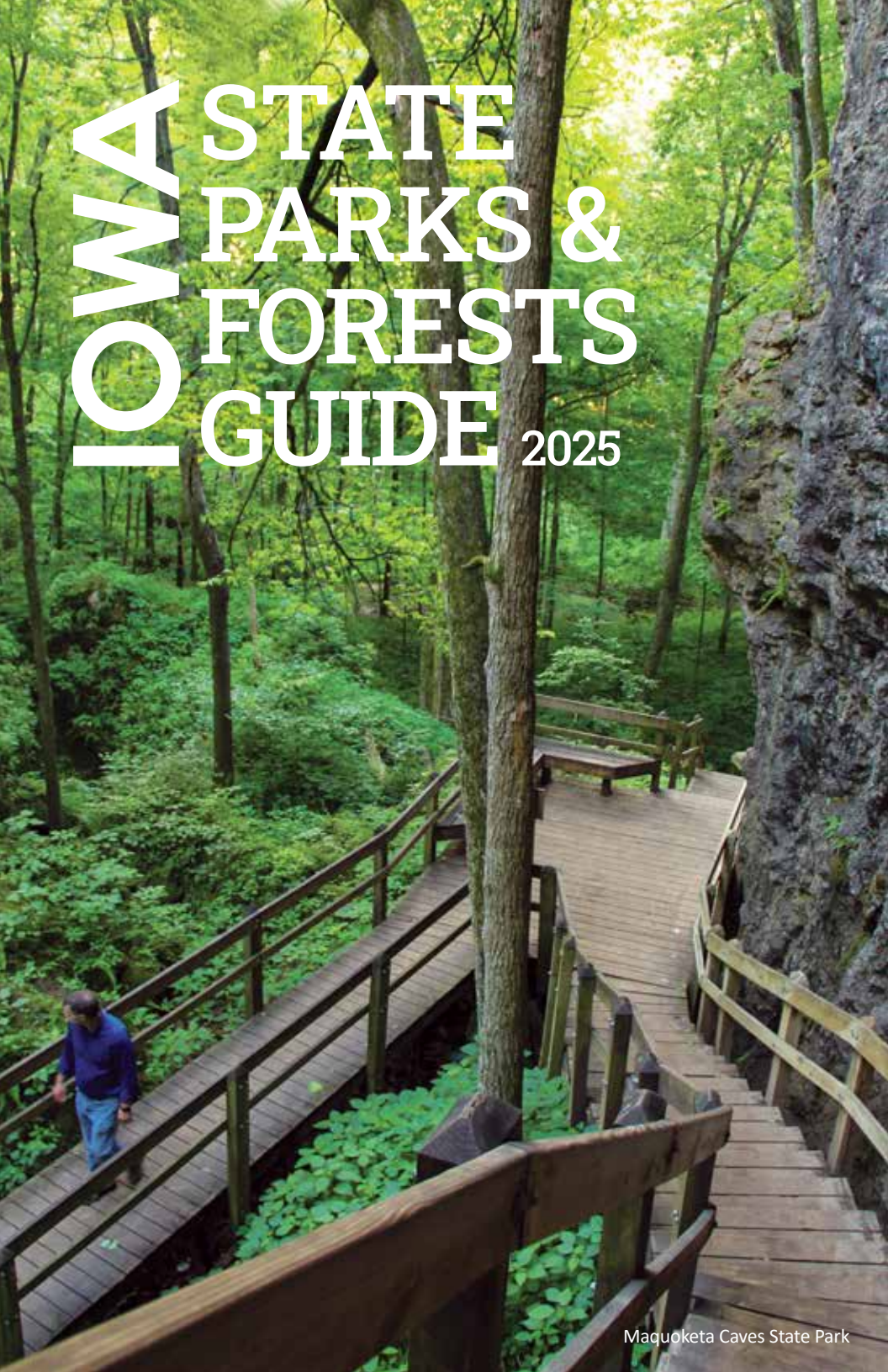


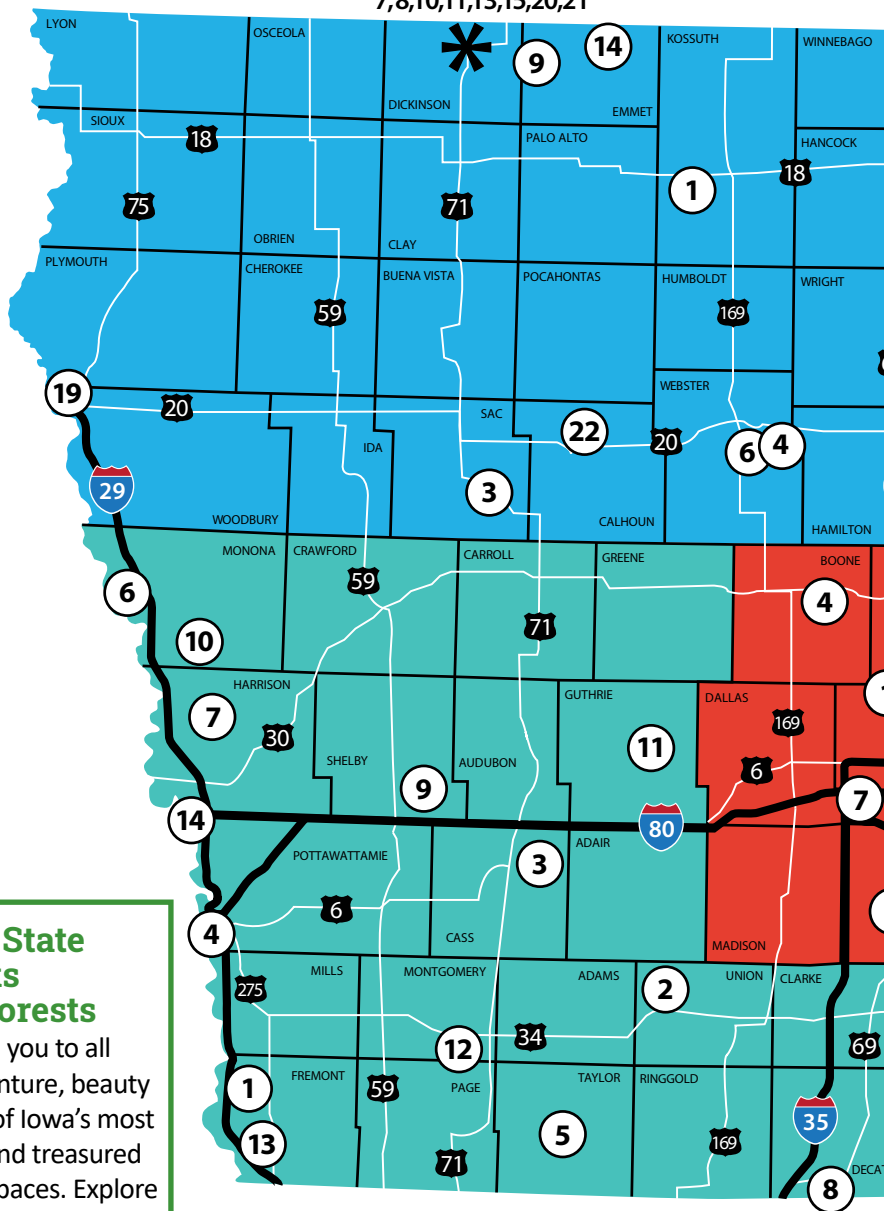

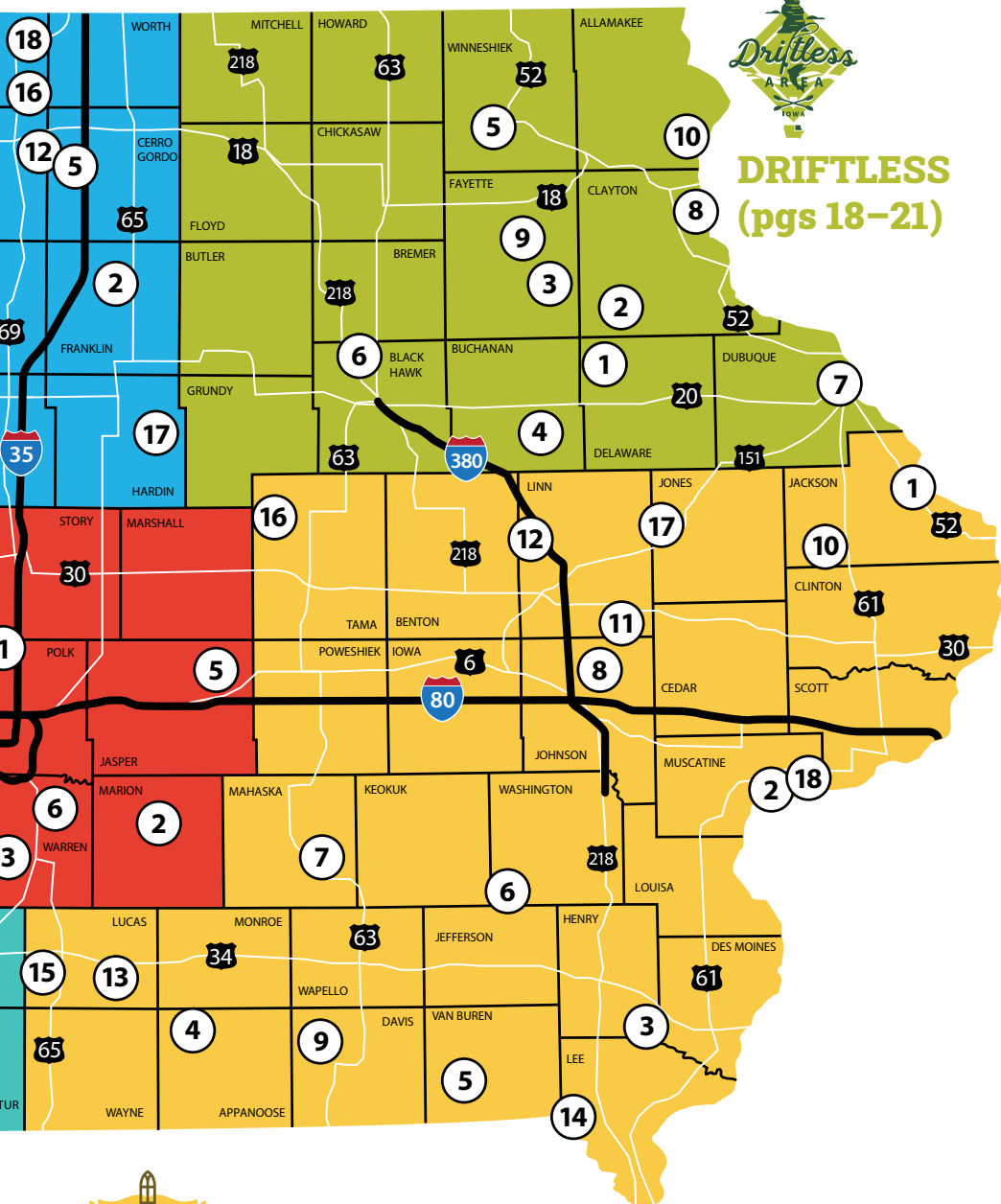

PLAN YOUR STAY

Ready to visit an Iowa state park? The best place to start is the website: iowadnr.gov/stateparks to pick a park, find maps and reserve a cabin, campsite, lodge or shelter. You also can learn about each state park's history, features, recreation and amenities.

RESERVATIONS:

Planning a weekend camping trip, family vacation, wedding or reunion? Iowa state parks and forests might have the perfect facility to meet your needs. Reservations can be made online.

Cabins: Stay in one of more than 90 cabins, including year-round, rustic camping cabins, yurts and more. Many cabins offer full kitchens and can accommodate varying party sizes. Cabins can be rented for a minimum of a two-night stay during the off-

season, and for one-week stays during the summer.

Lodges and Shelters: Reserve a lodge for your next special event. Lodges are enclosed structures, many historic, that normally include electricity, water, restrooms and a kitchen. Or rent an open-air shelter for a day-use family gathering.

Campsites: Enjoy an overnight stay in a tent or RV. A few things to know:

- Reservations can be made online for most campsites up to three months in advance, with limited walk-in availability on a first-come, first-served basis.
- Facilities vary from park-to-park. Most campsites have picnic tables and fire rings. Many campgrounds offer full hook-up amenities for RVs, pull-through sites, electricity and modern shower facilities.

Some parks offer more rustic experiences with pit toilets but no shower facilities. Be sure to check the reservation site when planning your visit.

- Other unique camping opportunities include hike-in, equestrian and youth group sites.

