Animal Rabies in Iowa

in 2023, 14 cases of animal rabies were reported in Iowa. Twelve bats, one dog, and one skunk.

During 2023, 1,232 animals in lowa were tested for rabies and 14 were confirmed positive (1.13%). Historically, the percent positive varies greatly by species. It is important to note that this data is greatly influenced by the number of animals tested. Many animals are tested because they have contact with humans or domestic animals and they exhibit unusual behavior or clinical signs making them more likely to be infected with the rabies virus. For these reasons, the percentages should not be considered representative of the true distribution of disease within the animal population in lowa.


In lowa, typically the most common bat species submitted for testing are the *Eptesicus fuscus* (big brown bat) and *Myotis lucifugus* (little brown bat); however other bat species are occasionally tested.

There are two laboratories that test animals for rabies in Iowa:

- State Hygienic Laboratory at the University of Iowa (tested 621 Iowa animals in 2023)
- Iowa State University Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory (tested 611 Iowa animals in 2023)

lowa animals are also periodically tested in out-of-state laboratories.

Human Rabies in Iowa

lowa's most recent human rabies case occurred in 2002, and was caused by the bat strain. Prior to that, the last reported case occurred in 1951. The United States Department of Agriculture estimates 60,000 people receive PEP each year. The exact number of lowans who receive PEP each year is unknown.
