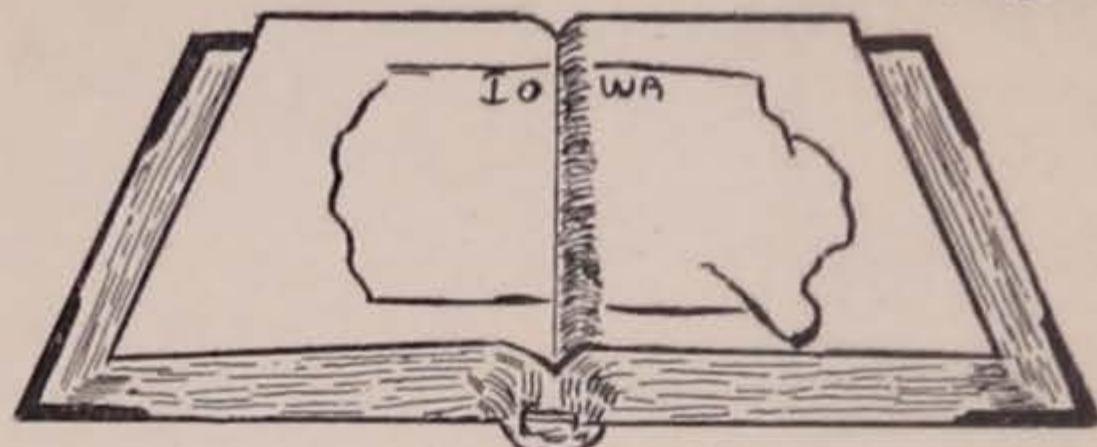
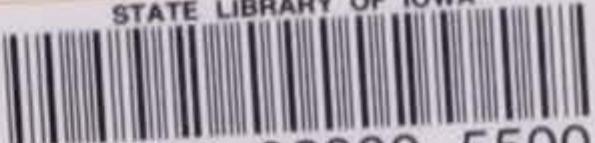

*To the Governor of Iowa and Members
of the Fifty-first General Assembly:*

We submit herewith the biennial report of the State Board of Education. The preface thereto will be brief. In the report will be found statements from the presidents and the superintendents of the institutions under the State Board of Education, and to those we invite your particular and careful attention.

It is never easy for this Board to estimate the needs of the several institutions, the government of which is entrusted to it, for the biennial period which begins more than six months after these estimates are filed with the State Comptroller. There are many factors which are unknown, even in normal times, chief among which is the sum that will be received from tuitions at the three institutions of higher learning. It is a much simpler matter to estimate the needs of the schools for the deaf and the blind, because their student bodies do not fluctuate much from year to year.

At all of the institutions under the Board's control there is the matter of salary. The salary scale at Minnesota, Illinois, Wisconsin, Ohio, and Indiana is much higher than ours, not to mention the great universities on the two seaboards and in between, like the University of Rochester, Western Reserve, and others. We are constantly losing men whom we do not wish to lose, because of competition with universities whose salary scales are away above that of the Iowa institutions. The same thing is true at the School for the Deaf and the School for the Blind. The salaries paid to teachers in those schools do not compare with the salaries paid to teachers in the public schools of the larger cities and towns in Iowa.

The School for the Deaf labors under a tremendous handicap of which few people have any knowledge. The handicap is its location. It is situated three miles from Council Bluffs, and is without any system of transportation except such as the School shall furnish. The streetcar line used to run from the center of Council Bluffs to the gates of the institution, with an hourly service that began early in the morning and continued well onto midnight. This service was discontinued many years ago. If the School is to attract and hold the right kind of teachers, it is going to be necessary to furnish trans-

portation on a regular schedule which will be at least reasonably adequate. What is true of teachers is also true of a considerable number of the people who are employed on the farm and in the physical plant.

The detailed askings of the Board will be set forth in the bill which will be presented to the General Assembly after the askings have been reviewed and approved by the Governor and the Comptroller. It would, therefore, be a bootless task to enter upon a discussion of them in this preface.

Two years ago we were at war and everything was problematical, so far as the number of students to be taken care of was concerned and what the Government would call upon the institutions to do to assist in winning the war. We are proud to say that the major educational institutions have made a large and distinguished contribution to this effort, having met every requirement.

In view of the uncertainties existing at that time, those who consulted with the General Assembly, at its request, pledged from time to time that if the General Assembly granted the Board's askings expenditures would be carefully looked after and any unobligated balances would be returned. This pledge will be kept.

What of the future? We are still at war, both in Europe and in Asia. We all hope that the war in Europe will soon come to a victorious conclusion; and it is devoutly to be hoped that before the biennium which we now confront shall have ended peace will reign throughout the world. It almost may be taken for granted, we think, that such will be the case.

If this hope is realized, then it goes almost without saying that the institutions of higher learning will have a tremendous increase in their student bodies. The Government, in what is known as the GI Bill, has made generous provision for the education of returning soldiers who are desirous of pursuing higher education, the only limitation being the fitness of the student. It may almost be taken for granted, we think, that all of our institutions of higher learning will have larger enrollments than they ever had. All this has been taken into consideration by the Board in making up its askings for the next biennium, and we take it for granted that the Governor and the Comptroller also will take due recognition of what probably will be the situation.

The capital askings speak for themselves, and will stand on their own merits when finally presented. We take it for granted that the State of Iowa and all other states will wish to make their contribution to the effort that must be made everywhere to insure full employment in peacetime industry. No more sensible contribution can be made than providing for a reasonable amount of capital expenditure for the things the State in its various activities and undertakings actually needs.

The general assemblies of Iowa have always shown a disposition to deal not only justly but generously with the state's educational institutions. The members believe in the aphorism, "Education is the cheap defense of nations." We have no doubt that the members of the Fifty-first General Assembly will act in this spirit.

A STATEMENT IN SUPPORT OF RECOMMENDATIONS
FOR APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE STATE
UNIVERSITY OF IOWA

This request is made while the nation is engaged in the greatest war of its history and while we do not know when or how that war will end. Great changes have been effected in the economic and in the emotional life of our people. Factors beyond our control make it difficult to see clearly the pattern of events for more than a few days, or at most for more than a few weeks, ahead. In such a time it is more than ordinarily difficult to prepare with any accuracy a request for funds which will be needed for a period which will not begin for almost a year and will not end for almost three years.

In the meantime we are confronted with many tasks:

- A. The maintenance and operation of the University for regular civilian students.
- B. Service to the Army and Navy by providing trainees with board, lodging, medical service and instruction. This contribution must be made.
- C. The conduct of research of a highly specialized nature in furtherance of the war effort.
- D. The preparation and operation of a rehabilitation program for the education of wounded veterans.
- E. Preparation for the greatly increased enrollments anticipated in the "post-war University."
- F. The replacement of worn-out equipment and the repair of physical plant as soon as equipment and materials are released from war-time controls.
- G. The filling of vacancies and the addition of other competent staff to meet the instructional demands of increased enrollments after the war.

FUND A—GENERAL OPERATING FUNDS

The 50th General Assembly appropriated annually, for the biennium 1943-1945, the sum of \$2,505,000 "for salaries, sup-

port and maintenance." The University expended of this sum \$2,305,000, resulting in a saving of \$200,000 annually, or \$400,000 for the biennium. At this date this reduction is estimated. The University hopes to turn back to the State Treasury this sum on June 30, 1945, providing unforeseen contingencies do not demand its need prior to this date. This saving results from unused salaries of teaching staff on leave of absence, serving the Government in various theatres of war, plus other minor savings in operating items.

It is requested that the same total be appropriated annually for the biennium 1945-1947, namely, \$2,505,000.

FUND B—REPAIRS, REPLACEMENTS AND ALTERATIONS

The 50th General Assembly appropriated annually for the biennium 1943-1945 the sum of \$75,000 "for repairs, replacements and alterations" although the amount requested for this period was \$185,000. The University Campus covers 429.9 acres of public grounds. There are fifty-seven buildings (excluding dormitories) in academic service to maintain and service with heat, light and water. The public grounds, buildings, and central power plant with many miles of heating lines, water pipes and electrical wires must be constantly maintained, replaced and repaired. For this purpose the sum of \$192,000 annually is requested.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

During the past fifteen years the State of Iowa has omitted to appropriate any substantial sums for capital improvements of the University. In that interval the needs of the University have become very pressing. Those needs will be acute as soon as veterans begin to return to the campus in considerable numbers.

The University has projected its long range needs as nearly as they can be foreseen at this time, and has developed a proposed program to meet them. Substantial sums are requested annually for the next biennium in order to begin the program. Substantial sums have been requested in order (1) to overcome the lag in building for the past fifteen years, (2) to provide for the pressing needs of the post-war years, and (3) to take the maximum advantage possible of any available outside funds.

Following this summarization is the detailed budget with explanatory comments.

FUND B—REPAIRS, REPLACEMENTS AND ALTERATIONS

Annually

1. Geology Annex Extension

The present annex houses the United States Geodetic Survey, and also the Iowa Geological Survey. The activities of these two Surveys demand additional space. \$ 7,500

2. Chemistry Building Improvements

Remodeling of laboratory facilities and a lecture room to improve teaching facilities and increase capacities. 5,000

3. Mechanical Engineering Laboratory

Replacing temporary partitions with permanent tile partitions. 1,500

4. Painting and Glazing

Interior and exterior painting and glazing as a part of an established maintenance program on all buildings. 15,000

5. Floors

Replacement and rebuilding of floors and floor coverings in the older buildings. 10,000

6. Roofs

Replacement of old roofs where it is impractical to make further repairs. 5,000

7. Masonry

Repairing and repainting of masonry and brick walls that are no longer water tight, so that the structures will not deteriorate, nor will interior painting be further damaged. 10,000

8. Acoustics

Treatment of classrooms and lecture rooms to bring them up to present day standards acoustically. 5,000

9. Ventilating Systems

The installation of new ventilating equipment and the repairing and reconditioning of present ventilation systems in old buildings to improve working conditions in buildings. 5,000

10. Remodeling

General remodeling of present buildings to increase usable teaching space. 15,000

11. Water and Sewer Piping

Water and sewer systems need to be completely replaced in some old buildings, and a constant replacement is necessary in laboratory systems where acid action eats through pipes and fittings. 5,000

12. General Campus Improvements

Rapid growth of the campus has forced the neglect of many areas. Considerable work should be done in the development of new lawns, the rehabilitation of old lawns, and the planting of trees and shrubs. 15,000

13. Sidewalks and Curbs

General repairs and new installations of walks and curbs. 5,000

14. River Dredge

Providing a dredge and equipment to clean the river of silt and fill so that a clear channel and basin may be maintained above the Burlington Street Dam. 12,500

15. Boiler Plant Repairs

The boiler water softener system has become inadequate, with the result that boilers have heavy deposits of scale on the tubes and drums, necessitating frequent cleaning, and making it difficult to keep boilers in operation. The addition of deareating heater, additional piping, and rearranging the feed water lines for emergency operations will alleviate this serious situation of shut down.

Repair and insulation of breeching from the building to smoke stack. Installation of fly ash removal equipment to safeguard deterioration of stacks. Replacement of undersize steam mains and proper placement of valves and new expansion joints.

Installation of more roof ventilators over boilers and breeching. Installation of water and air piping for fire protection and plant operation. Relining and repairing exteriors of ash hoppers. Installation of additional lighting for better plant operation. 17,500

16. Electric Plant Repairs

Installation of new bank of transformers outside the plant with proper wiring to promote safety of operation. Changing three-pole switches to four-pole switches where needed in the plant as a safety precaution. 8,000

17. Water Plant Repairs

Repiping of certain parts of plant so that continuous operation of plant may be maintained. 3,000

18. Condensation Meters

Meters to be installed at University buildings so that the exact use of steam for each building can be determined and controlled. 7,000

19. Electric Services at Building

Because of increase in use of electricity at all buildings, the present building transformers and services are inadequate. Replacement and enlargement of capacities must be done. 10,000

20. Lighting Changes

Lighting of classrooms and seminars is below standard. Lighting units need to be replaced so that better illumination may be obtained. 10,000

21. Tunnel Extensions and Steam Conservation

Piping replacement and improvements in steam distribution so that better and safer service may be obtained. Installation of pipe covering, insulation of buildings, caulking of windows, and other repairs are required for steam use conservation. 20,000

THE STATE UNIVERSITY OF IOWA BUILDING PROGRAM

July 1, 1945-July 1, 1955

GENERAL STATEMENT

The accompanying chart shows that State appropriations for capital purposes have been relatively small for the past fifteen years. During such a period a great University undergoes many changes, not only in enrollment but in teaching methods and demands from the student body and general public. Colleges and departments need reorganization from time to time for effective operation. Growth during the past decade has pointed to the need for many improvements to the physical plant. Many capital improvements, which have been seriously needed, have been deferred.

It is true that during the war period building materials and labor are not available. However, there are indications that after the war building materials will be obtainable and the Federal Government will have a Public Works Program wherein Federal funds will be forthcoming for capital needs, provided there are funds available for matching purposes. The State of Iowa should provide the University with a sizeable fund for capital purposes and be in a position to match Public Works Agency funds.

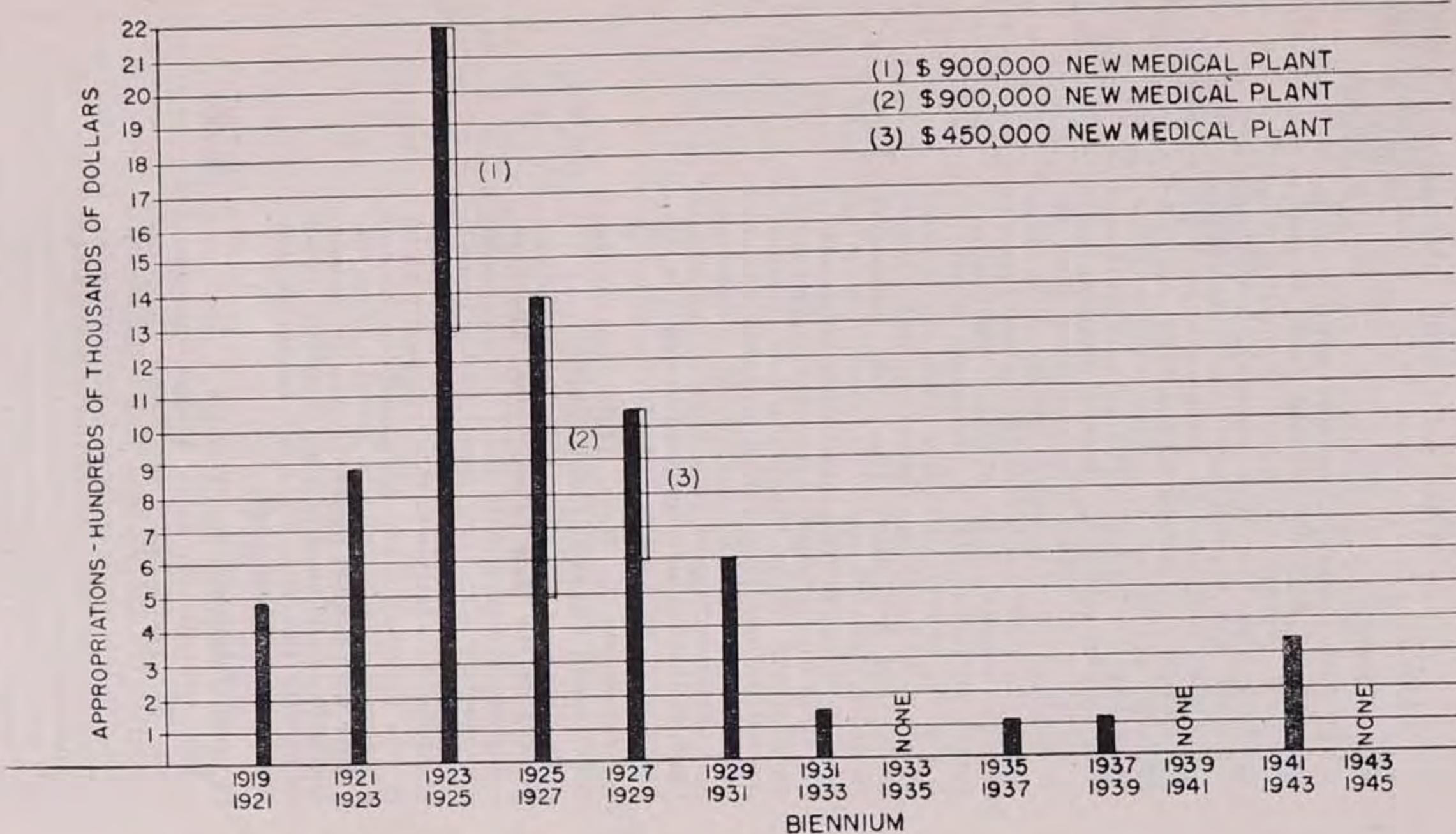
The businesslike thing to do is to report for consideration a planned progressive building program. The following summary sets forth these needs. Please note that the requests are

large for the first biennium—1945-1947. This is done not only to be in a position to secure as large a Federal appropriation as possible—when and if available—after the war, but also to overcome the lag in building during the past fifteen years and to provide for the acute needs of the post war years.

