

Introduction


Northwest Iowa Care Connections was formed under Iowa Code Chapter 28E to create a Mental Health and Disability Service (MHDS) Region in compliance with Iowa Code 331.390. In 2021 the regional name was changed to *Care Connections of Northern Iowa*. The annual service and budget plan is a component of the Management Plan which includes three parts: Annual Service and Budget Plan, Annual Report and Policies and Procedures Manual in compliance with Iowa Administrative Code 441.25.

The FY 2024 Annual Service and Budget Plan covers the period of July 1, 2023, to June 30, 2024. The Annual Service and Budget Plan includes local access points, targeted case management providers, crisis services, intensive mental health services, a description of the scope of services to be provided including core services, budget and final

Managed Care Organizations (MCOs) as contracted through the Department of Health and Human Services/Iowa Medicaid Enterprise provide care coordination to regionally eligible Medicaid members within the scope of their contracted duties for persons with mental health and disability service needs.

C. Crisis Planning

Crisis prevention, response, and resolution are as much a mindset as it is a continuum of strategies and services. Crisis services are available on a 24-hour basis for prevention, supportive counseling, and debriefing. Crisis prevention, response, and resolution are also embedded in the treatment and support plans that are prepared by Network Providers, Targeted Case Management, Integrated Health Homes, Managed Care Organizations (MCOs) Care Coordination, regional Service Coordination, and regionally contracted Care Coordinators.



As these plans are developed, the goal is to explore options for an environment and support structure that works for a person to mitigate the triggers that lead to crisis and address areas of need within the domains of access to service, life in the community, person-centeredness, health and wellness, quality of life and safety, and the utilization of family and natural supports.

Some agencies specifically use a Wellness Recovery Action Plan (WRAP) that complements the coordination plan. Much of the prevention, response and resolution of crisis are handled through the normal services and supports people receive and is also reflected in access standards. Below is a table of current providers, contact information, and crisis services they provide in the region.

F. Financial Forecasting Measures



Throughout the year, Care Connections of Northern Iowa staff and stakeholders will identify unmet needs and areas for service development, which are incorporated into subsequent strategic plans and budgets to address the domains of access to service, life in the community, personcenteredness, health and wellness, quality of life and safety, and the utilization of family and natural supports.

Care Connections of Northern Iowa has complied with legislation and has continued to work towards achieving legislated fund balances. *Moving forward* Care Connections is working through forecasting the financial changes, quarterly payments as well a continued reduction of fund balance. We work to maintain a constant balance between the extensive programming demands of legislated MHDS Redesign (HF 2456 and HF 690) and the need for sustainable funding of our various investments in services.

Our Region realizes the responsibility to develop and maintain access to the regional service array across all member counties within our significantly rural Region. Combine our rural member county configuration with workforce shortages in mental health and disability services and unprecedented COVID-19-related challenges, we will rely once again on our partnerships with stakeholders to establish priorities and inform our regional development decision-making based on data, including utilization and efficiencies to deliver positive client outcomes.

We have and will continue to identify mutually beneficial opportunities for adults, children, and their communities to coordinate crisis services, treatment, employment, supportive housing, and enhanced service coordination to build on a sound, effective, and sustainable investment plan.

We strive to have our infrastructure provide better response and to comply with access and fidelity standards. With the passage of SF 619 and the changes that followed such as the development of a performance-based contract between CCNIA and Health and Human Services which identifies the following areas:

- Provision of Access of all core services.
- Partner with HHS to provide accountable mental health and disability services system, which
 includes standardizing definitions, data elements, and data collection, developing tools forservicewidee system outcome goals, and utilizing common data systems and metics to allow data
 validation and quality assurance processes.
- Improve Service Provision by use of Evidence-Based Practices (EBP's).
- Report administrative costs annually.

With these specific activities included in the contract, this will also shape the work of the financial practices of the Region as the aim is to standardize practices between regions, resulting in possible financial changes and policy changes. The Leadership of CCNIA as well as the Governing Board will continue to monitor and work towards meeting and exceeding standards.

Specifically in FY 24 Care Connections has plans to expand our team to better meet the needs of the citizens through Program planning, development, ongoing management as well as quality assurance of programming. While this position will add to the Administrative cost and structure of the Region it is apparent that the development of services and workflows will better aid the citizens. The goal is to work towards more preventive measures, build up services, and provide technical assistance and quality assurance to ensure the resources are utilized well and cost-effective.

Interdisciplinary teams have been or will continue to be assembled to address the projects listed below as part of the region's strategic plan priorities. These teams continue to examine and evaluate the regional system's infrastructure that focuses on crisis and non-emergent interventions, and treatment while developing meaningful avenues to address social determinants of health, including but not limited to supported housing, employment, and community integration.

The following table reflects regional strategic plan priority areas and the strategy to develop and implement them.

G. Provider Reimbursement Provisions

The following is a description of the types of funding used by Care Connections of Northern Iowa

• Fee for service:

The Region will contract with MHDS providers whose base of operation is within the region. Care Connections of Northern Iowa may also honor contracts that other regions have with their local providers or may choose to contract with providers outside of the region. A contract may not be required with providers that provide one-time or as-needed services. A fee-for-service approach will be utilized in most provider contracts outlining the services to be provided and the rate of reimbursement. All payments will be based on a pre-authorized request for service authorization with the exception of court-ordered payments, such as civil commitment costs and crisis services.

Block grant payments

Block Grant payments are made to regional service providers when the service they are delivering is on a per capita basis and does not have the adequate funding for other sources to cover the operational costs i.e. Mobile Crisis Response.

• Compensation for a "system of care" approach: Care Connections of Northern Iowa does not have a per member/per month reimbursement model in place but it is the goal to practice this value-based contracting in the future to manage population health.

• Use of nontraditional providers:

When a non-traditional provider arrangement is more appropriate than a fee-for-service approach with a contracted provider, the Coordinators of Disability Services will work with the region's CEO to request such arrangements. A non-traditional provider may be an individual, organization and/or business who delivers services in the consumer's home and/or another community setting. Non-traditional providers typically are individuals, organizations, or businesses which do not provide MHDS services as a part of their normal business. These services are not to provide treatment but are supportive and maybe rehabilitative in focus, and are initiated when there is a reasonable likelihood that such services will benefit the consumer's functioning, assist them in maintaining community tenure, and act as an alternative way to achieve the consumer's stated goals or outcomes. A request for funding can be made by any consumer, or the consumer's authorized representative, to utilize non-traditional providers for services as approved in the Regional Management Plan. Non-traditional providers may be subject to certain licensing, certification, accreditation or other state approval standards.

• Incorporation of all funding sources for individuals including Medicaid:

The Region is responsible for ensuring that MHDS services are available to all residents of the region regardless of funding source. Care Connections of Northern Iowa will ensure that individuals apply for all funding sources prior to accessing regional funding, including private insurance, Medicaid, Medicare and other funding mechanisms. The use of exceptions to policy (IAC 331.393 2 (h) are provided in cases where hardships and factors i.e. income and resource access and/or availability impedes the ability of the individual and/or their families to optimally live, work, and recreate in integrated communities of their choice.


