*To the Governor, and Fiftieth
General Assembly of Iowa:*

In submitting to you the Biennial Report of the State Board of Education, it is at once customary and proper that we should, in a few paragraphs, sum up what we, as a Board, have sought to accomplish and to visualize, so far as is possible, the needs of the institutions for the biennium beginning July 1st, 1943.

The two years' period now drawing to a close have not been normal years. Half the world was at war July 1941, and our own participation in it seemed inevitable. In less than six months, America was forced into war by a sudden attack by an unscrupulous foe.

Almost immediately our schools were put upon a partial war footing. They began to serve the needs of the Army and Navy—and thus far have met the demands made upon them, and they all stand ready to render any service which can in any way further the war effort in the spirit of "Who dies if America lives."

During the college year 1941-42, the impact of war caused little change in the number of young men and young women served by the several institutions. There were not a few enlistments. Reserve officers were called to service. The faculties of the Colleges of Medicine, Veterinary Medicine and Dentistry, responded to the needs of the Government, but were enabled to maintain their efficiency.

Even when this college year began, there was no very marked decrease in enrollment. The total number to be served was made up, at the two larger Schools by regular students and trainees for the Navy, and before this report is in your hands a like situation will exist on the campus of the Teachers College.

The lowering of the draft age will take from every campus large numbers of boys,—just how many will depend largely on how many will, after induction, be returned to their respective colleges for short periods of intensive training in subjects, the mastery of which is incident to modern warfare.

It would be a rash man who would assume that he could forecast what will take place between the time when this legislative session shall end, and the day when another legislative session shall convene in regular session.

The Board has given no end of thought as to what would be the wisest policy to pursue in these confessedly trying and uncertain times. As a result of our thoughtful consideration, we "hold these things to be self evident."

1. So far as the Schools for the Deaf and the Blind are concerned, they will have about the same number of pupils to care for, and prepare for life, as in the last few years. The cost of maintaining them will increase, both as to materials, such as food supplies, and also as to what, for want of a better term we designate as "help"—the non-teaching staff. It has been most difficult to obtain competent people to replace those who have resigned places they have held for years and years, lured away by the high wages paid in war industries. The competition for teachers has increased. We incline to the opinion that we have under-estimated the increased sums which will be needed to support and maintain these institutions under the conditions sure to arise. We earnestly hope that our estimates for these institutions will not be reduced.

2. When it comes to the institutions of higher learning entrusted to our care, there is apt to be a tendency on the part of many people to reach hasty and incorrect conclusions as to their needs. There will be not a few who will say: These schools are sure to have fewer students. Why should the cost of maintaining them be not correspondingly decreased? To a certain degree this would be true, under normal conditions, but only to a degree. In any business, there is an irreducible overhead which must be taken care of. Just now this overhead must, of necessity, cost more. Again, using the word "help" as a generic term, their wages must be increased. This necessity was presented to the last General Assembly but was not acted upon in line with the recommendations made. As a result, the Interim Committee voted the Board a small sum, in order to grant a small increase in wages to all receiving less than \$100 per month. The Interim Committee, in this case, provided for increased compensation only up until February. Some immediate action to take care of this matter is therefore imperative.

3. It is our best information at the moment that the Government will make every effort, consistent with a vigorous prosecution of the war, to keep colleges and universities employed in preparing trainees as they have already been training them, on our several campuses. While the Government

provides some instruction, it relies in no small degree upon members of the faculty on each campus. It does not look as though there will be any diminution in the number of girls who will go to college. It is altogether probable that many will go into war work of one kind or another, but since the high schools are preparing to streamline their courses so as to graduate high school students at the end of three years of study instead of four, there will be an influx into the colleges of such students at an earlier age than hitherto. This might altogether make up for the number of college students who will take up war work.

4. Another thing to be considered is that all of the major institutions under the control of the State Board of Education are now working on a three-year basis. In other words, members of the faculty are teaching through the entire year. This will place a heavier load upon faculty members and, since it is a generally-accepted fact that few can teach efficiently without the usual vacation granted college professors and teachers, the entire number needed for this program will not be very much reduced. For those who elect to teach the entire year, increased compensation will be expected, and the expectation will be justified.

5. Of necessity, emphasis will be placed upon certain lines of work to the neglect of other lines,—but can any institution afford to permit its faculties to be scattered to the ends of the earth? No one can know when the war will end or very much about what will follow the war—but of one thing we can be, and are, reasonably certain,—that, the moment war ends, there will be a greater demand for the facilities of our colleges and universities than ever before, and these demands will not be confined to instruction in the sciences. Science is very important, but it is not all-important. It has brought us no end of comforts; at the same time, it has increased engines of destruction to the point where wars are fought no longer by armies but by populations, the great majority of the latter absolutely helpless.

If we are going to have a civilization fit to live in, we must train our young people for the highest type of citizenship. We do not believe that schools should attempt indoctrination in political ideologies, any more than we believe that they should indoctrinate students in religion,—but they should teach the history and the genius of our own country, and the

history of what has gone on before us, because it is still true that "Experience is a light to our feet and a guide to our path." The head of one of the greatest technical schools in the United States recently declared that he could think of no greater tragedy than the abandonment of colleges of liberal arts.

6. We close as we began,—by emphasizing the uncertainties of the present hour, and of the immediate future. You and we have to prepare for this immediate future, so far as education is concerned, as best we can. Is it asking too much that you provide the Board of Education adequate funds to carry on as we have thus far carried on, and trust to our integrity and good judgment to meet situations as they arise, with an eye single to the good of the State, with an eye single to economy? If you will thus trust us, we pledge our word that not a dollar shall be expended unnecessarily.

A STATEMENT IN SUPPORT OF RECOMMENDATIONS FOR APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE STATE UNIVERSITY OF IOWA

The biennium for which these funds are requested begins on a date more than ten months distant and ends on a date more than thirty-four months distant. Our country has been at war for less than nine months and already striking changes have taken place in our national life. It would require prophetic vision to anticipate all the changes which may take place during the coming biennium. No effort has been made in these askings to anticipate every situation that might arise; on the contrary, these askings are made on the assumption and in the hope that the transition from peace to war will be made with a reasonable degree of stability and orderliness.

Certain facts stand out with clarity, however, even in these times. The Federal government is making, and will continue to make, many demands upon the State University and others for assistance in the war effort. This is a contribution which must be made. Furthermore the University must train men and women with greater speed and accuracy than in normal times. There is a shortage of men for technical and specialized services, and there is need for men for officer training. The armed services have made it abundantly clear that it is the task of the University to help meet these needs.

It is equally clear that the University must be maintained as an effective educational institution of high quality both during and after the war. Its contribution to the war has just been indicated. Its contribution after the war will be equally necessary. This war requires training, skill and talent never before needed in war time. The reconstruction after the war will present problems no less profound than those existing today. The place of Iowa among the states of the Union is not attributable to its size, its population or its mineral or natural resources. Its place has been achieved through the character, training and capacity of its people. If that place is to be retained, and if the State is to move forward in the future as it has in the past, we must continue to build on the foundations so wisely established by our pioneer forebears. The University must be maintained as a university of the first class. To do this two things are needed:

There should be provision for an increase in the wages of employees in the lower brackets. When increased appropriations were requested two years ago, it was anticipated that there would be a substantial rise in living costs within the present biennium. The rise has now come, but without increased funds to meet it. Appropriations for the coming biennium should be adequate for needed adjustments in the wages of the lower paid employees.

There should be provision for the maintenance on the University staff of men of outstanding ability. An institution is judged by the number of its men of distinction. There is competition for such men. The University must meet that competition. In order to retain men of distinction and attract others, it must give salaries and emoluments which will not place it at a competitive disadvantage.

No capital askings are presented for the coming biennium, but it is requested that funds appropriated by the Forty-ninth General Assembly for the first unit of a new library and for an addition to the Orthopedic Hospital be established as reserves available for construction when the war emergency permits. The maintenance of staff and of physical plant, however, must go on at a level sufficient to enable the University to emerge from the war as a first class institution. With that in mind, the remaining askings have been prepared and presented at the same level as the askings of two years ago. Many developments then anticipated have since come to pass, making it clear that the appropriations requested will be needed for the coming biennium.

A—Operating Items

1. To provide funds (a) to meet increased living costs, and (b) to keep and employ a competent professional academic staff	\$ 265,000
(a) This sum includes sufficient funds to increase all salaries and wages below \$2,000 on a sliding scale basis beginning with higher percentages of increase to those below \$1,000, with lesser percentages of increase to those between \$1000 to \$2000.	
During the past two years the cost of living has increased steadily. The wages of labor and low paid salary groups in industry have been increased. This situation is serious and must be met.	
(b) This increase will also be used to increase salaries of competent professional staff and to employ new staff. The University of Iowa operates on a competitive basis with other similar universities. If the people of Iowa want a first class university, these funds must be provided.	
2. For current operations—equipment, supplies and operating expenses	61,000

B—Physical Plant—Repairs, Replacements and Alterations....	\$ 185,000
The University Campus covers 429.9 acres of public grounds. There are 57 buildings (excluding dormitories) in academic service to maintain, operate and service with heat, light, and water. The public grounds, buildings, and the central power plant, with many miles of heating lines, water pipes and electric wires must be constantly maintained, replaced and repaired. The items and amounts for each are as follows:	

I—Power plant

(a) **Surge Tank and Desecrator**

Present equipment is inadequate and in very poor repair. Old tanks have deteriorated to the point that replacement is necessary. Modern equipment offers economies not possible with present equipment.....\$ 5,000