1. New Library.....	\$ 700,000	\$ 350,000
The 49th General Assembly appropriated the sum of \$300,000 for the first unit of the New Library. The war prohibited all building and the 50th General Assembly continued the appropriation and authorized the State Treasurer to invest this sum in U. S. Bonds. It is requested that the sum of \$350,000 annually, or a total for the biennium 1945-1947 of \$700,000 be appropriated, which when added to the now existing appropriation of \$300,000 will create a fund of \$1,000,000 for the New Library. Not only is the Library needed to make books more readily accessible to students for educational purposes and to safeguard them in fire proof quarters but to release space now filled with books in Schaeffer Hall, Macbride Hall and other University buildings in order that the space so released may be used to meet classroom and other needs arising from the anticipated increase in post-war enrollments. Thus the Library is not only needed for our long range program but its construction will aid in reducing congestion and overcrowding after the war. For these reasons the prompt construction of the Library is of paramount importance.		
2. Improvements to Heat, Light and Water Service and Physical Plant Shops.....	500,000	250,000
The present physical plant shop is now located on the New Library site. The present shop, together with the plumbing, paint and machine shop, now inadequately housed, should be centralized in a new central shops building. In addition to this, our power plant is now overloaded and additional boilers and a steam turbine should be added. These together with needed improvements in tunnels, steam lines and electric lines should be added to service the new buildings requested for the biennium 1945-1947.		
3. Physical Education for Women.....	300,000	150,000
The present Women's Gymnasium was built 30 years ago to house physical education for 804 women. Today the enrollment for this work is more than double the enrollment for 1915. In the thirty years since the building was built, not only has the available space been outgrown but new technics and trends in the program of physical fitness for women require space designed for		

more highly personalized attention within their building and for the out-of-door exercise so closely allied to this program.

| 4. Communication Center (Journalism and Visual Education) | 525,000 | 262,500 |

Modern trends indicate clearly the inseparable relations existing between journalism, visual education, and radio. The need for a Journalism Building has long been felt since the building housing this school was burned in 1940, and the School of Journalism has since been inadequately housed in widely scattered and "borrowed" quarters. In providing this School with facilities in keeping with the importance of the training it provides, it is neither efficient educationally nor sound economically to divorce it from the two associated activities of visual education and radio. Moreover, a "communications center" to house and to coordinate these three activities not only will promote the effectiveness of each but will eliminate duplications in lecture rooms, classrooms, laboratories, libraries and service facilities which would be necessary if they were housed separately.

The successful use of visual aids, such as photography, cinematography, slides, lithographic charts, posters, models, animations, in education and in industry signifies a need for trained workers in the field of production, and the association of such work with trained writers in the field of journalism emphasizes the importance of a close relationship.

This center should be planned from the beginning to include radio for similar reasons, but it is believed wise at this time to defer such an inclusion until the trends in radio are more clearly indicated.

The 49th General Assembly appropriated \$45,000 for this addition. These funds are now invested in U. S. Bonds by the State Treasurer. The additional sum requested here will be needed to build the addition when materials are available.

| 6. New Pharmacy Building..... | 300,000 | 150,000 |

The College of Pharmacy is now housed in the Botany-Pharmacy-Chemistry Building. Quarters are inadequate and this College needs additional and proper space to store drugs and for the preparation of pharmaceutical materials. Furthermore, the College of Pharmacy properly belongs in the Medical and Hospital group on the West Campus. Pharmacy not only serves the College of Medicine educationally but buys or manu-

factures all of the drugs for the Hospitals. Removing Pharmacy from its present location will provide space for expansion of the Chemistry Department. The Chemistry Department was cramped and congested even before the war. The space now available for Chemistry is inadequate for anticipated post-war enrollments and for the expanding needs of a field of teaching and research of ever increasing importance.

7. Auditorium and Music Building.....	1,000,000	500,000
No auditorium on the campus seating more than 450 people is safe in the event of a fire. Macbride Auditorium, seating capacity 1200, was built for a student body of 2000; the lounge of Iowa Memorial Union, seating capacity 1800, was not built for an auditorium; both are inadequate for the present enrollment, and both are unsafe. The University needs and should have an auditorium capable of seating a large audience and designed so that the best talent in the country may be brought before the student body. From the standpoint of economy in construction, operation, and maintenance, such a building may also be used to house the Department of Music most efficiently, and will also provide expanded facilities now greatly needed for music teaching and graduate study in this field.		
8. A bridge across Iowa River from Observational School Campus to Fine Arts Campus....	50,000	25,000
This bridge is needed to give students in the observational school access to adequate playgrounds and other students access to the Dramatic Arts Laboratory and the Auditorium.		
9. Child Welfare Station.....	200,000	100,000
The facilities of the Child Welfare Research Station are widely scattered and some of its laboratories are in houses in areas which are scheduled for clearance. A consolidation of its facilities into a new building not only will promote this experimental work of the Station but will also enable it to coordinate this work in a significant way with secondary education in the University Experimental Schools.		
10. Equipment	160,000	80,000
It has been impossible to purchase equipment during the war period. After the war the amount of worn-out equipment which must be replaced will be large. Furthermore, new equipment will be needed for the new buildings listed.		
11. Clearing Campus of Privately-Owned Lots.... To provide sites for buildings in this list	100,000	50,000

and to clear the Campus of privately-owned property within the boundaries of the University fixed by the State Board of Education.

12. Sewers, Walks, Paving, Grading and Other Campus Improvements	125,000	62,500
This sum is needed to provide these services to the new buildings and to improve and replace existing services.

FUTURE NEEDS

(The order of the items listed hereafter is not necessarily final, and future needs may develop which are not now foreseen.)

1. New Dental Building	\$ 450,000
The present Dental Building was built in 1916. Growing demands for dental education make a new and larger dental laboratory building imperative. Furthermore, the College of Dentistry should be closely allied to the Medical Sciences on the West Campus.	
2. Botany Building	200,000
A new building and greenhouse to consolidate and to locate in better position, the work of the Botany Department, and further to increase the facilities for Chemistry by the removal of Botany from the Chemistry Building.	
3. Law Building	275,000
The long contemplated program of a College of Law Campus in the area set aside for that purpose requires a new building for the College of Law. The space vacated in the present Law Building will be completely convertible for other needed uses at small expense.	
4. Physical Plant Improvements	1,000,000
For extension of heat, light and water service to new buildings. Also additional shop service.	
5. College of Commerce	250,000
A new building to establish the College of Commerce in a building of its own and to release needed space in University Hall.	
6. Office Building	300,000
A new building to house administrative offices such as the Business Office, the Registrar's Office, etc.	
7. Zoology Building	225,000
A new building to enlarge the facilities for the Department of Zoology.	
8. Remodel University Buildings	250,000
The program of development and construction indicated herein will call for complete remodeling of seven major University buildings in order to adapt them to new uses. Schaeffer, Macbride and University Halls will house new	

tenants when the library is built, and all three buildings are completely convertible to new lecture, class, and laboratory work already in need of additional space. The present Zoology Building should be included and remodeled as a future addition for the Communication Center; the Dental Building may readily be converted into new and expanded quarters for Geology and Geography; the Music Building may be included as expanded facilities for the groups now housed in East Hall; and the Kellogg School, when remade, offers an excellent opportunity to move the State Hygienic Laboratories into acceptable quarters within the Medical Arts area, thus appropriately segregating this work and removing it from the Medical Laboratories. In the case of every one of these buildings, remodeling operations will produce a practically new building for uses which are already in need of expansion.

9. Addition to Dramatic Arts Laboratory.....	150,000
10. Student Health Center.....	250,000
11. Completion of Chemistry Building.....	500,000
This building is now crowded and should be completed.	
12. College of Education.....	200,000
13. Electrical Engineering Building.....	200,000
14. Communication Center (Radio).....	200,000
Developments in frequency modulation, television, and the increasing demand for education in radio require an expansion in both space and facilities. The relationship radio now has to journalism and the economy of joint use of lecture, classrooms, studios, and library naturally includes radio education and radio broadcasting within a "Communication Center".	
15. Equipment for above buildings.....	750,000
16. Clearing Campus of privately-owned lots.....	100,000

A STATEMENT IN SUPPORT OF RECOMMENDATIONS FOR APPROPRIATIONS FOR IOWA STATE COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE AND MECHANIC ARTS

The years 1945-1947 will undoubtedly be among the most significant in the history of Iowa State College. It is likely that most of the wartime activities will be terminated within the next twelve months. It is also likely that returning veterans will enter the College in increasingly large numbers after the spring of 1945. It is reasonable to assume that the College will reach and even surpass its normal pre-war enrollment by the beginning of the year 1946. Ultimately, with the demobilization of our Armed Services and with the return to school of many students now in essential war industries, the enrollment of the College is likely to reach a peak by 1947 of perhaps 25% above pre-war enrollments.

At the same time, demands upon the research agencies are increasing rapidly because of the growing number and variety of problems confronting Iowa agriculture and industry. The College has made many notable contributions to these activities in the past through programs of research in agriculture, engineering, home economics, science, and veterinary medicine.

One of the College's most notable contributions to the war effort has been through the extension agencies. The Agricultural Extension Service has taken a leading part in the program which has resulted in the most remarkable agricultural production the State of Iowa has ever known. At the same time, the Engineering Extension Service has been of tremendous value to the State of Iowa, through in-service training and the development of short courses for industrial workers and prospective workers.

It is believed that the requests for funds as described in the following statements are reasonable in view of the problems, the possibilities and the opportunities confronting the College and the people of Iowa during the next biennium and the years following. It is important that adequate funds be provided for operation and maintenance. It is especially important that provisions be made for buildings to accommodate the expanding activities of the College. It has become clear that

education has assumed a vitally important place in the nation's plans for the future. This education must comprehend not only the proper development of the material resources of the nation, but in a more important measure it must take full cognizance of the intellectual and spiritual growth of our people. Another war would be catastrophic; it is doubtful if civilization could survive. Our greatest problem is to learn how to control the developments of science in the high interests of humanity, and equally to find out the basis at which we can live at peace with the other people of the world. In these great tasks education will have a very important place.

SUMMARY OF BUDGET REQUESTS

For the Biennium 1945-1947 the amounts requested annually are, as follows:

On the following pages will be found the detailed budget with explanatory comments.

I—SALARIES, SUPPORT AND MAINTENANCE

It is requested that the sum of \$2,520,000 be appropriated annually for salaries, support and maintenance for the biennium 1945-1947.

This is the amount of the annual appropriation by the Fiftieth General Assembly for the biennium 1943-1945.

Of the amount appropriated for the present biennium it is anticipated that the College may be able to turn back to the State Treasurer the sum of \$200,000 for each year, or a total of \$400,000. These savings represent the unused salaries of members of the College staff on leave of absence for military and governmental service, together with smaller savings in certain operating items.

II—REPAIRS, REPLACEMENTS AND ALTERATIONS

The sum of \$122,500 annually was appropriated by the

Fiftieth General Assembly for "Repairs, Replacements and Alterations."

For each year of the biennium 1945-1947, the sum of \$200,000 is requested for these purposes.

The value of the College plant is \$16,000,000. The campus proper covers over 700 acres. There are 40 major buildings and 200 smaller structures to keep in repair and to service with heat, light and water. The public grounds, central power plant and many miles of utilities must be kept in good condition.

A summary and a detailed statement of the needs of the College in this category follow:

1. **Power Plant—Install new steam generating unit.....** \$130,000

As a continuation of the program of power plant improvement, it is proposed to remove two of the four remaining small boilers which have been in service 22 to 26 years and install in their place a new unit of larger capacity and modern design similar to the one installed in 1940.

2. **Power Plant—Reconstruct ash and coal handling system.....** 50,000

The present conveyer system for coal and ash was installed in 1915. It is badly worn and needs extensive repairs or replacements. A complete redesign and reconstruction of the system is necessary if it is to be of capacity to serve the additional steam generating equipment proposed herein.

3. **Power Plant—New electric switchboard.....** 15,000

In connection with the installation of a new generator and improvements to the electric distribution system it is considered advisable to install a complete new switchboard.

4. **Electric Distribution System—Transformer Replacements....** 15,000

This work consists of the replacement with larger units of the electric transformers serving Botany Hall, Home Economics Building, three Women's Dormitories and auxiliary

equipment in the power plant. It also includes the replacement of main circuits and feeders and partial rewiring of the buildings.

5. Electric Street Lighting System..... 12,000

This project covers the extension of the present street lighting system along various campus drives and walks which have been constructed in recent years. No extensions have been made to the street lighting system for some 15 years, and a great many areas on the campus have no lighting whatever.

6. Water System—New well and pumping equipment..... 10,000

This work is required to provide additional supply for the campus water system.

7. Tunnels—Extensions..... 75,000

This covers the construction of tunnels and the installation of utilities therein to serve various buildings proposed to be constructed under the building program for 1945-1947.

8. Sewer and Water System—Extensions..... 8,000

This also covers extensions of sanitary sewers, storm sewers and water mains to proposed buildings.

9. Storm Sewers—Engineering group and power plant..... 12,000

This work consists of: (1) enlargement and relocation of the storm sewers now serving the engineering group in the west side of the campus; and (2) providing drainage for surface water and other waste water (not sanitary sewage) from the power plant and the water plant.

