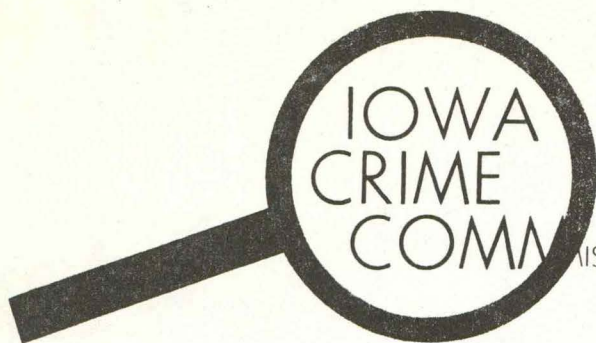

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INTRODUCTION  
STANDARDS AND GOALS CONFERENCE

Objective:

In January, 1973, 12 Iowans representing a broad segment of the Iowa Criminal Justice System were delegates to the National Conference of Criminal Justice Standards and Goals. It was the intention of the National Conference to provide recommendations through the establishment of standards and goals for the improvement of the Criminal Justice system and for the reduction of crime on a national basis.

Many of the standards and goals identified by the National Conference can serve as starting points for any state to outline its own goals for future Criminal Justice improvement. It is not possible, however, to simply lift the findings of the National Conference and transpose them into a state because of the peculiarities which tend to make one state greatly different from another.

Therefore, the Iowa Crime Commission embarked upon a program to prepare and conduct a three (3) day Governor's Conference on Criminal Justice Standards and Goals.

This conference was held in Des Moines, Iowa, November 27, 28, 29, 1973.

The intention of this state conference was to digest, debate, build upon, and adopt those portions of the work of the National Advisory Commission on Criminal Justice Standards and Goals which conference participants agree are applicable to Iowa and its subordinate jurisdictions.

As a direct result of the conference, the overall objective can be realized as follows:

"the development of a document containing concensus recommendations and plans for presentation to the Governor, the legislature, and the Citizens of Iowa, which will initiate and motivate action for improvements to Iowa's criminal justice system and the reduction of crime in Iowa." Obviously the acceptance of standards and goals by a broad and respected group of Iowans will add great credibility to the state comprehensive criminal justice plan for 1975 and beyond.

This conference involved Criminal Justice functionaries, state legislators, public officials, lay citizenry, representatives of Iowans for Better Justice, League of Womens Voters, Iowa Bar Association and lay citizenry who will contribute to the formulation of long range Criminal Justice Standards and goals for Iowa.

SUBSTANTIVE

I. Standards Screening and Selection.

Nearly 500 standards were developed by the National Conference and due to the time limit of the State Conference, it was necessary to reduce those to a manageable number (127), through a screening process based on criteria

developed and approved by the Iowa Crime Commission. Some of the criteria were based upon but not limited to:

- A. Magnitude of impact on crime.
- B. Political sensitivity.
- C. Legislation required.
- D. Difficulty of implementation.
- E. Degree of interrelationships and interdependence between the criminal justice subsystems.
- F. Cost of implementation.

## II. Working Paper Design

The development of well defined instructions and worksheets to be utilized by participants to include preparing and packaging reference material.

## III. Resource Persons

Selecting and providing knowledgeable resource persons from within and some from outside the State primarily for discussion leaders.

## IV. Conference Design

Structure of the conference was developed by a consultant in coordination with the State Planning Agency.

## Impact and Results:

As the results of the National Conference were to suggest national standards and goals for the improvement of the Criminal Justice System, so will be the result of the Governor's Conference on Criminal Justice Standards and Goals as they apply specifically to Iowa.

Therefore, it will be the primary purpose of the State Conference to establish state standards and goals in order to facilitate the development of a long range state master plan for the improvement of Iowa's Criminal Justice process. The importance of such guidance in long range planning will continue to be realized far down the road in the process of planning, administering, and improving Iowa's Criminal Justice system.

The following pages reflect the results (recommendations) of each workshop that were presented to the full conference. The results of the plenary session have not been compiled but will be included in a final conference report.