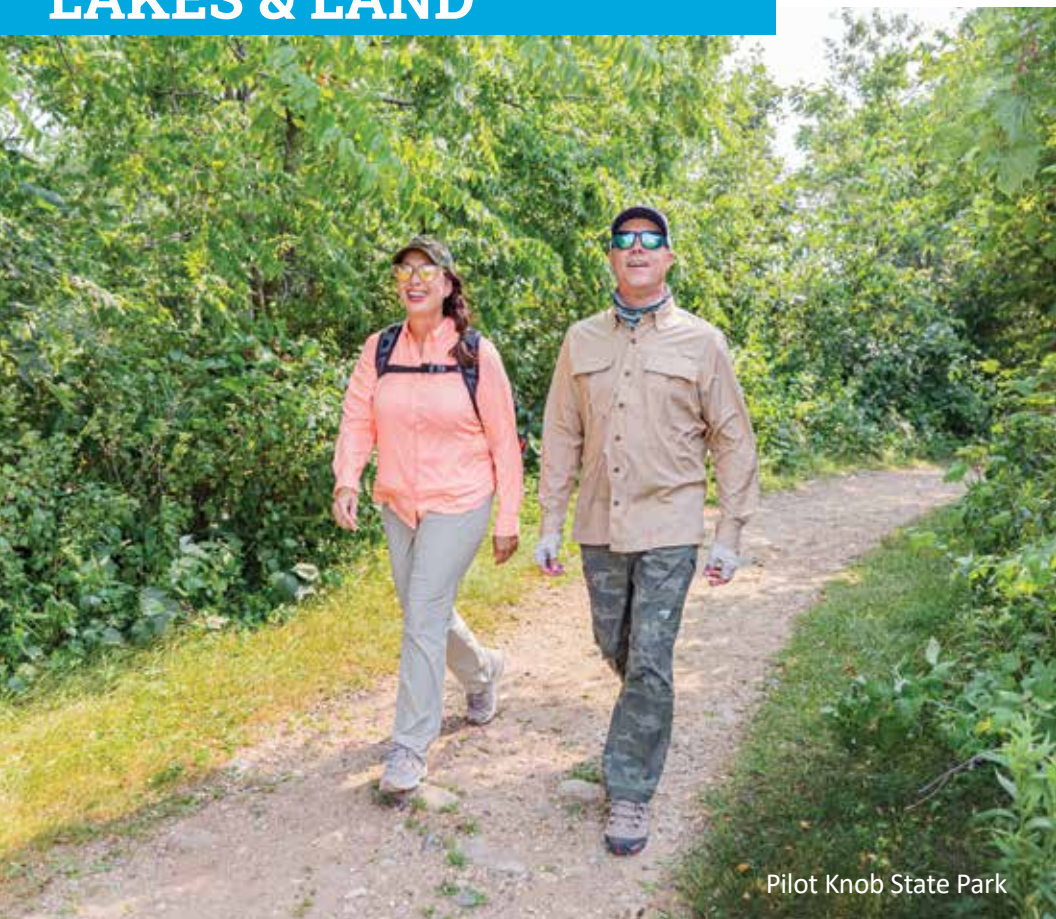

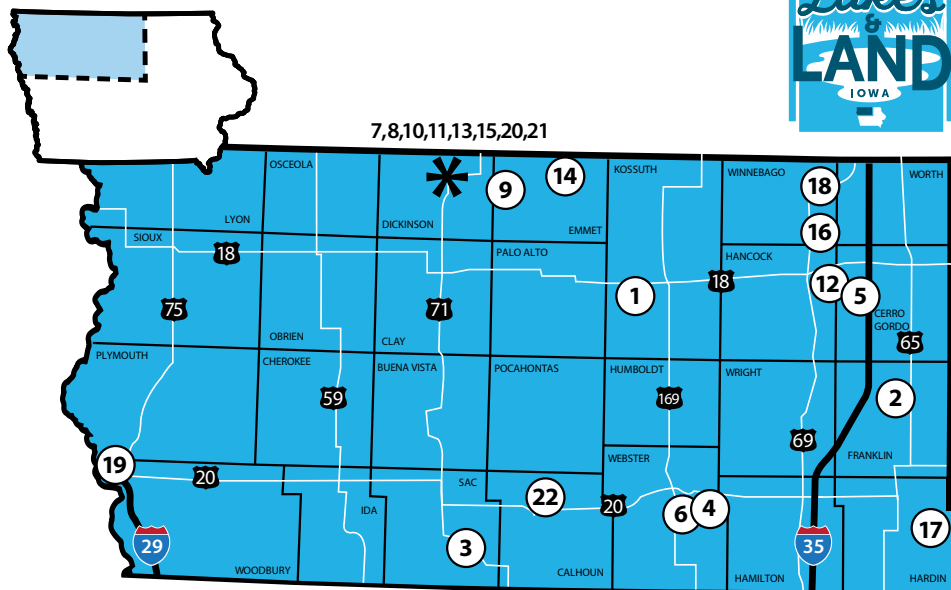

Pilot Knob State Park

Explore Iowa's Lakes and Land region, home to several state parks and recreation areas full of hidden gems and geological discoveries. Start at **Gull Point State Park** on the shore of the glacier-formed West Lake Okoboji. It is one of several state park areas in the Great Lakes region. Venture to **Clear Lake State Park** or **McIntosh Woods State Park** for a day of boating,

fishing or biking in Iowa's northern prairie region. Climb a CCC-era tower at **Pilot Knob State Park** to take in 360-degree views of Iowa countryside. End your adventure at **Brushy Creek State Recreation Area**, offering 45 miles of multi-use trails, or **Dolliver Memorial State Park**, home to a box canyon with Native American lore called Boneyard Hollow. Adventure awaits!

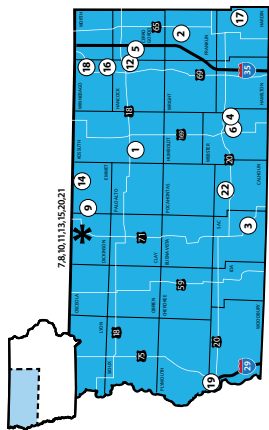


Clear Lake State Park

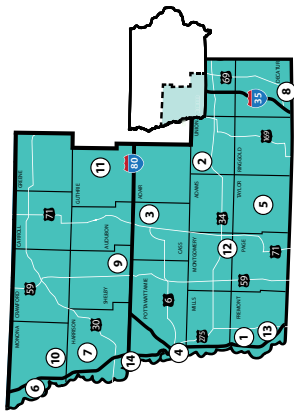


Loess Hills State Forest

With 200 miles of windblown hills along Iowa's western border, the Loess Hills offer unique experiences full of natural history. Start exploring at **Loess Hills State Forest** and **Preparation Canyon State Park**. Continue your Loess Hill tour with majestic views and a vast trail system at **Waubonsie State Park**. For a bit of history, head to **Lewis and Clark State Park**, a site on the famed trail, or