10. Botany Greenhouse Repairs..... 8,000

This project consists of repairing the frame work and sash and resetting the glass, together with a complete new heating and lighting system for the old greenhouses located immediately east of Botany Hall.

11. Veterinary Building—Remodeling 20,000

With the construction of the new Veterinary Clinic a few years ago the space formerly occupied by the Clinic is available for the use of other departments. Considerable remodeling is necessary, however, to make this space suitable for classrooms, lecture rooms and laboratories.

12. Miscellaneous Buildings—Modernize lighting..... 10,000

Many class rooms and laboratories are now equipped with lighting fixtures which do not meet the modern standards of illumination. This item is proposed as a start toward the correction of this condition in such buildings as Beardshear Hall, Engineering Hall, Library, Chemistry Hall, Physics Hall and Agricultural Hall.

13. Miscellaneous Buildings—Meter equipment..... 10,000

The installation of electric, steam and water meters in major buildings would be of great benefit in checking the consumption of these utilities and in indicating losses which might be prevented by maintenance or revision of operating conditions.

14. Water Plant—Addition 25,000

This project covers the construction of an additional settling basin, two more filters and an additional high lift pump to increase the campus water supply by fifty per cent.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

Aside from funds for Salaries, Support and Maintenance, the most pressing need is the addition of classroom and laboratory buildings to provide reasonable accommodations for the greatly expanded program of the College. Statements as to these needs have been submitted to the last five sessions of the General Assembly. If the College is to meet adequately the increasing demands for service from the people of Iowa, it is imperative that funds for plant expansion be provided.

In the seven-year period from 1934 to 1941 the resident enrollment of the College increased from 4,337 to 8,104. The short course enrollment increased from 6,955 to 20,959. This means that more than 29,000 students were served in 1940-1941 as against 11,300 in 1933-1934.

During the same seven-year period funds for only three major academic buildings have been granted by the State—the Veterinary Clinic, the Women's Gymnasium, and the Agricultural Engineering Building. The two latter buildings replaced older structures destroyed by fire; consequently, the *net* increase in the instructional and laboratory space during this time has been quite small and has by no means kept pace with the rapid growth of the teaching, research and extension programs.

Following is a statement indicating: (a) the buildings for which funds should be provided for the biennium 1945-1947; and (b) other structures which should be included in a planned building program covering a period of six to eight years thereafter:

BUILDING NEEDS

Group A—For the Biennium 1945-1947

1. Agronomy Building \$ 400,000

Soils, farm, crops and livestock are the primary factors in the agricultural economy of Iowa. The Department of Agronomy holds a position of outstanding importance in the teaching, research and extension program in agriculture in this state. An Agronomy Building of adequate size is one of the most urgent needs of the College. The Department has been badly crowded and illogically scattered for

many years. The situation has recently become more serious because of the expansion of the program and the development of cooperative activities with the United States Department of Agriculture.

2. Electrical Engineering Building..... 500,000

A very urgent need is for the construction of an adequate building to house the undergraduate and graduate work in electrical engineering and electronics research. The present facilities for training in electrical engineering are inadequate and to a large extent obsolete. The developments immediately before and during the war in the fields of radar and electronics make it necessary to modify very greatly the teaching of electrical engineering. To do this, laboratory facilities of a character entirely different from those now available must be provided and the space available to the program in electrical engineering must be greatly increased.

3. Home Economics Annex..... 250,000

It is essential that additional space be provided for the expanded program of the Division of Home Economics. When the present building was erected in 1926, the Division had a total enrollment of 1,322 students. This enrollment had increased by 1941 to more than 2,300 students. Consequently, the building is badly overcrowded and it has been necessary to hold many of the important classes in other buildings on the campus under conditions which are quite unsatisfactory.

It is expected that the enrollment within the next five years will increase to 3,000 women in Home Economics.

4. Completion of the Science Building..... 500,000

The present unit of the Science Building was erected in 1916. It was expected at that time that the building would soon be completed. However, no further additions have been made since that time and the present unit is totally inadequate to house the departments which now occupy it. Laboratories and class rooms in the departments of Bacteriology and Zoology are badly overcrowded. Enrollment in courses in both departments has increased much faster than has been anticipated. Vitally important research, especially in insect control, and cure of animal diseases, the application of bacteriology to the growing and processing of grains, and in the field of sewage treatment, is being carried on in quarters that are now inadequate for the purpose. These activities are highly important to the people of Iowa in the development of the great program of agriculture.

5. Additions to the Library..... 500,000

The great increase in enrollment in the past seven years has taxed the facilities of the Library to the utmost. Additional space must be provided in the form of wings to the present building. This space is needed for additional stack rooms, reading rooms, conference rooms and research space for graduate students and staff members.

6. Poultry Industry Building..... 250,000

The State of Iowa ranks first in the volume and value of poultry and poultry products. The poultry program of the

Iowa State College will be greatly facilitated by concentrating all of the activities of the department in one building. At the present time the work is scattered in various buildings and in quarters quite inadequate for the important program that has been developed.

7. Engineering Annex 100,000

In order to care for the greatly increased enrollment in engineering it is important that Engineering Hall West, known as the Engineering Annex, be remodeled to provide three full stories. This program will provide suitable quarters for architecture and architectural engineering and will afford relief to several other departments that are now seriously crowded.

8. Addition to the Power Plant 100,000

The present power plant is inadequate to care for the needs of the College for heat, light and other utilities. With the prospective expansion of the College Plant an addition to the present power plant building must be made in order to provide adequately for meeting the future needs for utilities.

9. Nursery School 100,000

One of the most important activities on the campus is the program in Child Development. This program is conducted by the Division of Home Economics. For the past ten or twelve years the work has been housed in a remodeled barn and the program has grown far beyond the present facilities. The proposed building will house all of the laboratory activities of the department.

10. Chemistry Annex 300,000

Chemistry is the largest department on the campus. Its activities cover both teaching and research. Most of the work is carried on in laboratories. In the last ten years the enrollment in the Department of Chemistry has more than doubled and the present building is entirely too small for this growth.

Increasingly, the work of the Department of Chemistry is being devoted to the study of agriculture and industrial problems of interest and value to the people of Iowa. These research activities are in addition to the very large program of teaching at both the undergraduate and graduate levels. The new unit is intended to provide the necessary additional laboratory and class room space to enable the department to carry on its expanded program with maximum efficiency.

11. Classroom Building 250,000

The proposed classroom building will provide badly needed quarters for such departments as English, Mathematics, History, Economics and Psychology. All of these departments have expanded so rapidly in recent years that their present quarters are totally inadequate.

12. Animal Husbandry Pavilion 150,000

The Iowa State College is located in the leading livestock producing state of the nation. In normal times the College leads all colleges and universities in the number of students

enrolled in animal husbandry. The research and extension work in this field is of tremendous importance because of the place of livestock and livestock production in the economic life of the state. However, the facilities for certain important phases of animal husbandry work are not equal to those at other comparable institutions. The proposed building would provide a large judging arena, space for livestock management work, and a much needed nutrition laboratory.

13. Aeronautical Engineering Laboratory.....	100,000
A laboratory building for wind tunnel work and for aeronautical design is needed in order to round out the facilities for the proper development of the program in aeronautical engineering.	
14. Additional Wing to Main Veterinary Group.....	50,000
This wing is needed to provide additional space for certain of the teaching departments in the Division of Veterinary Medicine.	
15. Plant Industry Building.....	150,000
This building is to provide proper housing for the departments of Horticulture and Forestry. The work of these departments is of increasing importance to the State of Iowa. At present these departments are housed in inadequate quarters in the main Agricultural building. Their expansion in recent years makes it important that proper facilities be provided for the future program in teaching, in research and in extension.	
16. Completion of Chemical Engineering Building.....	200,000
One of the most important developments after the war will be in the field of chemistry and chemical engineering. The work of Doctor Sweeney and his associates in the application of chemical engineering to the industrial uses of agricultural products has been of great value to the State of Iowa. Unquestionably this program will expand after the war, and the increase in student enrollment will be large. It is believed that the erection of this building would be one of the best investments the State of Iowa could make.

GROUP B—FUTURE BUILDING NEEDS

To be constructed as a part of a planned building program over a period of six to eight years.

1. Seed Laboratory	\$ 100,000
The seed laboratory is a service activity of the College, providing facilities for seed analysis for the farmers of Iowa and other parts of the country. The program has increased more than four-fold in the last few years. The work is of tremendous value to farmers of the state in assuring them of good seed and in detecting inferior seed.	
2. Technical Journalism Addition.....	75,000
The effectiveness of the teaching and service programs in Technical Journalism would be greatly increased if the class rooms, laboratories, shops and offices could be	

brought together in a central unit. At present they are badly scattered. It is proposed that an addition for this purpose be made to the Press building.	
3. Mineral Industries Building	200,000
While Iowa is not as large in mineral deposits as other states, there are minerals which have been of importance and can be made more important in the future. A building is needed for the departments of Geology, Ceramics and Metallurgy in order that proper attention may be given to effective development of Iowa's mineral resources. This would include Iowa coal and Iowa clays particularly.	
4. Additions to Agronomy and Genetics Greenhouses	30,000
These additions are needed in order to complete the greenhouse facilities of the departments of Agronomy and Genetics.	
5. Genetics, West Wing	15,000
The present building of the department of Genetics is too small to accommodate the growing research program. This addition is needed primarily for class room and laboratory facilities.	
6. Addition to Service Building	125,000
The Service Building at present provides quarters for the radio station, the Engineering Extension Service, the Statistical Laboratory and other service units. It is entirely too small to enable these departments to function effectively. The proposed addition would give these departments much more efficient quarters for their important programs.	
7. Addition to Beardshear Hall	100,000
Beardshear Hall is the chief administration building of the college. It was erected more than forty years ago. All of the administrative offices and quarters are inadequate for present needs. The proposed addition would greatly relieve the existing critical situation.	
8. Music and Dramatics Center	150,000
The Music Department is now housed in an old residence which is much too small. The program in dramatics is carried on in a make-shift fashion wherever temporary space can be secured. The program in music and dramatics provides one of the most valuable supplementary activities on the campus.	
9. Addition to the Armory	100,000
Undoubtedly the program of Reserve Officers' Training Corps will be expanded in future years. This addition is needed to provide proper classroom facilities.	
10. Auditorium and Fieldhouse	750,000
Thousands of Iowans come to college every year for instruction in various short courses. In addition many groups hold their annual meetings on the campus. The rapid growth of the College in the last decade makes it necessary that satisfactory facilities be provided for these groups and also for student entertainment and indoor athletic activities. The existing facilities are totally inadequate. The largest assembly room on the campus holds approximately 2500 people, whereas the normal enrollment is more than 6500 students, not to mention the members of the staff and others who attend various campus activities.

A STATEMENT IN SUPPORT OF RECOMMENDATIONS
FOR APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE IOWA
STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE

The Iowa State Board of Education requests the following appropriations for the Iowa State Teachers College for each year of the biennium that will begin July 1, 1945:

I. Salaries, Support and Maintenance.....	\$ 715,000
II. Repairs, Replacements and Alterations.....	30,000
III. Capital Improvements—New Buildings.....	685,000
Total	\$1,430,000

Table 1, following, shows a comparison on an annual basis between the legislative askings for the 1945-1947 biennium and the total appropriations available for the 1943-1945 biennium. This table shows that no increase is requested for salaries, support and maintenance; an additional \$20,000 is requested annually for repairs, replacements, and alterations; and an increase of \$685,000 annually is requested for capital improvements—new buildings.

SALARIES, SUPPORT AND MAINTENANCE

The 50th General Assembly appropriated \$715,000 annually for the biennium for salaries, support and maintenance. This amount includes an item of \$30,000 per year to provide salary increases for employees in the lower salary brackets.

The school years included in the last biennium have been difficult years for the public schools of the state. The Iowa State Teachers College has rendered the best possible service to the public schools during these years. In spite of the war demands upon the College, the training of efficient teachers has been the prime interest of the entire staff. The in-service training of teachers who have returned to the classrooms after many years of absence has received increased attention, and the College is working in close cooperation with county and city superintendents in an effort to uphold the quality of classroom instruction in the schools throughout the state. The years of the biennium, 1945-1947, will see increased de-

mands on the part of the Iowa State Teachers College in its effort to perform a professional service to the cause of public education. The postwar period will call for many adjustments in order to strengthen the public schools for the next forward step in education. As a professional college, the Iowa State Teachers College must be ready to meet the need for professional service to the cause of public education in the State of Iowa. The program for training effective teachers for the rural schools of the state has been strengthened during the war period and is now capable of indefinite expansion during the next biennium. In spite of the apparent demands of the next two years, no increase is asked in the appropriation for salaries, support and maintenance.

REPAIRS, REPLACEMENTS AND ALTERATIONS

An appropriation of \$30,000 annually is requested for the next biennium. This represents an increase of \$20,000. Many major items of repairs and maintenance are necessary. The appropriations in this respect have been inadequate in recent years. Following is a list of items proposed for attention during the next two years.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS—NEW BUILDINGS

An annual appropriation of \$685,000 is requested for capital improvements during the next biennial period. The proposed projects are as follows:

1. Health Service Building The health service program is now housed in two abandoned farm houses and an inadequate hospital building. Appropriations for the new buildings were requested from the last two general assemblies.	\$ 150,000	\$ 75,000
2. Campus Laboratory School Building The school is now housed in a four-story building poorly adapted to the needs of the school. The nursery school is housed in a frame building constructed for the war training program during World War I. The present school building will be converted to house the Department of Music which is now housed in Old Central Building, the first building constructed on the campus in 1868.	465,000	232,500

3. Arts and Industries Building.....	200,000	100,000
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Art and industrial arts are closely associated in the public schools. The organization for training teachers for these fields parallels the relationship found in the public schools. The training of teachers of art and industrial arts is now housed in the Vocational Building which is not adaptable to the program. The present building will be used to house the Department of Science which is now housed in three buildings on the campus. Earth Science is housed in the upper floors of the library building where the space is needed for library purposes. The physical sciences are housed in the laboratory building and the biological sciences are located on the first floor of the Vocational Building. The laboratory building will be used to house the Department of Commercial Education.

4. Auditorium Building	400,000	200,000
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The present auditorium accommodates approximately 1,400. The auditorium is inadequate both in the number of people accommodated and also in the number of activities capable of being conducted in one auditorium at any one time. There is also a small auditorium on the third floor of the Gilchrist building, a non-fire resistant building which does not enter into the ultimate plan for campus development. The proposed building will provide a large auditorium possibly flanked by two smaller auditoriums and will contain certain necessary classrooms.

5. Garage Building	55,000	27,500
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The college now maintains considerable motorized equipment used in maintaining the campus and transporting students to practice teaching centers and the rural demonstration schools. Present facilities are inadequate for housing and servicing this equipment.

6. Enclosure Wall	20,000	10,000
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The heating plant is situated on the main campus and the coal storage area is unsightly and detracts from the appearance of the campus. Due to the restricted area it is difficult to store the required amount of coal without a retaining wall. The proposed expenditure will also improve facilities for unloading cars of coal.