(b) Remodeling and Enlarging Switchboard	Expansion of electrical service installations during the past few years has been accomplished by making temporary switchboard connections. The resulting arrangement is not satisfactory, and should be reconstructed and placed in good condition.....	2,000
(c) Tunnel Remodeling and Maintenance	Our Steam Tunnels have to a large extent been extended from time to time to serve buildings at various points on the campus, until the resulting tunnel and steam service systems are in need of a general rearrangement and rebuilding in order to simplify and improve installations and afford more economical operations:	
(1) Provide a new tunnel and distribution system across Burlington Street	4,000
(2) Provide an additional exhaust steam main to the West Campus. This might necessitate the removal of water line from the present tunnel	15,000
(3) Construct a new Steam Tunnel from the Law Commons to the Children's Hospital. At present the Hospital group is entirely dependent for heat on one line from the Power Plant. This tunnel would provide service from a separate source, and is essential to the welfare of the Hospital	10,000
(4) Alterations and rearrangement of present tunnel piping. At numerous places in the steam distribution system, rearrangements in present lines should be made to provide better and more economical distribution of steam. The tunnel system is in about as poor condition as is possible and still be operative	20,000
(d) Tunnel Lighting	The entire tunnel system should be supplied with a safe and adequate lighting system. Men are at work in these tunnels at all times, and present conditions are very bad	1,250
(e) Condensation Meters	At present only such building as are self liquidating are provided with condensation meters. All buildings should be so equipped in order to insure an accurate check on the ultimate use of steam. Such meters will indicate many economies that will reflect directly on the cost of generating steam	5,000
II—Electric Service		
(a) East Side Electric Cable	A new electric service cable should be installed from the Power Plant to the Law Commons. At this point a switch can be provided making it possible to supply the Hospital group in case of failure of the present cable line serving such buildings. Such a cable will normally serve the Botanical Laboratory, Fine Arts Building, Dramatic Arts Building and Law Commons, and take this load off the present Hospital line	8,000
(b) New Electric Service Cable to Laundry	The present service cable to the laundry is heavily overloaded and new service should be installed. This cable carries all of the area between the main campus and the laundry, and a failure in this service would greatly inconvenience that part of the campus	3,250

(c) Electric Service, Rewiring and Enlarging	Heavy increases in the use of electricity in recent years have caused an overload on present transformers and services in numerous buildings. Replacements should be made, enlarging capacities generally. In this program, equipment salvaged from one building may be used to increase capacities at a smaller building	5,000
(d) Lighting Changes	In many classrooms and especially in libraries and reading rooms, present illumination is far below standard. The old installations should be replaced with modern units of higher efficiencies. The program should be quite general throughout the campus	10,000

III—Repairs and Alterations—Specific Buildings

(a) Alteration—Field House Pool Heating	This pool is now heated by live steam, a very expensive and inadequate method of heating. A closed heater system should be installed.....	2,500
(b) Medical Laboratories—Constant Temperature Room	In connection with the work at the medical laboratories, it is necessary to have a room especially prepared so that constant temperatures may be maintained. The provision of such a room will greatly aid the College of Medicine	2,500
(c) Engineering Building	Renovation of Basement Area. A large unfurnished room in the basement should be renovated and made available for general use. This building is congested and the space made available would be extremely useful	2,500

IV—General Repairs and Maintenance

During the past ten years expenditures for general maintenance of campus structures has been kept at a minimum. The resultant backlog of necessary maintenance cannot be reduced without special appropriations:

(a) Painting and Glazing	Both interiors and exteriors of practically all buildings need extensive painting and glazing	10,000
(b) Replacement of Floors in Old Buildings	In many of the older buildings, floors and floor coverings are worn to the point that replacement is necessary	7,500
(c) Roofs and Gutters	Although much headway has been made on the replacement and repair of older roofs, much work must be done	10,000
(d) Masonry	Repair and repointing of masonry walls has been neglected to the point that many walls are no longer water tight, and resulting deterioration of interior surfaces is serious. A continuous program should be instituted	12,500
(e) Replacement of Water and Sewer Pipes in Buildings	Many installations of water and sewer systems within buildings have been patched and repaired to such an extent that complete replacement should be undertaken, especially is this true in laboratory and medical buildings where acid action has been a fast deteriorator of piping	9,125

V—Campus Repairs and Maintenance

Part of the East and most of the West Campus is serviced by drives and parking areas temporarily surfaced by loose stones and cinders. These are costly to maintain and are unsatisfactory.

(a) Surfacing of Roadways and Parking Areas

This includes roadways and parking areas around the Field House and West Campus, General Hospital, Children's Hospital, Psychopathic Hospital, Dormitories, and Fine Arts Campus. Most of these are surfaced with cinders or fine stone. Dust is bad in kitchen areas around hospitals. Sand and grit is trodden into buildings, increasing maintenance costs. In several places drainage is bad. This request includes curb and gutter construction

(b) Grading, Fencing, Retaining Walls, and Improvement of Public Grounds

For the past few years the University has cooperated with the W.P.A. in providing work projects on the University Campus. Much of this work includes grading, construction of recreational fields, reclaiming river bottom land, dykes and river control, and fencing of West Campus boundaries. This sum will enable us to carry on W.P.A. projects and provide skilled labor where needed for general supervision of the work. If W.P.A. were not available, would need twice this sum

Capital Needs**1. No Request**

Due to the present war emergency, the Iowa State Board of Education has deferred making any request for capital improvements at the State University.

2. New Library

The 49th General Assembly appropriated \$300,000 for the first unit of the new Library at the University. The war situation prevented this construction. The fund is in the State Treasury.

The Board is requesting that a bill be drawn authorizing the State Comptroller to establish this fund as a reserve to be expended for the first unit of the Library when the war emergency permits.

3. Orthopedic Hospital

The 49th General Assembly appropriated \$45,000 for an addition to the Orthopedic Hospital. This construction has also been postponed.

The Board is requesting that a bill be drawn authorizing the State Comptroller to establish this fund as a reserve to be expended for an addition to the Orthopedic Hospital when the war emergency permits.

PUBLIC SERVICES

University Hospitals	\$ 1,250,000
An appropriation of \$1,000,000 annually for the University Hospital is insufficient.	
An increase of \$250,000 annually is requested to be utilized as follows:	
(1) To raise low paid staff	100,000

To meet the serious need of increases in wages to low salaried people. There are 400 employees in the University Hospital who receive less than \$1,000

per year in wages and 200 who receive between \$1,000 and \$2,000. With the present cost of living, these rates are too low. This sum is requested to be used to make a general increase in all salaries and wages below \$2,000 on a sliding scale basis, beginning with higher percentages of increase to those below \$1,000, and with lesser percentages of increase to those between \$1,000 and \$2,000.

- (2) To meet the demand for increased indigent service and to operate the hospital on a full capacity basis This would make possible the treatment of 100 more state patients per day, and would increase the quota allotment to all counties by 20%. The State's need for additional service is demonstrated daily by the extreme pressure brought to bear upon the Hospital for the admission of patients beyond present available funds. 150,000

Psychopathic Hospital \$ 116,000

The 49th General Assembly appropriated \$108,000 annually for the Psychopathic Hospital. The increase of \$8,000 is requested to be used to increase all salaries below \$2,000, on a sliding scale basis, beginning with higher percentages of increase to those below \$1,000, and with lesser percentages of increase to those between \$1,000 and \$2,000.

Soldiers' Tuition \$ 500

Since the close of the World War of 1918, the State of Iowa has generously provided a fund to pay part of the tuition of honorably discharged soldiers and sailors of the World War who are attending the University. The sum of \$500 annually has been provided for the past two years. This is sufficient now. An early end to the present war may, however, change this policy. For the present \$500 annually is sufficient.

Bacteriology Laboratory \$ 40,000

Sections 3952-3953 of the 1939 Code of Iowa established the Laboratory and prescribed its duties. They provide that the Laboratory shall be a permanent part of the College of Medicine of the State University of Iowa and that, in addition to its regular duties, it shall perform certain services for the State Department of Health. Experience has shown that the annual appropriation of \$40,000 is not adequate for these purposes, and it has been supplemented by additional state and federal funds made available through the Department of Health. However, only the sum of \$40,000 is requested by the University, because it is understood that the Department of Health will also request an appropriation for the Laboratory to supplement this requested appropriation and to insure the maintenance of the Laboratory's services.

A STATEMENT IN SUPPORT OF RECOMMENDATIONS
FOR APPROPRIATIONS FOR IOWA STATE
COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE AND
MECHANIC ARTS

It is not an easy matter to foresee all the possibilities and problems of the next biennium. Naturally, the war has affected the program of the Iowa State College in major ways, and other changes will undoubtedly occur.

Nevertheless, it is important that the College be prepared for any and all legitimate demands which may be made upon its facilities and personnel. The Iowa State College is devoting all of its energy to education and research in the interest of the successful prosecution of the war. Defense research and defense training, both on and off the campus, are given first consideration; the regular teaching and research program of the College comes next. Other normal functions are being modified, and in a few cases suspended, in order that the necessary attention may be given to the more important problems of immediate concern.

Certain factors must be kept in mind in the consideration of the requests to be made of the Fiftieth General Assembly:

(1) It is essential that adjustments be made in the general salary schedule of the academic, clerical and labor staffs of the College. You will recall that strong representations were made to the Forty-ninth General Assembly for funds to accomplish this purpose, but sufficient appropriations were not made, our efforts were not successful. The developments of the past year have made it clear that these adjustments must be made if the College is to retain the important members of its faculty in the face of strong competition from industries, from government and from other educational institutions, and if reasonable and tangible recognition is to be given to increased living costs, especially in the case of the low income groups.

(2) Institutions such as the Iowa State College, whose energies are devoted to the fields of science and technology, are being given an increasingly important role in connection with education and training for the war effort. Practically all the graduates of the college are trained in those scientific and

technical skills which are vital behind the lines as well as at the front.

