REQUIREMENTS.

All schools must be inspected before they are placed on the accredited list. The requirements for a fully accredited school are:

1. The course of study must be not less than four years of thirty-six weeks each in length, following an elementary course not less than eight years in length.

2. The course of study must require of each pupil not more than four recitations daily.

3. The entire time of at least three teachers must be given to instruction in high school branches.

4. The quality of instruction given and the character of the textbooks used must be approved by the Faculty of the College of Liberal Arts of the University.

5. Schools seeking considerable credit in science must demonstrate their ability to do successful laboratory work.

6. Schools seeking considerable credit in history and English must give evidence of a special library equipment for these branches.

7. The course of study must include at least two years of one foreign language.

Private academies, seminaries, normal schools or other secondary schools meeting the conditions mentioned above, or their equivalent, may be accepted on the same basis as high schools.

Partially accredited schools must meet the same general requirements as the fully accredited schools, but in the former there may be but two teachers, the course of study must be three years in length, recitation periods must be forty minutes long, no teacher may have more than eight recitations daily, and the principal can have but six.

GRADUATE COLLEGE—Graduates of reputable colleges may proceed to the degree of M. A. in one year, Ph. D. in three years. Graduate work in several of the professional colleges is offered. There are twenty-four fellowships and scholarships.

COLLEGE OF LIBERAL ARTS—Students are admitted from accredited schools and academies, and from the standard colleges of the State, without examination. Curriculum: numerous elective subjects under the group system, and combined liberal arts and various professional courses, leading to the degrees of A. B. and B. S.

SCHOOL OF POLITICAL AND SOCIAL SCIENCE—Provides for specialization in a wide range of subjects from commerce to sociology.

THE SCHOOL OF EDUCATION—Prepares for high school positions, principalships and superintendencies. Graduates eligible for first grade State teachers' certificates without examination.

SUMMER SESSION—Work arranged especially for superintendents, principals, high school teachers and librarians. Next session June 22 to July 27, 1908.

COLLEGE OF LAW—The course covers three years of nine months each. At the completion the degree of LL.B. is conferred.

COLLEGES OF MEDICINE, REGULAR AND HOMEOPATHIC—Courses, four years of nine months each. State bacteriological laboratory, in conjunction with the new general and clinical laboratories; and university hospitals with special clinics. Graduates receive the degree of M. D.

COLLEGE OF DENTISTRY—Course, three years of nine months each. Separate buildings and abundant clinics. Degree of D. D. S.

COLLEGE OF PHARMACY—Courses of two and three years of nine months each. Degrees of Ph. G. and Ph. C., and graduates are eligible to take the State board examination for immediate registration as pharmacists.

COLLEGE OF APPLIED SCIENCE—Embraces courses in civil, electrical, mechanical, sanitary and municipal, and mining engineering, chemistry and forestry, representing practical application of the principles of pure science. Degrees of B. E., and B. S. in chemistry.

THE UNIVERSITY SCHOOL OF MUSIC (affiliated)—Offers courses in vocal and instrumental music, harmony, theory, and history of music.

The professional colleges have been charter members in their respective national associations.

Professors and instructors (administrative and library staff not included) 129 plus 9 special lecturers. Total number of students, 1906-7, 2,072.

Matriculation fee, paid once for all, \$10; tuition free in the Graduate College, and to impecunious students in the Colleges of Liberal Arts and Applied Science. Tuition in the Colleges of Liberal Arts and Applied Science, \$10 a semester, including all laboratory fees, except actual cost of breakage and loss of laboratory materials. Tuition in the Colleges of Law, Medicine, Homeopathic Medicine, Dentistry, and Pharmacy, \$25 a semester. Honorably discharged soldiers of the Spanish-American war receive free tuition in the Colleges of Liberal Arts and Applied Science, and receive a rebate of \$25 a year on their tuition in other colleges; diploma fee in all colleges, \$10.

The cost of living in Iowa City is low. Many students pay part or all of their expenses by their work. Graduate fellowships at \$225, scholarships at \$125, and undergraduate scholarships at \$20 are available.

A dean of women cares for the special interests of young women. Semesters begin February 10, and September 16, 1908; summer session June 22, 1908.

This institution was established by the Iowa legislature in 1858, and endowed by the National land grant of Congress in 1862. In accepting the grant of the National Government, the Iowa General Assembly defined the object of the college as follows: "There shall be adopted and taught in the State Agricultural College a broad, liberal and practical course of study, in which the leading branches of learning shall relate to agriculture and the mechanic arts, and which shall also embrace such other branches of learning as will most practically and liberally educate the agricultural and industrial classes in the several pursuits and professions of life, including military tactics."