7. Additional Heating Plant Facilities.....	80,000	40,000
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The present heating plant is barely able to carry the present load with inadequate provisions for any major breakdown in the equipment. The proposed expenditure will provide an additional boiler and much needed condensing equipment.

I. Salaries, Support and Maintenance.

A request is made for one hundred forty-five thousand dollars (\$145,000.00), annually, an increase of five thousand dollars (\$5000.00) over the appropriation made by the 50th General Assembly. The request for this additional amount is made for the following reasons:

a. Salary increases for Faculty members. In order to keep present faculty members and attract efficient and capable new teachers to fill vacancies as they arise, it will be necessary to think in terms of the following minimum salary scales for teachers who come within the groups listed below.

1. Teachers with some college training and successful teaching experience, \$1620.00 annually.
2. Teachers with a Bachelor of Arts Degree or equivalent, and successful teaching experience, \$1800.00 annually.
3. Teachers with a Master of Arts Degree and successful teaching experience, \$2,000.00 annually.

The suggested salary schedule is in line with the 1944-1945 salaries that will be paid to teachers in other schools for the blind comparable to the Iowa School. The schedule is also in line with teachers' salaries in the medium sized public schools of Iowa. In filling vacancies, it is necessary for the School for the Blind to compete with the above groups. An increase of four thousand dollars (\$4,000.00) is requested to take care of these salary adjustments.

- b. A sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) is needed to adjust salaries for department heads. At the present time, the salaries that can be offered these key people are not in line with those paid in other leading schools for the blind.
- c. A sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) is needed to adjust salaries of some of the employees on the maintenance staff.

II. Repairs, Replacements, and Alterations.

A request for five thousand dollars (\$5000.00) annually is made for two reasons:

- a. With the uncertainty of ability to obtain new equipment, it is imperative that the present equipment be kept in good repair in order that its length of service may be prolonged.

- b. Inability to purchase many items during the past three years because of war restrictions, has greatly retarded the normal purchase of replacement items. As the production of civilian goods increases, and needed equipment items are made available for institutions, funds will be needed, not only to purchase equipment for the present, but for replacements that normally would have been taken care of during the period of shortage.

III. Capital Improvements.

A sum of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000.00) is requested to construct a dormitory to accommodate the three groups of boys that are now living in the Main Building.

At the present time, twenty-five high school boys are living in rooms on what is equivalent to a fourth floor. Forty younger boys occupy sleeping rooms on the floor immediately below. This building was constructed in 1862 and is not fire-proof. Hence, if the school should be so unfortunate as to have a fire break out in this building at night, disaster, with loss of life, might result. The construction of a new dormitory would enable the school to complete the plan of having all students housed in fire-proof buildings.

The new dormitory would free space in the Main Building for class room use. By having students use the Main Building in this capacity, the school would eliminate the present possibility of a fire hazard for children during the night when evacuation would be most difficult.

An estimate of the cost of constructing and furnishing a new boys' dormitory is as follows:

1. Fire-proof brick structure to accommodate seventy-five (75) boys.....	\$140,000.00
2. Furniture and Equipment.....	10,000.00
Total cost	\$150,000.00

The non-faculty salaries at the Iowa School for the Deaf appear to be very adequate. The number of workers is sufficient. All workers have one full day of twenty-four hours off each week. No general increase is suggested for this group.

At present, the School's faculty salaries are:

Beginning salary	\$1,500 gross per annum
Median salary	1,800 gross per annum
Maximum salary	2,100 gross per annum

Some further increase in the faculty salaries may be needed to secure better teachers on the staff and to hold them in the School.

It is recommended that three additional faculty members be employed, one to handle the work of hearing testing, achievement testing and intelligence testing, and two to provide needed instruc-

tion in speech and speech reading for pupils in the middle and upper schools. This is considered a sound principle for a good oral program.

Serious consideration should be given to providing for twelve residential faculty members to live outside the School, beginning September 1, 1945, to free rooms on the third floor of the Main Dormitory (center) in order that pupils in their senior year may have more suitable living quarters, and to relieve over-crowding in the pupils' main dormitory. \$4,000 is needed to reimburse the twelve faculty members for loss of board, room and laundry now provided by the School.

AID FOR THE BLIND

The 41st General Assembly made an appropriation "for the purpose of aiding students who are blind and who are regularly enrolled students taking any course of study, profession, art or science in any university, college, conservatory of music, normal, professional or vocational school, approved by the State Board of Education, and who are residents of the State of Iowa, and to assist them in defraying their necessary expenses including the expenses of a reader or assistant," with the understanding that the money "shall be granted only to worthy students who are not able, or whose parents are not able to provide the means for continuing their study in any of the institutions above mentioned."

During the biennium that ended June 30, 1944, scholarship aid was, as follows:

AID FOR DEAF

The 37th General Assembly that convened in January, 1917, enacted a law authorizing school corporations to provide education for deaf children. Section 4350, Code 1939, as follows:

"State board of education to supervise. When any school corporation shall elect to proceed under the provisions of this chapter it shall, through its proper officers, communicate that fact to the state board of education, and the state board of education shall have general supervision of all matters arising under this chapter, and no instructor shall be appointed hereunder and no courses or methods of instruction shall be installed hereunder without the approval of such state board of education."

That section has been in effect continuously since July 1, 1917.

The measure provided that any school corporation that would comply with the provisions of the act should be given state aid for each deaf child between certain ages. A part of section 4349 of the Code, 1939, is as follows:

"State aid—amount. To any school corporation providing such instruction and complying with all of the provisions of this chapter there shall be granted and paid as hereinafter provided state aid in an amount to be computed at twenty dollars for each month that each child not more than sixteen years of age is instructed under the provisions of this chapter."

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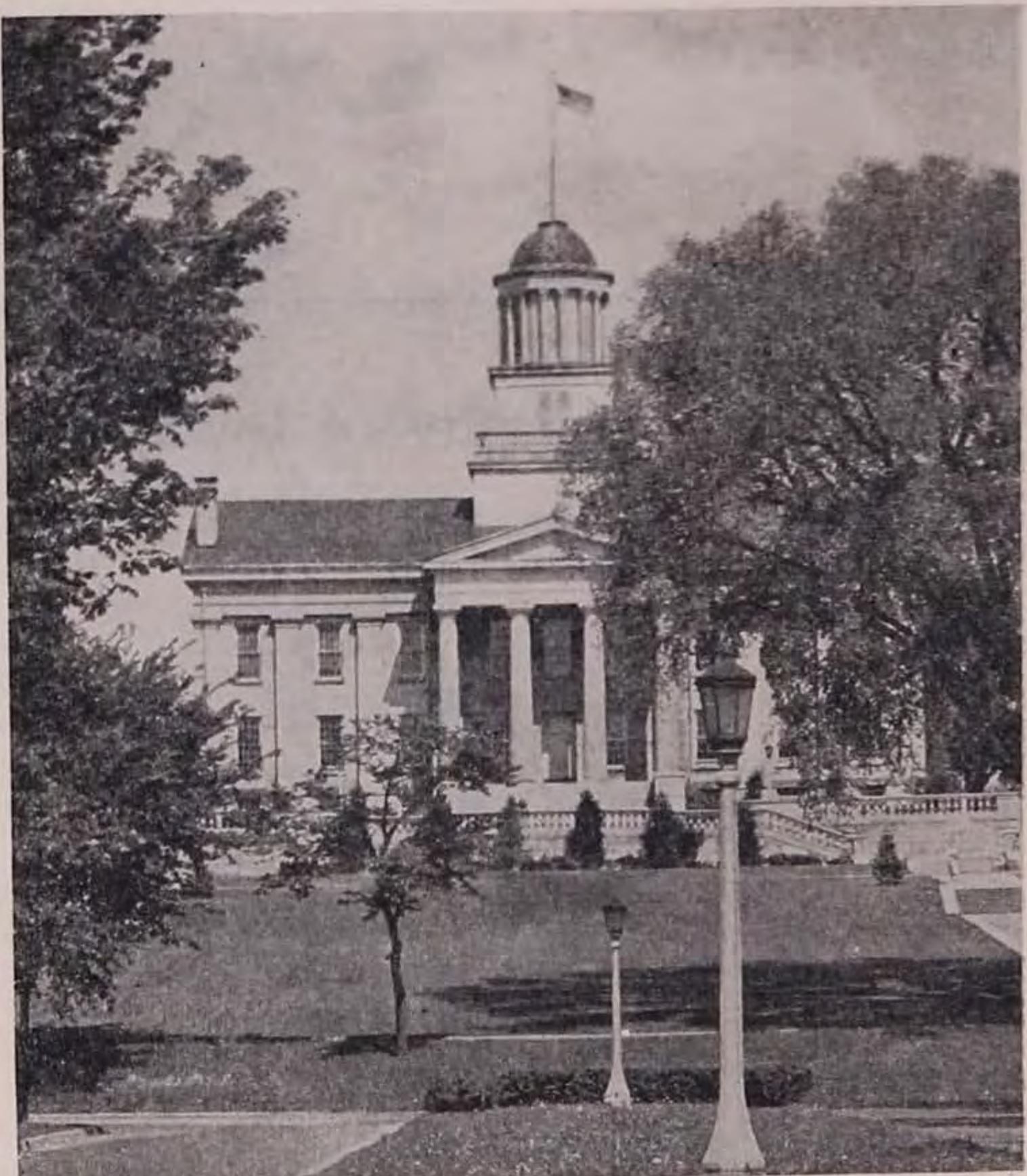

mount objectives of the University, the coordinate responsibility of providing its students with the opportunity to live a balanced and normal life is of no less importance. Accordingly, it has made adequate provision for the housing of its students, their health, and their recreational, religious and cultural activities.

THE CAMPUS

The University campus covers approximately 425 acres of land and includes more than 50 buildings. The Iowa River divides the campus into an East and West Campus with the major buildings located on the hills and in the valley extending along each side. The two parts of the campus are connected by two heavy traffic bridges and a foot bridge. The buildings and grounds are valued at \$22,500,000.

The East Campus is the older of the two and is dominated by Old Capitol, the first capitol of the State of Iowa. By reason of Old Capitol's architectural beauty, its setting and its historical association, it is a natural center. Around Old Capitol are located the buildings occupied by the Colleges of Liberal Arts, Law, Dentistry, Pharmacy, Engineering, Education, the Graduate College, the University Libraries, the State Historical Society, the Iowa Child Welfare Research Station and the Iowa Geological Survey. On the East Campus are also located the women's dormitories and gymnasium, the student recreational center, the Iowa Memorial Union, and the administrative offices and maintenance and service departments of the University.

The West Campus is dominated by the 145-foot stone tower of the University Hospital, the largest building of the medical center. Around it are located the Children's and Psychopathic Hospitals, the Medical Laboratory and Westlawn, the nurses' dormitory. On the west bluffs of the river are the dormitories for men, Hillcrest, the Quadrangle and the Law Commons. To the south and west of the medical center are located the buildings and grounds providing athletic and military facilities for men, the Field House and Armory, the Stadium and the golf

Founded in 1847 by act of the First General Assembly of Iowa, the State University of Iowa has for almost a century maintained a strong educational program designed to aid its students to obtain a broad and liberal education and to prepare for professional careers in business and industry, education, engineering, law, medicine and nursing, dentistry, pharmacy, and the creative arts. Opportunity for thorough preparation in each of these fields is open to men and women alike.

While the development and maintenance of instructional facilities and standards of a high degree of excellence are para-

course, the latter a gift to the University from the late W. O. Finkbine. Along the west valley of the river are located the Hydraulics Laboratory, the Fine Arts Building and the University Theatre.

ENROLLMENT

In the years immediately preceding the war the University stood among the fifteen highest colleges and universities in the total number of different students of college grade enrolled annually. The total number of campus students of college grade enrolled in the year 1940-1941 was 9,289. In addition, 1,731 students were enrolled for correspondence courses and projected study and 773 students of non-college grade were enrolled exclusive of conferences and short courses, making a grand total of 11,773 students without duplicates.

The record of enrollment since 1900, by ten-year intervals, is as follows:

It is of interest to note that almost twice as many (1.9) students of college grade were enrolled in residence study in the year immediately preceding World War II as were enrolled in the second year following World War I, and that more than twice as many students were enrolled in all types of registrations, exclusive of conferences and short courses.

Since 1940 the war has reduced civilian campus enrollment a little more than one-half, almost entirely in the enrollment of men. In the year 1943-44, 4376 civilian students were enrolled in courses of study offered on the campus, but armed force personnel assigned to the University for specialized training largely offset this reduction.

COURSES OF STUDY

The University includes nine colleges offering courses of study in various fields which lead to a degree or certificate. Four college years of study are required for graduation with the baccalaureate degree from the Colleges of Liberal Arts, Commerce, Education, Engineering and Pharmacy. Six college years of study, including pre-professional work, are required for graduation with a first degree from the Colleges of Dentistry and Law, and seven years for a first degree from the College of Medicine. Three years of study and clinical practice are required for graduation from the School of Nursing. Advanced degrees require from one to three or more years of graduate study.

The various courses of study and fields of specialization and the degree conferred upon graduation are, as follows:

COMMERCE—Accounting, Banking and Finance, Labor and Management, Marketing and Merchandising, Secretarial Training, and Transportation and Public Utilities, leading to the degree Bachelor of Science in Commerce.

DENTISTRY—Four-year course, in addition to two years of pre-dental study in the College of Liberal Arts, leading to the degree Doctor of Dental Surgery.

EDUCATION—Teacher training courses integrated with the curricula of the Colleges of Liberal Arts, Commerce and the Graduate College, and a four-year specialized school administration course which leads to the degree Bachelor of Science in School Supervision.

ENGINEERING—Chemical, Civil, Electrical, General, and Mechanical Engineering; Chemistry, leading to the degree Bachelor of Science in the respective field.

LAW—Three-year course, in addition to three years of pre-law study in the College of Liberal Arts, leading to the degree Bachelor of Laws or Juris Doctor.

LIBERAL ARTS—Art, Botany, Chemistry, Classical Languages, Economics and Sociology, English, Geology, German, History, Home Economics, Journalism, Mathematics and Astronomy, Music, Philosophy, Physical Education, Physics, Political Science, Psychology, Religion, Romance Languages, Speech and Dramatic Art, and Zoology, leading to the degree Bachelor of Arts.

Specialized courses in the Departments of Chemistry and Home Economics lead to the degrees Bachelor of Science in these respective fields; and those in the School of Fine Arts and the Division of Physical Education lead to the degree Bachelor of Fine Arts or Bachelor of Science in Physical Education, respectively, from the College of Liberal Arts.

Pre-professional courses preparing for admission to the Colleges of Dentistry, Law and Medicine may be selected in accordance with a combined curricula plan which leads to a baccalaureate degree from the College of Liberal Arts upon completion of one or more years of professional study. Combined courses with Engineering and the School of Nursing are also available, leading to the Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Science degree, respectively.

MEDICINE—Four-year course, in addition to three years of pre-medical study in the College of Liberal Arts, leading to the degree Doctor of Medicine.

SCHOOL OF NURSING—Three-year course leading to the Certificate Graduate Nurse.

PHARMACY—Four-year course, leading to the degree Bachelor of Science in Pharmacy.

