FOREWORD


With publication of <u>Guideposts to Higher Education in Iowa for 1965-1966</u>, the State Department of Public Instruction is resuming the series of annual booklets which present condensed statements about all universities, colleges and junior colleges in Iowa offering academic work above the high school level. Advisers of high school pupils interested in colleges will find in one place certain basic information about each school. By its very nature, this book will not provide all the information a prospective student will want, but will serve as a reference to be followed by direct contact with the school or schools in which an interest is developed.

Last year, the State Department of Public Instruction published a book that contained the same type of information about each college as <u>Guideposts</u> but with greatly expanded information about financial aids that are available to college freshmen. That book, <u>Scholarships and Loans Available to Iowa</u> High School Graduates, will not be revised this year. However, some copies remain and will be sent to public school officials upon request.

Copies of <u>Guideposts</u> are being sent to each high school district in the state. One copy is intended for the administrative office, and one for each high school. Guidance directors and other staff members who may like to obtain copies for use in the schools, may obtain them by writing to the State Department of Public Instruction, stating the number of copies needed. It is impossible to supply enough copies so that each senior can have a personal copy.

College costs for the 1965-1966 school year represent the best estimate that college officials can make this far in advance. However, college officials reserve the right to make changes in the charges at any time. Costs listed in <u>Guideposts</u> are those under the direct jurisdiction of the schools. Off campus living accomodations, clothing, transportation, laundry, school supplies, most social and recreational expenses are not included.

The State Department of Public Instruction wishes to thank college officials for their hearty cooperation in furnishing the data for this publication.



YOUR HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA IS WORTH 20 YEARS ON JOB

The comparative value of "experience" in a job in the U.S. is sinking rapidly. Today, just a high school diploma is worth 20 years of work experience without that diploma—an astonishing reversal of all historical precedents.


Until the post-World War II era, there was a premium on experience: An older worker in the U.S. earned more money for his years on the job than a better-educated green twig. But now, exactly the reverse is true.

To put a price tag on education, a man 35 years old with a high school diploma earns an average of \$1,594 a year more than a man with 20 years extra work "experience" but no high schooling. If this man has a college degree, he averages \$4.456 more a year than his counterpart with an extra 20 years' experience.

The last year of high school alone may be worth up to \$1,721 a year to a young man, government studies indicate. Over a man's working life, this will add up to tens of thousands of dollars—fancy sums for a dropout to forfeit in the last year of high school.

An alltime record of 51.9% of all male workers today have completed high school—meaning that for the first time the number of both men and women workers who have had at least 4 years of high school is larger than those who have not. But today's unparalleled teenage jobless rate of 16% underlines the grim fact that educational requirements for jobs are outrunning teenage educational attainments.

In view of the educational demands, it's downright terrifying to realize that over one-third of our young people are entering the labor force without a high school diploma. There is an unemployment explosion implicit in the fact that the Labor Dept. has not

changed its estimate that 7.5-million youths across the nation will have dropped out of high school by the end of this decade, and 2.5 million will not have even completed eighth grade.

It's not just a matter of money—although that's important. A man 20 years old today earns only \$748 a year on average if he has less than 4 years of high school. He earns an average of \$2,469 with a high school diploma, \$2,878 with a college degree.

The high school diploma also carries benefits beyond the paychecks, the most significant of which is job security. As a dramatic illustration, the jobless rate for high school dropouts 18 to 24 years old is nearly double the rate for those with a diploma —17.6 against 9.8%. For those with 1 year of college, the unemployment rate drops again by almost half—to 5.5%.

Even more alarming is the mounting evidence that lack of education is barring huge numbers from our new automationretraining programs. In one group of 107,000 applicants for training courses who were recently surveyed, only 6,300 survived the screening process for enrollment. Tens of thousands were turned down because they didn't have the basic education to qualify for the relatively simple classes!

No matter how you view it, the need for education is becoming increasingly imperative in our country. The teenager who drops out of school now and stays out dooms himself for life. Here's what the Census Bureau finds is the average annual income of men in various age brackets by years of school completed:

High School students should begin early in their high school careers to make plans for continuing their education beyond high school. They should elect those subjects which will qualify them for admission to the college course they hope to pursue

The number of applicants for admission now is so great that college administrators can be selective in filling their enrollment quotas. The first appraisal of a candidate will be based upon whether or not his high school record indicates a capacity for doing college work. Consideration also will be given to the extent to which the candidate has participated in the activities of the school, church, and community.

Many students will seek financial assistance. Most funds for scholarships and loans are administered by the colleges and can be obtained only after the student has been accepted for admission into the school. It is advisable to contact the college admissions office well before the time the student plans to enroll.

Three basic types of financial assistance are available for college students. (1) Scholarships. These are outright gifts or grants which do not need to be repaid. (2) Loans. Loans must be repaid, and usually require the payment of interest. (3) Jobs, both on campus and in the town in which the school is located. Some scholarships are awarded exclusively on the basis of excellent achievement in high school. In most cases a survey of family resources is made and the amount of assistance is based upon the need of the applicant.

Students who do not receive scholarships in sufficient amount to enable them to continue their education, may apply for loans. Most colleges have revolving funds at their disposal from which they can make loans to deserving students. In addition, there are many private sources in industry, churches, and banks who will help students.

The largest single source of student loans now available is the National Defense Student Loan Program, established under provisions of the National Defense Education Act of 1958 - Amended 1964. Under the terms of this Act, participating colleges receive funds from the government to be loaned to worthy students. Colleges in which these loans are available are indicated by the capital letters NDSLP in this booklet.

Under the terms of this Act a student may borrow up to \$1,000 per year, with a maximum of \$5,000 during college training. Repayment begins one year after the borrower ceases to be a full-time student, and is to be completed in ten years. Interest at the rate of 3% per annum begins at the time the repayment period starts. The Act contains the additional provision that if a borrower becomes a full-time teacher in public or private elementary or secondary schools or colleges, a maximum of 50% of the loan plus interest, may be cancelled at the rate of 10% for each year of teaching.

College officials also make work assignments for students.