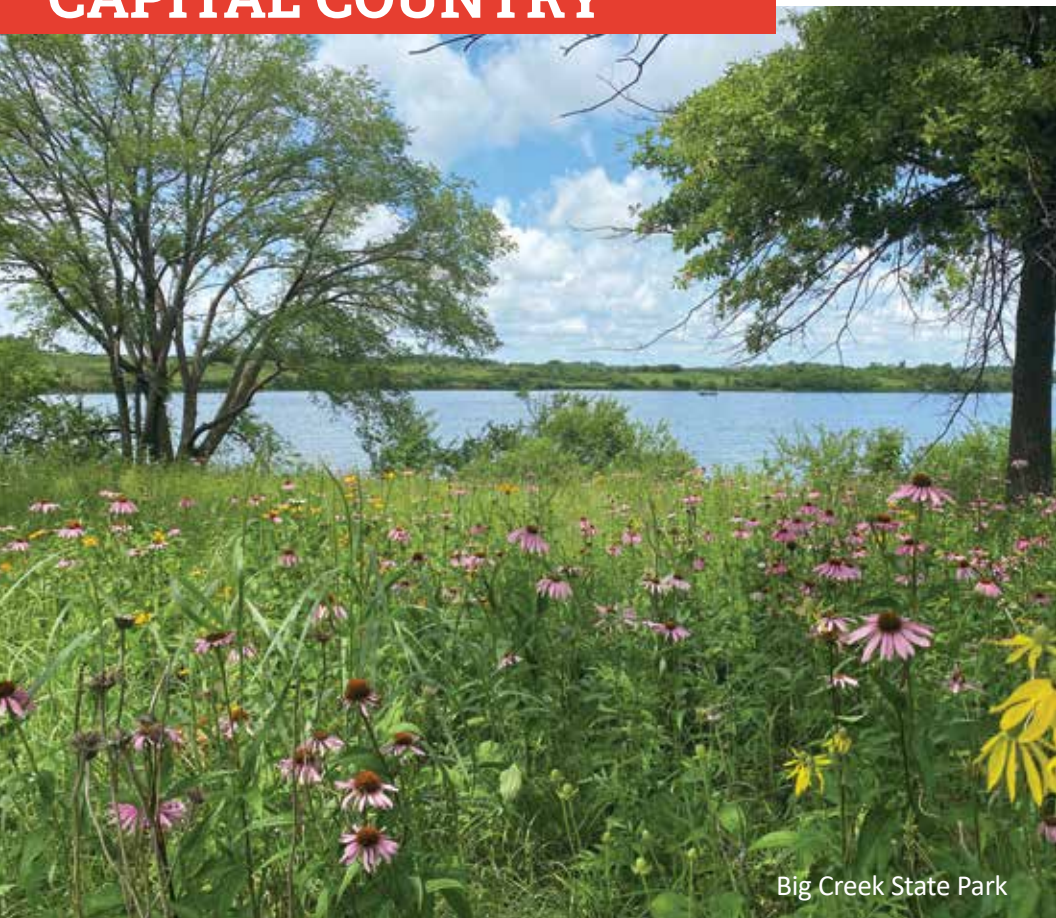
enjoy the highly popular **Lake Manawa State Park** for a day on the beach, boat or the accessible Dream Playground. In southwest Iowa, go fishing and boating at hidden gems like **Viking Lake State Park**, **Green Valley State Park** and **Lake of Three Fires State Park**. Visit the geographically diverse **Springbrook State Park**, with rocky outcrops and diverse terrain. Discover all the natural wonders of this region.

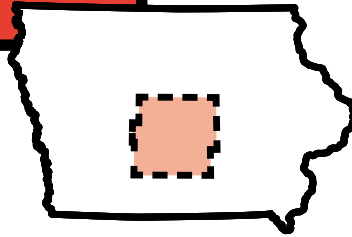
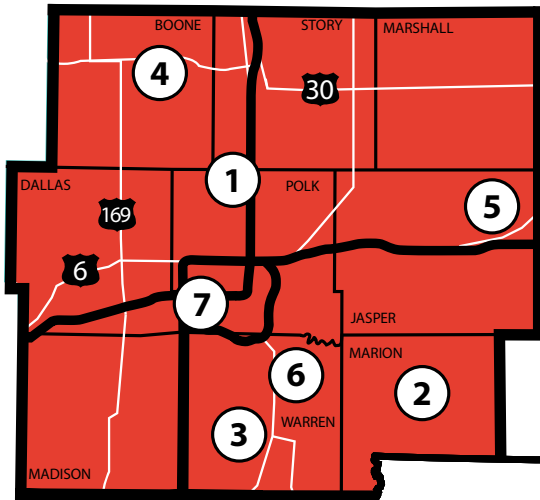
CAPITAL COUNTRY



Big Creek State Park

In central Iowa, Capital Country is full of immersive outdoor experiences and adventure. Visit the scenic overviews of one of Iowa's most iconic parks, **Ledges State Park**, with sandstone ledges towering 100 feet above the Des Moines River. Soak up the sun at **Big Creek State Park's** famed beach, or rent a pontoon to enjoy the lake. Head to **Banner Lakes at Sunset State Park**—a quarry-turned-state-park with more than

12 miles of multi-use trails. For a bit of natural history, camp and launch your boat at **Elk Rock State Park**, named for an unusual rock formation on the shore of Lake Red Rock, Iowa's largest lake. Near the Des Moines metro, explore **Walnut Woods State Park**, a lovely enclave near the Raccoon River, or visit **Lake Ahquabi State Park** near Indianola, a tranquil area named after the Sauk and Fox word meaning "resting place."