The business of the school is conducted by stated quarterly meetings held in March, June, September and December, at which meetings full and specific reports are filed by all officers and all committees, policies and plans for the future being determined. Special meetings are held on the call of the president whenever important contracts or other business of large importance must be considered.

The Normal School was established by the General Assembly in 1876 for the special education and training of teachers for the common schools. The institution was opened and began its work in September of that year, courses of instruction being provided whereby an education was obtainable by persons who plan to devote themselves to the public service as teachers in all grades of public schools.

The board was authorized to complete such organization of the school in the selection of teachers and officers as the needs of the work required. By statute the students who enter the Normal School must announce their intention of devoting their lives to the profession of public school teaching, and for this reason the course of study is especially planned and managed to that definite purpose, no work being offered at the school that does not have as a direct object the giving of effective preparation for the career of a public school teacher. It has been assumed that it was the province of the school to prepare special teachers, such as kindergartners, primary teachers, music teachers, manual training teachers, secondary school teachers, etc., and such assumption has been approved by the General Assembly making provision for buildings and equipment in conformity to such an excellent standard.

MANAGEMENT OF THE WORK.

The school is conducted for forty-two weeks to the school year, divided into terms as follows: fall, winter, spring, summer. The summer term is conducted for a time of six weeks, the other terms for twelve weeks, the sessions opening and closing to conform as nearly as possible with the plans adopted by the public schools. New classes are admitted at the opening of each session and a class is uniformly graduated at the close of each session. Graduates are given large assistance in securing remunerative and favorable appointments. School boards are given all the assistance within the power of the school to secure capable teachers. Under-graduates are given assistance in so far as their qualifications guarantee them success. The program of studies and the work of the school is printed in a quarterly bulletin which is obtainable on application. Bulletins that deal with the scholarship and methods of teaching are sold at cost. The standard required at the school is decidedly strong, definite and complete, giving the work in all respects the very best possible so as to guarantee acceptable service to those thus trained. The largest attention is constantly given to all the fundamental branches, as well as to the methods and plans of instruction. At the same time there is nothing omitted that would guarantee a good career for the student.

BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT.

The Normal School will have, when the plans of the General Assembly are carried out, a superior plant for all purposes connected with its work. Its prospects are now superior to any normal school in the United States, while its expense to the public in proportion to its breadth of service is on an economic basis. The trustees have been willing to secure the best and most modern equipment. The ventilation and heating system is the most modern that is possible to be installed, the temperature being regulated in all schoolrooms and fresh air being furnished by automatic means, so that contagious diseases are suppressed and the best of health is made possible. Everything about the institution contributes to making it a creditable school in which persons who are to have control of the health, happiness and success of the children in the public school are given a training and a development that is most essential. The shops, laboratories, library, art rooms, gymnasium, and other special features of the school, are among the first in character and fitness of service in the United States.

FOR BOYS, ELDORA.

Under management of the board of control of state institutions.

The object of these institutions is the reformation of juvenile delinquents. It is not a prison. It is a compulsory educational institution. It is a school where wayward and criminal boys and girls are brought under the influence of Christian instructors and taught by example, as well as precept, the better ways of life. It is a training school where the moral, intellectual and industrial education of the child is carried on at one and the same time.

With few exceptions, any boy or girl over 7 and under 16 years of age, who has become criminal, vagrant, disorderly or incorrigible, or over the age of 9 and under the age of 16 found guilty of crime in a court of record, may be committed to these schools by any court of record. Any boy or girl may be discharged or paroled from these schools at any time after one year's training, upon satisfactory evidence of reformation. They may also in exceptional cases be paroled or discharged in less than one year.

SOLDIERS' ORPHANS' HOME, DAVENPORT.

Superintendent—F. J. SESSIONS.

Under management of the board of control of state institutions.

There is in connection with this institution a school building, pleasant, commodious and well lighted, and it is the policy of the board to have the

course of instruction of the highest standard. A kindergarten is operated in connection for the very young pupils.

It is the aim to provide the children with plenty of good, comfortable clothing, and to have them taught to take good care of the same. Their clothing is all manufactured at the home, the large girls assisting in its manufacture. The table is supplied with a good variety of plain, wholesome food, and a reasonable amount of luxuries.