Advanced courses of study in the Graduate College, leading to the degree Master of Arts, Fine Arts, or Science, and Doctor of Philosophy, are available in all of the fields listed above except Nursing and, in addition, in Child Welfare, Character Education and Hydraulic Engineering. Post-graduate work in the College of Law leads to the degree Doctor of Juridical Science.

Opportunity to select a number of the regular course offerings directed towards preparation for certain occupational objectives is provided for mature students who have only a limited amount of time at their disposal for preparation.

Special classes are arranged on Saturdays for teachers and others with one year of college work who wish to devote part time to continued study towards a degree or to keep abreast of current practice.

Correspondence courses, at the college level, are offered in many of the departments through the Extension Division to students who cannot be in residence but wish to prepare themselves for more effective work in their respective occupations, or who wish to continue work towards graduation while out of residence. Directed study courses are similarly offered through the Graduate College.

WAR SERVICE

Since 1941 the University's full effort and resources have been freely given to the war effort. To enable young men to gain as much college training as possible, prior to induction into the armed forces, a three-semester college year instead of the regular two-semester was inaugurated for regular students.

In cooperation with the United States Office of Education, the University has given instruction to more than 6200 men and women in upwards of fifty different government financed short courses in engineering, science and management war training, in eleven industrial or educational centers, beginning with June, 1940.

Since December 7, 1941 the University, in cooperation with the United States Army, Navy and Air Force, has provided instruction and facilities for the specialized training of more than 3000 different members of the armed forces in the Army Specialized Training, Navy College Training, Army Air Forces Technical Training, and War Training programs. In August 1943 the School of Nursing was approved for the establishment of a United States Cadet Nurse Corps. Since then, 302 young women have been enrolled as cadet nurses. All of these programs are federally financed.

In April 1942 the United States Navy Pre-Flight School was established on the campus. Part of the University's athletic and dormitory facilities were leased by the Navy through contract with the State Board of Education. Since that time the campus has been host to more than 13,000 Navy Air Corps Cadets.

The United States Armed Forces Institute has provided opportunity for service personnel on active duty to further their education in off-duty hours through correspondence courses, self-directed study, group instruction, etc., in cooperation with eighty colleges and universities. They have also recently established, in cooperation with the War Prisoners' Aid Committee of the Y. M. C. A. and the colleges, a similar service for our men held by enemy nations as prisoners of war. The University has enrolled nearly 900 members of the armed forces, including a few prisoners of war, in correspondence courses, as a participating institution in this program.

These various programs represent but a part of the contribution of the University to the war effort. Of no less importance is the service which has been rendered through government financed research programs in the University's science laboratories, under the direction of staff members, in cooperation with the Office of Scientific Research and Development. Nor can mention be omitted of the loan for the duration of many of the University's staff to government agencies, either in civilian status or as members of the armed forces, where their particular talents would be of direct consequence to the war effort.

THE FUTURE

Federal legislation providing for the education and training of veterans and the reconversion of industry and government agencies to a peacetime basis is expected to result in a large increase in University enrollment. With the cessation of hostilities it is estimated that the enrollment of campus students will increase 25% or more over the 1940-41 level, within three to five years, largely as a result of the benefits provided for veterans by the "G. I. Bill" and the Vocational Rehabilitation Act.

To date, 57 veterans have been assigned to the University for training by the Veterans' Administration and practically all have enrolled in regular degree courses of study. It is anticipated that most of the returning veterans will be those who desire to continue an interrupted

education in regular courses leading to a degree. Opportunity is provided for mature veterans and others who do not wish to qualify for a degree to select a number of the regular course offerings in several of the colleges directed towards preparation for certain occupational objectives.

In anticipation of the special educational adjustment needs of the veteran, the University has established a special "Veterans' Service" division as a part of the Office of Student Affairs, where the full resources of testing, guidance and counseling services are at the disposal of competent advisers to aid the veteran.

Beginning with the first semester of this year, 1944-1945, a new Liberal Arts curriculum was inaugurated to present more effectively the approaches to a liberal and cultural educational experience in a modern world. It is designed to recognize the needs of the individual student, to offer adequate preparation in the basic skills necessary to continued educational achievement, to provide a core of knowledge in the several educational fields conducive to continued educational interest, and to permit a breadth and depth of training and experience in a field of concentration of the student's interest. Coordinate with this program, the advisory system and testing program have been strengthened and expanded as a means of implementing it.

Along with increased enrollments, the special needs of the veteran, and the problems arising from the integration of the educational programs necessary to the adjustment of the veteran and the younger college student, will be staff and physical plant needs. Detailed statements of these needs will be presented to the 51st General Assembly.

The primary functions of the University are the education of youth and the advancement of knowledge. For nearly a century the University has sought to develop the intellectual attributes of young men and women by bringing them into contact with all of the best that our civilization has produced to the end that they may establish ideals of mental, moral and physical health and ethical business and social relationships which will guide them to a wise selection of their life's work and an enduring appreciation of life's cultural values.

The future of Iowa does not lie in its present material wealth; it does not lie in its mines or factories or forests, or in its corn or hogs or cattle. The future of Iowa lies in the character and stamina and intelligence of its people and in their capacity to work with their fellow-countrymen and the other peoples of the world for the establishment of abiding principles of justice and freedom and order. The University is peculiarly fitted to aid in the achievement of these objectives, and it looks forward with confidence therefore to a future of increasing usefulness and achievement.

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

CURRENT INCOME FOR EDUCATIONAL PURPOSES

The current budgeted income for educational purposes is handled through two funds: the General Operating Fund and the Current Restricted, or Trust Fund. The General Operating Fund is further subdivided into Funds A and B. Fund A includes revenues from state appropriations, U. S. Army and Navy Departments, student tuition, sales and miscellaneous receipts; Fund B is the special state appropriation for repairs, replacements and alterations. The Current Restricted Fund revenue from outside agencies or persons, also special income from medical fees and other sundry income, all of which are expendable for a special designated purpose in education or research. (See page 75.)

Rental of Fraternity Houses for U. S. Army

The University rents and operates ten fraternity houses for the U. S. Army under government contract. (See above) The University is reimbursed for all rentals and cost of operating these houses. The fraternities are allowed 10% depreciation upon the appraised value of their equipment and the University is allowed 3% overhead upon direct expenditures. The University desires to make no profit upon this arrangement. The depreciation and overhead has been credited to a separate account. After payment of expenses against this income the balance on hand June 30, 1943 was \$1,148.18, which will be held as a reserve and distributed to fraternities at the close of the government contract. (See page 126.)

Tenant Properties

The net income from the operation of thirteen tenant properties was \$4,179.18. (See page 117.)

Iowa Memorial Union

The Iowa Memorial Union is accounted for separately. The net balance remaining in the Lounge Room Rental account after paying all bills was \$5,019.85. (See page 117.)

The special Union fund is credited with \$6.00 per year from student activity fees, making a total available of \$55,680.19 which includes a balance forward of \$5,846.73 and a special Finance Committee allocation of \$23,000.00 from tuition income. From this sum was paid \$1,522.62 in current expenses and \$51,068.24 on the leasehold contract with the Iowa Memorial Union Corporation as final payment of the leasehold for the second unit of the Union building, leaving a balance of \$3,089.33 in the fund June 30, 1943. (See page 117.)

The leasehold with the Iowa Memorial Union Corporation was entered into by the Board of Education April 1, 1938 in the sum of \$127,500.00. The rentals paid from the Union Special Fund are by agreement assigned on a loan made by the Union Corporation. The leasehold was paid in full March 18, 1943 and Unit No. 2 was transferred to the University of Iowa.

A summary of the terms and rates in these contracts, together with all financial operations, is set forth on pages 197-201. Contracts provide for reimbursement of activation and commissioning expense and monthly payments for cost of instruction, teaching supplies and textbooks, rental of University properties based upon 3% or 4% of book value, housing, messing and medical care. All costs include an allowance to the University of 3% overhead on direct costs and 7½% to 10% depreciation upon book value of equipment used. These contracts offer a rather complicated accounting problem as they involve our educational support fund for teaching and educational building operation, the income fund for housing, messing and medical care. Financial operations of the various funds and accounts are summarized above and reported in various schedules throughout this report. The following summary will give a comprehensive picture of all financial operations under these contracts without regard to fund distribution.

U. S. Navy Pre-Flight School Contract

The U. S. Navy contract was effective April 9, 1942 hence financial operations for the period from April 9, 1942 to June 30, 1942 were included in last year's financial report. The finances for this brief period were tentative as a definite contract was not completed until after July 1, 1942. For completeness these operations are repeated here which include corrections to 1941-42 figures made after accounts were closed June 30, 1942. (See page 198 for details.)

NON-EDUCATIONAL AND OTHER SPECIAL FUNDS

The University received from different sources gifts and endowment income for student prizes, scholarships, student aid and miscellaneous purposes. This is accounted for as non-educational income. The total received the past year amounted to \$36,868.32. (See pages 134-145.)

The University Business Office also handles and audits funds of various student activities on the campus consisting of different student organization accounts, Athletics, and Student Publications. (See pages 144-145.) These are accounted for as agency funds and, except for audit purposes, are not a part of the general revenue of the University. Reports of their activities are published separately. The gross receipts in 1942-43 were as follows:

STUDENT ACTIVITY FEE

Beginning with the fall semester of 1941-42 the Board of Education authorized the collection of a student activity fee of \$10.00 for each semester as a part of the general tuition. During 1942-43 the sum of \$105,785.89 was available including balance forward, \$3,672.84, and miscellaneous items. The sum \$92,471.29 was allocated to various student activity funds and expenses paid of \$601.57, leaving a net balance of \$12,713.03 carried as a reserve at June 30, 1943. (See page 154.)

STATE HYGIENIC LABORATORY

The State Hygienic Laboratory is operated in connection with the College of Medicine. The State appropriation for the year ended June 30, 1943 was \$40,000.00 and in addition the Interim Committee of the State General Assembly allocated \$10,000.00, making a total available from State Funds of \$50,000.00. In addition to this the Federal Government appropriated \$28,050.00 under the Social Security Act, Title VI, U. S. Public Health Service. Complete accounts are kept in the University Business Office, but disbursements are made upon approved vouchers from the State Comptroller's office. Expenditures in 1942-43 amounted to \$75,468.85. The State Board of Health also made available \$1,870.00 for Dental Health Education. (See pages 155-156.)

UNITED STATES CRIPPLED CHILDREN'S FUND

The University College of Medicine administers the United States Crippled Children's Fund under the Social Security Act, Title V, Part 2 as amended. Funds are carried in a separate bank account and accounts kept in the University Business Office. These funds are not included as revenue to the University. For 1942-43 the receipts totaled \$99,985.00, and the expenditures totaled \$102,920.36. (See page 157.)

UNITED STATES FUNDS FOR STUDENT AID

During 1942-43 the National Youth Administration, under the Federal Relief program, appropriated \$30,729.89 for the employment of 474 students in various services at the University. Funds are handled by Federal Agencies. This amount is not included as University revenue. (See page 156.)

STUDENT LOAN FUNDS AND OTHER STUDENT AID

Student Loan Funds were established in 1900 at the University. At present they total \$144,271.75 and consist of twenty-six different funds. They have been established by gifts from Alumni, friends and students. Loans are approved by the Student Aid Committee and handled through the University Business Office. In 1942-43, 532 students received loans totaling \$67,637.41. Interest in the amount of \$1,231.50 was collected and added to the fund or to associated accounts. On June 30, 1943 the outstanding loans totaled \$59,296.62, investments in U. S. Government Bonds totaled \$75,004.78, cash \$9,970.35. (See pages 158-161.)

Further aid was given to 1,178 students in the form of scholarships and fellowships with a total value of \$72,993.63. (For details see page 153.)

ENDOWMENT FUNDS

The first endowment fund was established in 1840 from the sale of land from the Federal Government. Other endowments have been received from time to time. Endowment funds are unexpendable, the in-

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

CURRENT INCOME FOR EDUCATIONAL PURPOSES

The current budgeted income for educational purposes is handled through two funds: the General Operating Fund and the Current Restricted, or Trust Fund. The General Operating Fund is further subdivided into Funds A and B. Fund A includes revenues from state appropriations, U. S. Army and Navy Departments, student tuition, sales and miscellaneous receipts; Fund B is the special state appropriation for repairs, replacements and alterations. The Current Restricted Fund receives revenue from outside agencies or persons, also special income from medical fees and other sundry income, all of which are expendable for a special designated purpose in education or research. (See page 216.)

Rental of Fraternity Houses for U. S. Army

The University rents and operates sixteen fraternity houses for the U. S. Army under Government Contract. (See above). The University is reimbursed for all rentals and cost of operating these houses. The fraternities are allowed 10% depreciation upon the appraised value of their equipment and the University is allowed 3% overhead upon direct expenditures. The University desires to make no profit upon this arrangement. The depreciation and overhead has been credited to a separate account. After payment of expenses against this income the balance on hand June 30, 1944 was \$3,693.86, which will be held as a reserve and distributed to fraternities at the close of the Government Contract. (See page 269.)

Tenant Properties

The net income from the operation of fifteen tenant properties was \$2,778.11. (See page 265.)

Iowa Memorial Union

The Iowa Memorial Union is accounted for separately. The net balance remaining in the Lounge Room Rental account after paying all bills was \$7,005.33. (See page 265.)

The special Union fund is credited with \$6.00 per year from student activity fees and all income for rent of Iowa Union Mess to U. S. Army, making a total available of \$36,644.26 which includes a balance forward of \$3,089.33. From this sum was paid \$695.84 in current expenses, leaving a balance of \$35,948.42 in the fund June 30, 1944. (See page 265.)

A summary of the terms and rates in these contracts, together with all financial operations, is set forth on pages 343-354. Contracts provide for reimbursement of activation and commissioning expense and monthly payments for cost of instruction, teaching supplies and textbooks, rental of University properties based upon 4% of book value, housing, messing and medical care. All costs include an allowance to the University of 3% overhead on direct costs and 7½% to 10½ depreciation upon book value of equipment used. These contracts offer a rather complicated accounting problem as they involve our educational support fund for teaching and educational building operation, the income fund for housing, messing and medical care. Financial operations of the various funds and accounts are summarized and reported in various schedules throughout this report. The following summary will give a comprehensive picture of all financial operations under these contracts without regard to fund distribution.

STORE ROOMS AND SERVICE DEPARTMENTS

NON-EDUCATIONAL AND OTHER SPECIAL FUNDS

The University received from different sources gifts and endowment income for student prizes, scholarships, student aid and miscellaneous purposes. This is accounted for as non-educational income. The total received the past year amounted to \$44,359.88. (See pages 277-287.)

The University Business Office also handles and audits funds of various student activities on the campus consisting of different student organization accounts, Athletics, and Student Publications. (See page 282.) These are accounted for as agency funds and, except for audit purposes, are not a part of the general revenue of the University. Reports of their activities are published separately. STUDENT ACTIVITY FEE

Beginning with the fall semester of 1941-42 the Board of Education authorized the collection of a student activity fee of \$10.00 for each semester as a part of the general tuition. During 1943-44 the sum of \$83,458.21 was available including balance forward, \$12,713.03 and miscellaneous items. The sum \$67,331.82 was allocated to various student activity funds and expenses paid of \$513.31, leaving a net balance of \$15,613.08 carried as a reserve at June 30, 1944. (See page 295.)

