Food drive starts Monday



Little things mean a lot

People who go far in their careers have a lot in common. They know what they want; they're highly motivated; and they work hard to reach their goals.

Those characteristics alone, however, do not guarantee success, says Tom Peters, one of the country's best known management consultants and authors (his latest book: The Pursuit of WOW!).

Successful people also must be superb managers, recognize opportunities, and take advantage of them elegantly.

Here is one of Peters' suggestions. More will appear in subsequent Staff Chatters:

• Give credit to all who deserve it.

In many agencies and companies, there's such fierce competition among workers that people try to hog the limelight or claim sole credit for themselves.

Such an attitude, sooner or later, always backfires. Colleagues eventually become resentful and hostile.

By sharing credit with as many people as possible, however, you elevate your stature in the eyes of co-workers while creating a network of people who owe you favors.

Important to remember...like recognition, credit must be sincere. And you can't just tell a colleague that she deserves credit for a good idea. You have to be sure to tell her boss at the appropriate time as well.

And — take special care to give credit to a rival. It makes you appear even more important. (It may also disarm him.)




It's a girl!

Tuesday, May 2: roast beef and mashed potatoes (lunch); ravioli casserole (supper).


Wednesday, May 3: meat salad sandwich and pasta salad (lunch); turkey fritter and potato wedges (supper).


The Larches balloon business offers lots of new colors and choices of mylar or latex balloons.




The Last Word