A library of well selected juvenile literature is a source of pleasure and profitable entertainment to the children, as from necessity the pastimes and pleasures of the children are otherwise somewhat circumscribed. The new chapel, erected recently, is a handsome and much needed addition to the home.

INSTITUTE FOR FEEBLE-MINDED CHILDREN, GLENWOOD.

Superintendent—GEORGE MOGRIDGE, M. D.

Under management of the board of control of state institutions.

The purposes or objects of the institution are to provide special methods of training of that class of children deficient in mind or marked with such peculiarities as to deprive them of the benefits and privileges provided for children with normal faculties. The object is to make each child as nearly self-supporting as practicable, and to approach as near as possible the movements and actions of normal people. It further aims to provide a home for those who are not susceptible of mental culture, relying wholly on others to supply their wants.

SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF, COUNCIL BLUFFS.

Superintendent—HENRY W. ROTHERT.

Under management of the board of control of state institutions.

This institution is free to all who are too deaf to be educated in the common schools. They must be sound in mind and free from immoral habits and contagious diseases. No charge is made for board and tuition.

The school opens on the first day of October each year and continues until the last day of June. Pupils should come promptly at the opening of the school and remain until the end of the season.

COLLEGE FOR THE BLIND, VINTON.

Principal—J. E. VANCE, Vinton, Iowa.

Under management of the board of control of state institutions.

The school term begins on the first day of September, and ends about the 30th day of June. It is desirable that the students enter at the first and remain until the close. They may, however, be admitted at any time, and they are at liberty to go home whenever their parents send for them.

The department of music is supplied with twenty-three pianos, one pipe organ, several cabinet organs and a sufficient number of violins, guitars, bass viols and brass instruments. Every student capable of receiving it is given a complete course in this branch.

In the industrial department, the girls are required to learn knitting, crocheting, fancy work, hand and machine sewing; the boys, netting, mattress making and cane seating. Those of either sex, who so desire, may learn carpet weaving.

These advantages are free to every person, either blind or of defective vision, and of suitable school age and capacity in the State. All that the friends are expected to do is to pay the traveling expenses and furnish clothing. If they are unable to clothe the pupils, the necessary clothing will be furnished here and the bill sent to the county from which the pupil comes.

IOWA SCHOOL SYSTEM.

ELECTORS.

Qualifications:—Male citizen of the United States, at least twenty-one years of age, a resident of the State six months, and of the county sixty days next preceding the election, a legal resident of the sub-district or corporation in which he offers his ballot. Female citizens possessing the same qualifications as to age and residence, may vote on propositions to issue school building bonds or to increase the school tax levy.

CORPORATIONS.

Classes:

School Township—Usually divided into sub-districts. Some are not.

Independent Corporations—Independent city, town and village districts, rural independent districts and independent district townships.

Meetings—Elections—Regular:

Subdistrict—Time: First Monday in March.

Notice: Five days' notice by posting.

Powers of Electors—To elect a director for the sub-district.

To vote schoolhouse tax on the sub-district.

Limit—Fifteen mills on the dollar, including the amount voted by the school township.

Corporation—Annual Meeting—Time: Second Monday in March.

Notice—Ten days' notice of, and of all propositions to be submitted.

Powers of Electors—To elect directors in independent corporations, and school townships not divided into sub-districts, and directors-at-large in school townships having an even number of sub-districts.

To fill vacancies in the membership of boards.

In independent CITY AND TOWN corporations, elect a treasurer for a term of two years from July 1st following.

To direct a change of text-books regularly adopted.

To direct the sale or make other disposition of any property belonging to the corporation and the application to be made of the proceeds of such sale.

To determine upon added branches that shall be taught.

To instruct the board that school buildings may or may not be used for meetings of public interest.

To direct the transfer of any surplus in the schoolhouse fund to the teachers' or contingent fund.

To authorize the board to obtain at the expense of the corporation roads for proper access to its schoolhouses.

To vote a schoolhouse tax not exceeding ten mills on the dollar to purchase sites, erect, complete or repair schoolhouses, procure libraries and open roads.

To vote on a proposition for county uniformity of text-books.

To authorize the board of directors or the county board of education to purchase text-books for sale.

To authorize the board of directors to purchase text-books to be loaned to pupils.

To authorize the board of directors to issue school building bonds.

Special—Subdistrict—Time: At call of the director of the subdistrict.

Notice—Ten days' notice by posting.

