ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Students should apply to the master's program in nursing through The University of Iowa Graduate College. Requirements for full-status admission include:

- · A graduate-level statistics course
- Current license to practice nursing in Iowa or another country
- Baccalaureate degree in nursing from a program accredited by the National League for Nursing
- Undergraduate GPA of 2.7 on a 4.0 scale
- Satisfactory Graduate Record Examination (GRE) scores
- Three letters of professional reference attesting to the applicant's capacity and potential for graduate study
- For applicants whose native language is not English, a minimum score on the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL)
- Health screening (health questionnaire and consent form, physical examination, urine analysis, rubella, rubeola, tetanus diphtheria, polio, TB skin test)

Individual consideration may be given to applicants who do not meet all of the above requirements.

Options are available for applicants with a non-nursing bachelor's degree or a B.S.N. from a nonaccredited program, for foreign registered nurses with a bachelor's degree, and for registered nurses with an associate degree in nursing or a diploma in nursing.

Statistics Requirements

Prior to enrollment in the research courses the student needs knowledge of:

- · Levels of measurement
- Univariate descriptive statistics (frequency distributions, percentiles, percentile ranks, central tendency, variability of dispersion, standard scores)
- Inferential statistics concepts (t-test, pearson r)
- Nonparametric statistics concepts (chi-square)
- Hypothesis testing (alpha levels, type I and type II errors)
- Inferential statistics (ANOVA)
- Nonparametric statistics (Mann-Whitney U test, Spearman's rho, Kendall tau)
- Use of computer statistical programs (SPSS, Minitab, BMDP, and some local programs)

FINANCIAL AID

Full-time students are eligible for limited professional nurse traineeships providing full or partial tuition support. The traineeships are funded by the federal government are are not guaranteed from year to year.

Limited teaching and research graduate student assistantships, graduate opportunity fellowships, and scholarships are available on a competitive basis. The best source of financial help for graduate students is a low-interest bank loan.

APPLICATION PROCEDURES

The college reviews applications for admission to the master's degree program continually. Applications must be complete, with all relevant materials submitted, in order to be reviewed.

Deadlines

May 1 December 1 for summer and fall admissions for spring admission

Students may first enroll during fall, spring, or summer semesters.

- · Completed application form
- Application fee
- Complete transcripts for work done in all undergraduate and graduate schools
- GRE scores
- · Three letters of professional reference