STATE HYGIENIC LABORATORY

The State Hygienic Laboratory is operated in connection with the College of Medicine. The State appropriation for the year ended June 30, 1944 was \$82,700.00 and in addition to this the Federal Government appropriated \$21,820.00 under Social Security Act, Title VI, U. S. Public Health Service. Complete accounts are kept in the University Business Office, but disbursements are made upon approved vouchers from the State Comptroller's Office. Expenditures in 1943-44 amounted to \$90,971.44. The State Board of Health also made available \$1,940.00 for Dental Health Education. (See pages 295-296.)

UNITED STATES CRIPPLED CHILDREN'S FUND

The University College of Medicine administers the United States Crippled Children's Fund under the Social Security Act, Title V, Part 2 as amended. Funds are carried in a separate bank account and accounts kept in the University Business Office. These funds are not included as revenue to the University. For 1933-44 the receipts totaled \$113,827.09, and the expenditures totaled \$96,479.74. (See page 297.)

STUDENT LOAN FUNDS AND OTHER STUDENT AID

Student Loan Funds were established in 1900 at the University. At present they total \$151,046.07 and consist of twenty-eight different funds. They have been established by gifts from alumni, friends and students. Loans are approved by the Student Aid Committee and handled through the University Business Office. In 1943-44, 179 students received loans totaling \$11,967.45. Income in the amount of \$2,757.28 was collected and added to the fund or to associated accounts. On June 30, 1944 the outstanding loans totaled \$56,069.42, investments in U. S. Government Bonds totaled \$77,799.01, cash \$17,177.64. (See pages 298-301.)

Further aid was given to 851 students in the form of scholarships and fellowships with a total value of \$61,100.98. (For details see page 294.)

ENDOWMENT FUNDS

The first endowment fund was established in 1840 from the sale of land from the Federal Government. Other endowments have been received from time to time. Endowment funds are unexpendable, the income being used for the purpose designated in the trust deeds. On June 30, 1944 the Endowment Fund totaled \$1,022,315.69 and was invested as follows: (See pages 302-304.)

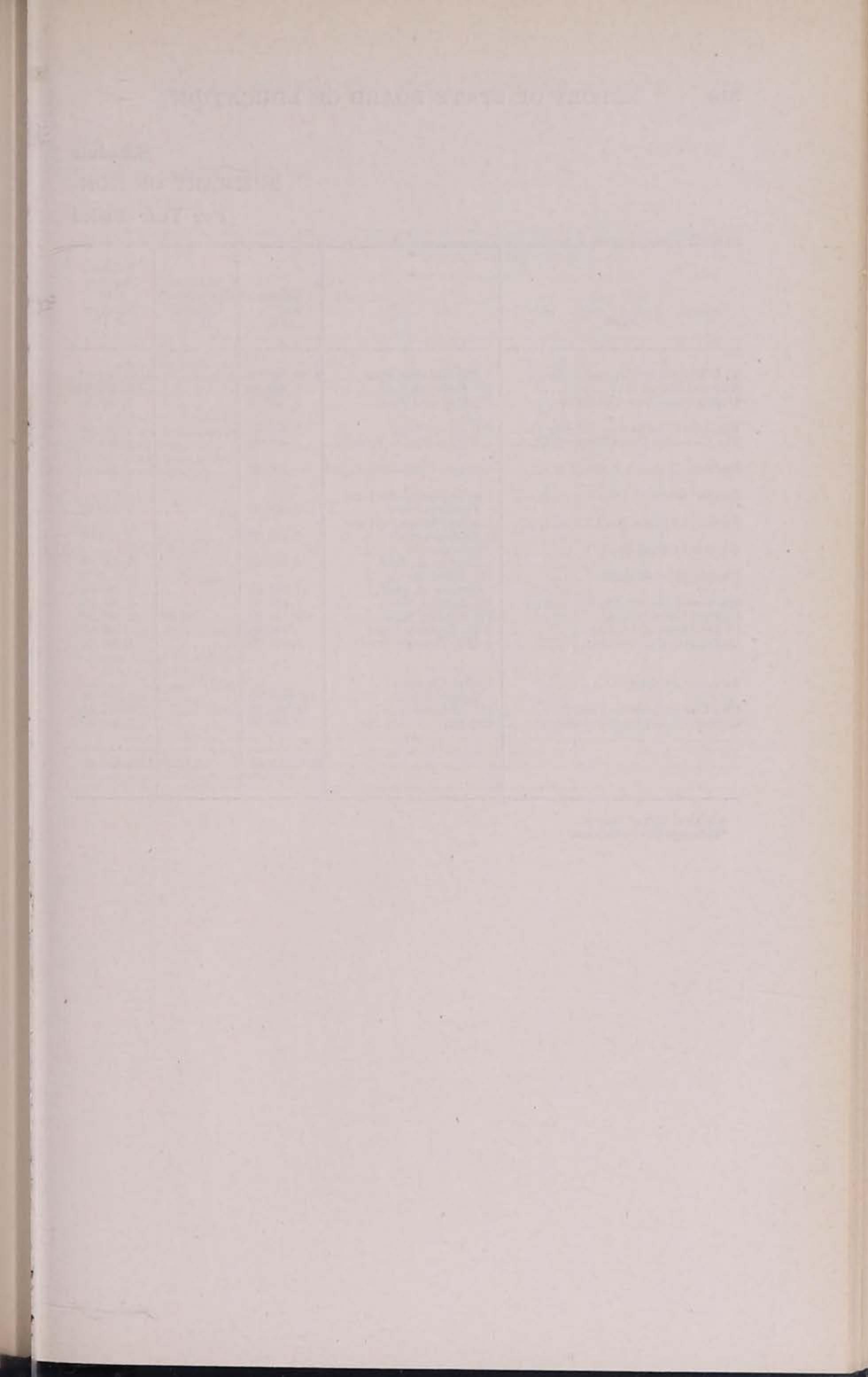

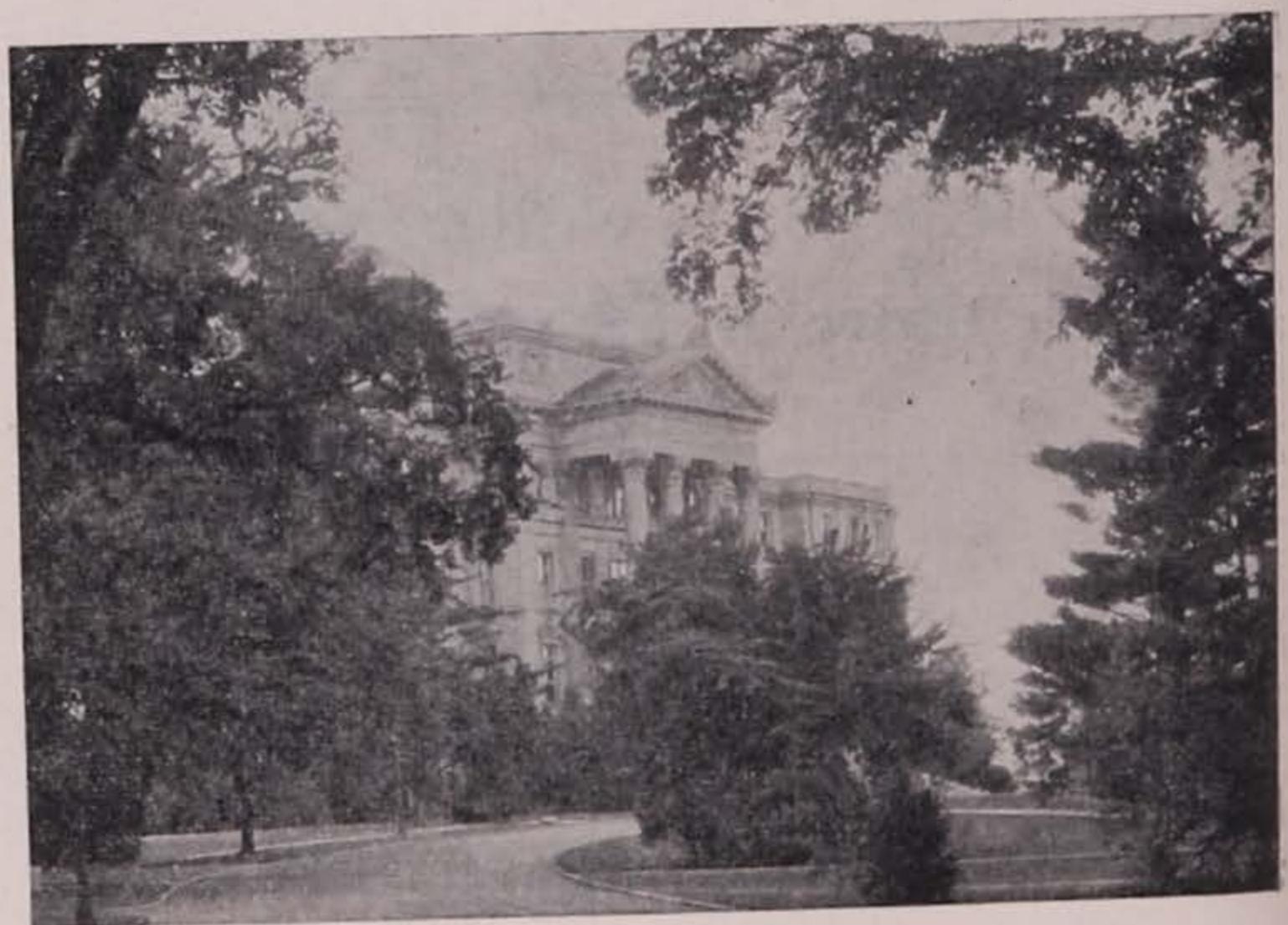

Report of Charles E. Friley, President

The Iowa State College was established on March 22, 1858, by act of the Seventh General Assembly of Iowa. Due to the advent of the Civil War and other factors the opening of the College to students was delayed to October, 1868. Thus, the year 1944 marks the 76th consecutive year of service to the people of Iowa.

OBJECTIVES OF THE COLLEGE

Under the terms of the federal Land Grant Act of 1862, providing for the establishment of colleges of agriculture and mechanic arts, the College has developed comprehensive programs of teaching, research and extension in agriculture, engineering, home economics, science and veterinary medicine. The curricula covering these fields provide a sound foundation in the basic, general and cultural studies upon which the student's field of technical or scientific specialization may be developed.

The Iowa State College has from the beginning received men and women on the same basis. Most of the women students are studying in the Division of Home Economics, which is now the largest school of Home Economics in the world, with an annual enrollment of more than 2000.

GROWTH

The College ranks among the first 25 institutions of higher education in the nation on the basis of total regular enrollment. For the year 1940-1941 the number of resident students was 8,104. In addition, 21,000 students registered for the many short courses offered on the campus. The following tabulation of regular enrollment since 1900, by five-year periods, is of interest:

Since 1941 the College has operated on a twelve months' basis, devoting its energies primarily to education, training, research and extension in behalf of the war effort. The decrease in the enrollment of civilian men has been largely offset by the presence of thousands of army and navy students in uniform, preparing for the various specialized combat services.

PHYSICAL PLANT

The physical plant of the College devoted to educational purposes now consists of 30 major buildings, and 200 minor structures including farm buildings. In addition, there are 10 dormitories with a total housing capacity of 2,100 students. Two other buildings, the Memorial Union and Alumni Hall, are the centers of student social and recreational life. The value of the educational plant is \$12,000,000; the value of the dormitory system is \$3,000,000; and the value of the two student centers is \$1,200,000.

Aside from dormitories, only three buildings of major importance have been erected in the past ten years. These are the Womens Gymnasium, the Agricultural Engineering Building, and the Veterinary Clinic. The first two replaced older buildings destroyed by fire, so the net increase in space for educational purposes has been quite small.

In the same ten-year period the resident enrollment has increased by 75 per cent. Consequently, the existing educational facilities have become quite inadequate for the greatly expanded program of the College. This expansion has occurred not only in resident enrollment, but to an even greater extent in research and extension activities. Additional buildings and equipment are necessary to enable the College adequately to carry on the large and complex program which has been inaugurated in order to meet the increasing demands of students and of the agricultural and industrial interests of Iowa. Detailed statements covering these needs will be presented at the Fifty-first session of the General Assembly of Iowa.

ACADEMIC PROGRAM

The following undergraduate courses of study, leading to the degree Bachelor of Science, are now offered in the several divisions of the College:

AGRICULTURE—Agronomy, Animal Husbandry, Dairy Husbandry, Dairy Industry, Poultry Husbandry, Farm Operation, Forestry, Horticulture, Landscape Architecture, Agricultural Engineering, Agricultural Economics, Rural Sociology, Technical Journalism, Agricultural Education, Industrial Education.

ENGINEERING—Aeronautical Engineering, Architectural Engineering, Chemical Engineering, Civil Engineering, Electrical Engineering, General Engineering, Mechanical Engineering, Mining Engineering.

HOME ECONOMICS—Applied Art, Child Development, Foods and Nutrition, Home Economics Education, Home Management, Household Equipment, Institution Management, Textiles and Clothing.

SCIENCE—Bacteriology, Botany, Chemistry, Chemical Technology, Food Technology, Genetics, Geology, Mathematics, Physical Education, Physics, Zoology, Entomology, Industrial Economics, Economic History.

VETERINARY MEDICINE—Five-year program leading to the degree Doctor of Veterinary Medicine.

Graduate courses, leading to the degrees Master of Science and Doctor of Philosophy, are offered in most of the fields listed above.

For the benefit of students who are unable to spend four years in study for a degree, the Iowa State College offers a number of short courses, covering periods ranging from 3 months to 2 years. These short courses are primarily in agriculture and engineering and deal with such subjects as Dairy Plant Operation, Live Stock Management, Farm Management, Farm Machinery, Diesel Engines, Engineering Drawing, and others.

WAR ACTIVITIES

The Iowa State College had made notable contributions to the war effort. Since June, 1942, more than 15,000 men of the armed services have been trained in various specialized and technical fields; significant war research activities have been conducted; and the greatly intensified program of the agricultural extension service has been an important factor in enabling the State of Iowa to produce the largest volume of agricultural products in her history.

Coincident with the war program, the College has carried forward its normal educational activities. For the past year, committees of the several divisions of the College have been engaged in a thorough study of courses of study with a view to making such changes as will enable the College to meet most effectively the educational needs of the student in the future.

POST-WAR PROGRAM

It is expected that the enrollment at the Iowa State College will greatly increase following the war. According to conservative estimates, about 1,500,000 returning veterans will take advantage of the provisions of the so-called G. I. Bill to continue their education when hostilities cease. This means in general an increase of at least 25 per cent over pre-war enrollments in our colleges and universities for several years after the war. During these years the annual attendance at the Iowa State College will no doubt be between 10,000 and 11,000 students.

While it is anticipated that most of the returning veterans who enter the Iowa State College will enroll in the regular degree courses, the program of non-degree short courses has been expanded, especially in Agriculture, Engineering and industrial fields, for those who desire to study some particular subject intensively for periods ranging from six months to two years.