It is reasonable to assume, therefore, that the College will have a large and continuing responsibility throughout the war for this type of training, not only for the regular students, but also for the many groups which are coming to the College for more intensive and specialized short courses. The recent decision of the Army and Navy to encourage students to remain in college and to enter the enlisted reserves on an inactive status is fair assurance that enrollments, particularly in this type of institution, are likely to be maintained.

(3) Intensive training courses for special groups, including the courses sponsored by the Navy, will form a very important part of the program of the College for the duration of the war. The various military services have found that they do not have time to build the schools necessary to train their men in the vital specialized areas, and they are therefore turning more and more to those colleges and universities which are equipped to provide such instruction.

(4) It is of great importance also that consideration be given the problems that will confront the College when the war is over. Undoubtedly many men discharged from the armed services will enter the colleges and universities of the nation for regular degree courses or for specialized courses, either on their own volition or under government supervision. Naturally, the Board does not know when this time will arrive, but it should by all means be ready to meet the problem when it comes.

(5) The problem of instructional supplies and equipment is increasingly difficult. Prices in general have risen from 20% to 25%, and many of the customary articles of supply and equipment are very hard to secure. Nevertheless, priority ratings have been granted on many of these articles, and they are essential to the maintenance of the teaching and research program. One illustration of the problem of supply is that of coal. Under the new price which the College is forced to pay, the coal bill will perhaps be \$10,000 more this year than last.

(6) The staffs of the research organizations and the extension services are hard pressed to meet the increasing demands made upon them by agriculture and industry throughout the State. There is no question that these agencies are rendering tremendously important service in this emergency;

but their financial resources are insufficient to cover all these demands adequately.

(7) In connection with the request for funds for repairs, replacements, and alterations, attention is called to the fact that many of the major items had to be postponed on account of the inability to secure materials. These items, therefore, have been included in the new askings.

(8) It is important to call attention again to the need for certain buildings for instructional purposes. The Board recognizes, of course, that the difficulty of making major repairs and erecting new buildings, which now exists, will undoubtedly continue for some time; but it feels that these problems should be kept before the Legislature.

The Board believes that the requests submitted are reasonable and represent the amounts necessary to enable the College to maintain its present high level of work and to meet the various and changing demands that will undoubtedly be made upon it in the next two or three years.

In addition, the Committee on Retrenchment and Reform made available an additional \$11,000.00 for the replacement of the Agricultural Engineering Laboratory, and \$24,500.00 for the expanded 1942 Summer Session.

I. Operation:

An increase of \$375,000 annually is requested for general educational support, research, maintenance, current expenses and equipment. The additional funds would be used as follows:

- (a) To meet the increased costs of educational services, including additional teaching personnel and the expansion of the summer quarter, to provide salary adjustments for the present academic staff and to develop a more comprehensive program of non-degree and short courses \$ 95,000
- (b) Salary and wage adjustments for the clerical and labor staff, and additions to staff 65,000
- (c) General supplies and current expense 55,000
- (d) Educational equipment for research and teaching 40,000

(e) Additional research	70,000
(f) Further development of extension program	50,000
Total	\$375,000

II. Repairs, Replacements and Alterations, annually: \$150,000

III. Capital Improvements:

A statement relative to the need for certain buildings appears on page 23. It is understood, however, that no official requests will be made of the Legislature for capital improvements on account of the war.

I—COMMENT ON REQUEST FOR ADDITIONAL OPERATION FUNDS

Requested for the Biennium 1943-1945

Because of the rising cost of living, it is imperative that salary adjustments be made for members of the present academic staff. The general level of salaries is still below that of 1931-1932. Additional staff members are needed because the student enrollment in the past six years has increased more rapidly than has the financial ability to provide the additional instructors necessary to handle the teaching load adequately. The immediate demands of the nation for technically and scientifically trained men and women for industry and for war service has necessitated various adjustments and expansions in the educational program. The Iowa State College is now on a full 12-months' basis with a greatly expanded summer program. New and important fields of educational activity are arising and must be recognized; aeronautical engineering is an example. There is an increasing demand for non-degree and short courses for the benefit of men and women, both young and old, who are not able to take the regular degree courses. This is a development of great significance, both for the present and for the post-war period, and it should be given careful study and planning in order that the College may be able to meet the demands which will be made upon it in this area.

Salaries and wages for the clerical and labor staff are entirely too low. Adjustments should be made in the case of all employees in this category who are receiving \$1500 or less. It is felt that the amount requested, \$65,000, is conservative as it represents somewhat less than a 10% increase for this group.

In recent months there has been a great increase in the cost of institutional supplies and current expense items. Present funds are inadequate to cover these needs properly.

In an institution of science and technology, educational and scientific equipment is essential in order to carry on the teaching and research programs effectively. The value of the present equipment is about three and a half million dollars, and the replacement of obsolete equipment alone is a large item. New equipment is needed constantly.

The program of research at the Iowa State College has proved to be most valuable to the people of Iowa, particularly the research in agriculture and the basic sciences of chemistry, bacteriology, botany and entomology. New problems are constantly arising, and there are many requests from individuals and groups throughout the State for assistance in solving these problems. Many of the problems can be solved only by careful research. It is necessary to study the production of essential agricultural products formerly imported, but now cut off. Among these are edible fats and oils, glycerine, rubber, hemp and other cordage fibers, tapioca and sugar. Another new problem is that of developing satisfactory techniques for drying eggs, milk, meats and vegetables. Dehydration is essential in lend-lease operations. Freezing, preservation and curing of meat and vegetable products are increasingly important. There is also great need for the development and maintenance of adequate and satisfactory standards of nutrition. The conservation of our basic resources, such as soils, crops and livestock, is still a matter requiring long and careful study. There is need also for a careful study of the adjustment of Iowa agriculture to new marketing problems, including the problems of transportation. These are a few of the research items that need immediate attention. Many others could be mentioned.

The Agricultural Extension Service of the Iowa State College has been of immense value to the farmers of the State in recent months, particularly in connection with the national food production program. The Extension Service has taken the lead in getting farmers acquainted with the problems and with means of solution. The present staff cannot meet all of the requests made upon it. Additional men and women are needed to carry the program to the 220,000 farms of the State.

The Agricultural Extension Service also has the responsibility for carrying on the educational phases of the great programs developed by the national agencies designed to increase food production and to assure the conservation of our natural resources. Such activities are vital not only to the immediate welfare of the State, but to its future development.

Similarly, the Engineering Extension Service is working in close cooperation with the industries of the State, particularly in the training of workmen in many skilled industries. This cooperation is extended not only to the regular industries of the State, but also to the war industries that have been set up in Iowa, notably the Burlington Munitions Plant and the Ankeny Munitions Plant.

1. **Power Plant—Cooling Tower** \$25,000.00

At present the condenser water for the steam turbines driving the electric generators is cooled by means of an open spray tank. This tank is in poor condition and does not operate efficiently and is of too small a capacity to handle the proposed new turbine. It is considered necessary to construct a modern cooling tower at the time the new turbine is installed in order that it may operate under best conditions.

2. **Power Plant—Rebuild two old boilers and install new
stokers** \$60,000.00

As a continuation of the program of power plant improvement it is proposed to rebuild two of the present boilers which are now 20 years old. The work consists of installing complete water walls and replacing the present chain grate stokers with new firing equipment of a modern and more efficient design. This change will double the capacity of these two boilers, besides decreasing the cost of operation.

3. **Campus—Renew electric distribution system** \$35,000.00

The electric cables used for the distribution of electricity on the Campus are now located in the heating tunnels. On account of the excessive heat in the tunnels the capacity of the system is considerably reduced and the losses

through the system are excessive. In a study made of this problem a number of years ago by the Electrical Engineering Department a recommendation was made that the cables be removed from the tunnels and placed in separate conduits underground. At the same time that this is done it is proposed to add a fourth wire and convert the system from three wire distribution to four wire distribution. This change and the increased capacity due to the removal from the tunnels will provide for approximately a 75% increase in carrying capacity and should carry future loads for a great many years without any change. In addition to the line loss caused by the location of the cables in the heating tunnels, there is a certain element of danger to men working in the tunnels on the maintenance of the heating system, as the electric cables are simply hung from the walls and there is some possibility of an accident should the insulation of the cables be broken during work on the steam mains.

4. **Campus—Renew gas distribution system**\$30,000.00

Gas is purchased by the Iowa State College at wholesale rates and distribution is handled through the college's system of pipes. This pipe was installed in 1913 and is beginning to rust out in many locations. Innumerable repairs have been made on the gas mains in the last year and it will be necessary to replace all of this piping in the very near future. The life of wrought iron pipe underground is usually considered about 20 years and since this has been in service for 27 years the replacement is to be expected.

5. **Veterinary Building—Remodelling**\$20,000.00

With the construction of the new Veterinary Clinic a few years ago the space originally occupied by the Clinic has been assigned to two other departments in the Veterinary Group which are in need of additional facilities. In order to be of use to these departments, the space vacated by the Clinic must be remodelled. It is proposed to use this appropriation in the construction of new class rooms, a lecture room, and to provide teaching and research equipment for the departments of Veterinary Anatomy and Veterinary Pathology.

6. **Remodel 3rd floor Engineering Annex**\$50,000.00

At present the third floor of Engineering Annex is only partly used because of lack of head room under the pitched roof at the sides. It is proposed to remove the pitched roof, extend the outside walls up to full story height and build a flat roof thus more than doubling the usable floor area on the third floor. This will increase the capacity of the building by about 20% and will provide much needed classroom and laboratory space.