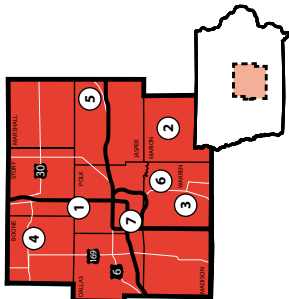


Elk Rock State Park

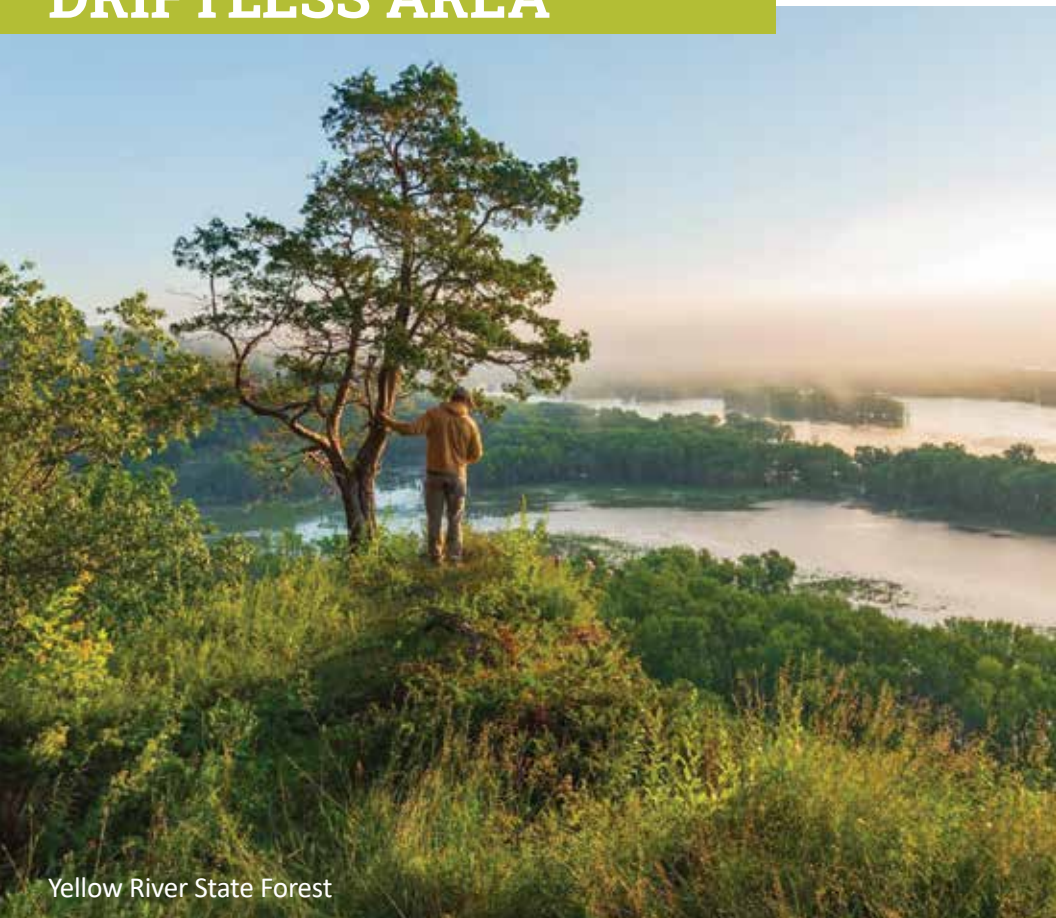

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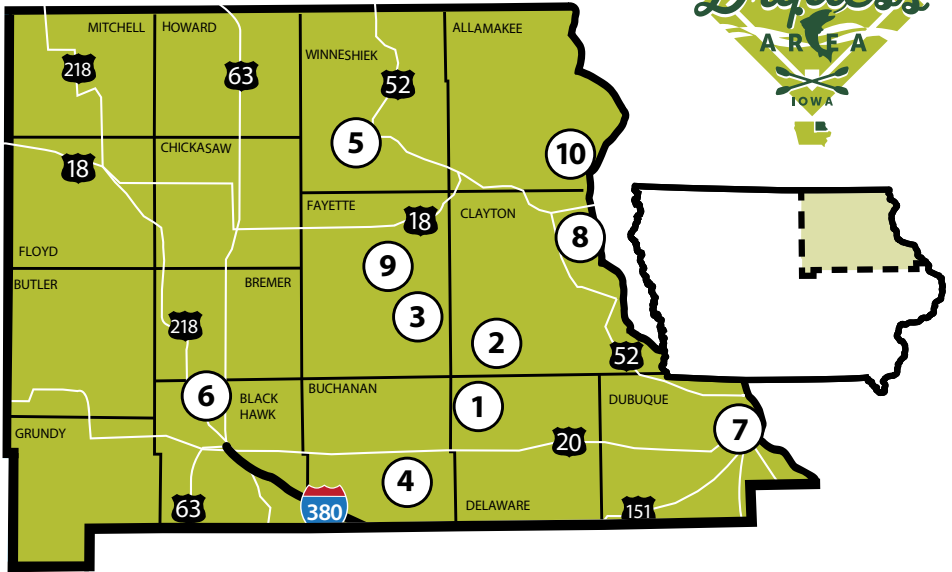
DRIFTLESS AREA



