds.

"We had accumulated a larger balance than normal so spent more this past year than usual. We received \$665 initially contributed by banks on March 10, 1980. We gave 31 scholarships of \$40 each to help defray expenses of senior 4-H'ers to Washington, D.C. for a week of citizenship focus.

"We also spent \$85 for project and local club program helps. We bought out-of-state publications to support our emphasis on family communication.

"We used about \$50 to help defray meal expenses of volunteers who helped at such area events as selecting state officer nominees and award winners.

"The bank contributions are very helpful in supporting the 4-H program," said Thomas A. Robb, Des Moines Area Extension Director.

"In the Fort Dodge Extension Area, bank money helped build leadership capabilities in 4-H leaders and members. It provided scholarships for the county council retreat so that all council members could attend the weekend training to help them perform more knowledgeably.

"The Area Leader Forums were accessible to a wider range of leaders, because of bank money. Leaders learned more about 4-H program opportunities. These funds also paid for teaching aides used throughout the area for leader training," Henrietta Van Maanen, Area Extension Director, reported.

"In the Mason City Extension area, Iowa 4-H Foundation Bank monies of 1978 & 1979 (\$540.41) were used to pay for supplies to print a 4-H Book of Games developed by summer aides and provided to all 4-H clubs in the area; to pay for supplies to print four editions of a 4-H swine project newsletter sent to all swine project members in the area; pay for interviewers meals; and to pay the travel expense for a 4-H recruitment aide.

"I think the most exciting, productive project was employment of a college student, past outstanding 4-H member, to spend 12 days in each of three counties to make personal contacts to recruit new 4-H leaders and members. She was able to lay the groundwork for two new clubs in each of the counties. She was able to identify and visit with a large number of adults who can assist with 4-H and she identified a group of youth to begin six new clubs.

"Iowa 4-H Foundation monies have enabled us to do a number of projects that would not have occurred with traditional funds," reported Lyle R. Mackey, Mason City Area Extension Director.

"In the Ottumwa Extension Area, the 4-H dog project slide set was purchased for \$31.00 and has been used by dog project groups in the area; it is something that will be used for years to come. In the past we have purchased several of the World Wide Table Games that have been used by hundreds of 4-H'ers at camps and other 4-H events. At many events we use the American and 4-H flags that were purchased by

banker's money. Orienteering has become a new camp activity because of the compasses we were able to purchase with these funds. The 4-H horse project slide sets have been in use by project leaders for several years and will continue to get good use.

"These items have all added to the 4-H and youth program in the Ottumwa Area, and I would urge the continued sharing of the bankers contribution with the Extension areas," said Dean King, Ottumwa Area Extension 4-H and Youth Leader.