Powers of Electors—To vote schoolhouse tax as at a regular meeting.

Corporation—Time: Called by the board of directors.

Notice—Ten days' notice of and of all propositions to be submitted.

Powers of Electors—To direct the sale of school property and the disposition of the proceeds of such sale.

To vote schoolhouse tax for the purchase of sites, erection of schoolhouses and opening roads.

To authorize the board to issue school building bonds.

When called by the secretary, or if there be no secretary, by the county superintendent, to fill vacancies in the membership of a board reduced below a quorum.

OFFICERS.

Superintendent of Public Instructions—Chosen biennially by the electors of the State. Salary, \$2,200.

Powers and Duties—Has general supervision of all county superintendents and the common schools of the State.

Calls meetings of the county superintendents, appoints institutes, approves institute faculties, visits institutes and other educational meetings, and delivers addresses on educational subjects.

Renders opinions in writing concerning school law to school officers.

Hears and determines cases brought before him on appeal from the decision of county superintendents.

Reports biennially to the Governor the condition of the schools and annually to the Auditor of State the school population.

Ex officio, President of the Board of Educational Examiners and board of Trustees of the State Normal School.

Ex officio, member of the Board of Regents of the State University and Board of Trustees of the Iowa State College.

County Superintendents:—Chosen biennially by the electors of the county. Number, ninety-nine. Salary, \$1,250, and such additional sum as the supervisors of the county may allow. Eligibility, male or female, holder of first grade county certificate, State certificate or a State diploma.

Powers and Duties—Charged with the supervision of the schools and teachers and the enforcement of the school law in his county.

Conducts examinations of candidates for county certificates on the last Friday, and the Wednesday and Thursday preceding, in the months of January, June, July and October, and at such special examinations as may be appointed for his county, but no special examinations will be appointed except upon request of the county superintendent.

Registers certificates in his county and revokes the same for cause.

Holds a county institute annually.

Visits schools and holds educational meetings.

Hears and decides cases appealed from the action of school boards.

Is organ of communication between the superintendent of public instruction and directors, officers and teachers.

Reports annually to the superintendent of public instruction the condition of the schools of his county and to the county auditor the school population of the different school corporations.

Educational Board of Examiners:—Three *ex officio*, and two appointed members. No salary, but all necessary expenses are paid and those not salaried officers of the State receive three dollars a day for time actually employed.

Membership—Superintendent of Public Instruction member and president, *ex officio*.

President of the State University member, *ex officio*.

President of the State Normal School member, *ex officio*.

One man appointed by the Governor for a term of four years.

One woman appointed by the Governor for a term of four years.

Powers and Duties—Elect a secretary and define his duties.

Inspect and approve institutions desiring official recognition for the preparation of teachers.

Hold examinations for State diplomas and State certificates.

Issue State diplomas, State certificates, uniform county certificates.

Kinds of Certificates—State—First grade, Second grade, primary certificates and special certificate in music, penmanship or drawing, all of which are valid for five years; and two-year State certificate.

County Certificates—First grade, second grade, third grade, special and provisional. (See also "Certification of teachers" page.)

School Boards:—*Election*—*Terms*—In school townships, the members are chosen by the electors of their respective sub-districts, on the first Monday in March, for a term of one year; except that directors-at-large are chosen by the electors of the entire township on the second Monday in March. In independent districts, members are chosen on the second Monday in March for a term of three years—one-third being chosen each year. No compensation, nor may members act as officers of the board or be employed by it at a compensation.

Eligibility—Male or female: If male a qualified elector of the corporation or sub-district. If female, same qualifications except as to sex.

Membership—In school townships, the board consists of one member from each sub-district, but if the number of sub-districts be even a director-at-large is chosen. If the township is not divided into sub-districts the board consists of three members, chosen by the electors of the entire township.

In all independent corporations including all or part of a city of the first class or a city under special charter the board consists of seven members; in all other independent city, town and village districts and in independent townships of five; and in rural independent districts of three members.

Organization—Manner: By electing a member president.

Time: Independent city, town and village corporations, third Monday in March.

Rural Corporations—July first (second if the first falls on Sunday).

Officers—Secretary—Treasurer—Truant Officer.

Election—Manner—Time—Term.

Secretary is elected by the board at the July meeting each year.

Term commences as soon as qualified.

Treasurer—In independent city and town corporations is chosen by the electors on the second Monday in March for two years. Term commences July first after election.