7. **Transformer Replacements—Botany Hall, Home Economics Building, Women's Dormitories and Heating Plant**\$12,000.00

This work consists of the replacement of electric transformers serving Botany Hall, Home Economics Building, three of the Women's Dormitories, and power auxiliaries in the Heating Plant. It also includes the replacement of main circuits and feeders and to a certain extent rewiring of the buildings. The present transformers and wiring systems are loaded to capacity and it is impossible to install any additional lighting or electric appliances. The

increasing use of the buildings, particularly Botany Hall and Home Economics Building is severely handicapped by the inability to extend the electric system.

8. **Power Plant—Electric connection to City of Ames** \$10,000.00

The City of Ames and the Iowa State College power distribution systems are inter-connected but the present connection is of a capacity which will handle only about 20% of the peak electrical demand on the campus. A few years ago the City of Ames constructed a new electric line within a few hundred feet of the College power plant. It is proposed to connect to this new line and install transformers so that power may be inter-changed between the City plant and the College plant in an emergency.

9. **Power Plant—Reconstruct ash disposal system** \$10,000.00

The present conveyor system for the disposal of ash was installed in 1915 when the plant was changed from hand firing to mechanical firing. The conveyor system is badly worn and needs either complete replacement or extensive repairs.

10. **Horticulture Farm, Dairy Farm, and Poultry Farm Construction of Water Mains from College System** \$12,000.00

At the present time the water for these farms is purchased from the City of Ames at a cost of approximately \$150.00 per month. A considerable saving can be made by extending a pipe line from the Campus water system to these farms. The cost to the College of furnishing water to the farms would be approximately one-fourth of the City water rate.

11. **Armory Balconies** \$10,000.00

It is proposed to construct fire proof balconies in the Armory to replace temporary wood construction which is hazardous not only from the standpoint of fire but also from overloading. The Armory is used on many occasions during the school year for the assembly of large numbers of people and provisions should be made for their safety.

12. **Miscellaneous Buildings—Install Heat Controls and Weatherstrip Windows** \$16,000.00

This is a continuation of the program of repairing heat controls and installing heat controls in buildings which are not now so equipped. While an attempt is made by the janitors in such buildings to control the heat manually and to keep the temperatures low during the night, there is danger in cold weather from this method of operation because temperatures may be low enough in certain parts of the building to allow pipes to freeze. Automatic heat control can be provided so that temperatures are kept low enough at night to economize on the heating and still protect the contents of the building from freezing. It is believed that the cost of automatic temperature controls will be repaid through the added economy of operation in four or five heating seasons.

The item for weatherstripping of windows is also one which would pay for itself in savings in operating costs in a very few seasons. At present few of the buildings are provided with weatherstripping or storm sash, and as a result there is a considerable leakage of heat or infiltration of cold air. In some isolated cases, particularly in north or northwest rooms it is exceedingly difficult to keep room

temperatures high enough for ordinary comfort. It is felt that the most satisfactory and economical procedure would be to provide weatherstripping rather than install storm sash because of the cost of placing, removing and maintaining storm sash each year.

13. Installation of Additional Fire Hydrants \$ 7,000.00

This work consists of installing about 20 new fire hydrants and relocating other hydrants in order to improve the fire protection facilities on the campus. A number of the present hydrants were installed before 1900 and are of a small type not satisfactory for use with modern fire fighting equipment. Changes in the location of drives through the years have made other hydrants inaccessible to the fire department and it is proposed to move them to proper locations adjacent to campus drives.

14. Agricultural Hall—Convert Heating System into a two pipe system \$ 4,000.00

The present heating system in Agricultural Hall is a one pipe system in which the single pipe to the radiators is used both for the admission of the steam and the removal of condensate. This type of system is now recognized as being very inefficient and is exceedingly sluggish in operation; that is, when there is a demand for more heat it takes a considerable length of time to bring the room temperatures up, after which temperatures will likely be too high and the occupants of the building have to open windows in order to prevent over-heating. In addition to the disadvantages of the one pipe system the present pipe which is now some 30 years or so old is beginning to fail from corrosion in a number of places.

15. Tunnel System—Install steam pressure and vacuum recording equipment \$ 2,000.00

It is important to erect a panel board in the power plant with a complete set of gauges and recorders to show pressures in the steam mains and vacuum in the return mains at various locations on the campus. This would be of great assistance to the operators in the plant and to the Heating Department, because it would provide a complete picture of pressures and vacuums in various sections of the campus. Since the system is divided into zones and vacuum pumps installed, it is necessary that the operation of these pumps be checked from time to time and the recording equipment herein provided for would allow this check-up to be made without frequent visits to the pits in which the vacuum pumps are located.

III CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

Due to the war emergency, the Iowa State Board of Education is not making any request for appropriations for capital improvements at the Iowa State College, but it wants to take this opportunity of calling attention to the needs which do exist.

Agronomy Building:

The present facilities of the Agronomy Department, both for teaching and research, are inadequate. The extensive grain improvement work and breeding program which is so important to Iowa agriculture is impeded because of lack of space. The selection of inbred lines and the testing of hybrids call for adequate laboratories with proper facilities for the drying and safe storage of many samples; facilities which at

present are almost entirely lacking. The program of soil testing and classification and soil conservation is vital to the welfare of the State. The teaching laboratories in Farm Crops and Soils are ill-arranged and unsuitable for the most effective work. To meet the needs of the Department and to provide for future developments, a building containing offices, classrooms, teaching and research laboratories with floor space in the neighborhood of 80,000 square feet is needed.

The value of the educational and investigational work of this Department to the State of Iowa, whose prosperity and future rest on its agriculture, cannot be questioned. Increased enrollment, on the one hand, and the development of new research tools and methods which cannot be properly applied under existing conditions, have overtaxed the present facilities.

The work of all departments in the Division of Agriculture is seriously handicapped due to crowded and inadequate classrooms, laboratories and offices. Therefore, the provision of this urgently needed Agronomy Building would make it possible for the other departments in the Division of Agriculture to carry on their teaching and research work more efficiently and effectively.

Science Building Addition:

The addition to the Science Building, erected in 1916, is urgently needed to provide instructional space. Laboratories in the departments of Bacteriology and Zoology are badly overcrowded. Enrollment in courses in both departments has increased beyond the increase in institutional enrollment, because of the inclusion in curricula of more of these courses.

Vitally important research, especially in the application of bacteriology to such fields as dairying and the processing of grains, in sewage treatment, in insect control and the control and cure of animal diseases is handicapped because of inadequate quarters and space. These fields are highly important in our services to the people of the State in terms of understanding grain storage and usage, packing house and food processing wastes, the identification of insect pests and farm and wild animal diseases.

A STATEMENT PERTAINING TO THE RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE IOWA STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION FOR APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE IOWA STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE FOR THE 1943-45 BIENNIAL PERIOD

The Iowa State Board of Education requests the following appropriations for the Iowa State Teachers College for each year of the biennium that will begin July 1, 1943:

I.	General Support, including salaries, support, maintenance and equipment	\$685,000

The table on page 27, shows a comparison between the legislative askings for the 1943-1945 biennium and the total appropriations available for the fiscal year 1942-1943. From this table it is apparent that an increase of \$15,100 is requested for general support, an additional \$1,000 is sought for repairs,

replacements and alterations, and an increase of \$75,000 is requested for capital outlay—new buildings.

I. GENERAL SUPPORT

The 49th General Assembly appropriated \$648,500 annually for the biennium for the purpose of general support. The Committee on Retrenchment and Reform made additional appropriations for the fiscal year 1942-1943 totaling \$21,400. The grand total of appropriations for the fiscal year 1942-1943 for general support was, therefore, \$669,900. The Iowa State Board of Education requests an annual appropriation of \$685,000 for general support. This represents an increase of \$15,100 over the total appropriation available for general support during the fiscal year 1942-1943.

At the present time the Iowa State Teachers College is cooperating closely with fifty of the ninety-nine counties in the state of Iowa on a program for training teachers for the one-room rural schools of the state. According to the latest report, there are 24,746 teaching positions in the state. Of this number, 8,424 are teaching positions in the one-room rural schools. The requested increase of \$15,100 in the annual appropriation for general support is for the purpose of expanding the service to the one-room rural schools of the state by the practical and efficient training of teachers for these schools.

II. REPAIRS, REPLACEMENTS AND ALTERATIONS

The 49th General Assembly appropriated \$9,000 annually for repairs, replacements and alterations. The request for the 1943-1945 biennium is \$10,000 annually. This represents an increase of \$1,000 per year. Even with this amount, the total annual expenditure for the general upkeep of the physical plant is significantly less than the total which should be expended in keeping with the standards of good business practice.

III. CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS—NEW BUILDINGS

An annual appropriation of \$75,000 is requested for capital improvements during the next biennial period. The appropriation will be expended as follows:

As a teacher training agency, it is the duty of the Iowa State Teachers College not only to prepare teachers professionally, but also to qualify them physically. Classroom efficiency demands good health on the part of the teacher. Furthermore, the teacher should be immunized against communicable diseases so that he is not a health hazard. Such a program calls for frequent health examinations and immunizations. In addition to this, the Department of Student Health Service must care for the general health of the entire student body. The present physical facilities are inadequate. Preliminary plans and estimates indicate that a satisfactory health service building will cost approximately \$150,000. An appropriation for this building was requested from the 49th General Assembly. The request is repeated at this time, as the need is urgent.

Due to the war emergency, the Iowa State Board of Education is not requesting appropriations for any capital improvements except for the Student Health Service Building, but it wants to take this opportunity of calling attention to the need for a storage building and enclosing wall.

