Managed care: It's coming

This year the Iowa Legislature passed two laws that may have a significant effect on Woodward State Hospital-School.

The first permits us not only to serve people with mental retardation but also those with other disabilities. Section 222 of the Iowa Code has now been amended to read as follows....

The Glenwood State Hospital-School and the Woodward State Hospital-School shall be maintained for the purpose of providing treatment, training, instruction, care, habilitation, and support of persons with mental retardation or other disabilities in this state.

This amendment was proposed by the WSHS Future Planning Steering Committee. We were extremely pleased with the support we received from local legislators.

House File 483 also allows us to retain

income we earn by entering into a contract in which we provide consultation or treat-

ment services to defray the costs of providing the services. This could be import-

ant as we work with other agencies in part-

nerships.

Another important piece of legislation

this year was Senate File 69 — the Prop-

erty Tax Revision Reduction Law.

Positive changes here are possible under M.C.

This law establishes that the state will

provide money to counties for mental

health, mental retardation, and developmental disabilities services according to

a formula that's based on population, prop-

erty evaluation, and expenditures during

the past fiscal year.

We're starting to plan now for managed care

The counties will be required to have a managed system of services for mental health and a managed system for mental retardation services. This system will be required to provide a "...full array of appropriate services and cost-effective delivery of services, or contract with a state-approved managed care contractor or contractionrs."

No one knows yet what managed care will look like here

The Iowa Dept. of Human Services (DHS) is required to specify rules in consultation with the state-county management committee. The counties will then be required to submit their plans to DHS by Oct. 1, 1996, and to implement those plans by Jan. 1, 1997.

At this point, no decisions have been made about the process for developing this managed system.

A number of options are being considered by the state-county management committee. The money provided by the state must lead to an equal reduction in property taxes and cannot be used for other purposes.

So what does all this mean to us? Nobody really knows what the managed system of care will look like.

--Share Fair Committee Virginia Davis Barb Fuson Mary Kay Borts We are working hard to prepare for a managed system. In fact, the WSHS strategic plan now being developed for the fiscal year that began July 1, 1995, included a high-priority goal of providing services

in the context of managed care.

This will be a significant part of our plan-

ning as the year goes on. It may have some very positive effects on WSHS, because it might allow us to charge for services we

currently provide at no cost — and it might make clear to counties that the total

costs for services in the community may actually be more comparable to WSHS costs than people think. Why? Because, for in-

stance, medications and pharmacy and physician services are billed directly to Medicaid by community providers -- whereas

we pay for most of those within our per diem billings.

As you can probably see, the issue of managed care is extremely complicated. It's difficult to explain in a short description like this one.

The most important thing I can say now is that, for the past year, we've been working on planning for managed care. While it will certainly bring changes to WSHS, many of those changes may be quite positive for Woodward State Hospital-School.

Stated another way: The team's vision is to "develop a restraint-free environment through a reduction in use of restraints while maintaining safety for clients and staff."


After Team Forte established who its customers are and reviewed the available data, it formulated its mission statement:

To improve the behavior intervention system as measured by duration, frequency, and number of individuals.

The team then began collating restraint data, specifically the number of WSHS clients involved, the frequency, and the duration of restraint use.

Have you checked your smoke detector battery during the past month?

Back injuries here at Woodward comprise 20.2% of all the on-the-job injuries reported during the past two years.

Remember....

- Bending your knees and lifting with your legs is important for safe lifting. Just bending your knees, however, is not enough. What protects your back from injury while you lift or perform any stressful activity? The normal curves of the back.
- To prevent back injury during lifting, keep the curves of your back intact, especially the normal inward curve of your lower back.


Without that curve, the pressure within your lower-back lumbar disks is forced back toward the weakest wall of the disk, increasing your risk for disk rupture.

When your lower back straightens, the protective muscular contraction that holds your lower-back curve in place is weakened, increasing your risk for muscle strain.

Holding or "locking in" the normal inward curve of your lower back minimizes the strain on the weakest, most vulnerable walls of your lumbar disks and protects your muscles from strain.



As a result, the new title is now "Management Information Support Team" -- M.I.S.T.