In other corporations the treasurer is chosen at the same time, for the same term, and in the same manner as the secretary.

Truant Officer—Chosen by the board at the July meeting each year. In corporations having a population of twenty thousand or more it is mandatory; in smaller corporations it is at the discretion of the board.

Vacancies—Filled by the board until the next regular election.

Meetings—Regular—Independent City, Town and Village Corporations—Two. Third Monday in March and first day of July (second if the first falls on Sunday).

Rural Corporations—One. July first (second if the first falls on Sunday).

Special meetings may be called by the president or by the secretary when requested in writing by a majority of the board, but notice must be delivered to each member in person.

Powers and Duties—Determine qualifications of members. Fill vacancies on the board until the next regular election. Select schoolhouse sites and erect schoolhouses according to plans ap-

proved by the county superintendent with funds voted by the electors.

Elect teachers and dismiss them for cause, giving them an opportunity to appear and defend, the teacher having the right of appeal.

Prescribe a course of study for the schools of the corporation.

Adopt text-books for a period of not less than five years.

Contract for text-books when authorized by the electors, purchase text-books for sale to pupils and teachers of the corporation after advertising for and considering bids for furnishing them.

When directed by the electors to purchase text-books to be loaned to pupils.

Make rules and regulations for the government of themselves, the teachers and pupils and for the protection of school property.

Suspend or expel pupils for cause and authorize teachers to suspend them temporarily, notice being given at once to the president of the board.

Divide the corporation into sub-districts or wards, determine the number of schools that shall be maintained and designate the school each pupil shall attend.

Transport pupils when there will be a saving of expense and the pupils will receive increased school advantages or where they reside an unreasonable distance from school.

Admit non-resident pupils and determine the terms of admission.

Provide school privileges in adjoining school corporations and pay for same.

Provide for visiting the schools and aid in enforcing the rules and regulations.

When authorized by the electors at the regular annual meeting, permit the use of school buildings for purposes other than public schools.

Provide for the holding and conducting of the annual meeting of the corporation on the second Monday in March and provide by proper notices for the submitting of propositions.

Call special elections.

Financial—Taxes—Estimate the amount needed for the teacher's and contingent funds and for the schoolhouse fund to pay on bonds and interest. (The electors vote schoolhouse tax for the erection of schoolhouses.)

Bonds—Issue school funding bonds to pay judgments; and, when authorized by the electors, they may issue school building

bonds for the purpose of erecting, completing or improving schoolhouses.

County Board of Education:—Only in counties having county uniformity.

County Uniformity—Adoption—Adopted by vote of the electors of rural corporations of the county at the regular annual meeting.

Membership—County Superintendent, chairman.

County Auditor, secretary.

Members of the county board of supervisors.

Powers and Duties—Adopt and contract for text-books and supplies for use in the rural schools of the county after advertising for bids.

Purchase for sale to teachers and pupils the text-books and supplies adopted by them.

Appoint depository agents to keep the books and supplies for sale and make settlement with them.

INDEBTEDNESS—LIMIT.

Constitutional:—Five per cent of the value of taxable property.

Statutory—One and one-fourth per cent of the actual value of the taxable property. (When the board of an independent school corporation having a population of three thousand or less is petitioned by a majority of the electors and the proposition carries by a two-thirds vote, the limit is two and one-half per cent.) A tax voted is not indebtedness.

FUNDS.

Schoolhouse Fund:—For erection, completion and improvement of schoolhouses and purchase of libraries, school sites and roads.

Sources—

District Taxes—Levied by county supervisors.

Voted by electors for erection of schoolhouses and payment of debts incurred for the same; purchase of sites and roads.

Limit—Ten mills on the dollar.

Estimated by the board for payment on bonds and interest.

Limit—Five mills on the dollar.

Proceeds from sale of bonds issued as follows:

School funding bonds to pay judgments and indebtedness arising from maturing bonds lawfully authorized.

Authorized by resolution of the board.

Limit—Amount of judgments and maturing bonds.

School building bonds for the erection, completion or improvement of school buildings.

Authorized by vote of the electors.

Limit—See "Indebtedness" above.

Contingent Fund:—For incidental expenses, repairs, fuel, rent, free text-books, text-books purchased for sale, for libraries and apparatus and for transportation.

Sources—

District Taxes—Levied by the board of supervisors.

Estimated by the board of directors.