No storage building is available for use by the Department of Buildings and Grounds. As a result, large pieces of equipment are exposed to the weather and cannot be cared for properly. The area used for coal storage is not enclosed and it is situated adjacent to a highway. A storage building for equipment and a retaining wall for the coal storage area have been designed, and it is estimated that the cost would be approximately \$24,000. This was requested of the 49th General Assembly, but no appropriation was made.

The careful and serious consideration of the Governor, the Comptroller, and the members of the General Assembly is respectively requested for this program of legislative askings.

I. Salaries, Support and Maintenance.

The School is asking for one hundred thirty-five thousand dollars (\$135,000.00), an increase of eleven thousand dollars (\$11,000.00) over the appropriation made by the 49th General Assembly. The request for this increase is made for three reasons:

- The increase in the price of commodities makes it necessary to add two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) to the food budget.
- For some time the Board has been cognizant of the fact that there are a number of boys and girls throughout the State who have impaired eye-sight to the extent that they cannot make satisfactory progress in the public schools of Iowa. Their education is being neglected at the present time because public schools are not equipped to take care of them. These children have too much sight to be educated in Braille classes. Therefore, it is recommended that a "Sight Saving" room be established at the Iowa School for the Blind to take care of the needs of about fifteen of the above mentioned children. Equipment, supplies, and a teacher with special training would require

- c. about three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) to provide this service.
- c. Six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00) to be used in an upward adjustment of salaries of employees at the Iowa School for the Blind.
1. At the present time teachers' salaries average about thirteen hundred twenty dollars (\$1,320.00) annually or one hundred ten dollars (\$110.00) per month. With such a low salary schedule it is impossible to interest superior teachers in accepting positions at the school. There is a tendency for superior teachers on the present faculty to be attracted by more lucrative offers from other schools for the blind. The adoption of a salary schedule whereby teachers might look forward to a maximum of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500.00) would tend to bring our rate of pay in line with that established in other outstanding schools for the blind throughout the country. An increase of three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) annually will provide enough funds to increase individual faculty members' salaries one hundred dollars (\$100.00) annually.
 2. A sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) is needed to adjust salaries of institutional and plant maintenance employees. In these groups there are fifteen employees out of thirty-five who receive less than six hundred fifty dollars (\$650.00) a year. The wage scale for the other employees in these groups ranges from seven hundred dollars (\$700.00) to twelve hundred fifty dollars (\$1,250.00) a year. Many of these people are attempting to support families on their present salaries. In the face of rising prices they are finding it very difficult to do so.
 3. A sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) is needed to adjust salaries of administrative officers and heads of departments. At the present time the salaries that can be offered these key people are not in line with those paid in other leading schools for the blind. An additional one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00) would provide funds to satisfactorily adjust the salaries of the five people in this group.

II. Repairs, Replacements and Alterations.

In these days when it is difficult to purchase new equipment, it is very essential that all equipment on hand be kept in the best of repair to increase the length of usefulness. Due to the price increases, the present appropriation for salaries, support and maintenance is not adequate for maintaining all equipment in good order. Therefore, it is requested that three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) annually be appropriated for repairs, replacements and alterations.

III. Capital Improvements.

With the increasing requirements of the Federal Government for building materials necessary for the war, no request for capital improvements is indicated.

AID FOR THE BLIND

The 41st General Assembly made an appropriation "for the purpose of aiding students who are blind and who are regularly enrolled students taking any course of study, profession, art or science in any university, college, conservatory of music, normal, professional or vocational school, approved by the State Board of Education, and who are residents of the State of Iowa, and to assist them in defraying their necessary expenses including the expenses of a reader or assistant," with the understanding that the money "shall be granted only to worthy students who are not able, or whose parents are not able to provide the means for continuing their study in any of the institutions above mentioned."

During the biennium that ended June 30, 1942, scholarship aid was, as follows:

AID FOR DEAF

The 37th General Assembly that convened in January, 1917, enacted a law authorizing school corporations to provide education for deaf children. Section 4350, Code 1939, is as follows:

"State board of education to supervise. When any school corporation shall elect to proceed under the provisions of this chapter it shall, through its proper officers, communicate that fact to the state board of education, and the state board of education shall have general supervision of all matters arising under this chapter, and no instructor shall be appointed hereunder and no courses or methods of instruction shall be installed hereunder without the approval of such state board of education."

That section has been in effect continuously since July 1, 1917.

The measure provided that any school corporation that would comply with the provisions of the act should be given state aid for each deaf child between certain ages. A part of section 4349 of the Code, 1939, is as follows:

"State aid—amount. To any school corporation providing such instruction and complying with all of the provisions of this chapter there shall be granted and paid as hereinafter provided state aid in an amount to be computed at twenty dollars for each month that each child not more than sixteen years of age is instructed under the provisions of this chapter."

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

The accounts of the University of Iowa are kept and its financial reports set up in accordance with the recommendations of the National Committee on Standard Reports for Institutions of Higher Education. The fund classifications of the University together with the assets and obligations of these funds are set forth in the Balance Sheet. (See Pages 58-59)

CURRENT INCOME FOR EDUCATIONAL PURPOSES

The current budgeted income for educational purposes is handled through two funds: the General Operating Fund and the Current Restricted, or Trust Fund. The General Operating Fund includes revenues from State appropriations, student tuition, sales and miscellaneous receipts. The Current Restricted Fund receives revenue from outside agencies or persons, also special income from medical fees and other sundry income, all of which are expendable for some special designated purpose in education or research. (See page 60).

The University closed its accounts June 30, 1941, with sufficient cash on hand to meet outstanding purchase orders and commitments in process of \$110,565.13 for the General Operating Fund; and of \$41,111.56 in the fund for Repairs, Replacements and Alterations. It also carried forward a Reserve of \$77,714.35 to cover estimated reduction of tuition revenue, and increased prices of supplies and equipment for the coming year. (See page 58).

AUXILIARY ENTERPRISES

The university operated as auxiliary enterprises dormitories, dining services, and the rental of residences as tenant properties.

The five major dormitories for men and women have a capacity for 1838 students, and were completely filled in 1940-41. Including the Memorial Union Dining Service, the net operating income before equipment replacements and financial charges was \$117,101.52, of which \$10,267.78 was transferred to the Dormitory Replacement Account for equipment and improvements. The remainder, \$106,833.74 was applied on dormitory indebtedness, \$90,000.00 on principal repayments, and \$16,833.74 on interest expense. (See pages 92-94).

In addition to these the University owns and operates twelve residences as co-operative dormitories. The students finance their own board at cost, the University receiving revenue from the room rent. The net income for 1940-41 (included above) was \$1,249.14.

The net income from operation of the seventeen tenant properties was \$7,895.94. (See page 95).

The Iowa Memorial Union Lounge Room and Union Fund is accounted for separately. The balance remaining after paying all bills was \$10,509.27. (See page 94).

STORE ROOMS AND SERVICE DEPARTMENTS

In order to meet the operating demands of educational and other departments, it is necessary in the interest of economy and efficiency to operate certain store rooms and service departments. These are handled upon a cost basis through a revolving fund. The amount of service rendered and net assets on hand June 30, 1941, are as follows: (See pages 80-85).

NON-EDUCATIONAL AND OTHER SPECIAL FUNDS

The University received from different sources gifts and endowment income for student prizes, scholarships, student aid and miscellaneous purposes. This is accounted for as non-educational income. Fifty-one different accounts are carried. The total received the past year amounted to \$44,453.39. (See pages 96-107).

The University Business Office also handles and audits funds of various student activities on the campus consisting of one hundred thirty-five different student organization accounts, Athletics, and Student Publications. (See page 104). These are accounted for as agency funds and, except for audit purposes, are not a part of the general revenue of the University. Reports of their activities are published separately. STATE HYGIENIC LABORATORY

The State Hygienic Laboratory is operated in connection with the College of Medicine. The State appropriation for the year ended June 30, 1941 was \$37,500.00 and in addition the Interim Committee of the State General Assembly allocated \$10,500.00, making a total available from State Funds of \$48,000.00. In addition to this the Federal Government appropriated \$33,440.43 under the Social Security Act, Title VI, U. S. Public Health Service. Complete accounts are kept in the University Business Office, but disbursements are made upon approved vouchers from the State Comptroller's office. Expenditures in 1940-41 amounted to \$81,440.43. (See page 114).

UNITED STATES CRIPPLED CHILDREN'S FUND

The University College of Medicine administers the United States Crippled Children's Fund under the Social Security Act, Title V, Part 2 as amended. Funds are carried in a separate bank account and accounts kept in the University Business Office. These funds are not included as revenue to the University. For 1940-41 the receipts totaled \$90,341.19, and the expenditures totaled \$92,538.60. (See page 115).

UNITED STATES FUNDS FOR STUDENT AID

During 1940-41 the National Youth Administration, under the Federal Relief program, appropriated \$66,276.55 for the employment of 484 students in various services at the University. Funds are handled by Federal Agencies. This amount is not included as University revenue. (See page 114).

STUDENT LOAN FUNDS AND OTHER STUDENT AID

Student Loan Funds were established in 1900 at the University. At present they total \$74,780.79 and consist of twenty-four different funds. They have been established by gifts from Alumni, friends, and students. Loans are approved by the Student Aid Committee and handled through the University Business Office. In 1940-41 four hundred ninety-two students received loans totaling \$24,212.62. Interest in the amount of \$1,446.94 was collected and added to the fund or to associated accounts. On June 30, 1941, the outstanding loans totaled \$18,080.76 with a cash balance of \$56,700.03. (See page 116).

In addition to this the University operates a student employment agency under the general management of the University Business Office. During the past year approximately 3,050 students were given part-time jobs earning either cash or the equivalent in board or room in the University and immediate vicinity.

