A Boardroom Webinar In April

Basically Incredible Boards

A new year of board education programs began with the ILOC Conference in January and continues with the first *Boardroom* webinar of the year in April. This webinar, *Basically Incredible Boards*, is scheduled for April 18, (6:00-7:30PM) It's based on a book by Iowa author Matt Booth



titled <u>Basically Incredible</u>. Matt Booth is from Dubuque and last fall was a keynote speaker at the lowa League of Cities Conference.

From Amazon, here's more about the book: Matt Booth argues that despite the complexity of life, it's the simple and fundamental practices that truly make a difference whether it's at work or home, with colleagues, friends or family, he illustrates the keys to building strong habits and even stronger relationships."

The book's subtitle lends a good description "doing the basics consistently leads to an incredible life." It is critical for trustees to understand the fundamentals of serving on a governing board—that's where the good work of boards begin. But webinar facilitators will go further by putting forward this proposition: it's also important for library boards to move beyond the basics and reach for improvements in communication, in funding, in service, and in advocacy.

Here's one example of where this webinar discussion will take us. Consider this question: your board has forged good relationships with each other, with the library director, with the staff. But is there room to strengthen relationships with city officials, with county supervisors, with the Friends Group and other community groups?

What special efforts have propelled your library board to move beyond the basics and achieve a higher level of service success? Is your board "basically incredible?" Let's find out!

There is no expectation that attendees read the book prior to the program.

Calling For Bridges Selectors



Join the Team in July

The Bridges Team is looking for new people to join the Bridges Selectors Group. The application form is open now and will remain open until the end of the month. Our goal is to have a new contingent of 18 people in place by late spring, with this group of selectors taking over on July 1st

If collection development is in your wheelhouse, and if you're willing to give some time to building the Bridges collection, then do consider applying to join this important group. Any library directors or support staff from Bridges member libraries are welcome to apply.

Collection development responsibilities will rotate among team members, with each member responsible for choosing and ordering materials—both eBook and eAudiobook formats—for two months of the year. This will be a three-year commitment, for a total of six months. Each month will have three selectors; one for adult nonfiction, one for adult fiction, and one for youth materials both children and teens. Everyone will operate within a set budget each month.

Committee members will be provided with a collection development policy, as well as instruction in how the selection process works. We anticipate the time commitment to be 5-10 hours per month only in those months when you will actually be doing the selection.

Sign-Up By March 29

If you are not aware of the **Foundation Directory**, there's no time like the present to learn more about this resource and how sign up for access. The **Foundation Directory** (FD) is a research tool

designed to help libraries and nonprofits find the grant-makers most likely to fund their projects. This tool includes grant-maker profiles with a summary of their work, along with all the pertinent details that fundraisers need to find and approach prospective grant agencies.

The Foundation Directory is provided to all lowa public libraries from the State Library at no cost. If your library has not yet signed up, please know that FD now allows new libraries access on a quarterly basis. You can submit your library's IP information on a form linked on our webpage at the button below. FD will process all new submissions following a deadline each quarter. The next opportunity for new libraries to be gain Foundation Directory access in this fiscal year is March 29, followed by June 28.

Once libraries submit their IP information to the form linked below, **FD** will contact libraries to provide further instructions on setting up access. **FD** authenticates through the library's IP address and because of that, it's available for in-library use only.