Limit—Five dollars for each person of school age, except that seventy-five dollars may be estimated for each school, and five dollars additional for each person of school age for transportation, and one dollar and fifty cents for free text-books.

Transfer from schoolhouse fund.

Teachers' Fund:—Pay teachers, tuition and for library books.

Sources—

District Taxes—Levied by supervisors.

Estimated by the board for the payment of teachers and tuition.

Limit—Fifteen dollars for each person of school age, including the semi-annual apportionment, but two hundred seventy dollars may be estimated for each school.

Semi-Annual Apportionment—Apportioned according to the school population (school age 5 to 21 years).

Sources—

Permanent—Interest on permanent school fund.

Temporary—County tax of one to three mills, determined and levied by the supervisors.

Proceeds of fines.

Tuition.

Transfer from schoolhouse fund.

Institute Fund:—To defray the expenses of the institute.

Sources—

Examination Fees—One dollar is paid by each candidate for a certificate, one-half of which is paid into the institute fund and one-half into the state treasury to defray the expense of grading manuscripts and issuing certificates.

Registration Fees—In every case of registration a fee of one dollar is paid into the institute fund. No certificate or diploma is valid until registered in the county in which the holder teaches.

Enrollment Fees—Institute attendance is voluntary, but a fee of one dollar is charged each one who enrolls.

State Appropriation—Each county in which an institute of at least six days is held receives \$50 from the state.

County Appropriation—The supervisors may appropriate such sum as they deem necessary.

CERTIFICATION OF TEACHERS.

Outline of the Law and the Regulations of the Educational Board of Examiners Governing the Issuing of Teachers' Licenses.

Licenses:—Necessity for: No person may be employed to teach in any public school or receive compensation from public funds for teaching, except he be the holder of a license, valid in the county in which he desires to teach.

Kinds of—State: Diploma:

Certificates—First grade, second grade, primary, special certificates in music, penmanship and drawing, and two-year.

County: First grade, special, second grade, third grade and provisional.

Term—State: Diploma—During life of holder.

Certificate—Five years, except the two-year certificate.

County—First grade and special, three years; second grade, two years; third grade and provisional, six months.

By Whom Issued—All teachers' licenses are issued by the Educational Board of Examiners.

Registration—Validity—No license is valid until registered in the office of the county superintendent of the county in which the holder desires to teach. When registered it is valid in that county until July first following.

Fee for Registration—In every case of registration the county superintendent shall collect a fee of one dollar to be paid into the institute fund of the county in which registration is made.

Basis of Issue: Examination, graduation from a standard college or normal school (see page 85). certificate issued by another state and renewal.

Fees: Diploma, five dollars; state certificate, two dollars; county certificate, one dollar.

To Whom Paid: State fees to the state superintendent as president of the educational board of examiners.

County fees are paid to the county superintendent.

Disposition of—State certificate and diploma fees are paid to the state treasurer.

County certificate examination fees are paid, one-half to the county treasurer for the institute fund, and one-half to the state treasurer.

Registration fees are paid to the county treasurer.

County Certificates—General provisions.

Examination—Place: Office of county superintendent or place provided by the county board of supervisors.

Conductor—The county superintendent conducts all examinations for county certificates held in his county. He is required to admit to the examination only those eligible to receive certificates.

Eligibility of Candidates for Certificates—

Character—Only persons of good moral character are eligible. If the superintendent does not have knowledge of this fact he should require proof.

Age—No person may receive a county certificate until he has reached the age of eighteen years. Only persons who have reached the age of eighteen or who will become eighteen before the next regular examination should be admitted.

Other qualifications: Aptness to teach, ability to govern, physical and mental condition, professional spirit, etc.

Dates—Regular—The last Friday and the Wednesday and Thursday preceding of January, June, July and October of each year.

Supplemental—Appointed by county superintendent, same dates as the regular examination.

Special—Appointed by the president of the educational board of examiners upon request of the county superintendent. Provisional certificates only may be obtained at a special examination and grades received at such an examination may not receive credit toward a regular certificate.

Re-Examination—Candidates failing to make a required standing will, upon a second trial, if made within one year, be required to pass in such subjects only as are necessary to enable them to meet the requirements for the grade of certificate they desire. At a third trial, all subjects required in the first examination must be taken.

Renewals—Certificates issued under present law:

Certificates Eligible—First grade, second grade and special certificates.

Conditions—Candidates must have pursued at least one line of professional inquiry during the life of the certificates to be renewed.

Proof of successful experience and professional spirit.