Further aid was given to 1,821 students in the form of scholarships and fellowships with a total value of \$113,746.34. (For details see page 112).

ENDOWMENT FUNDS

The first endowment fund was established in 1840 from the sale of land from the Federal Government. Other endowments have been received from time to time. Endowment funds are unexpendable, the income being used for the purpose designated in the trust deeds. On June 30, 1941 the Endowment Fund totaled \$1,052,847.98 and was invested as follows: (See page 122).

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

The accounts of the University of Iowa are kept and its financial reports set up in accordance with the recommendations of the National Committee on Standard Reports for Institutions of Higher Education. The fund classifications of the University together with the assets and obligations of these funds are set forth in the Balance Sheet. (See Pages 165-167.)

CURRENT INCOME FOR EDUCATIONAL PURPOSES

The current budgeted income for educational purposes is handled through two funds: the General Operating Fund and the Current Restricted, or Trust Fund. The General Operating Fund is further subdivided into Funds A, B, and C. Fund A includes revenues from State appropriations, student tuition, sales and miscellaneous receipts; Fund B is the special state appropriation for repairs, replacements, and alterations; and Fund C is set up in connection with the operation of 80% of the Field House and drill areas in connection with the United States Navy contract as explained below. The Current Restricted Fund receives revenue from outside agencies or persons, also special income from medical fees and other sundry income, all of which are expendable for a special designated purpose in education or research. (See page 168.)

AUXILIARY ENTERPRISES

Dormitories and Dining Services

The University operated as auxiliary enterprises dormitories, dining services, and the rental of residences as tenant properties.

The five major dormitories for men and women have a capacity for 1,838 students, and twelve residences operated as co-operative dormitories have a capacity for 336 students. These were completely filled in 1941-42. On April 9, 1942 the University leased the Quadrangle and Hillcrest dormitories, the Field House and surrounding drill areas to the U. S. Government for the United States Naval Aviation Pre-flight School. The Quadrangle was evacuated during March and Hillcrest May 15, 1942. Loss of revenue from regular students for this period was replaced from government rentals up to June 30, 1942.

The net operating income for 1941-42 from all dormitories and dining services but excluding operations under the United States Navy contract (see paragraph below) was \$100,903.61. (See page 205.) This amount was applied as follows:

Tenant Properties

The net income from the operation of sixteen tenant properties was \$6,228.90. Of this sum, \$2,134.06 was applied on the debit balance forwarded July 1, 1941 and \$2,950.00 to the purchase of lot 6 in block 96 of Iowa City, leaving a net balance of \$1,144.84. (See page 209.)

Iowa Memorial Union

The Iowa Memorial Union is accounted for separately. The net balance remaining in the Lounge Room rental account after paying all bills was \$3,649.00. (See page 208.)

The special Union fund is credited with \$6.00 per year from student activity fees, making a total available of \$36,413.06 which includes a balance forward of \$7,141.21. From this sum was paid \$566.33 in current expenses and \$30,000.00 on the leasehold contract with the Iowa Memorial Union Corporation as rental to April 1, 1944 for part of the second unit of the Union building, leaving a balance of \$5,846.73 in the fund June 30, 1942. (See page 208.)

The leasehold with the Iowa Memorial Union Corporation was entered into by the Board of Education April 1, 1938 in the sum of \$127,500.00. The rentals paid from the Union Special Fund are by agreement assigned

on a loan made by the Union Corporation. When the leasehold is paid in full the second unit becomes the property of the University. On June 30, 1942 the net amount due on the leasehold was \$49,820.59.

United States Navy Pre-flight School

On April 9, 1942 the Board of Education leased Quadrangle and Hillcrest dormitories, the Field House and drill areas to the United States Government for the Navy Pre-flight Training School. The first contract period ended June 30, 1942. The University is to operate the buildings and food service. The cost of alterations and remodeling in these three buildings is to be paid for by the United States Government. In addition, the Board of Education gave permission to the United States Navy to erect a two-story cement and brick building on the West Campus, the cost therefore to be paid by the United States Government.

STORE ROOMS AND SERVICE DEPARTMENTS

In order to meet the operating demands for educational and other departments, it is necessary in the interest of economy and efficiency to operate certain store rooms and service departments. These are handled upon a cost basis through a revolving fund. The amount of service rendered and net assets on hand June 30, 1942, are as follows: (See pages 190-197.)

NON-EDUCATIONAL AND OTHER SPECIAL FUNDS

The University received from different sources gifts and endowment income for student prizes, scholarships, student aid and miscellaneous purposes. This is accounted for as non-educational income. Fifty-seven different accounts are carried. The total received the past year amounted to \$43,091.86. (See pages 210-218.)

The University Business Office also handles and audits funds of various student activities on the campus consisting of different student organization accounts, Athletics, and Student Publications. (See pages 218-220.) These are accounted for as agency funds and, except for audit purposes, are not a part of the general revenue of the University. Reports of their activities are published separately. The gross receipts in 1941-42 were as follows:

STUDENT ACTIVITY FEE

Beginning with the fall semester of 1941-42 the Board of Education authorized the collection of a student activity fee of \$10.00 for each semester as a part of the general tuition. During 1941-42 the sum of \$99,957.30 was collected after making adjustments for refunds and miscellaneous items. The sum of \$94,640.63 was allocated to various student activity funds and expenses paid of \$1,643.83, leaving a net balance of \$3,672.84 carried as a reserve at June 30, 1942. (See page 228.)

STATE HYGIENIC LABORATORY

The State Hygienic Laboratory is operated in connection with the College of Medicine. The State appropriation for the year ended June 30, 1942 was \$40,000.00 and in addition the Interim Committee of the State General Assembly allocated \$10,000.00, making a total available from State Funds of \$50,000.00. In addition to this the Federal Government appropriated \$30,358.02 under the Social Security Act, Title VI, U. S. Public Health Service. Complete accounts are kept in the University Business Office, but disbursements are made upon approved vouchers from the State Comptroller's office. Expenditures in 1941-42 amounted to \$79,459.45. The State Board of Health also made available \$1,500.00 for Dental Health Education. (See page 229.)

UNITED STATES CRIPPLED CHILDREN'S FUND

The University College of Medicine administers the United States Crippled Children's Fund under the Social Security Act, Title V, Part 2 as amended. Funds are carried in a separate bank account and accounts kept in the University Business Office. These funds are not included as revenue to the University. For 1941-42 the receipts totaled \$108,232.53, and the expenditures totaled \$97,883.35. (See page 230.)

UNITED STATES FUNDS FOR STUDENT AID

During 1941-42 the National Youth Administration, under the Federal Relief program, appropriated \$45,150.14 for the employment of 442 students in various services at the University. Funds are handled by Federal Agencies. This amount is not included as University revenue. (See page 229.)

STUDENT LOAN FUNDS AND OTHER STUDENT AID

Student Loan Funds were established in 1900 at the University. At present they total \$100,354.79 and consist of twenty-six different funds. They have been established by gifts from Alumni, friends, and students. Loans are approved by the Student Aid Committee and handled through the University Business Office. In 1941-42 four hundred eighty students received loans totaling \$31,760.92. Interest in the amount of \$1,428.83 was collected and added to the fund or to associated accounts. On June 30, 1942 the outstanding loans totaled \$22,414.83 with a cash balance of \$77,939.96. (See pages 232-235.)

Further aid was given to 1,573 students in the form of scholarships and fellowships with a total value of \$98,037.69. (For details see page 227).

ENDOWMENT FUNDS

The first endowment fund was established in 1840 from the sale of land from the Federal Government. Other endowments have been received from time to time. Endowment funds are unexpendable, the income being used for the purpose designated in the trust deeds. On June 30, 1942 the Endowment Fund totaled \$997,315.63 and was invested as follows: See page 236.

CONDENSED SUMMARY

Income: The State of Iowa is the chief source of financial support for the Iowa State College. Appropriations made to the Iowa State College for the biennial period, 1940-1942, by the 48th and 49th General Assemblies were as follows:

In addition to the support of the State, the Iowa State College receives income from the Federal Government, from students, from the sales of services and by-products, from endowments, and from gifts. Expenditures: The teaching program of the Iowa State College consumes the largest share of its funds. In 1941-42, 47.5% of the total educational expenditures was devoted to teaching. In the same year, 34.1% was devoted to public service including research and extension; 10.2% for the operation and maintenance of the physical plant; and 8.2% for all other purposes such as libraries, equipment, administration and general.

Physical Plant: The physical plant of the Iowa State College consists of lands—Campus and farms—buildings; equipment, including furniture, laboratory equipment, livestock, farm implements, library books; and improvements other than buildings such as the heating and power plant, water plant, heating tunnels, sewage system, gas mains, and electric lines. All of these items aside from the lands are carried in the records at cost.

Approximately one-half of the endowment is restricted for educational purposes and the bulk of the remainder is restricted for student aid. Full explanations of the nature of the endowments and of the endowment investments are given in Exhibit F, and in Schedules F, F-1, F-2, and F-3 of this report.

Loan Funds: One June 30, 1942 funds totaling \$109,910.44 were available for loans to students. They were derived from gifts, loans, and advances from other funds. The following

table summarizes interesting and significant data about the operation of the loan funds for the years 1940-1942.

AUXILIARY ENTERPRISES

The auxiliary enterprises maintained at the Iowa State College consist of the following: dormitories, College Hospital, Agricultural Engineering Drafting Service, Agricultural Engineering General Service, Animal Husbandry Grain Storage, Book Store, Central Stores, Chemistry Stores, Drayage Service, College Instrument Shop, Laundry, Photoservice, Printing Department, Statistical Service, tenant properties, typewriter service, and Memorial Union student service.