Yellow River State Forest

Scenic byways, stunning views and natural wonders mark the state parks and forests of northeast Iowa. Visit **Backbone State Park**, Iowa's oldest state park, featuring trout streams, 21 miles of multi-use trails, and historic CCC-era structures. Meander to **Pikes Peak State Park** and **Bellevue State Park** for breathtaking views of the Mississippi River. Enjoy some of the best hiking in Iowa at

Mines of Spain State Recreation Area near Dubuque, stopping along the way at Horseshoe Bluff. Visit Iowa's only fire tower at **Yellow River State Forest**, or visit **Volga River State Recreation Area**, often referred to as "Little Switzerland" due to its rugged topography. For a bit of Iowa culture, stop at **Cedar Rock State Park** to tour a historic estate designed by Frank Lloyd Wright.



Mines of Spain State Recreation Area

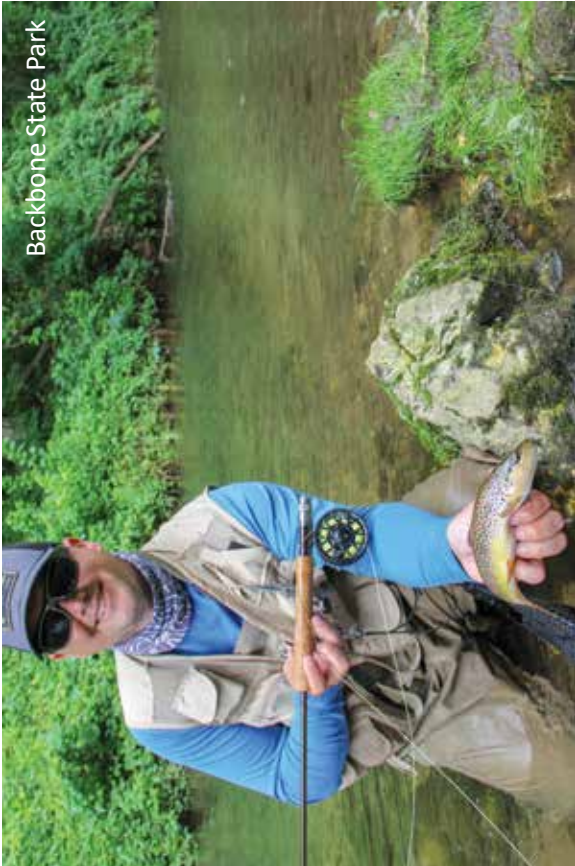

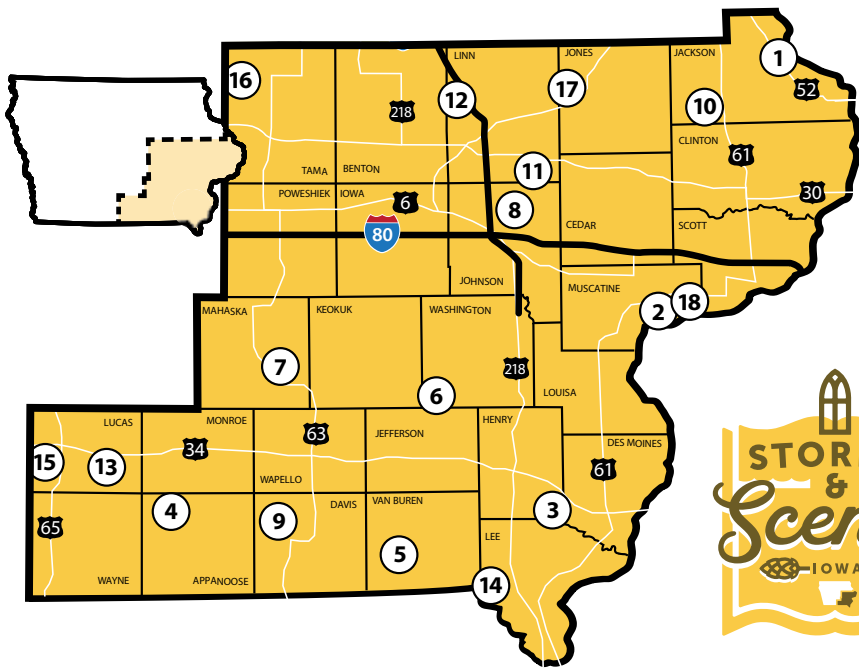

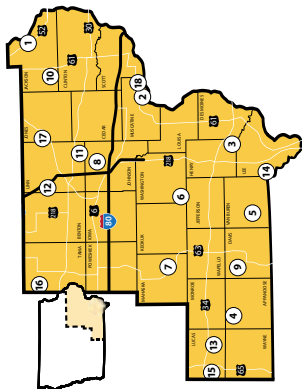
Wapsipinicon State Park

The Storied and Scenic area is home to some of Iowa's oldest and most scenic parks and forests. **Lacey-Keosauqua State Park** is the site of a river crossing on the Mormon Trek, and has ample forests and trails to explore. At **Wildcat Den State Park**, tour the oldest-running grist mill west of the Mississippi River, along with breathtaking trail experiences. Travel to **Lake Darling State Park** to cozy

up in a year-round, ADA-accessible cabin. Visit **Lake Wapello State Park's** CCC-era beach house, featuring unique pueblo-style architecture. Get lost in the woods in **Stephens and Shimek State Forests**, offering trails and more rustic outdoor adventures. Explore one of the gems of the park system, **Maquoketa Caves State Park**, showcasing the 1,100-foot "Dancehall Cave" and Iowa's largest cave system.

Iowa state parks and forests are committed to being welcoming destinations for people of all abilities by providing accessible outdoor opportunities and amenities.



EXPLORE ACCESSIBLE EXPERIENCES

From adaptive equipment to accessible fishing piers, hiking trails, picnic shelters and campsites, Iowa's state parks and forests provide many opportunities to enjoy the outdoors. Examples of accessible experiences include:

- Track Chair at **Big Creek State Park**, which can be checked out for free on a first-come, first-served basis.
- Accessible playgrounds, including one of Iowa's largest at **Lake Manawa State Park**.