Certificates issued by county superintendents under previous law.

Classes Eligible—First grade two-year certificates in force October 1, 1905, are eligible to renewal.

Second grade certificates, having first grade per cents, in force October 1, 1905, receive such credit as the educational board of examiners may determine.

Conditions—Theme—An essay of from three hundred to five hundred words on a subject selected by the applicant from a list of subjects submitted by the board of examiners.

Experience—Documentary evidence of successful experience during the preceding school year from members of school board and county superintendent, and if the candidate taught in a graded school, from the city superintendent or principal.

Standing—A first grade certificate is renewable as such.

Second Grade Certificates—Grades of ninety per cent or higher are accepted in lieu of an examination in those subjects for a uniform certificate, whether of first or second grade.

Fees—Examination—One dollar; one-half paid into institute fund and one-half into state treasury.

Registration—One dollar. Paid into institute fund.

Classes—Provisional, third grade, second grade, first grade and special certificates.

Provisional—Subjects Required: Orthography, reading, writing, arithmetic, geography, grammar, physiology, U. S. history, didactics and elements of vocal music.

Age—Not less than eighteen years.

Term of—Six months. County superintendent may extend it to July first following date of issue without fee.

Registration—May be registered only in the county in and for which it was issued.

Renewal—Not eligible to renewal.

Third Grade—Subjects: Same as for a provisional.

Standing—An average of 65 per cent with no grade below 60.

Age—Not less than eighteen years.

Term—Six months. County superintendent may extend to July first following date of issue without fee.

Registration—Is eligible to registration in any county, but a county superintendent having a sufficient supply of teachers holding higher classes of licenses may not be compelled to register third grade certificates.

Renewal—Not eligible to renewal. Not more than two may be issued to the same person.

Second Grade—

Subjects—Same as enumerated above.

Standing—An average of 75 per cent with no grade below 70.

Age—Not less than eighteen years.

Term—Not to exceed two years.

Registration—Is eligible to registration in any county.

Renewal—Is entitled to one renewal.

First Grade—

Subjects: Elementary algebra elementary physics, elementary civics and elementary economics in addition to the subjects required for the above named classes of certificates.

Standing—An average of 85 per cent with no grade below 75.

Age—Not less than eighteen years.

Experience—At least thirty-six weeks of successful experience or having completed an accepted course of study in an approved college or normal school.

Term—Three years.

Renewal—Is eligible to renewal.

Special—Subjects: Any subject or any group of subjects taught in the public schools. In addition to the subject or group of subjects for which a certificate is desired, the candidate shall pass in psychology, school management and principles and methods of instruction as applied to secondary education.

Standing—Same as for a first grade.

Age—Not less than eighteen years.

Experience—Same as for first grade.

Term—Three years.

Renewal—Is eligible to renewal.

State Licenses—General Regulations—

Examinations—Dates—Places—The educational board of examiners is required to hold at least two examinations annually and may hold such others as it may determine. The board determines the date and place of all examinations.

Regular Annual—Place—Des Moines.

Diploma—An examination for diplomas is offered the Friday and Saturday after Thanksgiving each year.

Certificates—An examination for state certificates is offered during the holidays, at the time of the session of the Iowa State Teachers' Association.

Special—A candidate for a state certificate whose application and fee, two dollars, have been filed with the Board of Examiners, may write at a regular examination in any county, provided the county superintendent files his request for questions for such examination at least twenty days before it is to begin.

Conductor—A state examination must be conducted by a member of the Board of Examiners, the secretary or a person appointed by the board.

Re-examination—Candidates failing in any examination will, upon a second trial, if made within one year, be excused from again passing in those subjects in which they earned a grade of 85 per cent or more. At a third trial all subjects must be taken.

Renewals—Requirements for—Documentary evidence of success and professional spirit during life of certificate to be renewed.

Fees—Examination—For state certificate, two dollars; for state diplomas, five dollars.

Disposition of—All state examination fees are paid into the state treasury by the educational board of examiners.

Classes of State Licenses—Two-year certificates, special certificates, first grade certificate, second grade certificates and diplomas.

Two-Year Certificates—Subjects—Candidates for this certificate pass in the same subjects as are required for first grade county certificates.

Basis of Issue—Examination.

Term—Two years.

Standing—Same as for first grade county certificates. An average of 85 per cent with no grade below 75.

Experience—No experience required.

Eligibility—Only graduates of approved courses of accredited institutions may be admitted to an examination for two-year state certificates.