Details of income and expenses of the various auxiliary enterprises are given in Schedules B-1, B-2, B-2-p, B-2-q, B-2-r, B-2-s, B-2-t and Exhibit E; and statements of physical plant facilities used by auxiliary enterprises are given in Schedules G-2, G-2-d, and G-2-d-1. A statement of the history of dormitory indebtedness is shown in Exhibit J in this report.

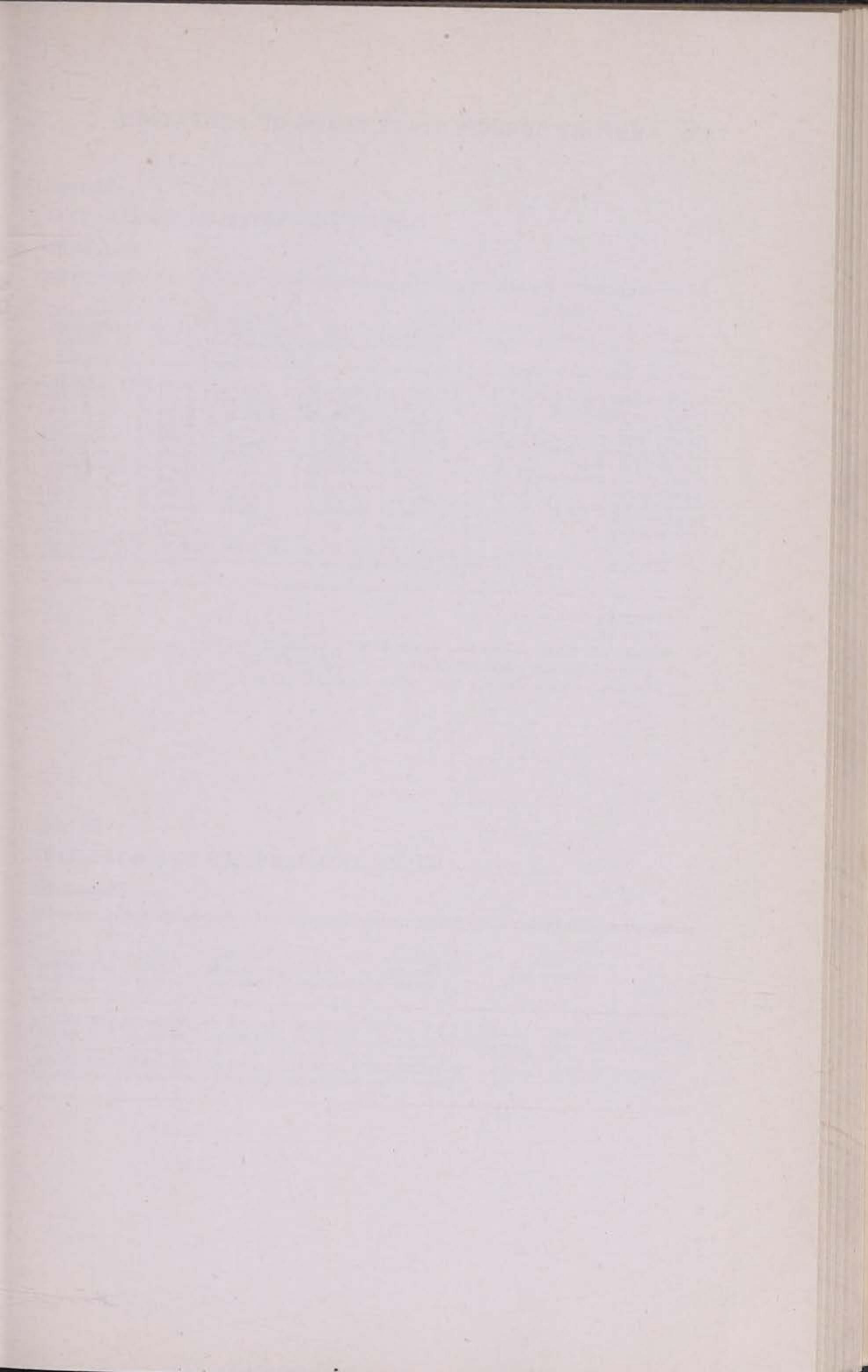

The Iowa School for the Blind is an educational institution which offers complete educational opportunity to the visually handicapped boys and girls from kindergarten through high school. In many respects, the subjects follow the same lines of those found in the schools for the sighted. In addition to academic subjects, special emphasis is placed on music, industrial arts, and physical education. After satisfactorily completing the four year high school course, students are equipped to enter college and those who do attain records that compare favorably with those of the sighted students.

ACADEMIC COURSES

In addition to the academic subjects, the effort in the school is to provide the students with a wholesome philosophy of life; to help them accept blindness more as an inconvenience rather than a handicap. The real handicap might lie in the lack of innate ability; the lack of health, initiative, application, resourcefulness—and not one of these does sight give, nor the loss of or lack of sight take away. Losing one's sight may become a challenge hitherto unsuspected. When one avenue to achievement is cut off, even the main highway perhaps, no reason exists why an individual must drop out of the march of events. Any destination can be reached by detours if one is willing to put in a few longer hours and endure a little rougher going. Visually picturing, mentally seeing through friendly eyes, are some of these detours.

PRIMARY

The primary department stresses fluent reading and rapid thought expression through practical experiences in the world about the child. The school emphasizes Braille reading which is the keynote of book thoughts for the blind pupil. There are three grades of Braille; Grade 1 is given in the kindergarten and in first grade, Grade 1½ is taught in the second grade, and Grade 2 is presented in the sixth grade. This advanced Braille consists of many contractions which add speed to reading and writing. The primary child learns the geography of his home, his school; the work of his friends; and society with their physical, social and geographical relationships to him. As he progresses in his primary work, he is taught to do the work with his hands, mind, and body as his friends about him do in gradual successions of experiences. He learns through dramatization stories, music, healthful rhythmic games and plays, numbers, and nature.

INTERMEDIATE

There are practically the same courses in the intermediate and junior high grades as in public schools with the exception of drawing. Through the use of "My Weekly Reader" and "Current Events", the school is cooperating with the reading program set up in the American Educational Press. Geography and history are taught in units and in both history and language much dramatization is done. The arithmetic course varies from that found in the public school in that mental arithmetic is stressed to a greater degree. This helps to develop the powers of concentration and

speeds up the process of learning. The talking book—a portable Victrola, with records of books, stories, and plays instead of records of music—and the Braille writer are two important aids. In the lower grades, tests and written work are done mostly in Braille, but the typewriter is used in the higher grades.

HIGH SCHOOL

The high school continues on the foundation established by the grades. Here the student receives instruction in most of the courses offered in a college preparatory curriculum. Magazines such as "The Reader's Digest", "The Searchlight", and the "Weekly News" are published in Braille and keep the student informed on present affairs. The radio, bringing the School of the Air, is used in some classrooms. The Braille library of several hundred volumes affords the students with reading in novels, drama, essays, history, biography, and science.

In commercial subjects besides typewriting, which he studies in the the grades, a student learns to use the Braille writer and the stenotype or shorthand machine.

In high school, the student participates in plays, creative writing and contests with public schools.

MUSIC

Seven full time and one part time music teachers are employed. Subjects taught are voice, organ, piano, violin and other instruments of the orchestra. Also harmony, musical form, and history of music are offered. The pupils do not learn their music "by ear" as some people erroneously think but they memorize it from music printed according to the Braile system. Christmas and Easter vesper services are given by the I. S. B. choir, and the same organization furnishes the commencement Sunday music. The choir averages about thirty-two members. In the orchestra are thirty members. Each year one or more orchestra concerts are given. In state high school music contests both the choir and the orchestra have received highest ratings.

HOME AND INDUSTRIAL ARTS

The industrial department of the school gives training in chair caning, mat and brush making, basketry, plain and art weaving, upholstery, leather work, and poultry raising. A four year course in piano tuning and repairing enables the student to take his place in a factory with sighted workers. Manual training students do repair work and make some new articles which gives the boys the fundamentals of handling tools.

Home arts consist of sewing, cooking, and home making, all of which subjects are planned to prepare the student to meet the needs of the home.

THE HEALTH PROGRAM

Every student enrolled in the Iowa School for the Blind participates in and benefits from an extensive health education program which has for its objective the development and maintenance of "a sound mind and sound body." Under the direction of three full time and two part time teachers the physical education department carries on a program of interscholastic and intramural sports. The school's wrestling and cross-country teams compete with boys of other schools in Iowa, while the boys' and girls' track teams enter a national telegraphic meet and two dual meets each spring. Kickball, ground baseball, and touch football are sports included in the intramural schedule. Supervised swim-

ming in the gymnasium pool and roller skating on the large outdoor cement oval are favorite pastimes with the students.

Winter sports include ice skating, and sliding down slides constructed on the campus.

Special attention is given in gymnasium classes to those students requiring remedial and corrective exercises. Much emphasis is placed on correct posture, standing, walking, and sitting habits. The good health of students is further guaranteed by the school through its maintenance of a completely equipped hospital which has an eighteen-bed capacity. The hospital includes:

1. A registered trained nurse, who is in constant attendance at the school, administering treatments for eye or other physical ailments, caring for ill students or attending to other hospital duties.

2. A regularly employed physician, who makes daily calls at the school to examine students who are sick or indisposed, to perform the usual medical services, to give advice with reference to the need of a specialist's services, to recommend helpful treatments, or to vaccinate for the prevention of disease.

3. A dentist is employed who gives two forenoons each week to the task of caring for the teeth of the students and looking after their dental needs fully. A complete dental office is maintained in connection with the hospital.

