Does your community have a Farmers Market? If you attended the State Library's Summer Reading Summits last month, you heard about a cool summer program from lowa PBS: it's the lowa **PBS Farmers Market**.

This is a ready-made program that provides 12 weeks worth of activities that build on everyday literacy learning for children. Materials include program guides, STEM

activities, recipes for the whole family to make together, and more.

From the PBS website "A local farmers market is an exceptional example of a summer learning environment that facilitates many examples of functional literacy. It provides a rich and immersive context for children to learn and practice problem solving skills, social skills, critical and computational thinking, all while encouraging intergenerational exchanges about the food we eat and the trades we need."

This program really came into its own two years ago thanks to Iowa PBS partnering with Perry Public Library. The program provided recipes, puzzles and brainteasers, guessing games, vegetable samples, STEM activities, as well as \$10.00 for each participating child to spend at the Perry Chamber of Commerce's weekly farmers market. This summer, Iowa PBS is proud to offer this same program to farmers markets in other communities.

Matt Burkey says "I'd love to work with other libraries across the state and see if we can get more walking school buses like we see in Perry, IA. I need librarians to reach out to their schools and help get the school signed up." Sounds like a worthy public library-school partnership!

About Walk, Bike, & Roll to School Day

This event connects with many issues that communities care about: creating safer and more walkable routes to school, building a sense of community and school spirit, and inspiring families to use their feet for the school commute more often. **Walk, Bike, & Roll to School Day** is a day to get to school without the car. Walking and biking to school help promote physical activity, community, and time together for the family. It is also an opportunity to reduce the number of vehicles around our schools which contribute to noise and air pollution. A great way to participate is to meet at a central location—like your local public library!

This event can help bring a community together linking physical activity, schools, and libraries. In addition, **Walk, Bike, & Roll to School Day** helps encourage communities to implement policy or engineering changes that make it safer to walk and bike to school. Take notes during your walk to school and identify any areas that need improvement.
