This is the first edition of ARTalk for Partnership Programs, Julie Bailey, Editor.

July 1 - a new fiscal year! New projects begin in earnest this month and I hope that your favorite project received IAC support in the latest round of giving. As always, we received many more applications for project support than we could fund. Please do not become discouraged if your grant application was denied funding. Learn from the experience by evaluating the reasons why you were not funded. As an informational item. I thought I would share some of the common problems which we saw on grant applications this year.

GRASSROOTS PARTNERSHIP

Perhaps the most evident problem was found in the Visual Arts projects submitted. Less than 1% of the organizations requesting IAC support for visual arts projects submitted the proper support materials. The advisory panel members who reviewed these applications were appalled at the lack of slides to support projects and chose not to award all of the funds they had at their discretion. Judging from the number of requests that were submitted, many worthy projects were not funded due to inadequate support materials.

In the other discipline panels (Music, Community Arts, Theatre/Dance, Literature, Multi-Discipline), common problems arose. Incomplete applications, artistic quality not documented, budget discrepancies, lack of specific details on project, weak support of review criteria, and lack of evidence of financial need were among the items cited by the panels as reasons not to fund.

Even if you are an experienced grant writer, go over your grant application with a fine-toothed comb! Better yet, have someone else read it and make sure that all BRARY OF IOW the information is clear and that

you have all the required support materials. Plan in advance so that you are not caught writing the grant application at the midnight hour of the deadline.

New grant guidelines will be available in the Fall. Please do not hesitate to contact me for assistance. I cannot write your grant for you, but if we talk and discuss your project and the grant guidelines, it will better prepare you for submission. The IAC granting programs are extremely competitive and you need every edge you can obtain in order to write successful grants.

GRANT WRITING WORKSHOPS

The IAC will again be offering Grant Writing Workshops this year. Instead of just the Partnership Programs (General Grants for Projects, etc.) being on the program, all five of the IAC Program Directors will be coming to various locations throughout lowa to inform you of the latest guidelines, application forms, etc. These workshops will offer concurrent sessions, so please bring more than one person from your organization. The following dates and communities are tentatively scheduled:

You will automatically receive a mailing with finalized information if you are on our mailing list.

Make plans to attend and take the first step toward the Fiscal Year 1991 deadlines!

In addition to technical assistance being available to you prior to submitting the grant, it is also important to receive feedback on your grant after the review process has been completed. Last year the IAC developed a scoring system by which all grants are reviewed. Each of the review criteria, as they appear in the program

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quidelines, is assigned a score by each member of the review panel. By looking at the scores, strengths and weaknesses of the application can be pinpointed. Generally we only receive calls from the people who are not funded, asking why their application was denied. It is equally important for those who recieve funding to call or write for this information. It will assist you in becoming a better grant writer. Just as IAC staff members are unable to write your grants for you, we are also unable to make comments at the panel meetings. Even if we are extremely familiar with your organization, or even the actual project being reviewed, we are not at liberty to state our opinion on the project. This is why it is important that the information contained in the application and in the accompanying support materials be assembled in a manner that will give panel members the best possible overview of the proposal.

For those of you with projects that did not meet the current year deadlines, remember the Mini-Grant category. If you can rationalize to us why you did not submit under regular program guidelines, your project may be elibible for emergency funding support. Up to \$500 is available to each project. If you are interested in this possibility, please review the guidelines listed in the Grassroots Partnership brochure or contact me at the IAC office.

The Arts to Go program also falls under the Partnership program title and there has been some significant happenings in this program the past few months. If your organization wishes to present a performing artist or company in your community, this is the program you should consider. The current roster offers a wide variety of lowa performers, and whoever you might select, I know you would not be dissappointed. The IAC

will assist with fee support, up to 50% of the total performance fee, or \$3,000, whichever is less. Remember to book early and apply to the IAC for support at least three months in advance of your performance. If you need the listing of artists available, the applications forms, or just want general information about the program please contact the IAC.

This Fall, the IAC will be hosting the most important event of the year for those individuals and organizations interested in promoting the arts in their communities. It's PARTE time!

PARTE is the name of our first annual Iowa Arts Council conference. Many of you are aware of the two conferences sponsored by the IAC in the past, the Artists-in-Schools/Communities Conference and the Iowa Booking Conference. These two projects are now being combined into a single event and will allow you to save expenses and time in attending one major conference a year for the IAC.

T'S PARTE

The entire third page of this newsletter is devoted to giving you more information about the PARTE. I hope that you will plan to attend and bring a full contingent of your members. This conference will cover all of the education and partnership programs offered by the IAC. Fun and frolic are also on the agenda since the dates fall on and around HALLOWEEN!

If you are a presenting organization, you may be interested in the Midwest Regional Conference scheduled for September 14-17 in Kansas City, MO. Co-sponsored by Arts Midwest and Mid-America Arts Alliance, this conference is designed to bring presenters and artists together from throughout the mid-section of the United States. Performing companies. individual artists, and professional arts management personnel will be on hand to offer you a variety of performers to choose from to complete your performing arts season.