4. The complete service of the University Medical School and Hospital.

a. Children entering the school for the first time are taken to the University Hospital for a complete examination and check-up.

b. All cases needing surgical treatment are referred to the University Hospital for attention.

c. Refractions for the purpose of fitting glasses are all taken care of at the University Hospital.

d. Cases of serious illness, needing the skill of a specialist, are cared for at the University Hospital. All of this service is without cost to the School for the Blind, and is very valuable.

Twice during each school year the ophthalmologist of the State University Medical School and Hospital, accompanied by two or three internes, makes a visit to the school. At the time of this visit all of the students of the school assemble for eye and other examinations. From the findings of these examinations the ophthalmologist makes recommendations as follows:

a. Concerning those needing daily or frequent medical or other treatment.

b. Concerning those who might be benefited by surgical means.

c. Concerning those whose vision might be improved by the fitting of glasses.

If the recommendations of the ophthalmologist involves surgery, then they are transmitted to the parents. If they give their consent, the ones concerned are sent to the University Hospital for such surgical work. During the years 1940-1942 students were sent as follows:

a. To the eye department, 48

b. To the department of otology, 0

c. To the department of surgery, 5

d. To the department of neurology, 1

e. To the orthopedic department, 6

f. To the department of medicine, 1

g. To the psychopathic department, 0

h. To the department of pediatrics, 1

i. To the department of head specialists, 1

All in all, a student enrolled in the Iowa School for the Blind participates in as fine a body building program as it is possible to offer.

ORGANIZATIONS

Besides the regular curricular subjects, there are four main extra curricular activities which function throughout the school year: Boy Scouts, Girl Reserves, Golden Rule Circle, and Vocational Guidance Club.

The Boy Scouts meet at least once each week with their Scout Master. Whenever possible an outdoor activity is planned for these meetings. Usually the activity is in the form of a nature study hike and an overnight camping trip or some kind of outdoor game.

There are two Girl Reserve groups with a sponsor for each. The groups are divided according to the rank which each girl has attained. The sponsors meet with their respective groups once each week.

The Golden Rule Circle, supervised by a teacher but planned by the high school students, meets each Sunday afternoon. Each alternate Sunday the meeting is held in the school chapel. At these meetings some worthwhile topic vital to the development of wholesome bodies and minds is discussed. On the other Sundays, the high school students meet in the Senior girls' lounge for a social get-together.

There are two Vocational Guidance Clubs, both directed by a teacher. The first includes the seventh and eighth grades and the second comprises the senior class members. The main purpose of these organizations is to do as much as possible toward preparing the student to select some vocation for which he is best suited after graduation.

When not engaged in some activity, the students spend their after-school hours in their dormitory. Either a matron or supervisor has charge of each of the eight dormitories. Dormitory life is planned as nearly as possible to coincide with the home life of the average child.

Chapel for students, teachers, matrons, and supervisors is held Monday, Wednesday, and Friday. At these chapels, teachers, ministers of Vinton, and students conduct services that offer special religious training. Every Sunday morning, Sunday School is held in the dormitories. Afterwards, the students join the church lines which are formed for attendance at the local churches. A teacher or supervisor is in charge of each line. A student may choose whatever church he wishes to attend.

REPORT OF THE IOWA SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF

L. E. BERG, Superintendent

THE OBJECT OF THE IOWA SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF

It is well to re-emphasize, from time to time, the objective toward which the school organization is working.

The object of the Iowa School for the Deaf is to promote a thorough education for children between the ages of seven and nineteen who are too deaf to be properly instructed in the public schools of the state.

This objective pre-supposes that the child's education shall be as individual in character as the school is reasonably able to afford. This means that each child, entrusted to the care of the school, shall receive training suitable to and commensurate with his capabilities.

The final test of the school's effectiveness shall be found in how well the child assumes the responsibilities of citizenship which are rightfully his. Specifically, the object is:

- (1) To develop boys and girls to be self-supporting.
- (2) To teach boys and girls how to conduct a successful home life.
- (3) To teach boys and girls fundamental skills involved in normal living.
- (4) To teach an intelligent use of leisure time.
- (5) To teach social concepts consistent with good citizenship.
- (6) To produce boys and girls healthy in mind, body and spirit.
- (7) To provide opportunities for qualified pupils to obtain a higher education.

PRIMARY HALL

Small children, upon first entering the school, are segregated in the Primary Hall unit, where they are surrounded with an oral atmosphere. Instruction is continued orally for three years, until the oral habit is well founded, if the pupil is amenable to this habit.

The physical needs of these children are cared for down to the smallest detail by a corps of selected counselors under the direction of a competent house mother. Their schoolroom training is given by a staff of nine special teachers directed by a supervising teacher.

By the careful development of this unit, the school was able to reduce the average entrance age from fourteen years in 1921 to between six and seven years. Records are on file of a number of deaf children of preschool age, with whom the State Field Worker is able to make contact, advise parents, and in general aid in the preparation for school so essential to the conservation of time during the formative years.

The work in Primary Hall covers elementary instruction largely in speech and language so that on entering the school proper the children are able to take first grade work or better, of the public school.

AURICULAR TESTS AND TRAINING

The hearing of each pupil is carefully tested with the Western Electric 6-A Audiometer soon after entrance and frequently thereafter. If the percentage of residual hearing revealed by these tests is enough to encourage efforts to develop that hearing, as many pupils as there are accommodations for are placed in a room with a hearing aid. The school now has six complete units of twelve outlets each. The cost of these instruments is high, but every effort is being made to provide enough units to take care of all the pupils who have usable hearing.

A trained pianist comes to the school daily to help conduct the rhythm exercises for the younger pupils. It is believed that these rhythm exercises assist the deaf child to acquire more flexibility in his speech.

ACADEMIC DEPARTMENT

The instruction throughout the academic department is given orally for those pupils able to profit by oral methods. Other methods must necessarily be used when pupils fail to progress by the oral method.

The course of study includes a systematic development of mathematics, language, social and natural sciences, composition, reading and speech and speech-reading. This course of study comprises a total of twelve years, three of which are spent in preparatory work. A thirteenth year of instruction is available for qualified pupils. This additional year may be used in preparation for entrance to a hearing high school, for college preparation or for further vocational instruction. A diploma is awarded to those pupils who have fulfilled the requirements of the school course of study.

Special opportunities are provided for all the boys and girls in the form of supervised play. This is in addition to the regular athletic program. Thus considerable interest is developed in such activities as volleyball, table tennis, bowling, and the like.

Once a week various members of the faculty sponsor assembly programs for the pupils. These programs are educational in nature, designed to be informative, and to develop character traits. Movies, both of an educational and entertainment nature are shown from time to time. Films are available for classroom use by those teachers requesting them.

VOCATIONAL TRAINING

Rounding out its program of training the deaf for active citizenship, the Iowa School offers extended facilities for developing the aptitudes of both boys and girls in some of the occupations most suited to them which may be taught under school conditions. Competent instructors are employed under the direction of an experienced principal. The school aims to train in workmanlike habits, in character, and in appreciation of good workmanship. The instruction is shaped to lay a good foundation in the fundamentals of a particular trade or occupation.

In this department, as in the academic department, credits are given for acceptable performance, or withheld if the student's performance does not come up to the requirements. Thus the vocational training credits definitely are required for graduation from the school.

Valuable practice for the pupils is obtained in caring for the needs of the school community. The baking classes make all the bread, cake, and pastries served. The shoe repairing classes attend to the mending of the pupils' shoes. The bookbindery pupils repair and rebuild both text and library books. This class cooperates with the printing class in making up the school catalogue.

In the printery, two linotypes are provided for instructional purposes, and the older pupils become proficient in their operation. A complete outfit of miscellaneous equipment and a variety of presses are provided, including a self-feeding unit.

The advanced classes in cabinet making do remarkably fine work, turning out excellent furniture which is in use all over the school. The upholstering classes also contribute many fine pieces for use in the parlors and offices.

A course in general shop instructs the pupils, both girls and boys, in the operations involved in leathercraft, woodworking and metal work. Likewise, the facilities of the school farm are used to instruct a class of boys interested in agriculture.

A modification of the advanced course permits students not desiring to prepare themselves for college to take extra vocational training, and in some cases full time work in this department.

The general policy of the school is to give every girl basic training in the art of home-making, in its various branches. If possible, training in some breadwinning occupation is also given to each girl.

A careful check is made of each pupil's development in this department, on the basis of such qualities as Speed, Accuracy, Self-Reliance, Industry, Thrift, Dependability, Punctuality, Co-operation, Courtesy and Neatness. The grading system is based upon the pupil's development of these qualities so essential to character. Therefore, vocational training in this school means considerably more than the development of skilled hands.

MORAL INSTRUCTION

Moral and religious training is provided, of a general character acceptable to all churches and creeds. Sunday School is held every Sunday morning in graded classes conducted by the regular teachers. Once a week, morning assemblies are held, when some member of the faculty gives a talk intended to strengthen character. Whenever parents request it, pupils are allowed to attend churches named by the parents in the city. Ministers of the various denominations are welcomed to conduct special services at the school for their special groups. Visiting ministers frequently are invited to address all the pupils in the main auditorium.

THE SOCIAL LIFE OF THE COMMUNITY

Pupils enjoy a varied social life such as might be expected in any large boarding school. General parties attended by pupils and teachers, directed by faculty committees, are held on all special occasions and holidays. Smaller groups have frequent socials. A number of clubs and activity groups hold frequent meetings. These occasions supply the opportunity to teach manners and social customs.

Picnics and trips to nearby places of interest, theater parties, and class trips of an educational nature are frequently arranged. Winter sports are a popular diversion. Extensive playgrounds enable the boys and girls to be out of doors for healthful games and pastimes during the fall and spring months.