In order to enable these students to make the most profitable use of their time while in college, the counseling and testing agencies have been expanded and strengthened. When desirable, individual programs will be worked out to fit individual needs.

For ALL students who enter the College in the post-war period, there will be increasing facilities available through which they may gain a clearer understanding and keener appreciation of the problems and opportunities in the world of tomorrow. Not only will the technical and scientific studies be strengthened in the light of recent discoveries and advances, but much greater attention will be given to the fields of history, government, political science, international relations, geography, economics and languages.

Equally important in the years to come will be the study of human relations. The most critical problem facing all of us is to learn how to live together peacefully. We have by no means mastered the art and science of social control. In spite of amazing scientific and technical advance we are still in the primitive age as regards international relations; the moral structure of civilization has crumbled; and we are constantly endangered by ignorance of human relations and the art of government, and by universal hatred and greed. Truly, "Where there is no vision the people perish." The study of mankind must be an important part of the program of every educational institution of the nation in the days to come.

Expenditures: While the instructional program of the Iowa State College consumes the largest share of its funds, the usual emphasis on teaching was relaxed somewhat in 1943-1944 in favor of the service of the college to the United States Government in connection with the war effort. In 1943-1944 approximately one-third of the educational expenditures (33.9%) were devoted to teaching, one-third (31.2%) were devoted to the usual program of public service (research and extension), the remaining third was devoted to all other purposes, the largest portion of which (approximately one-half) was devoted to research for the Federal Government in connection with the war effort.

Physical Plant: The physical plant of the Iowa State College consists of lands—Campus and farms—buildings; equipment, including furniture, laboratory equipment, livestock, farm implements, library books; and improvements other than buildings such as the heating and power plant, water plant, heating tunnels, sewage system, gas mains, and electric lines. 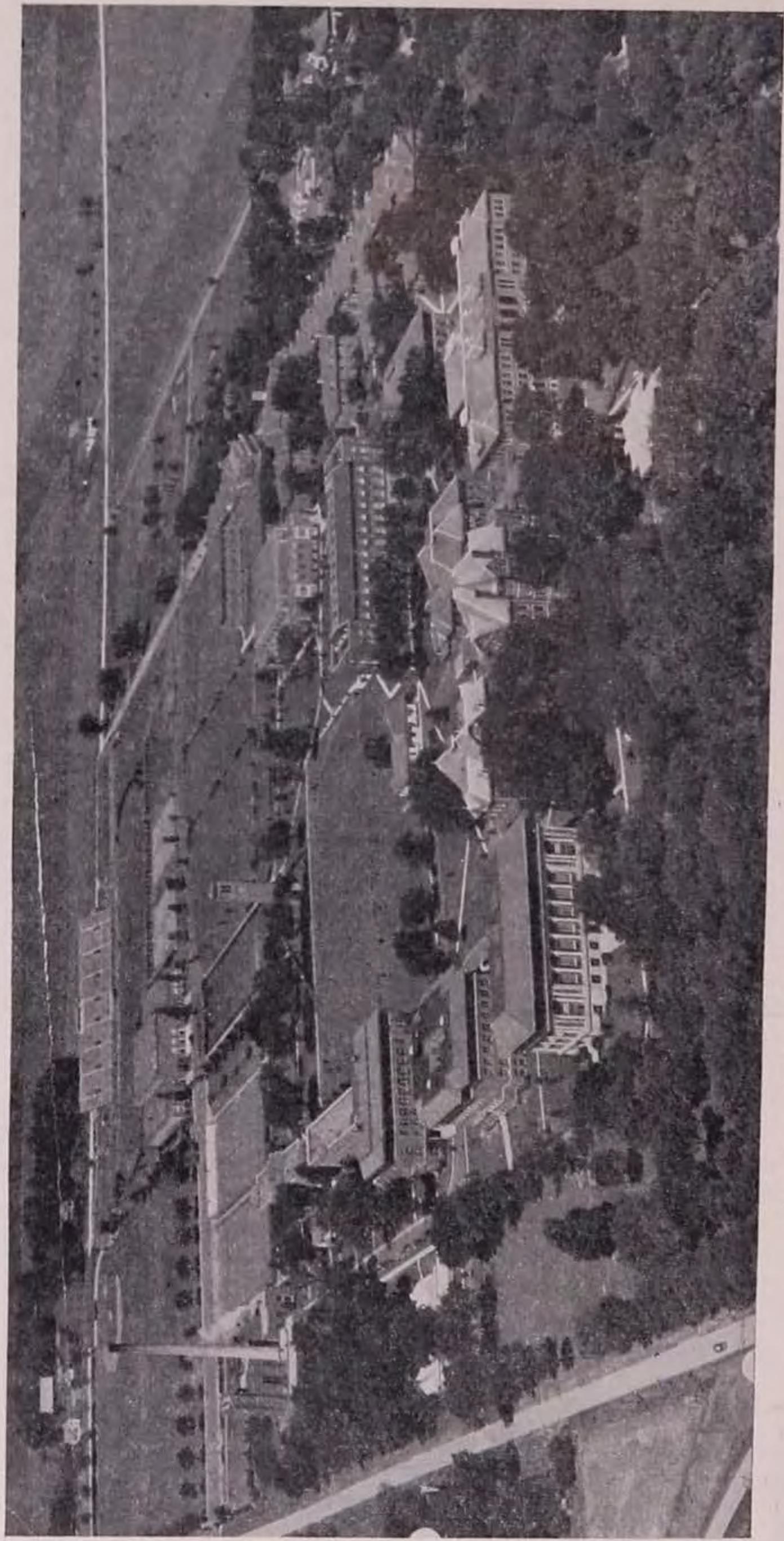

Report of Malcolm Price, President

The Iowa State Teachers College was founded in 1876 by act of the General Assembly. The College is fully accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, by the American Association of Teachers Colleges, and by the Association of American Universities.

As the name implies, the entire resources of the Iowa State Teachers College are devoted to the service of public education in the State of Iowa.

On the campus, teachers are trained for all the fields of teaching found in the public schools. Since approximately one-third of all the teaching positions in the state are found in the one-room rural schools, the College stresses the field of rural teaching and cooperates directly with county superintendents and rural school districts in this training program. Teachers are trained for the graded elementary schools of the town and city school districts under two main divisions, the kindergarten-primary grades and the upper elementary grades.

Teachers are trained for all the teaching fields found in the public schools. These fields include art, agriculture, biological science, chemistry, commercial education, earth science, economics, English, French, German, government, history, home economics, industrial arts, instrumental music, Latin, mathematics, physics, physical education (men), physical education (women), school music, Spanish, sociology, speech, and vocal music.

There is maintained on the campus a complete demonstration school ranging from a nursery school and a kindergarten to a senior high school. This unit gives opportunity for demonstrations and student teaching as do also schools in two neighboring towns and in two rural districts that are affiliated with the college. In all these situations the student teachers carry on their student teaching under normal school conditions and under the direct supervision of professionally trained critic teachers who are staff members of the college.

In addition to its function of teacher training, the Iowa State Teachers College serves the schools of the state through its Bureau of Extension Service. Through this bureau, professional consultative service by staff members of the College is made available in all teaching fields. This service is available to teachers, administrators and boards of education. Correspondence study and professional publications are also provided through the Bureau of Extension Service.



PRESIDENT MALCOM PRICE

Since December of 1942, the Iowa State Teachers College has been host to about a thousand women of the Women's Reserve of the Navy. This group uses dormitory facilities, the food service, and classroom and gymnasium space. From March, 1943, to July, 1944, similar facilities were made available to five-hundred men in the Army Air Corps. In addition these men were instructed by the College staff. The College is one of eighty-two institutions cooperating with the United States Armed Forces Institute in offering correspondence courses to men and women in the service.

The campus includes 132 acres of land and the physical plant is valued at \$4,295,000. Dormitory facilities are available for men and women students.

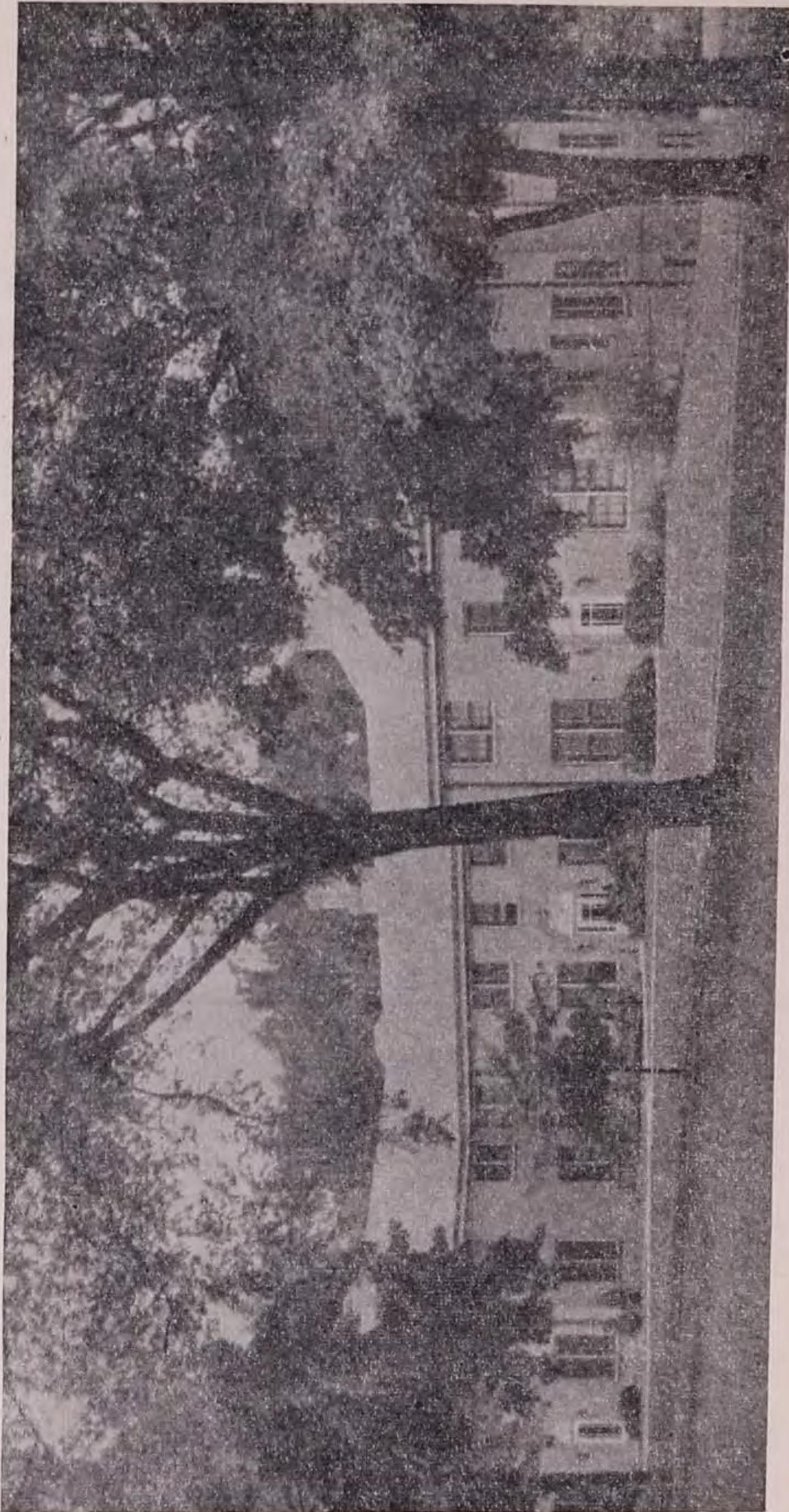

Iowa School for the Blind

The Iowa School for the Blind is an educational institution which offers complete educational opportunity to the visually handicapped boys and girls from kindergarten through high school. In many respects, the subjects follow the same lines of those found in the schools for the sighted. In addition to academic subjects, special emphasis is placed on music, industrial arts, and physical education. After satisfactorily completing the four year high school course, students are equipped to enter college and those who do so attain records that compare favorably with those of the sighted students.

In 1943 the Fiftieth General Assembly appropriated funds to establish a sight saving program to take care of the needs of children throughout the state whose vision is too great to use braille but not sufficient to make satisfactory progress in the public schools where ordinary print is used. The sight saving rooms are equipped with special lighting, green chalk boards, sight saving desks, and large type books. Teachers with special training in sight saving work conduct the classes.

ACADEMIC COURSES

In addition to the academic subjects, the effort in the School is to provide the students with a wholesome philosophy of life, to help them accept blindness more as an inconvenience rather than a handicap. The real handicap might lie in the lack of innate ability; the lack of health, initiative, application, resourcefulness—and not one of those does sight give, nor the loss of or lack of sight take away. Losing one's sight may become a challenge hitherto unsuspected. When one avenue to achievement is cut off, even the main highway perhaps, no reason exists why an individual must drop out of the march. Any destination can be reached by detours if one is willing to put in a few longer hours and endure a little rougher going. Visually picturing, mentally seeing through friendly eyes, are some of these detours.

PRIMARY

The primary department stresses fluent reading and rapid thought expression through practical experiences in the world about the child. The school emphasizes Braille reading which is the keynote of book thoughts for the blind pupil. There are three grades of Braille. Grade

1 is given in the kindergarten and in first grade; Grade 1½ is taught in the second grade; and Grade 2 is presented in the sixth grade. This advanced Braille consists of many contractions which add speed to reading and writing. The primary child learns the geography of his home, his school, the work of his friends, and society with their physical, social and geographical relationships to him. As he progresses in his primary work, he is taught to do the work with his hands, mind, and body as his friends about him do in gradual successions of experiences. He learns through dramatization stories, music, healthful rhythmic games and plays, numbers, and nature.

INTERMEDIATE

The School for the Blind has practically the same courses in the intermediate and junior high grades as in public schools with the exception of drawing. Through the use of "My Weekly Reader" and "Current Events," it is cooperating with the reading program set up in the American Educational Press. Geography and history are taught in units, and in both history and language much dramatization is done. The arithmetic course varies from that found in the public school in that mental arithmetic is stressed to a greater degree. This helps to develop the powers of concentration and speeds up the process of learning. The talking books—a portable victrola, with records of books, stories, and plays instead of records of music—and the Braille writer are two important aids. In the lower grades, tests and written work are done mostly in Braille, but the typewriter is used in the higher grades.

HIGH SCHOOL

The high school continues on the foundation established by the grades. Here the student receives instruction in most of the courses offered in a college preparatory curriculum. Magazines such as "The Reader's Digest", "The Searchlight", and the "Weekly News" are published in Braille and keep the student informed on present affairs. The radio, bringing the School of the Air, is used in some classrooms. The Braille library of several hundred volumes affords the students with reading in novels, drama, essays, history, biography, and science.

In commercial subjects besides typewriting, which he studies in the grades, a student learns to use the Braille writer and the stenotype or shorthand machine.

In high school, the student participates in plays, creative writing and contests with public schools.

MUSIC

Seven full time and one part time music teacher are employed. Subjects taught are voice, organ, piano, violin and other instruments of the orchestra. Also harmony, musical form, and history of music are offered. The pupils do not learn their music "by ear", as some people erroneously think, but they memorize it from music printed according to the Braille system. Christmas and Easter vesper services are given by the Iowa School for the Blind choir, and the same organization furnishes the commencement Sunday music. The choir averages thirty-two members. In the orchestra are thirty members. Each year one or more orchestra concerts are given. In state high school music contests both the choir and orchestra have received highest ratings.