Special Certificates—Kinds—Primary and music, penmanship or drawing.

Primary—Subjects—Scholastic—The usual common branches required for county certificates. First and second grade

uniform county certificates may be offered in lieu of an examination in these subjects.

Professional—Psychology of the child, school management, history of education, school laws of Iowa, primary methods, drawing, plant study, vocal music and physical culture.

Music—Penmanship—Drawing—Special state certificates are issued for each of these subjects, but a special certificate may not include more than one subject.

Term—Five years.

Standing—Each case is determined upon its merits.

Age—Not less than nineteen years.

Experience—At least two years of thirty-six weeks each, but graduates of approved special training courses of standard institutions may be admitted with less experience.

Second Grade State Certificates—Subjects—Orthography, reading, writing, arithmetic, geography, grammar, bookkeeping, physiology, U. S. history, algebra, botany, physics, civics, drawing, constitution and laws of Iowa, economics, didactics and vocal music.

Basis of Issue—Examination, graduation from a standard college or normal school or equivalent certificates or diplomas issued by other states. (For points governing classification see page 85.)

Term—Five years. May be extended by renewal.

Standing—Each case is determined upon its merits.

Age—Not less than nineteen years.

Experience—At least two years of thirty-six weeks each, except that graduates of standard colleges or normal schools who have pursued a course in pedagogy may offer such preparation in lieu of experience.

First Grade State Certificates—Subjects—In addition to the subjects required for a second grade state certificate, rhetoric, American and English literature, geometry, general history and psychology, including theory and practice of the construction of courses of study, are required.

Basis of Issue—Examination, graduation from a standard college or normal school or equivalent certificates or diplomas issued by other states. (For points governing classification see page 85.)

Term—Five years. May be extended by renewal.

Standing—Each case is determined upon its merits.

Age—Not less than nineteen years.

Experience—At least two years of thirty-six weeks each, except that graduates of standard colleges or normal schools who have pursued a course in pedagogy may offer such preparation in lieu of experience.

Diplomas—Subjects—In addition to those requirements for a regular first grade state certificate a candidate must pass in trigonometry, chemistry, zoology, geology, astronomy.

Term—During life of the holder.

Standing—Each case is determined upon its merits.

Experience—At least three years' experience under a state certificate issued by the board of examiners.

POINTS FOR DETERMINING THE ACCEPTANCE OF REGULAR
AND COLLEGIATE COURSES OF INSTRUCTION IN AC-
CORDANCE WITH CHAPTER 148, ACTS OF
THIRTY-SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

(Sections 2634-f to 2634-h, School Laws, 1907.)

DEFINITION.

An institution whose graduates are entitled to certificates shall provide at least a sufficient number of class hours of college grade to offer opportunity for freshman, sophomore, junior and senior years' work, making a total minimum of sixty hours for any one semester. Laboratory hours shall be reckoned as not less than two for one recitation hour.

THE EIGHT POINTS.

I. The number of class hours for the heads of departments and students shall not exceed twenty a week.

II. A faculty properly qualified shall consist of graduates of colleges who have pursued graduate work equivalent at least to that required for a master's degree.

III. The library shall consist of at least five thousand volumes, selected with reference to college subjects and exclusive of public documents.

IV. The laboratory equipment shall be worth not less than \$5,000 and so distributed as to establish at least an efficient chemical, physical, botanical and zoological laboratory.

V. The means of support is defined as requiring a permanent endowment of not less than \$200,000 or a fixed assured income exclusive of tuition equivalent to the interest derived from at least \$200,000.

VI. The average salary of the heads of departments, exclusive of the salary of the president, shall be at least \$1,000.

VII. The college must maintain at least seven separate departments or chairs, and in case the pedagogical work of the institution is to be accepted without examination the college must maintain at least eight chairs, one of which shall be devoted exclusively to education or at most to philosophy, including psychology and education. The heads of these departments should be devoted to college work.

VIII. The graduates must show the completion of a four-year secondary course and a four-year college course above the usual eight grades of the common schools, and the standing and character of the institution and the nature of its equipment and work must be such as to entitle its graduates to admission to the graduate college of the State University of Iowa.

THE GROUPING OF COLLEGES.

1. Colleges fully meeting the eight points shall constitute group A.
2. Colleges meeting either five, six or seven of the eight points shall constitute group B.
3. Colleges fully meeting either three or four of the eight points shall constitute group C.

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