- Trout fishing paths for wheelchair access at **Yellow River State Forest** and **Backbone State Park**.
- Overnight stays at accessible campsites and cabins.
- And many more!

SHARE THE TRAIL

Many of us love to hit the trail—whether on foot, by bike or on horseback.

You can help make the day enjoyable by following a few tips to share the trail:

- If you see a horseback rider:
 - o Stop and move to the side.
 - o Give plenty of space because horses can be unpredictable.
 - o Say hello and communicate so the horse knows you're there.
 - o Let the horse and rider pass by before you start to move again.



- Bikers, remember to slow down, give space and communicate your presence when passing other bikers and hikers.
- And of course, everyone should stay on designated trails, carry out trash and be respectful of surroundings.

MOST SURPRISING VIEW: Beeds Lake State Park

The dam at **Beeds Lake State Park**, constructed by the Civilian Conservation Corps in the 1930s, is said to be the most photographed dam in the Midwest. Located near Hampton, water from the lake plunges 40 feet down along the 170-foot-long horizontal layers of limestone. Don't forget to pack your camera!

BEST CAMPING: Backbone State Park

Iowa's oldest state park offers so many different adventures, there is no way to get through all of them without spending the night. Bring your tent along to "rough it" in one of two campgrounds, or rent a modern cabin for a more comfortable stay.

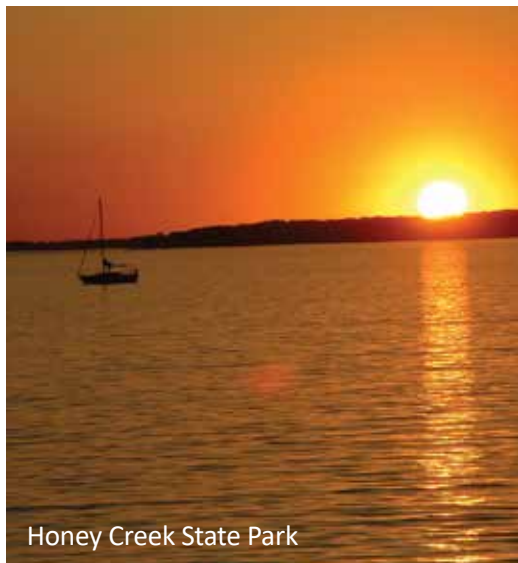

BEST BOATING:

Honey Creek State Park

Whether you plan to bring your own boat or rent one at a local marina, you are destined for a day packed full of fun on Lake Rathbun. This massive body of water (more than 11,000 acres) provides the perfect playground for more than a dozen boating styles from pontoon and speed boats, to paddling, kayaks and jet skis. **Honey Creek State Park** has one of the largest boat ramps on the lake, and features a beautiful campground, camping cabins and trails.

BEST HIKE: Maquoketa Caves State Park

Most of Iowa's state parks offer hiking, but not many offer hiking underground! At **Maquoketa Caves State Park**, you'll encounter wooded areas, fielded surroundings and caves that are several feet tall. Crawling might be required to navigate some caves. Be extra prepared for cave exploration by wearing clothes that can get dirty and bring a flashlight.
