





All Iowa Reads 2025 Titles Announced







Just last week, the All Iowa Reads books for 2025 were announced on the Talk of Iowa program on Iowa Public Radio. Host Charity Nebbe was joined by two All Iowa Reads Committee members: Kamryn Kronschnabel with Charles City Public Library announcing the adult title and Janeé Jackson-Doering, State Library Youth Services Consultant, announcing the titles for teens and kids. Here we go:



Distant Sons by Tim Johnston. Adult Title: The paths of two young men collide and spark unexpected violence in a Wisconsin town where three boys went missing in the 1970s in this "intricate, haunting novel" Gripping and immersive, this crime novel by bestselling author Tim Johnston becomes so much more: a book about friendship and love and good hard work—and a masterful read about how the most random intersection of lives can have consequences both devastating and beautiful.

Rez Ball by Byron Graves. Teen Title: This compelling debut novel by new talent Byron Graves tells the relatable, high-stakes story of a young athlete determined to play like the hero his Ojibwe community needs him to be. After decades of rez teams almost making it, Tre needs to take his team to state. Because if he can live up to Jaxon's dreams, their story isn't over yet.





<u>Jawbreaker</u> by Christina Wyman. Kids Title: This is a funny and fresh middle-grade debut novel about jawbreaking dental drama. Max has a severe overbite. She already has braces, which means she lives on Advil and soft foods after each orthodontist appointment. But now Max has to wear totally awkward orthodontic headgear nicknamed "the jawbreaker." Could things get any worse?

Established in 2003, the purpose of the **All lowa Reads** program is to foster a sense of community through reading. Iowans are encouraged to come together in their communities to read and talk about a single book title in the same calendar year. **All lowa Reads** consists of three programs, each with one title chosen per year: adults, teens ages 12-18, and kids ages 8-12. Libraries, book clubs, schools and other local organizations are encouraged to sponsor discussions of the titles.

In the coming months, the State Library will have multiple copies of all three 2025 titles for lowa libraries to borrow for their local book clubs—those will travel via IAShares. And by January, we'll be ready to post book discussion questions, promotional materials, and more to the AIR website. Learn more at the button below!



Described as a mystery for the whole family to enjoy, <u>Montgomery and the Case of the Golden Key</u> features 10-year-old Monty Carver, who is out to find the origin of a golden



key found in his southside Chicago neighborhood. The year is 2008 and Monty's neighborhood is one that may or may not host the next Olympic games, that may or may not usher in the next U.S. President, that may or may not have a ghost hanging around \bigcirc