HOME AND INDUSTRIAL ARTS

The industrial department of the school gives training in chair caning, mat and brush making, basketry, plain and art weaving, upholstery, leather work, and poultry raising. A four-year course in piano tuning

and repairing enables the student to take his place in a factory with sighted workers. Manual training students do repair work and make some new articles which gives the boys the fundamentals of handling tools.

Home arts consist of sewing, cooking, and home making, all of which subjects are planned to prepare the student to meet the needs of the home.

THE HEALTH PROGRAM

Every student enrolled in the Iowa School for the Blind participates in and benefits from an extensive health education program which has for its objective the development and maintenance of "a sound mind and sound body". Under the direction of three full time and two part time teachers the physical education department carries on a program of interscholastic and intramural sports. The wrestling and cross-country teams compete with boys of other schools in Iowa, while the boys' and girls' track teams enter a national telegraphic meet and two dual meets each spring. Kickball, ground baseball, and touch football are sports included in the intramural schedule. Supervised swimming in the gymnasium pool and roller skating on the large outdoor cement oval are favorite pastimes with the students. Winter sports include ice skating, and sliding down slides constructed on the campus.

Special attention is given in gymnasium classes to those students requiring remedial and corrective exercises. Much emphasis is placed on correct posture, standing, walking, and sitting habits. The good health of students is further guaranteed by the school through its maintenance of a completely equipped hospital which has an eighteen-bed capacity. The hospital includes:

1. A registered trained nurse, who is in constant attendance at the school, administering treatments for eye or other physical ailments, caring for ill students or attending to other hospital duties.

2. A regularly employed physician, who makes daily calls at the school to examine students who are sick or indisposed, to perform the usual medical services, to give advice with reference to the need of a specialist's services, to recommend helpful treatments, or to vaccinate for the prevention of disease.

3. A dentist is employed who gives two forenoons each week to the task of caring for the teeth of the students and looking after their dental needs fully. A complete dental office is maintained in connection with the hospital.

4. The complete service of the University Medical School and Hospital.

a. Children entering the school for the first time are taken to the University Hospital for a complete examination and check-up.

b. All cases needing surgical treatment are referred to the University Hospital for attention.

c. Refractions for the purpose of fitting glasses are all taken care of at the University Hospital.

d. Cases of serious illness, needing the skill of a specialist, are cared for at the University Hospital. All of this service is without cost to the School for the Blind, and is very valuable.

Twice during each school year the ophthalmologist of the State University Medical School and Hospital, accompanied by two or three internes, makes a visit to the school. At the time of this visit all of the students of the school assemble for eye and other examinations. From the findings of these examinations the ophthalmologist makes recommendations as follows:

a. Concerning those needing daily or frequent medical or other treatment.

b. Concerning those who might be benefited by surgical means.

c. Concerning those whose vision might be improved by the fitting of glasses.

If the recommendations of the ophthalmologist involves surgery, they are transmitted to the parents. If they give their consent, the ones concerned are sent to the University Hospital for such surgical work. During the years 1943-1944 students were sent as follows:

All in all, a student enrolled in the Iowa School for the Blind participates in as fine a body building program as it is possible to offer.

ORGANIZATIONS

Besides the regular curricular subjects, there are four main extra-curricular activities which function throughout the school year: Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Golden Rule Circle, and Vocational Guidance Club.

The Boy Scouts meet at least once each week with their Scout Master. Whenever possible an outdoor activity is planned for these meetings. Usually the activity is in the form of a nature study hike and an overnight camping trip or some kind of outdoor game.

There are two Girl Scout groups with a sponsor for each. The groups are divided according to the rank which each girl has attained. The sponsors meet with their respective groups once each week.

The Golden Rule Circle, supervised by a teacher but planned by the high school students, meets each Sunday afternoon. Each alternate Sunday the meeting is held in the school chapel. At these meetings some worthwhile topic vital to the development of wholesome bodies and minds is discussed. On the other Sundays, the high school students meet in the Senior girls' lounge for a social get-together.

There are two Vocational Guidance Clubs, both directed by a teacher. The first includes the seventh and eighth grades and the second comprises the senior class members. The main purpose of these organizations is to do as much as possible toward preparing the students to select some vocation for which he is best suited after graduation.

When not engaged in some activity, the students spend their after-school hours in their dormitory. Either a matron or supervisor has charge of each of the eight dormitories. Dormitory life is planned as nearly as possible to coincide with the home life of the average child.

Chapel for students, teachers, matrons, and supervisors is held Monday, Wednesday, and Friday. At these chapels, teachers, ministers of Vinton, and students conduct services that offer special religious training. Every Sunday morning, Sunday School is held in the dormitories. Afterwards, the students join the church lines which are formed for attendance at the local churches. A teacher or supervisor is in charge of each line. A student may choose whatever church he wishes to attend.

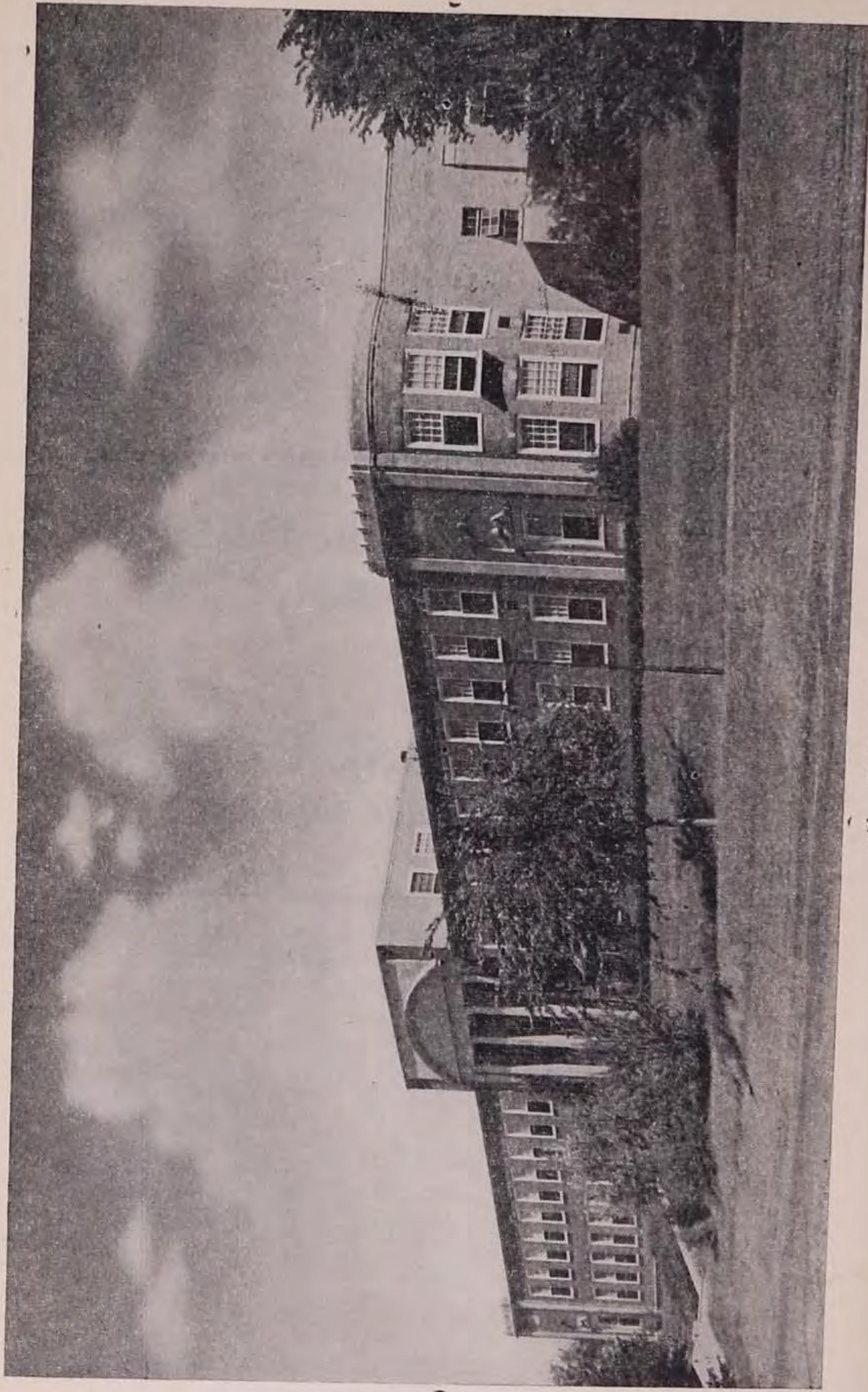

THE OBJECT OF THE IOWA SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF

This objective pre-supposes that the child's education shall be as individual in character as the school is reasonably able to afford. This means that each child, entrusted to the care of the school, shall receive training suitable to and commensurate with his capabilities.

It is well to re-emphasize, from time to time, the objective toward which the school organization is working.

The object of the Iowa School for the Deaf is to promote a thorough education for children between the ages of seven and nineteen who are too deaf to be properly instructed in the public schools of the state.

The final test of the school's effectiveness will be found in how well the child assumes the responsibilities of citizenship are rightfully his. Specifically, the object is:

1. To develop boys and girls who are self-supporting.
2. To teach boys and girls how to conduct a successful home life.
3. To teach boys and girls fundamental skills involved in normal living.
4. To teach an intelligent use of leisure time.
5. To teach social concepts consistent with good citizenship.
6. To produce boys and girls healthy in mind, body and spirit.
7. To provide opportunities for qualified pupils to obtain a higher education.

PRIMARY HALL

Small children, upon first entering the school, are segregated in the Primary Hall unit, where they are surrounded with an oral atmosphere. Instruction is continued orally for three years, until the oral habit is well founded, if the pupil is amenable to this habit.

The physical needs of these children are cared for down to the smallest detail by a corps of selected counselors under the direction of a competent housemother. Their schoolroom training is given by a staff of nine special teachers directed by a supervising teacher.

By the careful development of this unit, the school was able to reduce the average entrance age from fourteen years in 1921 to between six and

seven years. Records are on file of a number of deaf children of preschool age, with whom the State Field Worker is able to make contact, advise parents, and in general aid in the preparation for school so essential to the conservation of time during the formative years.

The work in Primary Hall covers elementary instruction largely in speech and language so that on entering the school proper the children are able to take first grade work or better, of the public school.

AURICULAR TESTS AND TRAINING

The hearing of each pupil is carefully tested with the Western Electric 6-A Audiometer soon after entrance and frequently thereafter. If the percentage of residual hearing revealed by these tests is enough to encourage efforts to develop that hearing, as many pupils as there are accommodations for are placed in a room with a hearing aid. The school now has six complete units of twelve outlets each. The cost of these instruments is high, but every effort is being made to provide enough units to take care of all the pupils who have usable hearing.

A trained pianist comes to the school daily to help conduct the rhythm exercises for the younger pupils. It is believed that these rhythm exercises assist the deaf child to acquire more flexibility in his speech.

ACADEMIC DEPARTMENT

The instruction throughout the academic department is given orally for those pupils able to profit by oral methods. Other methods must necessarily be used when pupils fail to progress by the oral method.

The course of study includes a systematic development of mathematics, language, social and natural sciences, composition, reading and speech and speech-reading. This course of study comprises a total of twelve years, three of which are spent in preparatory work. A thirteenth year of instruction is available for qualified pupils. This additional year may be used in preparation for entrance to a hearing high school, for college preparation or for further vocational instruction. A diploma is awarded to those pupils who have fulfilled the requirements of the school course of study.

Special opportunities are provided for all the boys and girls in the form of supervised play. This is in addition to the regular athletic program. Thus considerable interest is developed in such activities as volley ball, table tennis and bowling, and the like.

Once a week various members of the faculty sponsor assembly programs for the pupils. These programs are educational in nature, designed to be informative, and to develop character traits. Movies, both of an educational and entertainment nature, are held from time to time. Films are available for classroom use by those teachers requesting them.

VOCATIONAL TRAINING

Rounding out its program of training the deaf for active citizenship, the Iowa School offers extended facilities for developing the aptitudes of both boys and girls in some of the occupations most suited to them which may be taught under school conditions. Competent instructors are employed under the direction of an experienced principal. The school aims to train in workmanlike habits, in character, and in appreciation of good workmanship. The instruction is shaped to lay a good foundation in the fundamentals of a particular trade or occupation.

In this department, as in the academic department, credits are given for acceptable performance, or withheld if the student's performance does not come up to the requirements. Thus the vocational training credits definitely are required for graduation from the school.

Valuable practice for the pupils is obtained in caring for the needs of the school community. The baking classes make all the bread, cake and pastries served. The shoe repairing classes attend to the mending of the pupils' shoes. The book-bindery pupils repair and rebuild both text and library books. This class cooperates with the printing class in making up the school catalogue.

In the printery, two linotypes are provided for instructional purposes, and the older pupils become proficient in their operation. A complete outfit of miscellaneous equipment and a variety of presses are provided, including a self-feeding unit.

The advanced classes in cabinet making do remarkably fine work, turning out excellent furniture which is in use all over the school. The upholstering classes also contribute many fine pieces for use in the parlors and offices.

A course in general shop instructs the pupils, both girls and boys, in the operation involved in leathercraft, woodworking and metal work. Likewise, the facilities of the school farm are used to instruct a class of boys interested in agriculture.

A modification of the advanced course permits students not desiring to prepare themselves for college to take extra vocational training, and in some cases full time work in this department.

The general policy of the school is to give every girl basic training in the art of home-making, in its various branches. If possible, training in some bread-winning occupation is also given to each girl.

A careful check is made of each pupil's development in this department, on the basis of such qualities as Speed, Accuracy, Self-Reliance, Industry, Thrift, Dependability, Punctuality, Co-operation, Courtesy and Neatness. The grading system is based upon the pupil's development of these qualities so essential to character. Therefore, vocational training in this school means considerably more than the development of skilled hands.

MORAL INSTRUCTION

Moral and religious training is provided, of a general character acceptable to all churches and creeds. Sunday School is held every Sunday morning in graded classes conducted by the regular teachers. Once a week, morning assemblies are held, when some member of the faculty gives a talk intended to strengthen character. Whenever parents request it, pupils are allowed to attend churches named by the parents in the city. Ministers of the various denominations are welcomed to conduct special services at the school for their special groups. Visiting ministers frequently are invited to address all the pupils in the main auditorium.

THE SOCIAL LIFE OF THE COMMUNITY

Pupils enjoy a varied social life such as might be expected in any large boarding school. General parties attended by pupils and teachers, directed by faculty committees, are held on all special occasions and holidays. Smaller groups have frequent socials. A number of clubs and activity groups hold frequent meetings. These occasions supply the opportunity to teach manners and social customs.

Picnics and trips to nearby places of interest, theater parties and class trips of an educational nature are frequently arranged. Winter sports are a popular diversion. Extensive playgrounds enable the boys and girls to be out of doors for healthful games and pastimes during the fall and spring months.
