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## Introduction

Southwest Iowa MHDS Region (SWIA MHDS) was formed under Iowa Code Chapter 28E to create a Mental Health and Disability Service (MHDS) Region in compliance with Iowa Code 331.390. The annual service and budget plan is a component of the Management Plan which includes three parts: Annual Service and Budget Plan, Annual Report and Policies and Procedures Manual in compliance with Iowa Administrative Code 441.25.

The FY2024 Annual Service and Budget Plan covers the period of July 1, 2023, to June 30, 2024. The Annual Service and Budget Plan includes local access points, service coordination/case management providers, crisis services, intensive mental health services, a description of the scope of services to be provided including core services, budget and financial provisions, and provider reimbursement provisions.

The Annual Service and Budget Plan was reviewed by the Advisory Committees and approved by the SWIA MHDS Governing Board. The Southwest Iowa MHDS Region management plan is available in each local SWIA MHDS office, and on the region's website at <a href="www.swiamhds.com">www.swiamhds.com</a>. A list of Governing Board and Advisory Committee members can be found in Appendix A of this document.

#### A. Local Access Points

An access point is a part of the SWIA MHDS service system trained to complete MHDS regional applications for persons with a disability. ## **D. Intensive Mental Health Services**

The SWIA MHDS Region will be designating its Crisis Access Network (Southwest Iowa CAN) according to **Access Center** requirement in IAC 441-25.6(1). The region has a coordinated system for accessing and follow up treatment needs for mental health services. Service providers, along with region service coordinators, work in a coordinated manner to meet the needs of individuals in crisis. Individuals receiving a screening through various access points can be directed to the correct level of care or assessment. Individuals assessed through Mobile Response or those receiving Crisis Stabilization Services are referred to SWIA MHDS for Crisis Service Coordination to assure care coordination, navigation, and linkages to needed supports/services. Individuals presenting at local critical access hospitals throughout the region are often assessed by mobile response. The providers regularly involved in this system of care include:

# **G. Financial Forecasting Measures**

The following is a description of the financial forecasting measures used by SWIA MHDS Region in the identification of service needs and funding necessary for services. Historical service utilization is the starting point for all financial projections. There continue to be changes in the system leading to some unpredictability in forecasting. New people continue to access the Iowa Health and Wellness Plan and a waiting list continues for HCBS ID Waiver. Although it has been several years since the Iowa Medicaid system became managed by Managed Care Organizations (MCOs), the turnover of MCOs in the state leads to some unpredictability along with legislative changes and requirements of the MHDS Region system. The region forecasts any new services it creates based on cost estimates of similar programs in the state and familiarity with start-up costs of other services implemented by the region.

Throughout the year, SWIA MHDS regional staff and stakeholders identify unmet needs and areas for service development which are incorporated into subsequent service and budget plans. SWIA MHDS gathers information through its Advisory Committees at least twice a year to assess community priorities and begin planning for development of additional service needs and costs for both children and adults. The region will plan for use of available

financial resources in an effective and responsible manner. There are no reductions of services planned for FY24.

While the SWIA MHDS Region does not have any current fund balance concerns for FY24, the recent changes to state funding have caused some retooling of internal financial projection models to sustain the services available while allowing for continued growth of the system. The region will be required to have no more than a 5% fund balance effective at the end of FY24, therefore, planning for all expenditures and revenue is critical to maintaining enough fund balance to operate. Any balances beyond the 5% will be withheld from the following fiscal year putting at risk the sustainability of normal service costs.

# **H. Provider Reimbursement Provisions**

The following is a description of the types of funding used by SWIA MHDS Region.

- Fee for service: SWIA MHDS will contract with MHDS providers whose base of operation is within the region. The region may also honor contracts that other regions have with their local providers or may choose to contract with providers outside of the region. A contract may not be required with providers that provide one-time or as needed services. A fee for service approach will be utilized in most provider contracts outlining the services to be provided and the rate of reimbursement. All payments will be based on a pre-authorized request for service authorization except for court ordered payments, such as civil commitment costs and crisis services.
- Block grant payments: The region may utilize block grant payments when a service does not fit the traditional methods of payment based on a pre-approved individual service request. Examples are the 24-hour crisis coverage payments to the region's contracted mental health centers. There also may be an occasion when start-up costs for developing services are necessary. Such services would not be tied to individuals. Grant funding opportunities may also be offered by SWIA MHDS based on an assessed community need to engage providers in Evidence Based Practices, workforce development, and service enhancement or development.
- Use of nontraditional providers: When a non-traditional provider arrangement is more appropriate than a fee for service approach with a contracted provider, the Service Coordinator will work with the region's CEO to request such arrangements. A non-traditional provider may be an individual, organization and/or business who delivers services in the individual's home and/or other community setting. Non-traditional providers typically are individuals, organizations, or businesses which do not provide MHDS services as a part of their normal business. These services are not intended to provide treatment but are supportive and may be rehabilitative in nature. Such services are initiated when there is a reasonable likelihood that they will benefit the individual's functioning, assist them in maintaining community tenure, and act as an alternative way to achieve the individual's stated goals or outcomes. A request for funding can be made by any individual, or the individual's authorized representative, to utilize non-traditional providers for services as approved in the Regional Management Plan. Non-traditional providers may be subject to certain licensing, certification, accreditation, or other state approval standards.
- Incorporation of all funding sources for individuals including Medicaid: The Region is responsible for ensuring
  that MHDS services are available to all residents of the region regardless of funding source. SWIA MHDS will
  ensure that individuals apply for all funding sources prior to accessing regional funding, including private

insurance, Medicaid, Medicare, and other funding mechanisms which ensure that individuals and their families are able to optimally live, work, and recreate in integrated communities of their choice.

• Financial resource policy: SWIA MHDS follows the resource requirements of \$2000/\$3000 as outlined in administrative rule for FY 23 (331.393 subsection 2.h.). Under extenuating circumstances SWIA MHDS may offer an Exception to Policy for a short duration and for immediate needs while an individual is establishing an ABLE account, etc. Examples of this may include an individual needing immediate placement due to health/safety issues, or an individual who receives a Social Security back payment and is over resources until that money is spent down or put into a burial account. These exceptions are monitored closely, and the Region works with the individual's team to monitor progress toward spending down any amounts over the resource requirement.
